

THERECORD

Grand Old Man of SAE Joins Chapter Eternal

TEORGE DEERING KIMBALL, Colo. Z '95, for thirty-six years a member of the Supreme Council of Sigma Alpha Epsilon and founder of the National Interfraternity Conference, died at Denver, Colo., on July 8, 1936, as the result of complications resulting from a three-month siege of allergy. He was buried in Denver on July 10 with full Masonic honors, services having been held in the temple of the Colorado Consistory of the Scottish Rite bodies with Knights Templar and members of other bodies attending in uniform. Services at the grave in Fairmount cemetery were conducted by Denver Union Lodge of Masons, of which he had been a member for forty-six years. Delegations from Colorado Zeta and the Denver alumni of SAE attended and the Supreme Council was represented by Lauren Foreman, E.S.R.

An intimate associate of the late William C. Levere, long-time E.S.R., for whom he named his only son, George Kimball wrote his name high on the scroll of ΣAE and interfraternity leaders. His record of thirty-six years of continuous service on the Supreme Council in four different posts has not been equaled by any other member of the Fraternity. As the author of the resolution calling for the organization of a Panhellenic union of all Greek-letter fraternities, adopted at the famous meeting of the Department of Universities and Colleges of the Religious Education Association, held in Plymouth Church, Chicago, February 11, 1909, and as a participant in the meeting at the University Club, New York, November 27, 1909, at which organization was perfected, he was the moving force in the formation of the National Interfraternity Conference and is entitled to be known as the founder of this important body.

Born in East Portland, Me., May 17, 1868, he moved to Denver in 1886 and received his college education at the University of Denver where he was initiated into \$\Sigma AE\$, December 18, 1891, at the installation of Colorado

Zeta, of which he was a charter member. He immediately began to take an active part in all ΣAE affairs, was elected president of the Colorado State Association, and, although he was not present at the Pittsburgh Convention of 1893, he was elected by that convention, as was then the custom, to be president of Eta province, which at that time included Arkansas and Texas and all the United States north and west of those states. He presided at the first convention of Eta province in Denver, December 27, 1895, and was reelected as president, serving until the second convention in 1897.

He attended the national convention at St. Louis in 1896 and was made chairman of the finance committee, thus beginning his long career of constructive statesmanship for SAE. He attended every national convention since held. At the Nashville Convention of 1898 he was elected Eminent Supreme Deputy Archon and at Boston in 1900 he was elected Eminent Supreme Treasurer. He was elected Eminent Supreme Archon at Atlanta in 1906 and reëlected at Atlantic City in 1909; again elected Eminent Supreme Treasurer at Kansas City in 1910; held this office until the St. Louis Convention of 1920 when he was elected Eminent Supreme Warden; and continuously reëlected until the Washington Convention of 1934 when he refused to let his name be put in nomination for another term.

Through all these years he exercised a marked influence in the councils of the Fraternity, always insisting on sound business policies and practices, and the present financial stability of SAE is in no small measure the result of his efforts. The friendship that existed between George Kimball and Billy Levere might, without exaggeration, be likened to that of David and Jonathan or of Damon and Pythias but, nevertheless, they frequently disagreed sharply over matters of policy. Billy was something of a dreamer, always having in mind some constructive

plan for the betterment of SAE, and was impatient of delay. George, on the other hand, looked at every expenditure made or proposed (to quote Past E.S.A. Gibson Hobbs) "with a microscopic eye" and was never willing to authorize the expenditure of a cent until the money to pay it and a comfortable surplus besides was in hand. Their debates frequenly enlivened SAE gatherings and the terms, "the Eminent Tight-Wad of Denver" and "the distinguished literary genius of Evanston," which they applied to one another became by-words throughout the Fraternity.

By faith a Methodist and a Republican and in practice a strict prohibitionist, George Kimball frequently found himself in disagreement with SAEs, particularly those from the South, of Democratic leanings and more liberal views as to personal habits but there was not a man of them who did not give him credit for the sincerity of his convictions and hold him in the highest esteem and affection.

He was a thirty-third degree mason, captain general of the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar, almoner of Colorado Consistory No. 1 of the Scottish Rite, past commander of Colorado Commandery No. 1 of the Knights Templar, and treasurer of El Jebel Temple of the Mystic Shrine. Many years ago he was an officer of the Knights Templar drill team which won many national competitions.

The greater part of his business career was in connection with coal mining and he was president of the Rugby Coal Co., though he had retired from active business several years ago.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Grace Porter Kimball, who has attended many SAE conventions with him, by one son, William Levere Kimball, Colo. Z '33, second lieutenant, United States Army, who was graduated from West Point in June, and by a sister, Miss Martha Kimball, a former national officer of IIBO.





Matthew Luckiesh, Wizard of Light

RILLIANT student though he was, and a member of the Purdue chapter of Tau Beta Pi, nonorary engineering fraternity. little lid we who were members of Indiana Beta back in 1909 realize that we had in the subject of this sketch one whose contributions to the electrical industries were destined to place his name at the very top of those engaged in ecientific research.

Matthew Luckiesh, Ind. B '09, is an mazing individual, as his record atests. Still young, he is one of the great scientists of the world. At tweny-one he was still prospecting for old in Nevada where he had wanlered after a precocious career as rombone player in a minstrel troupe. To show you how his mind works, his cientific career began one night when, is he was trudging across the Nevada wastes, he chanced to observe the observe alled "will-o'-thevisp." Then and there deciding to ind out what it was all about, he packed himself back home and, aided by his trusty trombone, put himself hrough Purdue.

The trombone is laid away but not Matt's minstrel spirit. He loves night clubs and crowds, parties and theatres, says night was made to play and young people to play with. He asks becople whether they are disappointed because he hasn't whiskers, takes a prima donna's care of his figure and works like the devil. He finished a one hundred thousand word scientific

book in twenty-five nights.

Graduating from Purdue in 1909, Mr. Luckiesh went to Cleveland as physicist in the research laboratories of the Incandescent Lamp Department of the General Electric Company. In 920 he became Director of Applied cience and since 1924 has been Diector of the Lighting Research Laboratory. During the twenty-four years hat Luckiesh has been at Nela Park ne has initiated researches along nany fundamental lines and is reponsible for many notable developnents. He developed the first accurate class filter to be used with a MAZDA amp for the production of artificial laylight. Those blue-green daylight MAZDA lamps are his, as are the amps called "Flametint."

In one year General Electric sold 5,000,000 each of daylight MAZDA and Flametint lamps. A still newer levelopment was the use of artificial unlight with its health-giving rays, but his idea entails more than the nere invention of a new bulb. Statistically he will prove to you that day-

light costs as much as 100% in lighting and heating efficiency in New York, adding that windows waste heat and space and that their light is inefficient and limited. His ideas of the efficiency of daylightless factories are set forth in his book "The Cost of Daylight."

Dr. Luckiesh is a prolific writer, having published hundreds of scientific and technical as well as popular articles. The titles of his books indicate the wide scope of his knowledge and the perusal of them will convince one that he knows whereof he writes. The titles of his books to date are as follows:

Color and Its Applications, 1915, 1921; Light and Shade and Their Applications, 1916; The Lighting Art, 1917; The Language of Color, 1918; Artificial Light, 1920; Lighting the Home, 1920; Visual Illusions, 1922; The Book of the Sky, 1922, 1933; Ultraviolet Radiation, 1922; Light and Color in Advertising and Merchandising, 1923; Light and Work, 1924; Portable Lamps, 1924; Foundations of the Universe, 1925; Lighting Fixtures and Lighting Effects, 1925; Light and Health, 1926; Artificial Sunlight, 1930; Seeing, 1931; Seeing and Human Welfare, 1934.

In addition to lighting the workworld, Dr. Luckiesh has been a leader in the analysis and development of the possibilities of residential lighting, having years ago conducted surveys along this line in the development of lighting fixtures which produce a variety of lighting effects suitable for specific rooms and specific purposes. Much of the progress in residential lighting has been due to the interest aroused by his surveys of the prevailing conditions and prophesies of future possibilities in that field, supple-

mented by the development of fixtures

and lighting recipes.

In 1932 Dr. Luckiesh received the Gold Medal Award of the Distinguished Service Foundation of Optometry for his researches in Seeing and also for the contribution of his valuable book entitled "Seeing-a Partnership of Lighting and Vision." For more than twenty years he has been laying the foundation of the new science of seeing which provides such radically new concepts that the entire approach to lighting and human welfare has been altered. Already this new science is awakening a lighting consciousness on a broad front, revolutionizing lighting throughout its many fields and promising to revise many other practices of mankind because seeing is nearly synonymous to living.

The science of seeing is being accepted as the greatest contribution ever made to lighting development. It is evolving a crude art of lighting into a science. Seeing is a most important controllable activity human beings. It is almost as complex as living. Dr. Luckiesh has evolved the idea that seeing is an activity of human beings operating as human seeing-machines. He assumed that human beings see not only with eyes and light but with their bodies and minds. Thus he opened an entirely new vista of research and directed a new attack in this direction. Eventually long tedious researches upon eyes, muscles, nerves, heart, etc., pointed toward daylight conditions as ideal for seeing easily. They revealed penalties due to conditions of barely seeing. They provided knowledge for specifying light for human efficiency and welfare. Artificial lighting which was developed—and practiced—as a competitor of darkness became a competitor of daylight.

Dr. Luckiesh is a member of numerous societies, including the Edison Electric Institute, the Illuminating Engineering Society, the American Institute of Electrical Engineers, the American Physical Society, the Franklin Institute, the Optical Society of America, etc. He was awarded the Edward Longstreth Medal and certificate of merit by the Franklin Institute for his work on visibility of airplanes during the World War. It was at that time he served as chairman of the Committee on Camouflage of the

National Research Council.

At its commencement exercises in

June, 1935, Purdue University conferred the degree of Doctor of En-

gineering on Dr. Luckiesh with the

following citation:

"Matthew Luckiesh, illuminating engineer whose skillful moulding of the candles of science has furnished new light for the darkened places where men live. Upon the nomination of the President and the Faculty and by the authority of the Trustees of Purdue University, he has been admitted to the degree of Doctor of Engineering."

This degree is highly prized as it is rarely conferred by Purdue. It is a coincidence that the first man to whom this degree was given by Purdue was another member of S A E, Harry Robinson Safford, Ind. B '95, executive vice-president, Missouri Pacific

Lines, Houston, Tex.

Further details regarding Dr. Luckiesh's life and work may be

found in Who's Who in America, American Men of Science, Who's Who in Engineering, etc. A perusal of the above mentioned biographies gives only a one-sided picture of Dr. Luckiesh. They portray only the scientist and scholar. Dr. Luckiesh is not only one of the world's authorities on light and lighting-a man consulted on problems of color, art, architecture, general science, design, etc.-he is a most human sort of person. While he is a dreamer he is a realist at the same time. He loves Nature and his vacations are spent in the wilds of Canada. Anyone who enjoys Nature should read his "Book of the Sky" which portrays the beauties and wonders of cloudland.

Although a great portion of his writings and lectures are devoted to technical and scientific subjects, he also enters the broad and deep phases of living, including esthetics, happiness, economics and civilized progress. Perhaps his most outstanding gift is the ability to convey these ideas to the layman in the layman's language. His most outstanding characteristics are alertness and enthusiasm. He doesn't plan ever to grow old, although he allows he may retire and let the world catch up with his works. While waiting he will write—but not technical works as are most of those he has already published-instead, novels, books on popular science, and a major work on his philosophy of light and life.

Luckiesh is a firm believer that ignorance is the overwhelming cause of all ills and that scientific knowledge can and will eventually be the salva-

tion of civilization.

'Doc" Hand of Mississippi State

TERVING. Mississippi State College in the capacity of four positions should leave the normal person with little energy or ambition for endeavor beyond administrative detail. Not so Dr. William Flowers Hand, Miss. @ '93, who holds down the position of dean of the School of Science, vicepresident of the college, state chemist, and instructor in chemistry.

Although relatively frail in stature, Dr. Hand sets a pace that is the despair of his students and colleagues. He literally lives in his office and laboratory, greeting his classes with the eight o'clock bell, although sleepless students will tell you that on the night before, his laboratory windows were lighted until two or three. He likes to do research at night, and saves his most exacting analyses for the lonesome time when

there is no noise, no one to bother him. At such times he divides his activity between the microscope and the dictaphone, replying to the voluminous inquiries that pour into his offices daily.

Dr. Hand began his academic career with Mississippi State, and his fraternity career with old Mississippi Theta. He was graduated from Mississippi State in 1893, and remained to serve as assistant state chemist and assistant chemistry professor. Obtain-

ing the M.S. degree in 1895, he was promoted to state chemist and professor of chemistry four years later. The requirements of the Ph.D. kept him at Columbia for a while at the turn of the century. In 1920 he was elected vice-president of the Association of Agricultural Chemists of North America, and became president of that body in 1921. For several years he was on the board of the Association's Journal, and later became a member of the National Standards Committee. He has also been a president of the South Central States Food and Drug Officials.

His classmates know him as "Bill"; his students as "Doc," and his scientific pursuits do not preclude a close and affectionate bond between him and the latter. To them he likes to tell stories of old Mississippi Theta, when it was sub-rosa at State. At that time fraternities were strictly forbidden under the regulations of the military discipline locally in effect. When the presence of the chapter was discovered by General Stephen D. Lee, the president, the members were given the choice of renouncing their vows, or leaving the college. Unhesitatingly they chose the latter. Their departure from the campus was marked by wild enthusiasm on the part of their fellow classmates, who crowded the station and sped the heroes

homeward with cheers and waving

"That was a great moment," Dr. Hand recalls, "and that train ride held the highest and lowest moments of my life. I left the station with my head in the clouds, but I was back to earth before I reached home. As the group thinned out and we got nearer home, it suddenly dawned on me that my father might see nothing so heroic in my escapade, for he was not at all interested in college fraternities.'

SAE Alumni Secretaries

REAT 'em rough and get their money," is the playtime theme song of the American Alumni Council, an organization of some 250 college alumni secretaries and allied racketeers. He served as rush captain of the chapter for two years. and president of the Columbus Alumni Association of SAE.

Charles W. Beachem, Pa. Δ '25, alumni secretary of Gettysburg College, is the first and only incumbent of that office, the position having been created in 1929. He has built up a fine organization and a well equipped office, is editor of the alumni magazine, and conducts a successful alumni fund. Like many of us, he started as a teacher. He taught chemistry and coached athletics in the Mt. Pleasant (Pa.) high school for two years, was then elected principal, and served in that capacity until called back to Gettysburg. Beachem was a topnotcher on the campus and in the chapter during student days. He served as E.C. and alumni secretary during his junior year, and as E.A. during both terms of his senior year. Although playing three years of varsity football, representing his class on the student council, and serving as treasurer of the Y.M.C.A., he came through with honors in chemistry. He served in the Cavalry in the U.S. and the Philippines and during the World War attained the rank of Lieutenant Colonel, 28th Division. After the war he served as major on the General Staff, then



If the story is to be complete, there seems to be no way to get around a brief autobiography. Having been in this game since 1921, I suppose I rate among the deans. I have managed to make myself somewhat conspicuous, but never indis-pensable. I came back to Worcester Tech in 1920 as assistant professor of civil engineering, after a varied engineering and military career. For five years I was construction engineer for the Northern Pacific Railway in the Northwest, spent two years in the U. S. Army, one year overseas, as captain, 319th Engineers, then a year as sanitary engineer, City of Cleveland. My degeneration from a professorship has been gradual, one course sloughed off a year until I let go of the last one in 1929. Only an average student at Tech, I had to branch out in other lines-member of the track team, senior class president, and member of Skull, senior honorary society. I have since been honored by ΣΞ and served as chapter president, but that doesn't count. I joined the fraternity late in the course and held no offices. In later years I was more active, serving as first president of the Spokane Alumni Association and as its delegate to the Pittsburgh convention, also a faculty adviser and trustee of Massachusetts Delta.

R. John Thiesen, Ga. Φ'10, alumni secretary, Georgia School of Technology, is also one of the deans. He has been executive secretary, National Georgia Tech Alumni Association



since 1922, when he was called back to reorganize the work there. He is also editor of the Alumnus, director of the graduate personnel department and of the Expansion Fund projects. In 1930, Jack was president of the Georgia College Placement Office, and a member of the Presidents' Club of Atlanta. While he was a student, Thiesen played two years of varsity football and managed the team one year. He was business manager of the college annual, and member of several honorary societies. He served the Georgia Phi chapter in various capacities up to and including E.D.A. After graduation in 1910, Jack was successively president of a construction company, high school instructor, plant manager on gas manufacturing

equipment during the war.

Omitting write-ups of one or more important persons is the usual sin of feature writers. If there are other ΣAEs in alumni work, the editor of THE RECORD and I would like to know about them. When I was a mere neophyte in the profession, there were at least three other sons of Minerva in the group, all of whom rated as giants. Outstanding among them was H. S. Warwick, Colo. Z and Ohio @ '06, who was the initial promoter of an association of alumni secretaries, at a meeting held at Ohio State in 1913. Out of this came the American Alumni Council. At or soon after Warwick's time came Robert S. Crawford, Wis. A '03, alumni secretary at the University of Wisconsin, and A. G. (Gus) Pierrot, Ill. @ '07, alumni secretary, University of Chicago.

Major General Breckinridge, U. S. Marine Corps

THE great southwest was reached by pioneers through the gateway of the present states of Kentucky and Tennessee, and such men as Daniel Boone and Sam Houston traveled this route to open up lands. Some families stopped off in the Blue Grass regions and cast their lot in what is now the state of Kentucky. Among the early families whose blood has done much toward making history for that state stands the name of Breckinridge. Kentucky and Breckinridge are synonymous. John Cabell Breckinridge was Vice-President of the United States under President Buchanan; he settled in Lexington,

Ky., in the early 1800's.
In 1846 a son, Clifton, was born to John; early in life Clifton appreciated the standing of his family, and guided his life accordingly. In his early thirties he was sent to the United States Congress by his fellow state folk to represent the Memphis, Tenn., district, which he did ably for nearly fifteen years. As President Grover Cleveland was selecting his foreign ministers, his mind settled on Clifton Rhodes Breckinridge as Minister to Russia. When he started to this far off strange land in 1894, he took a seventeen-year old son, James Carson, a fair haired, blue eyed, erect, quiet lad, who had been attending the public schools and the University of Tennessee, where he was initiated by Tennessee Kappa of Sigma Alpha Epsilon.

During James Carson's stay in St. Petersburg from 1894 to 1897, he learned the problems and language of that vast country and, as with all boyhood impressions, these experiences have had a lasting place in his heart. Upon his return to the United States James Carson was nearly of age. At that time our country was about to enter into a war with Spain. True to form, he accepted a volunteer appointment as a second lieutenant in the Marine Corps in July, 1898. From that date to the present he has passed through all grades and ranks from second lieutenant to major general, which rank he attained in February, 1935.

The service of General Breckinridge, known among his contemporaries as "Breck," carried him to the Philippines, Cuba, Nicaragua, Mexico, Santo Domingo and China. He has the distinction of having more sea service than any marine officer on the active list. He reads, writes and speaks French, German, Russian and Spanish and has the reputation of being the best informed officer in the naval service on Russian affairs.

His duty in 1916 was assistant naval attache in Petrograd, Russia. He performed additional duty in the same capacity at Christiania, Norway, Copenhagen, Denmark, and Stockholm, Sweden, at the same time. These were no chance assignments, for memories of his boyhood days when he lived in Russia lingered long, and he desired to see the changes that country had undergone. The General filled these assignments with such outstanding success that the Navy Department awarded him the decoration of the Navy Cross for "distinguished service on this duty." In addition he wears the Philippine, Spanish, Cuban and Mexican campaign badges, the Expeditionary Medal, as well as the Victory Medal. He was also awarded the Medal of Merit by the President of the Dominican Republic.

Early in 1916 General Breckinridge commanded the American Legation Guard at Peking, China. At the present time he is in command of the Department of the Pacific, U. S. Marine Corps, with Headquarters at San Francisco, Calif. He is a graduate of both the Army War College and the Naval War College.

His brother SAEs, who remember the General as a young man, will be interested to know that today his hobbies are his two sons, who are typical chips off the old block, his home, and last, but not least, good books. In 1908 the General changed his usual residence to Fort Smith, Ark.

"It was done by our good friend and brother, Johannes Waller, the artist of the Levere Memorial Temple, who is a native of Bavaria, and he could not help thinking that he was complimenting me by giving me a serious Teutonic air," said the senator. "I told Waller that, as a work of art, the portrait was fine but that he had made me look more like a military man than I deserved."

In a great hurry to get back to his duties in Washington, he nevertheless spent about an hour and a half at the chapter house. A goodly amount of delicious punch and sandwiches was consumed by the actives, alumni, and the honor guest who was shown about the house and introduced to all the brothers. Then he gave a highly interesting informal talk in which he touched on many subjects including his interest in the fraternity especially in the founding of the chapter at the University of Nevada, the bright future which, he feels, is in store for Southwestern, and several of his humorous experiences in the Senate.

It was now time for the senator to leave and after the inevitable picture taking was over he bade farewell to the chapter which he has honored.

Lieutenant Governor of Kentucky

ITH the election of Hon. Keen Johnson, Ky. E '21, as lieutenant governor of Kenutcky, another name was added to the long list of illustrious members of ΣΑΕ who have achieved political prominence in the Blue Grass State. Mr. Johnson, a neophyte in the political field, won the Democratic nomination over nine rivals and led his ticket in

For two and a half years Mr. Johnson served as first lieutenant of the 89th Division of the A.E.F. and is a member of the American Legion. He is also secretary of the Kentucky Democratic State Central Executive Committee, a position he has held for some years.

Mr. Johnson, who is president of the University of Kentucky Alumni Association, is an active and loyal alumnus of Kentucky Epsilon and is a frequent visitor at the chapter house in Lexington.

At "Marse Henry's" Desk

Mark F. Ethridge, Miss. I'l8, for the past year president and publisher of the Times-Dispatch of Richmond, Va., resigned on June 1, 1936, to become general manager of the Courier-Journal of Louisville, Ky., where he is directing the editorial policy of the paper made famous by the late Col. Henry Watterson who was its editor for many years. Mark Ethridge's rise in the newspaper world has been rapid. For nine years he was connected with the Telegraph of Macon, Ga., going from cub reporter to assistant editor. LECTED as Imperial Potentate of the Ancient Arabic Order of Nobles of the Mystic Shrine by the Imperial Council at Seattle, Wash., July 16, 1936, Judge Clyde I. Webster, Mich. I-B '99, reached the highest office in the gift of this branch of the Masonic order one year sooner than he expected to when he was elected Imperial Outer Guard, the lowest place in the Imperial Divan, in Miami, Fla., in May 1928. Judge Hugh M. Caldwell of Seattle, Deputy Imperial Potentate, declined to take the chief executive position and Judge Webster, being the next man in line, stepped into the place.

Judge Webster, formerly a prominent practicing attorney of Detroit, served as United States Attorney for the Eastern District of Michigan un-

der Federal Judge Arthur J. Tuttle, *Mich.* I-B '92, Past E.S.A., and then became a circuit judge for Wayne County, Mich.

He has long been prominent in the Shrine and was elected Imperial Outer Guard on the first ballot at the Miami meeting of the Imperial Council. Under Shrine custom, this is the only office for which there is ever a contest and, after a man is elected to it, he is automatically raised a grade each year, ten years being required for him to negotiate the long route.

Judge Webster has always taken an active interest in SAE affairs, has served as an officer of the Detroit Alumni Association and of Province Delta and is a tower of strength for the Fraternity in Michigan.

The convention was opened by James Blue, Province Archon, reading the purpose of the convention from "The Province Convention," prepared by Dr. John O. Moseley, E.S.A., who was in attendance.

Reports were given by Colorado Zeta, Colorado Chi, Colorado Lambda, Colorado Delta, and Wyoming Alpha, all of which stressed present needs and accomplishments of the respective chapters, and served to give delegates a unified picture of SAE throughout the province.

Election of officers resulted in the following members being selected: Laurence W. DeMuth, Colo. X '31, archon; Joseph Henry Lanphier, Colo. X '32, deputy archon; and John M. Coke, Colo. Λ '28, recorder-treasurer.

Election was followed by a model initiation conducted by Dr. Moseley. The convention dinner was held immediately following. The presence of two national officers, Dr. Moseley, and Lauren Foreman, E.S.R., added immeasurably to the interest and effectiveness of the convention.

Sons and Brothers in ΣAE

YONSANGUINITY was again a major factor in the selection of men for initiation into Sigma Alpha Epsilon during the college year, 1935-36, ten grandsons, 104 sons and 162 brothers, out of a total of 1,702 initiates, having been inducted into the Fraternity, as against seven grandsons, 109 sons and 174 brothers, out of a total of 1,718 initiates in 1934-35.

Alabama Iota was the only chapter to initiate two grandsons but Mississippi Gamma and Mississippi Theta initiated first cousins, grandsons of the same man. The other six were distributed among Alabama Alpha-Mu, Georgia Beta, North Carolina Xi, Tennessee Eta, Tennessee Omega and Texas Rho. Seven of the ten grandsons were also sons in direct line of descent and a large proportion of the sons initiated were also brothers.



Leader in Recreational Work

AN FRANCISCO has long been in the lead among American cities which recognize the social utility of planning and directing leisure and recreational pursuits. The Recreational Commission of the city and county of San Francisco is nationally renowned for the brilliant work it has done in this field of municipal organization. Assistant Superintendent of the Recreation Commission is Raymond S. Kimball, Okla. K '28, who has been in on the ground floor of many of the widely imitated social experiments first tried out in the West Coast city.

Born in Altus, Okla., in 1903, Mr. Kimball served in the Navy during the World War and holds the distinction of being one of the youngest members of the American Legion. After sporadic excursions into active pedagogy in various schools, he came to San Francisco, bent on studying law, but became interested in recreation work and found himself a playground director in the year 1929. From that post he advanced to Supervisor of Playgrounds and Community Centers and thence to his present position.

Mr. Kimball was active in the establishment of the director-at-large system of dealing with young delinquents. Under this plan gangs of boys are brought into recreation centers; delinquents are given an opportunity for healthful play under supervision and are taught wise uses for leisure. The lowered juvenile delinquency rate of San Francisco, and the adoption of the system by many other large cities testify to its soundness.

Kimball was also instrumental in establishing the first District Coordinating Council in San Francisco, a clearing house for all organizations working in the interests of Youth.

In addition to his official capaci-ties, Mr. Kimball is a member of the Board of Directors, Metropolitan Division of Boy's Work for the Y.M.C.A.; is a member of the Board of Stewards, Glide Memorial M. E. Church (South); and first president of the Northern California Drama Association for the Little Theater Movement.

Led American Olympic Hopes

VERY BRUNDAGE, Ill. B '09, president of the Amateur Athletic Union of the United States and chairman of the American Olympic Committee, led the American entries for the 1936 games in Ber-

lin when they sailed from New York and the Associated Press announced on July 17 that he had been selected as a member of the International Olympic Committee, representing the United States, to succeed the late General Charles E. Sherrill.

Mr. Brundage, who is a prominent building contractor of Chicago, led the fight for American participation in the Berlin games and after winning the fight was drafted for another term as president of the A.A.U., a place from which he had voluntarily retired in 1934 after service of six years.

Despite the financial difficulties which he had to face in raising the money to pay the expenses of America's athletes, he refused an offer of \$100,000 from a breakfast food concern on the condition that its product would be included in the athletes' menu and advertising of this fact permitted.

"Though tempted to accept this means of solving most of the money worries," he said, "the committee rejected the offer on the ground that it would be unethical and set a precedent injurious to sport."

Cody Directs Florida Athletics

NE SAE succeeded another in a tough spot when Joshua Crittenden ("Josh") Cody, Ky. I '15 and Tenn. N '17, accepted the position of head football coach at the University of Florida, succeeding Dennis K. ("Dutch") Stanley, Fla. Y '29, who for the last three years has been head of a staff of coaches, made up entirely of Florida alumni.

Cody was named as football coach in December, 1935, and on April 30, 1936, was appointed as director of athletics at Florida by the State Board of Control. At the same it was announced that Stanley would be retained as director of physical education, head track coach and assistant football coach and that Andrew G. Pattillo, Fla. Y '27, would continue as assistant athletic director.

After one year at Bethel College where he was initiated into SAE by Kentucky Iota, Cody transferred to Vanderbilt University and affiliated with Tennessee Nu. He made a great record on the gridiron and was named as an all-time tackle. He entered the first officers training camp at Fort Oglethorpe, Ga., in May, 1917, was commissioned as second lieutenant and later promoted to first lieutenant in the Motor Transport Corps with which he served until the close of the World War.

He became football coach at Mercer University in 1920, went to Vanderbilt as assistant football coach and coach of baseball and basketball in 1923, became head coach at Clemson College of South Carolina in 1927, and returned to Vanderbilt in 1931 as assistant athletic director and head line coach. His son, Ernest Cody, was recently initiated by Tennessee Nu.

Great Year for "Bitsy"

TAMED as a member of the team to represent the United States in the matches for the Davis Cup, supreme world tennis trophy; going to the quarter finals of the All-England championship at Wimbledon, where he lost to Fred Perry, the final winner of the championship; and besting the best of the American players in various sectional tournaments during the spring, Bryan M. Grant, Jr., N.C. \(\mathbb{Z}\) '33, proved to all tennis followers during 1936 that he is one of the world's masters of the court.

Although Grant was not given an opportunity to play against Australia in the North American zone finals at Philadelphia, his prestige did not suffer in consequence. In fact, many of the most competent critics felt that, if he had been called into action, the United States would have made a better showing. Grant had handled himself creditably in the matches against Mexico and was in excellent form.

Known variously as the "Atlanta Atom" and the "Mighty Midget," Grant in his 27th year still weighs only 128 pounds though he has gained seven pounds since last year when he rose to No. 3 in the rankings of the U.S. Lawn Tennis Association. He won the Southern championship in 1927 and has held it eight times; was national clay courts champion in 1933, 1934, and again in 1935; and has been a serious contender for the United States championship whenever he has entered this contest. Karel Kozeluh, coach of the 1936 United States Davis Cup team, rates Grant as one of the best match tennis players in the world.

Monthly Audit System at Oregon State

NEW program requiring a monthly audit of house books has been inaugurated at Oregon State College. Even though this administrative ruling has been in force less than one year, the results produced thus far warrant its continuation in the future.

The question quite naturally arises just what is this audit system and how did it all come about? For some time the thought has been prevalent that certain weaknesses in the fraternity method of operation needed correction. Carelessness in the handling of cash items; inaccuracy in making monthly charges and the giving of proper credit; inefficiency in the collection of house bills; and the permitting of large past due balances to accumulate (with willful dishonesty on the part of some house managers and treasurers) were some of the problems in need of satisfactory solution. With the decrease in registration, caused by the economic depression, the need for financial revision was given an added impetus.

About seven years ago one of the fraternities on the Oregon State campus became hopelessly involved financially. The majority of its members were not paying their board bills, resulting in the chapter's not being able to meet its obligations. The faculty adviser for this fraternity appealed to the Cooperative Managers Association (a business organization of the 41 fraternities and sororities on the campus) for aid. It was decided that the association would actually keep the books for this fraternity, submitting a monthly audit to the faculty adviser, as well as making out the monthly national reports. In less than two years, with the aid and advice given the managers, this organization had paid off more than \$1400.00 in back debts and had completely reversed itself financially. Three more houses later on seeing the benefits to be derived from this monthly audit joined the ranks. These actions were all voluntary on the part of the fraternities and unsolicited by the Cooperative Managers Associa-

For over two years a faculty committee had been trying to get the college administration to do something with reference to the increasing number of men in each fraternity owing large sums on back board bills. The idea was that, by withholding credits or by imposing some disciplinary measure on a student who permitted his board bill to run from one month

to the next, an improvement in fraternity finances would be the outcome. After several meetings with fraternity representatives, the college put into operation in April, 1935, what is commonly known as the "monthly audit" and "forced collection" ruling. This measure in simple language provided for a monthly financial report from each fraternity and sorority, showing a list of members' accounts and balances owing at the end of each month. Before accepting these reports, however, the college insists on a competent audit of the same and where large balances appear that student is refused registration at the beginning of the next quarter.

To provide for the additional work that this actual bookkeeping and auditing necessitated, the Cooperative Managers Association enlarged its office space, increased its office equipment and hired a full time accountant. Conferences are arranged between the house manager or treasurer and the auditor. Details such as the time of bringing in the books, the number of reports required, the name of the faculty adviser and many other problems and questions are ironed out. Helpful and timely hints are given in matters of routine in correct bookkeeping procedure.

In order to facilitate the handling of information required by the college a uniform report was adopted. This report is divided into three main headings. First, there is a cash summary showing the receipts and disbursements, with the cash balance at the end of the month. Where the funds come from and where the cash goes is shown in detail. The second phase of the report indicates the monthly payroll to members for work, the amount of the accounts and notes payable and the monthly assessment for board and room. The num-

ber of members and pledges living in and eating in the house is also indicated. The third and most important part of the report is a copy of the accounts receivable ledger. Here is found every member's name with the balance owing at the beginning of the month, if any; the monthly charge; the total amount due; the amount paid during the month; and, finally, the balance owing at the end of the month. From the above it will be seen that the house manager, the faculty adviser and the dean of men's office at the college get a very clear picture as to the general progress of the chapter.

Like all new things and changes of the old order, this ruling by the administration was not accepted without some opposition. Some felt that the administration was acting outside of its field in asking for these monthly reports; others felt sure that the fraternity secrets would be exposed; and still others bemoaned the added cost this auditing would entail. Suffice to say, these fears were mainly imaginary and those who raised their voices the loudest in protest are now the most enthusiastic in support. With a nominal cost of \$1.50 to \$3.00 per month for an audit and with a monthly charge ranging from \$4.00 to \$6.00 maximum for the actual bookkeeping and audit, is it any wonder that the Cooperative Managers Association is now doing the work almost 100 per cent?

Speaking as financial adviser for Oregon Alpha, the writer can unhestitatingly say that our chapter is now having one of the best years in its history. No one will question that with the disappearance of financial difficulties, other chapter troubles and problems no longer exist or bother. To be more specific, the report turned in by Oregon Alpha as of December 31, 1935, in which 54 men out of 55 charged, had paid in full before leaving for the Christmas holidays, has no equal at this chapter. With all due respect to our present efficient E. T. and our hard working manager, the knowledge that board bills had to be paid in full before registration in college would be permitted, was an important factor in the fine showing made.

A receipt from the house manager must be presented to the dean of men's office, showing that the balance reported owing at the end of the quarter has been paid in full, before permission to register for the new term is granted. In this way the possibility of accumulating large unpaid balances is eliminated. Learning to take care of one's financial obligations while going to college will not only reflect credit on the individual, but will also strengthen and promote the welfare of the fraternity in the years to come.



Oklahoma Fraternities Declared Tax-Free

PROBLEM which has been harassing fraternities from time to time has been definitely solved by one of the recent decisions of the Supreme Court of Oklahoma, handed down in December of 1935. In the spring of 1935, all fraternity houses on the campus were assessed for taxes for the first time. On the refusal of the fraternities to pay the assessed taxes, the County Attorney for Cleveland County with the assistance of two tax ferrets, Gorrall and Asher, brought suit against three of the fraternities as the basis for a test case. The Inter-Fraternity Council hired Brother Coleman Haves and Brother Fisher Ames to handle the case for the fraternities. The trial case was conducted before Judge Pendleton, local county judge, who handed down a decision adverse to the fraternities.

The case was then appealed to the Oklahoma Supreme Court where it was finally disposed of last December. The highest tribunal in handing down its decision declared that fraternities were tax-free under that provision of the Oklahoma statutes which exempts all charitable institutions from tax assessments.

A decision to the contrary would have eventually put fraternities out of existence on this campus, due to the increased financial burden. Thus many thanks are due, not only from this chapter but from other fraternities and sororities as well, to Brothers Ames and Hayes for their defense of the fraternities in this suit. We only hope that this has finally cleared up this problem and nothing more will be said about it.—The \$\sum_{AE}\$ Dope Sheet of Oklahoma Kappa



Scholars Succeed As PART of a feature article, entitled "Sorry But You're Wrong About It," in its February,

1936, issue, the Reader's Digest carried the following which should be of especial interest to college men:

Dr. Hugh A. Smith of the University of Wisconsin recently engaged in a two-year research, studying the records of 1800 graduates who had been out in life from 15 to 45 years to find out just how the good, bad and mediocre students in this list had really turned out. His findings knock into a cocked hat the notion that the brilliant student in college is likely to fail in practical life. In fact the agreement between the lists of those who had succeeded in college and those who later achieved worldly success was almost unbelievable. As Professor Smith was almost unbelievable. As Professor Smith says: "If a man was high in one list, he was almost invariably high in the other; and if low in one, low in the other." But the most striking development from the study came when, from the list of 1800, a separate list was made up of the 97 who were considered "the most worthy, successful or eminent." Another list was made up of the 93 who had the highest grades. The of the 93 who had the highest grades. The astonishing thing is that these two lists contained 87 names in common! From these and other studies, it is evident that the man with high college achievements has statistically a much greater chance of achieving business or professional success than has the mediocre or dull student.

Athletic Subsidies WHATEVER may be said of the ethics or advisability of subsidizing college athletics, there

is no justification for the pressure frequently put on fraternity chapters to provide room and board for prospective stars in football and other fields of sport, no matter from what source the pressure may come. One chapter of SAE reports as one of its major problems: "requests from alumni that we support athletes." If alumni whose chief enthusiasm is for the athletic prowess of their alma maters wish to recruit impecunious high school students with athletic reputations, they should arrange to pay their expenses out of their own

pockets and not pass this responsibility on to the parents of the boys making up the fraternity chapters on which they seek to impose such candidates. Very few college students have independent incomes and the expenses of running fraternity houses are necessarily paid by remittances from their parents.

If certain men are subsidized, there is no escape from the result that their expenses are in reality being paid by the fathers and mothers of the boys in the chapter which is permitting itself to be bamboozled in this manner. Active men should give careful consideration to this before giving in to requests that they undertake to help the athletic prospects of their school

by the subsidizing process.

The financial question entirely aside, it is rare indeed that the presence of such men in a fraternity house adds anything to its prestige, athletically or otherwise. The parents of many of them are fully as able to pay their way through college as are the parents of bona fide students but are entirely willing to permit them to work their way on their reputations as athletes which are seldom found justified.

For the real college student and loyal fraternity member who achieves athletic distinction every fraternity chapter is grateful and such a man will be given all possible help, if he really needs it, but athletic ability should be the last instead of the first consideration and proved before it is given any consideration at all.

The E.S.A.'s Page

By John O. Moseley, Eminent Supreme Archon

EAR BROTHERS: There is one question which goes straight to the heart of the Fraternity system. It is one question which cannot be ignored. The answer to it settles without further argument whether the individual, the chapter, or the national organization making the answer is aware of and on the side of the only feature of the Greek-letter fraternity which can guarantee its permanence as a useful adjunct of college life and its harmony with the enduring traits of our so-called Western civilization. The question is, "Am I my brother's keeper?"

This question was first asked by the first son of the first man. By a rhetorical evasion he was seeking to justify a dastardly deed committed against his brother. By sacrifice and ritualistic propitiation he thought his account could be cleared. But the same small still voice which is resounding now in the hearts of men more clearly than ever before asking, "Where is Abel, thy brother?" convicted him of his responsibility.

This is a day of awakened conscience regarding social responsibility. Perhaps nations like individuals have periods of remorse following instances of gross inhumanity. No wonder every institution is being checked and double-checked under the glare of pitiless publicity and the college fraternity which seemingly was so comfortably safe must now come forward and prove its worth.

Sigma Alpha Épsilon was conceived in the thought of self-improvement and progress. Noble Leslie De Votie committed his fraternity to the noblest impulses of occidental man —the projecting of the pattern and improvement of the type. Our ritual is shot through with the ideal of mutual aid to a common goal. Friendship is the bond which binds us together and this bond is forged by the cultivation in ourselves and in one another of certain qualities which make for the most intimate and lasting friendship. Therefore, there is no quibbling about our answer to the question, "Am I my brother's keeper?" The next issue to be settled

is, "What are we doing about it?"
At the next Leadership School to be held in Evanston during the last week in August, the theme study will be Freshman Training. In preparing for that program a questionnaire containing fifty-five studies was submitted to the chapters. Ninety-four chapters replied, and a complete anal-

ysis of their findings has been made. By the time this article appears in the September Record it will have been submitted in full to the chapter representatives at the Leadership School. However, a few of the findings such as may be included in an article of this length will be of general interest to the Fraternity.

One of the most vital questions of the study is the matter of pledge fatalities. Among the ninety-four reporting chapters there were almost 1000 men pledged during the school year, 1935-36, who had not been initiated up to the time of the submission of the report. In the case of most chapters, the above date averages around May 1, 1936. This means that with the exception of a few men initiated late in the school year practically all of the above mentioned 1000 pledges are genuine casualties. This indicates injudicious, unwise, and unprepared rushing on the part of most of our chapters. The above statistical tables, arranged by province and by chapters, will be presented with detail and emphasis at the first afternoon conference of the school. By far the greatest causes for failure to initiate were finances and grades, the former accounting for 254 of these pledges, and the latter for 238. The following reasons were advanced most frequently to account for the failures of the remaining pledges: parental objection, pledge broken by chapter, illness, pledge continued by chapter, and left school for a variety of reasons. Around 150 of these pledges were eligible for initiation at the time of the report.

It is very interesting that 91 chapters reported that they do try to secure desirable men after the regular pledging date (although many without success), and only three chapters admitted that they do not. The most challenging fact brought out by this section of the report is that a far greater percentage of the men pledged after the regular pledging date qualified for initiation than those pledged during the so-called rushing season.

It was a pleasure to find that most of the chapters conform to standard practices regarding the use of pledge pins, the time of their bestowal, and the formal pledging ceremony. Twenty-seven chapters reported that they employ no pledging ceremony whatsoever, and of those who do have a formal ceremony some use the pledge ritual in a modified form.

The matter of Freshman Training,

the time, place, and manner of holding the regular chapter meeting and pledge meeting are important. Sixtytwo of the reporting chapters meet on Monday night, the others voting for the remaining days of the week, including three chapters which meet on Sunday. The chapters averaged about two regular meetings each called off for various reasons during the year 1935-36, and if this is accurately reported, it is a good record. Most pledge meetings are attended by one or two especially designated initiated men, or by the Upper Council, or by the officers of the chapter, although 15 chapters reported that all initiated men attended their pledge meetings and seven chapters reported that no initiated men attend their pledge meetings. Their pledge meetings are usually held on the same night as the regular chapter meetings, but in a different place and are conducted for the most part by the pledge master. Practically all of the pledge classes are organized, their officers being known by various titles, some comic.

The most distressing fact brought out by these questionnaires is the scarcity of alumni work with the pledge class. Forty-five chapters reported that at no time during the year did an alumnus talk to their pledges, meeting as a group, while the other chapters had only two or three such opportunities, one chapter in Province Zeta and one chapter in Province Iota reporting as a maximum six meetings of the pledges with the alumnus adviser. By far the greatest number of talks made to the freshmen were concerning the Fraternity, personal conduct, and grades. The questionnaires indicate beyond a doubt that such training as the freshmen are receiving is given by active chapter men, and even that is very casual and informal. Only 17 chapters report a visit from a member of the faculty to their pledge group.

We come now to the type of Freshman Training which seems to arouse most enthusiasm generally, especially in the hands of the sophomore. Eighty-seven chapters report that they require manual labor around the house as a part of the pledge service, and I believe that this is a good thing for it develops the habit of fraternity work and loyalty. However, I do believe that the chapters do not plan and execute this work as efficiently as they might do so, for 45 chapters admitted that they assigned pledge duties as the need arises, and many chapters do not have a special officer intrusted with these details. More than half of the reporting chapters admitted that they permited iniiated men to require personal service, such as the running of errands, from the pledges. This is a nefarious practice and should be stamped out at once. No individual or chapter can ever hope to command the loyalty of a freshman so treated. Fagging is a worn-out and passé feature of a past generation of college and fraternity life. Evidently the chapters are doing a good job in teaching the fraternity history for most chapters consider that their pledges could pass a fair examination conducted by a member of the Supreme Council.

One of the catch questions in the questionnaire was the report of the percentage of active chapter men whose attitude toward the pledges is "Do as I say, not as I do." It appears that hardly any of our chapters are without a few of these brothers whose mode of teaching is by precept rather

than example.

In this article I am not going to go into great detail regarding the status of Hell Week. Suffice it to say that the question is still with us, but progress is being made. Most chapters re-

port a modified form of Hell Week, and I truly believe that considerable advance has been made since the last Leadership School. The most alarming disclosure in the questionnaire on this point and on the general subject of paddling is that some chapters still allow sophomores to swing the paddle. This practice is subversive of every good principle of pledge training and thwarts every good motive of the sane leadership of the fraternity, to say nothing of creating in our chapters a bunch of bullies who represent the perpetual adolescents in our national membership. Those chapters which reported no very definite system of penalties for failure to perform pledge duties and said that the number of licks with the paddle more or less depended upon the mood of the occasion I suspect are the ones which permit sophomore beating.

To bring this rather long article to a close, the majority of the chap-

ters seem to place special emphasis in Freshman Training on hospitality, Σ AE history, intramural athletics, grades, and finances. However, it is encouraging to note that many chapters are stressing such abstract qualities as democracy, tolerance, temperance, sportsmanship, self-respect, and even appreciation of good music, good pictures, and good books.

Let us not forget the slow and tortuous path of mankind. Many of our chapters are still in the barbaric age; some of them have glimpsed the light of a better day; and a few are definitely headed in the right direction. A thousand commencement orators next spring, as last, will shout that our generation is living in a heaven of science but in total darkness as regards the humanities. May our \$\infty\$AE, founded on a brotherly love which does admit a responsibility to the younger brother, meet this age old but very real and modern challenge to the social order.

Present Day Fraternity Costs

PACKED with valuable statistics was the survey of fraternities, prepared by Harold Jacobsen, executive secretary of Sigma Pi, which he presented before the College Fraternity Secretaries Association at its meeting in New York on November 27, 1935. Not only does the report give a numerical picture of the 65 fraternities that compose the National Interfraternity Conference, but it reveals how widely different financial procedure is among them.

The 65 fraternities have a total of 2,541 chapters. The total number of men initiated a year by the 44 fraternities reporting on that point total 21,225, an average of 10 to a chapter each year. Sixty fraternities have initiated a total of 748,475, of whom 535,852 are reported as living members by 45 fraternities. A total of 1,769 houses are owned by 62 fraternities. Only 36 of the 62 report on the estimated valuation of chapter houses; these give \$40,262,299 as the

total for 1,182 houses.

Costs vary greatly, that fact being brought out even in regard to badges, which range from \$2.50 to \$22. Membership shingles cost from 50 cents to \$3, magazine subscriptions from \$1 to \$9; life subscriptions to magazines from \$10 to \$45; general endowment memberships \$2.50 to \$25; songbooks, \$1 to \$2; directories, 50c to \$3; and pledge manuals from 25c to \$1.50

National initiation fees range from \$1 to \$55, and as might be expected these fees include varying items, such

as endowment memberships, life subscriptions, undergraduate dues, pledge manuals, badges, and other items. For instance the \$55 fee includes an \$11 badge, a shingle, magazine subscription and active dues for four years. Fifteen dollars goes into a general endowment fund and \$18 is used for general and administrative expenses. Another fraternity collects \$40 and furnishes the initiate a \$5 badge, a shingle, and a life subscription to its magazine. It uses \$20 for general and administrative expense and puts \$5 in a general endowment fund. The combinations are almost as many as the fraternities, indicating that the amount of the fee means little unless one knows what it covers.

The survey shows a steady advance in the number of fraternities that include a life subscription in the national initiation fee, the total being 15, while eight others send the magazine to the initiate without charge. Others offer life subscriptions on an optional basis.

Active or per capita yearly dues range from none to \$15, but again the amount means little unless it is known what is given the member and the relationship of the dues to the national initiation fee he has paid. Some yearly dues include a subscription to the magazine, convention assessment, or perhaps an endowment payment. In at least six cases the national initiation fee is large enough to make yearly dues unnecessary.

Out of 46 fraternities reporting, 29 hold biennial conventions, 16 annual,

and one triennial. December is the most popular month for conventions, 15 being held at holiday time; 9 prefer September, 8 August, 5 June, and 1 May, while 5 say summer, and one, fall.

The fraternities find many ways to handle the convention costs, including special assessments, registration fees, and provision in the national budget. The custom of equalizing the expenses of chapter delegates is somewhat general.

E.S.A. Now LL.D.

USTIN College of Sherman, Tex., conferred the degree of Doctor of Laws on John O. Moseley, Eminent Supreme Archon of Sigma Alpha Epsilon, on June 1, 1936, following his delivery of the commencement address to the graduating class. Dr. Moseley was graduated from Austin College with the A.B. degree in 1912 prior to his attending the University of Oklahoma where he became a member of \$\Sigma AE\$. The citation read as follows:

John Oleyer Moseley—Child of the manse; worthy alumnus of Austin College in the Class of 1912, Master of Arts from the University of Oklahoma; college professor of scholarship and distinction; national leader in college fraternity life; president of the oldest teachers college in his state; teacher of teachers; guider of youth and leader of men—Doctor of Laws.

Two distinguished alumni of the University of North Carolina and of ΣΑΕ, Judge Michael Schenck, N.C. Ξ '97, of the Supreme Court of North Carolina, and Robert D. W. Connor, N.C. Ξ '99, Archivist of the United States, were given the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws by their alma mater in the 1936 commencement.

This award is one of the great honors that may come to a member of the fraternity during his four years of college life.

Only one senior per year in each chapter is eligible for the award. There are three credentials necessary before the committee can pass upon the qualifications of any given candidate:

(1) A statement from the athletic department of the college or university to the effect that the candidate has received two

major letters in any given sport.

(2) A statement from the registrar or corresponding officer of the college or university to the effect that the candidate has averaged 80 or thereabouts in scholarship

during his college career.

(3) A statement from the chapter to the effect that the candidate has held office in the chapter or has been an outstanding man on the campus and in the chapter.















OSCAR H. FERNBACH New York Alpha '95

 Lieutenant Colonel Oscar H. Fernbach, N.Y. A '95, internationally known newspaper man and veteran of the Phillipine Insurrection and the World War, died of a heart attack in San Francisco, Calif., May 13, 1936. He was one of the early members of New York Alpha and always maintained an active interest in YAE. At the time of his death he was radio editor of the San Francisco Examiner and he had held various important posts on California newspapers during his service of more than thirty years. He went to the Philippines with the First California Volunteers and was wounded in action. In 1913 he was named as commissioner for the Panama Pacific International Exposition, held in San Francisco in 1915, and visited many foreign countries in its behalf. While in Japan he received the Order of the Rising Sun from the Mikado and he was also decorated by King Victor Emmanuel of Italy. He went to France with the Seventy-Seventh Division as a lieutenant but, on account of his familiarity with the French and German languages, he was transferred to the Intelligence Corps and rose to the rank of lieutenant colonel.

GENERAL LOGAN FELAND Kentucky Alpha-Epsilon '86

Major General Logan Feland, Ky. A-E '86, Retired, U. S. Marine Corps, died in Columbus, Ohio, July 17, 1936. General Feland, who was initiated into SAE by the short-lived chapter at South Kentucky College and later received the Bachelor of Science degree from the Boston Institute of Technology, had one of the most colorful careers of any of the officers who have served with the Marines. He began his military career with the Third Battalion in the Philippines in 1899 and was in continuous action until his retirement by age limitation September 1, 1933. He was in command of one of the first units to land at Vera Cruz in 1914; went to France with General Pershing in 1917 and was in all the major engagements of the American Expeditionary Force; commanded the American forces in Nicaragua during the 1927 uprising and in 1929 undertook his last year of duty as commander of all the Marine forces on the Pacific Coast.

JUDGE FREDERICK A. WIECKING Indiana Gamma '13

Judge Frederick Augustus Wiecking, Ind. I '13, of the Indiana Appellate Court, died suddenly while playing golf at the Highland Golf and Country Club, Indianapolis, Ind., July 28, 1936.
