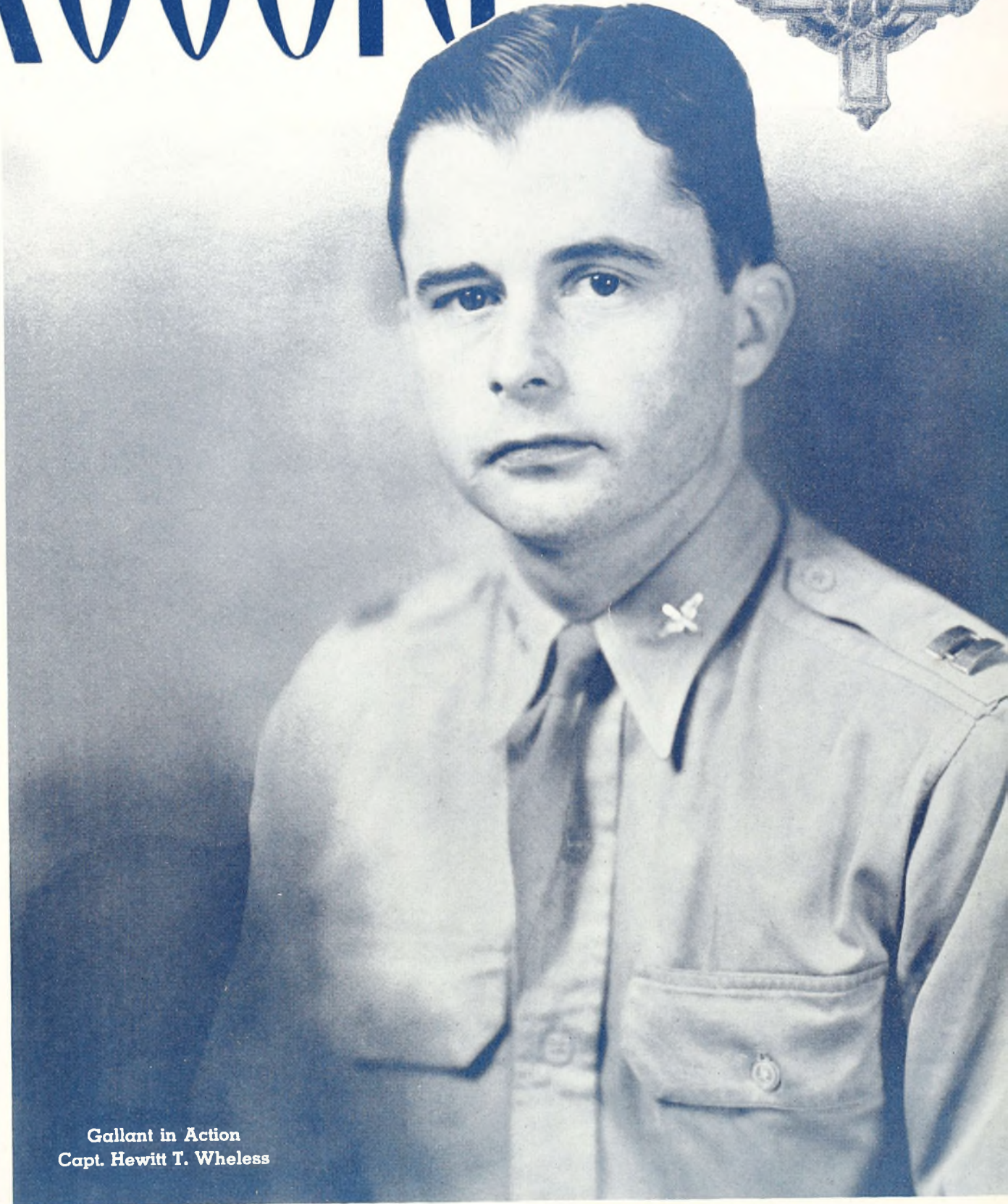

Nation Applauds Captain Wheless

OUT of the night of April 28 a new national hero was born. Diminutive, handsome and modest Capt. Henry T. Wheless, *Tex. P '38*, was catapulted to fame by words of acclaim from President Roosevelt on a radio address to the nation. The now familiar bombing raid and the return of the flying fortress through a screen of 18 Japanese "zero" planes brought cheers from every American. But the fighting flyer, now busy on the Army Air Corps Public Relations staff, confides he "feels a little funny about all the public recognition."

"Shucks," he told newsmen, "That kind of stuff happens all the time; why single me out? I didn't do anything anyone else wouldn't do."

Yet acclaim for his heroism and skill continues, for the fact remains that he commanded an army flying fortress which bombed six Japanese transports in the Philippines and downed eleven of eighteen attacking Jap planes over the western Pacific. His receiving the Distinguished Service Cross for this exploit, carried in the May issue of *THE RECORD*, was noted by the nation on the President's radio talk, and eighteen days later the President personally congratulated the Captain during a 20-minute chat at the White House.

He is now temporarily assigned to the Public Relations Office of the Army Air Corps, and on June 13th Warner Brothers Movie Studio announced that he will be technical advisor on the motion picture "Air Force," directed by Howard Hawks.

The thrilling account of the exploit of Captain Wheless and his daring bomber crew, as related in dramatic detail by President Roosevelt, must have brought home the necessity for self-denial on the part of the citizenry. Said the Chief Executive:

"I should like to tell you one or two stories about the men we have in our armed forces," he said near the close of his address. "This is a story of one of our army flying fortresses operating in the western Pacific. The pilot of this plane is a modest young man, proud of his crew for one of the toughest fights a bomber has yet experienced.

"The bomber departed from its base, as part of a flight of five, to attack Japanese transports which were landing troops in the Philippines. When they had gone about half way to their destination, one of the motors of this bomber went out of commission. The young pilot lost contact with the other bombers. The crew, however, got the motor working again and the plane proceeded on its mission alone.

"By the time it arrived at its target the other four flying fortresses had already passed over, had dropped their bombs, and had stirred up the Japanese "Zero" planes. Eighteen of them attacked our one flying fortress. Despite this mass attack, our plane proceeded on its mission and dropped all of its bombs on six Japanese transports which were lined up along the docks.

"As it turned back on its homeward journey a running fight between the bomber and the eighteen Japanese pursuit planes continued for 75 miles. Four pursuit ships attacked simultaneously at each side, and were shot down with the side guns. During this fight, the bomber's radio operator was killed, the engineer's right hand was shot off, and one gunner was crippled, leaving only one man avail-

able to operate both side guns. Although wounded in one hand, this gunner alternately manned both side guns, bringing down three more Japanese 'Zero' planes. While this was going on, one engine on the bomber was shot out, one gas tank was hit, the radio was shot off, and the oxygen system was entirely destroyed. Out of eleven control cables all but four were shot away. The rear landing wheel was blown off, and the two front wheels were both shot flat.

"The fight continued until the remaining Japanese pursuit ships exhausted their ammunition and turned back. With two engines gone and the plane practically out of control, the American bomber returned to its base after dark and made an emergency landing. The mission had been accomplished.

"The name of that pilot is Capt. Hewitt T. Wheless, of the United States Army. He comes from Menard, Tex.—population 2,375. He has been awarded the Distinguished Service Cross. I hope he is listening."

And he was listening. Captain and Mrs. Wheless, with their young daughter, heard the President's broadcast from their Fresno, California, home, where Captain Wheless was on leave.

Fought Crocodile after Japs

AFTER being shot down by the Japs over the New Guinea jungle, 2nd Lt. Gentry R. Plunkett, Jr., *Va. K. Va. O '41*, of Lynchburg, Va., had a thrilling experience, including a fight for life with a crocodile, but finally made his way to safety, after having been missing from his field for four days.

As told in a United Press dispatch of June 12th from "Somewhere in Australia," the pilot was shot down when three Jap zero fighters ganged on him at 15,000 feet. The plane burst into flames and Plunkett jumped.

"I don't remember much about the jump and must have pulled the rip

cord too soon for the shock knocked me out," he said. "The next thing I knew I was sitting in a tree limb with the chute tangled in the higher branches.

"With a splitting headache, but no injuries, I began a lonely hike to Port Moresby, slashing a way through the jungle with my knife, sleeping in trees, and eating cocoanuts and occasional handouts from natives. I lived

in the treetops like Tarzan and frequently saw the glowing eyes of jungle beasts beneath me.

"Finally I decided to swim the rivers to hasten my trip. Several times I spotted crocodiles but managed to scare them off by threshing the water. One day I felt a stabbing pain in my left shoulder and looked around to see the huge snout of a crocodile. I tried to escape by diving but he clung

to me until I got my jungle knife free and slashed his snout when he released his grip and made off at a rapid pace.

When he reached shore, bleeding badly, natives dressed his wounds and when he reached Port Moresby, he still had two black eyes "But, boy, you ought to see that crocodile," he said.

Two New Brigadier Generals

LAATEST additions to the list of ΣAE general officers in the United States Army are Brigadier General Philip R. Faymonville, *Calif.* A '09, promoted to this present rank January 22, 1942, while serving as a member of the Special War Supplies Mission to Russia, and Brigadier General Carl R. Gray, Jr., *Mo. B. Ill. B '11*, General Manager of the Army's Military Railway Service.

General Faymonville who is one of the Army's leading authorities on Far Eastern affairs has had a distinguished career during which he has served in the Philippines, Japan and Russia. He became a member of Sigma Alpha Epsilon at Stanford University but received an appointment to the U. S. Military Academy from which he was graduated June 12, 1912, being named as second lieutenant in the Coast Artillery Corps. He was promoted to first lieutenant November 2, 1915; to captain May 15, 1917; to major (temporary) January 12, 1918; and to lieutenant colonel (temporary) September 18, 1918. He reverted to his permanent rank of captain June 30, 1920 and was promoted to major July 1, 1920; to lieutenant colonel August 1, 1935; to colonel (temporary) November 1, 1940.

General Faymonville first served at Fort Monroe, Va., until December 20, 1912, then for three months at Fort Miley, Calif., and following Mexican border patrol from March 24 to August 14, 1914, returned to Fort Miley. His next assignment was on a mine planter at Fort Winfield Scott, Calif. In October, 1915, he was ordered to the Philippine Islands, where he remained until February 28, 1918, at the Manila Ordnance Depot. He then was assigned to the office of the Chief of Ordnance in Washington, D.C.

On August 15, 1918, General Faymonville went to Siberia as Chief Ordnance Officer, American Forces in Siberia, serving also as Judge

Advocate and a member of the Interallied War Materials Committee.

In April, 1920, General Faymonville left Siberia and proceeded to Brunsbuttel, Germany, in charge of repatriation of prisoners of war. He returned to the United States in August, 1920, to become 9th Corps Area Ordnance Officer, with headquarters in San Francisco, Calif., where he served until January 8, 1922. He then was sent to Chita, Trans-Baikal, Far Eastern Republic, as a Military Observer, until May, 1923, when he was appointed Assistant Military Attache and after January 25, 1924 the Military Attache at Tokyo, Japan.

General Faymonville left Japan in May, 1926, going to New York City for duty in the District Ordnance Office. On July 1, 1931, he became Assistant to the Commanding Officer of the Aberdeen Proving Ground, Aberdeen, Md. In March, 1932 he enrolled as a special student at the Ordnance School, Watertown Arsenal, Mass., and followed this with an ammunition study in the Office of the

Chief of Ordnance, Washington, D.C. On August 17, 1932, he entered the Army Industrial College, Washington, D.C., and following graduation in June, 1933, enrolled in the Field Officers' Course of the Chemical Warfare School, Edgewood Arsenal, Md. In August, 1933, he began the course at the Army War College, Washington, D.C., graduating in June, 1934.

General Faymonville was appointed Military Attache to Moscow, Russia, on July 1, 1934. He completed this tour of duty in February, 1939 and upon his return served on the technical staff of the Chief of Ordnance, Washington, D.C. On October 16, 1940 he was assigned to Headquarters of the Fourth Army at the Presidio of San Francisco, Calif. He was designated a member of the Special War Supplies Mission to Russia on September 9, 1941, and returned to Moscow.

General Gray, who was Executive Vice President of the Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis and Omaha Railway (Chicago and Northwestern Lines) with headquarters in St. Paul, Minn., maintains his headquarters in the Commerce Building in that city with a force of thirty officers, two warrant officers and 227 enlisted men.

"Keep 'em rolling" might well be his slogan if need arises to keep trains moving in war zones. With worldwide command, his chief job will be to keep rail lines open for operation by repair of damages inflicted by the enemy, and emergency construction of new lines. His division will handle railroads in combat zones anywhere in the United States or in foreign countries where the U. S. Army has combat units requiring railroad transportation. With headquarters at Fort Snelling, Minn., and organization of the unit conducted in St. Paul, the local command will include more than 750 officers and men. In World War I he served as captain, major, and lieutenant colonel.

Writes Will, Then Killed ON MARCH 8, aboard a U.S. warship somewhere in the South Pacific, Ensign Joseph P. Johnson, *Colo. Z '37, Mass. T.*, wrote his last will and testament and sealed it with a piece of brown paper and a seal, in lieu of a regular seal. Two days later he was shot down in his dive bomber by Japanese anti-aircraft batteries, as noted in the May issue of *THE RECORD*. In little more than two months the will, leaving all his estate to his mother, Mrs. Lillie Miller Johnson, and his fiancée, Miss Ann Dewar Steele, both of Denver, reached Denver from halfway around the globe.



Cadet Crashes AVIATION CADET WILLIAM F. BRIDGFORTH, *Miss. T, Miss. O '42*, stationed at Spence Field, Thomasville, Ga., was killed in an air crash April 1, 1942. He was the grandson of Walter R. Bridgforth, *Ky. X '78, Va. O '80*; the son of Allen, *Miss. T '12, Va. O '16*; and the brother of Walter R., II, *Miss. T '39*.



Killed in Australia 1ST LT. WILLIAM AMES GARNETT, *Texas P '40*, squadron commander, Army Air Corps, was killed in action in Australia, April 21, 1942. Many honors in his life included his graduation from high school as Salutatorian, from West Point as a commissioned officer, and from Kelly Field, San Antonio, Texas, June, 1940, from where he was assigned to Langley Field, Va. There he received instruction in piloting a bomber, became leader and commander of his squadron, and as such was transferred to the Pacific coast, December 8, 1941. Exactly two months later he was sent to Hawaii and in March moved to Australia, where he was engaged in leading attacks on Japanese bases. He was reported missing by the War Department since April 21, 1942. Lieutenant Garnett's father is W. D. Garnett, *Texas P '98*.



1st Lt. William Ames Garnett, *Tex. P '40*, Bomber Pilot, Squadron Commander, Army Air Corps, Died in Action in Australia, April 21, 1942. He Engaged in Several Bombing Attacks on Japanese Bases.



Crashes at Grays Harbor 1ST LT. RUDOLPH ("RUDY") J. BINDER, *Calif. A '39*, was killed in an airplane crash at Grays Harbor, Wash., February 20, 1942. On patrol duty at the time, as an observer in the 116th Observation Squadron, he was awaiting orders for flying training. While in high school and at U.C.L.A., he had won high honors as a rifle shot.



Dies in Far East 2ND LT. ROBERT R. LOVE, *Pa. A '42*, was killed in an airplane accident in the "far eastern theatre of war," May 1, 1942, according to information received by his parents in Wayne, Pa. The War Department explained that the fatality did not occur in combat with the enemy. Lieutenant Love enlisted in the Air Corps in April, 1942. He was 22 years old. At Gettysburg College he participated in swimming, track, soccer, and football.



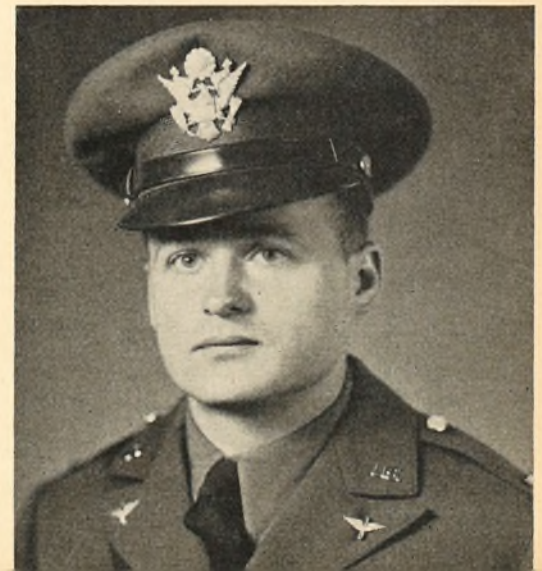
Death Comes Before Wings FLYING CADET GEORGE M. DUVALL, *Ohio O '40*, who was killed in a plane crash at Foster Field, Victoria, Tex., April 3, 1942, as carried in the May issue of *THE RECORD*, was to receive his wings and second lieutenant's commission on April 29. The wings and honorary diploma were presented to his mother, Mrs. Beatrice M. Duvall, in ceremonies at Foster Field April 29.

Killed at Canal Zone LT. CHARLES H. BRYANT, JR., *Iowa A '37*, was killed in an airplane crash in the Canal Zone, April 13, 1942. An aerial observer with the Naval Air Corps, his death was the first reported for the Gold Star records of Iowa Delta. He was one of seven chosen from the 113th Cavalry Unit, Brownwood, Texas, to study aerial observation at Brooks Field, San Antonio. From there he was sent to the Canal Zone to serve with the Naval Air Corps.

Wounded at Dutch Harbor

▪ 2nd Lt. Verner F. Peterson, *Colo.* Z '39, army bombardier, was wounded at the Jap attack on Dutch Harbor and on June 20 was reported as being in the army hospital at Vancouver, Wash.

Rescued in Pacific

▪ With his other plane crew members, James B. Buchanan, *Ca.* B '37, was reported missing over the Pacific on December 26, 1941 from his base at Hickam Field, Oahu. His parents, Mayor and Mrs. Buchanan of Holly Spring, Miss., were notified. Several weeks later the report came through that all the plane's crew had been picked up and rescued. Buchanan's bombardment squadron was the one which arrived over Pearl Harbor during the height of the Jap attack on December 7.

Coach Oliver in Navy

▪ Gerald A. ("Tex") Oliver, *Calif.* E '30, Life Member of the Chapter National, left his position as head football coach at the University of Oregon, Eugene, Ore., upon being commissioned as lieutenant commander in the navy.

Joe Smartt Commandos

▪ Ensign Joseph G. Smartt, *Texas* Δ '41, was killed at Pearl Harbor on December 7, as reported in the May issue of THE RECORD, but his spirit lives in the hearts of seventy-five determined young aviation cadets who have sworn to avenge his death. A cadet group known as the Joe Smartt Commandos left Dallas, Tex., June 9—designated by the local Aviation Selection Board as Joe Smartt Day—for the University of Georgia at Athens, where they are undergoing rigorous pre-flight physical training resembling the techniques developed by Britain's famed Commandos. Final flight training will follow, and the group will be ready to strike.

In a blood-stained letter to his mother Ensign Smartt had hurriedly added the postscript "We are now fighting," shortly before he was killed by a Japanese bomb. George W. Bryan, *Texas* Δ '44, who was initiated with Joe Smartt at the Fort Worth Convention, advises that Smartt's death caused him to enlist in the Marines. He is now serving as private, first class, at the Puget Sound Naval Ammunition depot but has passed his examination for the Navy Air Corps and hopes to be able to join the Joe Smartt Commandos.

In Charge of Camp Sports

▪ Major Thomas C. Ferguson, *S.D.* Σ '15, is serving as a special officer with the 132nd Service Unit in charge of sports and recreation at Fort George G. Meade, Md. In civilian life Major Ferguson was State Supervisor of Physical Education and Recreation. He developed the present mass athletic set-up in all Maryland schools. He began his career as Maryland's athletic head in 1937 and is now on leave for the duration, his post being filled by his assistant during the war. Major Ferguson served in World War I.

Tackles Jap Airdrome

▪ 1st Lt. Frank W. DeLong, Jr., *Ga.* B '40, Army Air Corps, led a bombing attack on the Japanese-held airdrome at Myitkyina, Burma, on May 16 and returned safely.

2,640 IN SERVICE

The list of members of Sigma Alpha Epsilon, serving in the armed forces of the United States, as reported to the National Office up to July 1, 1942, totaled 2,640, an increase of 1,040 since the list presented in the May issue of THE RECORD was compiled. The list of additional names printed in this issue also includes those of eighty-eight men for whom a change of rank or station has been reported. To meet the requirements of the military censorship, the organizations, ships or exact locations of men in foreign service are not given.

Archon Taylor in Army

▪ Former Judge Andrew Tip Taylor, *Tenn.* H '33, Archon of Province Iota, is now 2nd Lt. Taylor of the Army Air Corps. After preliminary training at Miami Beach, Fla., he will report to Brookley Field, Mobile, Ala., for duty. While Judge Taylor is in the army, his duties as Archon of Province Iota will be discharged by Deputy Archon Robert H. Horsley, *Tenn.* N '32, Nashville, Tenn.

From Lexington to Altar

▪ Ensign C. Stewart Henslee, *Tenn.* K '37, did not let a little matter such as jumping from the burning Aircraft Carrier *Lexington* into the waters of the Pacific ocean interfere with his wedding plans and so, with his commanding officer and other survivors of the *Lexington* as groomsmen, he was married to Miss Marjorie Waldridge at Coronado, Calif., June 9, 1942. When the order to abandon ship was given, he went over the side of the *Lexington* and slid down a cable which ended twenty feet above the water. He says he went so far down he was afraid he would never come up but he regained the surface and was picked up after floating for an hour and a half.

With "Flying Bears"

▪ Four members of Missouri Beta made up an ΣAE group in the "Flying Bears," a unit composed of students of Washington University who applied to enlist on December 8, 1941, and went on active duty on June 18, 1942. The group is composed of men selected by the Naval Cadet Selection Board for flight training in the Naval Air Corps at Lambert Field, Mo. The four ΣAEs are: Robert M. Bassett, '42; William T. Cartwright, '44; John Thomson Weber, '44; and Warren W. Wiperman, '44.

Flying Mayor

▪ Dropping detailed assaults on daily governmental problems by exchanging his duties as "Mayor" of Newport News, Va., for "Major" in the Army Air Corps, T. Parker Host, *Va.* O '14, a warbird of World War I, has been in service since February 20, taking off where he left off in 1918 as a flier for the armed forces.

Commissions Enlisted Men

▪ First graduates of the Army Air Corps' only non-flying officers' training school were commissioned by Maj. Gen. Walter R. Weaver, *Va.* Θ '04 (V.M.I.), Acting Chief of the Army Air Corps and Commanding General of the Air Corps Technical Training Command, on May 11 at Miami Beach, Fla. The 500 picked enlisted men are now handling supply, intelligence, and other administrative services for the men who fly the nation's bombers and fighters. General Weaver's graduating address to the new officers in palm-fringed Flamingo Park stressed that the enlisted man, as a cross-section of the Nation, is "a man of understanding and feeling and it is, therefore, your duty to deal with him as such." One member of the graduating class was Harrison P. Kellum, *Mont.* B '38, now stationed with the Army Air Force Technical Command.

Selects the Doctors

▪ Cutting red tape to procure 350 Hoosier doctors for war duty, which was Indiana's quota of the 16,000 army medics needed, was the function of Maj. Virgil L. Eikenberry, *Ind.* A '14, president of the five-man Medical Officers' Recruiting Board which toured Indiana through May and June. Interviewing applicants, arranging for physical examinations, and swearing them in as commissioned officers, Major Eikenberry's board bore the brunt of commissioning officers below the rank of major and making recommendations for commissions above that grade.

Don Gable in Pacific

▪ Don M. Gable, *Ohio* Δ '35, who has been Associate Editor of THE RECORD and Assistant to the E.S.R. since August, 1937, received an appointment as Ensign in the Naval Reserve and was ordered to report at Norfolk, Va., on May 18 for training and assignment to the staff of the Admiral commanding the South Pacific Area. A telegram, sent "sans origine," announcing his safe arrival, was received at Evanston on June 26. On receiving his appointment to the Navy, he was given a leave of absence for the duration by the Supreme Council. His work has been taken over by Gordon B. Duncan, *Ill.* B '39.

Chas. J. Lightfoot Missing

Officer in Top Army Court

Former First Lieutenant J. Carson Lumbattis, *Ill.* B '36, who since January has been in command of Headquarters Battery, Second Battalion, 62nd Coast Artillery, (AA), Fort Totten, N.Y., was promoted to Captain on May 29. Besides other duties, including his being gas officer, he is Trial Judge Advocate of the General Courts-Martial for the regiment, representing the United States in the prosecution of cases in this court, which is the highest army court, and the only one to condemn a man to death or to discharge him dishonorably.

Captain "Bobby" Jones

Robert Tyre Jones, *Ga.* Φ '22, grand slam golf champion of 1930, reported for active duty as a captain in the Army Air Corps at Mitchell Field, N.Y., June 23. He was assigned to the Aircraft Warning Service and after a course of training will take over the job of organizing and instructing large groups of volunteers.

Teaching Tars to Swim

Lt. (jg) Walter N. Colbath, *Ill.* Ψ-Ω '30, former Olympic star and national diving champion, is director of the course of instruction in swimming and diving at the Great Lakes, Ill., Training Station which the Navy is requiring every man from recruit to Commander to take. It is believed that this course will result in saving many lives and also produce great improvement in the physical condition of the men taking training. The course is a direct reversal of the old tradition that deep sea sailors never knew how to swim.

Father, Son Serve U.S.

While dad helps the navy build bases, his son is training to fly combat planes. Lt. Com. Ralph Bryan, *Mo.* B '13, former architect, who served in the Army Air Force in the last war and helped build flying fields for forces in England, works in Washington for the Civil Engineering Corps of the Naval Reserve, Bureau of Yards and Docks. His present duty is the planning of advanced naval bases. His son, George W. Bryan, *Texas* Δ '44, enlisted in the Marine Corps one week after Pearl Harbor and is now on duty in the Pacific Northwest. Having passed his final tests for the Marine Flying Corps, he is now in training for an aviator's commission.

Twice Decorated For Bravery

For gallantry in action, in connection with a bomber crew's lone attack upon a Southwest Pacific enemy base, 1st Lt. Henry J. Rose,

Tenn. Ω '40, *Tex.* P, was the recipient of two decorations—The Distinguished Service Cross and the Silver Star (a reward to persons previously cited in action). Along with six other members of his bomber crew Lieutenant Rose braved anti-aircraft fire and attacks by enemy fighters. The citations for bravery and extraordinary devotion to duty were announced June 9 by United Nations Headquarters at Australia. In a cablegram to his father the Texan tersely told of receiving the Distinguished Service Cross and added that he was "happy, healthy, and homesick." Lieutenant Rose received his commission in February, 1941, and was sent to the Philippines in October. He was transferred to Australia "in the nick of time" he told his father in a letter which took sixty days to reach Dallas.

Lt. Gen. Ford in Defense

Lt. Gen. Stanley H. Ford, *Ohio* Θ '98, U. S. Army, Retired, has been engaged in work with the State Council of Defense, Office of the Director of Civilian Defense, for the State of New York, in Albany, N.Y. He is associated with his wartime Commander, General O'Ryan. At the time of his retirement from the Army Lt. Gen. Ford was commander of the Sixth Corps Area, located in Chicago, Ill. He is a past Honorary Eminent Supreme Archon of ΣAE and makes his home in Merion, Pa.

Service Members in Alaska

Through 1st Lt. Elwin M. Nesmith, *N.H.* B '35, *Mass.* B-T, Army Transport Service, Office of the Assistant Superintendent, Fort Mears, Alaska, the National Office has learned that an attempt is being made to organize an alumni chapter of ΣAE in Alaska. In March a general letter to all posts in Alaska was sent from Fort Mears, outlining a plan of organization. Crowe a Prisoner

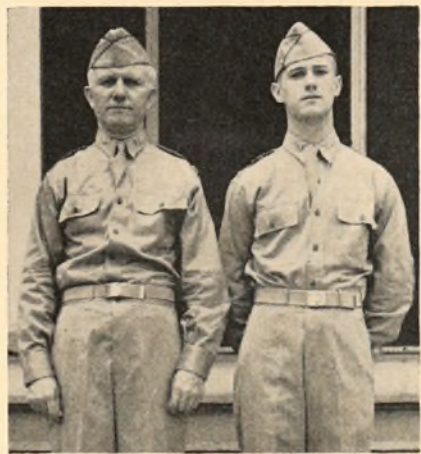

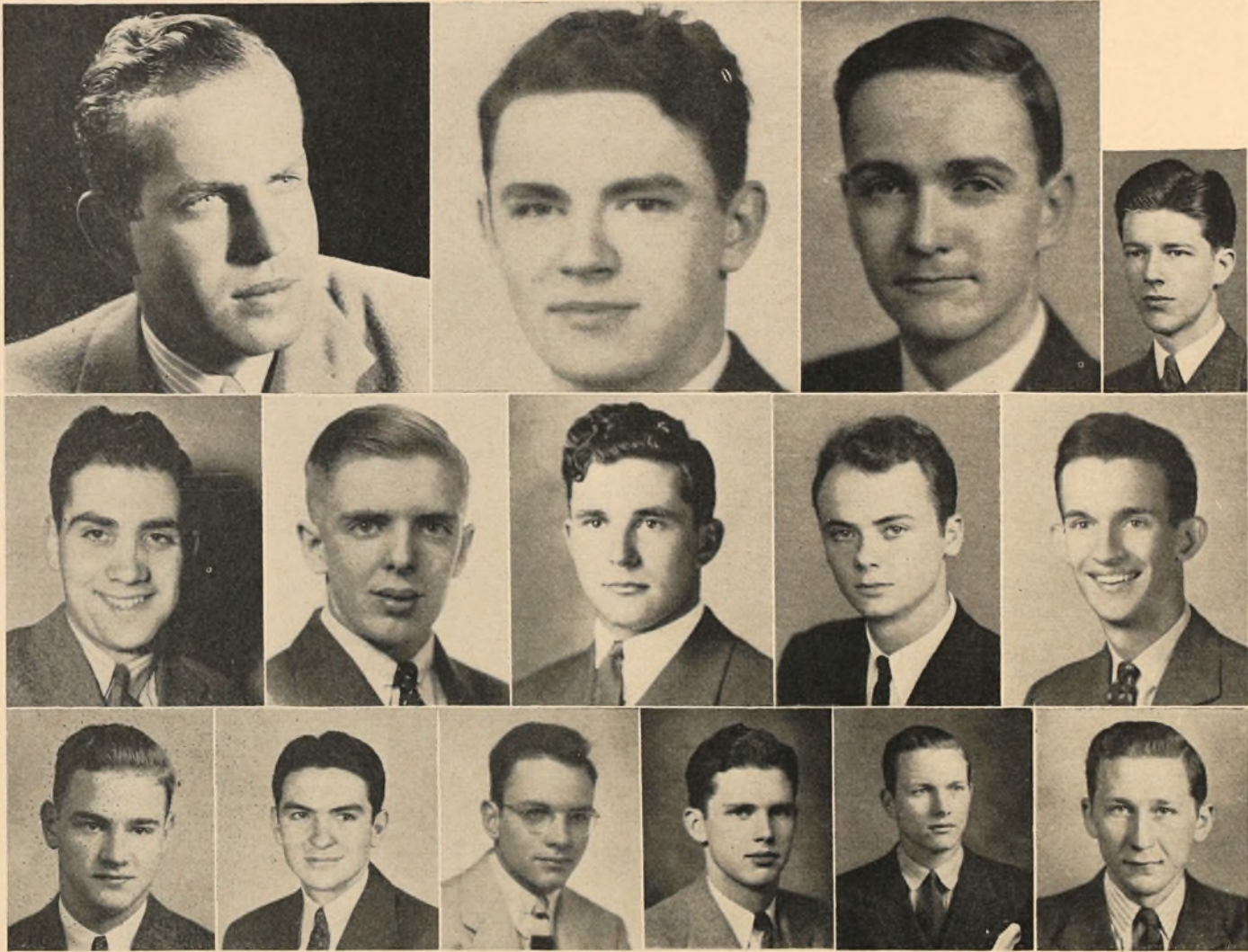

Eighth Leadership School

REGISTRATION for the Eighth Leadership School of Sigma Alpha Epsilon, to be held in the Levere Memorial Temple, the Fraternity's national shrine, 1856 Sheridan Road, Evanston, Ill., Sunday to Friday, August 23-28, 1942, indicate that there will be a good attendance despite the various restrictions imposed as the result of the Nation's war effort.

The program being prepared by Dr. John O. Moseley, Past Eminent Supreme Archon and Director of Leadership Training, will combine the ideas which have met the test of usefulness in past years with others

designed to meet the new problems of the present situation.

The School will open with a showing of ΣAE moving pictures Sunday afternoon, to be followed by a buffet supper in the Banquet Hall of the Temple, a song fest and a talk on the history of ΣAE music by O. K. Quivey, author of "Friends" and the recognized authority on the Fraternity's music.

Regular sessions of the School will start Monday morning and will continue throughout the week. Special features will include a dance Wednesday evening and initiation ceremony, followed by the farewell

banquet, Friday afternoon and evening, both to be held in the First Baptist church of Evanston of which Rev. Charles H. Heimsath, D.D., Texas P '22, is pastor.

The usual arrangements have been made with Northwestern University to furnish room and board for all who attend. The Fraternity will pay for room and board for one official representative from each chapter and the same accommodations will be furnished to additional representatives for approximately \$13.00.

The faculty will be made of members of Supreme Council, other present and past national officers, the Province Archons, and other alumni who are vitally interested in the progress of the Fraternity.

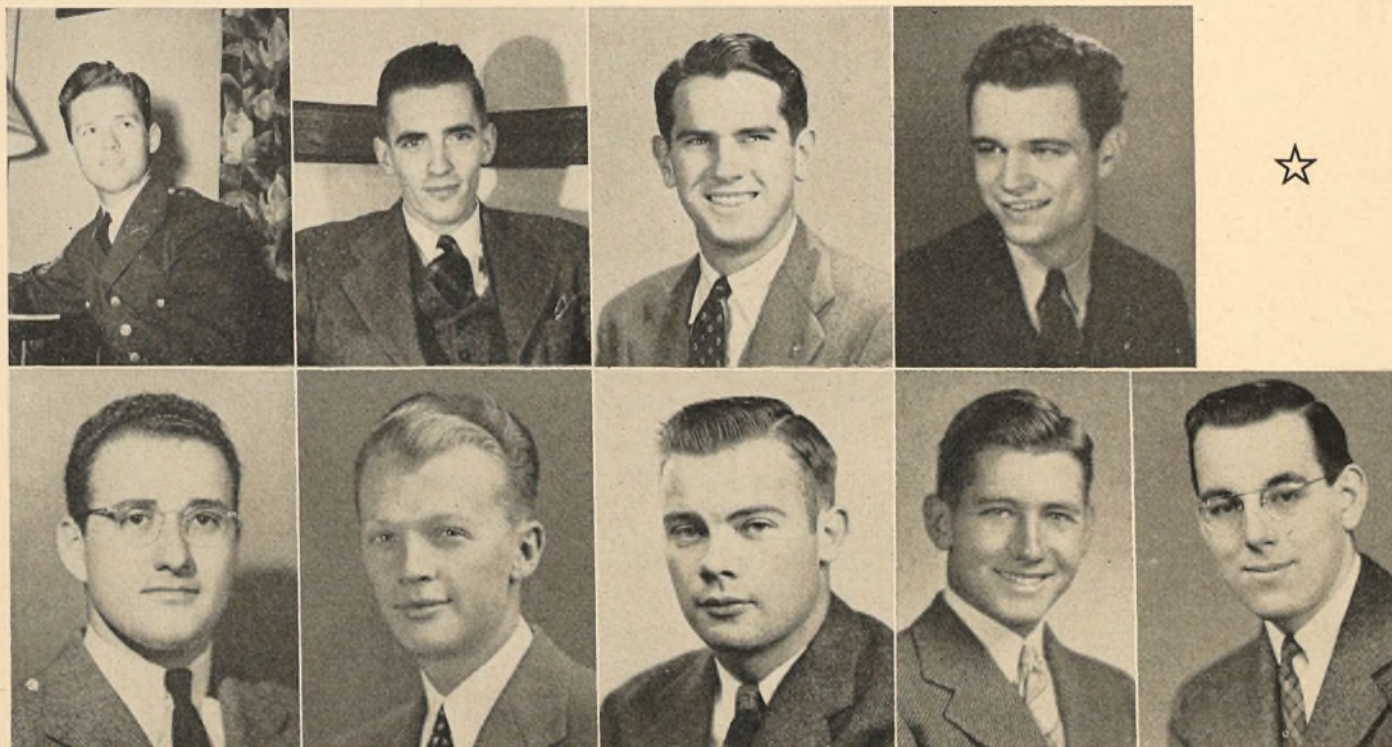

Chapters' Collegiate War Campaign

THE mobilization of ΣAE in the War Effort includes many members not measuring swords with the Axis. Men of the Chapters Collegiate, for example, are doing their share in essential service. Soon after Pearl Harbor many of the chapters instigated programs of self-sacrifice to enable the purchase of War Bonds and Stamps. Inquiries from the National Office reveal that practically every chapter is doing something to help.

For example, Alabama Alpha-Mu at Alabama Polytechnic Institute presented \$2.50-Defense-Stamp Books as favors at their Annual Formal Dance. Furthermore, instead of purchasing flowers as corsages, one hundred dollars was donated to the Red Cross. All over the campus now ten-cent War Stamps are purchased by every man attending a dance, and the stamps are turned over to the Red Cross.

California Alpha men purchase at least one stamp per man per week, practically, and are among the most consistent purchasers at Leland Stanford University. And most of the chapter members are engaged in Civilian Defense organizations.

Admission to Colorado Chi's Winter Formal at University of Colorado was gained by a substantial purchase of War Stamps, sold at a stand in the front entrance to the ballroom. War Stamp books also served as programs.

The Fighting Illini Spirit is evidenced by Illinois Beta at University of Illinois with every man contributing weekly to the Bond Fund Basket. Besides this, the chapter has co-operated wholeheartedly in aiding the Blood Bank Program installed in May.

Indiana Beta at Purdue was one of the first to realize the deep significance of the war and to consider thoughtfully the policies behind the organization the chapter represents. It was the first fraternity group on campus to form a workable plan for the support of the Government's War Bond and Stamp drive. Shortly after the beginning of the new year the first War Bond purchased by the chapter was for \$1,200. Stamp sales to date have approximated sixty dollars, and plans for regular purchase of bonds were established.

The prudent purchase of an \$18.75 War Bond each month has been faithfully followed by Massachusetts Kappa at Massachusetts State. The War Bond may well enable the building of a new house after the war. The Chapter House has taken every pre-

caution to care for itself in any emergency. Men are assigned duties as Wardens, Firemen, Runners, First Aiders, and a separate group is prepared to serve as Clean-Up Squad. One man is appointed to care for important records in case of bombing or fire.

Second place among fifty-eight fraternities and sororities at University of Minnesota who competed in the sale of bonds and stamps went to Minnesota Alpha. Selling in cooperation with Kappa Kappa Gamma sorority the chapter sold \$800 worth.

Besides financial aid, the men of Nevada Alpha at University of Nevada are lending moral support to their alumni in service, writing them letters at regular intervals, giving them the latest local news, and furnishing them with cigarettes. To aid in the purchase of War Stamps admission is charged to all social functions, and a stamp of twenty-five cent denomination is the usual minimum. Fines collected through the week are applied to the drive as well.

New York Delta is helping by individual purchases of stamps and donations of essential war materials. Receipts from "Victory Corsage" sales are converted into War Bonds.

Although North Carolina Xi's big contribution is in men—twenty-five per cent of the chapter's actives and pledges went into service—the group still contributed more than any other fraternity at University of North Carolina. Individual contributions are high, and all are doing their share. Hospitality has been extended to men in the armed forces passing through Chapel Hill, with free meals furnished frequently, and occasionally a bed or two.

Under the auspices of the faculty and Interfraternity Council at Denison University Ohio Mu co-operated in the Red Cross drive with a donation of twenty-five dollars, each man giving what he could.

We quote Robert E. Workman, E.A. of Ohio Rho at Case School of Applied Science to give you the interesting story of activities in Cleveland:

"The defense activities on campus are handled by a three-man War Council, of which I am a member. The purpose of the board is to formulate and to carry out the college's

war activities. The campus at Case has been the scene of a varied number of drives. These include the sale of War Bonds and Stamps, Red Cross, Conservation of Waste Materials, and Blood Donors. Because of our position on campus many of the above-mentioned drives were handled with creditable and praiseworthy results. The chapter has heartily entered the sale of bonds and stamps. One of our members handled their sale on campus and surpassed all total sale estimations. Two members have recently completed the Civilian Defense Air Raid Warden Training Course and are subject to duty in the residential section of Cleveland where the chapter house is located. In the fall a more rigorous program will be in effect, with approximately one-fifth of the chapter regularly enrolled in some type of Civilian Defense training.

"War Stamps are on hand at the house and are available for sale at any time. The conservation of electricity is diligently enforced both as a thrift effort and as a war effort. Paper is being diligently conserved along with other vital material. Regarding the classes in school, only the seniors are in compulsory attendance. The remainder of the chapter, who are not in school for the summer session, are, or will be, one hundred per cent in defense work, because of the technical training the men receive."

Another Ohio chapter has performed service in several ways. Ohio Tau at Miami University began by contributing ten dollars to Miami's All-Campus Fund for War Bonds, which are to be used to finance a Student Union building after the duration. The chapter has also co-operated in a drive to collect books for U.S.O. stations and prison camps. Four members canvassed different sections of Oxford to collect books and magazines. All material collected was turned over to the YMCA and YWCA for distribution. Besides this, the chapter men contributed more than twenty dollars to the Red Cross War Drive. An Air Raid Warden and a Fire Warden have also been appointed. They attend regular Civilian Defense lectures. Several members have given blood to the Red Cross Blood Bank.

Like many other chapters in Province Theta Oklahoma Mu at Oklahoma A. & M. is doing its share in the crisis. The American Flag flies every day from a pole in the center of the chapter house. In the living

room hangs a beautiful blue-and-white service flag, made by their House Mother. The blue service stars spell out ΣAE; one gold star honors Ensign Malcolm Kerby, '35, the first ΣAE reported killed in World War II. Many of the sailors stationed at the college have attended dinner and lunch several times during the year. A dance and tea have been planned for a group of British RAF fliers stationed at a nearby field. War Bonds have been purchased through the voluntary assessment of twenty-five cents per member. In the Fraternity Chapter's name, the bonds will benefit the chapter at a later date.

Early in the spring the University of Oregon sponsored a drive to buy War Bonds and Stamps. Of forty-six organizations on campus Oregon Beta was one of the first three to pledge one hundred per cent purchase of bonds and stamps.

Pennsylvania Theta at University of Pennsylvania instituted, in 1938, a building fund to which each man was to contribute \$2.50 per month besides his dues. To date this sum has amounted to several thousands of dollars, and the chapter has voted to turn this money and future building fund collections into War Bonds. Thus each man is contributing \$2.50 per month for War Bonds. Of the chapter's sixty-two active members thirty-five are now connected with the army, navy, or marine reserves.

Individual efforts to purchase bonds and stamps have been commendable at Rhode Island Alpha at Rhode Island State College. A large number of members have left for service, representing the parachute troops, ski troops, and the Army and

Navy Air Corps.

In place of a needed new roof, Tennessee Zeta at Southwestern College took the savings in the chapter account and put it to work—by purchasing a \$1,500 War Bond.

Contributions from Texas Rho at University of Texas have gone to the U.S.O., Navy Relief, and the Red Cross. Room and board have been given soldiers visiting Austin at various times. Planning with the alumni group is to result in consistent steps to purchase War Bonds and Stamps.

A special system to sell War Stamps has been devised by Virginia Tau at University of Richmond. A committee, with money borrowed from the treasury, has purchased a supply of stamps. Each member and pledge buys a ten-cent stamp each week from the committee, and the stamps are turned over to the Building Trust Fund. The Richmond Minerva Club, under arrangements by Mrs. C. F. Jones, president, is also actively engaged in the systematic purchase of War Stamps. And the Central Virginia Alumni Association purchased a bond at their last meeting, turning it over to the Trust Fund.

Wisconsin Alpha at University of Wisconsin is co-operating with the University War Effort Council by purchasing its quota of stamps regularly, and several members are engaged in selling stamps and bonds outside the house.

Each member of Wisconsin Phi at Beloit College has pledged himself to buy a number of stamps weekly, the amount being discretionary. Plans are in order for the purchase of bonds in the fall. Six chapter mem-

bers have been selected to serve the city of Beloit as part of a Rescue Squad in any emergency. Training in First Aid and rescue work is part of their program and they will be subject to call twenty-four hours a day.

In consideration of the total work being done by the Chapters Collegiate the National Office offers congratulations. Each chapter seems to realize that in order to prevent the loss of things money can't buy, it must make temporary sacrifice of many things money can buy.

TB Pioneer Retires

Breaker of trails in bacteriology and perhaps the world's foremost expert on tuberculosis, Edwin George Hastings, *Ohio* Θ '98, retired in June from active teaching at the University of Wisconsin. The scientist pioneered the long fight against bovine TB and added untold thousands of dollars to the value of Wisconsin's dairy herds in the past 40 years, during which period he has been Professor of Agricultural Bacteriology at Madison and president of the Society of American Bacteriologists. Breaking down the barrier of prejudice against "book farmers," Doctor Hastings brought about the tuberculin testing of more than 25,000,000 head of dairy cattle in the United States. Each was tested twice and over 5,000,000 head were found diseased and slaughtered. He proved "It's what's inside the cow that counts," and state after state fell in line to adopt testing laws. He participated in some of the first work in determining the temperature for proper pasteurization of milk, developed the "cold cure" method for cheddar cheese makers, and fostered "pure cultured starters" which made Swiss cheese more nearly uniform and improved its flavor. Telling his students he doesn't want to turn them into "a bunch of bacteriologists," Doctor Hastings has always explained, "I just want to make you better farmers and citizens." At its June 15th commencement exercises Ohio State University conferred upon him the honorary degree of Doctor of Science.

Tribute Paid for Services

Achievements and distinguished service in the fields of science, radio, and communication won Com. William F. Grimes, *Calif.* Γ '17, an honorary degree of Master of Science from the University of Southern California at the commencement exercises at Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum June 6. Commander Grimes is Communications Officer and Commanding Officer of U. S. Naval

Radio Stations, 11th Naval District, with headquarters at San Diego, Calif. During World War I he enlisted in the Naval Reserve and was sent to the Naval Radio School at Harvard University. After completion of these studies he served as radio operator on the Battleships *Rhode Island* and *Pennsylvania*. Later he was transferred to Washington's Naval Radio Laboratory, where he spent years on research and design of radio apparatus. In 1924 he joined Westinghouse Electric and Manufacturing Company at Los Angeles, advancing quickly to the post of general engineer. Nine years later he left this organization to organize the Radio Interference Engineering Bureau, continuing with this organization as Chief Engineer and Manager until he entered active service with the navy in January, 1941. In less than three months he was advanced to the rank of major.

Luminary Honored

Light wizard Dr. Matthew Luckiesh, *Ind.* B '09, North America's recently returned "ambassador of light and sight" to South America's ABC Nations, was elected an honorary fellow of the Mexican Institute of Illumination on Christmas Day, 1941, "in grateful recognition of his indefatigable labor in the work of illumination, in general, and his ardent interest in the progress of the Science of Seeing in the Mexican Republic." Sr. Atilio Celis, president of the institute, made presentation of the honor to General Electric's Lighting Research director (Cleveland, Ohio, laboratory). Dr. Luckiesh's 15,000-mile Southern-neighbor tour of last month was announced in the May issue of *THE RECORD*.

Leaving Singapore on February 3rd, nine days before it fell to the Japanese, on the last ship to go through the straits, Philip Druiding, *III. Ψ-Ω '27*, arrived in Chicago late in April. He told some of his many experiences at a Chicago ΣAE Alumni Association luncheon June 10, sharing harrowing experiences and acute observations. Under heavy bombardment, he left Singapore, where he was associated with a subsidiary of Wrigley's Chewing Gum Company for fifteen years. At Batavia the crew and

passengers were warned that the ship would be bombed, but she got through with one destroyer as convoy. He took an army transport out of Melbourne. His good fortune in escaping from Singapore, with "three out of five ships not getting through," and where there was "no air defense, some anti-aircraft," made thrilling narration, as did his experiences helping care for the wounded and dead in a Singapore hospital.

New Atlanta Bishop

Notes on New Books

FIRE IN SUMMER—Another ΣAE author has gained nationwide attention with a first novel of great promise. *Fire in Summer*, by Robert Ramsey, *Ark. A-T '34*, which has been presented to the library at Levere Memorial Temple by the author, is strong, exciting reading. An honest portrait of the Southern "poor white," the book is a study of fierceness and frustration in a background of pride



and poverty. Spencer Lovell is a character representing a whole people driven into pathological behaviour by an unjust system and hopeless insufficiency. The record is told from the innocent viewpoint of Spence's young son, who is caught in a web of horror but who paints his father objectively. In the latter's anger is reflected the book's theme—hatred of the poor white for the negro.

The novel came to publication by way of the Colorado Writer's Conference at Boulder, where in the summer of 1941 the book took shape under the guidance of Hudson Strode, professor in the literary department at the University of Alabama, whose encouragement and criticism also aided Edward Kimbrough, *W.C. P. Ala. M '40*, whose novel *From Hell to Breakfast* was reviewed in the August, 1941, issue of THE RECORD. Strode's classes, incidentally, are becoming famous. Lippincott Publishers give a \$1,000 prize each year to the best novel written in his class, which recognition is unique. In the past four years he has turned out seven published novelists—another record—and two of them are ΣAEs:

Kimbrough and Ramsey. Hudson Strode is author of *Finland Forever*, *South by Thunderbird*, *The Pageant of Cuba*, and *The Story of Bermuda*.

GIVE ME LIBERTY—Deputy Chairman of the War Manpower Commission, Fowler V. Harper, *Ohio M '20*, is a recognized authority on torts and the author of several books and scientific articles for law journals. He has presented an autographed copy of his most recent book, *Give Me Liberty*, to the Levere Memorial Library. The small 156-page book meets the need for a clear and concise grasp on the principles of our democratic faith and its implications. The style—simple and forceful—enables both young and old to appreciate it, and as a morale builder *Give Me Liberty* might well be recommended for nationwide reading. The American Way of Life, and the Capitalistic System, are considered in concrete, to-the-point fashion, and contrasted to totalitarianism. Fowler feels that "A Capitalistic System is not perfect. It has its seamy side, but we think it works better than any other." He asserts: "Neither a man nor a nation can submit to slavery and continue as an effective force in the world, even though, for a short time, the unity of purpose and the drive which comes from concerted effort directed by the master mind may crush an unsuspecting and undisciplined victim." He emphasizes that the only way we can realize our goal is for every American to keep the Nazi weeds out of his own personal democratic garden. "Just as a matter of clearing up your mind," he propounds, "so that this struggle to save democracy will make sense, why not discover whatever prejudices you may have, meet them face to face and tear them out by the roots."

MISCELLANEOUS—The *Song Book* and the *Pledge Manual* of Sigma Sigma Sigma, national education sorority, have been added to the fraternity and sorority section of the Levere Memorial Temple Library. 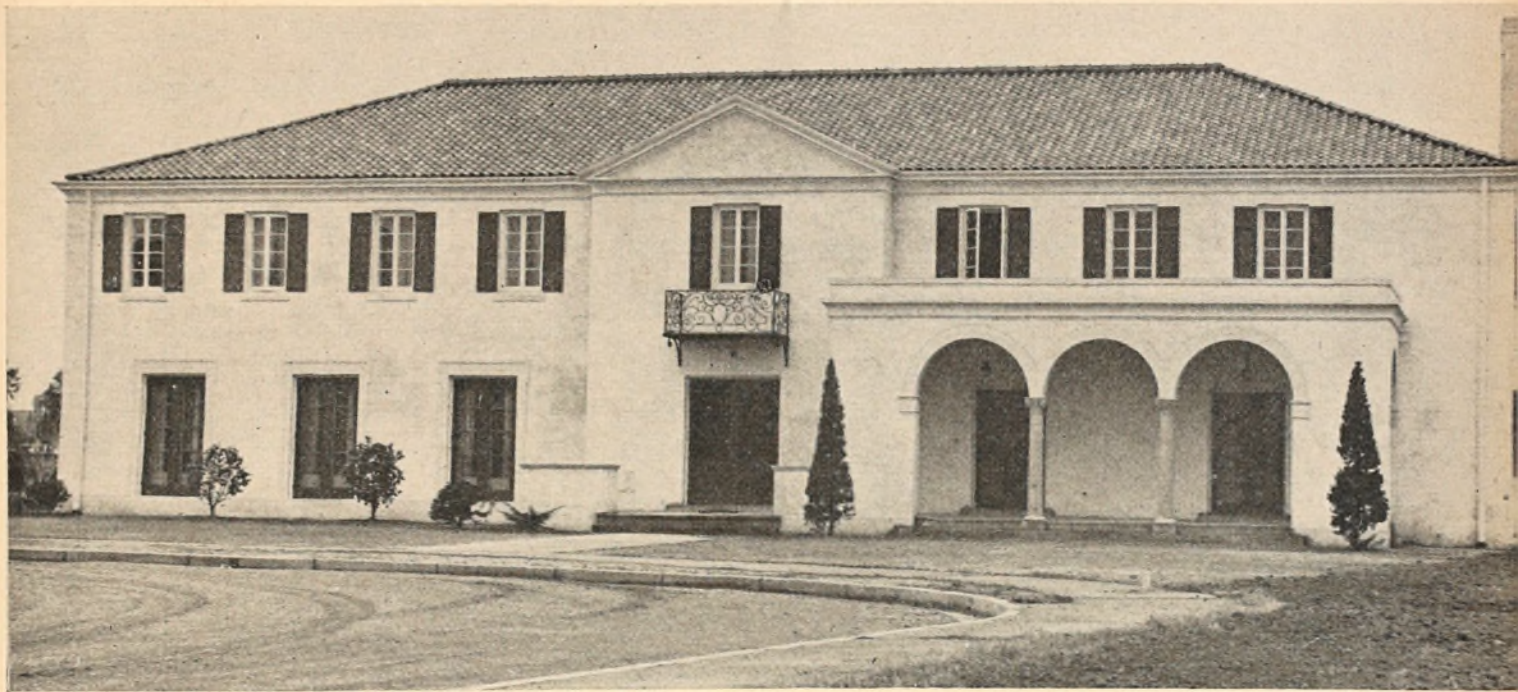
Archon Markham Resigns

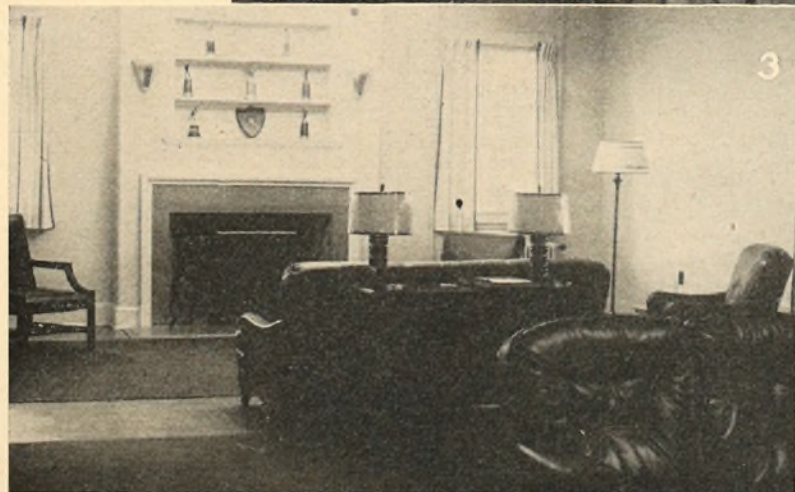
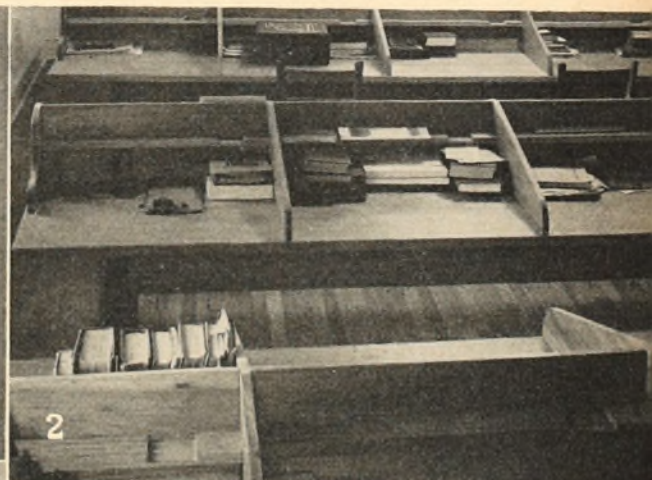

WASHINGTON CITY RHO at George Washington University is now located in its own home at 1824 Nineteenth St., N.W., after having occupied a rented house at 1128 Sixteenth St., N.W., for a number of years.

The house is owned by the Washington City Rho Association to which the chapter will pay a fixed rental from which the Association will pay interest, amortization of the principal, taxes and for major repairs.

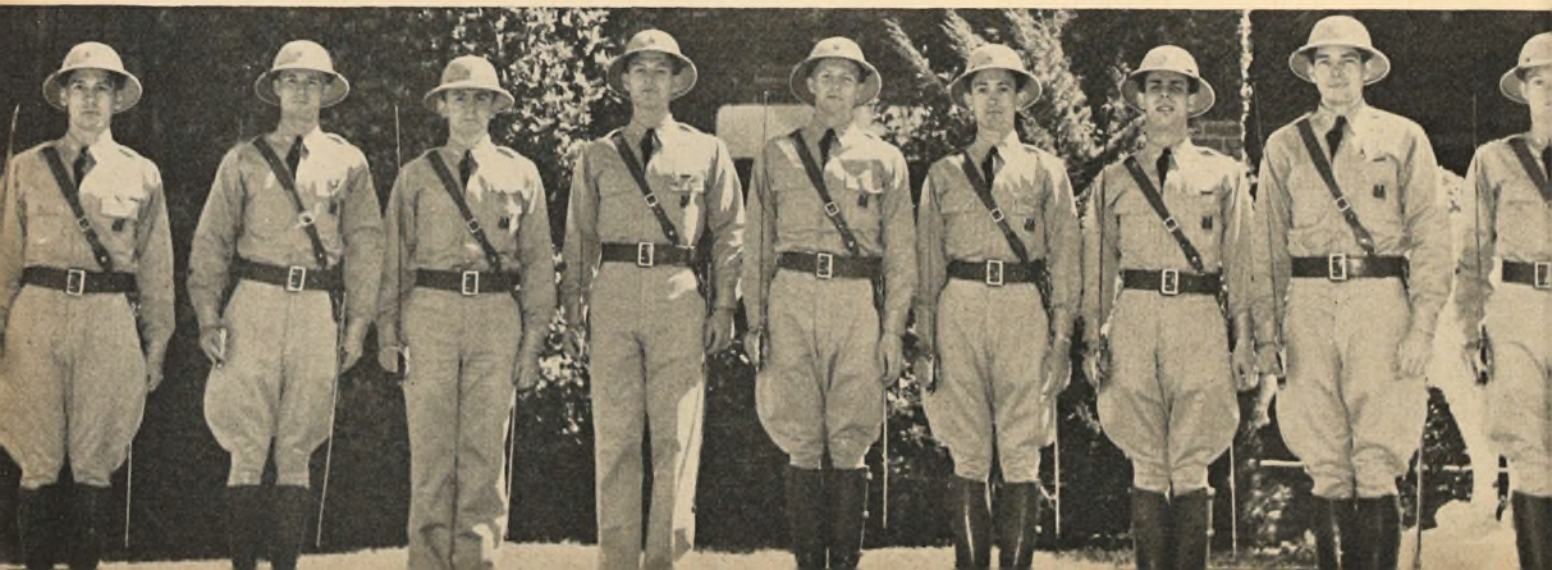
Daily Sheet Honored Again

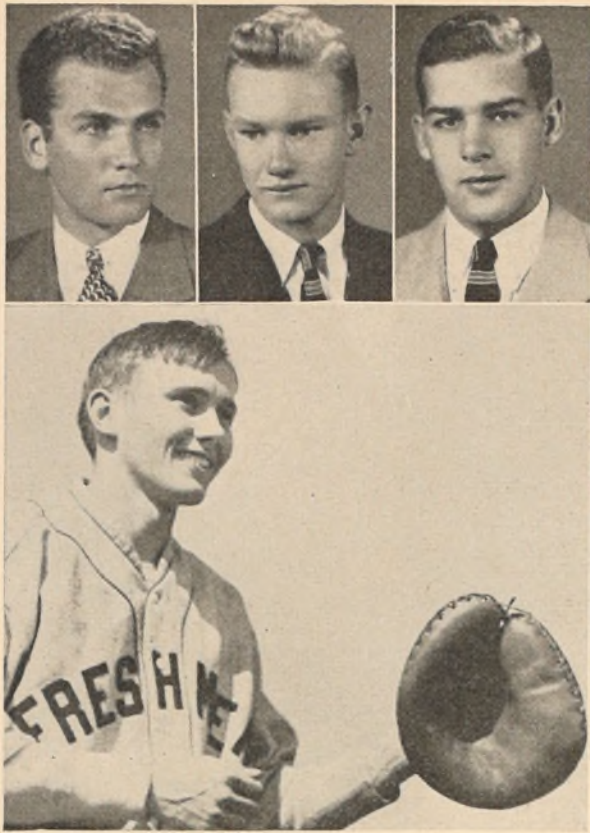

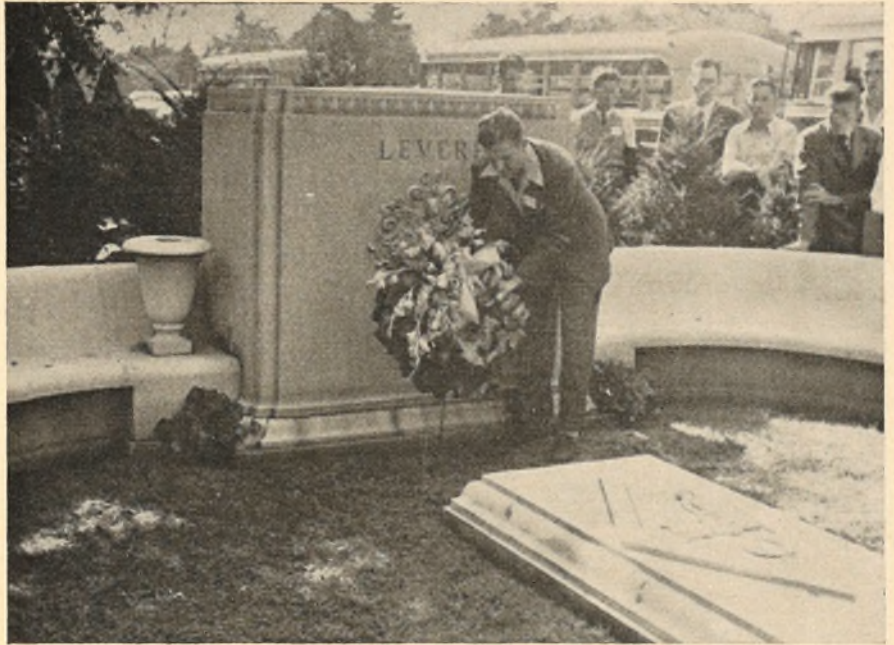

On the hardwood Ed Lucas, Bob McLeod, and MacBruce formed a flashy trio this year, and on the cinders in the spring Dick Port and Baxter Freeze handled the hurdles and other field events.

Gibson Hobbs Assassinated

THOMAS GIBSON HOBBS, Va. O '09, Eminent Supreme Archon of Sigma Alpha Epsilon, 1923-1924, prominent attorney of Lynchburg, Va., and leader in civic, church and educational affairs, was shot and killed by a disgruntled litigant in the corridor of the Law Building at Lynchburg in which his firm had offices shortly after noon June 30, 1942. A few minutes later, another attorney who was associated with Mr. Hobbs in the litigation which caused the tragedy was shot and killed by the same man against whom a charge of murder was lodged.

Apparently, Mr. Hobbs was shot without warning. He fell with two bullets in his back and died while being carried to a hospital. The funeral was held at Lynchburg the following afternoon.

For many years Mr. Hobbs had been an outstanding figure in ΣAE and had proved himself one of its most loyal and devoted members. From the day of his initiation by Virginia Omicron at the University of Virginia, October 12, 1907, he took a leading part in chapter activities. He was elected Recorder-Treasurer of Province Gamma the year following his graduation and Archon in 1912, being re-elected in 1914 and 1916.

During these years he had been a prominent figure in national conventions and at Pittsburgh in December, 1916, he was elected Eminent Supreme Deputy Archon. He was re-elected at Buffalo in 1919 and at St. Louis in 1920 and was elevated to Eminent Supreme Archon at Detroit in 1922.

The 94-year-old veteran served in the Civil War in Company I, Sixth Mississippi Regiment, under General Robert Lowry.

ROY B. BRADSHAW Oklahoma Kappa '21

Roy B. Bradshaw, Okla. K '21, high school principal and widely known youth leader of Tulsa, Okla., died at 52 in Tulsa May 14, 1942. Long associated with public school work, a student of genealogy and collector of antiques, and wounded in France in World War I, he is remembered as a very active alumnus who attended many province and national conventions and participated loyally in ΣAE work. He was a Life Member of the Chapter National.

DR. ALLEN SEYMOUR DAVIS Oklahoma Mu '31

Dr. Allen Seymour Davis, Okla. M '31, Life Member of the Chapter National, died at Stillwater, Okla., June 10, 1942. He was adviser in the organization and development of Chi Beta, local fraternity begun in 1921, which ten years later became Oklahoma Mu of Sigma Alpha Epsilon. Initiated at the chapter installation ceremonies on February 14, 1931, Doctor Davis's name heads the list in the ranks of Oklahoma Mu. In 1922 he organized and conducted the first courses in religious education at Oklahoma A. & M. College, and they have grown under his direction as head of the department of religious education.

As chief executive of the Fraternity he served with fidelity and distinction. He enjoyed the unreserved confidence of his associates and commanded their admiration for his keen intellect, unswerving fidelity and manifest courage. His engaging personality attracted every one with whom he came in contact.

After retiring from the Supreme Council, he continued his active interest in the Fraternity and was recognized as one of the ablest and most valuable members of all the national conventions he attended. He served on the extension committee several times and was chairman of the committee on national laws at Chicago in 1937 and 1939 and at Fort Worth in 1940. In this capacity he rendered conspicuous service.

Despite his varied interests, he found time to continue as the alumnus adviser of Virginia Omicron and was largely responsible for the success of the chapter in financing the rebuilding of its house which was dedicated to him at a testimonial dinner October 18, 1936.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Melville Bolling Hobbs; three sons, T. Gibson, Jr., Va. O '40, Ensign Stewart Bolling, Va. O '42, and Frank Imboden; and by one daughter, Miss Melville Minge Hobbs.

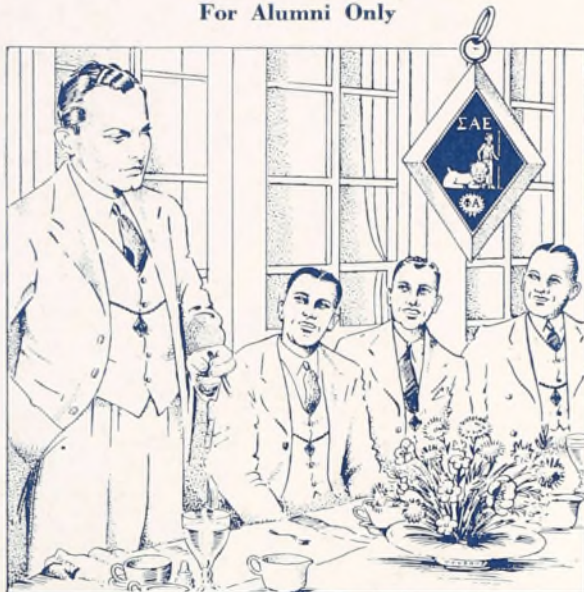
