

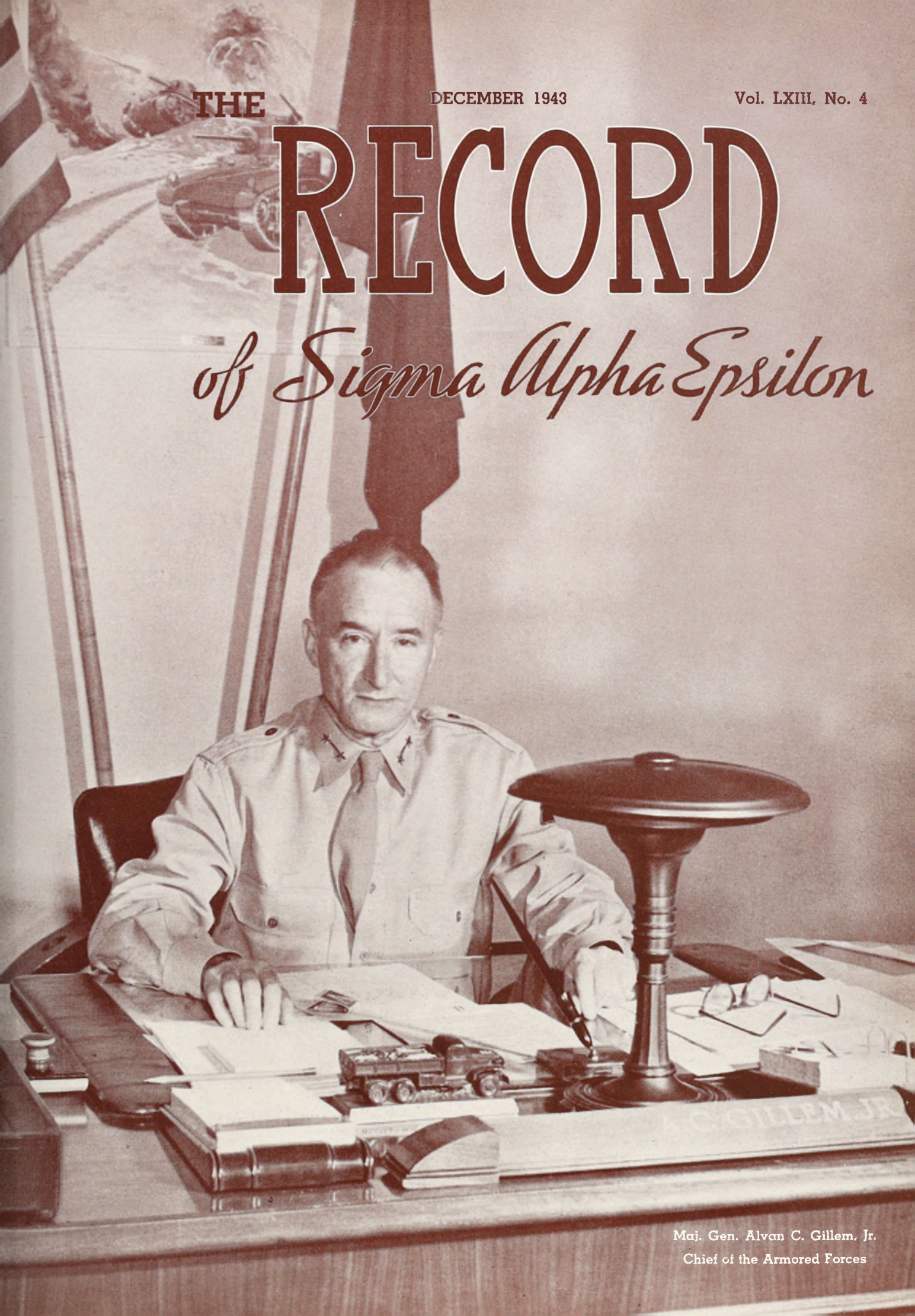

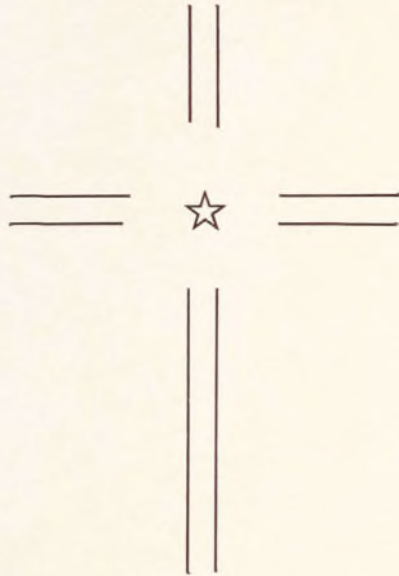

## Mortgage-Burning Features Convention

**H**IGHLIGHT of the Eighty-Seventh Anniversary National Convention of Sigma Alpha Epsilon, held in the Levere Memorial Temple, national shrine of the Fraternity, at Evanston, Ill., Sunday, August 22, and Friday and Saturday, 27-28, 1943, was the burning of the mortgage on the Temple, following announcement that the final instalment of the debt on the structure which represents an investment of \$412,696.71, had been paid.

The mortgage-burning ceremony followed a memorial service in honor of the 686 members of the Fraternity who had died since the Fort Worth Convention of December, 1940, special tribute being paid to the 114 whose deaths while serving in the armed forces in World War II had been reported at the time of the Convention. The memorial address was delivered by General J. Washington Moore, *Tenn. N '91, Past E.S.A.*, who was the guest of honor of the Convention.

The Convention was held in connection with the Ninth Leadership School. Sessions of both were held on Sunday; the School was in session Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday; and business sessions of the Convention were held Friday and Saturday, with a joint farewell dinner Saturday evening. Delegates from sixty-five Chapters Collegiate and seven Alumni Associations were seated in the Convention while 125 undergraduates attended the School.

Both the Convention and the School were devoted largely to discussion of war and post war problems. Determination to carry on in the face of all difficulties was the keynote of both gatherings. There was no entertainment, all social features having been eliminated from the program in keeping with the spirit of the times.

By unanimous vote the Convention authorized the establishment of two new Chapters Collegiate, granting charters to the petitioning local fraternities: Sigma Phi Gamma at the University of Connecticut, installed as Connecticut Beta, October 9; and Pi Kappa at the University of Maryland, installed as Maryland Beta, October 24.

Dr. Fred H. Turner, *Ill. B '22, Dean of Students at the University of Illinois*, was elected Eminent Supreme Archon to succeed George N. Short, *Ohio Δ '05*, and Dr. Robert R. Aurner, *Iowa B '20, Scholarship Commissioner*, was elected Eminent Supreme Chronicler. Other members of the Supreme Council were advanced, as follows:

Cobb C. Torrance, *Ga. B '21, from Eminent Supreme Warden to Eminent Supreme Deputy Archon* to succeed Dr. Turner;

G. A. Ginter, *Ohio E '97, from Eminent Supreme Herald to Eminent Supreme Warden*;

Lauren Foreman, *Ga. E '01, was re-elected as Eminent Supreme Recorder; Dr. John O. Moseley, Okla. K '16, as Director of Leadership Training; and Charles M. Carpenter, Mich. A '17, as a member of the National Board of Trustees for a term of ten years.*

Dr. Wilber J. Teeters, *Ohio Σ '93, Dean Emeritus of the University of Iowa, Past Archon of Province Zeta, and mayor of Iowa City, Iowa, was elected Honorary Eminent Supreme Archon.*

Eminent Supreme Archon Short presided at all sessions and kept things moving with such clock-like regularity that the Convention had finished its business and was ready to adjourn at 4:45 o'clock Saturday afternoon.

### Three Emergency Measures

Three emergency measures were adopted for the duration: (1) placing chapters which become inactive in a status of suspended animation and giving the Supreme Council authority to reestablish them; (2) suspending the provision of the National Laws, covering the payment of semi-annual national dues so that chapters with less than ten members will only have to pay on the number of members actually in school; (3) suspending the provision of the National Laws, dealing with the distribution of the Convention Fund, so that the balance left from this Convention will

be held over for the 1945 Convention instead of being transferred to the Student Loan Fund.

Amendments to the National Laws adopted by the Convention liberalized the provisions dealing with extension; made the provisions covering the initiation ceremony and pre-initiation practices more specific; and clarified the provisions covering membership in the Chapter National. A new classification, that of "Sustaining Members" who shall pay \$500 was created and Founders at \$1,000; Sustaining Members; and Life Members at \$50 were given the right to designate whether their donations shall go to the National Endowment Fund or the Levere Memorial Foundation.

Selection of time and place for holding the next Convention was left in the hands of the Supreme Council.

The Convention opened with the memorial service at 3:00 P.M. Sunday. Following the address by General Moore, the plaque in honor of the seventy members of ΣAE who died in the service of the Confederate States which has been erected in the Temple was presented formally by Lauren Foreman, as Secretary of the Levere Memorial Foundation, and was accepted by Mrs. Irma Davis, president of the Illinois Division of the United Daughters of the Confederacy.

Announcement that the final instalment of the debt on the Temple had been paid was then made and the Convention adjourned to the Court of the Archons where the mortgage-burning ceremony was held. The mortgage was placed on a copper platter, held by Mr. Short, and the match was applied by Lauren Foreman. Plans to light the fire with a sun glass had been made but a cloud unobliquely obscured the sun so that it was necessary to resort to the use of a match. Others who took part in the ceremony were: three members of the Levere Memorial Temple Building Committee, Judge Alfred K. Nippert, *Past E.S.A.*, chairman, Arthur H. Knox, *Ill. Ψ-Ω '02, architect*, and Park W. Stickney, *N.H. A '08*; also, Dr. John O. Moseley, *Past E.S.A.*, who had signed the mortgage in 1935 along with Lauren Foreman; Norman H. Pritchard, *Ind. A '04, Counsel for the Fraternity*, who had handled the legal side of the transaction; Harry S. Bunting, *Tenn. Z '91, Past Hon. E.S.A.*; Dr. Fred H. Turner, *E.S.D.A.*; and G. A. Ginter, *E.S.H.*

Preliminary work of the Convention was held at a Sunday evening session, Mr. Short making his report as E.S.A. and announcing the appointment of committees. Many of these committees were able to meet before Friday so that when the business sessions were opened there was plenty of grist ready for attention. Sessions were held Friday morning, after-



noon and evening and Saturday morning and afternoon. Delegates to the Convention, the majority of whom were the same as the representatives attending the Leadership School, were housed in Willard Hall of Northwestern University and had their meals there.

At the farewell dinner, held in Scott Hall of Northwestern University Saturday evening, the award of trophies was announced, as follows:

(1) The Scholarship Cup, offered by the Miami, Fla., Alumni Association, to South Carolina Gamma at Wofford College, Spartanburg, S.C.;

(2) The Scholarship Improvement Cup to Louisiana Tau-Upsilon at Tulane University, New Orleans, La.;

(3) The Chapter Efficiency Cup to Indiana Beta at Purdue University, West Lafayette, Ind.,

(4) The Scrap Book Cup to Alabama Alpha-Mu at the Alabama Polytechnic Institute, Auburn, Ala.

### The New Officers

Though young in years, Dr. Fred H. Turner, the new E.S.A., is old in his service to the Fraternity. He served as Archon of Province Mu from 1926 to 1932 and in the meantime took on the duties of Scholarship Commissioner to which position he was named by the Supreme Council, following the 1930 Convention.

He became a member of the Supreme Council when he was elected Eminent Supreme Herald at the Chicago Convention of 1937. He was advanced to the Warden's post in 1939, and to E.S.D.A. at the Fort Worth Convention of 1940.

He was made Dean of Men at the University of Illinois in 1931, succeeding Dean Thomas Arkle Clark under whom he had served as Assistant Dean of Men for several years. Just a few days before his election as E.S.A., he was given a position of greater responsibility at the University of Illinois when he was elected to the newly-created position of Dean of Students. Dean Turner has also been active in the National Interfraternity Conference, having served as its Educational Adviser and on many important committees.

Dr. Robert R. Aurner, the new member of the Supreme Council who was elected Eminent Supreme Chronicler, has been a member of the faculty of the School of Commerce of the University of Wisconsin since 1925 and has been ranking professor of business administration and head of courses since 1930.

He served as Recorder-Treasurer of Province Mu from 1932 until 1936 when he was elected Deputy Archon in which position he served until he was elected Scholarship Commissioner by the Supreme Council, following the 1937 Convention.

The new Honorary E.S.A., Dean Emeritus of Pharmacy of the University of Iowa Wilber J. Teeters, was initiated into ΣAE fifty-two years ago and has given a generous portion of that span of years to the service of his Fraternity. He has the distinction of having served as President of Province Delta and as Archon of Province Zeta and is recognized as the god-father of Iowa Beta at the University of Iowa. He is nationally famous as a toxicologist and is now serving as mayor of Iowa City.

# Connecticut Beta Installed

CONNECTICUT BETA was installed as a chapter of Sigma Alpha Epsilon at the University of Connecticut, Storrs, Conn., Saturday, October 9, 1943, when twenty-nine active and four alumni members of Sigma Phi Gamma, to which a charter had been issued by the Eighty-Seventh Anniversary National Convention, were formally initiated. Sunday morning another initiation ceremony was held for six service men who would not get leave on Saturday.

The installation took place at 3:00 o'clock Saturday afternoon in the University library, following a buffet luncheon at the chapter house. Immediately after the installation, the entire party journeyed to Willimantic for the installation dinner at the Nathan Hale hotel.

The new chapter was installed by Charles F. Collins, Past E.S.A. For the initiation ceremony, the chairs were filled, as follows: E.A., Chas. F. ## Maryland Beta in the Fold

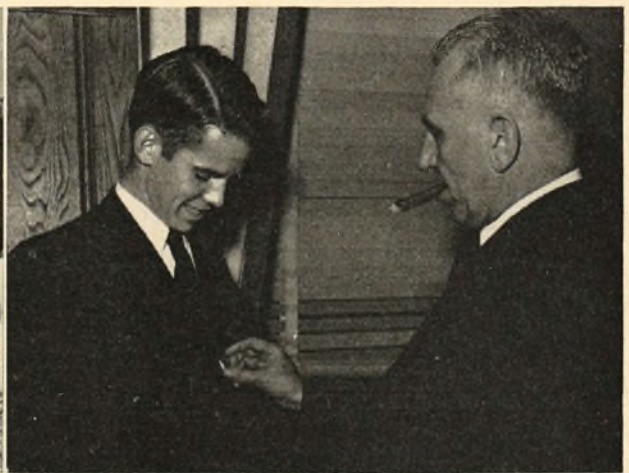

# Ninth Leadership School Proves Success

**W**ITH 108 representatives from sixty-five Chapters Collegiate present, the Ninth Leadership School, held in the Levere Memorial Temple at Evanston, Ill., in conjunction with the Eighty-Seventh Anniversary National Convention of Sigma Alpha Epsilon, from Sunday, August 22, to Saturday, August 28, proved its own best answer to those who were afraid that a sufficient attendance could not be recruited under war-time conditions to make the gathering worth while.

From its opening events on Sunday to the farewell banquet on Saturday evening, both of which were shared with the Convention, the School was an unqualified success and more than made up in spirit and enthusiasm for what it lacked in attendance, as compared with the Schools held in former years. The working sessions were compressed into four days and were sandwiched in between sessions of the Convention held on Sunday and on Friday and Saturday. This made it necessary to eliminate all social and entertainment features and to hold regular School sessions Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday evenings. This strenuous scholastic program was accepted cheerfully by all hands and all sessions were faithfully attended.

Thurston of Provinces Beta and Lambda were present throughout the School and rendered valuable assistance in carrying out the details of the program.

Guest speakers were James F. Lincoln, Ohio θ '07, president of the Lincoln Electric Co. of Cleveland, Ohio, and Dr. Lionel F. Crocker, Theta Chi, Faculty Adviser of Ohio Mu of ΣAE at Denison University.

Arrangements for the School were made by Lauren Foreman, E.S.R., and Albert J. Scoth, Chapter Supervisor, and registration was handled by the members of the National Office staff. As in past years, those attending the School were furnished rooms and meals in Willard Hall through the valuable cooperation of Northwestern University.

Following registration at Willard Hall Sunday morning, a group of early arrivals joined in an informal lunch at Cooley's Cupboard at noon, after which all repaired to the Temple to see the famous ΣAE motion pictures, taken

and arranged by G. A. Ginter and Dr. Burton A. Hoffman, displayed by these talented producers. The opening session of the Convention took up the afternoon but at 6:00 P.M. the School got under way again with the buffet supper in the Banquet Hall.

This helped all to get acquainted as Dr. Moseley introduced the members of the faculty, distinguished guests and National and Province officers. With Leo Terry at his Hammond organ, Song Leader Bill Sledge started the group to singing ΣAE music in a big way and a good time was had by all.

Returning to the Chapel at 7:30 P.M., the School members took part in the dedication of the ΣAE service flag in which the leading part was taken by Paul A. Walker, Ill. θ '05, member of the Federal Communications Commission. Albert M. Austin, Past E.S.A., then delivered an address on "The Building of ΣAE," after which the School gave way for the opening business session of the Convention.

School work started in earnest Monday morning at 9:00 o'clock. After organization and call, the chapter representatives were given an opportunity to tell their troubles, resulting from war conditions, and the final conclusion was that, though the outlook is gloomy, it might be worse and that the immediate future should be marked by action, rather than despair. At the 11:00 A.M. session in the Chapel, Dr. Moseley gave his famous address on "The Working Ideals of ΣAE."

Opening the afternoon session, Lauren Foreman, E.S.R., repeated the talk on chapter reports and paper work and relations with the National Office which he has given at each Leadership School. A general conference on planning for the present and post war periods

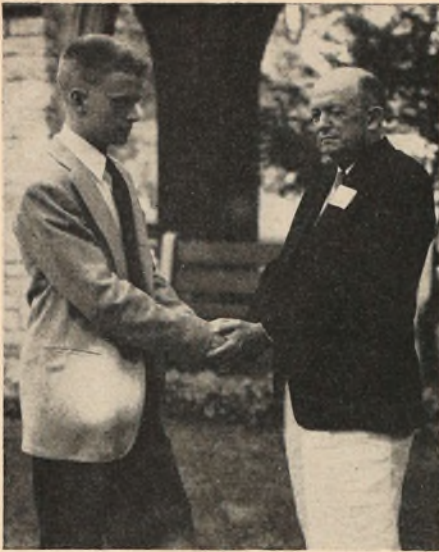

## Helping Crude Rubber Output

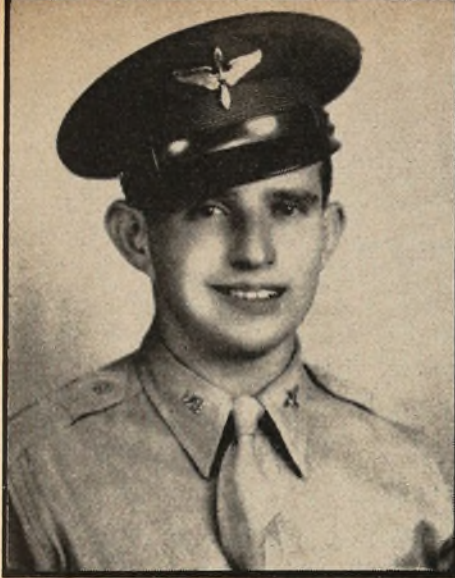
TWO MEMBERS of Sigma Alpha Epsilon, Raymond B. Bogardus, Pa. Φ '17, and James C. Roberts, Ohio Δ '23, experts for rival rubber companies, went together into the wilds of South America, figuratively with tin cups in their hands, several months ago and the result is an ever-increasing supply of the precious crude rubber for the Allied war effort.

Mr. Bogardus of the Goodyear Co. is now in charge of operations in Brazil and Mr. Roberts in Peru and Bolivia for the Rubber Development Corporation which was organized to meet the situation caused by the Jap capture of the rubber fields

of Malaya. There was no time to develop plantations with trees in neat rows. The only available source of rubber was the widely scattered stand of huge hevea trees in the area drained by the Amazon and its tributaries.

It was the job of Bogardus and Roberts to negotiate agreements for their respective territories, to arrange for labor, to ship in equipment ranging from planes to boats, and to see that the rubber kept moving back to the United States. The job is being done and the net supply, after giving the South American countries their proportion of the gross, has exceeded expectations. American rubber manufacturers are enthusiastic over the results which they predict will go a long way toward providing the necessary supply of crude rubber for military and civilian needs.



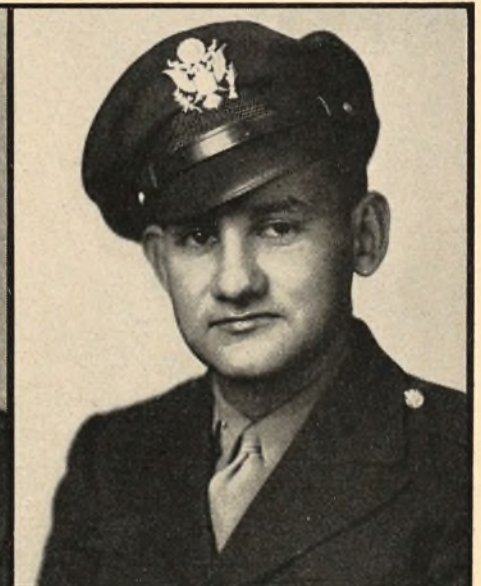
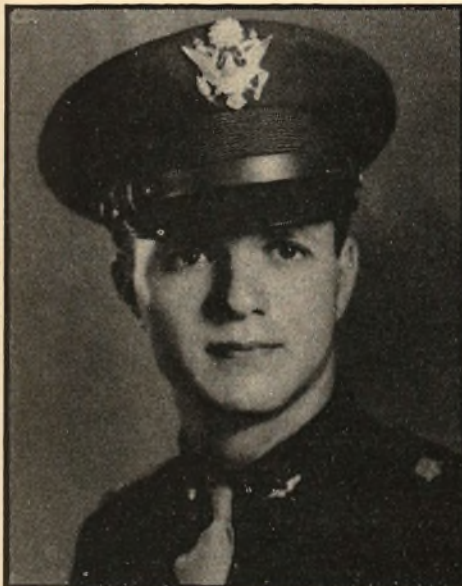

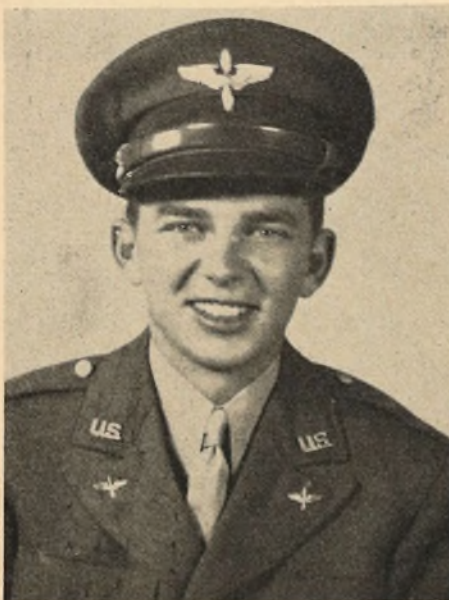

## CAPT. QUENTIN R. BIRCHARD

■ Capt. Quentin Roosevelt Birchard, *Calif.* A '38, Army Air Corps, whose death in action was reported in the March issue of *THE RECORD*, had been promoted from first lieutenant just a few days before and is carried as a captain in the records of the War Department, according to letters received by his parents. The Purple Heart decoration was awarded to him posthumously.

## CHARLES E. BLAINE, JR.

■ Charles Edmund Blaine, Jr., *Wash.* A '38, flight testing engineer for the Boeing Aircraft Co., was killed February 18, 1943, at Seattle, Wash., when a bomber being tested for the Army crashed into a building of the Frye Packing Co., killing eleven Boeing engineers and twenty-one employees of the packing company.

## LT. COL. ROSS B. BRETZ

■ Lt. Col. Ross B. Bretz, *Ind.* Γ '07, charter member of the Indiana chapter, died in Moore General Hospital, Swannanoa, N.C., August 5, 1943, after a long and distinguished career in the Army Medical Corps. At the time of his death, he was commanding officer of the 1500-bed hospital at Camp Butler, Durham, N.C. He served as first lieutenant in the Medical Reserve Corps in World War I, going overseas with the 88th Division. He was the brother of Dr. Waverly D. Bretz, charter member and president of the Dywyki local which became Indiana Gamma, and had several nephews in the Fraternity.

## 2ND LT. MARVIN H. BRYANT

■ 2nd Lt. Marvin H. Bryant, *Okla.* K '41, Army Air Corps, who was reported as missing in action after a bombing raid in the Aleutians, has now been officially reported by the War Department as having been killed in action January 18, 1943. The Order of the Purple Heart and the Army Air Medal for meritorious achievement were awarded to him posthumously and the medals and certificates have been sent to his mother, Mrs. Maud Bryant of Hugo, Okla.

## CAPT. CLAY R. DAVIS

■ Capt. Clay Robinson Davis, *N.Y.* A '39, Army Air Corps, Commanding Officer of a Fighter Squadron based at Santa Rosa, Calif., was killed in a crash over the bay July 7, 1943, when another plane out of control collided with the plane he was flying. He had formerly been commanding officer at Wendover Field, Utah.

## CAPT. JOHN DEE EWERS

■ Capt. John Dee Ewers, *Kan.* A '38, Army Engineers, died as the result of an automobile accident near Palermo, Sicily, July 31, 1943. He was a staff officer of an engineering unit that went overseas early in the summer of 1943.

## LT. TOM P. FORMAN

■ Lt. Thos. P. Forman, *Nev.* A '43, Army Ordnance, (HM), Tank, was killed in Sicily August 9, 1943. He had just designed and built a much needed weapon which is now being used by the Allied forces with good effect.



Maj. Gen. William P. Upshur, *Va.* Θ '02, *Va.* Σ '03, *Va.* O '04, Marine Corps Commanding Officer in Pacific Area, Killed in Plane Crash Near Sitka, Alaska, July 21, 1943.

## LT. CHAS. W. LOWNDES

■ Lt. Charles Wilkinson Lowndes, *Ga.* Φ '44, Army Air Corps, was killed in a plane crash while flying over Pantelleria, July 19, 1943. He had been awarded the Air Medal for "meritorious achievement while participating in aerial flight against the enemy," the morning of his death. He was buried in the military cemetery at Tripoli. Lt. Lowndes was the son of George S. Lowndes, *Ga.* Φ '04, and the brother of Capt. George W. Lowndes, *Ga.* Φ '34.

## CADET JAMES M. McCRORY, JR.

■ Aviation Cadet James M. McCrory, Jr., *Ala.* A-M '44, Army Air Corps, was killed October 7, 1943, at Williams Field, Chandler, Ariz., in the crash of the P-38 he was piloting.

## LT. RALPH D. O'RILEY

■ Lt. Ralph Dennis O'Riley, *Ind.* Γ '39, Army Air Corps, was killed in action in the Aleutians October 15, 1942, while making a raid on Jap shipping installations in Gertrude Bay, just off Kiska. He was first pilot on a B-26 bomber. The Distinguished Flying Cross and the Order of the Purple Heart for gallantry in action and devotion to country were conferred on him posthumously.



Capt. Wm. F. Grimes, USNR, *Calif.* Γ '17, Died in the Naval Hospital, Norco, Calif., June 26, 1943.

## 2ND LT. JOSEPH W. GORDON, JR.

■ 2nd Lt. Joseph W. Gordon, Jr., *Ohio* M '40, QMC, was killed during maneuvers at Camp Shelby, Miss., February 4, 1943, when the jeep in which he was riding overturned. He was a Past E.A. of Ohio Mu at Denison University.

## 2ND LT. WM. E. W. GERE

■ 2nd Lt. William E. W. Gere, *Mass.* Δ '43, Army Air Corps pilot, was killed in action August 10, 1943, when the plane in which he was flying his seventh bombing mission was shot down over the Mediterranean.

## 2ND LT. EDWIN B. UPDIKE

■ 2nd Lt. Edwin B. Updike, III, *Ala.* I '42, USMC, was killed in the wreck of the Pennsylvania Railroad's "Congressional Limited" at Philadelphia, Pa., September 6, 1943, while on a secret mission, carrying military papers from Washington to a northern destination.

## MAJ. GEN. WM. P. UPSHUR

■ Maj. Gen. William Peterkin Upshur, *Va.* Θ '02, *Va.* Σ '03, *Va.* O '04, senior major general of the United States Marine Corps and commanding officer for the Pacific area, was killed in a plane crash near Sitka, Alaska, July 21, 1943. Holder of the Congressional Medal of Honor for heroic service in Haiti in 1915, General Upshur had had an outstanding career in the Marine Corps which he entered as a second lieutenant in 1904.

## 1ST LT. OLIVER LAWSON WALKER

■ 1st Lt. Oliver Lawson Walker, *Pa.* Ω '42, Pilot, 18th Bombardment Squadron, Army Air Corps, was killed at Huron, S.D., February 17, 1943, while on a routine flight when his plane was wrecked by an explosion which tore off the left wing while at an elevation of 7,000 feet.

## LT. JOHN HENRY WERNER

■ Lt. John Henry Werner, *Wis.* A '39, Army Air Corps, was killed November 15, 1942, when he was forced to crash his plane into the Pacific after it had been disabled by Jap anti-aircraft fire. He was based on Port Moresby, New Guinea, and flew a Liberator bomber. The Order of the Purple Heart was conferred on him posthumously.

## MAJ. BUXTON L. LAYTON, JR.

■ Maj. Buxton L. ("Buck") Layton, Jr., *Ga.* Φ '36, is a prisoner of the Japs in Kobe sub camp of the Osaka camp and is in excellent health, according to a card from him received by his parents in Atlanta, Ga., August 7, 1943, which was the first news they had received from him since a cablegram in March, 1942, before the fall of the Philippines. He was called into active service in the Coast Artillery in January, 1941, and was training native troops in Panay when the Japs attacked Pearl Harbor.

## BRUCE THOMAS RINKER

■ Navigator Bruce Thomas Rinker, *N.D.* A '40, Army Air Corps, who went to England in June, 1943, was reported missing in action after a raid over France from which the B-17 bomber on which he was serving did not return. He is now known to be a prisoner of war at Stammlager Luft 3, Germany, according to a letter written to his parents, dated August 17, 1943.

■ Ensign Robert Vernon Bruce, Wis. A '42, USNR, has been reported missing in action since the sinking of the destroyer, *Rowan*, in Italian waters, September 11, 1943.

### 2ND LT. JOHN FARR CAMPBELL

■ 2nd Lt. John Farr Campbell, Pa. Σ-Φ '41, Army Air Corps, pilot of twin-engined bomber, was reported missing in action in North Africa, March 31, 1943.

### 1ST LT. MARSHALL M. SHEPHERD

■ 1st Lt. Marshall M. Shepherd, N.C. Z '40, Army Air Corps, pilot of a B-17 bomber, has been reported missing in action since October 8, 1943, the day when thirty bombers were lost in the raid over Bremen.

Lt. Jack E. Vandergrift, Okla. M '41, Army Air Corps, Reported Missing in Action in European Theater since May 17, 1943.

■ Lt. Jack E. Vandergrift, Okla. M '41, Army Air Corps, has been reported missing in action since May 17, 1943, following an operational flight from London, presumably over Germany. He had been stationed at a base near London since April 11.

### LT. WILLIAM W. BIRD

■ Lt. William W. Bird, Ga. Φ '42, pilot in the Army Air Corps, is a prisoner of the Japanese in Osaka, according to information received by his parents in August, 1943. He was stationed in Manila at the time of the invasion of the Philippines and later took part in the fighting on Bataan where he was captured.

### LT. WILLIAM P. CAREY

■ Lt. William Pershing Carey, Fla. T '41, reported missing in action after having been shot down while piloting a Flying Fortress over Germany, was reported July 30, 1943, to be a prisoner of the Germans.

### CAPT. JOHN C. ELLIS

■ Capt. John C. Ellis, Neb. A-Π '36, reported missing in action after the fall of Bataan and later as a prisoner of the Japs, has finally been able to communicate with his parents and wrote that he was uninjured and well.

### 2ND LT. EDWARD A. ERICKSON

■ 2nd Lt. Edward A. Erickson, Minn. A '40, Army Air Corps, who was reported missing in action after the fall of the Philippines, is now known to be a prisoner of war in Osaka Camp, Japan, according to word received by his parents, August 1, 1943.

### LT. KENNETH H. GODDARD

■ Lt. Kenneth H. Goddard, Vt. A-Σ-Π '40, is a prisoner of war in Germany, having been captured in the Tunisian campaign while he was serving as aide to an armored force commander.

### 2ND LT. JEROME B. SAVARIA

■ 2nd Lt. Jerome B. Savaria, Mass. Δ '40, is a prisoner of the Rumanian government, having been captured following the raid on the Ploesti oil fields in which the bomber of which he was co-pilot was shot down. He was first reported missing in action. In April he had a narrow escape when he was rescued at sea when the B-24 bomber of which he was co-pilot crashed 160 miles off Malta.

## Decorated for Gallantry



### Capt. Ralph A. Blakelock

■ Capt. Ralph A. Blakelock, *Ohio E '42*, has been awarded the Air Medal for "extraordinary achievement" for a mercy flight in which he took off in a thunderstorm to fly the drug, penicillin, from New York to Wilmington, N.C., for a Navy mother who lay dying at the Southport hospital after a Caesarean operation. It was too late to save the mother but her child lived. Capt. Blakelock had previously received the Air Medal for anti-submarine duty.

### Lt. Richard E. Bohannon

■ Lt. Richard E. Bohannon, *Va. K '41*, Army Air Corps, was awarded the Air Medal for his part in the transportation of troops for the invasion of Sicily. His citation said that

his skill, courage and devotion to duty contributed in a large degree to the successful dropping of paratroops and to establishing the value of a large glider force as a formidable weapon for future operations.

### 1st Lt. Richard M. Bracey

■ 1st Lt. Richard Monsel Bracey, *Ga. Φ '42*, Army Air Corps, was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for his participation in the Attu and Kiska operations. He pilots a P-38 Lightning. After nine months service in the Aleutians, he has been returned to Paine Field, Everett, Wash.

### 1st Lt. Benjamin C. Brewer

■ 1st Lt. Benjamin C. Brewer, *Ala. A-M '40*, has been awarded the Army Air Medal for meritorious conduct on operational flights during which exposure to enemy fire was problematical and expected while serving with the Thirtieth Air Force in the South Pacific.

### Capt. James B. Buchanan

■ Capt. James B. Buchanan, *Miss. Γ '37*, whose exploits in the South Pacific were described in the August and December, 1942, issues of *THE RECORD*, was back in Memphis, Tenn., in July, 1943, with three medals: Distinguished Flying Cross with oak leaf cluster, Silver Star with oak leaf cluster, and Air Medal, and enough stories of thrilling adventures to fill a book, gleaned from participation in sixty-one combat missions. Arriving at Pearl Harbor while the Jap attack was in full swing, he was later shot down in the Pacific and was adrift for five days during which time he learned that even raw sea gull can "taste pretty good, if you are hungry."

### 1st Lt. Robt. J. Connor

■ 1st Lt. Robert J. Connor, *Ohio Θ '42*, Army Air Corps, has been awarded the Air Medal with cluster for gallantry in the Tunisian campaign in which he completed twenty-two missions over enemy territory. He was promoted to first lieutenant May 1, 1943, and made an instructor.

### Major Frank W. DeLong

■ Major Frank W. DeLong, *Ga. B '40*, Army Air Corps, deputy commander of a bomber group, was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross, July 12, 1943, for meritorious service in the Middle Eastern War Theater. The presentation took place at Casper, Wyo.

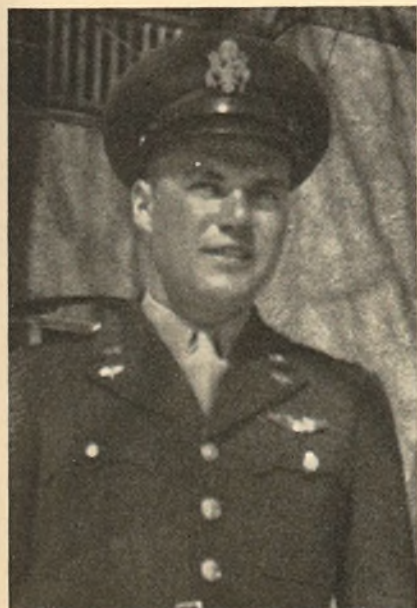
### Lt. James E. Cashman

■ Lt. James E. Cashman, *Wyo. A '32*, Medical Corps, USNR, of Rawlins, Wyo., was decorated with the Navy Silver Star at a ceremony held at the Naval Air Station, Alameda, Calif., June 28, 1943, for gallantry in action aboard the *USS Cushing* which was sunk by enemy action. His citation read, as follows:

For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity as medical officer aboard the USS *Cushing* during action against Japanese naval forces off Savo island on the night of November 12 and 13, 1942. While his ship was under heavy hostile bombardment, Lt. (jg) Cashman, although he himself was injured, bravely continued to administer to wounded personnel and assist in their evacuation. His heroic conduct, maintained with utter disregard for his own condition, was in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Naval service.

### Capt. William R. Gowdy

■ Capt. William R. Gowdy, Ohio E '41, Army Air Corps, has been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross. He was shot down while flying a bomber at Port Moresby. Pictures showing the crash of the plane and the subsequent rescue of the crew have been used in Army film which has been given wide distribution. The picture shows the members of the crew parachuting through the air, as the plane crashed below them.

### Ensign Joseph P. Johnson

■ For military merit, the Purple Heart decoration was awarded posthumously to Ensign Joseph P. Johnson, Colo. Z '27, who was killed in a dive bomber in line of duty in the South Pacific, March 10, 1942. His mother received the medal early in July, 1943.

### Lt. Ralph Meldrim Jones

■ Lt. Ralph Meldrim Jones, USNR, Ga. Φ '36, was awarded the Navy Cross by President Roosevelt in August, 1943, for "extraordinary heroism" while acting as pilot of a scouting squadron during the occupation of French Morocco in November, 1942.

### Capt. Jack W. Kaboth

■ Capt. Jack W. Kaboth, Okla. M '42, has been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross with Oak Leaf Cluster, the Army Air Medal with three Oak Leaf Clusters and the Purple Heart for his part in the North African and Sicilian campaigns and in raids over Italy and Rumania. He has 317 flying hours to his credit and has taken part in thirty-nine air raids, including the raid on the Ploesti oil fields of Rumania.

### Lt. Edmond L. Kimble, Jr.

■ Lt. Edmond L. Kimble, Jr., La. T-T '39, was awarded the Army Silver Star for gallantry in action in Sicily, his citation reading:

"Lt. Kimble captured twelve German prisoners and a truckful of enemy equipment. By exposing himself and drawing enemy fire and by his covering fire, Lt. Kimble enabled his section to withdraw safely, returning later with reinforcements to drive the enemy from their positions. The courage, initiative, devotion to duty, and disregard of personal safety displayed by Lt. Kimble in the accomplishment of these reconnaissance missions are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service."

### 2nd Lt. Orville A. Kirtland

■ Official award of the Order of the Purple Heart for "military merit and for wounds received in action has been made posthumously to 2nd Lt. Orville A. Kirtland, Wash. B '41, who lost his life in air combat in the South Pacific, July 11, 1942. The Purple Heart certificate has been received by his parents along with letters of high praise from Secretary of War Stimson, Gen. George C. Marshall, Chief of Staff, and Maj. Gen. Barney M. Giles, Air Chief.

### Capt. Jack A. Knight

■ Capt. Jack A. Knight, Pa. Θ '40, Army Tank Corps, has been awarded the Military Cross by the British Government for heroism during the Tunisian campaign in evacuating twenty wounded British soldiers in his jeep under severe fire, after he had placed his tanks in position. He had led his tanks forward and had walked through an enemy mine field to mark a track for his tanks.

### Capt. Dale M. Leslie

■ Capt. Dale M. Leslie, Fla. T '40, Marine Corps, has been awarded the Navy Cross for extraordinary heroism as a fighter pilot in assisting the evacuation of Marines surrounded by Japs during the Guadalcanal campaign. Capt. Leslie, then a second lieutenant, successfully directed the rescue boats to the trapped Marines and continually strafed the hostile gun emplacements, drawing their fire away from the boats.

### Lt. Col. Wm. R. Lovelace

■ Lt. Col. William Randolph Lovelace, Mo. B '32, Army Medical Corps, whose record parachute jump of 40,200 feet was described in the August issue of THE RECORD, has been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross. The presentation was made personally in Washington, D.C., by General Henry H. Arnold, Commanding general of the Army Air Forces.

### Capt. Charles B. Gholson

■ Capt. Charles B. Gholson, Ariz. A '31, Army Engineers, has been awarded the Legion of Merit decoration for exceptionally meritorious conduct in the performance of outstanding services in the North African theater of operations from September, 1942, to July, 1943. He organized the first American pipe line engineer company formed in the United Kingdom and, overcoming great obstacles, secured equipment for its training and operation. His company debarked at an Algerian port four days after the initial occupation and he immediately assumed control of petroleum distribution. As the campaign progressed, he assumed the task of pipe line and storage construction for most of North Africa. Through his untiring efforts, excellent judgment and leadership, the pipelines were used to provide an ample supply of gasoline at critical points during the final phase of the North African campaign.

### Col. Albert S. Dabney

■ Col. Albert S. Dabney, Ky. E '01, Army Medical Corps, has been awarded the Legion of Merit for exceptionally meritorious conduct in the performance of outstanding service. He was formerly director of the Medical Corps equipment laboratory and developed many new items of equipment. Since January 1, 1942, he has been assistant commandant of the Medical Field Service School with immediate charge of training Medical Corps officers.

### 1st Lt. Robert J. Lund

■ For gallantry in action, the Silver Star has been conferred posthumously on 1st Lt. Robert J. Lund, Field Artillery, Minn. A '40, who was killed in North Africa, March 29, 1943. His citation reads, as follows:

Lt. Lund was performing his duties of artillery forward observer and at all times accompanied the most advanced elements of the infantry. His fearless conduct throughout the action and his great skill in adjusting the fire of his battery were a source of inspiration to the infantry whom he supported. When his observation post came under heavy artillery and mortar fire, Lt. Lund stayed at his post and his devotion to duty and willingness to give his life in order to insure success of the assault were highly meritorious and a credit to the armed forces of the United States.



## Maj. Gen. Robert S. Beightler

■ Maj. Gen. Robert S. Beightler, *Ohio* Θ '13, has been awarded the Distinguished Service Medal for outstanding leadership from July 28 to August 8, 1943, in commanding the Thirty-Seventh Division in the capture of the vital base at Munda on New Georgia Island in the Solomons, then held by the Japs. His citation read:

Gen. Beightler's repeated presence in the forward elements of his division during combat was largely responsible for the high morale of his command and its forward drive over difficult terrain. Under his inspiring leadership, the division's assigned objective was captured in a minimum of time.

## Lt. John Bell

■ Lt. John Bell, *N.H.* A '35, has been awarded the Navy Cross for extraordinary heroism and distinguished service in action" while in charge of a craft at Casablanca, preceding the Allied invasion of North Africa in November, 1943.

## 2nd Lt. Elliott E. Dent, Jr.

■ 2nd Lt. Elliott E. Dent, Jr. *Ala.* M '45, Army Air Corps, has been awarded the Air Medal for meritorious achievement during participation in twenty-five operational flights in the South Pacific in which strafing and bombing attacks were made from dangerously low altitudes, destroying and damaging enemy installations and equipment.

# Meet in South Pacific

**M**Y ARTICLE on the Fraternity in the South Pacific for the May issue of *THE RECORD* had no more than passed through the censor's hands and into the mail when I began to meet members of Sigma Alpha Epsilon by the score!

That was last March. Soon after I had been placed ashore in February, the Armed Forces established a club in a hotel where officers swarmed during their few leisure hours. There I began to find many of the ΣAEs that I had mentioned in my last article as being aboard ships in the South Pacific. Shortly after the old French hotel opened its doors in American style I ran into Major Rene Banks, *Ohio* Δ '17, who was then a Captain and who, many members will remember, headed the Levere Memorial Foundation campaign in the early stage of World War II.

After that, on many jeep rides around the island and in the Major's little cottage on the bay, we discussed ΣAE and the members that we had met since our last get-together. One after another, we ΣAEs managed to find each other. Often members would learn of my whereabouts and come to my hut in "Quonset Village."

With the introduction of war correspondents into our officers' village last June, I was moved into another hut where I found as one of my hutmates, Lt. (jg) John A. Houston, *Calif.* A '36, whom everyone referred to as "Sam Houston."

After exactly one year to the day, July 31st, I suddenly received orders to leave the quaint island and its French atmosphere to return to my original base for duty. It was rather difficult to give up my little newspaper, which had developed into a daily of 500 copies. On one of my last nights on the press I found what I thought a stranger sitting at my desk.

## 1st Lt. James L. Nollkamper

■ 1st Lt. James Louis Nollkamper, *S.D.* Σ '40, Army Air Corps, has been awarded the Army Air Medal for courageous service and meritorious achievement while participating in aerial flights in the Southwest Pacific Area from May 2 to May 26, 1943. The award was made June 27, 1943.

## Lt. James W. Dowlin

■ Lt. James W. Dowlin, *Ohio* E '43, has been awarded the Army Air Medal with oak leaf clusters and the Distinguished Flying Cross for successful bombing operations during the North African, Sicilian and Italian campaigns. He was at home in Cincinnati on leave in October.

## Capt. Alexander Guerry, Jr.

■ Capt. Alexander Guerry, Jr., *Tenn.* Ω '39, has been cited for valorous service with the Army Air Corps in New Britain.

## Lt. Matt W. Mosby, Jr.

■ Profusely decorated for his performance in seventy-six flying missions over Tunisia, Dieppe, Pantelleria and Sicily, Lt. Matt W. Mosby, Jr., *Miss.* Γ '42, Army Air Corps, returned to his home in Indianola, Miss., early in October wearing the Distinguished Flying Cross with seven oak leaf clusters, the Air Medal, the American Defense Service medal, and the European-African Middle Eastern

Theater medal. He had many narrow escapes, including a crash landing in a Spitfire which had been riddled by enemy fire. He managed to fly the plane away from enemy territory and was befriended by an Arab chief in whose tent he spent the night.

## Capt. Joseph W. Voellmeck

■ Capt. Joseph W. Voellmeck, *Wash.* A '38, was one of fifty-seven members of the Thirtieth Air Force of the Army Air Corps to be awarded the Air Medal with oak leaf clusters for the Shortland Harbor bombing mission in the South Pacific, January 18, 1943. Capt. Voellmeck is a co-pilot.

## 1st Lt. Kenneth L. Steward

■ 1st Lt. Kenneth L. Steward, *La.* E '40, who died from wounds in a hospital camp near Bari, Italy, April 5, 1943, has been decorated posthumously with the Silver Star and Order of the Purple Heart, the presentation having been made to his widow at Camp Sibert, Ala., July 17, 1943.

## Lt. Col. Ernest C. Young

■ Taking part in the attack which reduced Pantelleria, Lt. Col. Ernest C. Young, *Okla.* M '38, had a field day in which he used a new skip-bombing technique. Once he skipped a bomb right through the door of an underground hangar. On another occasion, he smashed a heavy gun casement, letting his bomb go fifty feet from the target. He has been awarded the Air Medal, the Silver Star and the Distinguished Flying Cross for his outstanding work in North Africa.

few days in Sydney when Lt. Louis Chamberlain, *Ill.* Ψ-Ω '40, walked up to me in the Australia Hotel, the meeting place of the Southwest Pacific. Lou, who had shown visitors through the Levere Memorial Temple on Sunday afternoons, told me about his experiences in New Guinea, and I was able to give him information on some of his Northwestern friends.

My leave was over entirely too soon, and on August 20th I found myself high above the Tasman Sea. I recall that I was glad to be in a huge flying boat rather than pitching and rolling in that notoriously rough sea.

At the time of this writing, September 26th, I am back at my original base in the South Pacific. When I arrived here in August several of the hotel staff remembered my six weeks' stay of a year ago. As a result I was given a splendid front room with six windows; ah yes, a room with a view—to my right, a college campus, and to my left, the bay.

Soon after returning here I found a copy of a letter to Lauren Foreman, ESR, from Lt. Col. Frank Forsythe, *Ohio* Δ '16, Headquarters 37th Infantry Division. Colonel Forsythe indicated that from my article in the May issue of *THE RECORD* I had experienced difficulty in meeting ΣAEs in the South Pacific, and even he had been located here at the same time I was a year ago! I immediately wrote to Brother Forsythe and informed him that I had found it hard to contact members during my first few weeks in the South Pacific, but after seventeen months in the area, there was no strain at all. Brother Forsythe suggested that perhaps I had not proceeded far enough West. Maybe the Navy will arrange "Go West, Young Man, Go West," for me!

He turned out to be Lieut. Theodore H. Little, *W.C.* P '36, assistant attorney general of the State of Washington, who had learned where I was located. I recalled considerable correspondence with him during my days at the National office. It seemed strange that I had to come to the South Pacific to meet him. Lieutenant Little was amused that I remembered his unique handwriting, and I remarked: "Who could forget it?"

As I flew away in a Marine plane on the morning of August 6th, I had pleasant reflections of a year of "roughing it" more or less. Due to conditions and the informality of service, khaki trousers and shirts without ties were the uniform of the day on that island.

Within a few hours I found myself among officers in blues and white shirts again in Sydney, Australia, the land of the koala bear which I didn't see! It wasn't long until I had run into William J. Milliken, *Calif.* B '34, Deputy Archon of Province Kappa. He "discovered" me first as I was standing in line to obtain ration coupons in Sydney. I remarked to Brother Milliken how Province Kappa had spread!

Two weeks' furlough (Army term, but the Navy calls it "leave") in New South Wales was certainly welcomed after six months aboard ship and six months of shore duty. My real surprise came after a



# Lieutenant General Yount

**N**AMED as commanding general of the Army Air Forces Training Command (which replaced and combined the functions of the Technical Training Command and the Flying Training Command) in July, 1943, Major General Barton K. Yount, Ohio Θ '06, was nominated for promotion to the rank of lieutenant general by President Roosevelt, September 28, and the nomination was confirmed by the Senate, October 7.

After attending Ohio State University where he was initiated into Sigma Alpha Epsilon, Lt. Gen. Yount was appointed to the U. S. Military Academy from which he was graduated and commissioned as a second lieutenant of infantry, June 14, 1907. He served in the infantry until August, 1917, when he was transferred to the Signal Corps for duty with the Aviation Section. He was transferred to the Air Service, August 11, 1920, and has grown up with aviation in the Army, having held many important commands.

In October, 1940, he was assigned to command the Panama Canal Department Air Force and in November, 1940, was placed in command of the Southeast Air

District with headquarters in Tampa, Fla. In July, 1911, he was assigned to command the West Coast Air Corps Training Center, Moffett Field, Calif., and in January, 1942, he was ordered to Washington, D.C., for duty in the office of the Chief of the Air Corps. In March, 1942, he was made commanding general of the Army Air Forces Flying Training Command, Fort Worth, Tex.

During World War I, Gen. Yount attained the temporary rank of lieutenant colonel but reverted to his permanent rank of captain, June 30, 1920, being promoted to major the following day. He was promoted to lieutenant colonel February 28, 1931; to colonel April 1, 1936; to brigadier general September 12, 1936; and to major general October 1, 1940. Among other decorations, he is a chevalier of the French Legion of Honor.

Second ΣAE to be named as lieutenant general, he follows in this rank Lt. Gen. Stanley H. Ford, Retired, Ohio Θ '98, Past Honorary Eminent Supreme Archon, it being an interesting coincidence that they are from the same chapter.

## Brig. Gen. McSherry

**B**RIG. GEN. Frank J. McSherry, *Ariz.* A '17, holds an important command in the North African and Italian theater in connection with the administration of occupied countries. He entered the Army as a second lieutenant of Coast Artillery in the Reserve Corps in August, 1917. He served in France with the 62nd Artillery and was transferred to General Headquarters of the A.E.F. at Chaumont. After returning to the United States, he held many important posts and his promotion has been rapid. He was made a colonel in December, 1941, and promoted to brigadier general in February, 1942.

## Dived Faster than Sound

**A**VIATION history was made by Lt. Col. Cass S. Hough, *Mich.* I-B '25, technical director of the Eighth Fighter Command of the U. S. Army, who shattered all world records when he succeeded in diving a P-38 Lightning plane from a height of 43,000 feet, and attained a speed of 780 miles per hour, faster than the speed of sound.

This feat was accomplished in England by Col. Hough in September, 1942, and in February, 1943, he went up to 39,000 feet for a dive in a P-47 Thunderbolt. In both jumps, he leveled off at 18,000 feet, after vertical drops of approximately five miles. Both dives were taken voluntarily in quest of scientific information to aid fighter pilots.

Col. Hough, former alumnus adviser of the University of Michigan chapter, in peace-time is an air rifle manufacturer at Plymouth, Mich. News of his remarkable performances was not given out until August 2, 1943, when he was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for "special attainment in independent flight research."

# Amazing South Pacific Saga

**O**F ALL THE remarkable stories of adventure and of heroism on the part of American soldiers and sailors fighting in the waters and islands of the South Pacific, none takes precedence over that of Lt. (jg) Hugh Barr Miller, *Ala.* M '32, USNR, who for forty-three days after the sinking of the destroyer, *Strong*, July 4, 1943, fought the elements and the Japs and conquered both.

One of the last men to leave the *Strong*, Lt. Miller was injured when he went over the side. With a party of officers and men, several of whom died from injuries, he drifted for four days in Kula gulf and with five survivors landed on a small island off Arundel on which there was no water and only a few coconuts. After resting two days, they crossed to the mainland of Arundel where two of the party died.

Due to his injuries, Lt. Miller felt that it would lessen the chances of the three remaining enlisted men if they tried to care for him and at the same time dodge Jap patrols. So on August 15th he ordered them to take all the food and leave. From that time he was on his own and lived only on coconuts until he was able to salvage some Jap food, grenades and equipment from a barge which had been shot up by an American boat.

Taking this equipment betrayed his presence and a Jap patrol of five men was sent to look for him but he caught them in a bunch and killed all five of them with one of their own grenades. On three nights between August 9 and 15 he heaved grenades into Jap machine gun positions and knew he got some Japs each time but could not count the dead as the Japs carried them away.

In the meantime, Lt. Miller had been

strafed and slightly wounded by a Jap zero and had attracted the attention of two American planes, one of which dropped him a package of food and some iodine which he thinks saved his life. On August 16th, he was rescued by an American Marine plane, although there were Jap planes in the air at the time, and flown to Munda where he was placed in a hospital.

While at the University of Alabama, Lt. Miller won fame as a football player with the "Crimson Tide." He credits his ability to live in the jungle to his football training, to the fact that he had loved hunting all his life and had always been able to find his way home.

Lt. Miller has been decorated with the Navy Cross and the Purple Heart which were presented to him personally in a South Pacific hospital by Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt.

### Gen. Travis Led Attack

■ A large force of Flying Fortresses that bombed the Nazi "West Wall" early in October was led by Brig. Gen. Robert F. Travis, *Ga.* B '27, who piloted "Miss America." The mission was said to have been exceptionally well executed, every detail having been handled like a military drill.

### Coast Guard Chaplain

■ Rev. Walter H. Griswold, *Ill.* Δ '35, was commissioned as chaplain in the USNR with the rank of lieutenant, junior grade, at the Navy's chaplain school at William and Mary College in June and has been assigned as chaplain for the Coast Guard of the Ninth Naval District with headquarters at Cleveland, Ohio. His district covers the St. Lawrence river and all the Great Lakes except Lake Michigan.



# The Original "Flip Corkin"

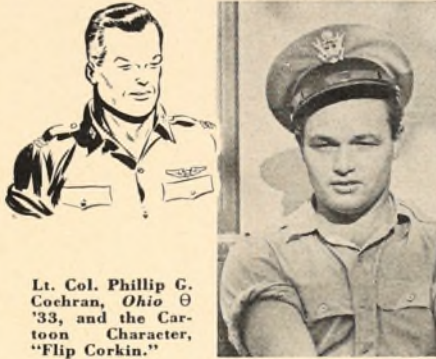

AS A RESULT of his valuable contributions toward the war effort, Lt. Col. Phillip G. Cochran, Ohio Θ '33, may well be ranked among the great American heroes of World War II. Numerous newspaper and magazine articles from coast to coast including an extensive article in the August 9, 1943 issue of *Life* have extolled his daring exploits in the North African theater of war. Thus far he has received eleven citations and five medals for his outstanding service. He has been awarded the Silver Star, the Soldier's Medal, the Distinguished Flying Cross with two oak leaf clusters, the Air Medal with three oak leaf clusters, and the Croix de Guerre with its star and palm.

But that is only one phase of a two sided life, for in fiction Cochran again plays the hero's role under the name of "Flip Corkin," who is found in the comic strip of *Terry and the Pirates*. This likeness between Cochran and Corkin was not by mere chance. Milton Caniff, the artist of *Terry and the Pirates* was actually an old friend of Cochran's and that is why he is able to create such a striking parallel between the two.

After graduating from Ohio State in 1935, Cochran applied for admission into the Army Air Corps and has been in the service ever since then. So flying might be said to be his real occupation. By the

fall of 1941 Cochran had become a first lieutenant in charge of an operational training airfield near Groton, Conn. Here Cochran's pilots were known as the "Fighting Cork Squadron." Instead of following conventional textbook tactics, Cochran believed that the best way for his men to learn to fly and fight was to practice flying constantly so that all reactions would be instinctive.

Soon after the United States entered the present conflict his particular squadron was assigned to help out on the Tunisian front. However, he was ordered to remain in the States as an instructor because of his talent for teaching an interceptor system that he had developed himself. Anxious to see action, Cochran was finally assigned to Africa in the fall of 1942 with the command of a group of thirty pilots, who were to be used as replacements for pilots killed in action. But since his new outfit was not permitted to go to the front, he decided to take the initiative and head east where he finally landed at

an airport in Western Tunisia. As he was the ranking officer on the field, he called the pilots together and informed them that he was now in charge. He then showed amazing ability in being able to see what needed to be done and in what way it should be carried out successfully. Despite inferior planes and equipment it was here that Cochran became so well known for this ingenuity in guerrilla type of warfare from the air.

After two full months of guerrilla warfare during which he flew on sixty-one different missions, Cochran was ordered back to Casablanca to teach what he had learned to younger pilots. After this he returned to the States where he was overwhelmed by reporters, photographers and autograph seekers. During his leave he showed his willingness to do more than his part in building up morale on the home front by taking part in bond drives, pep rallies at war plants and war dinners.

His stories about the air raids on London which have been printed in book form first attracted general attention to him but when he went to North Africa and began sending stories home which



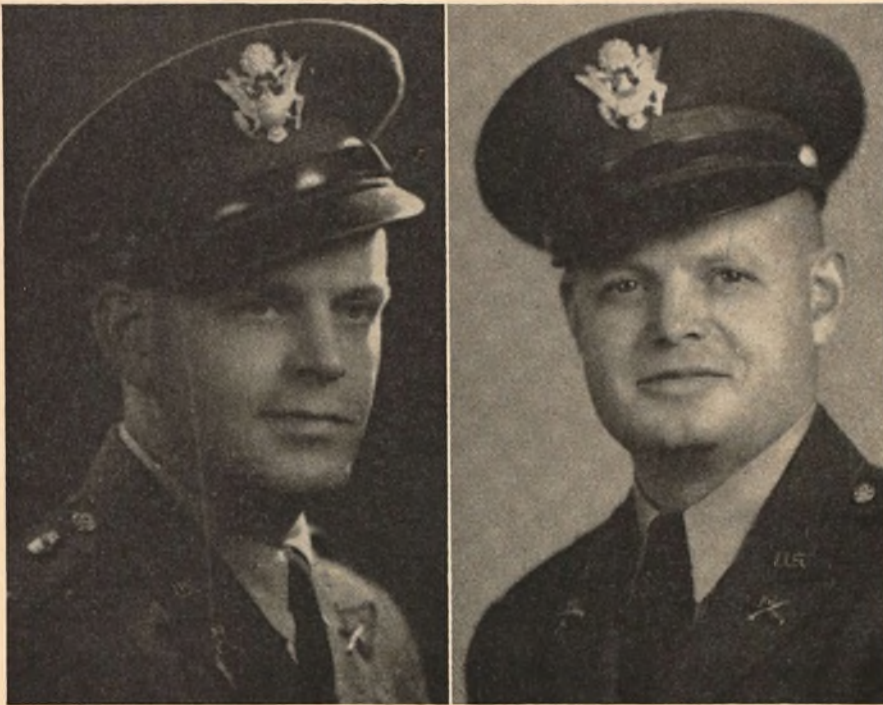

# Initiation in South Pacific

**F**IRST man to be inducted into Sigma Alpha Epsilon at a ceremony held outside the United States during World War II was Capt. Thorkel Myron Haaland, Wash. B '43, a former pledge of the Washington State chapter, whose initiation by his brother, Major Elmer Haaland, Wash. B '32, was authorized by the Supreme Council.

The initiation took place May 9, 1943,

on an island in the South Pacific, the exact location of which can not yet be told, due to censorship regulations, and was conducted by Major Haaland without any help, as other ΣAEs who had been expected to take part had been ordered to other locations. Major Haaland recited the ritual from memory, using a copy of THE RECORD for explanation of the coat of arms and the badge. He was in the

hospital with malaria at the time but talked the ward surgeon into letting him out for this event, as he was to be evacuated the following day. Writing from a West Coast hospital to which he had been transferred, Major Haaland described the initiation, as follows:

"We can tell you that the initiation took place in a deserted native village with good overhead coverage: i.e., palm, mangrove and unidentified trees. A swamp hemmed in one side and the surf roared on the other. Civilization had, of course, added its touch of barbed wire, fox holes, pill boxes and telephones. Near the entrance to the shelter stood a white wooden cross, marking the grave of a young native girl, killed by the Japs earlier in the campaign. Sentries insured secrecy."

Following the initiation ceremony which was held on a Sunday afternoon, the event was celebrated with a roast pig dinner in true native style.

It is known that both Haaland brothers have been in almost continuous combat in the South Pacific area. Captain Haaland, who has recently been promoted from first lieutenant, was named by his regimental commander as having the best cannon company in the entire area. Major Haaland, who is still ill, has recently been returned to the United States for further treatment.

The initiation of Thorkel culminates several years of longing on the part of each of the brothers. They have always been closer to each other than most brothers, and now with the bonds of ΣAE added to their blood relationship, they are truly two loyal and devoted brothers.

## A War-Time Initiation

**A**S SOON as I was sent to Camp Wolters, Tex., and shifted to the third platoon of Company C, 52nd battalion, I was thrown into contact with Gillon Niceley, a Kentucky lad who bunked next to me. Beightler, Ohio Θ '13, refused to rest, so a high officer detailed an aide to Gen. Beightler's dugout with orders to see that he stopped worrying and slept. Next morning the aide, his eyes looking holes burnt in a blanket, reported to his chief: "Sir, Gen. Beightler kept me awake all night."

## "Jack the Ripper" Pilot

■ Pilot of the famous flying fortress, "Jack the Ripper," Capt. William J. Crumm, Va. O '42, received a lot of newspaper publicity when he and his crew toured the United States, visiting war production plants in the spring of 1943. "Jack the Ripper," named for a famous English murderer, lived up to his reputation in handing out death and destruction to the Nazis on eleven deep penetration bombing missions over Europe, bringing down six Focke-Wulf's and one ME-109 fighter, in addition to doing incalculable damage to ground installations.

## Lieut. Col. Daugherty

■ Lt. Col. James F. Daugherty, Ark. A-T '32, director of pre-flight training and classification for the Army Air Forces Central Flying Training Command, was promoted from the rank of major in September, 1943, according to announcement from headquarters of the Command at Randolph Field, Tex.

# Life in the United States Navy

By Robert H. Wilson,

A SUPER-JOINT letter intended primarily for the many friends to whom I have meant to write but fairly neglected so far (and don't worry about multiplicity—carbon copies have flourished in our family for years):

Our service life is quite civilian/military (best features of both) right now: We put in a month at Great Lakes (Chicago suburb training station), were transferred to Philadelphia Navy Yard for several weeks, and for another month have been assigned to the activity which recruits cadets for the Navy: (best address, incidentally) Robert H. Wilson, Y2c, Naval Aviation Cadet Selection Board, 12th floor, Widener Building, South Penn Square, Philadelphia, Pa.

Both at GL and PNY we were "boarded and roomed" right on the station, but we now are on what is termed a subsistence basis, meaning that the Government allots us a predeterminedly adequate amount of money per diem then we shift for ourselves as to food and shelter. Our particular draft (detail shipped to this particular address and activity) of 17 men now is in the Army & Navy branch of the YMCA, in various hotels, and in apartments; and our eating and entertainment habits vary correspondingly. For your information, the subsistence has proven quite fair. Of course, for that matter, our adopting uncle (USA) has taken parrifol good care of us anyway, everything considered. E.g., I wouldn't have thought as a civilian of owning clothing of the same quality now furnished us "on the house" (\$120!!) and, all in all, I have long since concluded that here is often a case of a fellow's accidentally getting into a *far* better position than the one he left.

Our work here—about which we are mildly cautioned not to talk too much (which is impossible—we are too dumb about it yet)—is clerical in one form or another. At first I copied teeth: Made longhand copies in red ink of the Medical Department's findings on current applicants for cadet (flying) classification. Then bummed around the reception room, announcing John Smith to Lieutenant (jg) Doe. Then was put on writing anything for anybody ("Correspondence Yeoman"). Then borrowed by the section that gets John Smith's innumerable application papers in order. And now, effective yesterday (5/12/42) afternoon, I am finally on

This interesting description of Life in the Navy, as seen by a man recently transferred from civilian pursuits was given in a mimeographed letter sent out to numerous friends but not intended for publication. Mr. Wilson will be remembered pleasantly by the many ΣAEs who visited the Levere Memorial Temple from July 1, 1935, to September 1, 1937, when he served as custodian of the building and Assistant to the E.S.R. He resigned to take another year's work at the University of Illinois since which he has been connected with the construction division of the Pullman Company until he enlisted in the Navy. The letter was written on May 13, 1942.

something halfway definite—yeoman in charge of all mimeographing, both cutting and running (which former is about as varied and interesting as anything around the activity anyway). *Of course*, !, so far as we know we may be shipped out to Iceland tomorrow, or we may still be here two (2) years from now, but it soon gets so a person doesn't care one way or the other, strange as that may sound.

The main breaks from civilian employment are that we dress in Navy "gear" (dress jumper, trousers pressed inside out laterally, mourning neckerchief, and white hat), and employ Navy terminology considerably. E.g., "deck" versus floor, "bulkhead" for wall and "overhead" for ceiling, "head" for washroom, use of the 3rd person, "gear" for all man-

ner of possessions, "stow" for put away and secure (a command or statement) for stop work, and actually "ashore" or "aboard" as regards being on deck at a given moment. It is queer at first, but we shall do it of necessity later—why not now?

This is a strange, new world admittedly—hospitality from people we never met before and who wouldn't think of addressing us were we civilians; formality in the best Navy tradition (including dress); "skuttlebutt" (rumor (or drinking fountain)) of air raids, and meeting dozens of English Navy boys and men daily (some very likeable); work possible at any hour of day or night (have the "duty"—watch in our office—tonight, for example, 5:00 to 12:00 midnight, hence this letter at last) but in general much kinder than civilian work; visiting friends in Washington one week-end and riding a bicycle through Central Park (NYC) the next.

And meeting fraternity brothers most often—we recruit a lot of them, then others appear in my ken by accident—one in a Philly chain restaurant, another on top of the beautiful RCA building, and a bunch of them just this noon (went to the Philadelphia alumni association's monthly luncheon today, possible for the first time—turned out to be held in the classy-enough-to-have-scared-me-away-before restaurant just next door!)

Oh yes, above all else we tell time differently (but much less misunderstandably once a person gets on to it): 24-hour day, not 12-hour. So 1:00 p.m. becomes 1300, etc. Right this minute the exact time/day/date is 2348 Wednesday 13 May 1942. Not bad? Also, we salute not only Navy officers but also commissioned men in the Army and the Marine Corps . . . and enjoy this practice of trading respects and respect, which is exactly what it is. . . . All in all, and in conclusion, *this Navy is a mighty fine outfit*, and I am surely lucky to have stumbled into it.

## Col. Walter D. Dabney

Col. Walter D. Dabney, Va. # EDITORIALS

## Russell Praised

UNITED STATES SENATOR Richard B. Russell, Jr., Ga. B '18, of Georgia, who was chairman of the committee of five senators who made a round-the-world tour of the battle fronts on which the United States is engaged in war, has been highly praised for the statesmanlike attitude he took in regard to the impressions he received.

Though refusing to be drawn into any criticism of other Allied nations, he spoke out boldly for the protection of American interests, criticizing the failure of this country to obtain full credit abroad—particularly in Russia and Turkey—for its lend-lease shipments.

He said that many of our allies and some of our late enemies have too high expectations of the amount of relief and rehabilitation the United States will be able to supply. His utterances were widely quoted and approved by newspapers of all shades of political opinion.

## War Project for Alumni

FROM Ralph L. Phelps, Calif. B '02, Past Archon of Province Kappa, comes the timely suggestion that alumni who live in the vicinity of Army and Navy hospitals can perform a patriotic and fraternal service by visiting members of Sigma Alpha Epsilon who are being treated in these hospitals, particularly convalescents who need company and are a long way from their families and friends.

The need for such service was brought to the attention of Mr. Phelps when he and Arthur L. D. Warner, Mass. Γ '07, went to the Naval Hospital at Oak Knoll, Berkeley, Calif., to visit Lt. Philip T. Libbey, Mass. B-T '22, USNR, of Los Angeles who was temporarily hospitalized there.

Through Lt. Libbey, they met a young naval aviator from New York, a member of another fraternity, who had been shot down by the Japs on Guadalcanal and wounded after he had bailed out, as the result of which he had lost a leg. He was slowly recovering but had no friends in the vicinity, other than Lt. Libbey. Mr. Phelps brought this case to the attention of some of his friends who are members of the wounded aviator's fraternity so that they might call on him.

In writing of this experience to the Editor of THE RECORD, Mr. Phelps said:

This experience has suggested this thought: why wouldn't it be a very helpful service to some of our own brothers who may be temporarily hospitalized in the many Army and Navy hospitals in and near cities in which older ΣAE alumni live, if the local Alumni Associations would appoint committees to contact the administrative officers of these hospitals to find out whether there are any ΣAEs on their rosters and to call on any of these fine men, thus located, Saturdays, Sunday, or evenings when they can be seen? Such visits from their fraternity brothers will buck them up spiritually while they are recuperating and dispel a lot of loneliness.

This suggestion from Mr. Phelps is passed along to the Alumni Associations in the hope that those located near to Army and Navy hospitals will adopt it.

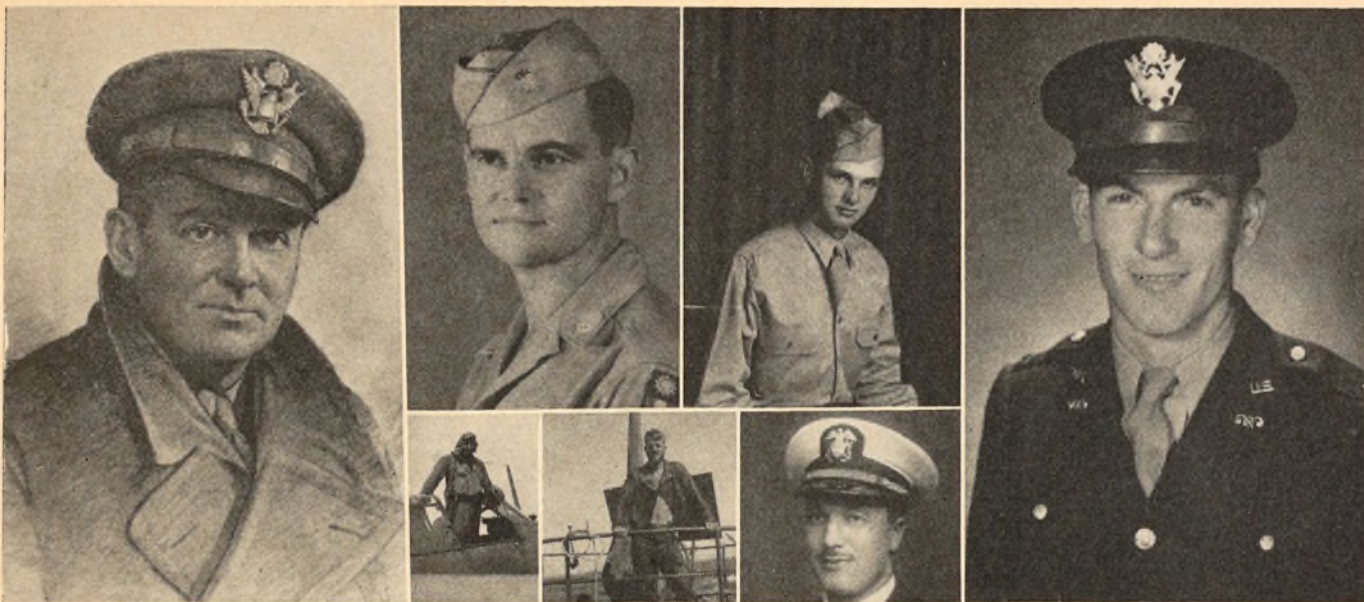

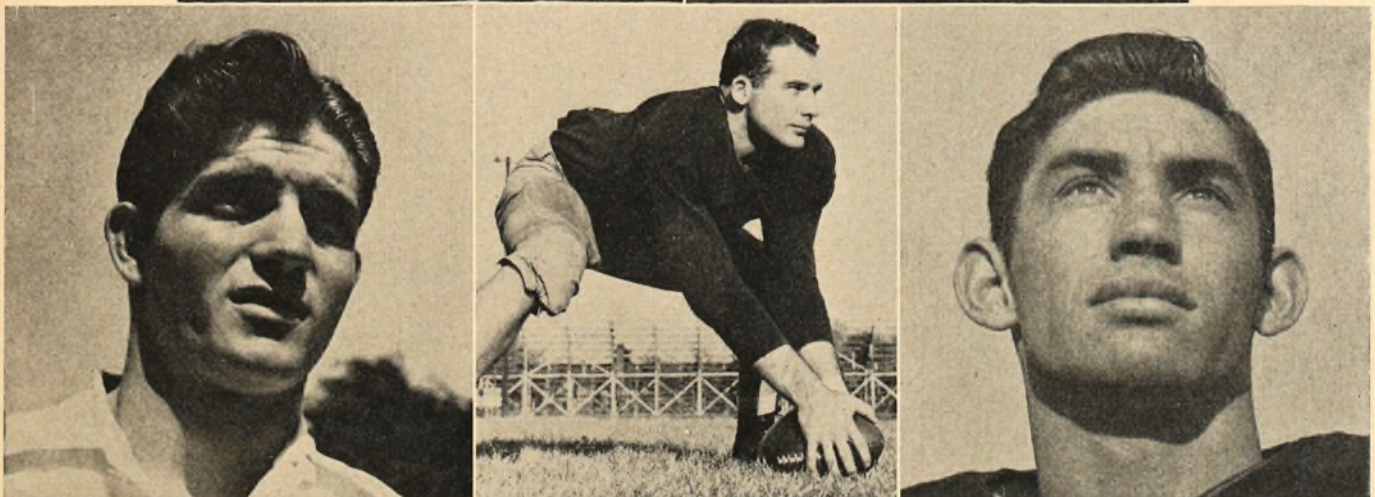
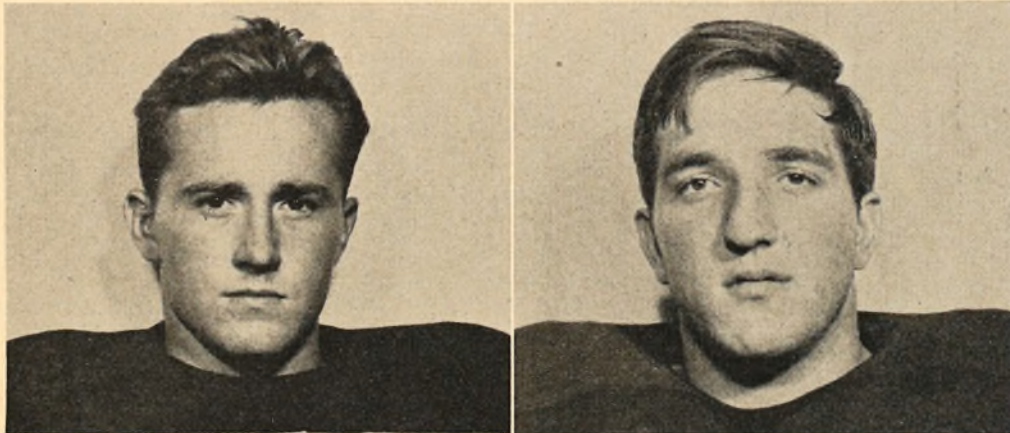

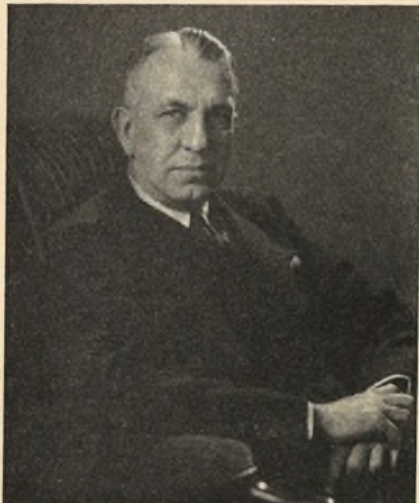
# DOWN CHAPTER WAY

## All-Star Football Game

■ Sigma Alpha Epsilon was represented by two well known 'Big Nine' football players in the All Star Game sponsored by The Chicago Tribune Charities, Ed (Buckets) Hirsch, Ill.  $\Psi$ - $\Sigma$  '44 and Marlin (Pat) Harder, Wis. A '44. Ed Hirsch, husky fullback, from Northwestern Univ. averaged 43 yards gain for each Western conference game he participated in last year. 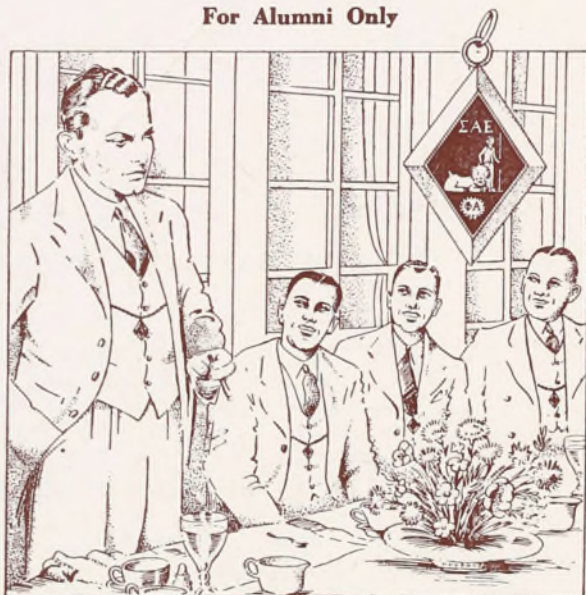

There shall be an Advisory Council of the Levere Memorial Foundation consisting of five (5) members in good standing of the Chapter National of the Sigma Alpha Epsilon Fraternity, residing within a radius of five hundred (500) miles of the Levere Memorial Temple in Evanston, Illinois, none of whom shall be a member of the Board of Trustees of the Levere Memorial Foundation, who shall be selected by reason of their experience and knowledge with respect to the investment of trust funds.

The Advisory Council shall assist the Trustees of The Levere Memorial Foundation in the selection of investments for the Levere Memorial Temple Sustaining Fund, the Student Loan Fund, and any Special Trust Funds of which the Trustees of The Levere Memorial Foundation shall be Trustees. No investment of funds, or sale or other disposition of assets of any of said trust funds, shall be made by the Trustees without the written approval of four-fifths (4/5) of the members of the Advisory Council.
