They Smash Japs in South Pacific

Foss Is Leading Aerial Ace

JOP-SCORING allied aerial ace among combat flyers in World War II, Capt. Joseph J. Foss, S.D. Σ '40, US Marine Corps, is officially credited with having shot down twenty-six Jap planes, which figure equals the World War I record of Capt. Eddie Rickenbacker. Twenty-three of these he bagged in six-weeks' flying at Guadalcanal, in fifty flights, and after returning from a brief vacation in Australia he knocked off three more Nipponese.

Winner of the Distinguished Flying Cross, the former Sioux Falls farm lad leads the "Flying Circus," an eight-plane flight which on January 26 had shot down sixty-nine Japanese planes. During the record-breaking day of January 15, in which Guadalcanal-based planes downed thirty Zeros and made direct hits on two Japanese destroyers and a cargo ship—with the loss of only seven American aircraft—Foss led a Grumman flight which, with Bell airacobras, cleared the way for an attack on the cargo ship off Vella Lavella island. Zeros unsuccessfully attempted to intercept the attack, and referring to the battle Foss said he "just milled around in a mess of Nips." During the battle his personal collection included two Zeroes which he shot down from the tails of his buddies.

With the designation of ace being five victories, Captain Foss may challenge all combat records in American flying annals. His short vacation in December followed an exploit when his plane was shot down and Foss bailed out over the water, from which he was picked up by a rescue crew.

Previous exploits were told by Herbert L. Merillat, *Ariz.* A '35, Marine Combat correspondent, whose Associated Press-distributed dispatch told of Foss' raising his total from eleven to fifteen enemy planes when he downed four planes on the fifteenth day of the enemy's all-out attempt to recapture Henderson Field in November. He was individual high-scorer of October 23rd when he shot down four Zeros, boosting his total at that time to eleven victories. Through an AP dispatch received November 19 Captain Foss modestly related his part in the battle.

As he described it he turned into a group of Zeros and nailed the first one from behind. He got on the tail of a second and bagged it with a burst. Split seconds later he polished off a Zero which was on the tail of a Grumman, and then he shot down his fourth victim who had made the mistake of passing him up from behind.

A broken oil line forced Captain Foss to turn back to the air field. When asked what impressions passed through his mind during the fight he would only say: "It's a good feeling to get them in your sights."

Twenty Zeros were blasted from the skies in that battle. Not a single American flyer was lost. In addition to the Zeros one Jap bomber was downed and three left smoking badly, bringing to 315 the total number of enemy aircraft brought down at that date by American planes since the beginning of air activity in the Solomons theatre.

Four days before the encounter Foss wrote his mother, saying, "This is the best hunting I've ever encountered—no bag limit." She received the letter November 19. He told her "I'm now at Guadalcanal, Solomon islands, a beautiful tropical isle in the blue, blue Pacific. . . ." At that time he had bagged four Zeros and a bomber, and had hit another bomber and started it smoking.

Captain Foss has been in marine service since the fall of 1939; his marksmanship ability dates back to early boyhood. One of his sensational feats was described by Ira Wolfert, North American Newspaper Alliance war correspondent, who reported the Sioux Falls ace's unofficial total as at twenty-nine planes. He wrote:

" . . . Once he shot down a Zero at 29,000 feet, dived down to less than

3,000 feet and chopped down two torpedo bombers. He dived so rapidly that the wind stripped the glass shelter and all his rubber pads from his plane, and he was working on his third victim before the first completed its fall into the sea."

Captain Foss' mother, Mrs. Mary Foss, a sixty-four-year-old widow, operates a farm near Sioux Falls, S.D., the pilot's birthplace twenty-seven years ago. She pointed out that "Joe always has been set on flying," and "Joe's a great hunter, too. It made him sick not to be able to hunt pheasants in South Dakota this fall, so I guess he took it out on the Japs."

Commands Heavy Bomb Group

MUCH-DECORATED Brig. Gen. Laverne G. (Blondy) Saunders, S.D. Σ '22, Commander of Army Heavy Bombardment Forces in the Solomons area, holds a key position of importance in the course of the war. Proving an important factor in control of South Pacific skies, his bombardment group has engaged in 240 combats in the South Pacific, during which an enemy aircraft carrier was probably sunk, twenty other ships were hit, sixty

enemy planes destroyed and thirty-three damaged.

For his performance of leadership he was awarded the Distinguished Service Medal on January 18th, 1943, with a citation praising his "marked efficiency in the exercise of his command of a bombardment group during a period of continuous and intensive employment since July 31, 1942."

General Saunders learned of the citation in the newspapers, which carried an Associated Press dispatch from Washington telling that the award was made January 18 for his "outstanding feats in aerial combat in the Solomons." Similarly, he discovered, on Christmas Day, that he had been promoted to Brigadier General. On January 22 he landed at Huron, S.D. Municipal Airport on the way home to Aberdeen, S.D., on furlough, and proved a reticence in discussing his exploits. Asked about the battling with the Japs, he stated that the Americans are "doing fine."

The group operating under Saunders was credited with inflicting great damage on Japanese naval, ground and air forces, and on important enemy installations in the Solomon islands.

Perhaps his strategy and cold courage in his crash-landing of a damaged plane on the water at ninety-five miles per hour was an indication of what a football background can do for a man. Regardless, the former West Point football line coach's exploit received nationwide attention, for with his pilot killed, the co-pilot dying, and his plane on fire in the midst of a swarm of Zeros over a Japanese base at Bougainville Island, Saunders took over the controls, crash-landed the plane safely on the water at a speed of ninety-five miles per hour, saved himself and seven other members of the crew. For this feat he was given the Distinguished Flying Cross, by Maj. Gen. Millard F. Harmon, and also the Navy Cross.

In a delayed Associated Press dispatch of late November Saunders was described as back on the job in command of all heavy bombers on the base, damaged and bruised and feeling "worse than after the first day of scrimmage."

After an air raid on ships in Shortland Harbor at the southern tip of Bougainville, with direct hits scored on two large cargo ships and annihilation of seventeen Zeros, only one plane of the American group was missing. But as Colonel Saunders told the story:

We'd made our second run across the target about 8:30 A.M. when about twenty Zeros got on us. . . . The co-pilot was wounded. . . . and I went back to get the first-aid kit. I'd just got back with it and was standing behind the cockpit when a machine-gun bullet went through the pilot's heart. It killed him instantly. At the same time, the co-pilot was wounded in the stomach. The cockpit was all shot up. . . . I. . . . took over the controls. . . .

Both engines on the left side were shot out and the wing was on fire. The only thing right on the instrument panel was the clock. I couldn't stay in formation, so I told another plane to take the lead." (Other pilots said Saunders' plane at that time was "flopping around" so crazily that they couldn't see how he continued to fly it.)

The left wing was red hot. The bank and turn indicator showed we were in a spin. . . . but I could tell that we were not. We came out of the overcast at about 500 feet and I saw I'd have to put her down. . . . We were about a mile and a half out. . . . I brought her down dragging the tail on the water at ninety-five miles an hour. The wings hit and there was really a sudden stop.

After those of the crew alive had crawled out of the plane they placed the co-pilot into one of their inflated rubber boats, and in another one they set out for shore. The co-pilot died on the way in. On the island they pulled everything back into the jungle and made a bed for Levi, the bombardier. Soon two boats full of black natives discovered them, and helped them build shelters. In the afternoon others came "in a hundred-foot canoe that would make any crew at Poughkeepsie look sick." At the nearby native village they were given food and shelter, which saved Levi's life. The next afternoon they were picked up by a navy plane.

Colonel Saunders, called "Blondy" because what hair he has is coal black, coached football at West Point from 1932 to 1939. His playing days as an Army tackle earned him the reputation of having "the best pair of hands in football." At Hickam Field, Honolulu, during the December 7 attack, he flew one of the few planes that got into the air.

Forty Days in Jungle

SHOT down off shore and forced to parachute into the ocean, hiding from the Japanese for forty days and nights, and living to tell about it—Lt. Dale M. Leslie, *Fla. T '40*, Marine Air Corps pilot, listed as missing in action in *THE RECORD*, December issue, had a story-book tale to tell after returning to his Solomons port early in November. He is now back in the United States.

Out on reconnaissance, Lieutenant Leslie's plane was attacked by a Jap Zero and set on fire. His gunner was killed, so Leslie bailed out, landed in the ocean just off-shore. Knowing that the shore was held by Japanese, he swam around for five or six hours until darkness when he went on land. For the next twenty-seven days he trudged through the jungle, pushing on at night, sleeping a few hours each day and ever on the alert for lurking Japs.

Finally he reached a small village, and after convincing the natives that he was American, not Japanese, he was with friends. Before he could eat, he explains, he had to shake hands with everyone in the village, some one hundred persons, from the oldest man to the tiniest tot. With shoes worn to shreds, clothing tattered, and forty-pounds underweight from a diet of cocoanuts "for breakfast, lunch and dinner," Lieutenant Leslie was well-fed and guided by a missionary back to Henderson Field, forty days after being shot down.

Flyer Decorated

HIS heroism in action against the Japanese during the battle of Midway won for Lt. (jg) Norman F. Vandivier, *Ind. A '38*, the Navy Cross, it was announced November 12. He was previously listed as missing in action. Lieutenant Vandivier was cited by Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox as follows:

"For extraordinary heroism and distinguished service as pilot of an airplane of a bombing squadron in action against enemy Japanese forces in the Battle of Midway during the period of June 4-6, 1942.

"Disregarding extreme danger from concentrated anti-aircraft barrage and heavy fighter opposition, he, with bold determination and courageous zeal, participated in the initial dive bombing assault of our forces against Japanese naval units. Flying a distance from his own forces which rendered return unlikely because of fuel exhaustion, he pressed home his attacks with utter disregard for his own personal safety. His gallant intrepidity and loyal devotion to duty contributed in large measure to the success of our forces and were in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States naval service."

Hero Killed in Combat

LEAVING life in the way he wanted to—in the sky, fighting—Lt. Orville Kirtland, *Wash. B '41*, was presumably drowned near Port Moresby while on an interception mission against enemy bombers July 11, 1942.

According to Lt. Philip K. Shriver, Adjutant of the squadron, Lieutenant Kirtland was an "eager" pilot, one who could not sufficiently satisfy his love for flying and fighting. His squadron had evidently been active in the de-

fense against Jap aerial forays against Port Moresby. In his letter to Mr. L. A. Kirtland in Pullman, Wash., Lieutenant Shriver told of the young flyer's heroism on July 11 when he was flying with his squadron in the New Guinea area near Port Moresby, and how he "must have been shot down as he closed in for a second attack." No one actually witnessed the action, however, as the plane disappeared in the clouds, but search revealed no trace of the plane. Describing Lieutenant Kirtland's action on that day as typical of his courage on all missions, the adjutant said:

"There wasn't enough fighting in this war to satisfy his love of flying and fighting. I was in a position to know Orville not only as a pilot but also as a friend as well. He has often said to me that when he left this life he wanted to leave it in the sky—fighting. If, indeed, he has left us, his only wish was gloriously gratified, and . . . a more courageous pilot never took to the air."

Describes Battling Enemy

DESCRIBING the Battle of Midway as "pandemonium supreme," Lt. (jg) Carl M. Blackstock, *Wash.* A '35, told *Seattle Times* newsmen in November how the scene looked from his motor torpedo-boat.

When they (Jap Zeros) roar over you at not more than fifty feet, dropping hundreds of pounds of explosives, you feel like burrowing into the deck to hide. Then you wish you were manning the machine guns, but you know you can't, because you're an officer and have other work to do.

First they let you have it with horizontal bombers, then they dive-bomb you, and if that's unsuccessful, they come along with the third stage of the operation—strafing the craft with machine-gun fire.

But the ingenuity of Americans who man the fastest water craft in the world nearly always outmaneuver the cunning Jap, and send a winged foe crashing into the sea.

Lieutenant Blackstock said the Americans are fighting a thoroughly-hated foe. The Japs are merciless, and believe the only good American is a dead American, he emphasized, telling how the Japs bombed the hospital, and strafed parachuting pilots.

A former Pacific Coast outboard motor-boat racing champion, Lieutenant Blackstock joined the navy twenty-two months ago. He is now temporarily stationed in the 13th Naval District.

General Lentz

General Lentz began his military career shortly after his graduation from Gettysburg College where he became a member of Sigma Alpha Epsilon. After attending officers training camps, he was commissioned as a second lieutenant, Field Artillery Reserve, November 27, 1917, and assigned to the 77th Field Artillery. He went to France with that regiment and served with it in the Toul Sector; the Aisne-Marne, St. Mihiel, and Meuse-Argonne offensives; and later in Germany, returning to the United States in August, 1919.

He was transferred to the Regular Army, July 1, 1920, and promoted to first lieutenant the same date; to captain, May 2, 1930; to major, January 16, 1939; to lieutenant colonel, April 18, 1941; to colonel, February 1, 1942; and to brigadier general September 14, 1942.

General Lentz has served with various field artillery units and is a graduate of the Field Artillery School at Fort Sill, Okla. (both regular and advanced courses); the Command and General Staff School at Fort Leavenworth, Kan.; and the Army War College at Washington, D.C.

He served as instructor at the Field Artillery School from 1931 to 1934; went to Fort Bragg, N.C., in June, 1936, as a member of the Field Artillery Board; returned to Washington in July, 1941, as Assistant Plans and Training Officer; was made Assistant

War Plans Officer of General Headquarters in December, 1941; and Plans and Training Officer in March, 1942.

Engages in Battle over Desert

A VIVID account of an air battle, carried in the Army Newspaper *Yank*, described a desert aerial battle in which one of the three principal actors was Lt. Louis Gregory, *Fla.* T '41. Somewhere on the Tunisian front a German plane, a JU-88, accidentally flew over an allied airfield. Discovering his error and seeing two P-38s taking off after him, the pilot gambled on the thousand-to-one shot and attacked the field in a power-dive, and released four bombs, disregarding the anti-aircraft fire from below. He came out of his dive and opened up with better than 300 miles per hour, but a 40-mm crew made a hit. The Germans—it turned out there were three of them—still might have escaped, but three second lieutenant were going into action. Lieutenant Gregory was already in the air; the other two were on the runway.

Lieutenant Gregory had been approaching the field and when he called for landing instructions he was told that a JU-88 was over the field. As Gregory explained:

It was overcast at 7,000 feet, when I started a steep climb to the east. I noticed bursts of flak all around an 88 nearby. Cloud formations and the sun at my back aided me in closing in on the enemy plane. I started firing my cannon a moment later, and then turned on both cannon and machine guns. I could see bullets hitting the entire length of the fuselage but I continued firing. The 88 nosed straight down, one top-rear gunner still firing. Jerry managed to pull out of the dive for a moment, then went out of control and into a dive again. Heading for the base, I observed a burning plane nearby. I went low enough to identify it.

Commander in Tunisia

■ Maj. Philip G. Cochran, *Ohio* Θ '33, in command of an Army Air Corps squadron in Tunisia, single-handedly bombed German headquarters at Kairouan early in January, according to a dispatch from Allied Headquarters in North Africa. His squadron was credited with six victories in three days. Major Cochran's brother, Ensign Thomas Cochran, *Ohio* Θ '40, is on active duty with the Naval Reserve.

Father and Son Serve

■ A pair of lieutenants in the Military Police and the Army Air Corps, respectively are L. J. Monson, *N.D.* A '12, and L. J. Monson, Jr., *N.D.* B '41. Lieutenant Monson, Sr., a veteran officer of World War I, serves with the new Military Police Battalion at Fort Snelling, Minn., while his son is a flying fortress navigator "somewhere in England" with a Bombardment Squadron.

MINERVA'S GOLD STAR VICTIMS

(Reported since December 1, 1942)

1ST LT. EDWARD ALLEN FIELDEN

■ Army Air Corps Pilot, 1st Lt. Edward Allen Fielden, Pa. Θ '39, died in a Puerto Rico hospital December 30, 1942, from injury suffered during officers' calisthenics at a flying field in Puerto Rico. At the University of Pennsylvania Edward Fielden starred on the gridiron at left end.

1ST LT. JENS HENNING HANSEN, JR.

■ Described by Lt. Gen. Henry Arnold, US Army Air Forces Commander, as "an officer of unusual promise and ability," 1st Lt. Jens Henning Hansen, Jr., Iowa B '40, Army Air Corps pilot, was killed in a plane crash in Egypt October 26, 1942. In a personal tribute General Arnold also wrote that Lieutenant Hansen's record marked him as an officer with "unusual intelligence and efficiency which earned for him the commendation of his instructors."

LT. NORMAN R. NELSON

■ In the European War Theatre, Lt. Norman R. Nelson, Mont. B '40, was killed in action November 9, 1942. His father, William M. Nelson, was advised of this through the War Department. Lieutenant Nelson was first reported missing in action, which information was carried in the December issue of THE RECORD.

1ST LT. FRED S. DEWEY

■ 1st Lt. Fred S. Dewey, Jr., Ohio E '37, is a prisoner of the Japanese in the Philippines, his family learned December 15, 1942. In service more than two years and sent overseas in June, 1941, he was reported missing in action in January, 1942, after the fall of Corregidor, where he was stationed with the Anti-Aircraft Coastal Defense, as carried in the August, 1942, issue of THE RECORD.

ENSIGN CHARLES W. HANNA

■ Co-pilot of a navy bomber, Ensign Charles W. Hanna, Iowa B '39, crashed to death five miles off the coast of Banana River, Fla., near Melbourne, November 11, 1942. Nine members of the twelve-man crew lost their lives in the crash, which occurred in heavy weather during a routine night training flight. Memorial services for Ensign Hanna were held at Melbourne and members of his squadron sent a purse of eighty dollars to his family to be used for a memorial in his memory.

LT. DALE M. LESLIE

■ Daring hero of Guadalcanal, Lt. Dale M. Leslie, Fla. T '40, Marine Air Corps, who saved a detachment of marines trapped by the Japanese on September 29th, is reported missing in action. Word of his exploit in saving the trapped marines was told in a United Press dispatch, which described how the marine detachment, cut off on all sides by the Japs, took off their shorts and spread them on the beach to spell HELP. Dive Bomber Pilot Leslie flashed the message to headquarters and dived among the Japs, blazing a path through them for marines to rescue their comrades.

69. Lt. Wilson Clyde Cater, Miss. Γ '40, Army Air Corps, was killed in a plane crash in New Guinea October 16, 1942.

70. A/C Leland T. Harvey, Kan. B '36, Naval Air Corps Reserve, was killed in an auto accident near Pensacola, Fla., May 11, 1940.

71. A/C Walter Eugene Law, Colo. X '43, Naval Air Corps, was killed at Los Alamitos, Calif., Naval Air Base January 5, 1942.

72. A/C Francis Menante, Nev. A '40, Army Air Corps, crashed to death near Salinas, Calif., November 21, 1942.

73. Flying-Sergeant Andrew Joseph McLaughlin, Ill. Δ '43, Royal Canadian Air Force, was killed in action over England December 10, 1942.

74. Lt. Donald B. Fyfe, Vt. A-Σ-II '40, was killed in a plane crash in Hillsborough Bay, Tampa, Fla., July 29, 1941.

75. 1st Lt. Edward Allen Fielden, Pa. Θ '39, Army Air Corps, died in a Puerto Rican hospital December 30, 1942, from injury suffered in officers' calisthenics.

76. Lt. James C. Ruch, N.H. A '40, U. S. Navy, Gunnery Crew Commander in the Merchant Marine, was killed in action October 19, 1942.

77. Lt. Edward Joseph Peterson, Jr., Colo. Z '40, Army Air Corps, was killed in a plane crash at the Colorado Springs Air Base August 8, 1942.

78. Seymour C. Hammond, Me. A '28, civil engineer under the War Department, was lost at sea due to enemy action August 27, 1942.

79. Lt. Clyde Parker Baugh, Utah T '43, Army Air Corps, died at San Diego, Calif., August 28, 1942.

80. Capt. Randolph Percival Davidson, Jr., La. E '41, Army Air Corps, Atlantic Ferrying Command, crashed to death at Bear Creek Grove, Minn., December 16, 1942.

81. 1st Lt. Jens Henning Hansen, Jr., Iowa B '40, Army Air Corps, was killed in a plane crash in Egypt, October 26, 1942.

82. Thomas W. Moore, Ala. I '32, Officers Training Corps, died at Camp Croft, S.C., January 11, 1943.

83. Lt. Norman R. Nelson, Mont. B '40, was killed in action in the European War Theatre November 9, 1942.

84. Capt. Edwin C. Novak, Iowa Γ '34, Army Air Corps, was killed in Africa November 9, 1942.

85. Herbert Knowlton, S.D. Σ '41, Army Air Corps, was killed in a bomber crash near Hamilton Field, Calif., December 6, 1942.

86. Ensign John Norman Albritton, Ala. M '36, USNR, was killed in the Boston Night Club Fire November 28, 1942.

87. 2nd Lt. William Lauby, Mont. B '43, Army Air Corps, was killed at Drew Field, Tampa, Fla., December 29, 1942.

■ With the AAF in England since September 1, 1942, Lt. Norman R. Nelson, Mont. B '40, has been missing in action since November 9, 1942, in the Western European war theater. At Montana State University he had taken the CAA pilot training course, and soon after his graduation in 1940 he enlisted in the Army Air Corps. Within less than one year he was commissioned, and was sent from Geiger Field, Washington, to the Hawaiian Islands, where he arrived too late to engage in the Battle of Midway. From there he returned to the United States, later leaving for England.

CAPT. RANDOLPH PERCIVAL DAVIDSON, JR.

■ Fourth Louisiana Epsilon service man to be killed or missing, Capt. Randolph Percival Davidson, Jr., La. E '41, Army Air Corps Bomber Pilot, Atlantic Ferrying Command, crashed to death at Bear Creek Grove, Minn., December 16, 1942. Promoted to Captain one week before he was killed, the twenty-three-year-old officer was buried with full military honors.

88. A/C Robert Owens Chaffin, Ga. Φ '44, was killed in Hawaii November 29, 1942.

89. Ensign Shirley F. Summers, Calif. B '40, was killed in a plane crash near Breezy Point, N.C., December 30, 1942.

90. Lt. Col. Virgil L. Eikenberry, Ind. A '15, died at the George Field, Ill., Military Hospital, December 25, 1942.

91. Albert James Ebersole, Ky. K '26, Volunteer Officer Candidate, died at the Army Induction Center, Fort Thomas, Ky., October 5, 1942.

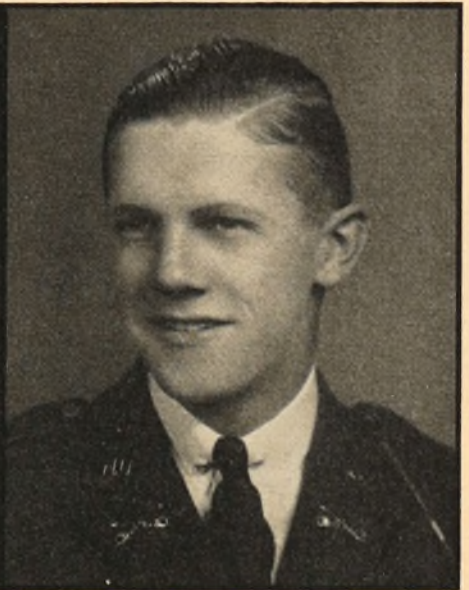

His Squadron Had Been Active in the Defense against Jap Aerial Forays on Port Moresby, and on July 11 Lieutenant Kirtland Disappeared in an Attack on Enemy Fighters Supporting the Japanese Bomber Formation.



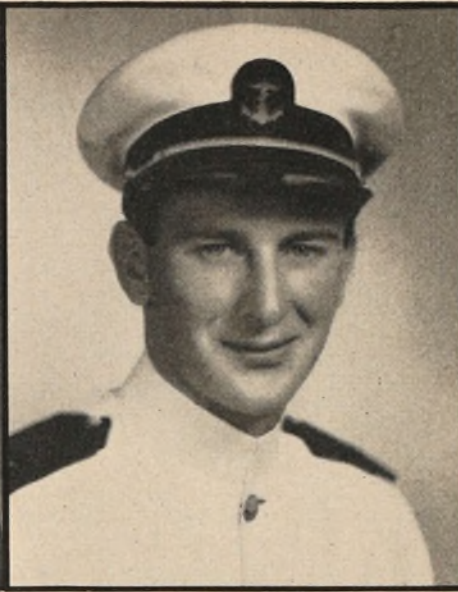
LT. DONALD B. FYFE

PURSUIT Pilot in the Far East, Lt. Philip T. Metsker, Ind. Lieutenant Metsker Left for the Western Pacific in November, 1941, Having Left United Air Lines to Join the Army Air Corps.

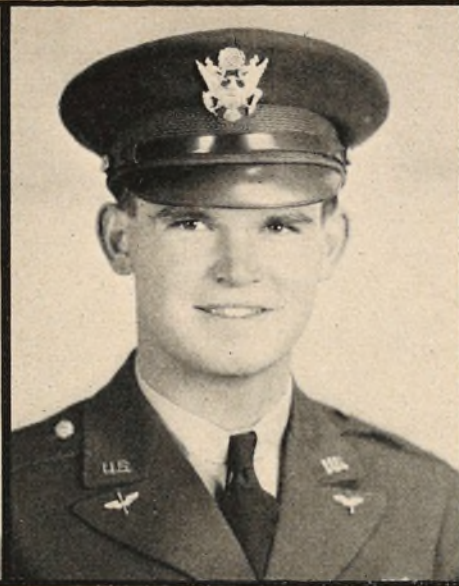
2ND LT. ROBERT PAUL SPRENG

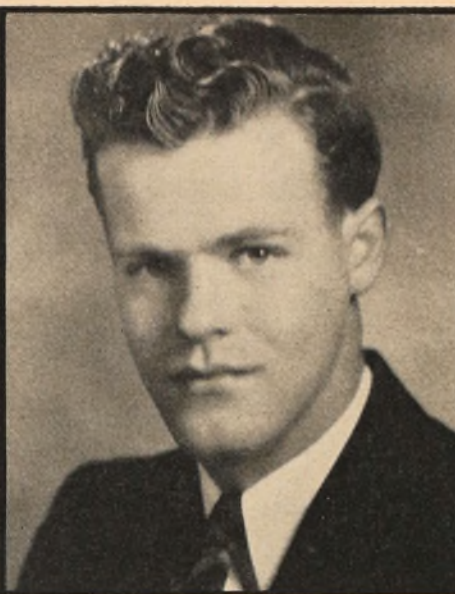

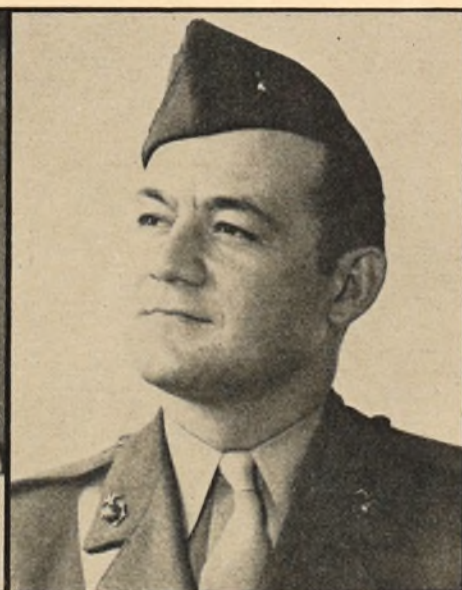

■ In practically any branch of service a member of the Snowden clan of Memphis, Tenn., can be found. Lt. Col. John B. Snowden, II, *Tenn.* Ω '26, is in the Infantry, and his brother, Maj. Robert B. Snowden, Jr., *Tenn.* K '19, in the Army Air Corps. The Major is a veteran officer of World War I, serving then in the Field Artillery as well as the Air Corps. First cousins of this pair are Capt. Robert G. Snowden, *Tenn.* Ω '40, of the Marine Corps, and his brother, Corp. J. Bayard Snowden, Jr., *Tenn.* Ω '36, of the Cavalry. Their father is J. Bayard Snowden, *Tenn.* Ω, Life Member of the Chapter National.

Escapes Stricken "Hornet"

■ Aboard the *Hornet* when it was sunk in the Pacific in October, Lt. (jg) William Moran, *Nev.* A '40, escaped injury and wrote to members of his Nevada Chapter that he is alive and well. Aide to General in Africa

■ Former Associated Press correspondent in Tacoma, Wash., 1st Lt. Jack Beardwood, *Wash.* A '35, is aide to Maj. Gen. Mark Clark, Chief of Staff for Lt. Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, American forces commander in North Africa. As an AP reporter, Beardwood wrote colorful articles concerning "war games" in California in 1941. In July of that year he was transferred to the Associated Press bureau in Washington, D.C., where he handled cable news from Latin-American countries, and six months ago he joined the army.

Major Allen Serves Again

■ Maj. Kenneth D. Allen, *Colo.* Z '10, Life Member of the Chapter National, whose individual feats of service during World War I won him the Medal of Honor personally presented by the King of England and a hand-made American flag presented by his British comrades in the trenches, is back in service again. Major Allen is serving in the Medical Corps at Fitzsimmons General Hospital, Denver, Colo. In the museum at the Levere Memorial Temple is the summons which he received from the King of England and the flag which British soldiers in the trenches painted on a piece of white cloth on July 4, 1918, to show their love and admiration for him. On that date his companions, with whom he had been serving for several months since the fortunes of war had taken him from the American Army and into the British trenches, gave him a feast and a few of the men walked

several miles to a ruined town where they found a white cloth and some paint. The hand-made flag was presented in honor of a man who, in the words of Billy Levere, "shirked no venture, or conflict, no man's land, or trench . . . an ΣAE who in imminent danger stood up and was counted for a man."

Drops Pen for Sword

■ Max Miller, *Wash.* A '23, forty-three-year-old marine writer, and author of "I Cover the Waterfront," is now a lieutenant in the navy, stationed on the east coast. Former University of Washington student editor, Miller was waterfront reporter for the *San Diego Union* from 1924 to 1932, during which time he gathered materials for his now famous book. Since then he has written fourteen books, including "Harbor of the Sun," "It Must Be the Climate," "The Second House from the Corner," "The Man on the Barge" and "He Went Away for Awhile," all centered in and around San Diego and woven around characters he met while a reporter on the San Diego waterfront. During World War I he served as a boatswain's mate in the navy.

Cited for Action at Sea

■ Among nineteen naval officers and men receiving letters of commendation for outstanding heroism, Lt. Calvert G. Chipchase, Jr., *Calif.* B '37, was cited for his part in the battle in which the carrier *Yorktown* was sunk. Aboard the vessel when it was sunk, Lieutenant Chipchase was also aboard the carrier *Lexington* when it was lost, and was adrift in a lifeboat for two days before being rescued. Details of the action for which he and eighteen others were cited during the *Yorktown* engagement were not made public. He is now on duty in the South Pacific.

Amputates Finger to Serve

■ In order to qualify for the Naval Air Corps Stephen Gusick, *Ill.* B '44, underwent a surgical amputation of the stiff finger which

had barred his enlistment. Accepted in Chicago on December 7th, Gusick said he expected to have a portion of a tonsil—the other impediment to his serving—removed before February, when he expects to be called. An athlete at the University of Illinois, Gusick suffered a compound fracture of his second finger, right hand, while playing football; the injury left his finger stiff. When he decided to join the Naval Air Corps last December eight surgeons told him amputation of the finger and removal of a portion of a tonsil was necessary before he would be accepted. In mid-November he underwent the operation in Champaign, Ill.; on December 7th he was accepted by the navy.

Commended by Doolittle

■ Capt. Arthur L. Zachry, Jr., *Ga.* B '39, moved a motor convoy loaded with gasoline and ammunition through unfamiliar terrain to a North African airdrome in time to supply American fighters with the materials of victory. For this feat he received a letter of commendation from Gen. James Doolittle, who wrote: "In spite of great difficulties presented by strange roads, faulty maps, lack of a guide, and the presence of enemy troops in the area, you led this convoy into the airdrome in time to supply our fighters with gasoline and ammunition needed for the first day of our operations there."

Navigator in Africa

■ Serving at an advanced bomber base in North Africa is Lt. Allen J. Wash, Jr., *Minn.* A '39, whose Light Bomber Squadron holds an enviable record. Described by Squadron Leader Maj. Charles C. Kegelman as "The most experienced light bomber squadron in the American Air Force," the group had, as of early in January, carried out forty-one raids on the Germans in Tunisia with the loss of but one plane crew—and that one has been reported safe. Lieutenant Wash began his foreign service June 1, 1942, served in Great Britain until transferred to Africa November 18. He wrote home telling of aerial engagements on his birthday, December 2, when he "gave more presents than received." His father is Allan J. Wash, Sr., *Minn.* A '10, Life Member of the Chapter National.

Praises the Sailors

■ Lt. Com. Carl C. Garver, *Ga.* E '29, Atlanta doctor who served aboard the *USS Atlanta* when she sank in the South Pacific November 13, returned home January 20 in the midst of the campaign of Atlantans and Georgians to sell \$35,750,000 worth of war bonds to replace the lost cruiser. The commander saw seventy-two hours of action last November, which ended in victory for the US Fleet, but with the loss of nine vessels. He was on constant sea duty for 118 days, and during the bitter action of November 13 treated more than 100 wounded men under fire. Regarding the men he told how they "sometimes stood duty at their posts or battle stations for twenty-four or forty-eight or even seventy-two hours at a time. They didn't flinch."

Henry Eve Not Missing

■ Ensign Henry P. Eve, *N.C.* Θ '36, *Ga.* E '39, who is on duty at sea, was erroneously reported "Missing" by the Navy Department in the fall of 1942 but at last accounts was still on duty. After graduation from the Midshipman School of Northwestern University, he was on duty at the Charleston, S.C., base before sent to sea.

His Son Won't Set

■ When Lt. Com. Cy S. Olson, *Minn.* A '24 (see photo on cover), wanted to get word of his promotion from Lieutenant to his son Vincent, eighteen-year-old seafarer and world traveler, he wondered how to go about it. Vincent Olson is believed to be on convoy duty in the merchant marine possibly out of England to Russia or Africa. Two years ago, while a junior in high school, he left for South America. Later he made a second trip, sailing to Seattle, then on to the Philippines. He left Manila a few days before it fell, sailed to Rangoon, where the Japs bombed his group for forty-two days and nights. In Calcutta he was stranded when the ship sailed under secret orders while he was on leave. Turned down by the navy because of eye requirements, he shipped aboard a freighter, which was torpedoed seven hours out of Trinidad. After eight days in a lifeboat a destroyer picked him up, and he flew home via an army bomber. He went off again, and his father received word from England in December in a cablegram reading "All is well." That is all he does know.

Legionnaires Active

■ After his Chapter National Dues bill had followed him over some 13,000 miles, finally catching up with him early in November, 1942, in Alaska, 1st Lt. E. M. Nesmith, *N.H.* B '35, *Mass.* B-T, writes that he will "attempt to be more on time next year," with his dues payment. As sponsor of the "Alaskan Legion of Sigma Alpha Epsilon" he explains that one stenographer is insufficient to handle the routine correspondence which passes through his hands. He promises to send plenty of news later.

It's Certainly "logical"

Heads Ordnance Depot

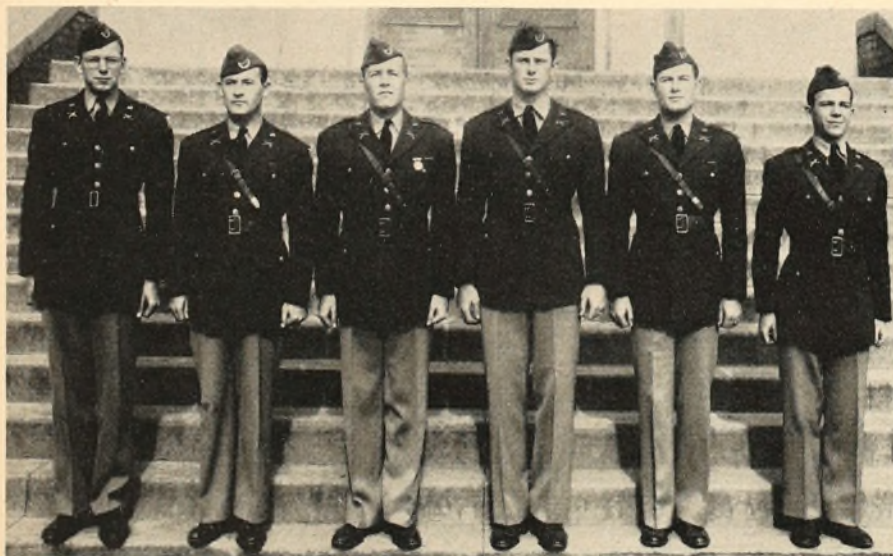

Develops Ration Kit

■ Perfecting an emergency ration container for lifeboats and rafts, Lt. Reginald W. Millard, *Mass.* I-T '09, Naval Ordnance, may prove a benefactor to seamen adrift from torpedoed vessels who are subject to the ravages of sun, wind, waves and fire. The new container has done away with the "iron rations," and will eliminate the long hours of pain from sunburn and exposure, and from wounds after swimming through burning oil. The kit contains twelve ounces of thirty-five overproof rum, 100 waterproofed cigarettes, 100 large-headed fuses of "wind-matches," a waterproof flashlight, a highly-polished mirror for daylight heliograph signaling; a navy pattern-clasp knife; two hand-fishing lines and hooks; shell and field dressings, anti-burn jellies, and tins of the newly-developed "canned water." Four thousand of the kits have already been ordered for immediate placement aboard all Canadian lifeboats and rafts.

The Secretary of the Navy has advised that the name *Uhlmann* has been assigned to a destroyer under construction at the Bethlehem Steel Company plant at Staten Island, N.Y.

Slips through the Enemy

Disguised as a Belgian peasant woman, Sgt./Pilot Dalton C. Mounts, RCAF, *N.D. B '43*, slipped through enemy territory in Europe and made his way safely to Gibraltar after he was forced to bail out of his plane over German-controlled Belgium. He credited friendly Belgians with rescuing him and hiding him from German hands during his thirty-five day adventure. Before leaving England for the United States, Sergeant Mounts made a radio broadcast from the American Red Cross Eagle Club in London. Back in the states he has transferred from the Royal Canadian Air Force to the US Naval Air Corps.

China Honors Neil Martin

The parents of Neil G. Martin, *Ark. A-T '39*, whose death while flying combat duty at Rangoon, Burma, December 23, 1941, was reported in the December issue of *THE RECORD*, and whose picture appears in this issue, received a scroll from Generalissimo and Madame

Chiang Kai-shek, which reads as follows: For all of China we send you these few words as a token of the appreciation of the Chinese people for the invaluable service which your son, Flight Leader Neil G. Martin, at Rangoon, Burma, on December 23, 1941, rendered to the cause for which he gave his life in battle. China is honored to hold his mortal remains. There are no bounds of place or time to the memory of those who die for love of men. As China grieves with you in your great loss she is also proud to claim a special part in preserving the record of his fair name."

Prisoner Speaks from Japan

A message from her son, Corp. Alfred H. Eckles, *Ky. E '36*, prisoner in Japan, was received by Mrs. A. H. Eckles in Hopkinsville, Ky., early in January. A recording of a short-wave broadcast was telephoned from the war prisoners' monitor station at Long Beach, Calif., and was the first word from Corporal Eckles since three days before his surrender with the American troops at Bataan. Mrs. Eckles was told her son was in good health and well-housed "somewhere in Japan."

U.C.L.A. Honors Lt. Stone

Homecoming Week at University of California at Los Angeles in October was opened with Memorial Ceremonies in honor of Lt. Earl Reynolds Stone, *Calif. A '40*, and Capt. Don Brown, former student body president and son of Joe E. Brown, comedian. Lieutenant Stone, whose gallantry was lauded by General MacArthur, Lieutenant-General Arnold, and many other high-ranking officers, was killed in action during aerial engagement in the Philippines March 24, 1942, as carried in the December issue of *THE RECORD*. Captain Brown was also killed in action.

Cited in Solomons

During the battle for the Solomon Islands early in August, the *USS Astoria* was hit by shell fire and torpedoes and was set afire. The order was given to abandon ship at 2:00 A.M., August 9, and Ensign Morgan Reynolds, *D-V(G), USNR, Ala. M '41*, was assigned as Junior Officer, turret II; his battle station was the lower powder room of the turret. For his "excellent and outstanding conduct" in aiding

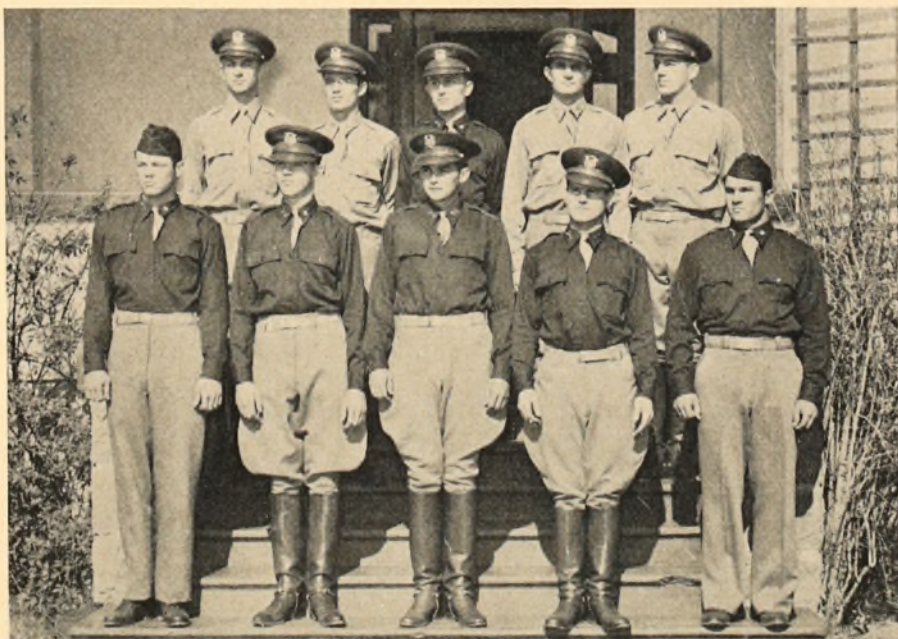
and helping others and rescuing those remaining alive in the powder room, and his conduct during the entire action and period following, Ensign Reynolds was officially cited and congratulated August 31, 1942. When the order was given to abandon ship he clung to a piece of wreckage, and was rescued about noon of August 9, after having been in the water approximately ten hours. He is now somewhere in the South Pacific. His brother, Henry Grady Reynolds, *Jr., Ala. M '38*, won his wings in the Air Corps at San Angelo, Tex., January 6, 1943.

Decorated in Far East

For heroic action in Tunisia, Capt. William M. Lively, *Ala. I '39*, Army Air Corps, was awarded the Air Medal in December. He was among forty-three pilots and crewmen of troop-carrying planes who were cited for "performance of an extremely hazardous offensive in the transportation of paratroops into Tunisia November 29." According to an Associated Press dispatch, the mission's complete success was laid to the excellent piloting, timing and handling of aircraft over the dropping area. Captain Lively, who flew privately before joining the Air Corps, has criss-crossed the country as a first pilot for the air transport division of the army. Commissioned a 1st Lieutenant in July, 1942, he was promoted to Captain in August and assigned to foreign service in England, prior to the opening of the North African offensive.

Rev. Lee Escaped Bombing

Rev. Edwin F. Lee, *D.D., Ill. W-R '08*, Bishop in charge of the work of the Methodist Church in the Philippines and Malaysia, was compelled to evacuate from Singapore January 30, 1942, with Mrs. Lee and twenty-four other American missionaries when the Japanese army was only fifteen miles away. The party experienced a raid by twenty-seven Japanese bombers while on a small American freighter tied up at the wharf in Singapore. This freighter took the party to Batavia, Java, and its members were landed in San Francisco on Easter evening after sixty-six days of travel, forty-six of them on three different trips. Bishop Lee is now living in Chicago but expects to go back to his work immediately after the conclusion of hostilities.

Addresses for Men in Service

CO-OPERATION of parents and friends in furnishing information about members of the Fraternity, serving in the armed forces, and addresses to which THE RECORD may be sent will be appreciated.

Under present regulations, magazines may be mailed by the publishers to men serving overseas but may not be forwarded. Therefore, if the Army Post Office address or the Fleet Postmaster address is given, we can mail THE RECORD directly.

Since the addresses of men in training change so frequently, it is suggested that the home addresses be maintained for all men serving in continental United States, except in such cases as medical officers, attached to hospitals, and other officers and enlisted men acting as instructors or in other capacities where there is reasonable expectation that the address will be fairly permanent.

In every case where a change of address is desired, the chapter and year of the member as well as his full name should be given as it often happens that there are several men from different chapters bearing the same name or similar names.

Liberal Arts and Freedom

SPEAKING at Duke University on January 14th, Mr. Wendell L. Willkie, late Republican candidate for President, delivered a powerful plea for continued teaching of the liberal arts in American colleges and universities as a necessary course of action for the preservation of American freedom.

Unfortunately, the press reports of Mr. Willkie's address emphasized certain political implications and gave scant attention to his central theme. Among the many telling passages in his address were the following:

So important are the liberal arts for our future civilization that I feel that education in them should be as much a part of our war planning as the more obviously needed technical training. Furthermore the men and women who are devoting their lives to such studies should not be made to feel inferior or

apologetic in the face of a P. T. boat commander or the driver of a tank.

For we can not win a true victory unless there exists in this country a large body of liberally educated citizens. This is a war for freedom—freedom here and freedom elsewhere. But if we are going to risk our lives for freedom, we must at the same time do all we can to preserve the deep springs from which it flows.

The destruction of the tradition of the liberal arts, at this crisis in our history, when freedom is more than ever at stake, would be a crime, comparable in my opinion, with the burning of the books by the Nazis. And it would have approximately the same results. Burn your books—or, what amounts to the same thing, neglect your books—and you will lose freedom, as surely as if you were to invite Hitler and his henchmen to rule over you.

ΣAE or SAE. Never S.A.E.

WHEN a member of Sigma Alpha Epsilon wishes to write of his

Fraternity in short form he should use preferably the Greek letters, ΣAE, but if he wishes to use the English letters, SAE, he should write them without periods.

The letters, SAE, are merely the English equivalents for the Greek letters, ΣAE, and are in no sense an abbreviation, requiring periods after each letter, as is the case when these same letters are used as abbreviations for the Society of Automotive Engineers or other organizations having three-word names which begin with the same letters.

La. Tau-Upsilon Leads in Scholarship

CONTINUING a powerful and spectacular recovery that began in the year 1940-41, Louisiana Tau-Upsilon of Sigma Alpha Epsilon, located at the University of Tulane in New Orleans, wins a smashing scholarship triumph for the year 1941-42. Final figures for this academic year have just become available from the offices of approximately one hundred colleges and universities across the land. These figures have been translated into percentile rankings by your Scholarship Commissioner according to the formula-system authorized and unanimously adopted by the Supreme Council in December, 1941. Under these formula-computations, to which explanatory reference is made in the box printed elsewhere on this page, the percentile rating of the Tulane chapter for the year 1941-42 is 96.87. This brilliant ranking has been achieved in competition with fifteen other nationally-known fraternities on the Tulane campus.

It is highly significant to note that Tulane not only recorded a gain over 1940-41 of 33.54 percentiles, but also raised itself, in the national rankings, from thirty-first to first place—thirty-two steps upward in one annual jump.

Even more notable is the fact that in two short years the Tulane chapter, starting literally from the scholastic cellar of the fraternity—trailing everybody at one hundred and fourth and last place in 1939-40—soared up to thirty-first place in the country in 1940-41, and without a break in its swift progress kept on soaring to top scholastic honors and first place in the nation in 1941-42.

Such a solid achievement offers dynamic proof of the progress that can be made by a fraternity chapter if it recognizes the need for scholarship and, by the adoption of a well-outlined program, does something about it. Tulane—by moving from one hundred and fourth place to first place in the national ranking in two years, something no other chapter in the national fraternity has ever done before—has demonstrated to a smash conclusion that scholarship can be improved any time a chapter wants to improve it.

Although the percentile rating for Tulane, the 1941-42 winner, is two-tenths of one percentile lower than the rating of the 1940-41 winner, Kentucky Epsilon at the University of Kentucky, it is nevertheless both encouraging and gratifying to be able to report that the national scholarship average for ΣAE has increased 3.10 percentiles over 1940-41.

It is pleasing, too, to be able to announce that forty-six chapters recorded

SPECIAL STATEMENT

Readers of the Scholarship Report of Sigma Alpha Epsilon for the Year 1941-42, may recall the special announcement in the December, 1941, issue of *THE RECORD*, page 182, entitled "New Scholarship Formula."

This announcement pointed out that relative scholastic standings of the Chapters Collegiate of ΣAE, beginning with the college year 1940-41, would be determined by the use of a new formula developed to put into effect the recommendation of the 1939 Convention, and adopted by unanimous vote of the Supreme Council after an exhaustive study of the subject.

The order of the Supreme Council of December, 1941, instructed the Scholarship Commissioner, beginning with the 1940-41 report, and continuing in the future, to use the following formula in calculating the ratings of each ΣAE chapter:

$$\frac{100}{N} \times [(N - S) + .5] = R$$

N equals the number of fraternities at the given institution.

S equals the standing or position of ΣAE (for example, third in ten).

R equals the centile rating.

The rating of each chapter is thus calculated at the center of the interval.

Acting in accordance with these instructions, your Commissioner put this formula into effect with the publication of the 1940-41 Report, and likewise in the 1941-42 Report appearing on this and the following pages. All material in Table I (and the following tables), including not only the present report-year, but also all previous years there included for comparison, has been recalculated under the new formula. Comparability is therefore retained and protected. Likewise the all-ΣAE National Trend Line has been recalculated and corrected throughout to reflect the application of the new formula.

Calculations of scholarship ratings issuing in the future from the office of the Commissioner will reflect the new formula. Chapters of ΣAE should bear this point in mind in examining the present report.

net gains for the year. But it is less pleasant to note that thirty-nine chapters fell in the scale to net losses. Fortunately, however, (1) the losses suffered were somewhat less severe than the benefits of the gains recorded; (2) in 1940-41 there were ten chapters with centile ratings below 10.00, whereas in 1941-42 there were only four chapters with centile ratings below 10.00. These factors have contributed to the recorded increase in the national average.

Your Commissioner's records show that, although the promising upward trend of 1939-40 appeared to be in part canceled by the recession of 1940-41, there is now some cause to hope that the upward scholastic trend of ΣAE has been strongly resumed. It remains true, however, that many chap-

ters in the lower half of the national rankings are still nullifying to a damaging extent the meritorious work of those chapters in the upper half. If chapters in the lower half of the percentile scale succeed in directing their plans toward the raising of their scholastic position—in the same effective way in which the Tulane chapter undertook the task—and if the chapters in the upper half can maintain their present gratifying performances, the upward trend of the national scholastic average can be maintained.

Despite the national gain in scholarship averages, there were only six chapters in first place on their respective campuses in 1941-42 as compared to eight campus leaders in 1940-41. Kentucky, Occidental, Oklahoma A. & M., Case, University of the South, Wofford, Furman, and Lafayette were the leaders in 1940-41. Only Occidental, Furman, and Wofford were able to repeat their peak performances in 1941-42. Tulane, Colorado State, and Union have also won their way into the select group.

The scholastic average of the Fraternity for the past eight years is presented in Table II. Elsewhere in this report appears a graphic representation of these final centile figures. This graph offers an easily understandable picture of the record of ΣAE national scholarship for a significant decade.

Table I presents the comparative centile ratings for four academic years, ending with the year 1941-42. This table is presented so that those interested may have complete data available to compute the trend of any chapter's scholastic record during these four years.

Outstanding Gains

The most spectacular single improvement among the chapters was recorded by Massachusetts Delta at Worcester Polytechnic Institute. This chapter climbed from eighty-fourth place in 1940-41 to eleventh in 1941-42. This tremendous gain of 64.58 percentiles was recorded in competition with eight other fraternities. Other important in-

creases were recorded by North Dakota Beta at North Dakota State College, with a net gain of 60.00 over 1940-41; Idaho Alpha at Idaho University, with a net gain of 58.33 over 1940-41; Oregon Alpha at Oregon State College, with a gain of 57.15 over 1940-41; and Alabama Alpha-Mu at Alabama Polytechnic Institute, with a net gain of 47.70 over 1940-41. Still other strong increases have been recorded by Georgia Psi at Mercer University, with a net gain of 40.00 over 1940-41; Ohio Tau at Miami University, with a gain of 39.36 over 1940-41; Colorado Zeta at Denver University, with a gain of 37.50 over 1940-41; and Nevada Alpha at Nevada University, with a net gain of 33.34 over 1940-41. Regardless of the point from which a gain begins, the significance of that gain lies in the increase itself. This percentile increase reflects the fact that the chapter is doing its part to strengthen not only its own position but also that of the National Fraternity.

Losses for the Year

Rhode Island Alpha at Rhode Island State College, suffering the most severe loss for the period, dropped from nineteenth place to eighty-fourth place, with a percentile loss of 50.01. Other severe and damaging losses were recorded by Montana State University and North Carolina University, the former dropping from twenty-ninth place to eighty-eighth place, and the latter from tenth place to sixty-sixth place, both with a loss of 42.86 percentiles; Lafayette, dropping from eighth place to fifty-seventh place with a centile loss of 41.18; and Norwich, Franklin, and Louisiana State dropping from fiftieth to ninety-first place, forty-fifth to ninetieth place, and twenty-fourth to seventy-third place, respectively, all with a percentile loss of 33.33. Of lesser magnitude but of serious effect are the losses of 30.83 percentiles of Oklahoma A. & M. chapter and 30.00 percentiles of Dickinson chapter recorded in 1941-42.

These severe losses, together with minor losses, are avoidable horse-weights that place a needless drag on the national ΣAE objective of higher leadership achievement. Although a loss sustained by one chapter may appear to that chapter to be relatively insignificant, each chapter must face the realization that such a loss may more than offset a corresponding gain won under hard competition by another chapter. With the damaging losses reported above, it is not difficult to detect at least one kind of drag of which ΣAE must rid itself.

Interesting Comparisons

In Table III are presented the ten chapters highest in scholarship and the

Test Your Position

Whether we like it or not, we must for the indefinite future operate our chapters under war-time conditions. The strain of the emergency may be long and bitter. The distractions may be many, but failure in scholarship during the coming year will be just as damaging to the present and future of your chapter as it ever has been in normal peace time. In fact, everything presently points to far greater damage

arising from such failure. Entirely new efforts must be made by every chapter member to help the relatively few civilian underclassmen and the various classes of armed-force reserves to carry a far greater share of the scholarship load, since they are the ones upon whom the scholarship load is going to fall. This statement is not a subject for debate. It is already a demonstrated fact. Chapters must begin their counter-action at once and without half-measures.

Your chapter can test its *current* position (for the reportable portion of your academic year 1942-43, as compared to the extensive data in the foregoing report) without having to resort to complicated figures or formulae. Simply ask yourselves the accompanying questions and delegate some capable brother in the house to compile the correct answers for a later report at a full chapter meeting.

Use Simple Line Graphs

Take a suggestion out of the foregoing report of your Commissioner. Set up a simple line-graph showing the standing of Σ AE on your campus in relation to the all-men's average. The offices of the dean of men or the

registrar on most campuses will be glad to assist in getting the few necessary figures. Post this graph along with your chapter grades inside a locked, glass-enclosed bulletin board. Your silent partner bulletin-board may prove

to be worth its weight in gold during the tough and trying times ahead.

Let it be remembered that every chapter of every fraternity is permitted to exist on any given campus only with the approval of the college or

2. What is the grade (or grade-point) average for your chapter for the first semester of this scholastic year, including also the average for all fraternities, for non-fraternity men, and for all men?
3. What is the number of men, first by initiates and second by pledges who failed in one or more subjects the first semester of this year? explain in detail.
4. What is the exact total of flunks made by the chapter during the first semester?
5. How many pledges failed to make grades satisfactory for initiation?
6. How many initiates and pledges dropped out of school during the first semester on account of grades? Explain in detail.
7. What methods do you use—if any—in maintaining decent scholarship, the kind of scholarship that gives you influence with the college administration, the kind of scholarship that gives you leverage with parents in pledging their sons?
8. Do you have a graduate counselor or chapter tutor?
9. Do you maintain a supervised study table?
10. Do you have a locked, glass-enclosed bulletin board for the systematic posting of grades of all initiates and all pledges, so that the chapter may KNOW who is in the locomotive cab doing the pulling?

university itself. During the times ahead, as never before, and for the long pull when peace comes, every chapter must consciously aim to follow a balanced program of pledging in which adequate emphasis is placed upon decent academic work. Only through a conscious chapter respect and esteem for decent scholarship can one of the central problems of the fraternity be solved.

Educational administrators have their eyes on every chapter of ΣAE in this country. The only complete defense of the fraternity system in the academic sphere, and the only justification for the continued existence of

As in previous years, it is the belief of your Commissioner that ΣΑΕ is ready, willing, and able to initiate and to sustain this program.

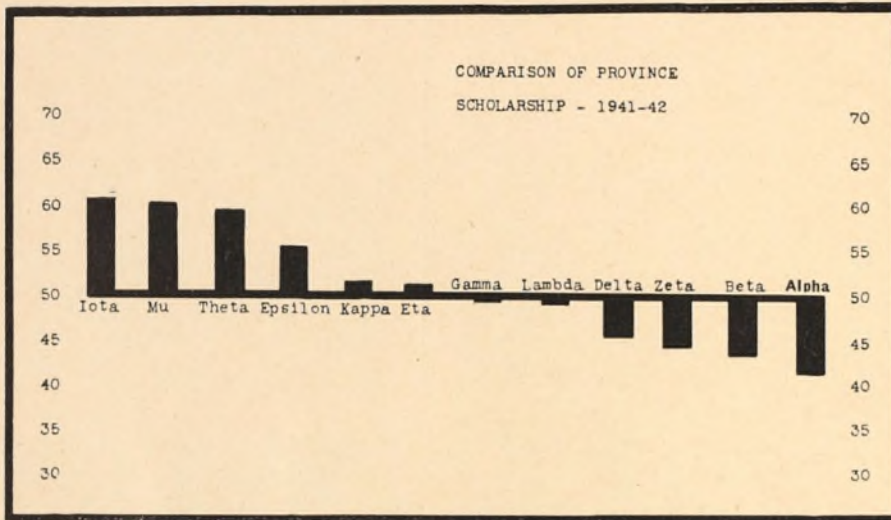
Supplement

Certain statistics arrived at the office of the Scholarship Commissioner after the deadline for the closing of the report forms. Although the information

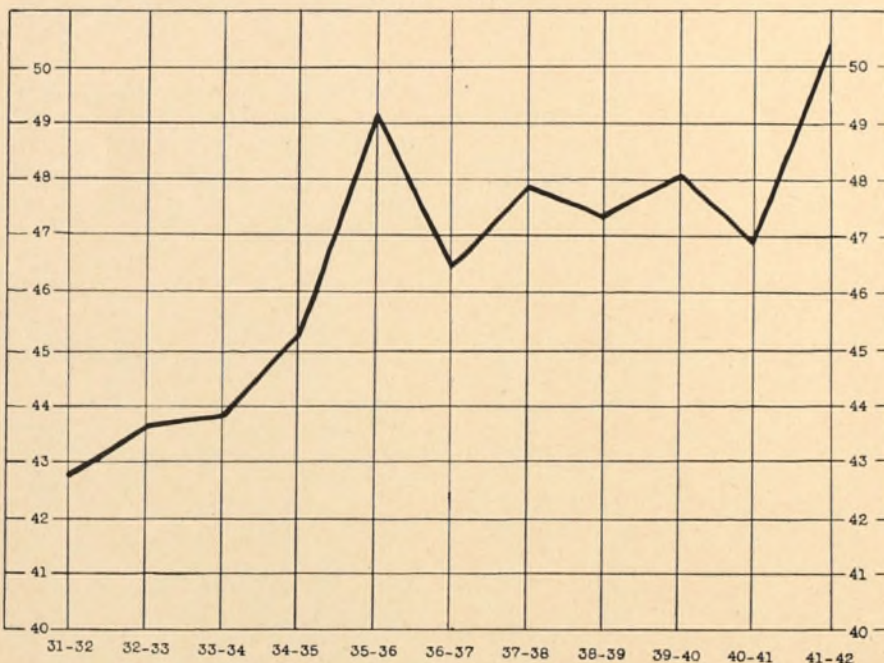
was too late to be incorporated in the Annual Report, the following entries are included for the reference of those to whom they may be of special interest:

Guides War Council

■ By banning formals, getting apple pickers, making a record Defense Chest drive, and revising the social life of 8,000 students, Kirby E. Torrance, Jr., *Wash. A '43*, first president of Associated Students at University of Washington elected in World War II, is seeing that the Student Council lives up to his platform of "Cooperation and Coordination."

The curly-headed reserve officer trainee and his aides worked all summer planning a unified cooperative and coordinated student government. Among accomplished results have been elimination of Varsity Ball and Junior Prom, all out-of-district social events, and requirements that dances end by 11:30 P.M., social budgets be cut, social functions be restricted to affairs contributing to the war effort. Under his instigation the student council set up a "Student War Council," which soon cut out Homecoming frills by eliminating Greek Row signs, and increased the war chest jackpot through homecomers' donations.

When apple growers needed 1,000 student pickers, and when 500 men were needed to collect scrap, Kirby led the way again, setting up the first College Manpower Commission in the nation—a board to coordinate all manpower drives on the campus. Then a "Class Officers' Council" was created, composed of the four leaders from each class, to further push class officer cooperation in student government. With everyone pulling together to shoulder war responsibility by "Cooperation and Coordination," Kirby feels that student government success is assured.

Idaho Alpha Takes Honors

■ Successfully balancing serious study with good times, Idaho Alpha at University of Idaho won the University Intrafraternity Scholarship Cup last semester, is working towards gaining permanent possession of it by winning it three semesters successively. On the social side, their much-publicized, traditional Bowery Dance was held December 12, and shortly afterwards the Chapter won the Christmas House Decorations Contest, the prize consisting of five dollars in War Saving Stamps. To do their part in the National Physical Fitness program members of the Chapter have installed a special work-out room with weight-lifting courses and exercises regularly given. One of the Chapter's outstanding "he-men," Gordon Grannis, was chosen by Kappa Alpha Theta sorority to represent them in the University annual "Dream Boy" contest. Among other honors won by Idaho Alpha this year was the Intramural Debate Cup, taken by Bill Edmark and Dick Minden, E.D.A., who is Chairman of the effective Chapter Scholarship Committee.

N.Y. Mu Wins Contest

■ New York Mu at Columbia University has been awarded the Aulick-Johnson Memorial Cup for distinctive achievement in scholarship, athletics and campus activities for the past year. Ranking third scholastically among the fraternities, the Chapter won on the basis of the amassed activities of members of the Chapter. The group took the Alpha Chi Rho King's Crown Cup, awarded annually to the fraternity which has most distinguished itself in King Crown activities.

Elected to Phi Beta Kappa

■ For the first time in University of Washington history Phi Beta Kappa elections were held to honor outstanding seniors. Of nine selected, three of them were men, one of whom was E. Lawrence Howard, *Wash. A '43*, Eminent Archon of the Chapter and son of Deane D. Howard, *Okla. K '18*.

THREE new Founders and 152 new Life Members of the National Endowment Fund of Sigma Alpha Epsilon, enrolled since November 15, 1942, when the list printed in the December issue of THE RECORD was made up, brought the total as of February 5 to fifty-four Founders who had paid \$1,000 each into the National Endowment Fund and 2,274 Life Members who had paid \$50 each.

Thus an alumnus who has paid annual dues for five years has a credit of \$12.50 and can become a Life Member by paying \$37.50; an alumnus who has paid for ten years has a credit of \$25.00 and can become a Life Member by paying \$25.00. Under this plan, when an alumnus pays his annual dues, he is at the same time paying an instalment on a Life Membership.

Helmick Back from China

■ Hon. Milton J. Helmick, *Calif. A '09*, for eight years judge of the United States Court for China at Shanghai, was among the 1,451 Americans repatriated on the Steamer, *Gripsholm*, in the fall of 1942, and is living at the Park-Wilshire Hotel in Los Angeles. Judge Helmick writes that he had an interesting time in Shanghai after the outbreak of the war. He was interned in a hotel for twenty-one days but says he was not mistreated by the Japanese though he suffered the restrictions and privations arising from Jap control. The future of his court is uncertain, due to the promise of the United States to surrender extra-territorial rights in China.

Another Lion

JHROUGH the kindness of W. Stanton Forbes, *Ga. B '33*, talented young artist of Athens, Ga., the Levere Memorial Temple has received another lion, made in Florence, Italy, by Marian Overby and fired by the great Cantagalli as a special concession to Miss Overby.

The beast which measures about two feet in length and is of painted terra cotta with gold leaf has had an eventful career. Coming across the water, the crate in which he was shipped was dropped or bombed and one paw knocked off and his tail crimped. He then spent another year in process at Miss Overby's studio at Cranbrook Academy, Bloomfield Hills, Mich., where he was recast and fired.

He came out of the fire a nice tawny gold color which is matched by the blue base made and decorated in gold by Mr. Forbes. "Leo" is now on duty in the Library of the Temple where he guards the stand which holds the fraternity magazines.

Mr. Forbes worked with Miss Overby in 1940 in Florence where she was assistant to Carl Milles.

NU Grid Captains Honored

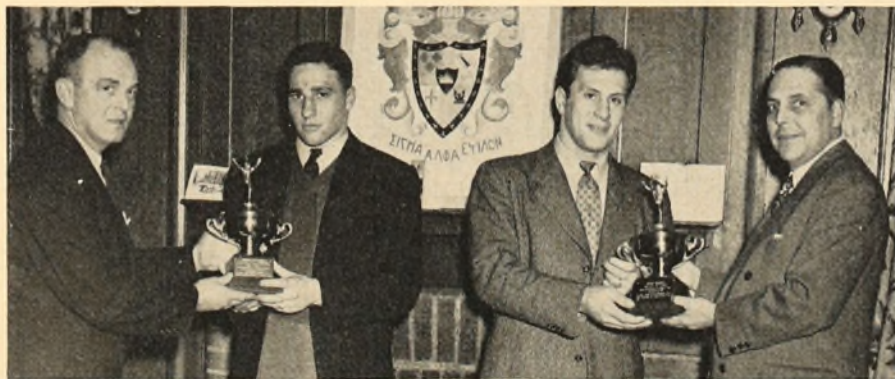

Bryan C. Collier Dies

BRYAN CHEVES COLLIER, *Ga.* B '90, member of the Supreme Council under Thomas S. Mell, first Eminent Supreme Archon, in 1889-90; secretary of the original National Board of Trustees; past president of the New York Alumni Association; Life Member of the Chapter National; and one of the most picturesque figures in the history of Sigma Alpha Epsilon, died at Allentown, Pa., December 14, 1942.

An eminent civil engineer and successful business man, he was a member of the U. S. Government party which conducted a topographical survey of the Missouri river shortly after his graduation from the University of Georgia. For many years he was president of the Cement Gun Company.

While a student he was a leading figure in the feud between Georgia Beta and the Eta chapter of Chi Phi which rocked the fraternity world and almost caused fraternities to be banned from the University of Georgia. In the light of present day opinion, the whole affair seems opera bouffe but to the young men of that day it was a serious matter in which the honor of the members of both chapters was at stake. 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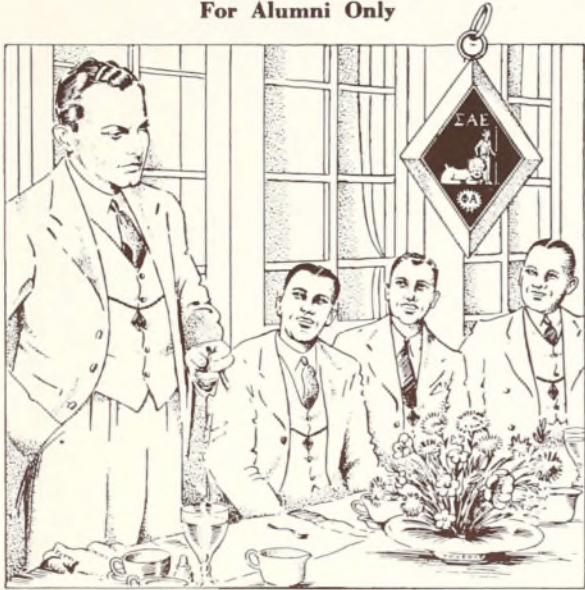
