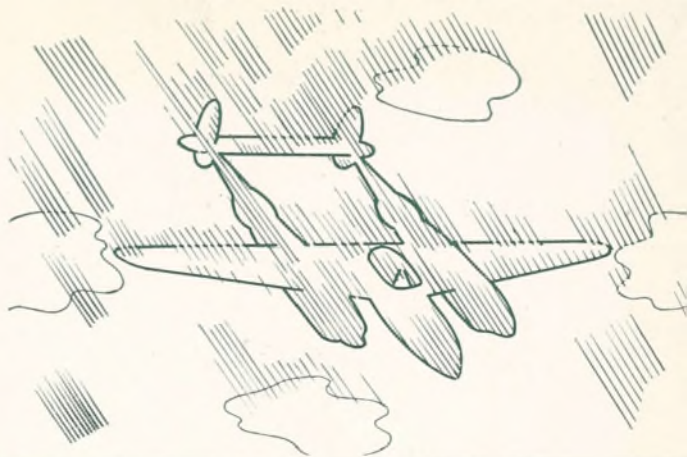


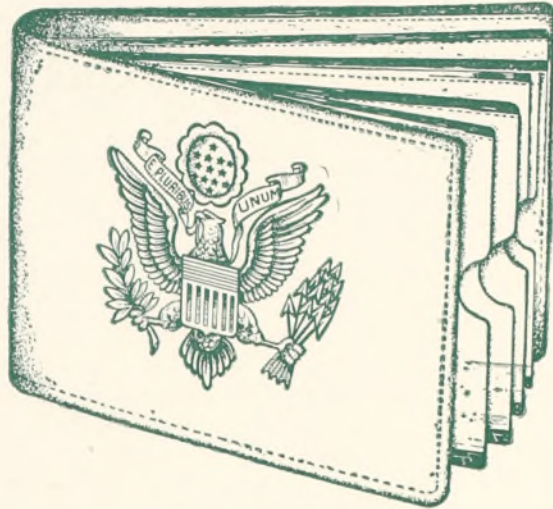

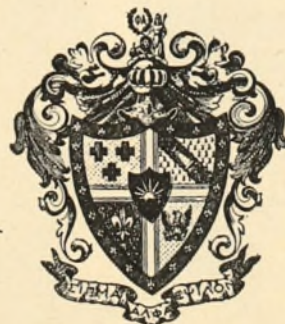

**CAPT. STANLEY M. BREWSTER
(198)**

■ Capt. Stanley M. Brewster, *Neb.* A-II '39, Army Air Corps, has been reported as losing his life when his convoy ship was sunk in the Mediterranean, April 20, 1944, by the War Department. Previously the War Department had reported him as missing in action in the North African theater of War since April 20, 1944. Capt. Brewster was with an aerial photo reconnaissance squadron and left during the first part of April for overseas. Holding a reserve commission in the ROTC, he had been in the army about three years, spending most of his duty at March Field, Calif.

**CAPT. CAREY H. BROWN, JR.
(204)**

■ Capt. Carey H. Brown, Jr., *N.Y.* A '41, Army Air Corps, son of Carey H. Brown, III, Θ '07, of Kingsport, Tenn., was killed in a plane crash over England, May 1, 1944. He was a flight leader attached to the Eighth Army Air Force. A graduate of West Point, he was a pilot of a Mustang fighter plane. He was buried in the American Air Force cemetery at Cambridge, England. For distinguished service in action, Capt. Brown was awarded the Air Medal. He also received the Distinguished Flying Cross.

**LT. CHARLES CHALMERS, JR.
(191)**

■ Lt. Charles Chalmers, Jr., *Ga.* Φ '44, was killed in action in Italy, April 28, 1944, according to a telegram received from the War Department by his parents in Atlanta, Ga. He was a Liberator bombardier in the 15th Army Air Force and just before his death he served as flight bombardier of his squadron. He trained in the United States for approximately two years before being sent overseas. He was awarded the Purple Heart posthumously.

**CAPT. HENRY R. FAUCETTE
(163)**

■ Captain Henry Roy Faucette, Jr., *Ala.* I '40, *Ala.* A-M, was killed in a plane crash at Chickasha, Okla., March 17, 1944, when he was returning from a routine trip to Oklahoma City. Listed as EAE's 163rd Gold Star in the May issue of THE RECORD, he was supply officer for the Department Air Training, Field Artillery School Staff. He had taken the liaison pilot training in 1943 and had been attached to the Staff since he received his wings in July, 1943. He was called into service in September, 1941, and attended officers training school at Ft. Sill, Okla. On the day the Japs struck Pearl Harbor he was en route to Ft. Bragg. Captain Faucette was to embark on the *Normandie* in January, 1942, when it met disaster in New York. He then was sent back

to Ft. Sill where he was attached to the Staff and served in different divisions until February, 1943, at which time he took his liaison pilot training. His brother, 1st Lt. William Lee Faucette, *Ala.* A-M '42, Army Air Corps, was killed in a plane crash at Houma, La., August 22, 1943, and was listed in the December, 1943, issue of THE RECORD as EAE's 116th Gold Star. He was buried at Birmingham, Ala., September 1, 1943. Their mother, Mrs. Henry Roy Faucette of Birmingham, informed the National Office that both men were wearing the EAE insignia ring when they crashed.

**CAPT. FRANK W. FLANAGAN
(188)**

■ Capt. Frank Wesley Flanagan, *Miss.* Θ '38, was fatally injured in a plane crash in Kingston, England, May 1, 1944, according to word received by his parents in Leland, Miss. He had been stationed in England since October, 1942, and held the Air Medal for missions over enemy territory. He enlisted in the Army in January, 1941. He was a test pilot. In England since October, 1942, he revolutionized the CBS program with jingles of his own composition and the program broadcast from England was a marked change from the routine.

**LT. DONALD F. GRAVES
(201)**

■ Lt. Donald F. Graves, *Maine* A '44, pilot of a Liberator bomber, was killed in action in Algiers, April 27, 1944, according to word received by his parents from the War Department. He entered the service in June, 1942, and received his pilot training at Albany, Ga., and Greenville, Miss. He was commissioned a second lieutenant at Columbus, Miss. He received advanced training in four-engined schools at Blythe, Calif., Clovis, N.M., and Tucson, Ariz. He went overseas in March, 1944, after a period of training at Langley Field, Va. On January 3, he was married to Miss Joanne Solie, University of Maine, '42.

**2ND LT. WILLIAM G. HALE
(183)**

■ 2nd Lt. William G. Hale, *N.Y.* Σ-Φ '43, bombardier, was killed in a plane crash in North Africa, January 30, 1944. A letter from Gen. H. H. Arnold was issued to his widow in West Hartford, Conn., concerning Lt. Hale's achievements in his training although he never reached combat.

**LT. EUGENE E. HAIR
(211)**

■ Lt. (jg) Eugene E. Hair, *Wash.* B '31, medical officer, was killed in action in the

performance of duty, according to the Navy Department, July 7, 1944. He was believed to have been killed in the invasion. He had served in Africa, Sicily, Salerno, and England. Lt. Hair was a physician on leave from the University of Buffalo Medical school faculty since May, 1943, when he received his commission and entered the Navy. He had served as medical officer on a LST.

**MAJ. ALVA E. HEMMING
(185)**

■ Maj. Alva Eugene Hemming, *La.* E '35, Army Air Corps, was killed at Eglin Field, Fla., May 3, 1944, when his parachute was struck by his burning plane. His plane caught fire and he was fatally injured when he attempted to parachute to safety. He volunteered for service three years ago, receiving his training at Hicks Field, Fort Worth, Randolph Field, San Antonio, and completed his course in Selma where he received his wings and commission as second lieutenant. At the time of his death he was commanding officer of the Gunnery School at Eglin. Members of the Gunnery School adopted an official memorial to him. It was in the form of an eulogy and was placed permanently in the files of the organization. He was buried in Meridian, Miss.

**2ND LT. EARLE HEPBURN
(216)**

■ 2nd Lt. Earle Hepburn, *Pa.* Θ '41, Army Air Force pilot, was killed while attempting to land his plane on the runway of the Army Air Field at Millville, N.J., July 12, 1944. In September, 1942, he had subjected himself to an operation which, two surgeons advised, almost surely would prove fatal. After being rejected by the Army, he submitted to the operation which was successful and soon he was in training with the Air Forces. He was a former University of Pennsylvania athlete. He was married June 5, 1944.

**1ST LT. DORMAN H. HERNDON
(190)**

■ 1st Lt. Dorman H. Herndon, *Colo.* Z '40, Marine pilot of a heavy bomber, was killed in action in the South Pacific, March 25, 1944, when his plane was shot down while he was returning from a raid over Rabaul, New Britain, according to word received by his mother in Denver, Colo., from the Navy Department. He was credited with successful bombing attacks on numerous ammunition stores and enemy installation in a wide area in the South Pacific and was in line for promotion to squadron leader. He enlisted in the Marines in 1942 and went overseas in October, 1943. He narrowly escaped injury on March 14, when his bomber was struck by flak.

**ENSIGN FRANK V. LANHAM
(165)**

■ Ensign Frank V. Lanham, Jr., *Texas* P '38, was killed in a routine flight Naval training plane crash near Pasco, Wash., May 21, 1943. He was acting as an instructor at the time. He was on duty at the Naval Air Station in Pasco.

**CAPT. MURPHY LENTS
(172)**

■ Capt. Murphy Kennedy Lents, *Okla.* K '38, was killed in a heavy bomber crash in the mountains near Millbrook, N.J., February 22, 1944. In 1942 he was a member of the 344th Squadron, 98th Bomb Group which was one of the first U.S. Air Corps to fly to Africa. He took part in bombing the German supply base at Tobruk, Bengazi, Sousse and Suda Bay, and followed the Army across Africa, flying from temporary air bases in the desert. Captain Lents participated in the bombings of Crete and Navarino Bay in Greece and was flying in the first flight of bombers to hit Italy when the Italian fleet was surprised in the Bay of Naples. For the African campaign, he received four stars on the service ribbon, the Air Medal, an Oak Leaf Cluster and the Distinguished Flying Cross. Back in the U.S. in 1943, he was instructor at the School of Applied Tactics in Orlando, Fla. Later he was placed in charge of a unit engaged in experimental work. While returning from Bangor, Maine, to Fort Dix, N.J., the bomber crash occurred. His brother is Max R. Lents, *Okla.* K '36, of Cotton Valley, La.

**2ND LT. GORDON L. LYON, JR.
(193)**

■ 2nd Lt. Gordon L. Lyon, Jr., *La.* E '41, who was listed in the August, 1943, issue of *THE RECORD*, as missing in action after head-on crash with a Jap Zero, February 14, 1943, has been recorded as lost by the Navy Department, according to word received from his father in Indianola, Miss. In the May issue of *THE RECORD* information was given concerning him as missing at the same time with Harold R. Stewart, *Ariz.* A '41, who was shot down in the South Pacific. They were part of a Corsair fighter escort.

**A/C HARRY H. McALISTER
(194)**

■ A/C Harry Hill McAlister, Jr., *Tenn.* N '46, was killed in a training plane crash near Newport Army Air Field, Ark., May 14, 1944. He was killed when his plane fell two miles south of the air field. He had been in the service for 15 months and was in basic training. He was a freshman at Sewanee prior to entering service.

**LT. (JG) JAMES W. McDONALD
(205)**

■ Lt. (jg) James W. McDonald, *Ill.* B '39, captain and center of the 1938 football team at the University of Illinois, was killed in action in the South Pacific, June 12, 1944, according to word received by his mother in Arcola, Ill. He was on the All-American football team which played the New York Giants in the All-Star game in Chicago in August, 1939. He entered the Navy in 1942 and was graduated from the Harvard Naval school as a supply officer. He left the United States about eight months ago aboard a destroyer bound for the South Pacific. It is believed that he may have been killed off the island of Saipan or in the preliminary stages of the battle between the Philippines and the Marianas.

**LT. COL. JOHN A. McNAUGHTON
(214)**

■ Lt. Col. John A. McNaughton, *Va.* O '14, of the Operations and Training Division, Anti-aircraft Artillery Command Headquarters, Fort Totten, Queens, N.Y., died while on an inspec-

tion tour at Newport, R.I., June 1, 1944. He had served as Captain of infantry in World War I and was overseas for almost two years. In October, 1942, he was ordered to active duty as a major in the Coast Artillery.

**2ND LT. WILLIAM MILES
(197)**

■ 2nd Lt. William Miles, *Iowa* Δ '43, pilot of a Liberator bomber, was killed in action in Italy, May 17, 1944. The War Department notification came to his widow at her home in Helena, Ark. While attending Drake University, he was sworn into the Army Air Corps at Fort Des Moines, Iowa, December 31, 1941. His father, Major Frank Miles, is one of Iowa's most widely known legionnaires, having been editor for many years of the *Iowa Legionnaire*. He is public relations officer and assistant legal officer of state selective service.

**2ND LT. LEIGH J. MONSON, JR.
(160)**

■ 2nd Lt. Leigh Judd Monson, Jr., *N.D.* B '41, who was reported in the May issue of *THE RECORD* as being deceased, February 25, 1944, according to word from the War Department, was killed in action over Embden, Germany, February 4, 1943. This information was provided by his mother in Grand Forks, N.D., in June. His father is Leigh Judd Monson, *N.D.* A '12, who is on duty in Italy. Lt. Monson was with a bombardment squadron. He was a cadet at Kelley Field. He went to England in October, 1942. The crash of his bomber occurred when a German drove his plane directly into the Fortress. Lt. Monson was awarded the Air Medal and Purple Heart posthumously.

**CAPT. LESTER T. MOONEY
(171)**

■ Capt. Lester T. Mooney, *Okla.* K '40, who was reported as ΣAE's Gold Star No. 171 in the May issue of *THE RECORD*, was killed in action near Saidor, New Guinea, February 9, 1944. This detailed information was received after the magazine went to press with the general statement that he was killed in the South Pacific. He held the Silver Star for gallantry at Buna, New Guinea. He was en route to the Philippines with an infantry unit when Pearl Harbor was bombed, and later fought in the defense of Java. He then went to Australia to reorganize his outfit for the New Guinea campaign.

**LT. CARLETON D. MORRIS
(184)**

■ Lt. (sg) Carleton D. Morris, *Ohio* Δ '25, Merchant Marine radio officer, was killed when the ammunition ship on which he was

aboard, was bombed at Bari, Italy, December 2, 1943. The tragedy was referred to as a second Pearl Harbor as other ships were set ablaze when the ammunition ship was hit. He entered the Merchant Marine in September, 1943, and was assigned to a Liberty ship. He had been a radio man in the first war. He made one trip to England before leaving on a second trip last October. His son, Robert, is also a radio officer with the rank of Ensign in the Merchant Marine and is in New Guinea.

**RUSSELL D. O'DELL
(187)**

■ 2nd Lt. Russell D. O'Dell, *N.C.* E '40, Army Air Force bombardier, was killed in a Liberator crash in Tunisia, January 19, 1944. He was killed when making his landing at final destination overseas. He entered the air force in December, 1942, and received his training at Santa Ana, Calif., Demming and Carlsbad, N.M., Tucson, Ariz., and Westover Field, Mass. He left Westover Field for overseas, January 12, 1944.

**CAPT ARLO L. OLSON
(206)**

■ Capt. Arlo L. Olson, *S.D.* E '40, was killed in action in Italy, October 28, 1943. He was awarded the Silver Star posthumously. His widow and daughter, who was born December 20, 1943, live in Baton Rouge, La.

**CAPT. DEAN B. RAYMOND
(182)**

■ Capt. Dean B. Raymond, *Ill.* B '41, USMCR, was killed when his Navy land plane crashed at the Marine Corps air facility at Pollokville, N.C., May 3, 1944. Capt. Raymond had been on duty in the South Pacific, returning to the United States for training as executive officer in a new Marine Corps flying unit. He was credited with two Jap planes shot down in the Guadalcanal area. He was one of the original Flying Illini of the University of Illinois who left the university to go into Navy flying early in the war. During his service in the South Pacific he was awarded two citations.

**A/C WILLIAM E. ROWLAND
(200)**

■ A/C William Edwin Rowland, *Calif.* Δ '44, was killed when he crashed while night flying at Strother Army Air Field at Winfield, Kan., January 18, 1944. He was an outstanding cadet and a scholar. He was the son of Guy Edwin Rowland, *W.C.* P '12, of Washington, D.C.

**SGT. FRANK SHERMAN
(186)**

■ Sgt. Frank Sherman, *Ga.* E '41, Army Signal Corps, died as a result of scrub typhus in Finschhafen, New Guinea, February 16, 1944, after being overseas for a year. He had enlisted in January, 1942, in the Air Cadets but was honorably discharged in June because of night blindness. After recuperating from pneumonia, he re-enlisted in September, 1942. He was with a radar outfit in New Guinea when he acquired typhus.

**F/O WILLIAM C. SHINN
(192)**

■ Flight Officer William C. Shinn, *Va.* E '45, bombardier in the U.S. Army Air Corps, was killed in a crash of a four engined bomber at New Underwood, 20 miles west of Rapid City, S.D., May 18, 1944. He enlisted in 1942 and entered the service in 1943 at Roanoke, Va., as an aviation cadet. He was graduated from gunnery school at Las Vegas, Nev., October 30, 1943, and was graduated as a bombardier at Victorville, Calif., March 18, 1944. He had been based at Rapid City airfield. He was one of ten men killed in the crash.

PFC. PAUL C. SULLIVAN
(202)

■ Pfc. Paul C. Sullivan, N.Y. P '39, radio operator and tail gunner of a Flying Fortress, who was listed as missing in action over Germany since November 13, 1943, has been officially classified by the War Department as having been killed. The Flying Fortress disappeared while en route to Berlin. The large plane had left the British Isles on November 13, and was last seen on that day, flying over the southwest coast of Denmark. His parents

in Pittsfield, Mass., were first notified that Paul was missing, November 26. He went overseas in June, 1943, and received gunnery course in England. He was a veteran of several months of bombing missions.

LT. BERT L. WEST
(178)

■ Lt. (sg) Bert L. West, Jr., Ohio Δ '36, Wis. A, was killed in a plane crash near Danbury, Conn., March 30, 1944. On March 1, he had reported to the Naval Air Field at Atlanta, Ga., where he had completed his instru-

ment training in twin-engine planes and had his orders to report for further training at Fort Worth, Texas. When on a routine flight, March 30, delivering his field commander from Atlanta to Boston, Mass., he was killed in a crash. Lt. West owned and flew his own plane and was a member of the Columbus, Ohio, Civil Air Patrol before joining the Naval Air Corps. He received his wings in December, 1942, at Pensacola, Fla. He was then sent to Bunker Hill, Ind., as a Naval air instructor. He is survived by his widow and three small daughters.

CAPT. AUBREY BENTON, JR.

■ Capt. Aubrey Benton, Jr., Mont. B '34, is still missing, according to word received from his father in Tacoma, Wash. Capt. Benton was listed in the December, 1942, issue of THE RECORD, as missing in action while serving in Cebu, since April, 1942. He was stationed at Lowry Field, Denver, Colo., until August, 1941, and he went overseas on the USS *President Pierce*. At that time he was a first lieutenant, serving as a bombsight instructor in the Air Force. In the Philippines he was stationed at Clarke Field near Manila. His last letter was written from Bataan, March 6, 1942. His last cable was Cebu, April 7, 1942; however it is believed his message was sent to Cebu for transmission. His parents believe he was lost on the last day of fighting at Bataan or was one of the men who suffered the March of Prisoners from Bataan, and may still be a prisoner.

CAPT. WILLIAM W. GALT

■ Capt. William W. Galt, Mont. A '42, was reported missing in action in Italy, May 29, 1944, according to word received from his sister in Great Falls, Mont. At the time he was fighting with the forces at Anzio. He had been overseas for 18 months and participated in the landing at Algiers in November, 1943. He fought at Salerno and Cassino. Last December he was decorated with the Purple Heart and the Silver Star. In February he was again decorated with the Purple Heart and Oak Leaf Cluster for heroic action. His brother is Pvt. Jack E. Galt, Mont. A '44, in England.

CAPT. LEWIS GORDON

■ Capt. Lewis Gordon, N.C. E '38, USMCR, has been missing in action in the Southwest Pacific since June 30, 1943. In March, 1944, he was awarded the Air Medal for his role in leading a 16-plane patrol in an attack that disrupted an enemy bombing run against ground forces making the initial attacks on Rendova Island, June 30, 1943. Capt. Gordon's flight destroyed 14 Jap fighters and probably shot down four others. He entered the Marine Corps Reserve as an Aviation cadet in December, 1940.

2ND LT. ROBERT L. KLOS

■ 2nd Lt. Robert L. Klos, Mont. B '45, has been missing in action since May 5, 1944, over Yugoslavia. He was a pilot of a P-38, and his parents were informed that he was missing, May 23. He received his wings and was commissioned a second lieutenant, December 5, 1943, at Williams Field, Ariz. He had 14 missions to his credit and was stationed in Italy.

PVT. FOREST L. MINER

■ Pvt. Forest Lee Miner, Wyo. A '42, Medical Detachment, Infantry, has been missing in action in North Africa since September 17, 1943, according to word received from the War Department by his relatives in Casper, Wyo. After receiving this information they were informed by a chaplain in Miner's regiment that he may be a prisoner of the Germans. The chaplain explained that the area in which Private Miner disappeared had been searched and that no casualties had been found which had been identified as him.

T/SGT. CECIL G. MORTON

■ T/Sgt. Cecil G. Morton, Mich. A '42, radio operator on a B-17, was reported in May as missing in action over Germany since April 13, 1944, according to a telegram received by his mother in Adrian, Mich. He had been awarded the Purple Heart, the Air Medal and Oak Leaf Cluster. He had been graduated from gunnery school before going overseas.

LT. OSCAR S. ROGERS, JR.

■ Lt. Oscar S. Rogers, Jr., Tex. P '44, has been reported as missing in action over Germany since April 29, 1944. He entered the service November 18, 1942, and received his wings as a bombardier October 2, 1943, at Denning, N.M. He went overseas in March, 1944. His home is in Henderson, Tex.

1ST LT. RAY W. SHARP

■ 1st Lt. Ray Wilson Sharp, Idaho A '43, was reported as missing in flight, February 18, 1944, in Alaska. He had been stationed in Fairbanks since October, 1942, but had been back to the States for further training. Relatives in Nevada, Mo., received a government report in June that he was still recorded as missing. He was a navigator and bombardier and went into the Air Corps in January, 1942, taking officers training at Ellington Field, Texas.

LT. FRED R. BAKER

■ 1st Lt. Fred Roger Baker, Ky. E '38, Paratrooper with the Airborne Forces, has been reported by the War Department as missing in action since D-Day over France, June 7, 1944. He had been in England since April, 1943. He was called into service through his reserve status in 1940. He had trained with the infantry, the ski troops and with paratroopers and had seen service in the United States and Iceland before going to England.

LT. WALTER S. WHITMAN

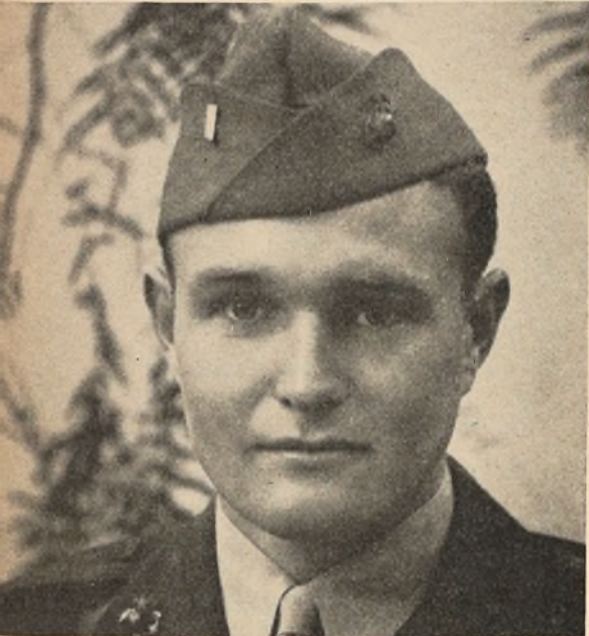
■ Lt. Walter S. Whitman, Ohio E '40, pilot of a Ventura bomber, has been reported as missing near Attu since March 25, 1944, after failing to return from a reconnaissance and bombing mission during a storm. He enlisted in February, 1941, and after training was sent to Pearl Harbor, January 6, 1942. He made almost 100 missions in a PBV. After being injured and hospitalized for several weeks he was sent to Midway where he figured in that battle. On a patrol flight his ship ran out of gas and he and his crew floated on the water for three days. His ship was refueled and he returned to Midway for more work. After leave in Miami Beach, Fla., he was sent to Oregon to fly Ventura bombers and left there for Attu.

PVT. WILLIAM DEL WOLFF

■ Pvt. William Delbert Wolff, Ill. Ψ-Ω '43, has been missing in action in Italy since December 2, 1943. After receiving his basic training at Camp Robinson, Ark., he was sent overseas in September, 1943. He was in Africa and then was sent to Italy in November. In error he was listed in the May, 1944, issue of THE RECORD as holding the rank of lieutenant.

LT. ROY C. UHLMANN

■ Lt. Roy Charles Uhlmann, Mich. I-B '41, was reported by the Navy Department as missing in action, December 29, 1943, while serving on the submarine, *USS Copelin*. The submarine was not reported as missing in news releases until March, 1944. That month his parents in Birmingham, Mich., were informed by the Navy that no further news was obtainable. His twin brother, Ensign Robert W. Uhlmann, Mich. I-B '41, was killed in action at Kanchoe Bay, T.H., December 7, 1941.

CAPT. GARNET P. FRANCIS

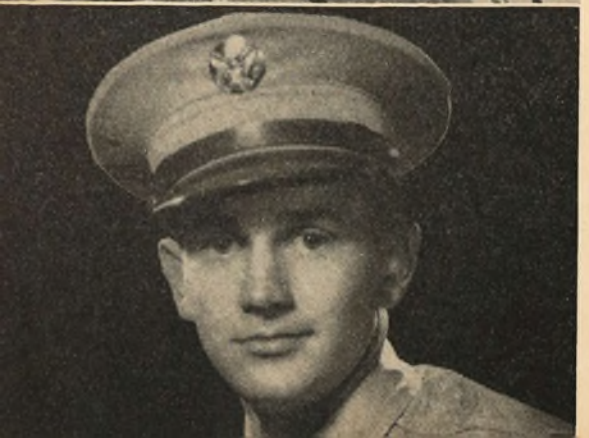
■ Capt. Garnet P. Francis, Jr., Pa. Ω '34, dental surgeon, is a prisoner of the Japanese, as was announced in the December, 1943, issue of THE RECORD. He first was reported as missing in action at Bataan. He received an Army commission as a dental surgeon upon completing his professional training and was assigned to duty at Manila in 1941. According to press dispatches at the time the Philippines fell to the Japs, Dr. Francis remained in command of a field unit. A nurse evacuated from Bataan stated that Capt. Francis was seriously ill with malaria at the time she left.

LT. JOSEPH A. PAGENKOPF

■ Lt. Joseph A. Pagenkopf, Minn. A '42, is a prisoner of the Germans, according to word received by his parents in St. Paul, Minn., May 18, 1944. He had flown from England as a co-pilot on a mission to Germany, April 11, 1944, and never returned. He had taken the mission as a co-pilot in order to get experience before taking his own crew over. He enlisted in the Army Air Corps in May 1942. He received training in Santa Ana, Calif., King City, Colo., Stockton, Calif., and Hobbs, N.M., and obtained his crew in Salt Lake City, Utah. Lt. Pagenkopf and his crew left Kearney, Neb., for England.

CAPT. J. R. RICHARDSON

■ Capt. J. R. Richardson, Mont. A '38, who had been missing since November 11, 1942, and recorded in THE RECORD as the fraternity's ninth member to be missing in action, is now reported as a prisoner of the Japs at Philippine Military Prison Camp No. 2. An undated card bearing the customary printed messages with appropriate ones underscored

Lt. Charles Alfke, Jr.

■ Lt. Charles J. Alfke, Jr., Pa. 6 '40, has been commended by Vice Admiral H. Kent Hewitt for outstanding performance of duty during the amphibious invasion of Italy, September 9-10, 1943. The commendation was dated December 30, 1943. It read: "As officer in charge of an assault boat wave, you exhibited aggressive leadership under fire and extreme determination in directing the assault boats to the proper beaches in the Gulf of Salerno against heavy enemy machine gun and artillery fire from shore defenses." He enlisted before Pearl Harbor and has been on active service in many places overseas for more than 14 months. He was a lieutenant junior grade at the time of the commendation.

S/Sgt. Duell B. Barnes

■ The Air Medal and an Oak Leaf Cluster have been awarded to S/Sgt. Duell B. Barnes, Ga. E '46, for exceptionally meritorious achievement in accomplishing with distinction heavy bombardment missions against enemy-occupied Europe. He was promoted from sergeant and is a turret gunner in England.

Capt. Jack Bingham

■ Capt. Jack Bingham, Ala. M '39, who risked his life in an effort to save his comrades in a burning ammunition truck somewhere in Italy, has been commended by the general officer in command of his anti-aircraft unit of the Fifth Army. He led a volunteer detail to the scene of a truck which had been hit by enemy fire. Discovering the ammunition on the truck exploding, he ordered his detail to a place of safety and proceeded alone to approach the burning truck and vicinity for wounded. He was a first lieutenant at the time and entered the Army in June, 1942.

Maj. Ralph A. Blakelock

■ The Distinguished Flying Cross and a fifth Air Medal for combat duty in the Central Pacific have been awarded to Maj. Ralph A. Blakelock, Ohio E '42. The awards were made in May, according to information from his mother in Auburn, N.Y.

1st Lt. Calvert S. Bowie

■ The Air Medal has been awarded to 1st Lt. Calvert S. Bowie, N.H. A '40, USMCR, who is carried on the records of the Marine Corps in Washington as missing in action, for his meritorious achievement in aerial flight against enemy Japanese forces in the Solomon Islands area on the night of May 14, 1943. The decoration and citation are being held in Washington in case he should be available for personal presentation. A copy of the citation was sent to his father, G. Calvert Bowie. Lt. Bowie was listed as missing in the August, 1943, issue of THE RECORD. The citation read:

For meritorious achievement while participating in aerial flight as a pilot in a Marine Torpedo Bombing Squadron in the Solomon Islands area on the night of May 14, 1943. Becoming separated from his flight in the vicinity of Bougainville Island, 1st Lt. Bowie, despite extremely bad weather and poor visibility, dropped through a heavy overcast and sighted a 3,000-ton Japanese cargo ship. Sweeping low to attack, he scored two direct hits which burst the vessel into flames and left her subsequently stranded upon a beach with her after section completely destroyed. His daring aggressiveness, maintained with utter disregard of personal safety, was in keeping with the highest traditions of the U.S. Naval Service.

Capt. John F. Burke

■ Capt. John F. Burke, Mont. A '42, who died in Tunisia, January 7, 1944, and who was reported in THE RECORD as EAE's 150th Gold Star, received a commendation for meritorious service by direct command of Gen Dwight D.

Eisenhower two days before his death. Capt. Burke's citation resulted from entering battle areas to secure salvage parts from destroyed tanks and utilizing such parts to repair armored type vehicles for combat use. He was serving in the Army Tank Corps as a battalion maintenance and inspection officer when he was killed. The commendation was issued by the American headquarters of the North African theater of operations.

Maj. John A. Burden

■ Maj. John A. Burden, Calif. Δ '27, who is now on duty in Chungking, received the Silver Star and the Purple Heart for participation in action on Guadalcanal. He was practicing surgery in the Hawaiian Islands and upon entering the Army was placed in intelligence work because of his background, having been born and reared in Japan. He was sent with the first division of the Army to the South Pacific where he saw action on Guadalcanal, the Russells, Rendova, Munda, Bairoko and Vella Lavella. While doing reconnaissance the plane he was in was shot down. This resulted in a three-hour swim in shark infested waters. After the Vella Lavella campaign he returned to the States for a short tour of teaching and then was assigned to headquarters in China. Major Burden said that THE RECORD follows him faithfully despite his many changes of address.



Lt. Col. Leo F. Dusard, Jr.

■ Lt. Col. Leo F. Dusard, Jr., Mo. B '37, commander of a fighter group in the South Pacific, has been decorated with the Air Medal for meritorious achievements in aerial operations. At the time of the award he had shot down two Jap fighter planes since he had gone overseas in November, 1943.

Capt. William C. Craddock

■ Capt. William C. Craddock, Tenn. Z '40, Army Air Force, has received the Air Medal with seven Oak Leaf clusters. He was the pilot of a B-26, "Jabbo's Sky King, II," and participated in 40 missions over Messina, Naples, Rome, Pantelleria, Sardinia and France. He was with the oldest medium bomber group in the Mediterranean area. He returned to the United States and is now located in Miami Beach, Fla.

Maj. Melvin Engstrom

■ Maj. Melvin Engstrom, Wyo. A '37, has received the Air Medal for heroism displayed in an air raid over the Mediterranean. He was a football star at the University of Wyoming and at West Point. He studied advanced aviation at Texas fields after being graduated from West Point.

Lt. Thomas P. Forman

■ The Legion of Merit was awarded posthumously to Lt. Thomas P. Forman, Jr., Nev. A '43, Army Ordnance Company, who was killed in Sicily, August 9, 1943, and who was listed as EAE's 124th Gold Star. The citation relating to the award said:

For exceptionally meritorious conduct in the performance of outstanding service from April 15 to August 9, 1943. Lt. Forman's efforts were a primary contributing factor in the successful development, manufacture and test firing of the 81 mm Mortar Wire Entanglement Remover and the 81 mm Mortar Bangalore Torpedo weapon, both of which materially assisted in the successful Sicilian landing. In addi-

tion, as maintenance officer, he displayed unusual ability, initiative, foresight and leadership which were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service.

Maj. Olin E. Gilbert

■ The Distinguished Flying Cross, the Air Medal and five Oak Leaf Clusters have been awarded to Maj. Olin E. Gilbert, Mo. B '39, Ala. M, who has been stationed in England as a fighter pilot for the past ten months. He has engaged in more than 50 missions over Germany and was still fighting on extended time when this news was sent to the National Office in June. He has been flying with the largest operational Thunderbolt group in England. He made several of the historic raids on Berlin and his group often escorted large formations of Flying Fortresses and Liberators deep within the German Reich. He served as a squadron commander on the combat missions and has done dive-bombing with his P-47 Thunderbolt. He was credited with personally downing a Nazi plane in the heavy American Air Force attacks over France. At the time he was serving as commander of the Eighth Air Force fighter squadron in England.

Capt. James F. Hackler

■ Capt. James F. Hackler, Jr., N.C. E '42, pilot of a Thunderbolt P-47, has been decorated with the Distinguished Flying Cross with second and third Oak Leaf Clusters. He participated in the invasion of France on D-Day and has been in combat for approximately 10 months. He was graduated from the U.S. Military Academy.

Maj. John V. Hinkel

■ Maj. John Vincent Hinkel, N.Y. M '31, has received the Purple Heart, after being wounded by four fragments of a German 88-millimeter shell which landed five feet away while he was on a special reconnaissance mission northwest of Cassino. Major Hinkel is a member of the news staff of *The New York Times*. He was in a jeep when the shell landed and it virtually blew him out of the vehicle. In April he was assigned to the headquarters staff of the Allied Control Commission in Naples.

Col. Cornelius C. Holcomb

■ The Bronze Star for heroic action in the face of enemy fire has been awarded to Lt. Col. Cornelius C. Holcomb, Wash. A '30. The award was made for his activity while he was in command of quartermasters at the Anzio beachhead. The citation accompanying the award related that on January 26 he personally supervised the transfer of trucks from one bomb-struck LST to another in the midst of falling flak and bombs. Later he organized the resumption of supply lines in the area after an air raid set fire to a truck loaded with ammunition. He ran to the scene, disregarding the exploding ammunition, burning gasoline and falling bombs. Previously his group had been awarded a Presidential unit citation.

Comdr. Byron S. Huie, Jr.

■ Comdr. Byron S. Huie, Jr., Wyo. A '27, has received the Legion of Merit for exceptional meritorious service in the Middle East. The award was indicated as the first made by the Army to an officer of the Navy in the Middle East. He was attached to the famous British Eighth Army and saw action at El Alamein and also commanded the Massawa naval base at Eritrea where he quelled an Axis inspired native uprising and removed a dangerous sunken Italian mine-layer that menaced Allied shipping in the harbor. After a 30-day leave in the States, he was assigned to another theatre of action.

Lt. Newton B. Jones

■ 1st Lt. Newton B. Jones, *Tenn.* Z '40, has been awarded the Legion of Merit for outstanding work in establishing bases in the Aleutians. Although an infantry officer, he was in charge of the initial landings of small boats and barges at Amchitka and Kiska.

Brig. Gen. John M. Lentz

■ Brig. Gen. John Max Lentz, *Pa.* Δ '17, has been awarded the Distinguished Service Medal for meritorious service in the Army Ground Forces. He has been with the Plans and Training Officer Headquarters, Army Ground Forces, Washington, D.C.

Pfc. Phelps W. Long

■ The Silver Star was awarded posthumously to Pfc. Phelps W. Long, Jr., *Fla.* T '45, USMCR, who was killed on the fighting front in the Southwest Pacific, December 16, 1943. He was recorded in the March issue of *THE RECORD* as 2AE's Gold Star No. 152. The award was for conspicuous gallantry during the Marine Corps attack on Bougainville island. He attempted to rescue another Marine wounded by Japanese fire when he was mortally wounded by a Jap sniper.

Lt. Taylor Malone

■ 2nd Lt. Taylor Malone, Jr., *Tenn.* Z '41, has received a second cluster to the Air Medal for meritorious participation in anti-submarine patrol flights with an Air Support Command in Northwestern Africa. He is a pursuit pilot in Corsica after being transferred from Sicily last December.

Lt. Dudley G. McBee, Jr.

■ A posthumous award of the Air Medal, June 5, 1944, was made to 2nd Lt. Dudley G. McBee, Jr., *Miss.* Θ '41, who was reported in the March issue of *THE RECORD* as 2AE's Gold Star No. 155. More details were carried in the May issue of the magazine. The award was made by Lt. Gen. Millard F. Harmon, commanding U.S. Army Forces in the South Pacific, and was for meritorious achievement while participating as a fighter pilot from October 29 to November 10, 1943, in sustained combat operational missions. He was killed by anti-aircraft fire while on a strafing mission over Bougainville, December 6, 1943.

Lt. Robert D. Rand

■ Lt. Robert D. Rand, *Calif.* A '41, Army Air Corps, who was reported in the May issue of *THE RECORD* as 2AE's 175th Gold Star, having been killed in the European Area, May 1, 1943, was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross before the War Department notified his parents in Oakland, Calif., that he was missing in action over occupied Europe. He was pilot of a B-17 bomber and had taken part in at least eight raids over German-held territory. He was credited with destroying at least three planes.

Lt. John L. Roehlk

■ Lt. John L. Roehlk, Jr., *Mo.* B '43, pilot of a Flying Fortress, has been awarded the Air Medal for meritorious achievement on five combat missions over Europe, an Eighth Army Air Force bomber station in England announced in May. He entered the services in July, 1942.

Lt. Col. J. Clarke Selman

■ Lt. Col. J. Clarke Selman, *Okla.* K '38, who holds the Distinguished Flying Cross, commanded a fighter group in the South Pacific which received two citations from President Roosevelt for its excellent record. After two

years in the aerial war in the South Pacific, he returned to the United States and now is assigned to Miami, Fla.

Lt. Bittner F. Snead

■ 2nd Lt. Bittner F. Snead, *Pa.* Ω '43, has received two Oak Leaf Clusters to his Air Medal, marking the completion of 15 combat missions over Nazi Europe as a navigator of a Flying Fortress. He was sent overseas in October, 1943, and received the Air Medal in December. He entered the service in August, 1942, and was classified a bombardier, receiving his wings at San Marcos, Texas. On reclassification, he received his navigator's wings at San Marcos.

Maj. Robert W. Spence

■ Maj. Robert W. Spence, *Texas* P '42, has been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross at a B-24 Liberator base in England, as announced by Gen. James H. Doolittle, commanding general of the Eighth Air Force in England. He was cited for extraordinary achievement while serving as a pilot of a B-24 on many bombardment missions over enemy occupied Continental Europe. Displaying great courage and skill, he had materially aided in the successful completion of each mission and his actions were an inspiring example for his fellow flyers. He participated in the Sicilian-Italian campaign and the onslaught against Germany from operational bases in England. His longest mission was a raid on Nazi occupied Norway when he remained aloft for 10 hours. He holds a Unit Citation and the Air Medal with three Oak Leaf Clusters.

Lt. James L. Sprunt

■ Lt. James L. Sprunt, *N.C.* Z '36, who is in full command of a minesweeper in Mediterranean waters, has been cited for "skillful and courageous handling" of this type vessel, after he had swept a heavily-mined channel to clear a way for transports and loading boats while his own ship was under fire from shore batteries and undergoing bombing from enemy planes. He recently was promoted to his present rank.

Lt. Earl R. Stone, Jr.

■ Mr. and Mrs. Earl Reynolds Stone of Los Angeles, Calif., parents of the late Lt. Earl R. Stone, *Calif.* Δ '40, who was killed in action at Bataan peninsula, March 24, 1942, received a personal letter from General H. H. Arnold and an engraved scroll from the President of the United States on Memorial Day, 1944, in memoriam to their son. Lt. Stone was 2AE's 37th Gold Star and an extensive article on his gallant career was carried in the December, 1942, issue of *THE RECORD*. His brother, Lt. Wescott B. Stone, III, *Calif.* Γ '42, Commander of a B-24 Liberator Bomber, has been on long missions over Germany. Wescott's photograph was reproduced in the May, 1944, issue of *THE RECORD*. He was referred to as the brother of Lt. Earl Reynolds Stone, Jr., instructor in bomber school at the time. This was an error on the part of *THE RECORD* staff as Lt. Earl Stone was previously listed as a Gold Star.

Admiral Mahlon S. Tisdale

■ A Gold Star in lieu of a second Legion of Merit in recognition of his outstanding duty in the Pacific was awarded to Rear Admiral Mahlon S. Tisdale, *Minn.* A '11, commandant of Mare Island Navy Yard, Calif. Admiral Tisdale became commandant at Mare Island in January, and details of his career were carried in the March issue of *THE RECORD*. Accompanying the award was a citation pointing out the Admiral's exceptional record as commander of destroyers and cruisers in the Pacific. It was signed by Admiral C. W. Nimitz, commander-in-chief of the Pacific Fleet.

Lt. Richard O. Trent

■ Lt. Richard O. Trent, *Okla.* K '44, has been awarded the Distinguished Cross. He was wounded in action in the Southwest Pacific last August and was placed back in flying status in November. He had taken part in more than 50 missions, transporting supplies and troops over territory that was continually patrolled by enemy fighter aircraft. He enlisted in the Army Air Corps in January, 1942, and went overseas in June, 1943.

Lt. (jg) U. A. Tull

■ Lt. (jg) U. A. Tull, *Tenn.* H '38, has been awarded the Air Medal for meritorious achievement while participating in aerial flight as pilot-navigator of a Coronado seaplane employed in a series of attacks upon Wake Island at night in formation, January 30 to February 11. The citation was signed by Admiral Nimitz. He entered the service in February, 1942, and was commissioned at Jacksonville, Fla., and served for a time at San Diego, Calif., before going overseas in October, 1943.

Lt. Andrew B. Waggener

■ Lt. Andrew B. Waggener, *Tenn.* A '36, has been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross with an Oak Leaf Cluster and the Air Medal. He was overseas for 11 months, serving as a pilot of a Liberator in the Southwest Pacific theatre. While there he was on 40 missions for more than 300 combat hours. After returning to the States he was married to Miss Elaine Bergstrand at Miami Beach, Fla., March 22, 1944. He now is with the Army Air Force Headquarters, Office of Flying Safety, in Winston-Salem, N.C.

Capt. Felix P. Welch

■ Capt. Felix P. Welch, *Miss.* Θ '29, of the Huntsville, Ala., Arsenal, recently was commended by the commandant of the Arsenal for his act of extinguishing the burning clothes of a civilian worker. The letter of commendation said: "You are hereby commended for your act of courage in extinguishing the burning clothes of Mr. Carl Smith on the morning of December 23. Your disregard of your personal safety to save the life of an employe sets an example of high courage and devotion to duty of which this entire command is proud."

Lt. Col. Henry T. Wheless

■ Lt. Col. Henry T. Wheless, *Texas* P '38, who distinguished himself early in the war, was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross and the Air Medal at the Second Army Air Force Headquarters in Colorado Springs, Colo., in May. He was decorated for his exploits in the Pacific early in the war when President Roosevelt cited him in a radio address as an example of American heroism and skill. He received the awards from Brig. Gen. U. G. Ent, commanding general of the Second Air Force. Col. Wheless also was cited for participation in the first mass flight of heavy bombers from Hamilton Field, Calif., to Hickman Field, Hawaii, in May, 1942, and the first mass movement of heavy bombers from Albuquerque, N.M., to Clark Field, Philippine Islands. Col. Wheless scored one of the war's first aerial victories over the then triumphant Japs. In 1943 he was commissioned to re-enact his experiences for motion pictures. Details were given in the August, 1942, issue of *THE RECORD*.

Admiral John H. Towers

■ Vice Admiral John H. Towers, *Ga.* Φ '06, Deputy Commander in Chief of the Pacific Fleet and Pacific Ocean areas, has been awarded the Legion of Merit for his services as commander of the Air Force, Pacific Fleet. He took his new position, second in command to Admiral Chester W. Nimitz, last February.

Capt. Edwin R. Wilkinson

■ Capt. Edwin R. Wilkinson, Fla. T '23, has been awarded the Navy Cross, as commanding officer of the famous destroyer *O'Bannon* which was in action against the Japanese, November 12, 1942, when the *O'Bannon* scored three torpedo hits on a Jap battleship, engaged two other men-o'-war, and retired safely in spite of damage sustained. The destroyer was awarded a Presidential unit citation and became one of the Navy's best known and most successful fighting ships. Capt. Wilkinson is hero of many battles against the Japs in the South Pacific. Recently he returned to the United States for a visit.

Lt. Col. Gilbert O. Wymond

■ Lt. Col. Gilbert O. Wymond, Ky. E '42, wears a chestful of medals including the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Air Medal with seven clusters, the Silver Star and the Purple Heart. He has been overseas two years where he has participated in many battles as a squadron commander. He is one of the youngest lieutenant colonels in the Army and has been on more than 140 combat missions. He is the second oldest combat pilot in the point of service and was on the first operational mission by the U.S. Air Force against the Germans. As part of the British Eighth Army Lt. Col. Wymond was in the "Fighting Cock Squadron" that fought its way from El Alamein through Tunis, Sicily, Pantelleria, Naples, Rome and Corsica. On the way his squadron gained three Presidential Unit Citations. The first citation was for support of the British Eighth Army in the Egyptian-Libyan campaign; the second for breaking railroad contact between Northern Italy and Rome; the third for destroying 76 planes and damaging 30 others in the Palm Sunday battle at Cape Bon, called the greatest aerial victory of the war. The first cluster to the Air Medal was given for his three confirmed German planes downed at Tripoli and El Alamein; the other six for the 140 missions completed. The Purple Heart came when he swooped low to blow up an ammunition truck and he succeeded in blowing up part of his ship. He had to

make a forced landing which put him in the hospital for four weeks. He earned the Distinguished Flying Cross for 200 operational hours in the Egyptian-Libyan campaign.

Lt. Col. Ernest C. Young

■ Lt. Col. Ernest C. Young, Ohio M '38, received the Distinguished Flying Cross from Lord Halifax, British ambassador to the United States, for outstanding achievement in combat. The award was made in behalf of King George VI in a presentation ceremony at the residence of the British embassy in Washington, in March. He received the award as group commander, executive officer, and pilot of a P-38 in the North African theater of operations, showing outstanding ability in all phases of combat flying and tactics. On July 19, 1943, Lt. Col. Young led his group as escort to the first bomber mission over Rome, Italy. On July 30, he led his group as escort to B-25 bombers, attacking *Practica de Mare*. He drove off enemy fighters, allowing the bombers to continue to a successful mission. He wears the American DFC, and Air Medal with 10 Oak Leaf Clusters and Silver Star, awarded to him at the conclusion of the Pantelleria attack.

Maj. Arthur L. Zachry

■ Maj. Arthur L. Zachry, Ga. B '39, has been cited by the commanding general of the 12th Air Force. For 21 months he was a supply and ordnance officer in European and Mediterranean war theatres. He returned to the States in March for a rest at the Army Air Forces redistribution station at Miami Beach, Fla. He entered the services four years ago as a second lieutenant.

First report was that he was missing in action. Later the Red Cross and the War Department reported him as safe and a prisoner.

LT. GEORGE W. SHOCK

■ Lt. George W. Shock, Neb. A-II '40, pilot of a Flying Fortress with the Eighth U.S. Army Air Forces, who was reported as missing in action over Denmark since April 9, 1944, is now a prisoner of the German government, according to a telegram received by his mother in Falls City, Neb., from the War Department. The report was received in May. He had flown 24 missions and was decorated with the Air Medal and with several Oak Leaf Clusters. He also received commendation from his commanding officer for his meritorious achievements and courage, coolness and skill. Lt. Shock and his crew members bailed out of the fortress a few minutes before it exploded.

Made Headlines, History in Dive

COL. CASS S. HOUGH, *Mich.* I-B '25, became the world's fastest traveling human when he made his famous power dive in a P-38 from 43,000 feet which resulted in an Air Force citation which said: "Colonel Hough achieved the longest terminal velocity dive in history. . . . He knowingly and deliberately entered unknown regions of the air. . . . The courage, skill and devotion to duty displayed by this officer reflect the highest credit upon himself and the Armed Forces of the United States."

As technical director of the Eighth Fighter Command of the U.S. Army in England, Col. Hough proved the worth of the P-38 against the Luftwaffe when the British had shaken their heads. In a mock battle with Spitfires, RAF pilots flew circles around him. So, he set to work for improvements in the American two-engine, twin-fuselage fighter. Another mock battle proved a different story. He outperformed captured German Focke-Wulfs and Messerschmidts and a sensational new fighter plane took to the skies against the Luftwaffe.

In his 43,000 foot plunge to prove the P-38 he was traveling about 800 miles per hour, faster than the speed of sound, *faster than any living being had ever traveled before.* As he flashed below 20,000 feet he had slightly over 15 seconds to live. The plane started to pull out of the dive at 15,000. No plane had ever before been successfully subjected to such a fearful test. The plane was going over 700 miles an hour when all the controls took hold at once and Hough was safe, but the tremendous force of pulling out from the great dive blacked him into semiconsciousness. When he came to, he was 5,000 feet higher up, with the plane climbing almost vertically. His faith in the Lightning had been justified and he had made it a superweapon. The first story on Col. Hough appeared in the December, 1943, issue of *THE RECORD*, which also told of his dive in a P-47 at 780 miles per hour. *Air News* carried a detailed article, followed by condensation in *Reader's Digest*.

When called into service he was vice president and sales manager of the Daisy Manufacturing Company, air rifle firm in Plymouth, Mich. He was commissioned a second lieutenant in the Air Corps Reserve in April, 1940. After training he helped to fly the first lot of pursuit planes across the Atlantic and for which he was awarded the Air Medal. Then he joined the Eighth Air Force in England and received the Distinguished Flying Cross and was advanced to rank of colonel in 1943 following his work with the P-38 development. He has been flying since he was 17 and used his five-place Waco plane regularly in calling on his customers all over the States.

Leads Tank Force Into Eternal City

WHEN Rome, the Eternal City, was liberated on June 4 by tanks and infantry troops of the Allied Fifth Army, Lt. Col. Henry E. Gardiner, *Mont.* A '28, was the executive officer for the tank force. The Fifth Army force fought its way into the heart of the city after a four-hour battle against German armor in the suburbs. Several tanks were knocked out and some crew members were killed and others wounded.

Col. Gardiner was the opening feature in the May, 1943, issue of *THE RECORD*, which gave a full page account of his star rôle in Africa. He distinguished himself in the battle of February 22, 1943, in Tunisia. He skillfully maneuvered his medium tank company, knocking out 10 German tanks without losing one at Tebessa Pass in the Kasserine Valley. He was thrice decorated for outstanding heroism and for shoulder wounds received at Djedeida.

In civilian life Col. Gardiner was an attorney in Chicago, Ill.

Gray's Men Honored

■ The Fifth Army Plaque and Clasp was awarded to the entire Military Railway Service in Italy, under the command of Brig. Gen. Carl R. Gray, Jr., *Mo.* B, Ill. B '11, according to word received in June. The award was made for "excellence in discipline, performance, merit," Allied Force M.R.S. Headquarters reported from Italy. The recognition which is ordinarily accorded only to units within the command of the Fifth Army, is the highest to be received by military railroaders. The ceremony was timed to take place on Gen. Gray's 55th birthday and he received the award before members of his entire railroad staff and a number of officers of his operating and shop units. Lt. Gen. Mark W. Clark's deputy chief of staff presented the

Chickering Named Brigadier General

THE Fraternity added another brigadier general to its list when this rank was given to William E. Chickering, *Pa.* Θ '16, in January, 1944. At the time he was Director of the Army Postal Service, Adjutant General's Office, Washington, D.C.

Gen. Chickering has had an outstanding military career, beginning with his commission as a second lieutenant in the Infantry Reserve in 1917, being called to active duty on the same date and being commissioned a second lieutenant of Infantry in the Regular Army on October 26, 1917. Going to France in February, 1918, his name was associated with William C. Levere, Past E.S.R., and the initiation ceremony conducted in Andernach Castle on the Rhine. In October, 1918, he was wounded and taken prisoner. He later was assigned to Paris, and in January, 1919, he rejoined the Seventh Infantry for duty with the American Forces in Germany, stationed at Coblenz. He returned to the States in 1923.

In March, 1927, Gen. Chickering was transferred from Infantry to the Adjutant General's Department. In 1933 he went to Manila and became Assistant Adjutant General of the Philippine Department, and returned to the States in 1936. In September, 1938, he was assistant to the officer in charge in the Officers' division, The Adjutant General's Office in Washington. In December, 1940, he was appointed by President Roosevelt to serve as Deputy Administrator of Export Control with headquarters in Washington. In September, 1941, he was assigned to the Army Group for duty with the U. S. Military North African Mission in Washington and in the Middle Eastern Theatre of Operations. From July, 1942, until February, 1943, he served as Adjutant General, Headquarters Services of Supply, U. S. Army Forces in the Middle East, and then became Chief of Staff at that headquarters.

Returning to the U.S., he was designated Director of the Army Postal Service, Adjutant General's Office in Washington. He received the Silver Star for bravery in action at Le Theodore Farm in France, July 23, 1918, and the Purple Heart for bravery in action when wounded, October 3, 1918. He was awarded the Legion of Merit in 1943, and his citation read: "For exceptionally meritorious service in various assignments of great responsibility with the U.S. Army Forces in the Middle East." The Order of the British Empire was conferred upon him in June, 1943, for service with the U.S. Military Mission in the Middle East Theatre of Operations.

elaborate inlaid Italian wood tablet to Director General Gray, together with a letter from Fifth Army's commanding general. Gen. Clark wrote that Gray's soldiers had performed the impossible.

“Flip Corkin” Lands Another Glider Force

COL. Phillip G. Cochran, Ohio Θ '33, who is the prototype of Col. “Flip Corkin” of “Terry and the Pirates,” landed another glider force in Burma last April when his American air commando force penetrated re-enforcements more than 200 miles into that territory.

The re-enforcing operation under Col. Cochran was similar to the original air invasion in February. This time the American glider force landed and found no Japanese interference. The new landings were far to the east of the first operation and in the vicinity of the important enemy base of Bhamo, less than 40 miles from the China border. The re-enforcing operation was spearheaded by trains of gliders filled with picked allied troops and equipment. When they stopped, engineering equipment including bulldozers, was rolled out and work was started on clearing another great airfield behind the enemy lines.

Only 36 hours after the gliders took off from India, big U.S. and British transport planes were landing on the new field and disgorging troops, mules, food and munitions. Col. Cochran's light planes then flew to isolated points within the Allied defense box, carrying supplies to scattered units and evacuating wounded men.

Details of Col. Cochran's career were given in the December, 1943, issue of THE RECORD. The British Distinguished Service order was awarded to him on April 27. In May he returned to his home for a brief visit in Erie, Pa., where a wish came true . . . to sit on the porch. The visit was brief, though, as he had to report to Washington on his exploits. There he said: “We have only scratched the surface of the possibility of moving armies by air.”

Marble Bust of Colonel

A marble bust of Lt. Col. Floyd E. Thomas, Iowa B '14, has been placed in the Municipio in Trapani, Sicily, in honor of the colonel who is on leave from the University of Arizona to serve with the Allied Military Government. Thus, the law professor has become a symbol to citizens of Trapani. The bust was done by Sculptor Domenico LiMuli, and at the unveiling gratitude was expressed to the Allies for rebuilding their bombed community, wrested last year from German military forces. Col. Thomas is the senior civil affairs officer of the AMG in Sicily. He is a veteran of World War I, having served in France. He remained a reserve officer and was called to active duty February, 1941. He was sent overseas in June, 1943. In March he was transferred from Trapani Province to an unannounced new province with more than a million persons under his advisory control. His sons are Dr. Berwyn Thomas, Ariz. A '40, research chemist in Covington, Va., and Lt. Alan Thomas, Ariz. A '44, Army bomber pilot.

Cox Tops Military Order

Brig. Gen. Albert L. Cox, N.C. Σ '04, is national commander of the Military Order of the World Wars, an organization of commissioned officers. Gen. Cox, who formerly commanded the National Guard of the District of Columbia, was head of the military commission which tried in 1942 the eight German saboteurs who landed from a submarine on Long Island.

Foss Bags No. 27

From an advanced South Pacific air base came the news in May that Major Joseph Foss, S.D. Σ '40, Marine Corps Air Ace, bagged another Jap plane, No. 27 on his score pad. His new catch was a Jap floatplane, sitting on the water off New Ireland and he strafed it to destruction. However, under the Pacific theater system of counting, the plane didn't go on his combat-downed record, but it signified that the ace was again on the prowl for Japanese. As stated in the May issue of THE RECORD in which a review of his book was given, Major Foss commands a squadron and operates a Cosair rather than a Wildcat. He holds the Congressional Medal of Honor and equaled the score of Capt. Eddie Rickenbacker in World War I.

Transports Men, Supplies

Hugh H. Gordon, III, Ga. B '32, brother of Capt. Lewis Gordon, N.C. Σ '38, who is missing in action in the Southwest Pacific, is chief pilot of the Africa-Orient Division of Pan American Airways and transports men and materials to the Near East. He is in charge of the operations line between Miami, Fla., and Karachi, India, via the West Indies, the tip of South America to the Gold Coast, the Sudan and on to Karachi. He also has charge of another route from Miami to the Bermuda Islands, the Azores, Casa Blanca and the Southern Mediterranean. He is a captain in the Marine Air Corps but has not been called to active duty, being retained by Pan American. His base is at Miami where he maintains his home.

Directs Service Chaplains

Bishop Edwin F. Lee, Ill. Ψ - Ω '08, of the Methodist Church, is director of Protestant work in behalf of Army and Navy chaplains, having been elected to this position by the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America in May. He took over his new duties in June, working through the General Commission on Army and Navy Chaplains. Bishop Lee is a veteran of 22 years of service in the Far East.

Aids in Rescue

Comdr. Joseph C. Clifton, Ky. E '29, recently figured in a dramatic rescue of a Naval lieutenant (jg) from a life raft into a British submarine after the officer's plane had been downed at sea during an attack against Sabang. Comdr. Clifton has been flying from a carrier in the Pacific.

Brig. Gen. Saunders Heads Raid on Japan

WHEN the United States' new B-29 Superfortress bombers hit a vital industrial target in Japan in June, none other than Brig. Gen. LaVerne G. (“Blondie”) Saunders, S.D. Σ '22, who acquired a spectacular record in B-17 Flying Fortress operations around the South Pacific, was the ranking officer.

Brig. Gen. Saunders took the place of the raid planner, Brig. Gen. Kenneth B. Wolfe, chief of the 20th Bomber Command, who was forced to sweat the mission out on the ground. Saunders was an all-American tackle and line coach at West Point. Details of his activities in the Solomons area were carried in the March, 1943, issue of THE RECORD. Much-decorated General Saunders held a key position in the Pacific skies, his bombardment group having engaged in 240 combat missions, during which an enemy aircraft carrier was probably sunk, 20 other ships were hit, 60 enemy planes destroyed and 33 damaged.

Saunders with his heavyweights flew out of China and more than 2,000 miles to drop a great weight of explosives on Yawata, “Japan's Pittsburgh,” and the Imperial Iron & Steel Works, source of one-fifth of all Jap war steel.

Jones in France

Lt. Col. Robert Tyre (“Bobby”) Jones, Ga. Φ '22, was reported in the May issue of THE RECORD as being on duty in England where he found no time for golf. Official reports in June stated that he was in France for the invasion where he was with the Ninth Air Force Tactical Command.

Saved in Plane Crash

Capt. Edwin M. Shanks, Pa. Z '41, and his crew were daringly rescued from Jap infested waters in the Southwest Pacific after their Army medium bomber was downed by enemy anti-aircraft fire off New Ireland in April. Forced to crash-land his B-25 when one of the motors was knocked out during an attack on Rabaul, Capt. Shanks and his crew were saved when a Catalina flying boat picked them up after they had spent 55 minutes on life rafts. As the Catalina picked the men up, they were being carried by the current toward Jap-occupied land. Capt. Shanks wrote to his parents in Evanston, Ill.: “I have been slightly shot down. We landed in the water and the whole crew is O.K.” He was awarded the Air Medal for meritorious achievement in aerial operations, the award being dated prior to the above incident. Capt. Shanks was on eight sorties immediately after being returned to his base.

Landis Sketch in Print

In the June 25 issue of the *Chicago Tribune* appeared a character sketch of Lt. (sg) Kenneth Landis, Ill. Ψ - Ω '40, USNR. Lt. Landis' portrait was sketched by *Tribune* Artist Gary Sheahan, who was on a trip to the South Pacific theater of war. Mr. Sheahan met Landis again and they were roommates on an aircraft carrier. Landis was called into service in 1941 as a member of the naval reserve and served three years in the Southwest Pacific. He manned an anti-aircraft gun in the battle of Pearl Harbor. After a leave at his home in Evanston, Ill., he reported to the commander's school at Miami Beach, Fla.

Before entering the Army he was a partner in the Roswell Seed Co. Recently he was pictured in press releases in front of St. Peter's Cathedral in Rome.

Proud of Their Club

American flying officers at the B-24 Liberator bomber base, 15th Army Air Force, in Italy have a club of which they are exceptionally proud. Built of the same heavy limestone blocks that characterize Italian construction, the building is 150 x 50 feet and was designed and built by the officers, led by 1st Lt. Richard L. Ames, Jr., Va. K '38. Lt. Ames was instrumental in obtaining materials at low cost from bomb-gutted buildings and dilapidated farm houses. The low structure cost \$180, several packages of cigarettes and an old pair of discarded civilian shoes. Italian stone masons did the intricate work.

Keeps 'Em Flying

James M. Sullivan, Wyo. A '39, is now a lieutenant colonel and serves as commanding officer of a Ninth Air Force Service Command Service Group in England. It is his job to keep P-51 Mustangs and P-47 Thunderbolts in fighting trim. His group does all the first-line jobs of repair and maintenance on the long-range ships which escort U.S. "heavies" over Germany. Before entering the service in 1941, Col. Sullivan was secretary and treasurer of the Federal Land Bank of Omaha, Nebr.

Soldier-Painter Forbes

T/Sgt. W. Stanton Forbes, Ga. B '32, a talented artist, who is now with the American Army in England, did three murals for an Anglican church near his station which were dedicated on Easter. In another accident he escaped serious injury but he said that "it is quite a terrifying experience to find oneself riding along one minute and then the next minute floating through the air with pieces of your vehicle going by."

They are Pfc. Ben B. Johnston, Jr., Ark. A-T '33, who has been overseas since September, 1943, and is now stationed somewhere near Casablanca; 2nd Lt. Thomas B. Johnston, Ark. A-T '40, who is teaching at Stockton, Calif., and Pvt. John G. Johnston, Ark. A-T '45, who has been overseas since December, 1943, and recently was transferred from the engineering corps to the weather squadron. John was stationed in New Caledonia.

Father, Sons Serve

A letter from Col. Frank F. Bell, Mass. I-T '10, from overseas in April notified the National Office of his service and that he has two ΣAE sons in the armed forces. They are 2nd Lt. Edwin S. Lt. Col. Gordon A. Hittenmark, Iowa Δ '26, who is public relations officer in the Middle East, recently toured Iran where he gathered recordings of soldier activities along the supply route to Russia for broadcast from stations in the United States. Formerly he was announcer on radio station WRC and prior to being called to active duty in 1940, he was serving as aide to Brig. Gen. Albert Cox, commander of the District National Guard.

In Officer Procurement

Rear Admiral Isaac C. Johnson, La. E '02, is director of officer procurement for the 11th Naval District in Los Angeles, Calif., and was given the permanent rank of rear admiral on February 23, 1942, for meritorious service. During his distinguished naval career the Admiral has received the Navy Cross, French Legion of Honor, Mexican Service Medal, World War Victory Medal and the American Defense Medal. As an ensign he made the world cruise with the Great White Fleet in 1908, and at the Vera Cruz engagement he was the commanding officer of a battalion of blue-jackets. He was graduated from the Naval Academy at Annapolis in 1904. During World War I he was commanding officer of two vessels converted to Navy use for convoy duty and also was commodore of a division of destroyers. He served as supervisor of the Port at Brest, France, and upon President Wilson's visit to France for the Versailles Treaty, it was Commander Johnson who had charge of the President's landing. While a captain he was in Tokyo to serve for three years as Naval attache. In 1939 he retired and resumed active duty in 1941 as director of Naval Reserves, 11th Naval District. Later he became director of naval officer procurement.

Stassen Gets Play

An article of approximately eight pages, devoted to Lt. Comdr. Harold Stassen, Minn. A '29, ex-governor of Minnesota, appeared in the June 26 issue of *Life*, and gave in detail the accomplishments of the young man whose name had blazed across the country as a possible candidate for the presidency of the United States. While the Republican Convention was going on in Chicago, Stassen was keeping silent in politics and going about his business as flag secretary to Vice Admiral Newton in command of the South Pacific. His name was withdrawn from the contest at the Republican National Convention in favor of Gov. Dewey. He is now assistant chief of staff and flag secretary to Admiral William F. Halsey, commander of the Third Fleet, after serving as aide and flag secretary to Admiral Halsey since August, 1943, while Halsey was commander of South Pacific Forces. Stassen returned to Minnesota and Washington for a visit in July.

Capt. Sturman Wounded

Capt. Kenneth Sturman, Wyo. A '40, was wounded in action in the invasion of the Marshall Islands, February 3, 1944. He was removed from the battle theatre to a base hospital in the Hawaiian Islands. In addition to the engagement with the Japs on Kwajalein, Captain Sturman led infantry forces in the battle of Attu in the Aleutians. He was flank commander of the assaulting forces which wiped out the last nest of Japs in the battle of Kwajalein.

Promoted Prior to Death

Andrew Joseph McLaughlin, Ill. Δ '43, who was ΣAE's 71st Gold Star, was commissioned before his death, according to word received by his relatives from the Royal Canadian Air Force. Pilot Officer McLaughlin, rather than Sgt. Observer, as given in the March, 1943, issue of *THE RECORD*, was killed in England after raid over Turin, Italy, December 10, 1942. His commission had been granted officially before the time of his death but he was unaware of it. He was buried in Coningsby, Lincolnshire, England.

Ernie Pyle Wins Pulitzer Prize

JUST as the May issue of THE RECORD, featuring America's Ace War Correspondent Ernie Pyle, *Ind. Γ '23*, on the cover, was rolling off the press, his name and picture appeared in newspapers all over the country May 1, as a result of his winning the Pulitzer award for "distinguished correspondence during the year."

In selecting the "distinguished correspondence" winner for 1943, Columbia University trustees said that it was based on "fair, judicious, well-balanced and well-informed interpretive writing, which shall make clear the significance of the subject covered in the correspondence or which shall promote international understanding and appreciation." The award carries a \$500 prize.

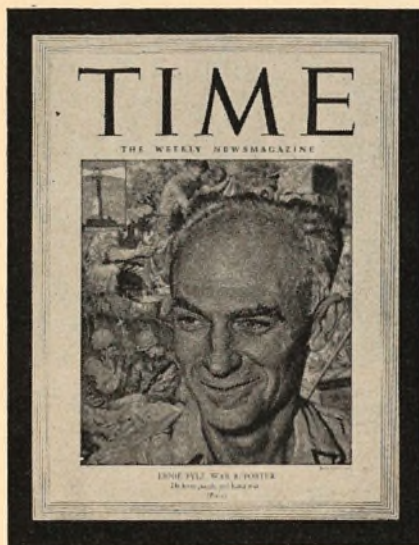
Two days after winning the Pulitzer Prize Pyle made the front pages again when he was awarded the Raymond Clapper Memorial Award for distinguished war correspondence, as announced by Sigma Delta Chi, professional journalism fraternity. Pyle, Scripps-Howard newspaper columnist, whose warm words from the battle front are syndicated throughout the United States, was featured in the May issue of THE RECORD, with a book review of his fast-selling *Here Is Your War*, from which a movie is being made.

Early in May he arrived in London from the Anzio beachhead in Italy, where he remained until preparation was completed for D-Day. He crossed the channel in an LST for France and soon learned complete information on the invasion. His first story on the H-Hour appeared in his column on June 14, at which time he said: "A feeling of utter desperation obsessed me throughout the night. It was nearly 4 a.m. before I got to sleep, and then it was a sleep harassed and torn by an awful knowledge."

To his Pulitzer Prize and Clapper Award Ernie added more laurels shortly after. He was among National Headliners Awards winners in May for the best foreign feature of the year. The National Headliners Club recorded him as the first man in the organization to receive an award for two successive years. Mr. Pyle won the award for the best foreign feature for the second time.

He also was designated by the Sons of Indiana as "Hoosier of 1944" (*Time*, May 15), and Congress passed the so-called "Ernie Pyle Bill" to raise G.I. pay \$10.00 for combat service. The War Department adopted his suggestion that it revive the practice of awarding a sleeve stripe for each six months of overseas service. All of these things added up to clinch him as Number One War Correspondent.

Time made Pyle a cover man too, July 17, with the legend: "He loves people and hates war." Approximately three pages of the issue were devoted to his career and the "little man's war."

Willard Gibbs Medal

Two Nominated for Governorship

TWO members of Sigma Alpha Epsilon took the leads in GOP gubernatorial primaries in June when Lt. Gov. Robert Donald Blue, *Iowa Δ '22*, walked away with the nomination for governor of Iowa, and Fred G. Aandahl, *N.D. A '21*, was conceded by his opponent as the nominee for governor of North Dakota.

Mr. Aandahl, charter member of North Dakota Alpha at the University of North Dakota and a Life member of the Chapter National, was a regular Republican candidate and the ball started rolling for him in April when Barnes county friends and neighbors gave him a hearty godspeed at a reception in his honor in Valley City. He is No. 1 man on ΣAE's alphabetical list. He operates a farm near Litchville, N.D.

Lt. Gov. Blue also is a farm operator and has had a distinguished career of public service including lieutenant governor, 1943-44; speaker of the house of representatives, 1941-42; Republican floor leader, 1937-41; state representative, 1935-43; alternate delegate to the Republican National Convention, 1932; county attorney, 1924-30, and city attorney, 1932-34.

Lt. Gov. Blue resides in Eagle Grove, Iowa, a town of 4,000 people, and Wright County showed its confidence in him by electing him attorney six years and naming him as their state representative eight years. He was nominated and elected lieutenant governor of Iowa from a field of four candidates in 1942. He has been a lawyer for 22 years. He attended Drake University, Iowa State College and Capital City Commercial College. He is a Veteran of World War I, a member of the Methodist Church, a Mason, a Shriner, a member of the American Legion, Rotary, Moose, and the Iowa State Bar Association.

Supreme Court Justice

■ Robert T. Simpson, Jr., *Ala. M '15*, is Associate Justice of the Alabama Supreme Court, having been appointed to the bench in June by Gov. Chauncey Sparks. Judge Simpson was Associate Justice of the Alabama Court of Appeals, having been appointed in 1941. 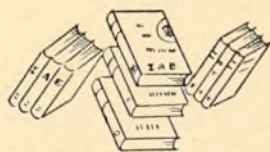

DAYBREAK FOR OUR CARRIER (Whittlesey House, McGraw-Hill Book Company)—After becoming a well-known author on travel with his first book being a best-seller, Max Miller, *Wash.* A '23, now a lieutenant in the U. He makes the carrier and her personnel a part of the United States despite her possible distance from our country in this mad battle, for what the author has been writing about for years.

The book is wonderfully illustrated with photographs without captions by Lt. Charles E. Kerlee, USNR, and they are official U. S. Navy pictures, each in itself, telling a story. The photographs as well as the story tell how our fighting men live and think and feel. It is a story of the day-to-day living and human reactions of a body of men in the course of one operation against the enemy. Quality is brought out by the fact that Lt. Miller was on regular duty on the carrier, and not a correspondent or an observer. The power and effectiveness of the carrier in the war in the Pacific glow in the book. The carrier seems almost human when Miller tells of its emptiness when her planes are on a mission or the ship is in port. He says: "A carrier is built for her flyers, and around her flyers, and when they are not aboard a carrier cannot help but seem half empty and spiritless, and all this despite the hundreds and hundreds of other people aboard all hard at work. 'But you just wait. The flyers will be aboard tomorrow.'"

Lt. Miller was in the Navy in World War I. He left high school to join the fleet and served through the war. When it was over, he returned to school, finished his course, and attended the University of Washington. In 1942 he was commissioned in the Naval Reserve and with his experience in the writing field, he knew how to tell about life on a carrier, "as big as a city," on task-force duty, leading through D-Day.

Royalties from his book are directed to the Secretary of the Navy for dispersal to such Naval welfare funds as may be selected. Every person, in or out of service, should read *Daybreak for Our Carrier*.

MISCELLANEOUS—Squadron 303, a book concerning the Polish fighter squadron with the RAF by Arkady Fiedler, was sent to the library with the compliments of the Polish Government Information Center, New York. The author was in Tahiti at the outbreak of the present war and traveled back to France to volunteer for the Polish Army. He has written several travel books which were among the best-sellers in Poland until war broke out. It is an interesting story of the famous Warsaw Squadron (Kosciuszko Squadron 303) of the Polish Air Force which destroyed 126 aircraft in the Battle of Britain and was top scorer in the Battle of Dieppe. (Roy, Publishers, New York, 1943).

A beautifully illustrated brochure, *Into a Second Century with Procter & Gamble*, has been placed in the library. The brochure with striking color work and pleasing type-faces has been presented to Procter & Gamble stockholders and is a brief historic record of the company. *Into a Second Century* tells more than the story of one great American enterprise from its humble beginnings in 1837 to the present day. Through the example of Procter & Gamble's record, it serves to outline and emphasize the broad scope of the changes in all business from that day to this. (Privately printed in Cincinnati, Ohio, 1944.)

Matter-in-Motion, depicting evolution of the universe, by William Emil Herrman, was contributed by the Minden Press, New York, N.Y.

Fight For Air Power by William Bradford Huie has been presented to the library by Mrs. Ed George of Texarkana, Ark., in memory of 1st Lt. Louis Read George, *Ark.* A-T '40, who was killed in an aerial battle with the Japs over Rabaul, January 1, 1944. Lt. George, who was awarded the Silver Star posthumously, and was SAE's 174th Gold Star, had selected *Fight for Air Power* as the best book of the year (1942). He was navigator on a B-24 Liberator, "Blessed Event." The book contains a photograph of Maj. Gen. Walter R. Weaver, *Va.* Θ '04, Commander of the Technical Training Command, Army Air Corps.

Five Province Conventions

Fifty-five New Life Members

Editorials

More Education Out of the War

GOOD NEWS came to undergraduate men in service when it was announced that the "GI Bill of Rights" had been passed by both Houses of Congress and approved by the President. It is a great opportunity for fraternity men to continue their educations with the aid of the government.

Any person who served in the active military or naval service on or after September 16, 1940, and who was not over 25 years of age at the time he entered the service, and who shall have been honorably discharged, and who either (1) shall have served 90 days or more, exclusive of any period he was assigned to an Army or Navy college training program, which was a continuation of his civilian course and was pursued to completion, or (2) as a cadet or midshipman at one of the service academies or (3) shall have been discharged from active service by reason of an actual service-incurred injury or disability shall be eligible for education benefits.

Other requirements state that such educational course must be begun not later than two years after either date of his discharge or the termination of the present war, which ever is the later, and the benefits will not be extended beyond seven years after the close of the present year. This will give the service man plenty of time and a chance for academic adjustment again. Any such eligible person shall be entitled to education for one year. After the close of the first year the veteran, if in the opinion of the institution he is attending, has shown satisfactory progress, shall be entitled to additional periods of education not to exceed the time such person was in active service after September 16, 1940, and before the termination of the war, but in no event shall the total period of education exceed four years.

According to the plan the government will pay up to \$500 for each person for an ordinary school year for tuition, laboratory fees, books, and supplies exclusive of board, lodging, other living expenses and travel. A man may enter an elementary school, trade or technical institution, college or graduate school. During this period he will receive \$50 a month if single, \$75 if he has one or more dependents. Men over 26 years of age when they entered the service will receive the same benefits if they can prove that their education was "delayed, interrupted, impeded or interfered with," which probably will not be made difficult. It has been estimated that at least one million soldiers will return to the classroom and among these there should be enough ΣAEs to fill our Chapters Collegiate.

This plan definitely will aid fraternity postwar chapters, and falls in line with fraternity plans to rebuild their chapter memberships after the war.

Alumni Help Needed Now

TO FILL the gap in the revenues of the Fraternity, resulting from the decrease in the

number of members of the Chapters Collegiate, the financial assistance of alumni is now badly needed and an appeal is being addressed to interested alumni, calling on them to become "stand-ins" for the boys who have left their chapters to serve in the armed forces of the Nation.

Heretofore, receipts from chapter dues and initiation fees have been the chief source of support for the Fraternity. What the war has done to the revenues of the Fraternity is indicated by the following comparative figures for the college years, 1942-43 and 1943-44:

During the fall of 1942 the chapters paid dues of \$17,785.00 on 3,557 members and initiation fees of \$7,840.00 for 784 initiates; during the spring of 1943, they paid \$19,500.00 dues for 3,900 members and initiation fees of \$20,470.00 for 2,047 initiates; a total of \$65,595.00 for the college year, 1942-43, \$37,285.00 for dues and \$28,310 for initiation fees.

During the fall of 1943 the chapters paid dues of \$6,220.00 on 1,244 members and initiation fees of \$7,240.00 on 724 initiates; during the spring of 1944 they paid \$7,350.00 dues on 1,470 members and initiation fees of \$7,650.00 on 765 initiates; a total of \$28,459.00 for the college year, 1943-44, \$13,569.00 for dues and \$14,890.00 for initiation fees.

Economy has been exercised wherever possible without impairing the service of the Fraternity to the Chapters Collegiate and to the men under arms but, despite all such efforts, operations for the year, 1943-44, showed a loss. The outlook for the future is not encouraging, as a further drop in college membership during the year, 1944-45, is inevitable.

The members of the Supreme Council have felt that the Fraternity should maintain its organization so as to be of the best possible service to the chapters which have remained active and to be in position to reestablish chapters which have become inactive for the duration, as soon as that is possible; also, that THE RECORD should be kept up to peace-time standards.

To help provide the leadership which will be needed more than ever by the Chapters Collegiate, the Tenth Leadership School will be held in Evanston, August 20-25, and the Fraternity has offered to furnish room and board for the official representative from each chapter.

Alumni who will become "stand-ins" for the men who have left the Chapters Collegiate should send their checks to Sigma Alpha Epsilon, P.O. Box 1856, Evanston, Ill. They will assist their Fraternity to carry on through one of the most difficult periods in its history.

School Plans Now Complete

PLANS for the Tenth Leadership School of Sigma Alpha Epsilon, to be

held in the Levere Memorial Temple, Evanston, Ill., Sunday to Friday, August 20-25, 1944, have been completed and credentials received from the Chapters Collegiate indicate that there will be a good attendance.

The program has been prepared by Dr. John O. Moseley, Director of Leadership Training, and will be carried out under his direction with the assistance of the members of the Supreme Council, the Province Archons and the force of the National Office.

Under arrangements which have been made with Northwestern University, room and board for chapter representatives will be furnished in Willard Hall, as in past years. The Fraternity will pay the cost of room and board while in Evanston for the official representative of each chapter. Similar accommodations can be furnished for additional representatives at \$17.25 each for the period of the School.

■ "Phi Kaps everywhere will be grateful and interested to learn that the Maintenance and Rehabilitation Fund has received a contribution of \$1,000 from the Benjamin Lee II Memorial Fund. This Fund is a perpetual trust fund established by Mrs. Joshua C. Chase, the mother of Benjamin Lee, II, Alpha '17, the principal of which is approximately \$15,000, representing the proceeds of the government life insurance paid to her upon the death of Ensign Lee, October 28, 1918, while a naval aviator serving at a U. S. Naval Station at Killingholme, England. The Story of Lucy Pattie

By William C. Levere

I THOUGHT I had combed the country for historical material about Sigma Alpha Epsilon and when the three-volumed history appeared in 1911, it was supposed that it covered about everything of importance and interest there was. You can imagine my chagrin therefore when two years later there appeared in THE RECORD a brief account of "A Woman Brother" by J. D. Allen, Ky. X '82. It had four statements which were that when the Civil War came Miss Lucy Pattie was intrusted by his chapter with the secret minutes and ritual of the chapter and that when the war was over, she returned them for which the chapter in appreciation made her a member of the fraternity. That so interesting an incident in our history had escaped me in my long search for material concerning ΣAE was distressing. I had written Brother Allen for help but for some reason he had not answered although many other Kentucky Chi alumni had, but none of them had told of this charming story. Immediately after the article appeared I was so greatly interested in it and felt so strongly that the fraternity ought to have the fullest details, that I wrote to Brother Allen and continued to write to him at intervals through the years after but received no reply. Nevertheless I could not get it out of my mind that here was something we would all want to know more about though there never came time to dig out the entire tale.

It was in August, 1919, I decided the fraternity would be willing to make the expenditure of time and money to trace this incident of nearly sixty years ago and I accordingly prepared a letter and sent it to every one of the one hundred and fifty alumni of this chapter, a chapter, it may be said in passing, which filled a very great place in our early history but which disappeared from our roll thirty years ago. The letter sent these ancient ΣAEs follows:

Box 254, Evanston, Ill., Aug. 28, 1919

Dear Brother:

There is a tradition in the fraternity that during the Civil War, the ritual and documents belonging to the Kentucky Chi Chapter of Sigma Alpha Epsilon were in charge of a young lady, named Lucy Pattie. It is said that she was initiated into the fraternity, and took charge of ΣAE documents while the boys were away. Did you ever hear of this case, and if so, what can you tell me about it? Do you know if she is still living? I will greatly appreciate an answer.

Thanking you for this information, I am

Thirty-three replies came to this letter including a brief note from Brother Allen. Some of the brothers who replied had been in the chapter quite a period after the war and evidently the tradition had never been kept alive for they had never heard of it. It happened that their letters came first and this was discouraging. But then I commenced to hear from the old timers, who remembered the event and then from some who were able to tell me that Miss Pattie was still living and finally, wonder of wonders, a letter from Miss Pattie herself. She was living at Frankfort and she signed her letter "yours fraternally." It was these things that determined me, when the time came to visit the Kentucky chapters, to go to Frankfort and see Miss Pattie.

It was a glorious May morning that greeted me when I came to the state capitol of Kentucky where I had learned I would find the "only woman ΣAE." The noble building high upon a hill of the blue grass state is itself a monument to a ΣAE, for when United States Senator J. W. Beckham was governor he not only built it but did so without costing the state a single penny. But that is another story. I was in search of the girl who figured in the ΣAE romance

of long ago. I found her in the educational department of the state. I saw at a desk a fine looking American woman. A face full of character and breeding was surmounted by a lovely crown of white hair. At my approach she rose and received me with a kindness in which was blended the most exquisite old-fashioned manners and a friendliness which was the essence of courtesy. And a moment later she gave me the grip. Surely I never met a ΣAE of whom I was more proud.

The story which she told me is one that our fraternity will always treasure. There are few fraternities which have been blessed with so many events, which have had a touch of romance and adventure as ΣAE and here was one more to add to our golden trove of happy incident. Kentucky Chi had been at the old Kentucky Military Institute three years when the Civil War came. It was a chapter full of merry hearted laughing young fellows gathered from all parts of the South and among the gayest of them was clear-eyed and captivating John B. Kent. Less than a thousand feet from the campus was

the home of the Pattie family, who had long been residents of the county and who were known and respected by all the country round. In this home lived Lucy Pattie with her parents as well as with her brother, Coleman D. Pattie, who in future years was himself to be a ΣAE. The Pattie home was a favorite place with the young students and with none more so than John B. Kent and his chum, Ben Marston, both of whom were devoted to Kentucky Chi. Kent was older by several years than little "Miss Lucy" but he was very fond of her and loved to talk to her about his fraternity while to her the charming fellow was a prince out of a storybook. Then the war came, a war between brothers which made it more awful.

There were no slackers in Kentucky Chi. Every one of the bright young fellows was ready to answer the voice of the cause in which he believed. In a few days the chapter was widely scattered, each member going to different parts of the country to enlist. Kent and Marston were the last to leave as there were matters they had to arrange and they stayed with the Patties during the two or three weeks they were getting ready. To Kent had been left all the affairs of the chapter and he was extremely solicitous concerning the secret papers of the fraternity for he not only had the ritual but the constitution as the laws were called in those days, which was also part of the intimate affairs of the order. As the day came closer for Kent to leave, he felt strongly the need to provide for the care of these documents and he finally determined to trust them with the young girl whom he believed would protect them and sacredly guard them.

There was a rustic bench near the ancient stile on the family farm and here Kent confided to the young girl the ritual and other papers of the chapter whose contents should only be known to its members. There were some copies of these papers he wished to take with him and for these Miss Lucy made a waterproof envelope and after the papers were put in this and sealed with wax it was put between the lining and front of his waistcoat for safety. The papers she kept she likewise sealed and then hid them away where neither friend nor foe might find them.

The years have passed, Lucy Pattie has never forgotten the solemn injunction with which John Kent entrusted the papers to her. With all the earnestness with which he was capable he told her how dear they were to the boys who had been bound together in ΣAE and then he said,

"Keep them, Lucy, till I come back, but if I never come again give them to no one unless he can give you this grip of the hand." And that is how Lucy Pattie came to learn the grip of ΣAE.

Then the long days came, the days full of anguish and sorrow as across the fields of proud Kentucky, the red blood of her sons and the sons of the union was shed. Two years passed and one dark day there came the word to the little farm that John Kent had paid the full measure of devotion. He was in the cruel charge at Shiloh and in that charge his young life went out. Those were sad hours beneath that blue Kentucky sky where the memory of his happy young laugh had been so dear. And quietly hidden away rested the precious papers, all unknowing that never again would they feel the touch of their owner's hand.

At last the drama of civil strife was ended. There came trooping back to the old school faces that were new and the thread of its life was taken up where it had been dropped just a few years ago, but few as they were, each one seemed a century. One day there came to the farm house, Major Robert Allen and he asked for Miss Lucy Pattie. When she had come, he told her he had come for the papers which Kent had intrusted to her. He said what was true, that he had been empowered by the fraternity to re-establish the chapter. But he offered to give the girl no evidence that he was entitled to them and she waited for that grip of the hand. It was not forthcoming and the gallant major beat a retreat without them. For several days the negotiations continued. The major was an old friend of the family and they urged her to deliver the papers but she remembered her pledge and continued to refuse. Finally, when asked if there was any way she could be persuaded to surrender them, she said when one of the company who were re-organizing the chapter could convince her he was a ΣAE, they should have the papers but not before. This brought Albert McMahan to her for he had been initiated previously. Up to this time no one had known that she had the grip and it was with considerable hesitancy that he took her hand and passed on the recognition handshake of the fraternity. She responded pressure for pressure; and at length satisfied, she gave the papers; and Kentucky Chi was once again an integral part of the fraternity.

The gratitude and delight of the young brothers at her devotion and care of their ritual and other private papers was so great that at their first meeting they voted her a mem-

ber of the fraternity and gave her the badge. And from then on she was the belle of the chapter. She never attended a business meeting but was always at their social gatherings and always spoken of by the boys as "our only woman member." Nor was this her only reward. Major Allen, to whom she had first refused the papers, saw that she was admitted to the school as a student. This was, it must be remembered, in the sixties when co-education was not popular anywhere and least of all in Kentucky. Still she was allowed to attend the classes though her name was not allowed to appear in the school catalogue. And that she might not be embarrassed by being the only girl among so many fellows, it was arranged that her friend Helen Carmer should attend with her. It is interesting to know that in later years Miss Carmer married and that her son became a ΣAE. Another side light on this story which shows how strange a course things take in our affairs is that all the time I was trying so strenuously to find out about Miss Pattie, if she was still living and where she was, and the story I have just told, her niece, Mrs. S. J. Glanton was living just a few blocks away from the general offices of the fraternity in Evanston.

The badge the boys of Kentucky Chi had given Miss Pattie was long since lost but when I left her she was wearing again after many years, the emblem she still loves. I told her the Fraternity wanted her to wear it and the badge I gave her was a replica of the first one, the badge the founders had worn. She is a brave, splendid woman, this daughter of ΣAE. And though the years have passed over her head, since those days of the sixties when she first wore our badge, still in her winsome smile and her happy heart, I found she shared with our goddess Minerva a grateful attribute—she is perpetually young.

Call for Levere Histories

■ Tau Epsilon Phi has a new headquarters building with the buying of a six-story structure at 627 West 115th St., New York City, and becomes the seventh Greek-letter fraternity to own a national headquarters building. ΦΔΘ has published plans for a new Georgian colonial headquarters building to be erected at Oxford, Ohio, birthplace of the fraternity. The postwar plan calls for the structure to be ready by 1948 when the fraternity will reach its 100th birthday. Speaking of centennials, ΔΚΕ is celebrating its 100th anniversary. The fraternity was founded June 22, 1844, at Yale College, New Haven, Conn. It now has 27,470 members, 47 active chapters and 82 alumni chapters.

Presenting . DeVotie Memorial Library

FRATERNITY-MINDED men and women on the west coast have long realized the need for a library of fraternity literature to serve the great West. Sigma Alpha Epsilon's answer to this was the establishment, on March 9, 1944, of the DeVotie Memorial Library of ΣΑΕ at Beverly Hills, California, in honor of Noble Leslie DeVotie, principal founder of ΣΑΕ.

This library, the only one of its kind west of the Mississippi, will serve Greeks in the West, and will contain bound volumes of fraternity and sorority magazines, catalogues, directories, histories, and other publications of Greek-letter organizations which are of particular interest to fraternity and sorority members.

In addition to these publications, the library will maintain as complete a collection as possible of the current catalogues of all American colleges and universities, as well as the annuals of the schools at which ΣΑΕ chapters are located.

During the last few months, all the fraternities and sororities have been notified of the establishment of the library, and have been solicited for donations of their publications, and thus far the cooperation has been excellent.

The administration of the library is invested in a librarian and an assistant, in addition to the California Delta chapter at the University of California at Los Angeles, which is in close proximity to the library.

■ "It really gives me a feeling of pride to receive letters from all my boys in the service," says Mrs. Harriette Evans, former Delta Upsilon fraternity house mother, in reference to her correspondence with about 168 ΔTs in the armed services. According to the *Delta Upsilon Quarterly* in July, Mrs. Evans served as ΔT house mother for 10 years. When the fraternity house was taken over by the Army, Mrs. Evans went to her home before her husband's death. With the coming of the war, Mrs. Evans received a flood of letters from boys who had left the chapter to go into the Army, Navy or Marines—letters containing accounts of experiences, little bits of brotherly gossip, and questions about the chapter and Mrs. Evans. Though she answers every letter as soon as possible, it still takes her almost a month to reply to the 168 men overseas and in camps in the United States. She has started a file system. It was difficult for her to keep track of "her boys" until she hit upon the idea of a world map with a pin marking the location of each boy in England, Scotland, Ireland, Italy, Africa and every corner of the earth. Blue pins represent the Navy men; green pins, Marines, and brown, Army men. Whenever one of the boys is moved, his pin is changed as soon as Mrs. Evans receives his new address.

12,179 IN SERVICE

Up to July 1, 1944, the names of 12,179 members of Sigma Alpha Epsilon who are serving in the armed forces had been reported to the National Office, 789 having been reported since April 1, 1944, when the list which was carried in the May issue of THE RECORD was compiled. The new names are listed herewith and also the names of 692 (indicated by asterisks) who have been promoted or transferred.

Because of censorship regulations THE RECORD does not use the names of outfits or units and their locations in combat areas but the service man as an individual may be listed as in a specific area without including the name of his outfit, etc. Also names of ships on which men are serving are not printed in THE RECORD and service men overseas, or about to embark are not identified or linked with their ships or units.

Men in service, their parents and friends are requested to give information which will aid the National Office in holding a complete file, regardless of what may be printed in the magazine. The magazine can be sent overseas if their APO or Fleet address is given for our files but THE RECORD may not be forwarded from their home addresses.

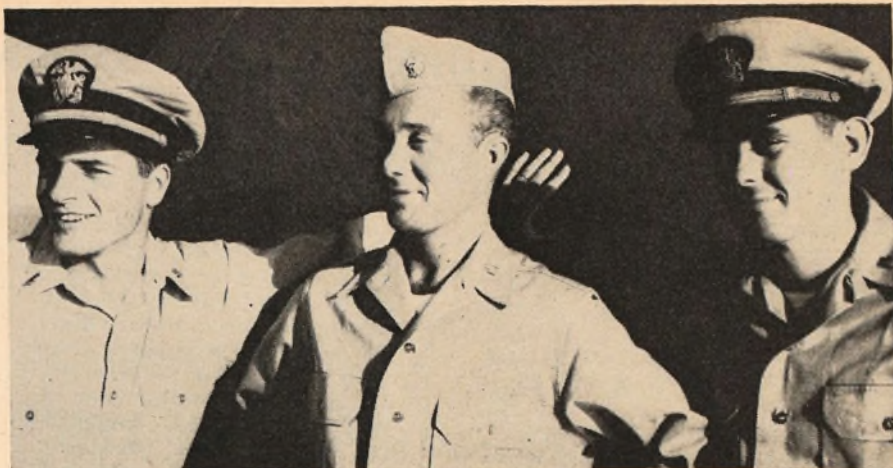

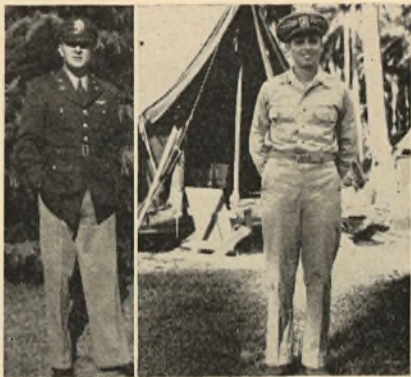

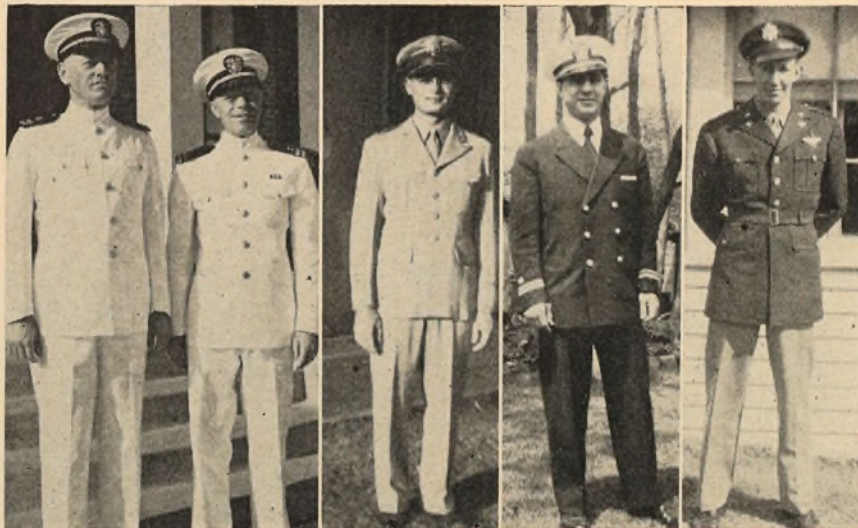
