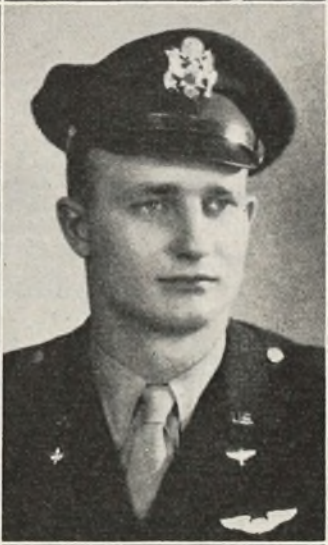

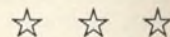

SINCE the August, 1944, issue of THE RECORD the names of sixty additional members of Sigma Alpha Epsilon who have made the supreme sacrifice while serving in the armed forces of the United States have been reported to the National Office, bringing the total reported deceased to 279 as of November 15, 1944. In addition, fifty-seven have been reported as missing in action and fifty-five as prisoners of war.

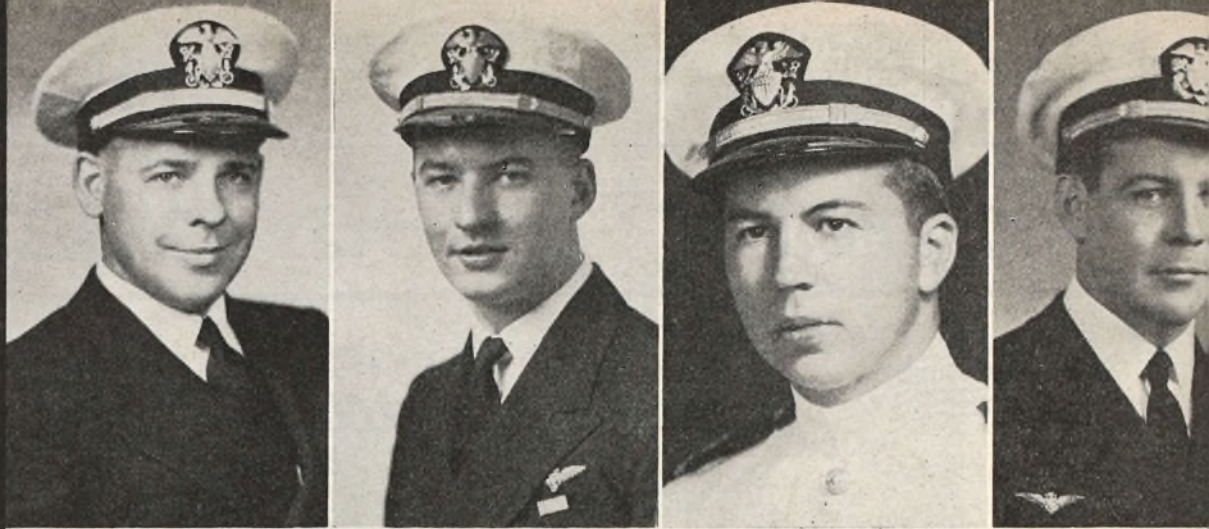

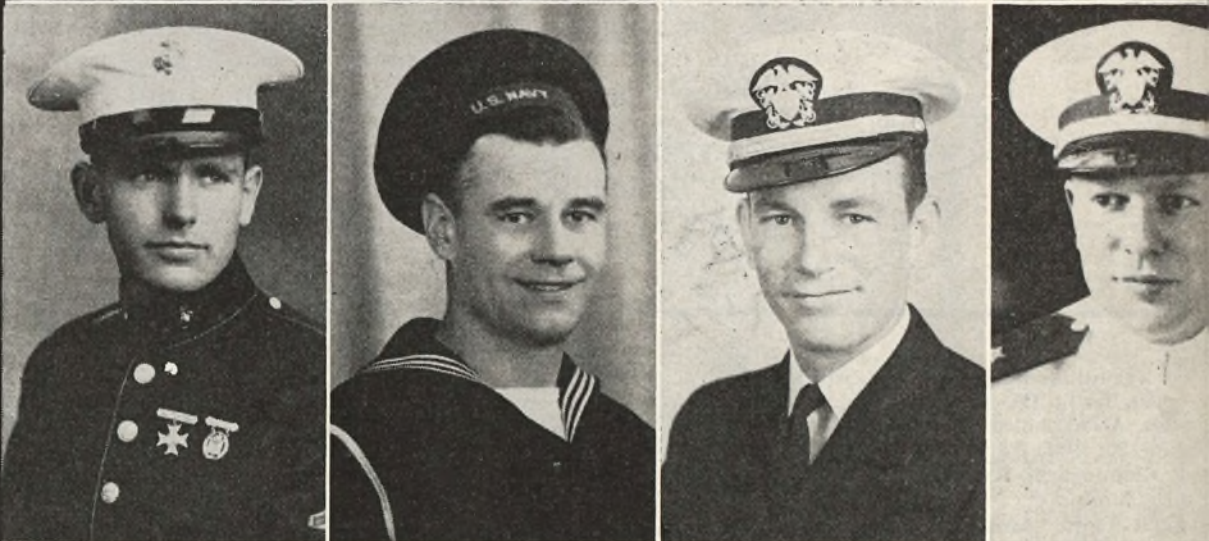

273. **1st Lt. William Stokes Walker, Ga.** B '42, USMCR, killed in action on Saipan, July 7, 1944. He was the son of Dr. C. N. Walker, Ga. Ψ '07, grandson of Rev. William Stokes Walker, Ga. B '77,

and brother of Clarence N. Walker, Jr., Va. Σ '45.

274. **Capt. James R. Miller, Calif.** B '38, reported missing in New Guinea, since October 16, 1943, declared legally dead by War Department.

275. **Lt. Harry L. Cole, Jr., Wash.** B '42, previously reported missing in the Pacific, killed in an accident landing aboard carrier, June 17, 1944.

276. **Lt. (sg) Robert E. Heekin, Jr., Va.** O '38, son of Robert E. Heekin, Ohio Θ '06, died of tropical fever somewhere on the Mediterranean, October 26, 1944.

277. **2nd Lt. John Charles Eskew, Jr., La.** E '45, fighter pilot, killed in a plane accident at Shrewsbury, England, September 10, 1944.

278. **Pfc. Hector Coffin, III, Tenn.** K '43, son of Hector Coffin, Jr., Tenn. K '06, died at Kennedy General Hospital (Army) in Memphis, Tenn., September 12, 1944.

279. **Sgt. Edgar R. Attebery, Jr., Wash.** A '46, paratrooper with the Army in France, killed in action, September 27, 1944.

LT. COMDR. CALDER ATKINSON (264)

■ Lt. Comdr. Calder Atkinson, N.C. E '36, USN, commander of a squadron of Naval patrol planes based in South America, was killed in a crash in Brazil, May 10, 1944. His brother is W. M. Atkinson, Jr., N.C. E '32, of Wilmington, N.C. Lt. Comdr. Atkinson received his wings at Pensacola Naval Air Station. He served at various stations and compiled an enviable record with the Navy. His death brought many expressions of commendation from high Naval officials.

LT. JOSEPH E. BAINER (240)

■ 1st Lt. Joseph E. Bainer, Ohio M '36, son of John D. Bainer, Ill. B '13, of Meadville, Pa., died on Middleburg Island, New Guinea, July 30, 1944, as a result of wounds received in action during an operation. He was in charge of a group of tanks and was leading the first wave of a landing when wounded. He died aboard a ship where he was taken for medical attention but was buried on the mainland near the scene of the operation. The Purple Heart and Presidential citation were awarded to him posthumously. He enlisted in the cavalry in 1939 and was graduated from Officers Candidate School at Fort Riley, Kan., as a second lieutenant, July 18, 1942, and went overseas September 2, 1943. He was graduated from the Ranger and Combat Training School, Hawaiian Department, November 13, 1943, and then served as an officer in the cavalry reconnaissance troop in New Guinea, starting in January, 1944. In civilian life he was secretary of the Cleveland Alumni Association and his father was a member of the Chicago Alumni Association of ΣΑΕ.

PFC. RAY J. BRANNAMAN (215)

■ Pfc. Ray Junior Brannaman, Colo. Δ '46, Marine Corps was killed in action on Saipan, June 16, 1944, according to word received from his father, Ray H. Brannaman, Colo. Δ '15. He landed on Saipan, June 15, and was under artillery fire before landing and through the entire day. He was wounded shortly after landing but refused to go to the first aid station and remained with his buddy under fire throughout the day and was killed the next morning when an artillery shell exploded over his foxhole, the same shell wounding his buddy. He was buried on Saipan.

LT. WILLIAM G. BURT (252)

■ Lt. William G. Burt, Jr., Ga. B '42, bombardier on a B-17, was killed in action over Italy, May 25, 1944, after a successful mission in France, according to word received from his mother in Bolingbroke, Ga. He was the son of Maj. William G. Burt, Retired, Ga. Ψ '02, Ga. φ.

LT. PHILIP S. CHESS, JR. (250)

■ 1st Lt. Philip S. Chess, Jr., Va. K '44, was killed in action in Italy, July 17, 1944. He was wounded on March 15 and received the Purple Heart. Lt. Chess joined the service in July, 1941, and was graduated from Officers Candidate School at Fort Benning, Ga., in January, 1943. He was sent to Africa in April and instructed in an infantry school there until going to Italy in January, 1944.

LT. HARRY COLE, JR. (275)

■ Lt. Harry Cole, Jr., Wash. B '42, who had been missing in action in the Pacific since June, 1944, according to the Navy Department, has been reported killed in an accident landing aboard a carrier, June 17, 1944. Relatives in Pullman, Wash., received a letter from him on June 22, dated June 7. He had been transferred to the Pacific in May and was a division leader of a carrier-based Navy fighter plane group. He was an instructor at the Pensacola Naval Air Station for more than two years.

ENSIGN ROBERT S. COOK (212)

■ Ensign Robert Seabury Cook, N.Y. Σ-Φ '43, Naval Air Corps, was killed in a plane crash, January 19, 1944, according to his father, Lt. Comdr. Seabury Cook, USN, Ret., of Summit, N.J. He was reported lost by the Navy Department. He entered the service in April, 1942, and received his training at Anacosta and Pensacola, Fla. He left Bard College in his junior year to enter the Air Corps.

LT. COL. HAROLD C. CRATER (271)

■ Lt. Col. Harold C. Crater, Ind. A '26, died of a heart attack following influenza at

Camp Shelby, Miss., April 20, 1941, according to word received from his widow in Columbus, Ind. He served in the Army during World War I as a second lieutenant. He was an officer in the Indiana National Guard from 1922 until his induction into the Army in 1941. At that time he was in command of the 1st battalion of the 139th field artillery, 38th division at Camp Shelby. At the time of the National Guard mobilization he was superintendent of schools in Lawrenceburg, Ind.

LT. DAVID W. CUDDY (263)

■ 1st Lt. David Warren Cuddy, Calif. A '41, died of wounds received at Anzio, February 3, 1944. He was in Italy with the First Special Service Force, a branch of the Army which comprised U.S. and Canadian forces of "Super Commandos." He was awarded the Purple Heart posthumously. Lt. Cuddy was with this force in the Pacific and later was in the mountain fighting in Italy. He was with the unit when it moved in and took Mt. Defense in one colossal assault, on the road to Cassino. At one time he contracted pneumonia and was hospitalized, but he went back to the front with his men. His brother is 1st Lt. Daniel H. Cuddy, Calif. A '43, overseas.

LT. DAVID F. CUNNINGHAM (220)

■ 1st Lt. David Pratt Cunningham, Ariz. A '43, son of Forrest F. Cunningham, Wis. A '08, Ill. Θ, was killed in action in France, June 20, 1944. He was attached to a mechanized cavalry unit and had landed safely during the invasion. In July, 1942, he entered Fort Riley Officers Training School and was commissioned a lieutenant the following September. He went overseas in December, 1943, after training in Tennessee and California.

MAJ. GORDON B. EVANS (229)

■ Maj. Gordon B. Evans, Tenn. N '26, was killed in an accident in New Guinea, July 21, 1944. Entering the service on March 12, 1942, he was sent overseas nine days later, and had been stationed in Australia and New Guinea, attached to the Maritime Personnel Section, Post Command, of the Army Service Forces. He was scheduled to return to the United States in September.

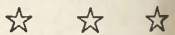

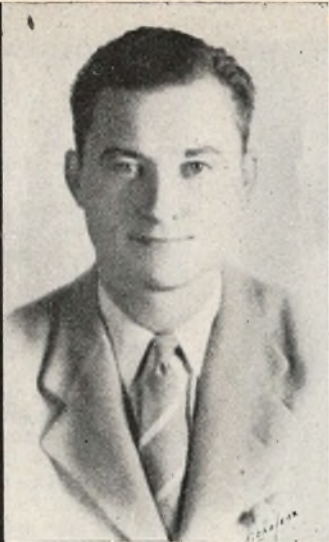

CAPT. WILLIAM W. GALT
(261)

■ Capt. William W. Galt, *Mont.* A '42, who was reported as missing in action in Italy in the August issue of *THE RECORD*, was killed, May 29, 1944, while leading his company in the capture of a German strongpoint in the drive toward Rome. He has been recommended for the Congressional Medal of Honor. He had been reported as missing in action but communications from officers of his division confirm his death. An enemy antitank gun scored a direct hit on Captain Galt's tank destroyer as he was directing an attack and manning a machine gun. Reports stated that Captain Galt fatally wounded about 40 enemy and wounded a number of others. His mission led to the ultimate capture of the Italian town. He was a veteran of the African and Italian campaigns and had been awarded the Silver Star and twice received the Purple Heart. His brother is Pvt. Jack E. Galt, *Mont.* A '44, with a medical airborne company overseas.

ENSIGN ROBERT N. GARLOCK
(247)

■ Ensign Robert Noble Garlock, *Iowa* T '34, was killed when his plane crashed into the sea near the Hawaiian Islands, September 19, 1943. He and his squadron were stationed on one of the islands for further training. During a practice maneuver about 20 miles from their base another plane damaged a wing of Garlock's plane and it went into a tail-spin, struck the water and submerged immediately.

LT. ROBERT E. HEEKIN, JR.
(276)

■ Lt. (sg) Robert E. Heekin, Jr., *Va.* O '38, died of tropical fever somewhere on the Mediterranean, October 26, 1944. He was the son of Robert E. Heekin, *Ohio* O '06, of Cincinnati. He was in command of the oil tanker, *Syncline*, servicing submarines and Navy craft in the Mediterranean. Lt. Heekin enlisted in the Navy in 1940, served at Norfolk, Va., and Boston, Mass., and in 1941 was executive officer of a patrol ship on Panama Bay out of Balboa. After attending anti-submarine school, he was assigned as executive officer of the *Syncline*. He was put in command in June, 1944.

LT. J. DANIEL HOUSTON
(199)

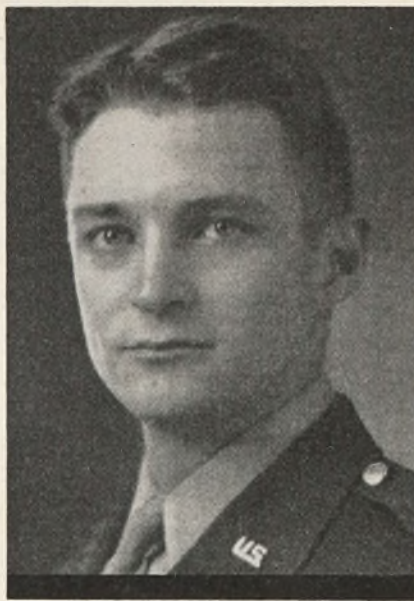
■ Lt. J. Daniel Houston, *Neb.* A-II '32, pilot of a Liberator bomber, was killed in a plane crash at Princeton, W.Va., February 2, 1943, but his body was not found until April 22, according to word received from his widow in Omaha, Nebr. At the time of his death he had been nominated for the rank of captain. He was piloting the plane from Dallas, Texas, when the crash occurred.

ENSIGN RAYFORD HUXFORD

■ Ensign Rayford Huxford, *Ga.* E '43, Naval Air Reserve, who was listed in the August, 1943, issue of *THE RECORD*, as having died at San Diego, Calif., February 1, 1943, was killed in a plane crash there, according to details received from relatives in Perry, Fla. He entered service in July, 1941. In the previous report he was listed as a second lieutenant and the fraternity's 104th Gold Star, due to unreliable reports.

CAPT. ROBERT C. KADGIHN
(237)

■ Capt. Robert C. Kadgihn, *Iowa* B '41, with General Merrill's Marauders of the Infantry, was killed in action in North Burma, July 30, 1944, according to a telegram to his relatives in Iowa City, Iowa, from the War Department. He had been in the Army for three years and had been in India teaching Chinese troops for more than a year. His brother is 1st Lt. Henry Kadgihn, *Iowa* B '35, with the artillery in Italy.

He had just been graduated as top-ranking cadet of his class to a fighter school in Phoenix, Ariz. He enlisted in the Army Air Corps in December, 1942. He was born in Vienna, Austria.

LT. MARVIN N. KEITH
(251)

■ 1st Lt. Marvin N. Keith, Jr., *Miss.* O '42, son of Marvin N. Keith, *Ark.* A-T '15, of Kansas City, Mo., was killed in action in France, August 2, 1944. On August 21 the Secretary of War informed his parents that Lt. Keith was missing in action in France. Five days later they were informed that he was killed in action. He received his commission as second lieutenant when he was graduated from Mississippi State College. He trained troops at Camp Wolters, Texas, and attended Rifle and Heavy Weapons school at Fort Benning, Ga. He was promoted to first lieutenant in July, 1943, and before going overseas he was at Fort Meade, Md.

LT. WILLIAM H. KINZY
(260)

■ Lt. William Henry Kinzy, Jr., *Tenn.* N '46, Army infantryman, was killed in France, July 16, 1944. He entered the service in November, 1943, and attended the officers training school at Fort Benning, Ga., and later taught military classes at Camp Blanding, Fla., and Camp Robinson, Ark. He was sent overseas in March, 1944.

LT. J. E. LEONARD
(265)

■ 1st Lt. J. E. ("Bud") Leonard, *Ore.* B '42, USMC, was killed in the battle of Guam, July 28, 1944. He went overseas in February, 1943, landing on New Hebrides first and later moving to New Caledonia. He received his first lieutenant's commission, September, 1943, but due to hospitalization after contraction of a jungle foot disease, his promotion did not become effective until five months later. While on Guadalcanal he took part in various "mopping up" activities. He left that base for combat in June, 1944. A dispatch from Guam dated July 26 was broadcast telling of a dangerous mission in which he led his men, sustaining no casualties. This was the bloodless taking of Mount Alifan overlooking the key town of Agat, Guam.

LLOYD W. LINKLATER
(239)

■ S1/c Lloyd William Linklater, *Ill.* O '32, who was enroute to his home in Roseland, Ill., after being discharged from the Navy, was killed in a train accident in Fort Madison, Iowa, July 30, 1944. He had stepped off of the train for a moment and evidently slipped when getting aboard again. He was employed as a pressman at the Hammond, Ind., *Times* until his enlistment in the Navy. He had been a lieutenant in the Civil Air Patrol. He was on the *U.S.S. Irwin* when he became ill.

SGT. RICHARD M. MARCH
(249)

■ Sgt. Richard M. March, *Pa.* A '44, was killed in action in France, July 5, 1944. After training at Camp Croft, S.C., he was sent to North Africa in July, 1943. He was in Sicily and went to England for preparation of the invasion in France. His parents in Norristown, Pa., were informed that he was to be awarded the Purple Heart. He was attending Gettysburg College when called into service.

LT. JOHN ED McCUISTION
(230)

■ Lt. John Ed McCuiston, *N.Y.* M '43, died in a Prescott, Ark., hospital following an auto accident near Prescott, January 9, 1944. Lt. McCuiston was driving the car when it was demolished as it skidded on ice on the Little Missouri river bridge. Lt. McCuiston was in the Army Air Forces and received his commission at Eagle Pass, Texas, a few days previous to the accident. He was enroute to his home in Little Rock before reporting for pursuit pilot duty at Tallahassee, Fla. He had enlisted in the Army after being graduated from Columbia University.

ENSIGN THOMAS E. McGRATH
(177)

■ Ensign Thomas E. McGrath, *Mass.* I-T '43, Air Corps, was killed when his plane was shot down by enemy anti-aircraft fire during a combat mission at Taroa Island, January 29, 1944. He was awarded the Purple Heart. Ensign McGrath enlisted in the Naval Reserve in 1937 and reported for duty, June 13, 1941, and then was sent to the Pacific area. Information was provided by his sister, Miss Jo Ann McGrath of Brighton, Mass.

LT. GAYLE H. MILLER
(272)

■ 1st Lt. Gayle H. Miller, *Ala.* M '41, pilot of a Liberator bomber, who had been reported missing in action over Germany since August 16, 1944, is now listed as deceased. He is the brother of Capt. Frank Harvey Miller, Jr., *Ala.* M '39, fighter pilot, who was reported missing in flight from India to China, July 5, 1944. Lt. Gayle Miller was in the South Pacific in 1942 and returned to United States in March, 1943, to enter the Air Corps. In June 1944, he was sent overseas again.

CAPT. JAMES R. MILLER
(274)

■ Capt. James R. Miller, *Calif.* B '38, who had been missing over Finchhafen, New Guinea since October 16, 1943, after disappearing in a storm according to word received from relatives in California, has been declared legally dead by the War Department. He had received two Distinguished Flying Crosses and three Air Medals and had completed 175 missions. In the December, 1942, issue of *THE RECORD* was an article entitled "Flies with Human Cushion," concerning Fighter Pilot Miller who used a native as a cushion in order that he could make proper observation from the seat of his P-40. He was toastmaster at the first air banquet commemorating the first year of the Air Force in New Guinea. Shortly afterwards he gave a world-wide radio address from Australia, May 29, which was heard by his relatives. After a furlough he returned October 15, 1943, to take command of a Fighter squadron and was lost the next day.

LT. WILLIAM B. MILES
(197)

Information concerning the death of 2nd Lt. William Baker Miles Iowa Δ '43, was carried in the August issue of THE RECORD, but more details have been provided by his widow in West Helena, Ark. He was a Liberator first pilot and was instantly killed by flak at 20,000 feet altitude over the Island of Elba, May 17, 1944. Going overseas in March, 1944, he was in Africa for a short time, and then was based in Italy from where he was on his eighth raid over enemy territory when he was killed. Burial was held in the United States cemetery near Bari, Italy. His brother is 1st Lt. Frank Miles, Jr., Iowa Δ '39, Army Air Corps bombardier. A son, William Baker Miles, Jr., was born in Helena, Ark., October 11, 1944.

CAPT. JOHN S. MILLIGAN
(232)

Capt. John S. Milligan, Jr., Fla. T '42, son of John S. Milligan, III, Θ '19, of Ormond, Fla., was killed in action in Normandy, July 12, 1944. He had entered the Army as a second lieutenant with the field artillery in June, 1942 and had served overseas since February, 1944. He is believed to have been with the invasion forces since D-Day, as his last letter from England was dated June 5. He had served as a battery commander with the field artillery, but a letter written a week before his death told of his promotion to liaison officer. His father is a veteran of World War I. Captain Milligan was awarded the Purple Heart posthumously.

LT. JAMES R. MITCHELL
(246)

Lt. (jg) James R. Mitchell, Colo. A '39, USNR, was killed while on a routine flight as primary flight instructor at the Naval Air Station at Norman, Okla. July 17, 1944. This Gold Star is not to be confused with 1st Lt. James R. Mitchell, Miss. Θ '39, who died of acute leukemia, January 31, 1944, while on a special mission from Samoa to Delhi, India, and was ΣAE's 154th Gold Star. Lt. (jg) James R. Mitchell's twin brother, Cpl. Edward W. Mitchell, Colo. X '40, is in Italy.

LT. ROBERT M. MITCHELL
(266)

1st Lt. Robert M. Mitchell, S.C. Φ '38, son of Dr. Alexander R. Mitchell, charter member of Tennessee Omega, died of wounds received in Holland, September 19, 1944. He was with the airborne infantry and died two days after being wounded. He entered service in May, 1941, and was decorated four times, winning the Bronze Star Medal, Soldier's Medal, the Purple Heart for wound received in the Normandy invasion, and his unit had received a Presidential citation for meritorious service.

CAPT. LESTER T. MOONEY
(171)

Capt. Lester T. Mooney, Okla. K '40, was killed while leading a patrol at Saidor, New Guinea, February 9, 1944. In February, 1943, he had been awarded the Silver Star for gallantry in action near Buna, New Guinea. After his death his parents in Temple, Okla., received the Purple Heart. He went to the Philippines in November, 1942. He was on duty in Australia and Java. His brothers are Lt. Jerome E. Mooney, Air Force, San Bernardino, Calif., and Pfc. John R. Mooney, Camp Crowder, Mo.

PFC. DONALD W. MORGAN
(207)

Pfc. Donald W. Morgan, Vt. B '44, was killed near Cassino in Italy by a German mine, January 12, 1944, according to word from his relatives in Burlington, Vt. He enlisted in June, 1942, and was sent to Fort Knox, Ky. He went overseas in March, 1943, and was in North Africa and Sicily until December 22. He landed in Naples, December 24.

CAPT. WILLIAM S. NICHOLSON
(181)

Capt. William S. Nicholson, Jr., N.C. Θ '38, was killed in a plane crash near Lillington, N.C., April 27, 1944. He was ferrying a heavy bomber from Michigan to South Carolina when the accident occurred. He received his reserve commission at Fort Moultrie in 1940 and was called to service in 1942. After being stationed at Fort McClellan, Ala., and Camp Forrest, Tenn., he took pilot training at Kelly Field, Texas, at Spartan Aircraft, Okla., and Randolph Field, Texas. He received his wings at Foster Field, Texas, in January, 1943. At the time of his death he was assigned to the Air Transport Command with the Fifth Ferry Group as assistant director of trianing, Lowe Field, Texas.

CAPT. ARLO L. OLSON
(206)

Capt. Arlo L. Olson, S.D. Σ '40, who was listed in the August issue of THE RECORD, as the Fraternity's 206th Gold Star, was credited with killing 30 Germans and singlehandedly knocking out two machine gun nests while leading his men across the strongly defended Volturno river in Italy and spearheading the capture of a mountain position above the river, in October, 1943. He lost his life on the 28th during the series of actions. After the hill was taken Captain Olson posted security and reorganized his company. During the reorganization heavy artillery concentrations swept the hill, seriously wounding him, but he refused to be evacuated until his men were prepared for an enemy counterattack. He died as the litter bearers carried him down the mountain his infantrymen had wrested from the enemy. He was awarded posthumously the Medal of Honor, the nation's highest military tribute, for gallantry in action. He also had the Silver Star.



1st Lt. Robert M. Mitchell, S.C. Φ '38, Son of Dr. Alexander R. Mitchell, Charter Member of Tennessee Omega, Died of Wounds in Holland, September 19, 1944—(266).

CAPT. MAURICE M. PARKER
(238)

Capt. Maurice Mabie Parker, Colo. Δ '42, was killed in action in France, July 4, 1944. He had been overseas three months and was a liaison officer. He was formerly commander of Battery C, 11th Battalion, 4th Training Regiment, FARC, at Fort Bragg, N.C. His brother is Ensign Marvin Parker, Colo. Δ '39, who is somewhere in the Pacific area.

CAPT. JILLSON M. PEATTIE
(262)

Capt. Jillson M. Peattie, Calif. A '34, was killed in a plane crash near Chickasha, Okla., March 17, 1944, and it was learned from his widow in San Francisco in October that the plane in which he was killed was piloted by Capt. Henry Roy Faucette, Jr., Ala. I '40, Ala. A-M, who was also killed as re-

ported in previous issues of THE RECORD. Mrs. Peattie saw a picture of Captain Faucette in the August issue, along with that of his brother, 1st Lt. William Lee Faucette, Ala. A-M '42, who was killed in a plane crash at Houma, La., August 22, 1943. Captain Peattie was a passenger in the plane, returning to Fort Sill, Okla., from Oklahoma City. Captain Peattie received his commission at Stanford University in 1933 and went on active duty there in 1940 as associate professor of military science and tactics. In September, 1942, he transferred to the glider force and when this program was curtailed, he returned to the field artillery and took his liaison pilot training at Fort Sill. He had recently received his wings when the crash occurred.

A/C DEAN PRESTON
(144)

A/C Dean Preston, Mass. B-T '43, Army Air Force, was killed when his plane crashed at Walnut Ridge, Ark., August 4, 1943. He was listed in THE RECORD as ΣAE's 144th Gold Star but details were not received from relatives in Midlothian, Ill., until recently. He was soloing at the time of the crash. When his plane controls locked, he bailed out but his parachute caught in the tail of the plane and he was dragged to earth. He was to have received his wings the following month. A/C Preston was buried at his home.

PVT. DONALD RICHARDS
(242)

Pvt. Donald W. Richards, Mass. Γ '46, was killed in action in France, August 1, 1944, according to word received by his relatives in Boston, Mass. He was the only member of the Harvard University class of 1945 to win letters in three sports. He starred as a sophomore on the 1942 Crimson 11. He is the son of Robert G. Richards, Mass. Γ '16. Pvt. Richards wrote his last letter to his family on July 28 from among the hedgerows of France where he had dug a foxhole, taken a bath from water in his helmet and felt at "peace with the world." He was on his way up to the front when he wrote the letter telling of his adventures while using a water can for a desk and a slit trench for a home.

LT. HARRY E. SAYLE, JR.
(222)

2nd Lt. Harry E. Sayle, Jr., Tenn. N '45, was killed when his training plane crashed near New Hamilton, Miss., May 31, 1944. He was stationed at the Army Air Field at Columbus. Death came instantly when his twin engine A T-10 training plane crashed. He was a pilot and instrument instructor and received his commission in February, 1944. He left Vanderbilt University to enlist in the Army Air Corps.

LT. MORRIS SAYLOR
(259)

1st Lt. Morris Saylor, Jr., Tenn. N '42, was killed in action with the Eighth Air Force in England, June 2, 1944. He enlisted at Fort Thomas, Ky., in May, 1942, and was commissioned as a lieutenant in a bomber squadron in May, 1943. He was sent for training as a bombardier to Carlsbad, N.M., and in October, 1943, was assigned to overseas duty in England in October, 1943.

LT. OTHOR R. SHADWICK
(233)

2nd Lt. Othor R. Shadwick, Ky. E '43, Infantry, was killed in France, July 15, 1944. He had received his commission from infantry school at Fort Benning, Ga., July 31, 1943. He was stationed at Camp Wheeler, Ga., Fort Jackson, S.C., and Camp Atterbury, Ind. Lt. Shadwick went overseas last May and was in England for three weeks, before being sent to France. He was married to Gene Ray Crawford, ΑΓΑ, in August, 1943.

**LT. ARTHUR R. SHULTZ
(267)**

■ 2nd Lt. Arthur Reynolds Shultz, *Ill.* Ψ-Ω '38, Army flier in New Guinea, who was reported as missing in action May 27, 1942, was declared legally dead July 1, 1944, according to information received from his father, Arthur E. Shultz of Olney, Ill., in October. He was awarded the Purple Heart for services rendered while in combat with Jap Zeros. At the time he was reported as missing in action he was accompanying a convoy of American troops when Zeros attacked, and during the combat he shot down one Zero and was pursuing another when he disappeared. He was flying over dense, uninhabited jungle. Lt. Shultz enlisted in March, 1941, and received training at Randolph and Ellington fields, Texas. He was vice-president of the Shultz Seed Co., Olney.

**LT. WALTER F. SIMON
(225)**

■ Lt. Walter F. Simon, *Pa.* Δ '42, son of the Rev. Walter V. Simon, *Pa.* Δ '15, of Frostburg, Md., was killed in action while leading his men in the invasion of Normandy. Lt. Simon was a paratrooper and went overseas in March, 1943. He served on the Italian front before going to England, after which he participated in the invasion of France. While at Gettysburg College he was Eminent Archon of Pennsylvania Delta. His father also served as E.A. of the chapter, as well as his uncle, Carl R. Simon, *Pa.* Δ '23. Lt. Simon was an honor cadet in the ROTC.

**A/C CHARLES C. SMITH
(257)**

■ A/C Charles Compton Smith, Jr., *Calif.* A '45, was killed in a plane crash at Gila Bend, Ariz., March 23, 1944. He enlisted in the Air Corps Reserve during his freshman year at Stanford University. He was to have been graduated at Luke Field, Ariz., April 13, 1944. He was in advanced gunnery school at Gila Bend, and was flying in formation dive bombing when killed. He had qualified as a single engine fighter pilot. Cadet Smith was buried at the military cemetery at Fort Sam Houston, San Antonio, Tex.

**LT. COL. JOHN B. SNOWDEN
(258)**

■ Lt. Col. John B. Snowden, II, *Tenn.* Ω '29, was killed in action in France, September 7, 1944, while fighting with Gen. Patton's infantry. He had been overseas since June. He had enlisted in the army several months before Pearl Harbor. Col. Snowden served on Gen. Ben Lear's staff until recently when he requested combat duty.

**LT. FRED M. THOMPSON
(235)**

■ 2nd Lt. Fred Marvin Thompson, *Okla.* M '44, co-pilot on a cargo transport plane, was killed in a plane crash in India, June 19, 1944. While taking aeronautical engineering at Oklahoma A. & M. College, he entered the Air Corps and received his commission.

**LT. LOUIS A. TOWSON
(244)**

■ 2nd Lt. Louis A. Towson, *Fla.* T '42, was reported missing in action in the North Africa theater, February 21, 1943, and recorded as deceased on the same date, 1944, according to word received from relatives in Gainesville, Fla. He was reported missing shortly after he had taken part in the giant Allied air assault which turned back the Nazis in the battle for Kasereine Pass in Tunisia. The Air Medal and two Oak Leaf Clusters were sent to his mother. The citation accompanying the Air Medal read in part: "For the destruction of one enemy aircraft in North Africa, January 23, 1943." The cluster citation read: "For destruction of one enemy aircraft, February 8, 1943, and for participation in 10 sorties against the enemy." It was reported that Lt. Towson destroyed the enemy bomber he was pursuing when he was shot down. His plane crashed between Sicily and Tunis.

**CAPT. HAROLD E. VANANTWERP
(221)**

■ Capt. Harold Edwin VanAntwerp, *Ind.* A '39, commanding officer of an Army parachute company, was killed in Normandy, June 6, 1944, according to word received from Sgt. H. M. Kinnear, *Ind.* A '43, who is in England. Capt. VanAntwerp enlisted in the service in 1941 and had been overseas since September, 1943. He was a member of an airborne division in the invasion. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. William VanAntwerp, live near Franklin, Ind.

**LT. NORMAN F. VANDIVIER
(254)**

■ Lt. (jg) Norman F. Vandivier, *Ind.* A '38, who was reported as missing in the Midway battle, June 4, 1942, has been considered as deceased by the Navy Department as of June 5, 1943. He was a dive bomber based on the Carrier *The Enterprise*. His plane ran out of gas after the bombing attack and he was seen in his rubber boat. Because of this, his parents in Franklin, Ind., still have hope for him. Lt. Vandivier, for service beyond the call

of duty, received the Air Medal, the Navy Cross, and the Purple Heart. The escort destroyer *USS Vandivier* was named in his honor.

**LT. JOHN MILTON WAGNER

While at the University of Georgia, Lt. Walker was a member of Phi Beta Kappa and Phi Kappa Phi.

■ 2nd Lt. Glenn A. White, *Ohio* M '40, bombardier in the Army Air Corps, was killed when his B-24 Liberator crashed while on a mission over Italy, June 11, 1944. He had made several missions over Roumania and Yugoslavia and was over France the day of the invasion, June 6. He received the Air Medal for these missions and the Purple Heart was sent to his widow.

**LT. SHELDON B. WILLOCK

■ 2nd Lt. Sheldon B. Willock, *Ky.* E '46, was killed in action in Normandy, June 28, 1944. He was with a division that landed June 7, the day after D-Day, but was not identified until July 19 when it was stated that the division had had contact with the enemy every day since it stormed the beaches. 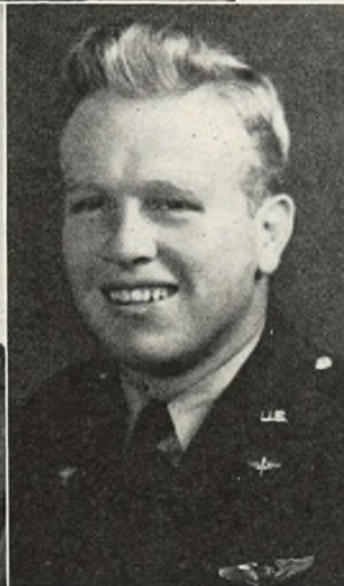

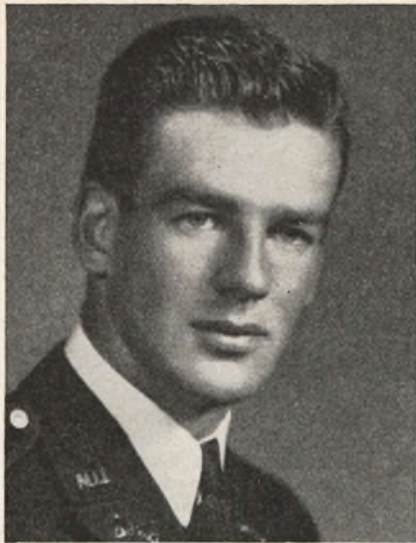

His parents received word concerning him a day after a son was born to his wife in Casper, Wyo.

LT. JOSEPH W. FOOTE

■ 2nd Lt. Joseph W. Foote, Jr., *Mich. I-B '40*, navigator on a B-17, missing in action over Germany since July 29, 1944, has been reported as a prisoner of war. He was one of four of the crew of nine to survive. He enlisted in the Air Corps in August, 1942, and became a navigator. He had been overseas about a month when he became missing.

LT. ROBERT P. HART

■ 1st Lt. Robert Palmer Hart, *Pa. Δ '45*, was reported as a prisoner of the Germans August 23, after being shot down over Leipzig, July 20, 1944. He was on his 32nd mission and was serving as wing head navigator. He was commissioned a second lieutenant in the Army Air Force in January 1944 and received his promotion in June for meritorious conduct. He wears the Distinguished Flying Cross, Air Medal and five Oak Leaf Clusters. His brother is 2nd Lt. Alfred J. Hart, Jr., *Pa. Δ '43*, who is somewhere in France.

CAPT. EARLE K. KELLY

■ Capt. Earle K. Kelly, *Vt. A-2-II '40*, pilot of a B-24 based in Italy, who had been missing since September 10, 1944, while flying over Austria, has been reported as a German prisoner, according to the War Department through the International Red Cross. After being reported missing, word was received from the War Department that ten parachutes (the whole crew) were seen to emerge from Captain Kelly's plane before it crashed near Keszthely, Hungary. In the same plane was T/Sgt. John C. Meese, *Idaho A '40*, radioman, who is listed in this issue as missing as no further information has been received concerning him. Captain Kelly was on his 12th mission.

SGT. ROBERT R. LONG

■ S/Sgt. Robert R. Long, *Pa. Θ '40*, waist gunner on a B-17, is a prisoner of the Germans according to reports received by his father, E. Walter Long, *Pa. Σ-Φ '11*. He had been on numerous missions before he was shot down over Germany last June. He had been reported as missing after a shuttle raid over Berlin. Sgt. Long was awarded the Army Air Medal sometime before his last mission, and was reported a prisoner, August 9. His brother is Lt. (jg) L. Walter Long, *Pa. Θ '40*.

LT. GEORGE W. TATE

■ 1st Lt. George W. Tate, *N.C. Θ '43*, who was reported in the August issue of *THE RECORD* as missing in action in Italy, June 3, 1944, is now reported as a prisoner somewhere in Germany. He was with General Clark's Fifth Army, when captured.

CAPT. ROBERT K. WHITELEY

■ Capt. Robert K. Whiteley, *Calif. A '29*, Medical Corps, has been reported as a prisoner of the Japanese in Camp No. 2 which is supposed to be near Davao on Mindanao Island. Captain Whiteley was in Manila at the time of Pearl Harbor and was transferred to Bataan where he was serving in a field hospital at the time of the fall of Bataan.

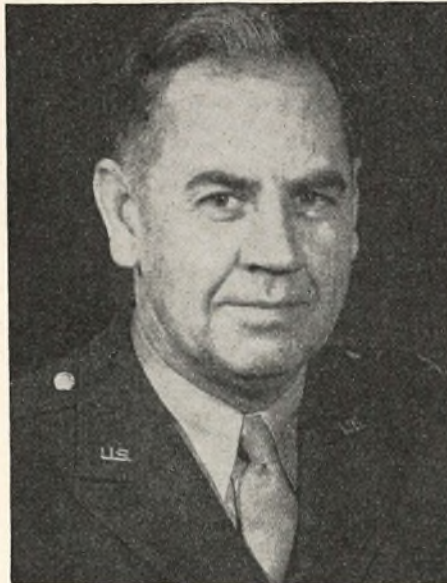

Big Job in European Area

■ Brig. Gen. Nicholas Hammer Cobbs, *Tenn.* Ω '15, is fiscal director in the European theater of operations. In July, 1942, he was named chief finance officer, Services of Supply, and theater finance officer in the European theater of operations, and then was designated fiscal director in June, 1943. He began his Army career as a second lieutenant in 1917 and was promoted to first lieutenant in 1918. He was commissioned a first lieutenant in the finance department in the regular army in 1920. On the same date he was promoted to captain and then became a major in 1935. A colonel in 1941, he became brigadier general in May, 1944. He was with the American Expeditionary Forces at Brest, St. Florent and St. Nasaire in 1918. He held various finance officer posts throughout the country following World War I, before going to the Philippine Islands and Manila. From July, 1939, until March, 1942, he served as finance officer at Fort McHenry, Baltimore, Md., and then served a brief tour of duty at Headquarters, First Army, Governors Island, N.Y.

Foss Continues in the News

■ Maj. Joe Foss, *S.D.* Σ '40, who holds the Congressional Medal and has equalled the score of Capt. Eddie Rickenbacker in World War I, is still gaining attention in the newspapers. After bagging 26 Jap planes and having a rest in the States, he returned to the South Pacific to continue his fight. In August, the Marine air ace escorted Charles A. Lindbergh, plane maker's agent, on an inspection tour of a South Pacific base. Just as this issue went to press it was learned that Foss expected to enter an Army hospital for treatment of malaria, which twice has forced him home from the Pacific. After treatment he expects to be assigned to the Marine Combat Training Base at El Toro, Calif. He completed another 30-day leave at his home in Sioux Falls, S.D.

Escapes Bulgarian Prison

■ Lt. Julian T. Darlington, *Ga.* E '40, who was imprisoned at Shumen in eastern Bulgaria, was among the 135 American officers and 170 enlisted men to be evacuated after they had been imprisoned following combat over Bulgaria, including the famous raid on Ploesti oil fields. The group moved by train to Turkey and then to a U.S. base in Egypt. In Cairo the men told the press of their experiences, living on half rations for months, enduring cold, disease, beatings and "gun butt treatment," at the hands of pro-Nazi Bulgarian officers before the new Bulgarian government took over. The Shumen group, who had been prisoners for periods ranging from three weeks to 13 months, were released after the Balkan situation grew tense late in August and pressure was put on Bulgarian authorities. They moved out of Shumen just two hours before Russian troops arrived to take over the city, September 8. Lt. Darlington had crash-landed his plane on Bulgarian soil and suffered head injuries and shock, but soon recovered.

Lt. Bimel Reported Safe

■ Lt. Fred B. Bimel, *Ohio* E '47, co-pilot of a Liberator bomber, who was reported missing in action October 14, 1944, returned to his base in Italy, according to word received by his parents in Cincinnati, Ohio. It was said that he had walked back from Yugoslavia to his Italian base.

On Japan Raid

■ S/Sgt. Robert A. Singleton, *Nev.* A '43, radio operator stationed at Calcutta, India, was in the first B-29 bomber raid on Japan, June 15, according to his father in Sparks, Nev. He enlisted in the Air Corps in January, 1942. He was on the B-29 which passed the lines into friendly territory in China but the bomber was wrecked in landing. A few hours later it was destroyed by Jap bombing. Sgt. Singleton was not injured and soon was back in India flying on a B-24 between India and China.

Aids Yanks in Drive

■ Cpl. George M. Simpson, *Ala.* I '43, *Ala.* M, was with the first troops entering Rome and played a valiant role when he rescued three injured soldiers under heavy artillery fire. According to a news release, one of the boys was dead when Cpl. Simpson reached him, but he dragged his body from a burning jeep and went to help the others who were not injured but were badly shocked. Cpl. Simpson gave them first aid and helped them back to a safer area. He has been in the Army since June 21, 1943, and went overseas about a year ago. He was awarded the Silver Star for gallantry in action.

Maj. Ammons on Guam

■ Maj. Teller Ammons, *Colo.* Z '23, former governor of Colorado, is army civil affairs officer on the island of Guam, and works hand-in-hand with his brother-in-law, Maj. Gen. Henry L. Larsen, Marine Corps, island commander. Major Ammons is studying problems of the natives which grew out of the Japanese rule and their property and personal losses in the battle for Guam. It was reported that Major Ammons may become governor of Guam when the situation allows appointment to that office.

In Charge of Voting

■ Capt. Francis C. Bray, *Mo.* B '27, had the job of getting ballots to soldiers in the European theater. When absentee ballots were being dropped by parachute to American paratroopers isolated in Holland and voting in the presidential election was going on at "foxhole level," Captain Bray was in charge, as assistant to Col. Thomas R. Kerschner, European theater coordinator of soldier voting. Captain Bray went overseas about eight months ago and has been in General Eisenhower's headquarters most of the time.

Manufactures Gases

■ 1st Lt. Charles R. Lohrman, *Pa.* Φ '42, is an engineer with a gas generating unit overseas and has the job of manufacturing all of the non-poisonous gases being used in the Southwest Pacific. He has been commended highly by officers for his work. Lt. Lohrman entered the armed forces in April, 1942. He was a member of ROTC at Carnegie Institute of Technology.

Worst Battered Fortress

■ Considered as one of the worst battered fortresses to return to a base, a B-17 crash landed at a Royal Air Force fighter field in England with Maj. Alex Andrews, *N.C.* Ξ '34, nephew of Alexander B. Andrews, *N.C.* Ξ '93, of Raleigh, N.C., who had heroically tended the wounded on the crippled plane. The flak-happy Fortress had received a direct hit from an 88 mm. shell and struggled back to its base with its nose shot off and two motors out of commission. Maj. Andrews, co-pilot observer, had braved a 200-mile per hour gale which swept through the damaged nose to administer first aid to the seriously wounded bombardier. Giving his oxygen mask to the wounded man, Maj. Andrews crawled down into the wreckage of the nose in an attempt to save the life of the injured crew member. The ship returned from a mission over southern France minus a gunner, a navigator and a dead bombardier. Recently Maj. Andrews received the Air Medal for meritorious achievement during combat bombing missions over Nazi Europe.



U.S. Army Air Forces

Capt. H. E. Perry, Wis. A '37, Army Air Corps, Navigator on the Standardization Board at Walla Walla, Wash., Army Field, after serving with the Famous 19th Heavy Bombardment Group (B-17s) in the South Pacific. He flew 53 Combat Missions against the Japs and was in the Coral Sea Battle and the Solomon Island and New Guinea Campaigns in 1942. Captain Perry wears the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Silver Star with Oak Leaf Cluster and has a Presidential Citation with Three Oak Leaf Clusters.

On Raft for 11 Days

■ Lt. Comdr. Robert H. Price, III, B '37, was back on a normal diet two days after spending 11 long ones on a raft in waters west of Saipan, but he is fortunate in being alive today. It took a naval force enroute to attack the Bonin Islands to change its course to save him, Lt. Comdr. Price was rescued by a destroyer, June 23. He had landed his Hellcat fighter in the middle of a Jap convoy, June 12, which Navy flyers were attacking. From then until he was rescued he lived on eight ounces of water and one sea gull. In spite of sea dye and his tracer bullets searchers were not able to locate him due to the sun's glare. His rations ran out on the ninth day, and two days later a destroyer found him. He was too weak to climb the cargo net and had to be lifted over the side. He had lost 20 pounds and had drifted 100 miles from where his plane was shot down. He was rescued because a friend convinced the commander of the naval unit that it was worthwhile to alter its course for one last look for Commander Price. The rescue came on the fourth birthday of his son, Richard in Shelbyville, Ill.

Tells of Real Fighters

■ When Lt. Paul Castoldi, Wash. B '42, who commanded a platoon of the 100th Infantry, the famed All-American-Hawaiian Japanese Unit in Italy, returned to the States, he said that he saw his men face the greatest odds and they are "among the best soldiers in the world." Lt. Castoldi was on a 21-day rest leave in Walla Walla, Wash., after more than six months in a hospital, recovering from wounds received on the front lines. He was wounded by an anti-personnel mine in the battle of Cassino. He hopes that he will be sent overseas again to help finish off the enemy. He was one of a few white officers supplementing the Japanese unit. Lt. Castoldi reported for reassignment at a California base.

Transport Pilot Praised

■ Tifton, Ga., home town of Lt. Col. Henry Myers, Ga. B '29, turned out recently to praise the former airlines pilot who has become one of the greatest war pilots and who has had 13,000 hours in the air. An American Airlines pilot for seven years, Lt. Col. Myers, better-known in Tifton as "Brother Myers," joined the Army Air Transport Command and has made an amazing record. The Rotary, Kiwanis and Lions clubs in Tifton held a dinner in his honor in October, although Col. Myers was somewhere in France, and presented a painting of the flyer to his mother. Lt. Col. Myers piloted the plane that flew Madame Chiang Kai-shek from Rio de Janeiro to Miami in less than a full day's time—5,000 miles in 22 hours, which stands as a record today. Secretary Stimson was flown by Myers on his inspection of the western invasion front and Italy. Senator Richard B. Russell, Ga. B '18, recognized the hazardous journey he flew with Myers over the treacherous Himalaya Mountains from India to China—3,600 miles over area patrolled at that time by Japs. This flight was the first successful one over that sector. He flew Gen. George Catlett Marshall and Mobilization Director James F. Byrnes from Washington to Paris for a conference with Generals "Ike" Eisenhower and Omar Bradley. In fact, it seems whenever a big name needs to cover big distances, Myer's plane is called into action. It is said that that he has set his plane down on every island in the Pacific not actually occupied by the Japs. Col. Myers holds the nonstop record from London to Washington.



Safe: Lt. Richard Elliott Wright, Wis. A '44, Bombardier on a B-24, who was reported as missing in action over France, June 14, 1944, revealed in a letter to his parents in Racine, Wis., that he had returned to his base in England, September 13. He received his wings and commission at Big Spring, Texas, November 13, 1943, arrived in England, May 16, 1944, and participated in D-Day invasion.

X-Ray Equipment on Wheels

■ Lt. Col. K. D. A. Allen, Colo. Z '10, has developed a mobile X-ray unit which has been designed to give medical aid to wounded men at the fighting front in the European theater of operations. By putting X-ray service on wheels, Col. Allen, senior consultant in radiology to the European theater of operations chief surgeon, has helped to break a bottleneck in X-ray service which developed to some extent in the Mediterranean theater. Col. Allen's study of the mobile X-ray produced an Army truck fully equipped with tentage, modern X-ray machinery and power generators, ready to move on a moment's notice. Two blacked-out tents attached to a tarpaulin covering the back of the truck serve as patients' waiting room and picture-taking room. The rear of the truck is used for developing and drying X-ray pictures. Col. Allen served in World War I. The Sigma Alpha Epsilon museum in the Levere Memorial Temple has a painted American flag and summons from the King of England. The flag was painted on a piece of white cloth by British soldiers in the trenches on July 4, 1918, to show their love for Allen, American soldier who was decorated by King George V. Col. Allen was practicing radiology in Denver, Colo., when he entered the Army again in 1942.

Z '36*, of the Judge Advocate General's Department of the Army in Omaha, Neb., recently won the 1944 \$3,000 Ross essay contest sponsored by the American Bar Association. Z '31*, associate professor of theology, Chicago Theological Seminary; Capt. Roger W. Williams, *Colo. Z '34*, chemical engineer, now in Quartermaster Corps in Washington, D.C., and Capt. Jerry S. Williams, *Colo. Z '38*, Caribbean Wing, Air Transport Command, now assistant trial judge advocate of the wing, on duty at West Palm Beach, Fla. A first cousin is Hubert D. Henry, *Colo. Z '30*.

Jacob McGavock, '42, who is with the Eighth Air Force in England. Major Dickinson was wounded in February and has the Purple Heart and the Air Medal with several Oak Leaf clusters. He has been serving as operations officer of his squadron.

New Caledonia Initiation

■ Cpl. Vincent I. Peters, *W.C.P. '38*, now has this chapter designation with his name as the result of his extreme desire to be initiated into Sigma Alpha Epsilon while on duty in New Caledonia. After correspondence with the National Office and Peters' tracking down a member who knew enough about the Ritual, he was inducted into the Fraternity. After attempting to contact several members and finding them having moved to other parts of the Pacific, Peters posted a notice in the Red Cross club in Noumea. This brought results, but Peters found that he did not have the time to make the contacts. However, on a Sunday in August he started out, and after journeying most of the day, riding on various service equipment, he arrived at a hospital in an ambulance. There he learned the member he was seeking had left the day before. However, he found the last name on his list at Camp Goettge. This was Arthur S. Bimrose, Jr., *Ore. B '35*, who was on KP duty at the moment when Peters asked questions in the mess hall, and Peters found Bimrose filling peanut butter dishes! Said Peters: "Arthur then later initiated me to the best of his ability and I feel greatly honored now and trust that everything is now in order to make me a full fledged member." Peters was a pledge at George Washington University in 1936.

Hear from McDonald

■ Joseph F. McDonald, Jr., *Nev. A '41*, who was reported alive and well as a Japanese prisoner in the December, 1942, issue of **THE RECORD**, after having been reported killed at Wake Island where he was a construction worker and war correspondent, has assured his father Joseph F. McDonald, *Nev. A '15*, editor of the *Nevada State Journal*, that he still is "alive and kicking." McDonald's parents received another letter from him last August from a Japanese war prison camp. This was the third letter received by the McDonalds since he was taken as a prisoner. The first letter was reprinted in **THE RECORD**.

In Honor of Gold Star

■ Capt. Joseph J. May, *Mont. A '41*, pilot of one of the best flight-leading combinations in a Ninth Air Force A-20 Havoc group, has labeled his light bomber "Pauncho B," in honor of his chapter brother, Capt. John F. Burke, *Mont. A '42*, Army Tank Corps, who died in Tunisia, January 7, 1944, and who is listed as ΣAE's 150th Gold Star. Capt. May gets a lot of satisfaction every time the "Pauncho B" dumps a load of bombs on a marshalling yard in France or a highway bridge or a Nazi fuel dump or any one of a dozen types of targets the Havocs hit in support of the ground forces in France. "Pauncho" on the side of the plane is a Mexican with a sombrero and a football. Back at Montana State College Joe and Jack played a lot of football together. Jack (Burke) was hit in the stomach so much that he was called "Pauncho," and the name stuck. After being graduated, they went into the Army together and finally were separated, but carried on a heavy correspondence. Jack had named his tank after Joe, but Jack was killed and the tank put out of action. Thus, the plane named "Pauncho" is still going strong.

In Same Prison Camp

■ Through information from relatives of members reported as prisoners of war it has been discovered that six members are in the same prison camp in Germany. Listed in Stalag Luft No. III are: Lt. Joseph Arborio, *N.H. A '37*, AAF, previously reported missing over Yugoslavia, June 2, 1944; Capt. James Willis Daltzell, *Nev. A '38*, who was shot down over Germany, April 18, 1944; 1st Lt. Thomas G. Hammond, Jr., *Wash. A '43*, who was previously reported as missing in action in the North African area in October, 1943; 1st Lt. Robert Palmer Hart, *Pa. A '45*, who was shot down over Leipzig, July 20, 1944, and is in subsidiary camp, Stalag Luft I; 1st Lt. Bruce Thomas Rinker, *N.D. A '40*, previously reported as missing in action after a raid over France; 2nd Lt. John W. Vilberg, *Wis. A '37*, after being shot down over Germany, April 29, 1944. Two members are listed in Stalag Luft No. 1. They are: Lt. Alan A. Moore, *Pa. A '44*, shot down over Germany, April 18, 1944, and Lt. Nicholas B. Robson, *Kan. B '43*, shot down over Bremen, November 13, 1943.

Life Member in New Guinea



■ S/Sgt. John C. Matheny, *Va. K '38*, who has been with the Army Air Forces in New Guinea, became a Life Member of the Chapter National while on duty there. He wrote to W. Stirling King, *Va. K '26*, stating that in his 28 months overseas his only contact with the fraternity

was through **THE RECORD** that had reached him safely. Sergeant Matheny expressed his desire to become a Life Member and requested that Mr. King contact his mother in Richmond, Va., to provide a check for \$50.00 for a Life Membership. Matheny sailed for Australia in February, 1942, after training at Chanute Field, Ill., and Selfridge Field, Mich. He served as crew chief for the cargo plane of Brig. Gen. Walker while in Australia.

Remembers His Fraternity

■ 1st Lt. Robert R. White, *Ala. A-M '37*, who recently presented a check for \$50.00 to the National Office for a Life Membership in the Chapter National, has had two tours of duty overseas. In 1943 he was a bombardier on sea patrol with the Sixth Air Force in Central and South America. Later he was on 50 combat missions with the 15th Air Force in Italy. Lt. White's letter came from Midland, Tex., and he said: "I hope you will not hold my negligence of not paying Chapter National dues against me as I am only too proud to be a member of an organization whose efforts are dedicated toward building better Americans."

Letter from the Marshalls

■ Readers of **THE RECORD** no doubt will enjoy a letter from Lt. (jg) William J. D. Bell, Jr., *Va. S. '29*, who stated that he had been on the Marshall Islands for a year. His letter dated September 13 and received at the National Office in nine days was in response to an appeal to alumni to aid the fraternity during these trying times. The letter to Lauren Foreman, *E.S.R.*, read: "That was one of the nicest letters I've ever read! Here's my \$10.00 from the Marshall Islands. I've been out here a year with the Navy, been in three years in January. But if I can't help out old ΣAE in the first call they've made on me in 15 years, I'd be a pretty poor member. You're doing a good job. Keep the old club alive. It's been a source of joy and pride to me through the years. Call on me again if you don't get what you need. May this senseless slaughter soon end."

Baptised in Queen's Robe

■ The baby daughter of Capt. and Mrs. Thomas D. Wynne, *Ark. A-T '37*, was christened in Fordyce, Ark., last September in the baptismal robe of Queen Elizabeth of England. Captain Wynne had returned to the United States after his 31st mission in combat duty from an English base. The baptismal dress worn by the English queen had been donated to the Red Cross and Captain Wynne purchased it at a benefit in Leicester, England. He wears the Silver Star, the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Air Medal with three Oak Leaf Clusters and the Purple Heart. His first mission was over Bremen, Germany, November 26, 1943. He suffered his only wound in a raid over Oberpfaffenhofen, when heavy flak tore into the plane and left 21 holes in its body. His daughter was born while he was leading a bombardier group over Frankfurt, Germany, last January.

Brig. Gen. Saunders Injured

■ Brig. Gen. LaVerne G. ("Blondie") Saunders, S.D. Σ '22, of the B-29 bomber command in the China-Burma-India theater, was seriously injured in a plane accident. He sustained three fractures of the arms and legs and lacerations of the scalp. He was flown from India to Washington for treatment. In the August issue of THE RECORD an article described his part in the B-29 bombing of Japan last June.

Wounded in France

■ Capt. Richard L. Duchossois, Va. Σ '44, was seriously wounded in France, September 15, 1944, according to word received by his wife in Chicago from the War Department. He had been in constant action under General Patton since June. A letter from him, dated September 8, stated that he expected to be sent back for a rest period. His wife was informed that she would be advised as reports of his condition were received.

In Hospital in Italy

■ According to word from 2nd Lt. Albert B. Chipman, III, Mich. I-B '44, he was recuperating from wounds in a hospital somewhere in Italy. In a letter written, July 31, he asked for the last two issues of THE RECORD to be mailed to him as soon as possible as he wanted to catch up on fraternity news. Through request of the Red Cross copies of the magazine were sent to him via first class mail. Lt. Chipman received the Purple Heart. His father is Maj. Albert B. Chipman, III, Ψ-Ω '17, assistant trial attorney on the Board of Contract Appeals, Judge Advocate's office, Arlington, Va. In September it was learned that Sgt. Edwin Fred Eschmeyer, Ohio E '34, Infantry, who was slightly wounded on August 25 in Italy, was recuperating in a hospital there.

Hospitalized in England

■ Word was received late in July, after the August issue went to press, that Lt. Howard ("Buddy") Sellers, Ky. E '41, was confined to a hospital in England, suffering from shrapnel wounds in his left arm and right leg and a broken knee. He was injured in France shortly after the invasion. He entered the service in April, 1942, and arrived in England April 1, 1944. Capt. Keith Angwin, Wyo. A '41, also was reported as wounded on September 2 and is in an army hospital in England. His name is listed in the "Decorated for Gallantry" section of this issue. F/O William Karsteter, Ill. Ψ-Ω '40, was wounded on D-Day while serving with a glider group in England. He was grounded for six months. Lt. Kenneth D. Grumbles, Calif. Γ '25, was wounded in Admiralty Island in July.

Memorial to McDonald

■ A memorial service for Lt. (jg) James W. McDonald, Ill. B '39, football star, who was killed in the South Pacific, June 12, 1944, was held in the chapel of the Levere Memorial Temple, Sunday afternoon, August 6. Dr. Fred H. Turner, Ill. B '22, E.S.A., came from Urbana, Ill., to speak in behalf of Lt. McDonald. Chaplain William J. Jarman of Great Lakes was in charge and a group of officers from Northwestern University served as guards. Mrs. McDonald, who was a member of Alpha Delta Pi at Illinois, resides with her small daughter in Chicago. Others from the National Fraternity attending were Lauren Foreman,

Ga. E '01, E.S.R.; Park W. Stickney, N.H. A '08, of the Levere Memorial building committee, and Albert J. Schoth, Ore. A '18, chapter supervisor.

Saved by a Whistle

■ When Ensign W. H. ("J a c k")

Vaughan, Iowa Δ '44, was forced down in the Pacific and his plane left him without a life raft, he resorted to his musical background to bring his rescue by a destroyer. He blasted on a small whistle as he swam when he saw a destroyer in the distance.

The diaphragm breathing he learned in playing the clarinet for eight years enabled him to blow the whistle loud enough to attract a deck officer on the destroyer. While at Drake University Vaughan organized and directed a swing band and he has done considerable entertaining for men in service. In the Pacific his fighter squadron set a one-day record when it shot down 67 Jap planes. Ensign Vaughan lists four Jap planes confirmed destroyed and one probable. He shot down three enemy fighters in 10 minutes on June 19 over Guam's Orote airfield.

Keeping Up With the Boys

■ Sam Stone, Okla. M '45, has been so busy, trying to keep up with the members of his chapter at Oklahoma A. & M. College, that he said he was late in paying his Chapter National dues. He has been attempting to keep in contact with the men who were active at the time the Chapter closed for the duration. He said: "I write to 75 of them each month, mimeographing a one page news letter about the college, location of the various men and news of general interest. As a result I have a fairly accurate mailing address of those who were in school at the time the Chapter became inactive."

Named "Coach of the Year"

■ Capt. Fred Thomsen, Neb. A-II '23, University of Arkansas head football coach before the war, received the title of "coach of the year," by Sgt. John Kerr, sports editor of the *China-Burma-India Round-Up*, published in India. Last July the publication described Capt. Thomsen's coaching efforts in the Far East Theater. He had 42 teams playing volleyball in one Chinese town and was making plans for his "Rice Bowl" game during the fall. He set up a softball program for Army bases over China and managed a track meet attended by 5,000 fans. Capt. Thomsen is special service officer for the 14th Air Force.

Commandant at Moody Field

■ Lt. Col. Howard C. Stelling, Ga. B '30, is commandant at Moody Field, Valdosta, Ga., after serving as director of training at Turner Field, Albany, Ga., for two years. He was commissioned as a second lieutenant at the University of Georgia in the U. S. Cavalry in June, 1930. He received his pilot's wings at Kelly Field, Tex., in 1931. In June, 1942, he volunteered for active duty with the Army Air Forces after serving for eight years as a first pilot for Eastern Airlines. He entered active duty with the rank of captain in Columbus, Miss. His wife is the former Helen Wainwright, Olympic and AAU swimming and diving champion. Last June Col. Stelling was introduced to the American Legion meeting in Valdosta by Frank Rose, Ga. B '21, mayor. The mayor pro-tem is Maxwell Oliver, Ga. B '26.

Specialist in G.I. Food

■ Capt. Lawrence M. Jones, Wis. Φ '26, as a nutrition officer in the Army, is among a small group of specialists serving under the surgeon general. The group is primarily concerned with the nutrition of enlisted men. Recently Capt. Jones conducted a nutritional survey of a prisoner-of-war camp, being concerned with the observance of the provisions of the Geneva Convention with respect to feeding prisoners.

On the Wrong Track?

■ "We are puzzled by the following comment in a recent issue of *The Fraternity Month*. 'It has been our feeling that servicemen would just as soon read something (in their fraternity magazines) besides the Purple Heart stories of the brothers, since heroes are not always heroic and rewards in line of duty come by accident as often as not. The 72-point stories about dead heroes seem especially inappropriate as feature material just now.' Have we been on the wrong editorial track by devoting so much space to 'Our War Story—Continued'? No, a thunderous thousand times no!"—*The Phi Gamma Delta*.

Letters to 250 Men

■ In the August issue of THE RECORD a former Delta Upsilon house mother, Mrs. Harriette Evans, was reported to have been writing to approximately 168 ΔTs in the armed forces. As the result of this information appearing on the Greek exchange page, THE RECORD was informed that ΣAE's Florida Upsilon house mother, Mrs. Joree McFarlin, at the University of Florida, writes to almost all of the 250 members of Florida Upsilon whose names were carried in the August issue. In fact most of the service list for Florida Upsilon in the National Office was compiled from the letters received by Mrs. McFarlin. This fact, however, was not revealed until the story of Mrs. Evans appeared. Indications have been that many ΣAE house mothers are playing a vital part in this war by keeping track of the many members who have left the campuses for points all over the world. The National Office finds another example in Mrs. Elizabeth Luxon of Kentucky Epsilon at the University of Kentucky. She keeps the National Office supplied with news clippings on members in service. "Mom" Young of Ohio Theta at Ohio State is doing her bit too. The work of housemothers and members of Minerva clubs has assisted the National Office of ΣAE greatly.

Wins Swedish Prize

■ 1st Lt. Henry Gaither Perry, III, Fla. T '40, who has been a prisoner of the Germans for almost two years and listed as a prisoner in the August issue of THE RECORD after being reported as missing in action, February, 1943, has been awarded the Swedish Sports Medal for outstanding athletic activities and for promotion of morale among his comrades in the various prison camps in which he has been interned. The award from Sweden was made through the courtesy of World's Alliance, War Prisoners Aid of the YMCA, Geneva, Switzerland. He is in the German war camp, Oflag 64, Schubin, Poland. He was taken prisoner at Kaf El Mar, North Africa, by the Italians. He was first taken to Italy where he was interned in a number of camps until he was turned over to the Germans and taken to Germany, and then to Poland. His brother is Lt. Thomas Rennie Perry, Fla. T '44, Marine fighter pilot, Miami, Fla.

Caffery Now . . .

In France

HON. JEFFERSON CAFFERY, La. T-T '06, who had been U. S. Ambassador to Brazil for seven years, leaped into the European war limelight in September when he was appointed by President Roosevelt as the U. S. representative to Gen. De Gaulle's French committee.

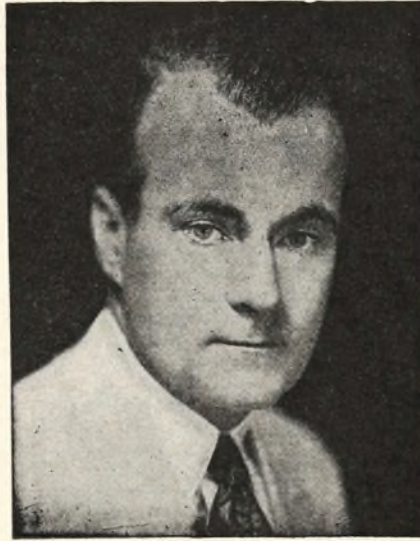
Ambassador Caffery left Rio de Janeiro on September 17 for "consultation" in Washington, and a few days later his appointment was announced. At that time he had the personal rank of ambassador but not the actual post, as the U. S. had not recognized the committee formally as a government. He was sent immediately to "the de facto French authority established in Paris," and in October the United States recognized the French government with Caffery as Ambassador.

Ambassador Caffery has been in the American diplomatic service since 1911, at which time he entered the field as secretary of legation in Venezuela. He did service in the Middle East during World War I, serving in Madrid, Athens, Tokyo, and Berlin. He became minister to Salvador in 1926 and then moved to Colombia with the same rank. After serving briefly as assistant secretary of state in 1933, he went to Cuba as ambassador. He became ambassador to Brazil in 1937. In 1939 he visited the States and was a guest of the Chicago Alumni Association and a visitor to the Levere Memorial Temple. While in Brazil he guided the construction of the huge embassy.

Time, October 2, labeled Diplomat Caffery as "Careerist to Paris" and pointed out that none of the appointments of nine U. S. envoys in Washington ranked in importance with Caffery's, "He is highly regarded by the State Department as a painstaking foreign serviceman who plugs away to carry out orders, digs hard for facts, win the respect of foreigners and keeps Washington well-informed with terse, one-page reports.

Changes Chest Jobs

■ William A. Sohl, Ohio M '33, is now executive secretary of the Community Chest in Omaha, Neb., after holding that position in Bay City. He resigned the Bay City job to accept the one in Omaha last August. Mr. Sohl also served in executive capacities with the War Chest and the Council of Social Agencies. His work in Omaha embraces direction of 39 local agencies as compared with 11 in Bay City. Mr. Sohl took his position in Bay City in 1940 after serving as assistant secretary of the Council of Social Agencies in Grand Rapids, Mich. He previously had been a staff worker in the same field in Cleveland, Ohio, Flint, Mich., and Kansas City, Mo.

Helmick Sent to China

■ Milton J. Helmick, Calif. A '09, former judge of the U. S. Court for China, has been sent to China by the State Department to make a general survey of Chinese laws, regulations and judicial administration, with particular reference to commercial laws affecting American companies having commercial interests in China. He will be in China about three months. He is a former attorney general of New Mexico and a former district judge of that State. Mr. Helmick served in Shanghai from 1934 until Pearl Harbor and was repatriated on the exchange liner *Gripsholm* in 1942 with American diplomats from occupied China.

Stassen—GOP '48 Hopeful

■ With the defeat of Thomas Dewey in the race for the presidency of the United States, November 7, Lt. Comdr. Harold E. Stassen, Minn. A '29, former governor of Minnesota, has become the Republican party's hopeful for the candidacy in 1948. Commander Stassen was in the Pacific with the Navy during the 1944 campaign. He was elected governor of Minnesota in 1938 and was the youngest executive in his state's history. He resigned in 1943 to join the Navy, saying he was too young to stay out of the war.

Top-Notch Tire Engineer

■ Eugene A. Roberts, Ohio Δ '24, in charge of airplane and passenger car tire development for Firestone, is considered one of Akron's top tire engineers. He has been doing much toward the service in this war. In 1943 he was named a technical consultant to help solve the Army Air Force's military aircraft tire problems. Missions for the Army took him to Alaska, England, India and Africa. He joined Firestone in 1926 after one year of coaching. Roberts became nationally known among tire men in 1939, when he developed a wider rim for auto tires.

Ernie Pyle at His Home in Albuquerque, N.M., after a Long Stretch Overseas. The Famous War Correspondent Expects to Go to War Again, This Time to the Pacific.

Pyle Back Home . . .

May Go to Pacific

WEARY of war and not wanting to see another dead man, America's Ace War Correspondent and Pulitzer Prize Winner Ernie Pyle, Ind. F '23, returned on a hospital ship in September to American soil after 29 months overseas.

In Ernie's last newspaper column from Europe in August he said: "By the time you read this, the Old Man will be on his way back to America. After that will come a long rest. And after the rest—well, you never can tell. I'm leaving for one reason only—because I have to stop. 'I've had it,' as they say in the Army. I have had all I can take for a while."

While overseas Pyle wrote about 700,000 words about the war and totaled nearly a year in the front lines. He indicated that after a rest he may be off to the Pacific for more war. However, when he arrived in New York, he found that longed-for rest at his home in Albuquerque, N.M., delayed. There he sat for a bust by Sculptor Jo Davidson and consulted United Artists about the movie production of his book, *Here is Your War*. Advance sales on a third book, *Brave Men*, recently completed, were running high. *Life's* photographer, Alfred Eisenstaedt, took a portrait of him which appeared in full page in the October 2 issue. Publicity came from all directions. Example, the Lions club of Dana, Ind., his former home, erected a sign pointing to the house and referred to Pyle as "Hoosier vagabond."

Finally Pyle arrived in Albuquerque, but for how much rest? On October 27 New Mexico University conferred the degree of doctor of letters on him at commencement exercises. In a letter received by the Associate Editor from Pyle in Albuquerque, dated October 18, he stated that he discovered after several months of living overseas with Don Whitehead, Ky. E '30, war correspondent, that both were members of ΣAE. He mentioned that he had received a copy of the May, 1944, RECORD (his picture was on the cover) in France.

On November 13, Indiana University, Pyle's alma mater, conferred an honorary degree of doctor of humane letters on him. Indiana Gamma held open house for Pyle.

He left the Army under the over-38-year-regulation. His son, Bobby Jones, III, who has gained nation-wide attention in golf, was pledged to Georgia Phi at Georgia School of Technology, as listed in the August issue of THE RECORD. Georgia Phi calls its chapter house the "Bobby Jones Lodge."

Vallee Back on Radio

■ After Rudy Vallee, Me. A '25, left the Coast Guard in July, it was not long until he was on the ether waves again. On September 9 he returned to the air on the Procter & Gamble Drene program. His brother, William Lynch Vallee, N.Y. M '33, is still free-lancing as a writer, according to word received from him in September. He left his home in Maine that month to return to New York "and the procession of Lana Turners and Spencer Tracys." He writes for several movie magazines.

In War Board Chair

■ J. Glenn Donaldson, Mich. I-B '26, attorney in Denver, Colo., is chairman of the Ninth Regional War Labor Board and the Nonferrous Metals Commission, with headquarters in Denver. He was acting chairman since July 15 and was appointed October 1. Formerly he was state inheritance tax commissioner for Colorado and served as assistant attorney general for the state for seven years. In 1941 he was counsel for the department of consumers' credit studies of the Russell Sage Foundation in New York. The Alumni Program Swings into Action

THE ALUMNI PROGRAM of Sigma Alpha Epsilon has of recent weeks become a prominent subject for discussion throughout the realm of ΣAE. Its central purpose is both simple and direct: to help the active Chapters of ΣAE now and in the permanent future. The ΣAE Alumni Program is not a temporary affair. It is here to stay. Its whole pattern is based on permanence.

Briefly, as the content of the summary in later paragraphs will show, its further aims are:

1. To reactivate all undergraduate Chapters which have been made quiescent by the call of members to the wars.
2. To build postwar active Chapters to a level of greater strength and quality and purposeful achievement in brotherhood.
3. To weld into the postwar active program a determination to shape the interests and activities of the Chapter so that such interests and activities become identified with those of the collegiate institution at which the Chapter is domiciled.
4. To improve and strengthen Chapter management, financial administration, and alumni cooperation.

In sum, the Alumni Program, through the multiple activities outlined in the following paragraphs, comes to a focus on the undergraduate active Chapter. The new group of Key Men of ΣAE, alumni groups with concrete and sharply defined calendars of action, the Minerva Clubs, and other important units of blueprinted active Chapter help—all focus their work on the reactivating and the rebuilding of strong Chapters on a permanent long-pull basis.

The Alumni Program has grown out of a mandate of the 1943 Convention, which instructed the Supreme Council to develop a plan for bringing the alumni in closer touch with the active Chapters and assisting in the promotion of better relations with parents, colleges, other campus organizations, and that part of the public coming directly in contact with college activities.

With the purpose of putting the immense power of thousands of loyally interested alumni back of a concrete and carefully planned program to strengthen the active Chapters, and with the further purpose of inviting constructive alumni participation in all the affairs of ΣAE, the Supreme Council at its meeting in Evanston, Ill., August 17-19, 1944, approved the comprehensive alumni schedule, and put it under the direction of a committee, composed of Robert R. Aurner, Eminent Supreme Chronicler, Chairman; Harry G. Griswold, Archon, Province Gamma, Vice Chairman; Lauren Foreman, Eminent Supreme Recorder; Charles H. Barker, Archon, Province Mu; and Edward G. Hathcock, Archon, Province Kappa.

The Supreme Council, through the committee, directed that the "test run" of

the entire program be held in Province Gamma, under the direction of its Archon, Harry G. Griswold, who is also vice chairman of the committee. Under the direction of the full committee, the preliminary steps of the program have been in progress for several weeks, and the first of the Alumni Indoctrination Schools, which are a prominent feature of the program, was held at the Statler Hotel, Washington, D. C., Sunday, November 26.

The detailed purposes of the Alumni Program are set forth in the following digest which has been prepared by those in active charge of the program.

Purpose of the Program

The purpose of the program is to better the public relations of the Fraternity by improving the quality of the active Chapters, by strengthening campus relations, the relations with parents, and with the general public coming in contact with Chapter members.

The plan provides five main target-objectives:

1. To reactivate alumni interest in the work of the Fraternity.
2. To enlist alumni participation in Chapter revival, Chapter building, and Chapter supervision.
3. To provide machinery by which members returning from war and those leaving the universities can find their place in the world beyond the college walls.
4. To set up a concentrated program for keeping our own alumni acquainted with what is happening, and with the means by which they can be of help.
5. To broaden our organization so that we can use more men than we have ever used before in a modern, streamlined organization, eventually to be headed by experts who know their business.

In the plan for rekindling alumni interest we expect to continue the use of existing machinery by promoting Alumni Associations and stimulating their interest and by giving official recognition to, and providing a definite part for, the Minerva Clubs, both those connected directly with the active Chapters and those affiliated with Alumni Associations. In the field of new ideas, there are two means which are definitely forward-looking,

1. The creation of an honor group of organized laymen to be known as the "Key Men of ΣAE," and
2. The instituting of Alumni Indoctrination Schools.

"Key Men of ΣAE" will be men who have done and are doing something for the Fraternity in other ways as well as financially. They will be men who love to work with young men, and who are willing to spend time in digging up good prospects, in rushing, in taking part in pledge training and Chapter supervision, in promoting special projects for the benefit of the Chapters, and in helping to find a place in the world for these men after they have left college. In furtherance of this program is the Alumni Indoctrination School. For ten years we have had a school at Levere Me-

morial Temple for the undergraduates. We now propose a series of short, interesting meetings for the purpose of reteaching alumni what the Fraternity really is, the basis of its strength, and what the alumni can do to promote the welfare and improve the quality of the active Chapter.

The second major phase of this program involving alumni participation in active Chapter work will take on the form, first of reviving presently dormant Chapters of the Fraternity, then in helping to build all of our Chapters to a new high level of personnel, scholarship, moral standing and extra-curricular activities, and then in supervising Chapters to see that these levels are maintained. This is a large undertaking, but one which is perfectly capable of being attained.

The third objective involves the drawing in of practical, hard-headed businessmen, and forms a place in which idealism and sound, everyday help can be combined; finding a place in the business and professional world for young ΣAEs, both those just out of the armed forces and those out of school. In the beginning, this program will be centered at the National Headquarters. Channels will be set up through which the men and the job will be brought together. It is something more than finding a job for a man, or directing a man to just any job, for we plan to supplement it with definite scientific aptitude tests, to be conducted by experts and financed by the Fraternity.

The fourth objective consists of the perfecting of an alumni organization, built from the bottom up, employing hundreds and thousands of men, eventually to be headed by an alumni officer who will direct the entire program.

The machinery for the generation and the dissemination of live news about the Fraternity and its progress, to supplement our very excellent publications, is already available. We have in Evanston mailing lists so set up that information can be made available to our members in any city or state while it is still live "spot" news, and through this medium they can be informed about coming events and also kept informed about what is going on in the Chapters nearest to them or, if there happens to be any important activity in any particular Chapter, this will give all of the members of that Chapter prompt information. A good business makes excellent use of mailing lists, and certainly ΣAE is good business, and a big business as well.

The fifth objective, the streamlining of the alumni organization, will be dedicated to the task of tying together the work of individual alumni in smaller communities, and the alumni groups in towns, and alumni associations in cities and the over-all alumni organizations of the Provinces. No attempt is going to be made to set up a new bureau in ΣAE, but the long-time program does contemplate a reinforcement of the present machinery by placing under the ESR an officer of the Fraternity whose work will be with the alumni in just the same way as the ESR now has an officer in charge of Chapter supervision.

The Program In Action In order to get the program under way now, not next year, the Supreme Council has made

an appropriation to take care of such expenses as will be incurred during the first six months. This money is not going to be thrown away, but will be used most carefully because the biggest part of this work is going to be done by men who will give generously of their time and go wherever they are sent, without compensation other than that which comes from a sense of service to the Fraternity. It would be simple if we had the money to set up a high-

powered organization, but the Fraternity was not built that way. The success of this plan will lie in the very fact that a thousand men will do this work, and not just three or four. During this six months' period every effort will be made to get Alumni Associations and Minerva Clubs back at work with something to do. The first of the Key Men will be honored, and at least one Indoctrination School will be

held to test the methods and to evaluate the results. We then will be in a position at the next meeting of the Council to ask for additional financial support, which we know will be forthcoming if we produce.

The administration of the program in each Province will be carried out under the direct supervision of the Province Archon, for it is a definite purpose of the program that it must be

used to reinforce, and not in any case to supplant, the Province as an integral part of our Fraternity system. None of us has any illusions that the task will be easy, but if every man who has a love for his Fraternity will take even a little part in the things we want to accomplish, we will find 113 live, going Chapters of ΣΑΕ in the place of the 76 who are now active, and they will be good Chapters.

Endowment Funds of The Sigma Alpha Epsilon Fraternity and Levere Memorial Foundation

MEMBERS of Sigma Alpha Epsilon, who desire to contribute to its future financial stability and to provide the members of the Supreme Council an income which can be used in carrying out the objectives of the Fraternity and of the Levere Memorial Foundation, may do so by making donations to either the Fraternity or the Foundation for Founders' Memberships at \$1,000, Sustaining Memberships at \$500, Life Memberships at \$50, or such other amounts as they may wish to give.

When checks are drawn in favor of the Sigma Alpha Epsilon Fraternity, such donations go to the National Endowment Fund; when checks are drawn in favor of The Levere Memorial Foundation, such donations go to the Levere Memorial Temple Sustaining Fund. Donations to the Foundation are deductible from personal income tax returns while donations to the Fraternity are not so deductible. The Fraternity is now engaged in building up these two funds and all donations received are permanently invested in one or the other of them.

National Endowment Fund

The National Endowment Fund was established by the St. Louis Convention of 1920 and as of July 1, 1943, amounted to \$26,888.37 at which figure it had stood for several years. No additions were possible during this period since all receipts from alumni for Life and Founders' Memberships were applied to reduction of the debt on the Levere Memorial Temple. Now that this debt has been finally extinguished, it has again become possible to increase the corpus of the fund which had grown to \$32,116.87 on June 30.

The primary purposes of this fund are to promote the building of houses for the Chapters Collegiate through loans to chapter house building corporations and to provide an income to assist in paying the expenses of administering the general business of the Fraternity.

Investments are carefully safeguarded by the National Laws and are closely supervised by the National Board of Trustees, consisting of five members, living in the vicinity of New York City, who are elected for ten-year terms by the National Convention. Through loans from this fund, the National Board of Trustees has been able to assist a number of Chapters and as of June 30 loans to six Chapters, amounting to \$13,278.74, were outstanding and \$10,000 had been invested in United States Treasury Bonds.

Temple Sustaining Fund

The Levere Memorial Temple Sustaining Fund was created by legislation adopted by the Fort Worth National Convention of 1940, its purposes being to provide an income for the upkeep, embellishment and improvement of the Levere Memorial Temple and to assist in the attainment of any of the purposes of the Levere Memorial Foundation. It is hoped that in time the income from this fund will be sufficient to cover all expenses of the upkeep and operation of the Levere Memorial Temple, so that it will not be necessary to use funds from any other source for this purpose.

Investments for this fund are carefully safeguarded by the provisions of the National Laws and can only be made by the Trustees of the Foundation on the written approval of four-fifths of the members of the Advisory Council which was set up to assist the Trustees in the selection of investments for this fund. The Advisory Council consists of five members, selected by reason of their experience and knowledge with respect to the investment of trust funds. The present members of the Advisory Council are: Norman H. Pritchard, *Ind.* A '04; Charles F. Grey, *Ill.* Θ '11; Joseph F. Govan, *Ark.* A-T '02; Edwin O. Blomquist, *Ill.* Ψ-Ω '15; and Judge Alfred K. Nippert, *Ohio* E '94.

As of June 30, 1944, \$12,043.75 had been placed in the Sustaining Fund. Of this amount, \$6,610.00 has been invested in U. S. Treasury Bonds and \$5,166.87 in high class corporation stocks.

Record Life Fund

The National Board of Trustees also administers the Record Life Subscription Fund which on June 30, 1944, amounted to \$438,483.62 of which \$438,206.83 was invested, as follows: U. S. Treasury Bonds, \$185,170.31; Loans on Chapter House Properties, \$104,603.75; other Real Estate Loans, \$126,887.77; Railroad Bonds, \$13,782.50; Stocks, \$7,762.50.

This fund comes from the payment of \$10 by each initiate for a life subscription to THE RECORD and continues to grow from year to year. Eventually it should provide a sufficient income to pay all the expenses for publication of THE RECORD and a balance for other fraternity expenses. Due to the lowering of interest rates in the face of increased publication costs, this result has not yet been attained but it was approximated during the year 1943-44 during which the cost of printing THE RECORD was controlled by sharp reduction in the size of the magazine and the number of engravings used.

Other Trust Funds

The Trustees of the Levere Memorial Foundation who are the members of the Supreme Council and the Eminent Supreme Recorder also administer the Student Loan Fund amounting to \$6,558.77 and the Special Scholarship Fund, amounting to \$28,360.70 which was donated by the late Mrs. Maud Gamble Nippert. Investments for either of these funds, other than loans to students, can only be made with the approval of the members of the Advisory Council. Any additional trust funds which may be established under the Levere Memorial Foundation in the future will be similarly handled and safeguarded.

John Moseley . . . Welcomed at Nevada

FORMAL inauguration of Dr. John O. Moseley, *Okla. K '16, Calif. A '30*, as the seventh president of the University of Nevada was witnessed by more than 1,500 persons including state, university and college dignitaries and friends in Reno, Nev., October 12, 1944.

Dr. Moseley, past Eminent Supreme Archon and Director of Leadership Training of Sigma Alpha Epsilon, left his position as Dean of Students at the University of Tennessee last June to accept the presidency at Nevada, July 1, when he was selected as the one candidate completely to fulfill the presidential requirements of the Board of Regents, faculty and student body of the western school. Approval of Dr. Moseley was expressed by the warm response at the inauguration as witnessed by myself and Robert A. Allen, *Nev. A '14*, of Carson City, who represented the Supreme Council of Σ AE at the ceremony.

The inaugural exercises took place at Mackay Stadium on the university campus, following the academic procession which formed at the Mackay quadrangle. Leading the procession were the marshals and ROTC, followed by representatives of affiliated organizations, university faculty, accredited delegates of universities, colleges and national organizations, boards of visitors, justices, emeriti and the president's party. All were gowned in the robes signifying their degrees. Dr. Charles H. Gorman, vice president and comptroller of the university, presided over the inaugural. Music was provided by the university band.

Ross Inducts

The invocation was given by Rev. Thomas P. Collins of Our Lady of the Snows Catholic Church, while the benediction was given by the Rev. James Asa White of the First Baptist Church. Judge William E. Orr, chief justice of the supreme court of Nevada, administered the oath of office, while formal induction was made by Silas E. Ross, *Nev. A '09*, chairman of the Board of Regents, who presented the seal of the university to Dr. Moseley. Guest speaker was Dr. Alfred Atkinson, president of the University of Arizona, who spoke on "The University and Postwar Demands." During the ceremony greetings were extended from accredited representatives. They were presented by Dean Frederick Wood, chairman of the inaugural committee. Myself and Brother Allen were officially presented and greeted warmly by President Moseley.

One of the interesting incidents of the ceremonies was the arrival by plane and presentation of Lt. Comdr. Elmer Toll as the personal representative of Rear Admiral Mahlon S. Tisdale, *Minn. A '11*, Commandant, Mare Island Navy Yard, Calif.

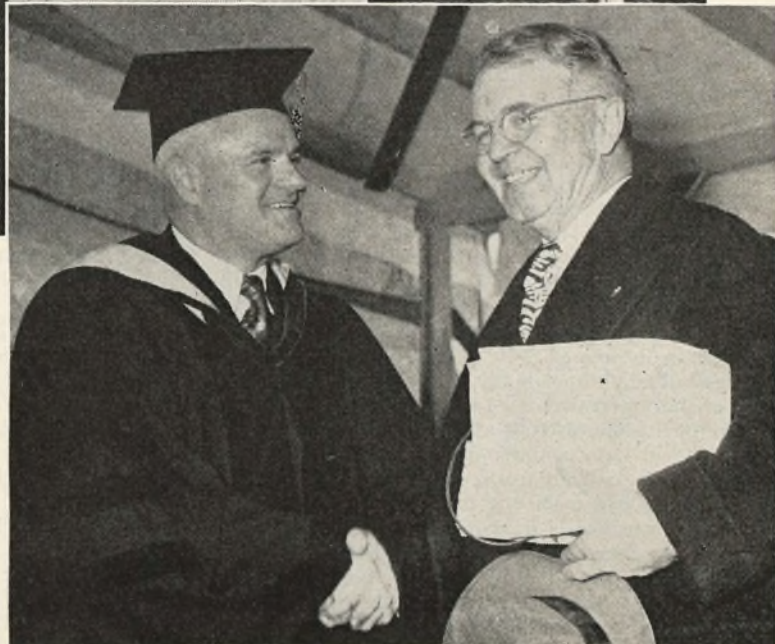
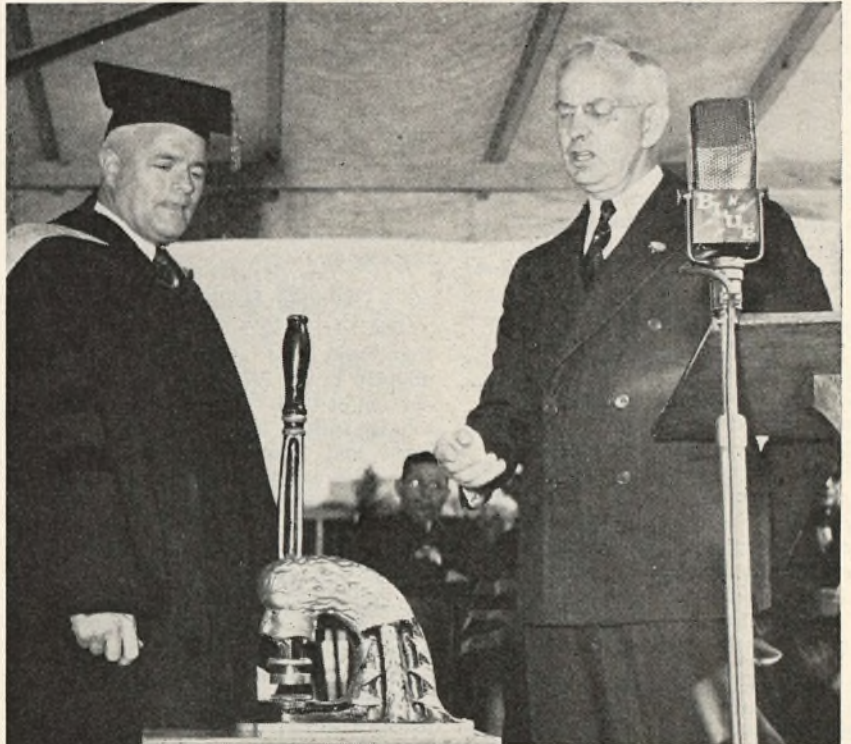

Thompson, dean of men, who represented the faculty.

There plans were made to re-establish the Nevada Alpha chapter at the university in keeping with the National Fraternity's Alumni Program, and to initiate several pledges on November 17 under the direction of Dr. Moseley. At the luncheon I gave the following tribute to Brother Moseley:

And the magic Nevada's silver has won.

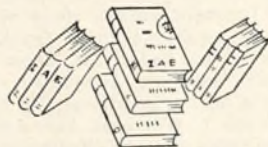
From Mt. Davidson's sides to Boulder

New Books In Temple Library

MEN WORKING (Harcourt, Brace and Co., New York)—A first novel by the brother of William Faulkner, Miss. Γ '19, famous author, calls to mind *Tobacco Road* and the *Grapes of Wrath*, but John W. T. Faulkner, III, Miss. Γ '29, who is now serving in the Navy as a lieutenant (pictured with his son in this issue) gives his story a sincerity and vividness all of its own. Lt. Faulkner was reared in the South where he learned much about the people of the soil, and later he was supervisor on various work projects which put him in close contact with WPA workers. His story concerns those poor white folks who gave up their hard life with the soil to try city living on the "WP and A," as the "Taylors" called it. The reader no doubt knows all about the "Jeeter Lesters" and the "Joads," but will find even more character study in the "Taylors" of this book. Book reviewer Harry Hansen, Ill. Θ '09, of the *New York World-Telegram*, said: "After he (Faulkner) has shocked you, baffled you, amused you and made you gasp at the economic dislocation of a Southern town you will admit that he's done pretty well for a beginner." Lt. Faulkner's *Dollar Cotton*, his second novel, was reviewed in THE RECORD in December, 1942, as a matter of having been received first.

LIGHT, VISION AND SEEING (D. Van Nostrand Co., Inc., New York)—Another book on light has been added to the more than 20 written by Matthew Luckiesh, Ind. B '09, director of the lighting research laboratory of the General Electric Company, Nela Park, Cleveland. Director Luckiesh has provided copies of all his books to the fraternity library including his latest. This book was the

result of more than 30 years of continuous research in light, vision and seeing. Mr. Luckiesh has been referred to as the world's greatest authority on light, and he presents this new book which deals with controllable factors which make seeing easier and greatly simplifies the subject of seeing in relation to light and vision. If you are interested in better seeing, ideal seeing conditions and their effects upon human welfare and efficiency, look at the simple diagrams and read the discussions in Mr. Luckiesh's series.

MISCELLANEOUS—*Alabama Lawyers Handbook*, edited by Judge Walter B. Jones, Ala. A-M '10, Past ESA, and published by the Junior Bar of Alabama, 1944, has been contributed to the library by Editor Jones of Montgomery who has taken a keen interest in the Fraternity's collection of volumes. Brig. Gen. J. T. Pierce, Wyo. A '14, Camp Howze, Tex., has provided a copy of *Cactus Caravan*, which is a good example of unit publications of this war. This attractive publication loaded with pictures of camp activities and maneuvers was issued by the 103rd Infantry Division and contains a photograph of Brig. Gen. Pierce, assistant division commander. A copy of *A History of St. Andrew's Episcopal Church of Jackson, Miss.*, by Nash K. Burger, historiographer of the Diocese of Mississippi, has been contributed by the Rev. Walter B. Capers, S.C. Δ '91. This pamphlet commemorates the 150th anniversary of the St. Andrew's parish and the 25th anniversary of the rectorship of Rev. Capers. *Mental Adjustments*, a cleverly illustrated booklet of 90 pages, has been contributed by its author, Dr. William Muhlberg, Ohio E '97, vice president and medical director of the Union Central Life Insurance Company, Cincinnati, Ohio.

Gallup Wins Medal

■ Dr. George H. Gallup, Jr., Iowa B '22, director of the American Institute of Public Opinion, was one of the four recipients of bronze journalism medals presented by the School of Journalism at Syracuse University recently. Mr. Gallup, originator of the famous "Gallup Poll," a system of public opinion statistics, has contributed a copy of his second book, *A Guide to Public Opinion Polls* (Princeton University Press), to the Levere Memorial Temple library. What Is a College Fraternity...?

■ In *Life* (in the Fraternities at Ohio State University) published by The Fraternity Affairs Office this year is an interesting article on "What Is a College Fraternity . . . What Does It Offer?" The article stated in part: "During these wartimes, the choice of whether or not to take a fraternity is facing many men who are entering Ohio State. It is indeed an important step, and one which every sound-thinking student should consider. What is a college fraternity? First, let us see what a fraternity is *not*: It is not a group of boys with a rah-rah spirit, a glorified country club, or an expensive four-year fling. It is not the popular song and dance 'frat' of the movies.

"Then just what is a college fraternity? It is a group of college men banded together with a common purpose of friendship, an organization founded and maintained upon high ideals and serving a definite educational purpose at the University. It is both tangible and intangible—the tangible, a chapter home and men; the intangible, a spirit of brotherhood and cooperation that makes the fraternity house a real chapter home.

"Most men search in college to find how they might make certain social contacts, form genuine and lasting friendships, and how they might learn to live with other men. For 150 years, many men have found the answer in the college fraternity. The greatest single feature that you receive from your fraternity is its fellowship and its training in the development of men. In a fraternity you will face many of the relationships which you will face in life. You must learn to give and take; you must have faith in others and instill them with a faith in you; you must develop confidence but remain modest in all your relations. A fraternity is really a democracy based on the principles of brotherly love and cooperation. You will learn from fraternity how to be a better citizen of our democratic nation."

Sorority Uses Temple

■ When Alpha Delta Pi installed a chapter at Northwestern University during the fall, facilities of the Levere Memorial Temple, national headquarters of Sigma Alpha Epsilon, were used for rushing and various meetings of the members. Timely Help From Alumni DESPITE a drop of 75 percent in the receipts for dues and initiation fees from the Chapters Collegiate which have hitherto been its chief source of support, Sigma Alpha Epsilon has been able to carry on through the emergency brought on by the war through the generosity of its alumni who from January 1 to October 31, 1944, contributed \$28,458.85, which could be used for operating expenses, in addition to \$9,995.00 for Founders and Life Memberships which has been added to the Fraternity's endowment funds.

In response to an appeal for assistance, addressed to alumni who had previously become Founders or Life Members, over 900 of these loyal sons of Minerva had contributed \$9,732.00 up to October 31, with additional donations coming in daily.

During the current year, a new record in the payment of annual Chapter National dues of \$3.00 was made, a total of \$18,726.86 having been received.

Receipts for the endowment funds came from \$9,095.00 paid for or on Life Memberships at \$50.00 each and \$900.00 from part payments on Founders Memberships at \$1,000 each.

Conspicuous among the contributors in each class were members of ΣAE who are serving in the armed forces of the Nation in all parts of the world.

With such substantial evidence of the loyalty and interest of its alumni, there is no reason why ΣAE should not come out of the war with flying colors and look forward to the day when the dislocation brought on by the war can be forgotten, except as history.

Rocking the Boat ONE of the four fraternity chapters at the University of Wisconsin which has maintained a house during the war period has been accused of violating the University's anti-hazing regulation and University authorities have asked that chapter's national organization to suspend its charter.

The specific charge against the chapter, according to the *Madison State Journal* of October 26, is of "inflicting mental and physical violence upon its pledges" which resulted in injury to a wounded war veteran.

Dean of Men Scott H. Goodnight is quoted as having said: "On a recent evening, the veteran and two other pledges were made to stand in close proximity to a hot fire in the fire place and this treatment was followed by paddling in the case of two of the pledges. The veteran, however, who was suffering great pain from his injured leg, was not paddled. He turned in his pledge pin a few hours later."

The defense, submitted by the chapter's president and two members of its executive board, was that the chapter "had held no specific Hell Week and that the punishment inflicted upon the pledges was actually less severe than claimed."

Such violations of University or College regulations endanger the whole fraternity system and merit the severest disapproval by all fraternity men. Those who engage in such practices are rocking the fraternity boat.

Editorials

Five Chapters Back at Work FIVE of the Chapters Collegiate of Sigma Alpha Epsilon which had been reported as "inactive during the duration" and were inactive during the college year, 1943-1944, have either resumed full activity or are conducting rushing campaigns and expect to resume normal Chapter life in the near future: Wisconsin Alpha at the University of Wisconsin; Nevada Alpha at the University of Nevada; Utah Upsilon at Utah State College; Tennessee Eta at Union University; and Montana Beta at the University of Montana.

Wisconsin Alpha was reorganized through the efforts of Dr. Robert R. Aurner, Eminent Supreme Chronicler and Chairman of the Committee on The Alumni Program, as the first fruits of that program. The Chapter has elected officers, is submitting its reports regularly, and func-

tioning normally though it has not yet re-occupied its house.

Nevada Alpha was restored to life on November 19 when a large group was initiated through the work of a committee of alumni of which Silas E. Ross, Nev. A '09, was chairman. The re-establishment of this chapter followed closely the inauguration as president of the University of Nevada of Dr. John O. Moseley, Okla. K '16, Calif. A '30, Past ESA and Director of Leadership Training, who is always a spark plug of ΣAE enthusiasm and activity wherever he goes.

Utah Upsilon, Tennessee Eta and Montana Beta are lining up desirable pledges and expect to be under full steam before the close of the year. In addition, plans are also being made to re-establish Nebraska Lambda-Pi at the University of Nebraska and Wyoming Alpha at the University of Wyoming.

Tenth Leadership School Defies Trying Times

DESPITE war conditions and anxiety concerning attendance, Sigma Alpha Epsilon's Tenth Leadership School passed its anticipated "low year" with flying colors. Fifty-four representatives, just half the number attending the 1943 school, from 39 Chapters Collegiate traveled to the Levere Memorial Temple, fraternity shrine in Evanston, Ill., Sunday, August 20.

Representatives came from the four corners of the United States without guarantee of immediate transportation home at the close of the five-day school on August 25. The school was the smallest ever held but successful in a new way. Its limited attendance resulted in closer acquaintance among the delegates and instilled in them the desire to keep the Fraternity alive, even down to a one-man Chapter, for the duration.

Dr. John O. Moseley, *Okla. K '16, Calif. A '30*, Past E.S.A. and president of the University of Nevada, appeared to conduct the school which he originated in 1935 and has enthusiastically directed every year. His assistant, Emmett B. Moore, *Mont. A '24, E.S.H.*, took the responsibility of directing several sessions and conducted the model initiation on the closing day.

Again details in the Temple were arranged by Lauren Foreman, *Ga. E '01, ESR*; Albert J. Schoth, *Ore. A '18*, Chapter Supervisor; Don M. Gable, Associate Editor of *THE RECORD*, who missed two schools while serving in the Navy in the South Pacific, and members of the National Office staff. As in previous years delegates were furnished rooms and meals in Willard Hall at Northwestern University despite crowded conditions on the campus.

On Sunday, August 20, following registration supervised by employes of the National Office, the delegates gathered in the Panhellenic Room to view fraternity motion pictures by G. A. Ginter, *Ohio E '97, ESW*. Again Leo Terry was on hand to bring out bursts of song from the delegates when they met in the Banquet Hall for a buffet supper. Dr. Moseley introduced members of the Supreme Council, Province Archons, visiting alumni and Mathias Noheimer, artist of Cincinnati, Ohio, who described the decorations of the Banquet Hall which he had painted in 1939. Mr. Foreman introduced the office force.

Memorial Service

Following the buffet supper Dr. Moseley led a memorial service program in the chapel for the 128 members of the fraternity in 78 chapters who sacrificed their lives in World War II since the 1943 Leadership School. The following prayers were given: "For Our Departed Brothers," David Allen, *Ga. Φ*; "For Those Wounded and Suffering in Body and Spirit," Ed Pellowe, *Mich. A '44*; "For Our Men in the Service," Dick Stephens, *Calif. A*; "For Our Brothers Everywhere and Their Families," Leonard Anderson, *Ill. B*; "For the Cause of Our Fraternity," Roy Miller, *Iowa Δ*; "For Our Country," Myron Walker, *Mont. A*.

The school proper opened Monday morning with introduction of veterans, those who have attended previous schools, by Dr. Moseley. Tom Shaw, *Iowa Δ*, had attended three schools while George Hubbard, *Tenn. K*, song leader, Joe Walt, *Calif. Δ*, and Bob Gillespie, *Pa. Φ*, had returned for their second school. Following the parade of the Chapters, the delegates adjourned to the chapel to hear the school's guest speaker, Hon. Paul A. Walker, *Ill. Θ '05*, past Archon of Province Theta and a member of the Federal Communications Commission in Washington, D.C.

Mr. Walker, who is well-known nationally and has the unique position of being a Bible class teacher for 25 years, spoke on "Building the Temple of Minerva," and described the Temple constructed in the memory of William C. Levere, *Ill. Ψ-Ω '98*. He said that in its symbolism, it is the modern counterpart of the famed Temple erected in ancient Rome in honor of Minerva, the Goddess of Wisdom,

symbolic of our fraternity. He referred to the various Chapter houses as Temples. Mr. Walker said:

"Our founding father, Noble Leslie DeVotie, did not misconstrue the purposes of the Fraternity. He was not unduly concerned about the building which was to house the first Chapter of ΣAE. I am confident that he never dreamed of a magnificent national shrine which would come to be a mecca for the thousands of ΣAE members throughout the nation and the world. While he appreciated physical beauty, and were he living today would share with us a proper appreciation of this Memorial Temple, he did not attach greatest importance to material things. First of all, he was a man of the highest character. His make-up was devoid of any mean or selfish thing. There was a self-abnegation about him which made him beloved by all his associates. He moved among his fellows with a spirit of helpfulness and those who felt the charm and force of his personality were inspired to follow his example. It is a tribute to his teachings and leadership that the Fraternity continued to grow and prosper and that it survived one of the greatest of all tragedies, fraternal strife in the war between the states.

Post War World Thought

"We should be thinking seriously of the place the Fraternity will occupy in the post war world. I am convinced it must be prepared to function, not only for the good of its members, but also that, as an institution, it must be able to serve the entire college community and adapt its program to the basic needs of the college. We must dispel the idea many people have that a fraternity is made up of snobbish, selfish, pampered boys who spend their time in fast living and look with disdain upon students who do not belong to fraternities. To overcome this prejudice, we must extend the fraternal spirit to all on the campus and our good deeds beyond the walls of the fraternity house. We must impress the student body, the college faculty and authorities, as well as the general public, with our fraternal and democratic spirit.

"I am convinced that the colleges of tomorrow will put increasing emphasis on scholarship. Standards will be raised and students who fail to make the grade will be dropped from the rolls. We shall find accelerated programs with no time for loafing. I do not mean to suggest that socialibility will go by the board. There should be, and no doubt will be, a place for good, wholesome social life on the campus. This is an important part of education. But there will be no place for protracted 'bull sessions,' and more honest-to-goodness intelligent effort will be required of students. If the Fraternity is to continue to play a significant role in college affairs, it must be prepared to fit into the new pattern."

Conferences Start

Monday noon daily luncheon conferences on rushing, alumni relations and leadership started when the delegates met at Willard Hall and were seated by Provinces. In the afternoon ESR Foreman discussed "The Paper Work of ΣAE," and a conference on rushing was led by Cobb C. Torrance, *Ga. B '21, ESDA*. Beginning late Monday afternoon the delegates adjourned for daily recreation, most of the delegates taking advantage of the beach of Lake Michigan near the Temple. Monday night Chapter Supervisor Scoth led a conference on "Chapter Administration." He was assisted by ESH Moore. Late Monday evening a series of general sessions with refreshments was inaugurated in the Banquet Hall.

At the opening of the Tuesday morning session Dr. Moseley introduced Charles R. Allen, *W.C. P '18, past Archon of Province Beta*, who paid a visit to the school. Dr. Moseley then presented the "Working Ideals of ΣAE" in the Chapel. This was followed by a conducted tour of the Tower Room of the Temple by Jack Colbert, *Okla. M '41, Treasurer of Province Theta* and past national traveling secretary. "The History of ΣAE" was presented by ESR Foreman in the Chapel. In the afternoon Mr. Moore led a conference on initiation in the Panhellenic Room. This was followed by a group photograph in the Court of Archons. Tuesday evening Dr. Robert R. Aurner, *Iowa B '20, ESCh*, and former scholarship commissioner, discussed public relations.

Meet All-Star

Wednesday morning a conference on chapter advisers, alumni relations and chapter leadership was led by Mr. Colbert, assisted by Mr. Ginter, Gilkeson and Miller. Greek Week and interfraternity councils on various campuses were discussed. This was followed by a presentation of the ΣAE crest by Dr. Moseley. That afternoon a conference of pledge training was held and in the evening O. K. Quivey, *Ind. B '12, past ESA*, illustrated the songs of ΣAE in the Chapel. At the general session later Lt. Bob Ruman, *Ariz. A '43, All-Star halfback*, who was practicing at the Northwestern stadium for the Chicago Bear-All Star game on August 30, was introduced to the delegates by Barry McNulty of Illinois Psi-Omega.

Collection of Chapter Accounts was discussed by Collection Attorney James E. Chapman, *Ill. Ψ-Ω '97*, Thursday morning. In the meantime the cast for "The Founding of ΣAE," a playlet by Dr. George H. Kress, *Ohio E '96*, prepared to act in costume in the Court of the Archons under the direction of Mr. Gilkeson. Cast members were: Barry McNulty, *Ill. Ψ-Ω, Noble Leslie DeVotie*; Earl Adams, *N.Y. In the afternoon Former Scholarship Commissioner Aurner gave a report on scholarship, with the use of projector slides handled by Chapter Supervisor Scoth. The report was preceded by color slides of various Chapter houses photographed by Mr. Scoth. That evening an informal dance was held in the Panhellenic room.

Portrait Unveiled

The highlight of the school took place Friday morning when the portrait of Director of Leadership Training Moseley was unveiled in the Chapel. The painting by Mathias Noheimer now hangs in the library of the Temple. Judge Alfred K. Nippert, *Ohio E '94, past ESA*, gave an inspiring talk and a jeweled ΣAE pin was presented to Mrs. Nippert. A collection from the delegates was subscribed to defray costs of a handsome desk purchased for the exclusive use of the Director of Leadership Training.

Dr. Moseley was on hand for the unveiling of his portrait after addressing the graduating class of 400 at the University of Minnesota on the previous day. His address was "Leadership in a World Which Is To Be."

Dr. Moseley conducted a final meeting and summary of the school in the Chapel Friday afternoon, previous to the model initiation planned by Mr. Moore in the Panhellenic Room. 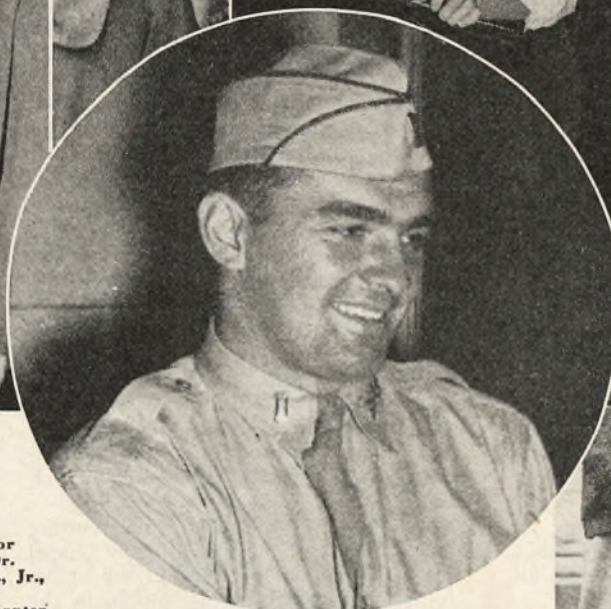

Ruman on All-Star Team; Harder Cited

WHEN the All-Stars met the Chicago Bears in a fast battle at Dyche stadium in Evanston, Ill., August 30, Sigma Alpha Epsilon stood out from various angles. Lt. Bob Ruman, *Ariz.* A '43, former University of Arizona half back, was named to the college team; Marlin M. ("Pat") Harder, *Wis.* A '44, received the *Chicago Tribune* trophy for being the most valuable player in the 1943 game; John L. ("Paddy") Driscoll, *Ill.* Ψ-Ω '18, was coach for the Chicago Bears half backs, and Lt. (jg) James McDonald, *Ill.* B '39, was paid tribute as one of the six former All-Stars who have made the supreme sacrifice.

Although Lt. Ruman did not play in the August 30 game which ended in a 24-21 triumph for the professional team, he was mentioned as an outstanding back on Coach Lynn Waldorf's All-Star squad. Pat Harder received the coveted trophy before the game began. Selected by newspaper-

men as the most valuable player last year, Harder was handed the trophy by Harry Stuhldreher who coached the Badger star at the University of Wisconsin and who was head coach of last year's All-Star group. Ambrose Schindler, *Calif.* Γ '40, won the award in 1940.

Paddy Driscoll was in the news limelight when he said: "This was a better All-Star team than the one we beat the last time. The last time was 1942 when the professionals whipped Bob Zuppke's Collegians, 21 to 0. I'll vote for this one as the best of all the All-Star games. And to think that 50,000 sat in the rain until the last minute."

At the half the field was darkened and the All-Star band of 200 musicians with their caps and instruments bearing electric lights came into Northwestern's stadium. Don Ameche, motion picture and radio star, delivered the lines which signaled the real purpose of the evening . . . a memorial tribute to all of those former All-Stars in service, but particularly to the six men who have made the supreme sacrifice. These included Lt. McDonald, who was a star in 1939, and was killed in the South Pacific, June 12, 1944,

An American Tragedy (1925). It erupted into violence in Faulkner's *Sanctuary* (1931) and spread into the dreary documentation of James T. Farrell's *Young Lonigan* (1932). Mr. Faulkner who has written several famous books and who recently has been busy with movie work in Hollywood is the brother of Lt. John Faulkner, Miss. Γ '29, author of *Dollar Colton* and *Men Working*.

In previous issues details were given in regard to the awards, but due to the necessity for conserving space in THE RECORD for all military information, a list is carried with limited details. This method also avoids repetition.

Lt. Westcott B. Stone, III., Calif. T '42, B-24 Liberator bomber pilot, Air Medal and four Oak Leaf Clusters, indicating 30 missions. His plane, the "Mad Monk," was the first to return to England after the D-Day bombing of Normandy.

Lt. Col. Willis O. Jackson, Ga. B '30, Silver Star, for gallantry in action in Italy, as a battalion commander of a front line infantry regiment.

Capt. R. W. Johannessen, Idaho A '41, Ore. B, USMC, Distinguished Flying Cross, presented by Admiral William F. Halsey, in South Pacific.

2nd Lt. Robert L. Young, Idaho A '43, bombardier on a B-24, Air Medal, for meritorious achievement in accomplishing aerial operational missions over enemy occupied Continental Europe.

2nd Lt. Edward A. Lahey, Ill. B '43, Air Medal with Oak Leaf Cluster, for exceptionally meritorious achievement while participating in ten separate combat missions over continental Europe.

Lt. Richard B. Trimble, Ill. B '41, Air Medal for fighter attacks during the recapture of Attu.

2nd Lt. Fred H. Sherriff, Ind. B '44, Air Medal for meritorious achievement while participating in bomber combat operations over Germany and enemy-occupied Europe.

Lt. Col. David Harp, Jr., Ky. E '41, Distinguished Flying Cross for extraordinary achievement in aerial flight as a group leader and pilot of a B-24 bomber in the European war theater. He also has the Air Medal and with two Oak Leaf Clusters.

Maj. Thomas Walton Fort, La. E '37, Bronze Star medal, for meritorious service at New Georgia and Bougainville.

Capt. Carlton H. McConnell, La. E '43, Distinguished Flying Cross, for extraordinary achievement in aerial combat over Europe; also holds Air Medal with three Oak Leaf Clusters.

Lt. (Jg) H. R. Davies, Jr., La. T-T '41, Purple Heart, following the Cherbourg bombardment in which he was on a destroyer.

Lt. John J. Lambros, Md. P-D '39, Bronze Star for meritorious service as commander of a motor torpedo boat during the operation of New Georgia, British Solomon Island. He also has the Purple Heart.

T/Sgt. Lee M. Craig, Mass. I-T '45, Pa. O, Distinguished Flying Cross for extraordinary achievement in aerial combat. He also has the Air Medal and two Oak Leaf Clusters.

Lt. Col. John A. Dunning, Mo. B '37, Legion of Merit for exceptionally meritorious conduct in the performance of outstanding services as director of gunnery, Foster Field, Texas.

Lt. Col. Olin E. Gilbert, Mo. B '39, Ala. M, commander of a P-47 Thunderbolt fighter

squadron, an Oak Leaf Cluster to the Distinguished Flying Cross for extraordinary achievement in 50 combat missions over Germany and occupied countries in Europe. He also has the Air Medal with three Oak Leaf Clusters.

1st Lt. William F. Pape, III, Mo. B, Colo. X '42, navigator of a B-24 somewhere in Italy, Distinguished Flying Cross. He also has the Air Medal with six Oak Leaf Clusters.

Lt. Col. Francis J. Corbin, Mont. A '38, Silver Star for gallantry in action near New Guinea, June 27, 1944.

Capt. Howard L. Fogg, Jr., N.H. A '38, USAAF, flight commander with Thunderbolt fighters over Europe, Distinguished Flying Cross; also has Air Medal with several Clusters and has amassed more than 70 combat sorties over enemy territory.

Pvt. Herman H. Parton, N.M. P '46, Bronze Star for heroic achievement in action in Italy.

Maj. Alex B. Andrews, N.C. E '34, Air Medal for meritorious achievement during combat bombing missions over Nazi Europe.

Col. Phillip G. Cochran, Ohio O '33, "Flip Corkin" of "Terry and the Pirates," Distinguished Service Medal for crack performance in the first airborne invasion of Burma. He has the British Distinguished Service Order.

Lt. Col. Ernest C. Young, Okla. M '38, Distinguished Flying Cross, presented by Lord Halifax for outstanding achievement in combat. This was reported in the August issue of THE RECORD, but the magazine was in error, listing Col. Young's chapter as Ohio Mu. He also wears the American DFC, Air Medal with 10 Oak Leaf Clusters and the Silver Star.

S/Sgt. William R. Hoover, Pa. O '43, the Purple Heart for wounds received while participating in sustained operational activities against the enemy in Italy. He also holds the Air Medal. He is a nose-gunner of a B-24 Liberator.

Capt. Richard C. Coleman, S.C. P '37, bombardier on a Liberator, Distinguished Flying Cross for meritorious achievement of low level bombing attack on Roumanian oil fields at Ploesti; also holds Air Medal with three Oak Leaf Clusters.

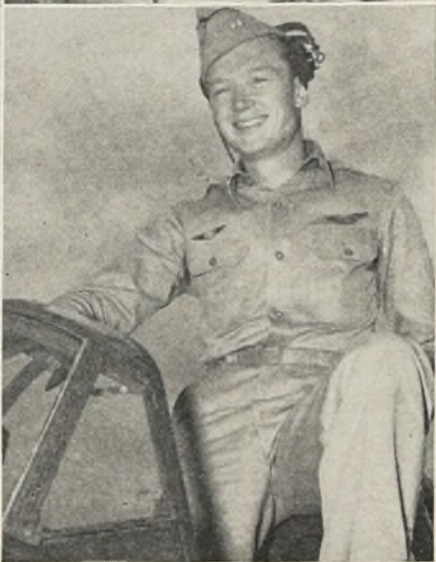
1st Lt. John Lockwood, S.D. S '42, Silver Star for gallantry in action and the Purple Heart for wounds sustained in action in Italy.

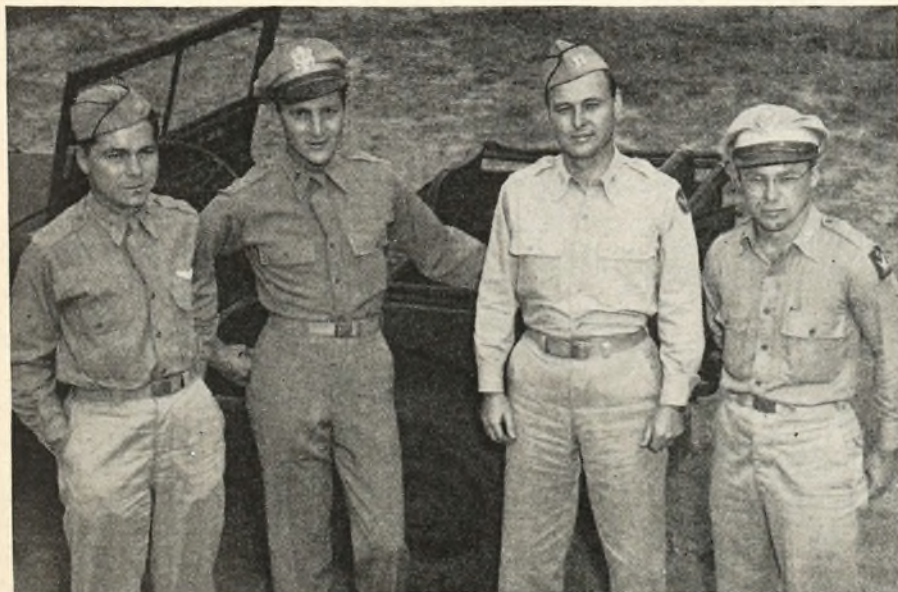

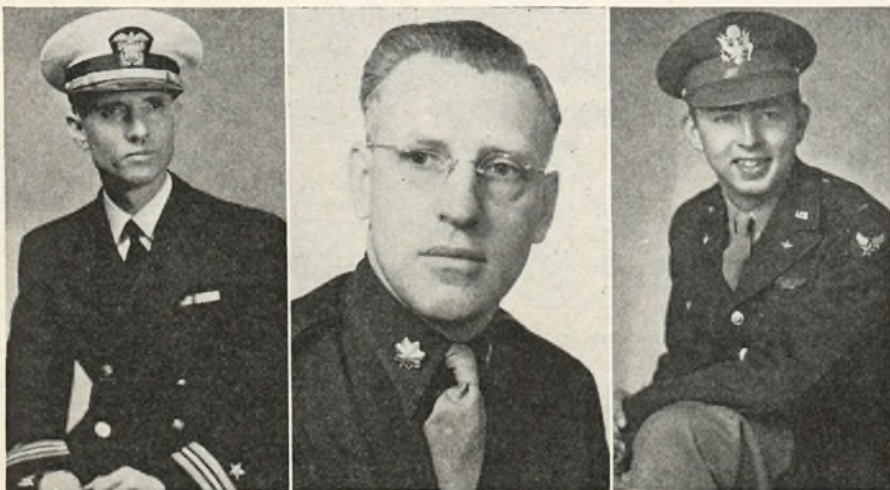

Utah Upsilon Reactivated

Chapter Eternal

MAJ. GEN. WALTER WEAVER Virginia Theta '04

■ Maj. Gen. Walter Read Weaver, Va. Θ '04, Retired, former acting chief of the Army Air Corps and former commander of the Army Air Forces Technical Training Command, died in Washington, D.C., October 27, 1944. In 1941 he was commanding officer of the Southeast Air Corps Training Center at Maxwell Field, Montgomery, Ala. He had served in the Philippines and China. Maj. Gen. Weaver was pictured on the cover of the May, 1942, issue of THE RECORD, with Admiral (Rear at that time, Vice now) John H. Towers, Ga. Φ '06. Weaver became brigadier general in 1940 and was promoted to major general in 1942.

Maj. Gen. Weaver was awarded the Distinguished Service Medal before his retirement last year, after 36 years of service. He had set up a system of training schools for air cadets and personally had awarded the first lot of diplomas at the school at Miami Beach. Rear Admiral Harry G. Hamlet, Ret., Mass. I-T '95, and Lt. Col. Howard W. Dix, W.C. P '17, represented the Fraternity at the funeral in Arlington Cemetery. Lt. Gen. Barton K. Yount, Ohio Θ '06, Commanding General of Army Air Forces Training Command, was unable to attend as a pallbearer.

FRANCIS A. SCHMIDT
Nebraska Lambda-Pi '07

Francis A. Schmidt, *Neb. A-II '07*, Ohio State University head football coach for seven years and recently coach at the University of Idaho, died in a hospital in Spokane, Wash., September 19, 1944. He had been in failing health for several months and was confined to a hospital early in September. Coach Schmidt had a record of 170 victories, 47 losses and 12 ties during his 24-year football career. After resigning at Ohio State in 1940, he went to Idaho in 1941, but his contract was not renewed in 1943 when Idaho joined other Pacific Northwest colleges in suspending football due to lack of players during the war.

In the Buckeye post he won the Western Conference title in 1939 and finished in a tie for the crown on another occasion. He gained fame with his "razzle-dazzle" offense in 1934 and earned the name of "Shut the Gates of Mercy Schmidt." At Ohio State he chalked up 39 victories, 16 losses and a single tie. He started his coaching career at Kendall College, now Tulsa University.

During his five years at Texas Christian University he made a record that placed his team on top of the heap in the Southwestern Conference. In 1932 he won the Conference championship and in 1933 he tied for second place. Always a fraternity leader, Coach Schmidt served as Archon of Province Theta from 1928 to 1934 and held the job of sergeant-at-arms at the National Convention in 1937. He was considered the most versatile gridiron instructor in the Big Ten conference. He had coached a girls' basketball team, taught esthetic dancing, conducted a community band, taught school, doubled on a cornet, bass, French horn and cello, and had given singing lessons.

DAVID C. CHAPMAN
Tennessee Kappa '97

Col. David C. Chapman, *Tenn. K '97*, well known as the father of the Great Smoky Mountains National Park, and prominent citizen in Knoxville, Tenn., died at his home in Topsiside, July 26, 1944. He was a wholesale druggist and civic leader for nearly half a century. At the end of the Spanish-American War, Col. Chapman became adjutant and captain in the Third Tennessee Regiment of the National Guard and was a leading figure in its reorganization. In World War I he was commissioned colonel of the Fifth Tennessee Regiment. A three-pointed peak in the eastern part of the Great Smoky Mountains National Park and the fourth highest in the Smokies was named "Mt. Chapman" by the United States Geographic Board in 1931. The highway from Knoxville to the park is named Chapman Highway in honor of the colonel.

GEORGE HERBERT CHARLS
Ohio Epsilon '02

George Herbert Charls, *Ohio E '02*, better known as Bert Charls, died in Cleveland, Ohio, September 11, 1944. An industrial leader, Mr. Charls started his career with the American Rolling Mill Co., Middletown, Ohio, and became general sales manager and vice president. He was active in research and one of the first men to perfect and use stainless steel. He invented processes for the production of copper and molybdenum in the



production of rust re-

sisting iron and steel. In 1915 he received the gold medal award at the San Francisco Fair for his collaboration in the development of pure iron. In 1919 he became vice president and a director of the Stark Rolling Mill Co. and the Berger Manufacturing Co. of Canton, Ohio. Three years later he became president of the United Alloy Steel Corp. He was president of the National Association of Flat Rolled Steel Manufacturers and vice president of the American Iron and Steel Institute of New York. He played an important part in the drafting of the steel code for the NRA in Washington. At the time of his death he was president of the Metro Coal and Limestone Co.
