Install Ohio Kappa at Bowling Green

• Ohio Kappa at Bowling Green State University, Bowling Green, Ohio, became the 114th Chapter Collegiate of Sigma Alpha Epsilon on Saturday, May 26, 1945, when 54 active and alumni members of The Five Brothers, local fraternity, to which a charter had been granted by the electorate of the Fraternity by direct vote, were initiated and posthumous initiation ceremonies were held for four members of The Five Brothers who had made the supreme sacrifice while serving in the armed forces of the Nation during World War II.

Dr. Fred H. Turner, Eminent Supreme Archon, was the installing officer and took the part of Eminent Archon, assisted by Lauren Foreman, ESR. Other members of the initiating team were: O. K. Quivey, past ESA, Recorder; Dr. Robert R. Aurner, ESCh., Chronicler; Albrecht F. Leue, *Ohio E '98*, past ESDA, Deputy Chronicler; G. A. Ginter, ESW, Warden; and Arthur H. Harris, Archon of Province Delta, Herald.

Albert J. Schoth, Chapter Supervisor, was master of arrangements and had prepared Recital Hall in the Practical Arts building, which was an ideal setting for the initiation, so that the ceremony passed off without the slightest hitch. Joseph W. Walt, *Calif. Δ '45*, *Tenn. K '46*, acted as chorister.

Others who assisted in presenting the initiation ceremony were George B. Barner, *Mass. Γ '30*, Treasurer of Province Alpha; Edgar L. Kuesthardt, *Ohio M '23*; Lee B. Kasson, *Ohio E '18*; Harry M. Seubert, *Mich. A '15*; Joseph C. DeHority, *Ind. Γ '23*; Alumni Secretary of Province Delta; Melvin H. Humphrey, *Ohio Δ '41*; James B. Rike, Jr., *Ohio Δ '42*; and Robert G. Cooney, Jr., *Tenn. K '48*.

The festivities and ceremonies, connected with the installation were spread over the three days, Friday, Saturday, and Sunday, May 25-26-27. Friday was given over to social affairs. Members of the Supreme Council and other officers, arriving in Toledo on early morning trains, were entertained at breakfast at the Toledo Club and driven to Bowling Green in time to be the guests of Dr. Frank J. Prout, $\Phi\Delta\Theta$, president of the University, at lunch at the Falcon's Nest. In the evening all visitors were guests at a buffet supper and smoker at The Five Brothers house, now the ΣAE house. Following the supper, ESW Ginter, showed his famous kodachrome movies, featuring the Leadership Schools and Conventions held at the Levere Memorial Temple in recent years.

Saturday was a busy day for all hands, the scheduled events resembling a three-ring circus with everything moving with clocklike regularity. Breakfast for the visitors was served by members of the Tri Lambda sorority at the Falcon's Nest. At 9:30 A.M., the men to be initiated were

assembled for completion of the necessary paper work under the direction of Mr. Schoth, who with the assistance of Dr. Aurner, Mr. Leue and Mr. Foreman, showed them the requisite qualities of a good slave driver. Result: all paper work was completed and reports made out before the initiation ceremony was held.

Having signed their lives away, the neophytes were then subjected to an indoctrination program in Recital Hall at which the speakers were the ESA, the ESR and Chapter Supervisor Schoth. Sessions were held at 11:00 A.M. and 2:15 P.M.

Simultaneously, an indoctrination school for the alumni of Province Delta was held in Studio B of the Practical Arts building under the direction of Province Archon Harris, assisted by Dr. Aurner, Chairman of the Committee on The Alumni Program; Harry G. Griswold, *Ga. E '15*, Province Gamma Archon, Vice Chairman; and the Eminent Supreme Archon. Sessions were held at 10:00 A.M. and 2:15 P.M.

Ladies Entertained

While the visiting ΣAE s and members of The Five Brothers fraternity were entertained at lunch at the Delta Gamma House, the wives of visiting members and other feminine visitors were guests at a buffet lunch at the Alpha Chi Omega house.

Entertainment events of the afternoon included an aquatic program by the members of the Swan Club (all lady swans) and a musical program by the Glee Club. Feminine visitors were received by Mrs. Prout and the wives of the deans at the president's home at 2:15 P.M. and were entertained at a bridge party at 4:00 P.M. and a buffet supper at 6:30 P.M. at the Alpha Xi Delta house.

The initiation ceremony was completed in plenty of time for the old and new brothers to assemble in Shatzel Hall at 6:30 P.M. for the initiation banquet at which the charter of Ohio Kappa was presented by the ESA.

Ivan E. Lake, charter member of The Five Brothers fraternity and one of the three charter members of the local to be initiated as charter members of Ohio Kappa, acted as charman and introduced Frank M. Cobourn, *Ohio Σ '15*, prominent attorney of Toledo, who acted as toastmaster. The program included addresses, as follows:

Introduction of initiates and reading of messages of congratulation by Lauren Foreman, ESR.

The program was interspersed with the singing of ΣAE songs, led by Joc Walt.

The busy and eventful day was brought to a fitting close by the installation ball in Recreation Hall with music furnished by the orchestra of Pretz Russell.

Sunday's program included breakfast at Shatzel Hall, served by the members of the Phrata sorority; attendance in a body at services at the Methodist church where a special sermon was preached by Rev. Leslie V. Vesey, the pastor, a graduate of Ohio Wesleyan University and friend of many members of Ohio Delta; mid-day dinner at the Alpha Xi Delta house; the first meeting at Ohio Kappa at 2:30 P.M.; and open house at the ΣAE house, 410 South Main St. at 4:00 P.M.

The first meeting of the new chapter was conducted by ESR Foreman, assisted by Mr. Ginter, Dr. Aurner, Mr. Harris and Mr. Schoth, until the new officers were elected, after which the meeting was turned over to them. The following were elected as the first officers of the new chapter: James Violand, EA; James Martin, EDA; Thomas Weaver, ER; Richard Crain, ECh.; Norman Klee, EC; Tom Mercer, ET; James Knierim, EW; Robert Logee, EH; and Ivan E. Lake, Alumnus Adviser.

At the open house reception, Mrs. Jennie Eckert, house mother, poured tea, assisted by members of the Alpha Phi and Gamma Phi Beta sororities. In a touching ceremony, EA Violand presented to Mrs. Eckert the badge which had been issued in the name of her husband, Sgt. Robert W. Eckert, one of the four men initiated posthumously.

The warm reception, extended to ΣAE by the University administration, the sororities and other student organizations was most flattering and encouraging. Visiting officers and alumni were entertained in the Practice Apartment of the School of Home Economics and in sorority houses which had been vacated by their members. Too much cannot be said in praise of the lavish hospitality which was extended.

The new chapter seems off to a good start and should soon develop into a strong link in the ΣAE chain. The Five Brothers fraternity was the first local established at Bowling Green and for years has worked toward securing a ΣAE charter. It was established in 1922 and had initiated 540 members. It was the first local fraternity on the campus to set up a scholarship requirement for initiation and

the first and only one to purchase its own home. The name, Ohio Kappa, was selected by the Supreme Council in honor of the late Dr. Clayton C. Kohl, who was the adviser and inspiration of the local in its formative years.

Prior to the entry of ΣAE, the national fraternities on the Bowling Green campus were Pi Kappa Alpha, established in 1942, and Alpha Tau Omega, established in 1943. The local fraternity, Beta Gamma Upsilon, is now petitioning Sigma Nu.

"Doc" Lake Praised

A great part of the credit for the successful installation, as for the establishment of Ohio Kappa, should go to Mr. Lake, charter member, who worked in season and out for the charter and co-operated 100 percent in carrying out the stipulations of the Supreme Council and in arranging the installation program.

The four members initiated posthumously were: Pfc. George Burkholder, killed in France, September 22, 1944; Sgt. Robert W. Eckert, killed in Germany, November 21, 1944; Lt. A. D. Glenn, killed in plane crash after bombing mission in the Bismarck Archipelago, September 8, 1944; and Lt. (jg) Thomas Gluvna, killed in crash of patrol bomber near Camp Allen, Va., April 16, 1943.

The installation was featured by the initiation of the first and last presidents of The Five Brothers fraternity: Meryl G. Hoskinson, '24, and James Violand, '45. In addition to Mr. Hoskinson, two other founders of The Five Brothers, Merwyn Nelson, '25, and Ivan E. Lake, '23, were initiated.

Included among the initiates were five of the signers of the original petition to ΣAE who are now serving in the armed forces: Bruce Edward Bishop, Robert Thurman Brown, Jay Urban Moore, John W. Berie, and Robert Louis Molineaux.

Alumni initiated included Dr. Donnal V. Smith, president of State Teachers College, Cortland, N.Y.; Hon. Fred L. Adams, member of the Ohio State Senate; and three members of the Bowling Green faculty: Sidney Conkel Stone, Lewis Franklin Manhart, and Emerson Clayton Shuck.

The Fraternity was well represented at the installation, despite the difficulties of travel under war conditions, those present including three members of the Supreme Council, Dr. Fred H. Turner, ESA; G. A. Ginter, ESW; Dr. Robert R. Aurner, ESCh.; Lauren Foreman, ESR, and Albert J. Schoth, Chapter Supervisor, from the National Office at Evanston, Ill.; all of the officers of Province Delta, Arthur H. Harris, Archon; Campbell J. Graf, Deputy Archon; Haughton K. Fox, Recorder-Treasurer; and Joseph C. DeHority, Alumni Secretary; O. K. Quivey, past ESA; Albrecht F. Leue, past ESDA; Harry G. Griswold, Archon of Province Gamma; George Barner, Treasurer of Province Alpha; and alumni from Toledo, Columbus, Cincinnati and other Ohio cities.

Since its installation, the chapter has held two initiations, one man having been inducted on June 15 and nine on June 24, making a total of 68 initiates, all of whom will be enrolled as charter members. Three of the new initiates are members of the Bowling Green faculty: Dr. Earl Clair Powell, Paul Muse, and J. Paul Kennedy. At the time of the installation, Dr. Powell was ill and Messrs. Muse and Kennedy were unavoidably absent.

Two Province Alumni Schools

• In keeping with the plans of The Alumni Program of the National Fraternity two more Provinces of Sigma Alpha Epsilon have staged Alumni Indoctrination Schools since the March and May issues of THE RECORD, when reports were made on schools in Provinces Gamma and Kappa.

The third and fourth schools were held by Provinces Delta and Beta, Delta being held on a limited scale at the installation of Ohio Kappa at Bowling Green State University, May 26, and Beta closely following with a school in Pittsburgh, Pa., June 3.

Reports on the new schools are as follows:

Beta

Province Beta's first Alumni Indoctrination School was held Sunday, June 3, 1945, at Pittsburgh, Pa., the home of two ΣAE chapters, Pennsylvania Phi at Carnegie Tech and Pennsylvania Chi-Omicron at the University of Pittsburgh. The school was conducted at the beautiful Stephen Foster Memorial building in the shadow of Pitt's 42-story Cathedral of Learning. The faculty consisted of Dr. Robert R. Aurner, ESCh., Lauren Foreman, ESR, Harry G. Griswold, Archon of Province Gamma, and Fairbairn Gilkeson, Archon of Province Beta.

Starting with the invocation by Rev. Francis A. Cox, N.C. \approx '05, Va. O '07, former Chancellor of St. John's University, Shanghai and Japanese internee, the fast moving program held the interest of the "Key Men" alumni from Cornell, Dartmouth, Illinois, Pittsburgh, Carnegie Tech and other schools.

ESR Foreman spoke on "The Organization of ΣAE" and "The Ritual of ΣAE." Mr. Griswold, vice chairman of the Committee on The Alumni Program took the subjects: "The Perpetuation of ΣAE" and "What the Chapters Can Do." Archon Gilkeson in addition to presiding spoke on "The Financial Strength of ΣAE." Dr. Aurner, chairman of the Alumni Committee, explained its program and led the group in a roundtable discussion to wind up the program.

Ending at 5:30 every "Key Man" in attendance agreed that the school was a success.

Delta

In conjunction with the installation of the Ohio Kappa at Bowling Green, Ohio, a limited Alumni Indoctrination School was held. It had to be limited due to the numerous and varied activities that were crowded into the two-day program. The meeting was well attended with some 25 members from many parts of the country. This can be considered a good attendance because the publicity on this meeting emphasized the installation of Ohio Kappa and not the Alumni Indoctrination School. Province Delta was well represented as there were members from all sections of the Province in attendance.

The meeting was well handled by Dr. Robert R. Aurner, ESCh., and Harry G. Griswold, Province Gamma Archon, chairman and vice chairman of the Committee on the Alumni Program. Since the time was limited, it was necessary that only high spots be touched at this meeting. ESCh. Aurner was called upon to give the history of the Alumni Indoctrination School from its inception at the meeting of the Supreme Council in August, 1944, and his appointment to head up and publicize this program. This can be well proved by reading *The Keynoter*, program publication. Aurner then asked Archon Griswold to give an outline of the meeting of the first Alumni Indoctrination School which was held at Washington, D.C., by Province Gamma. Some time was reserved for a discussion, and the many questions and suggestions emphasized the interest shown by the members in attendance. It was agreed that Province Delta would hold several of these meetings in the near future. One suggestion that came out of this meeting at Bowling Green was that we obtain a complete report from Mr. Griswold on his school for Province Gamma. This report is to cover everything from the planning of the school to suggestions on how to improve it.

G. A. Ginter, ESW, suggested that the first meeting be held at Cincinnati in August, and he offered to make all arrangements. The Province Delta officers have offered their services to Mr. Ginter, and we hope to have a meeting soon when all of the ground work will be laid for the first Alumni Indoctrination School in this Province.

Handled Important Jobs

■ After nearly five years of active service with the Army in World War II, Maj. Wilhelm P. Kennard, Mass. B-T '09, was retired to inactive duty at the age of 61, June 18, 1945, and is now a consulting engineer with office in the Bankers Insurance Building, Macon, Ga. A veteran of World War I, Maj. Kennard was ordered to active duty in October, 1940, served for a year with the Construction Division of the Quartermaster Corps and was then assigned to the Corps of Engineers. During this period he had charge of design and construction of Camp Wheeler, Ga.; some construction at Camp Stewart, Ga.; organization of utilities at Camp Forrest, Tenn.; and in the spring of 1942 was sent on a military mission to Persia. On return from this, he was stationed at Atlantic City for a while and then sent to India. He returned from India in September, 1944, and was in a hospital until the date of his discharge.

Seeks G.I. Loan Changes

■ Walter B. Allen, S.D. Σ '14, Chicago banker, heads a group of financial experts suggesting changes in G.I. loans for the benefit of veterans. In an article in the June 10 issue of *Finance* the American Legion's six point program to make the loan features of the G.I. Bill of Rights workable is presented. Legislation has been proposed to Congress as the result of a two-day conference held in Washington by Legion officials with experts from all types of financial institutions. The idea behind the program is to speed up loans to veterans. Led by Mr. Allen, vice president of the Continental Illinois National Bank and Trust Co. of Chicago and a member of the American Bankers Association's Committee on Service to Veterans, the financial experts have pointed out the barriers to G.I. loans erected by restrictive provisions of the law and the regulations of the Veterans Administration. The financial experts agreed that, if the six point program were adopted by Congress, the making of loans would be facilitated and, with an alternate plan covering business loans, it would be possible for the financial institutions to be more liberal.

Chapter Meetings Held in Jap Prison Camp

• Members of Sigma Alpha Epsilon held Chapter meetings throughout 1943 in a Jap prison camp!

From Capt. Charles F. Lewis, Jr., Calif. B '36, comes one of the most unusual fraternity stories of World War II. Captain Lewis, a doctor, returned to his home in California after being released from the Japanese at Cabanatuan in the Philippines, and has evidence of ΣΑΕ Chapter meetings in prison, a photograph showing members of ΣΑΕ who were prisoners at Cabanatuan in February, 1943.

News of Captain Lewis' liberation came through a letter from Maj. Robert K. Whiteley, Calif. A '29, who stated that the two men were at Cabanatuan when the Americans released them, January 30, 1945, and they both arrived in the States, March 16. Major Whiteley's letter was reproduced in the May issue of THE RECORD.

A letter from Captain Lewis, April 30, stated that members of ΣΑΕ organized a Chapter and had meetings and as the members were sent to Japan one by one, he was entrusted with the minutes which were lost during the raid that led to American release. Although the minutes were missing, Captain Lewis received from Manila a photograph of the ΣΑΕs. This picture was taken by a Lt. Col. Paul Wing with a camera smuggled into camp. Because Captain Lewis treated so many hundreds of men in prison, he has been unable to identify all of the ΣΑΕs in the picture, but it is hoped through its reproduction in THE RECORD that all members will be recognized.

According to Captain Lewis, Capt. John C. Ellis, Neb. A-II '36, served as Eminent Archon of the Cabanatuan Chapter. Captain Lewis indicated in his first letter, April 30, to the National Office that the members initiated an officer by the name of Meier in April, 1943, but an official report had not been received concerning this at publication time. Captain Lewis reported that a badge was cut from a silver peso found in Manila Bay.

Aid Indicated

The photograph reproduced in this issue shows the bamboo and grass shacks in which the prisoners lived and the perimeter fence in the background. According to Captain Lewis, the photograph was taken two months after the prisoners had received Red Cross food and medicines, and camp conditions were at their best; disease and starvation had greatly diminished, and the clothes the men are shown wearing in the picture were the best or only clothes in honor of the ΣΑΕ occasion. Captain Lewis stated that meetings were held although forbidden by the Jap authorities. Gradually the members were sent to Japan.

Captain Lewis and Lt. Col. (then a Captain) Garnet P. Francis, Pa. Ω '34, dental corps, were left at Cabanatuan to

care for the sick. According to Captain Lewis, Colonel Francis was severely wounded by Jap mortar fire in Santo Tomas in Manila in February, 1945, where he was aiding in the care of sick and wounded interned Americans. "He was flown home," Captain Lewis stated in his second letter, June 3, to the National Office, "and I understand is hospitalized now somewhere in the U.S. The other brothers are now in Japan as far as we know. Brother Whiteley was in Mindanao, P.I. at another prison camp when the picture was taken. Other brothers in prison camp but not in the picture were Ensign Paul W. French, Calif. Δ '39, and Lt. Stanley Leahigh, Nev. A '29. As far as I know we were the only fraternity to organize Chapter meetings in camp—was a big help in getting to know and live and help each other through those trying days."

After hearing from Captain Lewis, it was learned through a newspaper account that Colonel Francis and his wife, the former Lt. Earleen Allen, were in McGuire General Hospital in Richmond, Va., in May, and the Colonel was receiving treatment for a blast injury resulting in concussion of the brain and partial blindness. He had been injured four days after his liberation.

Colonel Francis and Lieutenant Allen, a nurse, were married at the front lines on Bataan, January 3, 1942, but three months later they were separated, not to be united until February 29, 1944, in the Santo Tomas prison camp in Manila. The couple

had been awarded the Bronze Star for carrying on professional activities while in prison. Their campaign ribbons are well studded with battle stars and each wears a distinguished unit citation with two Oak Leaf clusters.

The Colonel's wife was captured after her plane was wrecked in Mindanao. She was being evacuated with other nurses to Corregidor. The Colonel was captured by the Japs the day after his wife left Bataan and spent time in the Bilibid and Cabanatuan prisons (the latter as indicated) before being sent to Santo Tomas. The Colonel was quoted in the press: "From the first day of our surrender, the treatment was pretty rough, especially the food and medical aid. While I was at Cabanatuan, I was used for professional work and was provost marshal of the prisoners. I lost 65 pounds. On February 29, 1944, I was transferred to Santo Tomas with two other medical officers. Nearly a year later, February 3, 1945, we were released. Four days later the Japs began shelling the camp where we had remained to care for the sick and wounded. There was a number of casualties and I was in there helping to take care of them. Suddenly a shell burst right in the ward where I was working. My patient, on the operating table, was killed instantly and several others in the room were killed or wounded seriously." Almost totally blind from the explosion, Colonel Francis is recovering his sight.

Joined Engineers

According to reports Horace B. Browning, Ohio M '27 mining engineer in the Philippines who joined the U.S. Engineers on Bataan Peninsula and was captured when Corregidor fell, was lost when the Japanese ship on which he was being conveyed to another prison, was torpedoed. However, a letter from his wife, June 13, informed the National Office that the War Department had not listed him as lost as yet, "as there is some possibility that he may have been saved by the Japanese." Mrs. Browning, when she wrote, had just returned to the States with her two sons from Manila where she had been interned by the Japanese, stated: "Mr. Browning was in a military camp. In October he was moved with the other able bodied prisoners supposedly to Japan. True, the ship on which he was being conveyed was torpedoed and no word has been received of him. While the chance of him being safe is very slim, we are hoping against hope. He was taken prisoner at Corregidor and I have not seen him since although via underground communication, I knew that he was well until October, 1944. He wrote me once that he had attended a ΣAE meeting in Cabanatuan."

1st Lt. Fred S. Dewey, Jr., Ohio E '37, who was on coastal defense at Corregidor and held a prisoner of the Japs, has been listed as lost when the Jap prisoner ship was sunk by an American submarine in the South China Sea, October 24, 1944. Lieutenant Dewey has been recorded as ΣAE's 469th Gold Star, and it is believed that Browning may have been on this ship, but as stated before, he has not been recorded as lost.

At press time Mrs. Browning informed the National Office that the War Department had officially declared Mr. Browning as killed in action when the Jap prisoner ship was sunk in the China Sea, October 24, 1944. She stated that only nine of the 1,775 prisoners aboard survived. Mr. Browning has been listed as ΣAE's 493rd Gold Star in this issue of THE RECORD.

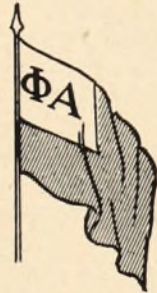

Overseas since September, 1944, he held the Purple Heart, the Air Medal with two Oak Leaf Clusters and a Presidential Unit citation with three Oak Leaf Clusters.

Lt. Karl R. Fye—417

■ 1st Lt. Karl R. Fye, Mont. A '44, was killed in action in Germany, March 15, 1945. He entered the Army in June, 1942, while attending Montana State College, and was called to active duty in April, 1943. He became a second lieutenant at Fort Benning, Ga., and went overseas in November, 1944. He received a battlefield promotion to first lieutenant early in 1945. Lieutenant Fye served with the 7th Army and received the Purple Heart posthumously.

Capt. G. P. Gammill, Jr.—420

■ Capt. Gilbert Porter Gammill, Jr., Ark. A-T '41, was killed in combat in Germany, April 1, 1945, while in command of a rifle company, according to word received from his father in El Dorado, Ark. He was awarded the Bronze Star for meritorious service in connection with military operations in France, Belgium and Germany. He was in three major engagements, the capture of Cherbourg, engagements in the Periers Sector and the breakthrough west of St. Lo. Captain Gammill was commissioned as a second lieutenant in May, 1941, and entered military service at Fort Leonard Wood, Mo., in July. In April, 1944, he landed in England as a casual, and June 13, he arrived in France as a replacement S-3-Officer. He is survived by parents, his wife and 20-months old son.

Lt. John R. L. Keig, Jr.—436

■ 2nd Lt. John Robert Lee Keig, Jr., Mass. Γ '45, navigator on a B-17, was killed instantly by flak in northern Italy, February 28, 1945. He was awarded a battle star for the Rome-Arno campaign and the Air Medal for sustained aerial flight. He also was recommended for an Oak Leaf Cluster to the Air Medal. Lieutenant Keig had flown 17 sorties and was the only crew member of the B-17 killed while flying over a target in Italy. He was buried in southern Italy.

Lt. Reed V. Larson—425

■ Lt. Reed VanNatta Larson, Ill. B '45, copilot of a liberator bomber, was killed when his plane exploded from a direct hit while on a raid over the dispersal area of the Shinchiku air drome in northern Formosa, April 15, 1945. His plane, left wing, first flight, received a direct hit from anti-aircraft fire in the bomb-bay section, five seconds before bombs away, causing the plane to explode in mid-air. He was awarded the Purple Heart posthumously. Lauren Foreman, ESR, participated in a memorial service for Lieutenant Larson at the Congregational Church in Sandwich, Ill., May 13, 1945.

Ensign Robert N. Lorenzen—413

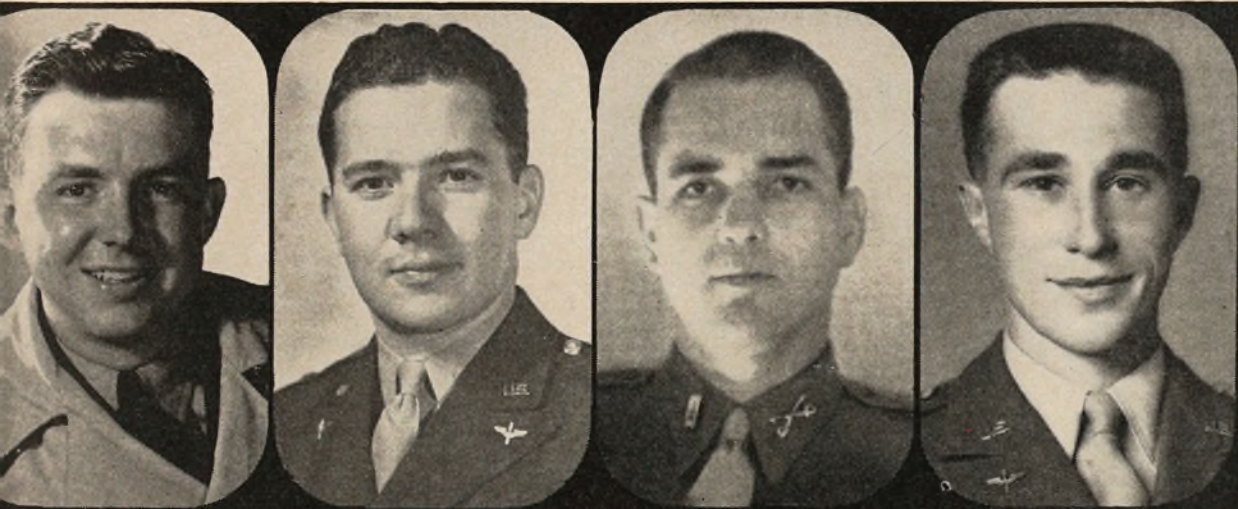
■ Ensign Robert Norman Lorenzen, Calif. A '42, was instantly killed when the USS *Bismarck Sea* was sunk by Japanese action off the coast of Iwo Jima, February 21, 1945. The section of the ship in which he had his battle station was struck and a large explosion resulted in which he died instantly. Ensign Lorenzen volunteered in 1942 and was assigned to Naval Intelligence in San Francisco and was later selected for training at Columbia University. He served as company commander at Camp Madonough, Plattsburg, N.Y., and went overseas in October, 1944. He had been assigned to duty on the USS *Princeton*, but she was sunk before he reached her.

T/Sgt. Cecil G. Morton—422

■ T/Sgt. Cecil G. Morton, Mich. A '42, crew member of a Flying Fortress who was lost on a combat mission to Schweinfurt, Germany, April 13, 1944, has been declared deceased by the War Department, according to word received by his parents near Adrian, Mich. He was a volunteer on a secret mission and his

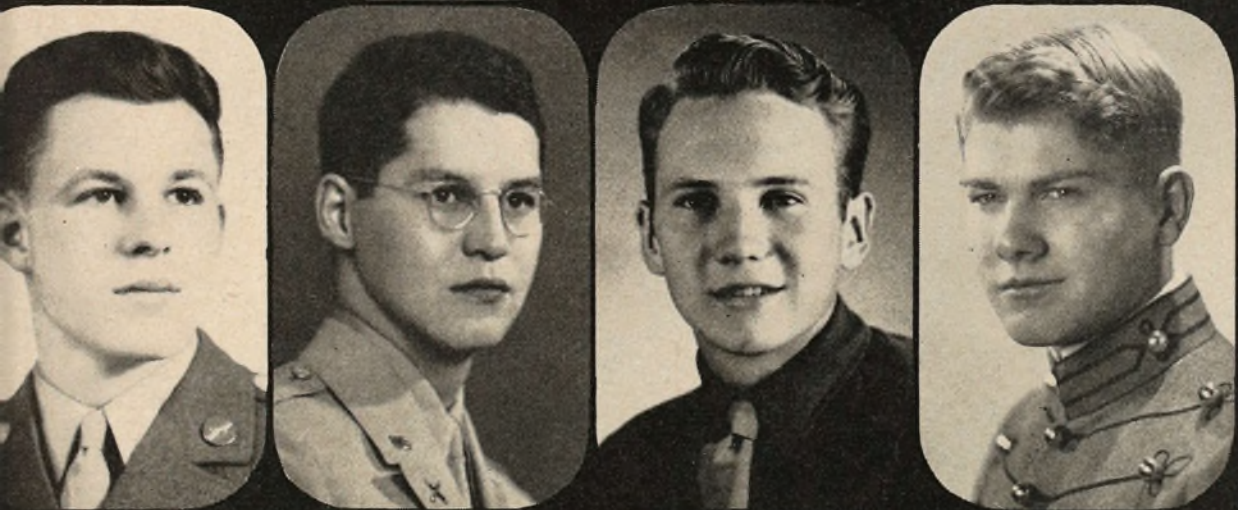

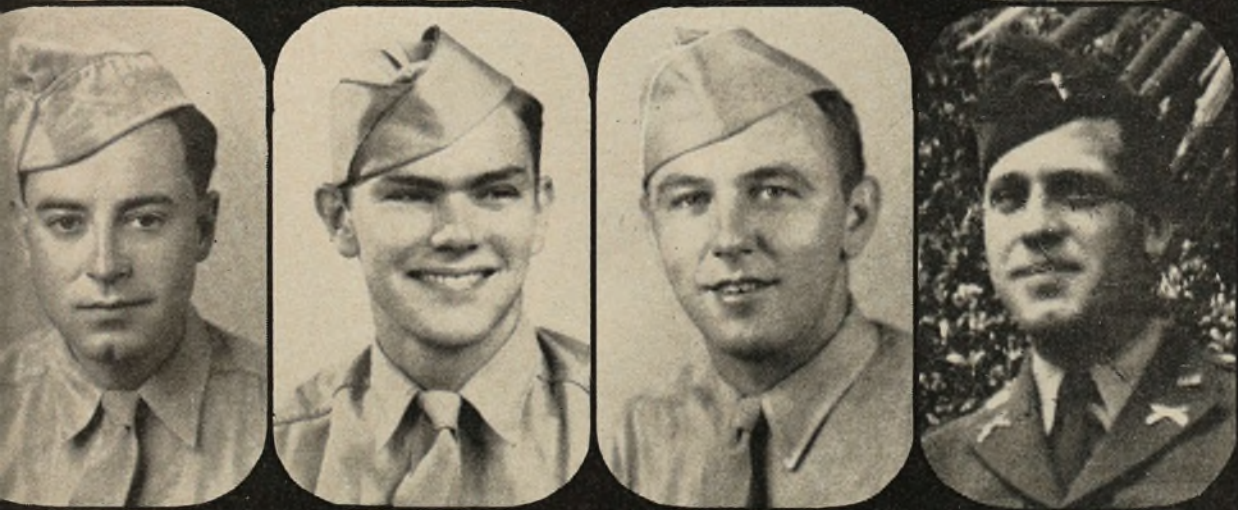

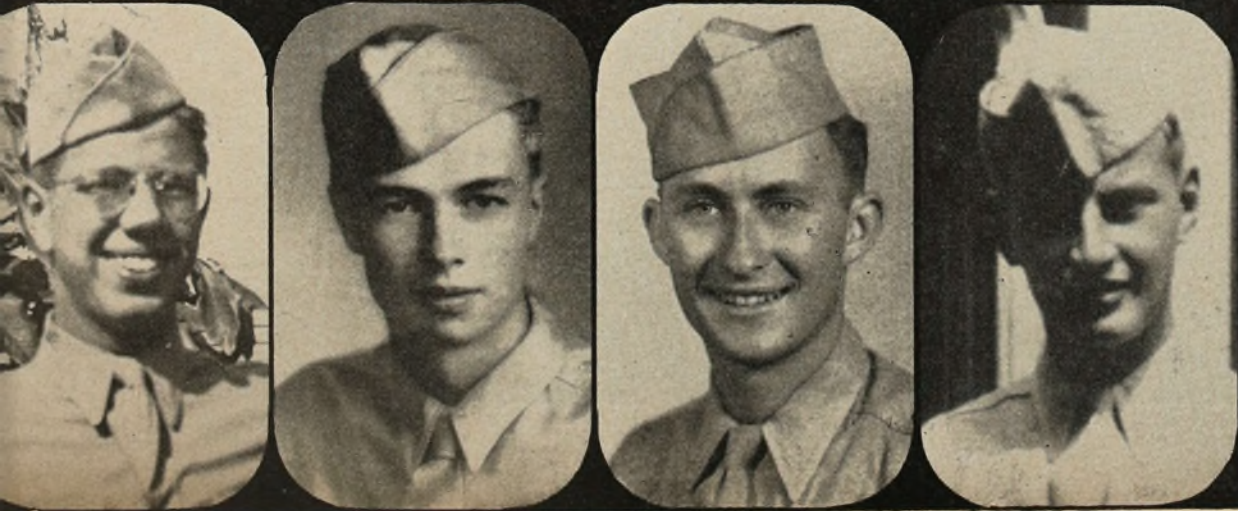

He previously was reported as missing in action in THE RECORD. The Air Medal and two Oak Leaf Clusters were presented in ceremonies at Selfridge Field, Mich., in June. He previously had received the Purple Heart, two Oak Leaf Clusters and the citation of honor.

Capt. Lyle M. Murphy—432

■ Capt. Lyle Moyer Murphy, Kan. B '37, paratrooper, was killed in action on Negros Island, April 17, 1945. He had participated in four campaigns in the Southwest Pacific. In the Campaign at Lae, New Guinea, he was awarded the Silver Star for gallantry in action and later he received the Purple Heart. His company of paratroopers was among those units which participated in the jump on Corregidor, and the unit was awarded the Presidential citation. After attending Kansas State College Captain Murphy received his M.A. degree from Michigan State College, following which he joined the faculty of the department of horticulture at Rhode Island State College. He was called into active duty as a second lieutenant in the Army Reserve Corps March 5, 1942, and went overseas October 20, 1942. Memorial services were held for him in Manhattan, Kan., May 9, 1945. His brother is Ray V. Murphy, Kan. B '42, of Kansas City, Mo.

Col. Dudley M. Outcalt—447

■ Col. Dudley Miller Outcalt, Ohio E '18, was killed when his Army plane exploded, crashed and burned on a farm five miles east of Silver Springs, Md., a Washington, D.C., suburb, May 26, 1945. Colonel Outcalt who was in World War I and had left his post as Judge of Hamilton Common Pleas Court in Ohio, November, 1942, to enter the Army Air Forces, was returning from official business in the South when the crash occurred. He was a special investigator for the Army. His widow is secretary of the Mothers Club of Ohio Epsilon in Cincinnati, Ohio. A son, Peter Outcalt, Ohio E '45, who was discharged from the Navy and is studying law, named the club's newsletter, *Minerva Chronicle*.

Capt. Marion S. Owens—429

■ Capt. Marion S. Owens, Okla. K '34, was killed in action in northern Luzon Island, in the Philippines, March 30, 1945. He had participated in the invasion of Leyte and was in the invasion of Luzon when killed. He left a widow and a six-months-old son, born after Captain Owens left for overseas. He is the nephew of Jesse T. Owens, Okla. K '10, of Oklahoma City.

Lt. Gould A. Ryder, Jr.—446

■ Lt. Gould A. Ryder, Jr., Ohio Δ '45, B-24 pilot based in Italy, was killed on a mission to Austria when the second motor of his plane caught fire and crashed into the Adriatic Sea, April 2, 1945. He had been in service two

years and recently had received the Air Medal.

Pfc. Jack W. Schott—430

■ Pfc. Jack W. Schott, N.Y. Δ '45, was killed in action in Germany, November 29, 1944. He was a platoon runner in the first platoon. Before being trained for combat he entertained at Army shows in service clubs and hospitals and was a member of a war bond show which toured the Southern States. Last summer he appeared as an entertainer with a special service unit in England. He was widely known in Syracuse, N.Y., his home, for his dancing and dramatic ability. Private Schott was sent overseas in September, 1944. He entered the Army in July 1943, after completing two years at Syracuse University.

Lt. Ray W. Sharp—427

■ 1st Lt. Ray Wilson Sharp, Idaho A '43, previously reported missing in flight in Alaska, February 18, 1944, has been declared lost as of that date by the War Department. Word was received from the War Department February 19, 1945, by his family in Nevada, Mo. In the same plane, a B-25, was Capt. Henry F. Wilson, Ky. K '32, who has been recorded as the Fraternity's 428th Gold Star. Lieutenant Sharp and Captain Wilson were attached to the cold weather testing detachment at Ladd Field, Alaska. When they disappeared, 1st Lt. George H. Bushnell, Calif. Δ '44, and 1st Lt. Raymond D. Schott, Ohio Δ '38, as-

Lt. Fred C. Wallace, Jr.—414

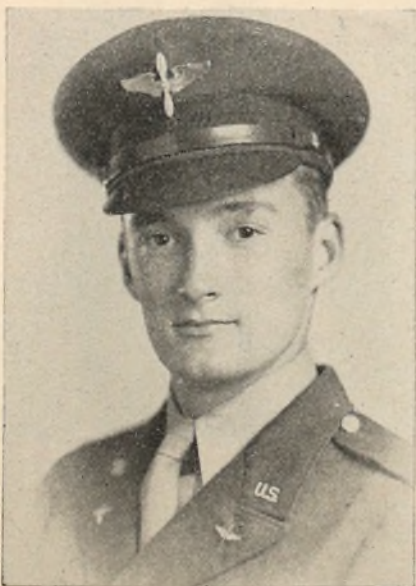
■ 2nd Lt. Fred C. Wallace, Jr., Va. O '44, son of Maj. Gen. Fred C. Wallace on Okinawa, was killed in action near St. Jean de Daye, Normandy, France, July 19, 1944, according to word received from his mother in Baltimore, Md. Lieutenant Wallace was acting as an air observer when his plane was hit by German plane fire. He was serving at Camp Chaffee, Ark., when he volunteered for overseas duty as a replacement, and he was sent across in March, 1944. He joined a battalion in England and was on his 18th combat sortie when shot down. He was buried in the American cemetery at St. Mere Eglise, Normandy.

Lt. Col. Francis C. Wilbur—465

■ Lt. Col. Francis C. Wilbur, N.Y. A '18, died in Hollandia, Dutch New Guinea, December 17, 1944. He had served overseas in World War I and was recalled to service in July, 1941. In 1942 he was sent to Australia and a year later he was promoted and made executive officer of the Port of Brisbane. His last post of service was Headquarters Commandant in Hollandia. In World War I he took part in major engagements and received the Purple Heart for wounds suffered at Frisette, France. He was active in organizing and maintaining the 391st Regiment of Rochester, N.Y.

Capt. W. R. S. Wilburn—402

■ Capt. William R. Saunders Wilburn, Jr., Miss. O '38, brother of C. S. Wilburn, Miss. O '36, was killed by a mine explosion in Germany, March 4, 1945, while attempting to get supplies and ammunition to his men on the front line. He was an executive of the 3rd Battalion Headquarters, 346th Infantry of General Patton's 3rd Army. Captain Wilburn volunteered for the Air Corps in 1940 and entered the infantry in June, 1941, receiving his commission at Fort Benning, Ga., in April, 1942.

Capt. Vernon G. Alexander

■ Capt. Vernon Gayle Alexander, Ky. E '43, B-17 pilot, previously reported missing in action over Germany, November 2, 1944, returned to his home in Lexington, Ky., June 1, 1945, after harrowing experiences while a prisoner of the Germans. Captain Alexander was liberated from Moosburg in Bavaria, April 29, and returned to the States in the first convoy after the surrender of Germany, arriving in New York, May 29. According to word from his mother he suffered many hardships and privations as a prisoner, first at Sagan, Germany, and later after being evacuated, January 27, 1945, at Nuernberg and later at Moosburg. His brother is Lt. Col. Harry S. Alexander, Ky. E '41, B-24 pilot in India. Other details concerning Captain Vernon Alexander were carried in the May issue of THE RECORD.

Lt. Earl W. Carlson

■ Lt. Earl W. Carlson, N.D. A '42, paratrooper, who was reported missing in action in Holland, September 19, 1944, and then as a prisoner of the Germans in Stalag Luft No. 64 in Poland, is back home in Minneapolis, Minn., after being released by the Russians. In January, 1945, he was marched with other prisoners for 28 days and then was placed in a sealed train car for two days. He was liberated from Luckenwalde, south of Berlin, and reached the American lines, May 5. According to his mother, he was hungry most of the time, and "if it hadn't been for the Red Cross food parcels, the prisoners could not have survived." Lieutenant Carlson is recovering and has regained 35 pounds.

Lt. William B. Crooker

■ 2nd Lt. William B. Crooker, Jr., Pa. O '46, bombardier on a B-24 based in Italy, previously reported missing in action over Czechoslovakia, December 6, 1944, was liberated from the Germans in Stalag Luft No. 1 at Barth, Germany, by the Russians, May 2, 1945. He was flown to a camp near St. Valery in France where he awaited processing to be sent home. He reported to his parents in New York City that he was in fine condition. On June 8 he said that he had returned to camp from a leave in Paris and expected to be enroute home on the 16th.

S/Sgt. Robert R. Long

■ Sgt. Robert R. Long, son of Ebe Walter Long, Pa. E-4 '11, and brother of Lt. (jg) L. Walter Long, Pa. O '40, was back home in June, 1945, in Harrisburg, Pa., after liberation from the Germans. A waist-gunner on a B-17, Sergeant Long was reported missing on a shuttle raid over Berlin and reported as a prisoner August 9, 1944. He was interned for eight months at Stalag Luft No. IV at Gross Tychow, Germany. He was under forced marching from the Pomeranian district in a round-about northwestern direction, and was liberated by the 9th Army at Schwerin, Germany, May 2, 1945. On June 27 his father reported that Sergeant Long was amazingly well.

Capt. Charles E. Mosse

■ Capt. Charles E. Mosse, Ariz. A '40, flight leader of the 368th Fighter Squadron, was reported as liberated from the Germans, April 29, 1945, when the German camp in Bavaria was freed. Captain Mosse was listed as missing in action as a result of a raid on Berlin, May 19, 1944. He bailed out of his plane after it was damaged. He shot down an M.E. 109. Later he was reported as a prisoner in Stalag Luft No. III, at Sagan, where he remained until late in January, 1945, and then was moved to Bavaria. His wife in Phoenix, Ariz., reported that she received two cables from

him in May, one stating that he was visiting her relatives in Scotland and expected to be home in June.

Capt. Guy T. Nunn, Jr.

■ Capt. Guy T. Nunn, Jr., Calif. E '36, was among five American officers rescued from possible fate as hostages of Hitler in Germany, April 17, 1945. The five officers included a colonel who had been sentenced to die. Captain Nunn was graduated from Occidental College with the highest grade average ever attained there. He held a straight three-point record and was selected as a Rhodes Scholar.

Lt. Joseph A. Pagenkopf

■ Lt. Joseph A. Pagenkopf, Minn. A '42, returned to his home in St. Paul, Minn., for a 60-day furlough after being released from the Germans in Stalag Luft No. I by the Russians, May 2, 1945. He had been reported as a prisoner after being missing over Germany, April 11, 1944. Lieutenant Pagenkopf was among 9,000 prisoners to be freed. After two weeks, he was flown to France, and then sent to the U.S., arriving home, June 20. According to word received from his mother, June 22, he will report to Miami Beach, Fla., for reassignment.

Capt. Lawrence L. Purifoy

■ Capt. Lawrence Lloyd Purifoy, Jr., La. T-1 '41, who was reported as missing in action in September, 1943, and then as a prisoner of the Germans in February, 1944, is now at the Northington General Hospital in Tuscaloosa, Ala., where he is receiving plastic surgery. In June he hoped to be back in service in about two months. He returned to the States on the SS *Gripsholm*. When Purifoy was reported missing he held the rank of first lieutenant. He wears the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Air Medal with eight Oak Leaf Clusters and the Purple Heart.

Lt. Thomas M. Shive

■ 1st Lt. Thomas M. Shive, Iowa F '45, Flying Fortress bombardier with the 15th Air Force in Italy, was back at his home in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, June 18, 1945, after being a prisoner of the Germans in Stalag Luft No. I. He had been shot down over Linz, Austria, November 25, 1944, and taken prisoner. The November 25 mission, Lieutenant Shive's 24th, was a single-plane raid. After parachuting to safety, he was captured by a civilian near Linz. After being moved from jail to jail, Lieutenant Shive finally was placed in Stalag Luft No. 1 at Barth on the Baltic seacoast. After liberation by the Russians, he was flown to Le Havre and finally sailed for New York.

A '43, Released from the Germans, April 29, 1945, and Arrived in the U. S., May 23, for a 60-Day Leave before Reporting at Santa Monica, August 1.

Organize Alumni Group on Guam

• Through Carl Rosborough, *Ohio M '27*, with the Seabees on Guam, members of ΣAE have organized and are holding meetings. Various reports concerning the meetings have arrived in Evanston, but the "germ" plan for organization was through the efforts of Coxswain Rosborough who arranged the first meeting with Col. Teller Ammons, *Colo. Z '23*.

The first meeting was a memorial service for 1st Lt. J. E. Leonard, *Ore. B '42*, who was killed on Guam. Twenty-three members of ΣAE responded to a local radio announcement informing all members to meet at the Agate Cemetery, Sunday, May 13. Following the service, a business meeting for the Fraternity took place. The next meeting was planned for May 24 at which time an alumni association formation was slated.

In Rosborough's first letter to the National Office, he revealed his plans for organization and a memorial service to Lieutenant Leonard, and indicated that Ernie Pyle, *Ind. T '23*, would be invited. Rosborough's letter was dated April 14 and Pyle was killed on the 18th.

At the request of Rosborough the National Office immediately sent copies of ΣAE songs and a picture of the badge. In a later letter Rosborough stated that the members attending the first meeting were labeled the charter members and plans were being made for a regular meeting place. In June a copy of a letter was received from Ed. E. Tanguy, *Pa. A-Z '12*, written by his son, Lt. Charles R. Tanguy, *Pa. A-Z '42*, who attended the first meeting. Lieutenant Tanguy commented that he almost swallowed his razor when he heard the local broadcast about the ΣAEs meeting on Guam. Later it was learned that Lt. Comdr. Mel Norquist, *Wash. A '23*, fleet air athletic equipment officer for the Pacific area, stationed on Guam, attended a luncheon at which 42 ΣAEs were present. Details of the Guam Alumni Association will be carried in another issue of *THE RECORD*.

At press time S/Sgt. Paul R. McGinty, *Ark. A-T '23*, paid a visit to the National Office and stated that he had attended the first two meetings on Guam, responding to the local radio announcement for the May 13 meeting. After three years in service including duty in Africa and on Guam, McGinty has been discharged and is now with the A C Spark Plug Co. in Dallas, Texas.

Twenty-eight members signed a petition for a charter for the Guam Alumni Association and this has been submitted to the Supreme Council for approval. Officers elected on Guam were BM 2/C Carl E. Rosborough, president, and Lt. Charles R. Tanguy, secretary-treasurer. Meetings are

Fort Sheridan Commander

■ Brig. Gen. John T. Pierce, *Wyo. A '14*, is commanding officer at Fort Sheridan, Ill., assuming command, June 14, 1945. He was assistant commander of the 103rd Infantry division from August, 1942, until he left it in Innsbruck, Austria, June 5. He landed with the 103rd division at Marseille, France, in September, 1944, and his division served in the Vosges mountains of France, protected the right flank of the 3rd Army in the Battle of the Belgium Bulge, moved through the Siegfried line, crossed the Rhine and the Danube rivers, and sped through Brenner Pass to affect a junction with the 5th Army. General Pierce has passed most of his 29 years of service in the cavalry. His son is Lt. John T. Pierce, Jr., *Kan. B '45*. Details of General Pierce's career were carried in the August, 1943, issue of *THE RECORD*.

Towers with Task Force

■ Vice Admiral John H. Towers, *Ga. Φ '06*, deputy commander in chief of the Pacific Fleet and Pacific Ocean area, has been placed in command of the 2nd carrier task force in the Pacific, succeeding Vice Admiral John S. McCain. The shift of Admiral Towers was among several changes by the Navy in its air borne arm in the Pacific in apparent preparation for the showdown phases of the war against Japan. Towers is No. 1 aviator on Navy rolls which now include more than 50,000 fliers.

Gillem Lt. General

■ In June, 1945, Alan C. Gillem, Jr., *Tenn. Ω '12*, *Va. O '14*, was promoted from the rank of major general to lieutenant general. The nomination was made by President Truman and confirmed by the Senate June 27. General Gillem was featured on the cover of the December, 1943, issue of *THE RECORD*, as Chief of the Armored Forces. Commander of the 13th Corps, he has received the Distinguished Service Medal and is scheduled to go to the Pacific.

C. C. Fenn Is Brigadier General

• Judge Advocate Clarence C. Fenn, *Wis. A '15*, in the India-Burma theater, became a brigadier general in February, 1945, and when advised of his promotion, confirmed by the Senate, he insisted that enlisted men pin the stars on him.

Brig. Gen. Fenn went to the India-Burma area in March, 1942, and took over the job of judge advocate as a member of Gen. Joseph W. Stilwell's original staff. General Fenn arranged for the United States to maintain jurisdiction over its own personnel in India and China, and he conferred with British, Indian and Chinese officials to bring this decision about.

General Fenn was graduated from Georgetown and Wisconsin and entered the Army in 1917. During World War I he served in France and he has been on duty in Hawaii and the Philippines. He was among four India-Burma colonels raised to the rank of brigadier general.

Stassen Back to Pacific

■ At the close of the United Nations' Peace Conference in San Francisco, Calif., Comdr. Harold E. Stassen, *Minn. A '29*, American delegate and ex-governor of Minnesota, prepared to return to Navy duty in the Pacific where he formerly served with Admiral William F. Halsey of the 3rd Fleet. At the close of the conference Commander Stassen who is generally considered as a strong contender for the Republican presidential nomination in 1948, went to Mackinac Island, Mich., where he addressed the 37th annual conference of governors. He set forth a two-point program by which the governors could reinforce the peace framework. He envisioned a minimum of 50 years of world peace.

Initiation in Hawaii

■ Ensign Ben G. Rucker, USNR, assigned to a LST in the Pacific, ran into a couple of his classmates from the University of South Carolina in Hawaii, but little did he know that he would become a member of ΣAE in the Pacific. Several members of ΣAE had met by chance in Hawaii and they included Ensign William E. Murray, *S.C. Δ '45*, Ensign Jack Bradford, *S.C. Δ '45*, and Ensign Mike S. Jolly, *S.C. Δ '46*. All the ΣAEs stuck together out there, and Rucker was right along with his friends although he was not a member. So, a trans-Pacific telephone call to the National Office in Evanston brought permission from the ESR to initiate Pledge Rucker. Officers were immediately elected. They were: Ensign George Haskell, *Mich. 1-B '46*, EA; Lt. (jg) Felix Castagnola, Jr., *Nev. A '41*, EDA; William Murray, ER and ET; Ensign Peter Benedict, *Ohio Δ '46*, EH; Jack Bradford, E.C., and Mike Jolly, pledge trainer. The group wrote as much of the Ritual as they could remember. Others assisting at the meeting were: Lt. (jg)

Pease, R.I. A '35; Lt. Lawrence A. Wheeler, Mass. B-T '40; Lt. William Thorpe, Fla. T '38. The coat-of-arms was drawn from memory by Murray and Haskell in order that the crest could be explained to Rucker, who went through the initiation ceremony on April 1, 1945. Shortly after the initiation Rucker left on orders, a ΣAE. The coat-of-arms prepared for the ceremony has been placed in the Museum of the Levere Memorial Temple as part of the historical collection of ΣAE in World War II.

Dawson in Germany

■ Since the occupation of Germany by the Allied forces, Capt. Eric A. Dawson, Miss. Γ '08, past Eminent Supreme Recorder, who is connected with the Allied Military Government, has been assisting in organizing the Rhine Province Government and has had many interesting experiences. Writing on June 9, he stated that he was then located in a resort hotel, just nine miles of Andernach, where the famous ΣAE initiation was staged by William C. Levere, following World War I. For five weeks he was the censor of the first German newspaper printed under Allied supervision. Later he supervised the movement of thousands of liberated French soldiers from Luxembourg back to France. He has also opened some of the schools and searched for hideaways of art treasures.

Invents Army Weapons

■ Lt. Willis R. Sutherland, Jr., Ky. E '43, has been credited by the Army with being the inventor and operator of V-16 and V-17 weapons, according to an Army dispatch. It was stated that Lieutenant Sutherland designed the weapons when his company found itself holding a block of houses in the center of a sizable city, with krauts holding the next block. His first production was the V-16, a king-sized sling-shot designed to lob white phosphorous grenades into German positions. Two discarded inner tubes comprised the sling-shot with a piece of canvas forming the pouch for the missiles. The V-17 is an ordinary rifle grenade launcher with the prongs reshaped to accommodate cylindrical thermite grenades.

Survivor of B-17 Crash

■ Lt. Lyman N. Cranston, Jr., R.I. A '41, who has been located at Moody Field and engaged in ferrying B-25s to other fields, returned from duty overseas sometime ago as the only survivor of a B-17 crash. Details concerning the whereabouts of the crash cannot be given. He was shot down and interned in a neutral country. He was co-pilot of the B-17. In December his mother in Wakefield, R.I., received word that he was back at his base in England and shortly after that he arrived home on furlough.

Birthday Party in Belgium

■ Capt. Joseph L. Scott, R.I. A '38, with the provost marshal's section, Headquarters, 1st Army, celebrated a birthday with his brother, 1st Lt. Walton H. Scott, Jr., R.I. A '41, infantry officer, in Belgium. Lieutenant Scott had been ordered to a replacement depot in Belgium after being wounded in the left arm by shrapnel near Aachen, in September, 1944, and hospitalized in England. Captain Scott learned that his brother was to report to a depot near his outfit and kept checking for his arrival. On November 18, Lieutenant Scott arrived at the center and Captain Scott was there to meet him. A younger brother, Robert C. Scott, R.I. A '44, was in service but received a medical discharge and is now a student at Rhode Island State College.

Star Is Now Pilot

■ Famous football player Bill Dudley, Va. O '41, first All-American at the University of Virginia, is now a pilot in the Air Corps, and in May he was at Kearns, Utah, awaiting shipment to distant points. In 1941 Dudley was leading ground gainer and brought home two prizes, the Walter Memorial Trophy from the Touchdown Club



in Washington and the Robert W. Maxwell award presented in Philadelphia. In 1942 in pro football with Pittsburgh he repeated as leading ground gainer. He was named the outstanding athlete of the nation and winner of the Dapper Dan Trophy. Then he enlisted in the Air Corps and won his Silver Wings in April, 1944. He was assigned as an instructor at Randolph Field Central Instructors School and found time for football, compiling quite a record there as quarterback with the Randolph Ramblers. He won the Robert Smith trophy as outstanding all-service player and the *Los Angeles Times* award.

Mitchell to Washington

■ Maj. Lloyd D. Mitchell, Calif. Γ '27, AAF, who has been acting as chief public relations officer at Wright Field, Dayton, Ohio, has been transferred to Washington, D.C., as executive officer in the Office of Information Services, Headquarters, Army Air Forces, with office in The Pentagon Bldg.

In Charge of Research

■ Comdr. Charles S. Piggot, Tenn. Ω '14, well known research chemist before the war, is in charge of Navy Ordnance Research in Washington, D.C. In May, 1939, he was featured in *THE RECORD* concerning his work in analyzing the concentration of radium in oceanbottom sediments. He developed the first machine to secure adequate core samples of the ocean floor. Dr. Piggot has been research chemist for the Geophysical Laboratory, Carnegie Institution of Washington.



"C Ration College"

■ Through the efforts of 1st Lt. Edwin T. Martin, Ga. E '28, 12th Air Force personnel have been able to go to college in Italy. Lieutenant Martin, information and education officer with a fighter control squadron was instrumental in organizing what has become popularly known in the Mediterranean Theater as "C Ration College." The original idea was to provide means of maintaining morale during a temporary non-operational period through which Lieutenant Martin's unit was going, but the school turned out to be a forerunner of a potswar educational program for members of the armed forces. Three hours each week are devoted to each of the 28 subjects in the curriculum. Classes meet five days each week in various buildings in the Italian community and the subjects range from American Economic Problems and Literary Criticism and Creative Writing to Auto Mechanics and Blueprint Reading, designed to give an equivalent of a semester at an average university. Lieutenant Wilson was formerly assistant professor of English at Emory University. He also is responsible for the various Army correspondence courses taken by officers and men of his organization.

Replacement Plan

■ Lt. William Wolf, Ill. Ψ-Ω '40, was the originator of the plan for the replacement of Japanese-American soldiers returning home after fighting with the 442nd infantry regiment in Italy and France. Lieutenant Wolf works with a committee of two other officers and every Nisei soldier heading home takes with him the names of men already contacted in America who will help him locate in the place and in the industry or profession he wants. He also bears letters indicating his membership in one of the most decorated outfits in the Army. The system was arranged specifically for soldier victims of exclusive tactics on the Pacific coast.

Reckord Welcomed Home

■ After 18 months as provost marshal in the European Theater of Operations, Maj. Gen. Milton A. Reckord, Md. B '04, returned to Maryland for a visit and was welcomed home in a celebration at the Bel Air, Md., armory in July. His fraternity brother, Senator Mildard E. Tydings, Md. B '10, made the welcoming address. Senator Tydings is featured on the cover of this issue.

Hutchison at Lafayette College

• Returning to his alma mater as president is Dr. Ralph Cooper Hutchison, Pa. Γ '18, who is now president of Lafayette College at Easton, Pa.

Mr. Hutchison has served as president of Washington and Jefferson College in Washington, Pa., and director of the State Council of Defense. He also has served as a member of the Governor's Cabinet and vice chairman of the State Aeronautics Commission.

He is the 11th president in Lafayette's 113-year history and the first alumnus to be elected to the position. Lafayette is the domicile of Pennsylvania Gamma chapter of Sigma Alpha Epsilon, established on that campus in 1919. Mr. Hutchison succeeded Dr. William Mather Lewis who retired at the close of the 1944-45 academic year, after 18 years of service.

After being graduated from Lafayette, Mr. Hutchison received his M.A. degree from Harvard University in 1919 and his Ph.D. from the University of Pennsylvania in 1925. In World War I he was an aviator. He received his D.D. degree from Lafayette and honorary degrees of doctor of laws from Otterbein College and the University of Pittsburgh. He was graduated from Princeton Theological Seminary in 1922 and was ordained a minister in the Presbyterian Church in the same year.

While serving at Alborz College, Teheran, Persia, he was elected head of Washington and Jefferson College. During his stay in the Near East he was active in postwar emergency work with the International YMCA. He was director of athletics for Constantinople and director of publications in Turkey. He has served as director of the Pennsylvania United War Fund Commissions and Surplus Property, United States Department of Education. He heads the Scotch-Irish Society of Pennsylvania and is a director of Pennsylvania State YMCA and the Association of College Presidents of Pennsylvania.

• Roderick K. Shaw, Jr., N.C. Θ '22, has been named as assistant business manager of the Florida College for Women at Tallahassee and is carrying the full responsibilities of the office since the death of the business manager whom he had been assisting since September, 1942, on a commuting basis while maintaining his insurance agency in Quincy, Fla. He is maintaining his home in Quincy but spends five days of each week in Tallahassee.

Editorials

Present Sacrifice For Future Good

DIRECTORS of several house corporations holding title to chapter house properties of Chapters Collegiate of ΣAE, have had difficult decisions to make when forced to choose between turning the houses back to Chapters with small memberships or accepting attractive lease proposals for use of the houses during the year, 1945-46.

Where the prospects of the Chapter seemed to indicate a membership large enough to enable the Chapter to carry the necessary expenses of operating the house, the house corporation directors have been glad to restore the house to its normal use as the home of the Chapter Collegiate.

In other cases, although there were small groups of enthusiastic Chapter members who were anxious to occupy their houses again, the directors, after careful analysis of all controlling factors, have determined that even with the most successful rushing results next fall the Chapters would be unable to swing the heavy financial load and have concluded leases of the house properties where this could be done on favorable terms.

In making such decisions which they knew would be disappointing to the members of the Chapters Collegiate, the directors of the house corporations have acted for what they consider the best interest of the Chapters, taking the long range view that they were doing much greater service to the Chapters by maintaining strong reserves for a vigorous take-off in the fall of 1946, rather than to see the Chapters undertake a perilous struggle in trying to operate their houses during the year, 1945-46.

Alumni Loyalty Meets Emergency

THROUGH the whole-hearted and enthusiastic support of its loyal alumni, ΣAE was enabled to go through the difficult year, 1944-45, without any financial loss, despite the fact that the membership in the Chapters Collegiate was only about one fourth of that of normal years.

How the alumni stepped into the breach, caused by the depletion of the membership of the Chapters Collegiate, resulting from the call of men of college age into the armed forces, is shown by the fact that during the year, July 1, 1944-June 30, 1945, they contributed \$34,156.40 which could be used for the payment of operating expenses. This sizable sum came from the payment of annual Chapter National dues of \$3.00 by nearly 8,000 alumni, totaling \$23,590.40, and of gifts of \$10,566.00 from approximately 900 alumni who had previously become Founders or Life Members and are, therefore, not subject to the payment of Chapter National dues.

During the same period, payments of initiation fees and dues by the Chapters Collegiate, which in normal years have been the chief support of the Fraternity, amounted to only \$32,070.00 of which

\$17,650.00 came from initiation fees and \$14,420.00 from Chapter dues.

Alumni also paid \$22,437.61 into the endowment funds of the Fraternity, \$20,387.25 for Life Memberships in the Chapter National, and \$2,050.36 for Founders Memberships. Of this, \$10,984.75 went into the National Endowment Fund and \$11,462.86 into the Levere Memorial Temple Sustaining Fund.

This grand total of \$56,594.01, paid to the Fraternity by alumni in one college year, is the best possible evidence of their loyalty and interest which could be given. By continuing such support, alumni will make it possible for ΣAE to carry on despite the handicaps of the war period.

Founder's Fund For Ernie Pyle

FROM many sources has come the suggestion that members of ΣAE, especially those who have served or are serving in the armed forces, would be glad to contribute to a fund of \$1,000 for a Founder's Membership in the Chapter National in honor of Ernie Pyle, *Ind. Γ '23*, who attained a nation-wide reputation as the "roving reporter;" became the best loved of American war correspondents, serving on the battle fronts of World War II; and fell as the victim of a Jap sniper's bullet.

The proponents of this idea are agreed that it would be much more fitting for such a Founder's Membership to be established by small gifts from a large number, rather than by relatively large gifts from a few admirers of the ace of war correspondents who liked to call himself the "Little Guy."

Pyle's Portrait for Temple

• Although War Correspondent Ernie (Ernest Taylor) Pyle, *Ind. '23*, received many honors during his reporting days of World War II, probably there have been few men in the United States to have such wide recognition upon and after death.

Sigma Alpha Epsilon, through Judge Alfred K. Nippert, *Ohio E '94*, past ESA, adds to that long list of honors for the man who gave his life for his country on Ie Shima, Okinawa, April 18, 1945, with a portrait for the Fraternity's shrine, the Levere Memorial Temple in Evanston, Ill.

The portrait is from the brush of Matthias Noheimer of Cincinnati, who has done considerable art work for ΣAE. The painting shows Ernie Pyle, ΣAE's 412th Gold Star, in his correspondent's uniform with service stripes. Mr. Noheimer went to great lengths to bring the true color

and character into the painting of the man who will be recorded in the history books of war. The portrait will be dedicated at the Temple when the Supreme Council meets in August. A copy of the painting has been donated by Frank B. Shields, *Ind. A '05, Mass. I-T '07*, for Pyle's chapter, Indiana Gamma at Indiana University.

During the height of Pyle's reporting career in the European Theater of Operations and the Pacific, news concerning his various honors, including winning the Pulitzer Prize, was carried in THE RECORD and he was the magazine's cover man in May, 1944. At the time of his death a movie, "Story of G.I. Joe," from Pyle's famous book, *Here Is Your War* (more than 1,500,000 copies in print), was in production, and that movie was presented to the American public in Indianapolis, Ind., July 6. The National Press Club paid tribute to Pyle with a special program at Loew's Palace theatre in Washington, D.C., July 3, with the national preview of "Story of G.I. Joe." Preceding the picture the club sponsored a national broadcast from the stage with friends of Ernie taking part either at the theatre or from the war zones.

For weeks after Ernie's death honor upon honor was recorded in the press. Among these were: Indiana University, his alma mater which bestowed an honorary degree upon him, received a life-size bust of him at the world premiere of the Pyle film; a Camp Maxey, Texas, training field was named in his honor; the "million dollar ferry boat" *Yerba Buena* was renamed the *Ernie Pyle* at a special ceremony in San Francisco; an Indianapolis post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars adopted the name of Ernie Pyle; for the second consecutive year top achievement Sigma Delta Chi awards in journalism went to Ernie Pyle for human interest reporting; a troop transport was named for Ernie Pyle and launched by Henry J. Kaiser's Vancouver, Wash., shipyard; the National Headliners Club cited Ernie Pyle for valor with a posthumous award; Indiana University organized an Ernie Pyle Memorial Fund to expand teaching and provide scholarships and lectureships in journalism and allied fields; a B-29 Superfortress called the Ernie Pyle was unveiled by his father, William C. Pyle of Dana, Ind., at the Wichita, Kan., Boeing Airplane Company plant, with the purchase of the bomber by Boeing employes with \$600,000 in war bonds; The Maritime Commission assigned the name Ernie Pyle to a C-4 military type cargo vessel; a bronze statue of Ernie Pyle was placed in the Willard Kiplinger Collection in the Smithsonian Institution; members of ΣAE's Pennsylvania Chi-Omicron chapter at the University of Pittsburgh made contributions to the Red Cross Blood Bank in his memory, with Ernie Pyle Week being featured at the blood donor center the following week; the 77th Infantry Division erected a memorial on Ie Shima where Pyle met death; a Medal of Merit was awarded posthumously by President Truman, the Army and the Navy, July 3.

The above honors indicate that Ernie Pyle had been on the minds and in the hearts of most Americans. They wanted

to remember the man who wore the Purple Heart from Anzio and wrote about the U.S. fighting men. As Pyle said, "War to a soldier is hardly ever bigger than a hundred yards on each side of him,"—thus he was compelled to be up in front. "That 200 yards was his beat. In articles home to 393 daily and 297 weekly newspapers (total circulation, 13,390,144), he covered the 200-yard view, its terrors, fatigues, laughs and heroism, more vividly and more simply than any other U.S. reporter.—*Time*, April 30. And as President Truman stated: No man in this war has so well told the story of the American fighting man as American fighting men wanted it told." Said General Eisenhower: "All of us have lost one of our best and most understanding friends."

1st Lt. Kirkly Lockwood Sinclair, Jr., Calif. Δ '42, killed in action in Germany, April 7, 1945, by his father, Mr. Kirkly L. Sinclair of Los Angeles, Calif.;

2nd Lt. Seth Sprague, Jr., Vt. A-Σ-II '44, 47th Tank Battalion, 14th Armored Division, killed in action in France, January 13, 1945, by his mother, Mrs. Seth Sprague of Hingham, Mass.;

1st Lt. John F. Curtin, Jr., Md. B '42, killed in action in Germany, August 3, 1944; and

2nd Lt. Robert Barton Willis, Md. B '45, killed in plane crash in Panama, February 2, 1944, by the Baltimore Alumni Association.

The name of Pfc. Raymond P. Connors, N.Y. Δ '46, killed in action in France, January 11, 1945, has also been added to the Gold Star roll as the result of his having made the Fraternity the beneficiary for \$100 under a life insurance policy, carried with the Travelers Insurance Co.

There were 3,288 Life Members on June 30, 1945, an increase of 85 since March 31, when the list which was printed in the May issue of *THE RECORD* was compiled. The majority of the new Life Members are serving in the armed forces, practically all branches of the fighting forces and all combat areas being represented.

Members are given a credit of \$2.50 for each payment of annual Chapter National dues and may become Life Members by paying the balance necessary to make up the \$50.00 fee. Information as to the amount standing to the credit of any member will be furnished by the Eminent Supreme Recorder on request.

In addition to the Life Members who have paid \$50.00 each, there are 60 Founders who have paid \$1,000 each and several members who are becoming Founders by paying in instalments.

Receipts from Founders and Life Mem-

bers are credited to the National Endowment Fund when checks are drawn in favor of Sigma Alpha Epsilon and to the Levere Memorial Temple Sustaining Fund when checks are drawn in favor of the Levere Memorial Foundation. Donations to the Foundation are deductible from Federal income tax returns but donations to the Fraternity are not.

Endowment Funds Grow

• During the fiscal year, ended June 30, 1945, the two endowment funds which produce incomes which may be used for current operating expenses of the Sigma Alpha Epsilon Fraternity and The Levere Memorial Foundation were increased by \$22,778.61; the National Endowment Fund by \$11,284.75, raising its principal amount from \$32,116.87 to \$43,401.62; and the Levere Memorial Temple Sustaining Fund by \$11,492.86, raising its principal amount from \$12,043.75 to \$23,536.61.

Practically the entire increase came from the payment for Life Memberships and Founder's Memberships in the Chapter National by alumni, as will be shown by the following figures for the two funds:

The National Endowment Fund is administered by the National Board of Trustees, consisting of five members in New York City and is invested in loans on chapter houses and in U.S. Treasury Bonds. Income from this fund remitted to the National Office during the year, amounting to \$1,449.48, was used for the general purposes of the Fraternity.

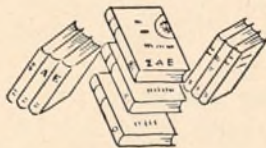
Investments for the Levere Memorial Temple Sustaining Fund are made by the Trustees of the Levere Memorial Foundation on the advice of the Advisory Council which consists of five members, four of whom live in Chicago and one in Cincinnati. Income of \$351.86, produced by this fund during the year, was used for expenses in connection with the maintenance and operation of the Levere Memorial Temple. It is hoped that the income from this fund eventually will be sufficient to cover all such expenses.

This is a new fund, established by the Fort Worth Convention of 1940, and nothing was placed in it until after the debt on the Levere Memorial Temple had been finally extinguished in August, 1943. Of the principal amount of this fund, \$12,500 has been invested in U. S. Treasury bonds and the remainder in high class corporation stocks.

All sums received from Life Memberships and Founder's Memberships are placed in these two funds; in the National Endowment Fund when checks are drawn in favor of ΣAE; in the Sustaining Fund

when checks are drawn in favor of the Levere Memorial Foundation. Donations to the Foundation are deductible from federal income tax returns but donations to the Fraternity are not so deductible.

Alumni who give to these two funds are contributing to the future financial stability of the Fraternity and may be assured that their donations will be invested by members of the Fraternity who are skilled in handling trust funds.



New Books In Temple Library

• ROBINSON CRUSOE, USN—One of the interesting books to come out of war is *Robinson Crusoe, USN*, by Thomas Blake Clark, Tenn. H '29, Tenn. N, author of *Paradise Limited* and other books and articles for magazines. *Robinson Crusoe, USN* is the amazing story of George Tweed, radioman first class of the Navy, on Jap-held Guam. Tweed, now a warrant officer, dodged the Japs for more than two years and was able to come back to relate his story to Mr. Clark, formerly of the University of Hawaii and now of Washington. Tweed didn't have the resources of Robinson Crusoe, but eventually through friendly natives he was able to repair a radio and on a "tired typewriter" produce *The Guam Eagle*, a one-sheet underground newspaper in which he spread truth and hope that the Japs would be defeated on Guam. 14,832 IN SERVICE

Up to July 1, 1945, the names of 14,832 members of Sigma Alpha Epsilon who are serving in the armed forces had been reported to the National Office, 732 having been reported since April 1, 1945, when the list which was carried in the May issue of THE RECORD was compiled. The new names are listed herewith and also the names of 1,167 (indicated by asterisks) who have been promoted, transferred, etc.

Because of censorship regulations THE RECORD does not use the names of outfits or units and their locations in combat areas but the serviceman as an individual may be listed as in a specific area without including the name of his outfit, etc. Also names of ships on which men are serving are not printed in THE RECORD and servicemen overseas, or about to embark are not identified or linked with their ships or units.

Men in service, their parents and friends are requested to give information which will aid the National Office in holding a complete file, regardless of what may be printed in the magazine. The magazine can be sent overseas if their APO or Fleet address is given for our files but THE RECORD may not be forwarded from their home addresses.

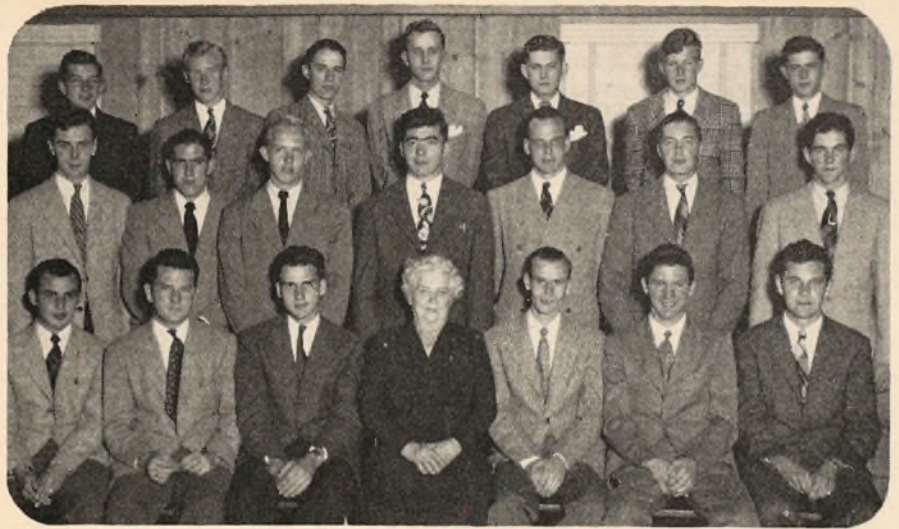

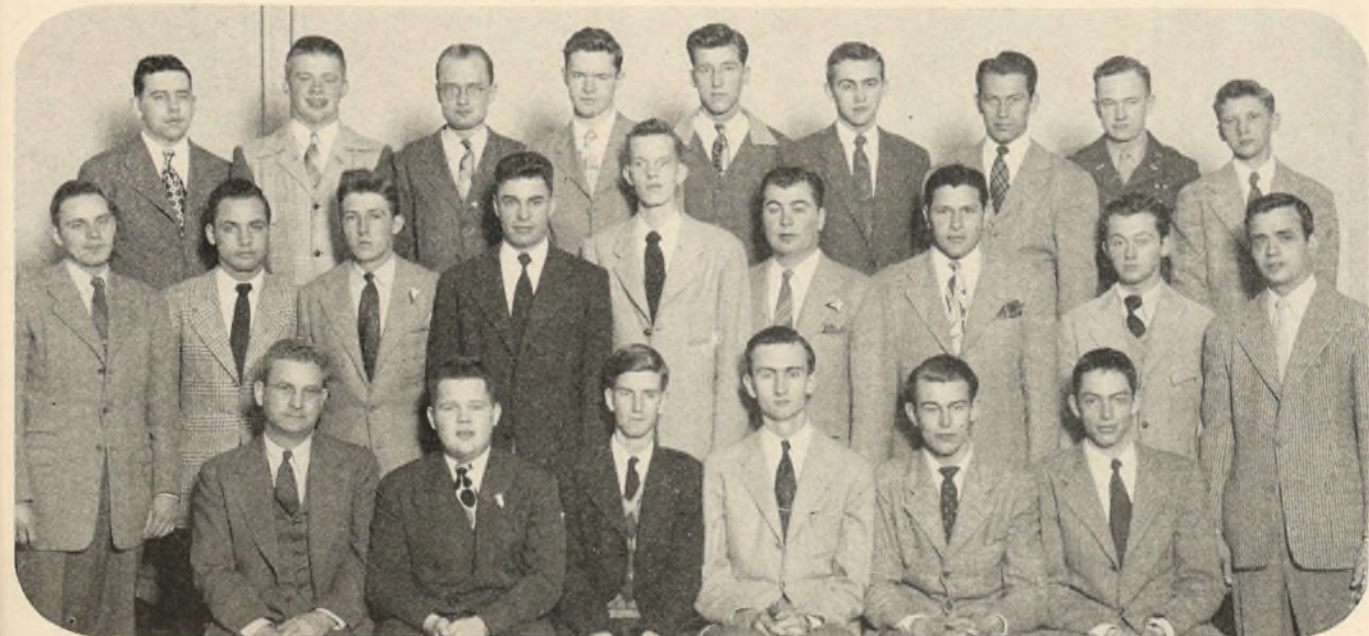
