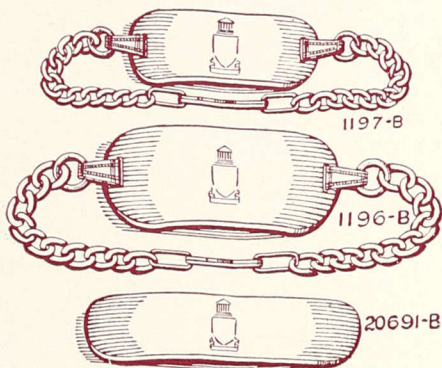

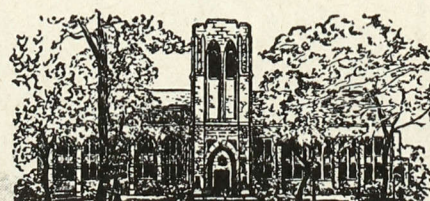
Presenting . . .

T-T '06* (Tulane), Ambassador to France, entering the American Embassy in Paris, after he was appointed by the late President Roosevelt as the U.S. Representative to Gen. DeGaulle's French Committee. In October, 1944, the United States recognized the French government with Caffery as Ambassador. He had been U.S. Ambassador to Brazil for seven years. At top of cover is the famous Arc de Triomphe.

351. **Carl Lobe, Jr.**, *Wash.* A '42, killed while landing a plane at Cabaniss Field, Naval Air Training Station, Corpus Christi, Texas, August 11, 1944.

352. **2nd Lt. Matt Edward Rose**, *Ga.* Φ '45, killed in France, January 15, 1945.

353. **Pfc. James S. Richards, Jr.**, *Fla.* T '45, first gunner with a light machine gun squad, killed in Belgium, January 20, 1945.

354. **Sgt. Rodman T. Green**, *Pa.* Φ '42, died in a hospital in England, December 13, 1944, as a result of wounds received in action in Germany, November 25.

355. **Lt. John H. Mullen**, *N.H.* A '35, killed in action in Normandy, July 21, 1944.

356. **Pfc. Nelson K. Moore**, *N.Y.* P '42, killed in Belgium, January 5, 1945.

365. **Pfc. William G. ("Pat") Haven**, *Pa.* A-Z '46, died while a prisoner of the German government, January 11, 1945.

366. **F/O Edgar Beaver**, *R.I.* A '45, previously reported as missing in action over Yugoslavia, killed in B-24 crash in mountains, December 23, 1944.

367. **Pfc. Jack D. Boyle**, *Utah* T '46,

377. **O/C Richard W. Horn**, *Mo.* B '42, veteran of 19 months in the China-Burma, India theater, died in the Fort Benning, Ga., hospital as a result of injuries received in training, February 5, 1945.

378. **2nd Lt. Herndon Hamer**, *Tenn.* K '37, killed in an auto accident near Albany, Ga., November 1, 1940.

379. **Capt. Hall Scott Roberts**, *N.H.* B '39, killed in action while being held as a prisoner of the Germans near the front, December 23, 1944.

380. **Ensign Donald B. Steenburg**, *Col.* X '42, killed in plane crash in the San Francisco Bay, February 13, 1945.

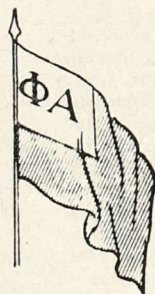

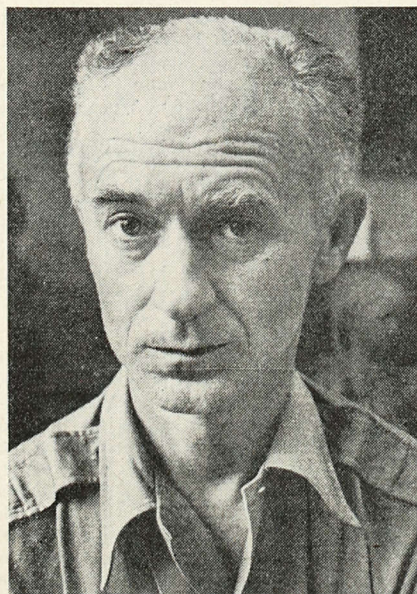

In addition, 83 have been reported as missing in action and 89 as prisoners of war.

390. **Ensign Rodney A. Rice**, *Neb.* Λ-II '44, killed in a plane crash in the Atlantic, March 17, 1945.

391. **Maj. John G. Evans**, *Wash.* A '39, missing in action on a mission in the Middle East area, declared dead by the War Department as of February 21, 1944.

392. **1st Lt. Aarne Karvonen**, *Mass.* K '44, navigator, killed in action over Germany, September 11, 1944.

393. **2nd Lt. Edward J. Erwin, Jr.**, *N.C.* Θ '43, died from wounds on Luzon, February 13, 1945.

394. **Lt. Col. Louis M. Jiggitts**, *Miss.* Γ '21, died at Foster General Hospital in Jackson, Miss., March 22, 1945, after being returned from the Pacific for hospitalization in December, 1944.

395. **S/Sgt. Edwin Bringardner, Jr.**, *Ohio* Θ '44, son of Edwin W. Bringardner, *Ohio* Θ '18, declared dead by War Department after being missing on his first mission over Germany, November 2, 1944.

396. **Pvt. Barton A. Carpenter**, *Ohio* Δ '44, killed in action on the Luxembourg front, December 20, 1944.

397. **Sgt. Edward P. Jaenicke**, *Ga.* Φ '45, killed in action in Germany, February 3, 1945.

398. **1st Lt. John M. Nearhood, Jr.**, *Minn.* A '44, Marine flyer based on Guam, killed in action over Rota Island in the Marianas, October 8, 1944.

399. **Capt. William Clay Woods, Jr.**, *Mo.* A '32, died at William Beaumont General Hospital in El Paso, Texas, February 4, 1945.

400. **1st Lt. Fred Charles Stoll, Jr.**, *Ohio* Δ '41, died of a compound fractured arm while a prisoner of the Germans, January 31, 1945.

401. **Maj. Louis C. Goldsmith**, *Wash.* A '25, died in the European area as the result of a plane crash, September 30, 1943.

402. **Capt. W. R. S. Wilburn, Jr.**, *Miss.* Θ '38, killed in action in European area, March 4, 1945.

403. **2nd Lt. David Merrick Dowdell, Jr.**, *Miss.* Θ '44, killed in action in France, November 27, 1944.

404. **Pfc. Raymond P. Connors, Jr.**, *N.Y.* Δ '46, killed in action in France, January 11, 1945.

killed in action in the Pacific, March 21, 1945.

LT. EDWARD J. ANGERMEIER
(409)

■ 2nd Lt. Edward J. Angermeier, *Mont.* A '43, Marine Corps, was killed in action at Iwo Jima, February 19, 1945, according to word received from his father in Great Falls, Mont. Lieutenant Angermeier had written to his parents on February 17 and death came on the day of the Iwo Jima invasion. He entered the Marine Corps in July, 1943, and went overseas in June, 1944, going first to Pearl Harbor and then to the Marianas where he participated with the 4th Marine Division in the taking of Tinian. He was wounded August 2, 1944, and received the Purple Heart. He also wore the Presidential unit citation given the 4th Division for participation in the Saipan and Tinian actions.

F/O EDGAR P. BEAVER
(366)

■ F/O Edgar P. Beaver, *R.I.* A '45, co-pilot of a B-24 based in Italy, was killed in a plane crash in the mountains of Yugoslavia, December 23, 1944. Previously he had been reported as missing in action. When the B-24 crashed, the entire crew was killed instantly. Burial took place in Yugoslavia. The accident on December 23 was Flight Officer Beaver's 23rd birthday, and according to his sister in Barrington, R.I., he was wearing his SAE ring at the time of the crash.

S/SGT. EDWIN W. BRINGARDNER
(395)

■ S/Sgt. Edwin W. Bringardner, Jr., *Ohio* Θ '44, radio operator and gunner on a B-24, has been declared dead by the War Department after being missing on his first mission over Germany, November 2, 1944. He was the son of Edwin W. Bringardner, *Ohio* Θ '18, of Columbus, Ohio, the brother of Pvt. Thomas A. Bringardner, *Ohio* Θ '49, of Robbins Field, Ga., and the nephew of Martin P. Bringardner, *Ohio* Θ '11. Sergeant Bringardner's bomber was shot down over Castrop. He was assigned to duty with the 8th Army Air Force last October. A memorial mass was held for him at Holy Rosary Church in Columbus, April 4, 1945.

PVT. BARTON A. CARPENTER
(396)

■ Pvt. Barton Adams Carpenter, *Ohio* Δ '44, infantry, was killed in action on the Luxembourg front, December 20, 1944, according to word received by his parents in Geneva, Ill. He previously had been reported as missing. It was known that Private Carpenter's division which was attached to the 1st Army, was among those which bore the brunt of the German counter offensive. In 1942 he enlisted in the Marine Corps Reserve and was called to duty in July, 1943. After six months he was honorably discharged following a serious illness. He enlisted in the Army in March, 1944, and was sent to England in October, arriving on the German front above December 1.

SGT. WILLIAM R. COLE
(345)

■ Sgt. William R. Cole, *Ky.* E '39, who was recorded in the March issue of THE RECORD as SAE's 345th Gold Star, was awarded the Bronze Star for gallantry in action during the siege of Fortress Brest. He ran across an exposed area swept by artillery and machine gun fire, and reestablished communications. He had been the leader of his section and his job was to assist the artillery liaison officer in the coordination of artillery fire in the support of the infantry troops. On September 11, 1944, Sergeant Cole was killed instantly by a sniper during street fighting inside the city of Brest.

LT. ROBERT M. FOLEY
(384)

■ 1st Lt. Robert M. Foley, *Tenn.* Z '38, was killed in action in Germany, March 1, 1945. He previously had been wounded in action but had returned to duty, January 14. He had been awarded the Bronze Star for meritorious service. Lieutenant Foley was serving with a headquarters company of a tank battalion. He entered the service in 1941.

LT. WILLIAM H. GILLESPIE
(364)

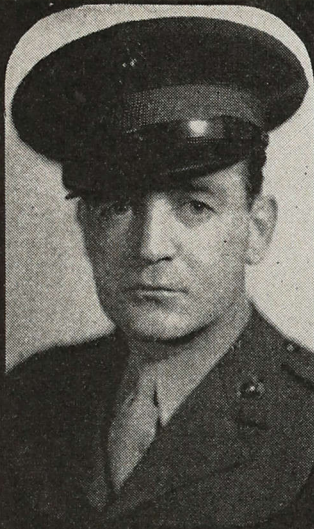
■ Lt. William H. Gillespie, Jr., *N.Y.* Δ '43, has been declared as giving his life for his country after having been reported as missing in action at sea, September 28, 1944. He was a pilot of a torpedo bomber and had been in service since leaving Syracuse University in September, 1941. He received the Air Medal for distinguished performance of duty while serving with the Navy. The citation referred to his meritorious achievement in aerial fighting against an enemy submarine in the Atlantic area. His mother in Saugus, Mass., subscribed to a Life Membership in the Chapter National for him, February 28, 1945, carrying out the wishes of Lieutenant Gillespie. He was married to Miss Naomi H. Fransen of San Diego, Calif., June 24, 1944.

MAJ. LOUIS C. GOLDSMITH

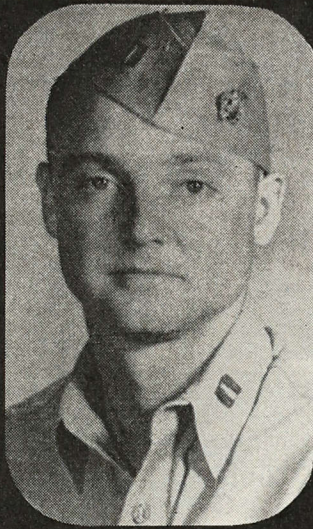
■ Maj. Louis C. Goldsmith, *Wash.* A '25, prominent flier and author of flying and adventure stories, died in the European area, October 12, 1943, according to word received by his wife in Portland, Ore., from the War Department. Major Goldsmith volunteered for the Army immediately after Pearl Harbor and left for overseas in March, 1942, with the rank of Captain. He was a veteran of World War I and served as aviation adviser and fier for the Cantonese during the early Chinese-Japanese war. He also set a flight record between Salt Lake City and Portland while piloting for the United Air Lines. He was president of the Portland Writers Club when he re-enlisted in the Army Air Corps.

■ 1st Lt. Theodore W. Hart, *Mich.* Γ '41, son of Herschell Hart, *Ind.* Γ '13, of the *Detroit News*, was killed in action in Germany, February 26, 1945, according to word received from his father. He previously had been reported as missing in action. He had been awarded the Silver Star for gallantry in action in Germany, October 8, 1944, and also he had received the Purple Heart. His photograph was reproduced in the December, 1944, issue of *THE RECORD*, and at that time he was with the 30th Division in France.

PFC. WILLIAM G. HAVEN
(365)

■ Pfc. William G. ("Pat") Haven, *Pa.* A-Z '46, died while a prisoner of the German government, January 11, 1945, according to word received by his parents in Cleveland, Ohio, from the War Department through the International Red Cross. He had previously been reported as missing in action, December 20, 1944. He landed in France with his division soon after D-Day and took part in the St. Lo breakthrough. After several months of continuous front-line service, he was placed in a rest area just back of the front line where the German offensive was launched December 16.

MAJ. LIVINGSTON HENRY
(361)

■ Maj. Livingston Henry, *Ga.* Ψ '42, died in a military hospital, October 30, 1944, as a result of wounds received in action near Metz, France, October 29. He was serving with Gen. George S. Patton's 3rd Army. Earlier in October he had been awarded the Purple Heart for wounds received in fighting which took place on the 18th. He also held the Bronze Star in recognition of heroic service rendered in operations against the enemy August 4-7.

LT. HORACE W. HOLMES
(329)

■ 1st Lt. Horace W. Holmes, Jr., *Ark.* A-T '32, died of wounds in Germany, December 30, 1944. His name was recorded in the March issue of *THE RECORD*. As a result of his heroic action at the Roer River, he was awarded the Silver Star. Disregarding hostile fire and the tricky currents of the river which caused three boatloads of soldiers to capsiz, Lieutenant Holmes plunged into the icy water with a rope and succeeded in making the opposite side with the rope which he secured to a tree trunk. Then he returned and made another trip back, this time with a boat. He managed to round up 12 of his men on the German side of the stream.

PVT. RICHARD E. HUFSMITH
(74)

■ Pvt. Richard E. Hufsmith, *Wyo.* A '39, was declared dead by the War Department, July 1, 1944, after he had been missing in action for two years, according to word received from his mother, Mrs. Fred W. Hufsmith of Casper, Wyo., mother of three SAE sons in service. Private Hufsmith was with a pursuit squadron at Clark Field when the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor and it was believed that he was a prisoner after the fall of Bataan. He had been awarded the Purple Heart at Bataan. His brothers are Capt. Frederic N. Hufsmith, *Wyo.* A '31, in the Philippines, and Capt. Frank R. Hufsmith, *Wyo.* A '34, in training as a B-24 pilot in Tennessee. A fourth Hufsmith in service but not a member of SAE is Cpl. John A. Hufsmith, at an advanced base in the Pacific. Mrs. Hufsmith was named "Mother of Wyoming" last May by the Golden Rule Foundation of New York, N.Y. In her spare time she works in the parachute shop at the Casper Army Air Field where she packs parachutes

and serves men preparing to leave for overseas duty. She says this is the least she can do.

SGT. EDWARD P. JAENICKE
(397)

■ Sgt. Edward P. Jaenicke, *Ga.* Φ '45, was killed in action in Germany during an attack on enemy positions, February 3, 1945, according to word received from his mother in Atlanta, Ga. Sergeant Jaenicke was called to active duty in June, 1943, and received basic training at Camp Croft, S.C. He attended Rhode Island State College and the University of New Hampshire under the Army Specialized Training Program. He went overseas from Camp Pickett, Va., in October, 1944. He was awarded the Combat Infantry Badge, and received the Purple Heart posthumously.

COL. LOUIS M. JIGGITS
(394)

■ Lt. Col. Louis M. Jiggits, *Miss.* Γ '21, died at Foster General Hospital in Jackson, Miss., March 22, 1945, after being returned from the Pacific for hospitalization last December, following a heart attack during the Morotai campaign. He was former Democratic national committeeman from Mississippi. He was one of Mississippi's best-known attorneys and entered the service in 1940 with the Mississippi National Guard. He participated in campaigns in New Guinea, Morotai and Leyte. Colonel Jiggits was a Rhodes Scholar and a veteran of World War I.

LT. AARNE KARVONEN
(392)

■ 1st Lt. Aarne Karvonen, *Mass.* K '44, navigator, was killed in action over Germany, September 11, 1944. He previously had been reported as missing in action. He entered the service in September, 1942, and was stationed at San Antonio, Texas. Lieutenant Karvonen went overseas in March, 1944, and was stationed in England. He was awarded the Air Medal with several Oak Leaf Clusters, and the Purple Heart posthumously.

LT. RUSSELL H. PHELPS
(388)

■ Lt. Russell H. Phelps, *Okla.* M '43, was killed instantly by a tank shell near Bastogne, December 25, 1944. Going overseas in July, 1944, Lieutenant Phelps was in almost continuous action. He was with Patton's Army when the Germans broke through our lines in Belgium, December 16, and fought the Germans near Luxembourg and Bastogne. He was buried in the 3rd Army cemetery near Luxembourg.

ERNIE PYLE
(412)

■ Ernie (Ernest Taylor) Pyle, *Ind.* Γ '23, famous war correspondent and friend of the G.I.s who accepted him as one of their own, was killed instantly by Japanese machine gun fire on Ie, a little island near Okinawa in the Pacific, April 18, 1945. Dispatches from Guam said that he was singled out by a Jap machine gunner while he and an Army officer were moving to the front during the Battle of Ie.

Pyle, who saw action in Europe with the G.I.s, returned to the United States for a rest from the war he hated, only to go back to it with the Navy in the Pacific. He was the 30th American correspondent to be killed in World War II and the 13th to die in the Pacific area. Ernie having a premonition that he would "get it" during the Okinawa campaign, Lt. Comdr. Max Miller, *Wash.* A '23, author of *Daybreak for Our Carrier*, tried to talk him out of participating but Ernie could not be dissuaded. Quickly following the death

of President Roosevelt, April 12, the passing of Pulitzer Prize winner Pyle was mourned by President Truman, congressmen, high government officials, generals and admirals along with the G.I.s and gobs throughout the world.

Beloved for his newspaper column concerning "the little man in this war" and for his books *This Is Your War* and *Brave Men* (the former produced as a movie entitled "G. I. Joe"), Correspondent Pyle was not technically in uniform, but due to his service to his country, he has been recorded as a Gold Star of SAE, a "Son of Minerva in Service." He was buried with military honors on Ie Shima. Before going to the Pacific, Pyle visited his Chapter, Indiana Gamma, at the Indiana University, at the time he was given an honorary degree.

ENSIGN RODNEY A. RICE
(390)

■ Ensign Rodney Ansen Rice, *Neb.* A-II '44, Navy patrol bomber pilot, was killed in a plane crash, March 17, 1945, but the place of the accident was not revealed by the Navy Department. Ensign Rice's father in Scottsbluff, Neb., said that he had been on duty in a war zone island in the Atlantic. Last August Ensign Rice survived 17 hours on a rubber life raft after his plane had been forced down over the Atlantic.

CAPT. JOHN R. RICHARDSON
(362)

■ Capt. John R. Richardson, *Mont.* A '38, prisoner of the Japanese in Mindanao in the Philippines, was killed when the ship he was aboard en route to Japan was torpedoed and sunk by U. S. forces, September 7, 1944. In the March, 1945, issue of *THE RECORD*, a special item entitled "Whereabouts Unknown," indicated that Captain Richardson might have been rescued from the transfer ship and recaptured by the Japs. However, shortly after that article was published, his wife, 1st Lt. Henrietta F. Richardson, Army Nurse Corps, Baer Field Hospital, Fort Wayne, Ind., was informed by the War Department that her husband had been killed. Captain Richardson was first reported missing in November, 1942, and later reported as a prisoner of the Japs in Philippine military camp No. II.

CAPT. HALL S. ROBERTS
(379)

■ Capt. Hall Scott Roberts, *N.H.* B '37, was killed in action while being held as a prisoner of the Germans, December 23, 1944, according to word received from his mother in Dover, N.H. Captain Roberts first was reported as missing in action, December 16, but later the War Department announced that the International Red Cross made the report that Captain Roberts was being held as a prisoner near the front and during an air attack, he was killed. He was awarded the Purple Heart posthumously. Captain Roberts was called into service in September, 1941, as a first lieutenant. His division was one which bore the brunt of the German counter offensive of December 15 and which later developed into the Battle of the Bulge. Capt. Robert W. Preucel, *Wash.* A '42, was in the same outfit and was taken prisoner, but escaped, as reported in the March issue of *THE RECORD*. It was learned through Captain Roberts' mother that Captain Preucel has returned to the States.

LT. MATT E. ROSE

■ 2nd Lt. Matt Edward Rose, *Ga.* Φ '45, was killed in France, January 15, 1945, while serving with General Patch's 7th

■ Pfc. Norton A. Shoger, Ill. Ψ - Ω '44, was killed in action in France, November 18, 1944, after having been previously reported as missing in action, according to word received from the War Department by his parents in Aurora, Ill. He received his training at Fort Benning, Ga., and Fort Bragg, N.C., before landing at Marseilles, France, in October, 1944, where he joined the 7th Army. He was buried in Eastern France. A memorial service was held for him at the New England Congregational Church in Aurora, February 25, 1945.

**ENSIGN DONALD B. STEENBURG
(380)**

■ Ensign Donald B. Steenburg, Jr., Colo. X '42, en route home to Aurora, Neb., to see his three-weeks-old son, was killed when the Naval transport plane in which he was traveling, crashed in the San Francisco Bay, February 13, 1945. He had been hospitalized at Oak Knoll Navy Hospital after returning from duty in the Gilbert Islands. Previous to that assignment he was an amphibious officer and a member of landing parties in the attacks upon the Aleutians and Tarawa.

**LT. FRED C. STOLL, JR.
(400)**

■ 1st Lt. Fred Charles Stoll, Jr., Ohio Δ '41, died from a compound fractured arm while a prisoner of the Germans, January 31, 1945. He had two jerries and 80 missions to his credit. While flying a Thunderbolt fighter bomber in Normandy in July, 1944, he brought his plane back from a mission although he had six fragments of steel in his eyes and was unable to see at all for five minutes. In December, after serving 79 missions, he received a new plane and his crew blew up 52 German tanks. On his last mission, December 17, he was shot down. His plane was 800 feet from the ground and his commanding officer didn't see him bail out. He was fortunate enough to get out with only a fractured arm. Lieutenant Stoll held the Air Medal with two Oak Leaf Clusters.

**LT. ERNEST E. WOODS
(359)**

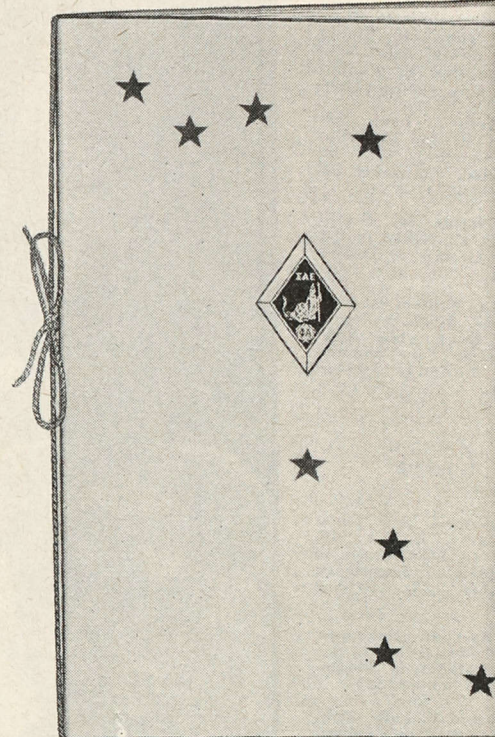
■ 2nd Lt. Ernest E. ("Larry") Woods, Jr., Kan. B '44, was killed in action with the 1st Army in Belgium, January 31, 1945. When the German counter offensive came in December, 1944, he was stationed four miles inside of Germany on the Belgium front. At that time he was injured and evacuated to a Paris hospital, where he remained until January 7, 1945, and then rejoined his regiment. His father, who is representative of the 27th District, Independence, Kan., has received no further word from the War Department as to the manner in which Lieutenant Woods met his death.

**LT. COL. ERNEST C. YOUNG

■ Lt. Col. Ernest C. Young, Okla. M '38, was killed in a plane crash near Redmond, Ore., September 20, 1944, two days before his 27th birthday, while carrying out his duties as Plans and Training officer of the 317th Wing. He was beginning his weekly tour of inspection of fields in Washington, Oregon and California under his jurisdiction. He entered the Army in 1939 as a flying cadet and received his commission as a second lieutenant in 1940. In December, 1941, he flew with his squadron to the Pacific Coast for submarine patrol work. In September, 1942, he sailed for Ireland with the P-38 squadron which he commanded, and spent three months in training and operational work in the British Isles. In December, 1942, he flew to Africa and participated in action at Pantaleria and in Sicily. He was cited for his achievements in skip-bombing and in various combat missions, including the first attack on Rome. He was promoted to lieutenant colonel in March, 1943, and was awarded the Air Medal, the Silver Star, the Distinguished Flying Cross and the British Distinguished Flying Cross. After completing his tour of combat duty, he returned to the States in December, 1943, and was stationed at various points on the Pacific Coast. A second son was born to his widow at Sentinel, Okla., December 10, 1944.

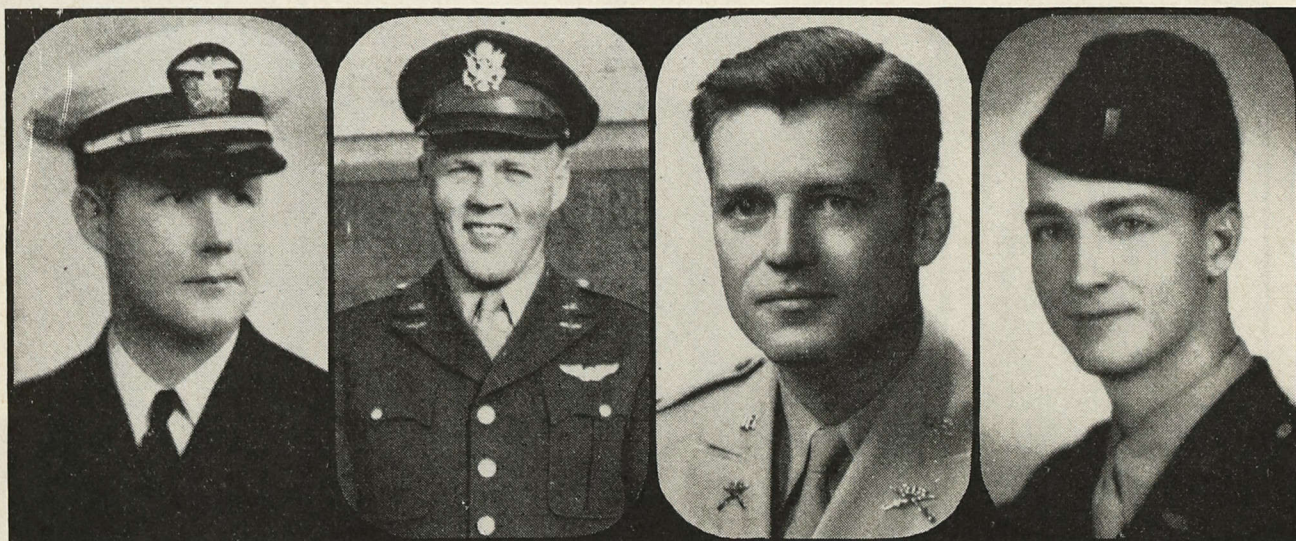

The disappearance of Lieutenant Albert's plane was believed to have been due to the exhaustion of fuel supply.

■ Maj. Harold R. Bookstrom, Neb. A-II '38, has been reported as missing in action in Belgium since December 19, 1944, but he may be a prisoner of the Germans as a propaganda report from Germany mentioned a Maj. Harold R. Bookstrom as a prisoner of war. This information was learned by his parents in Lincoln, Neb., from the War Department. He was commissioned a major at Camp Polk, La., in 1944 and took basic training at Fort Riley, Kan. After maneuvers in Arkansas, California and Louisiana, he was sent overseas in August, 1944, and was stationed in England, France and Luxembourg. He was with an armored field artillery battalion.

LT. ROBERT F. BROOKS

■ 2nd Lt. Robert F. Brooks, Tenn. K '44, has been reported as missing in action over Germany since November 21, 1944. He was a crew member of a B-24 Liberator bomber which participated in a bombardment mission to Hamburg, Germany. During the mission over the target the U. S. planes were subjected to flak and Lieutenant Brooks' bomber sustained damage. Over Texel Island, Holland, a radio message was received from his bomber, stating that the crew was going to bail out. No further information was obtainable relative to the loss of the Liberator.

CAPT. MALCOLM A. SMITH

■ Capt. Malcolm A. Smith, Jr., Ala. A-M '39, fighter pilot on a P-47 Thunderbolt, has been missing in action over France, since May 21, 1944. He was in combat more than four months and had received the Air Medal with three Oak Leaf Clusters. He was graduated from the U. S. Military Academy in January, 1943, and received his wings at Moultrie, Ga.

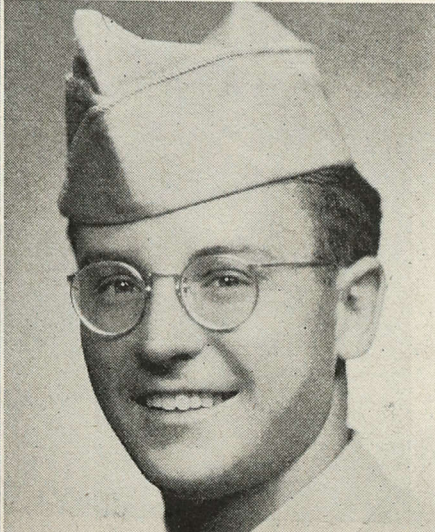
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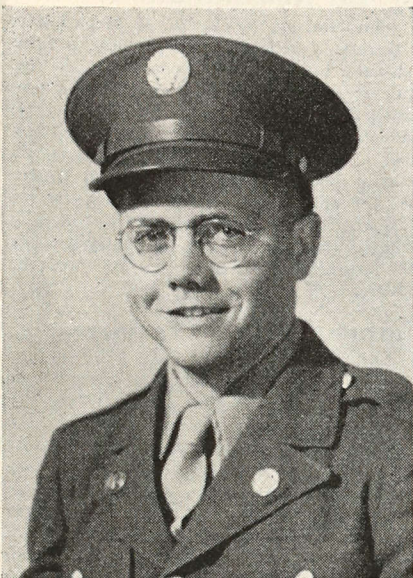
CAPT. VERNON G. ALEXANDER

■ Capt. Vernon Gayle Alexander, Ky. E '43, B-17 pilot, is a prisoner of the Germans after being missing in action over Germany, November 2, 1944. He was in Stalag Luft No. III until that camp was evacuated in January, 1945 and now he is believed to be at Moosburg or Nurnberg. Captain Alexander flew a lead plane in the Pathfinder Force of the 8th Air Force and was shot down over Meresburg, Germany on his 20th mission. The Air Medal and two Oak Leaf Clusters were sent to his mother in Lexington, Ky. Captain Alexander's brother is Maj. Harry S. Alexander, Ky. E '41, B-24 pilot, and commanding officer of a bomb squadron of the 7th Air Force in India.

LT. BLAINE A. BRIGGS

■ 1st Lt. Blaine A. Briggs, Iowa Δ '45, was reported as a prisoner of the German government in Stalag Luft. No. III, January 2, 1945, after being missing over Austria, October 29, 1944. He was a navigator on a B-24 with the 15th Air Force. He had completed 25

missions, when on October 16, 1944, navigating the lead plane in a formation over Lenz, Austria, his plane was hit by flak while over the target. Unable to clear the Alps, the crew bailed out over Seewiesen, central Austria. He had received the Air Medal and four Oak Leaf Clusters and his unit had two Presidential citations.

COL. RICHARD B. HARBESON

■ Lt. Col. Richard B. Harbeson, Ala. A-M '38, who was reported as missing in action over Germany, December 17, 1944, is a prisoner of the Germans, according to word received by his father in Pensacola, Fla., from the War Department. He is a P-47 fighter pilot and was in command of a tactical air command. He was strafing locomotives when he was shot down by anti-aircraft fire, and in his forced landing he hit a church steeple and the plane landed upside down. However, he was seen crawling from the wrecked plane. Colonel Harbeson had been stationed overseas since February, 1944. He was stationed at Pearl Harbor at the time of the bombing.

CAPT. K. LAMAR HART

■ Capt. K. Lamar Hart, Ala. A-M '39, Army Medical Corps, who was reported missing in action in Luxembourg, December 20, 1944, is a prisoner of the Germans, according to

word received from his mother, Mrs. J. B. Hart, House Mother of Alabama Alpha-Mu at Alabama Polytechnic Institute. Overseas 18 months, he was awarded the Purple Heart for wounds received in action last August.

LT. COL. EARL F. KLINCK

■ Lt. Col. Earl F. Klinck, Ohio M '25, who previously was reported missing in action, is now a prisoner of the Germans. He was called to duty in February, 1941, and was stationed at Fort Thomas for some time. He



went overseas eight months ago. He has been on leave as physical instructor and head baseball coach and assistant football coach at Hughes High School in Cincinnati. Colonel Klinck holds the highest rank of any teacher in the Cincinnati public school system in military service. Word from him, dated January 25, 1944, came from Oflag XIII-B, La. Hammelburg, Germany.

Lt. Colley Liberated

■ The second report of a member of ΣΑΕ listed as a prisoner of war to be liberated was Lt. Frank H. Colley, Ga. B '36, who arrived in Augusta, Ga., February 26, 1945, to find his parents and relatives there to greet him. His father is Carroll D. Colley, Ga. B '09. He had informed his parents of Washington, Ga., from Moscow that he had parted company with the Germans, January 22, 1945. Lieutenant Colley had been reported as missing in action at Faid Pass, North Africa, February 17, 1943, and a prisoner of the Germans in April. He had been placed in Oflag 64 at Szubin, near the Polish Corridor. Two years later the Russians broke into the sector and the entire camp was liberated. By February 17, 1945, Lieutenant Colley had reached Moscow. He was flown from Moscow to Washington, D.C. in 56 hours. The Fraternity's first prisoner to be reported as released was Lt. Julian T. Darlington, Ga. E '40, who was imprisoned at Shumen in eastern Bulgaria and was evacuated and moved to a U.S. base in Egypt. Details were given in the December, 1944, issue of THE RECORD. A third member to be reported as liberated was M/Sgt. Robert E. Carroll, N.M. Φ '44, who had been missing in action in Germany since October 14, 1944. The War Department informed his father in El Paso, Texas, that Sergeant Carroll had been reported as liberated from the Germans through U. S. Military Mission in Moscow.

Thanked by Queen

■ Special words of thanks came from Queen Wilhelmina for Capt. Harry Turney-High, N.Y. Σ-Φ '22, commander of the American section of the American-British-Canadian body-guard that accompanied the queen on a nine-day tour of liberated Holland. A dispatch from Venlo, Holland, dated March 21, said that Captain Turney-High, former professor of anthropology, was singled out for thanks by the queen at an airport near Venlo before she returned to England.

Four More Freed

■ As this issue of THE RECORD went to press it was learned that four more members had been liberated, two from the Germans and two from the Japanese. The German prisoners happened to be from the same Chapter and hometown and were both in Oflag No. 64. They are Capt. Fred R. Baker, Ky. E '38, paratrooper, who was reported missing in action over France on D-Day, June 7, 1944, and later reported as a prisoner of the Germans on that day, after he had participated in the invasions of Sicily and Italy; and Lt. Robert M. Watt, Ky. E '46, who was with the American Ranger battalion overpowered by the Germans at Anzio beach-head, January 30, 1943. The men freed from the Japs are doctors, Maj. Robert K. Whiteley, Calif. A '29, and Capt. Charles F. Lewis, Jr., Calif. B '36. Major Whiteley was in Manila at the time of Pearl Harbor, was captured by the Japs, April 9, 1942, and reported as a prisoner in Camp No. II near Davao on Mindanao Island. Captain Lewis was on Bataan Peninsula and was reported as a prisoner in Camp No. I by his father in July, 1944. A letter to the Associate Editor, THE RECORD, from Major Whiteley read as follows:

"It is true that I was in the Cabanatuan prison camp when the Rangers liberated us. The night of January 30 will long be remembered as the most thrilling in my life. Captain Charles Lewis, Calif. B, was with us that night. We arrived back in the States March 16 after a very good crossing. I weighed 95 pounds when released; since then have gained 50 pounds and am well and certainly happy to be home (571 Hamilton Ave., Palo Alto, Calif.)."

Survives Foxhole Siege

■ Pfc. John A. Dresser, Calif. Γ '44, of Pasadena, Calif., was one of a party of 23 soldiers who held out for a week against Germans surrounding them in an apple orchard west of Tettingen, Germany, 13 miles southeast of Luxembourg, in January. There were 27 men in the party at the beginning of the siege, including four wounded men, and they had seven cans of C-rations between them. The soldiers were entrenched in four foxholes, and repeatedly the Germans tried to storm the position, but the Americans drove off every attack. An American artillery observation plane flew over and the doughboys tried to signal that they were Americans but the plane dipped and sped back, and a few minutes later their sector was plastered with a concentration from American 105 mm. guns. Five times the plane flew over and each time its visit was followed by American artillery fire. The trapped men became ravenously hungry and once they were tempted to don uniforms taken from dead Nazis and join a German field kitchen chowline, but they gave up the idea. On the seventh day an American advance took the area and the men who had survived their ordeal were free. Dresser enlisted in the Army in August, 1942, and after training went to England in August, 1944, and to France in September. In March, 1945, word was received that Dresser had been in a hospital in England since February after being evacuated from the front line in Germany. He had suffered frozen feet.

Eye Specialist in Army

■ Capt. Alston Callahan, La. T-T '33, is attached to one of the eight special Army hospitals for eye surgery and has done a lot of work in reconstruction and rehabilitation for servicemen who have been returned to the States from France and Germany. He is located at Northington General Hospital, Tuscaloosa, Ala., which has been one of those selected as an eye center. He is the brother of Lt. Neil Callahan, La. T-T '39, Coast Guard, Marine Hospital, Norfolk, Va.

Was Pilot for FDR

■ Lt. Col. Henry T. Myers, *Ga. B '29*, who always seems to be the pilot when important people go to important places by air was selected to fly the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt from the island of Malta to Crimea, preliminary to his historic meeting with Marshal Stalin and Prime Minister Churchill. Colonel Myers, rated as one of the best pilots in the armed services, is with the Army Air Transport Command. He also flew the late President and members of his staff back to the Mediterranean after the Yalta conferences. He was chosen to pilot for Secretary of the Treasury Morgenthau to Italy. In the December, 1944, issue of *THE RECORD*, the names of other important people flown by Myers were given.

Hounds Japs in Pacific

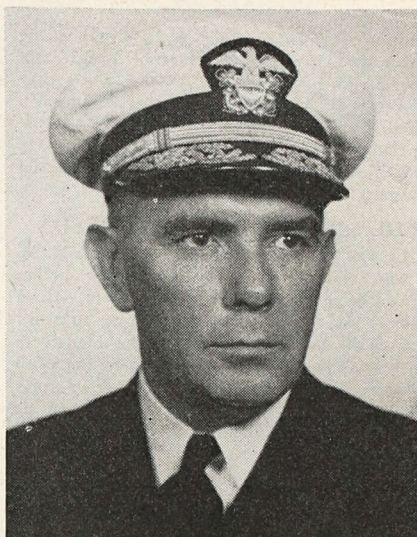
■ Col. Hewitt T. Wheless, *Texas P '38*, wearer of the Distinguished Service Cross and *THE RECORD*'s cover man in August, 1942, is back in the Pacific, hounding the Japanese. He is deputy commander of a new combat unit of the 21st Bomber Command which runs the B-29 raids against Japan from the Marianas. This is his first assignment overseas since his return from the Southwest Pacific in 1942 when he piloted a battered bomber which fought off 18 enemy pursuit planes for 25 minutes and returned safely to his base in the Philippines. He participated in the first mass ferry flight of B-17s from Hamilton Field, Calif., to the Philippines in May, 1941. Before going to the Pacific again he trained men at Boise, Idaho. He became a Major in August, 1942, and was made a Lieutenant Colonel in March, 1943. His full colonelcy came recently.

Writes about Iwo Jima

■ Capt. David K. Nopper, *Md. P-A '35*, Marine Corps liaison officer, and another Associated Press man, were in the Battle of Iwo Jima and they wrote more than two million words on the activities. Captain Nopper joined the Marine Corps shortly after the

Admiral Carter Is Paymaster

ONE of the biggest jobs in the Navy is now being handled by Rear Admiral William J. Carter, *S.C. T '13*, *N.Y. A '17*, USN, who became paymaster general and chief of the Bureau of Supplies and Accounts in March, 1945. Serving as pay director for the Navy, the Senate confirmed Admiral Carter's new job following nomination by President Roosevelt.

Admiral Carter was featured in the August, 1944, issue of *THE RECORD* when he was assistant chief of the Naval Supply Corps in Washington. His rank remains the same for this job but he will hold the position for four years. He began his Naval career in 1917. He was commissioned as assistant paymaster with the rank of Ensign in the Supply Corps in June, 1917. During World War I he had duty on troop transports as assistant officer of the USS *Leviathan* and later supply officer of the USS *Pocahontas*.

Holding various positions, Carter became a Lieutenant Commander in 1931 and was promoted to Captain in July, 1942, and became a Rear Admiral in September of that year. He has the Victory Medal, the Transport Clasp and the American Defense Service Medal.

war started, after having served with the *Baltimore Sun* and the *Associated Press*. He has been engaged in a number of battles and landed on Iwo Jima with the Marines. He has been credited with outstanding newspaper work in covering the activities on the front lines. ■ John Sitarsky, *Pa. Z '36*, is preparing to become a rehabilitation physical training instructor for the Army somewhere in England. He was wounded in the fighting near Aachen, Germany, in October, 1944, and after recuperation, he was selected along with 70 other battle casualties for the training course. Sitarsky coached football at Bucknell University, his alma mater, before entering service in November, 1943. His job will be aiding in bridging the gap between hospitalization and the returning to active duty for wounded soldiers.

Father, Sons in Service

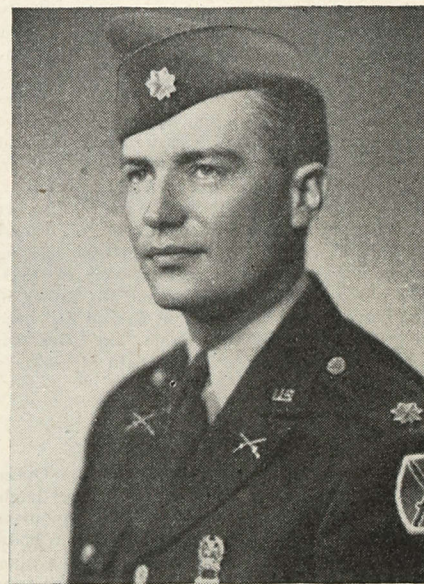

Earl P. Paris, Jr., *Ga. B '41*, is at El Toro, Marine Corps Air Station, Santa Ana, Calif., where he is commanding officer of a dive squadron. When he was shot down over Ballale, he landed in the sea with a bullet wound in his leg. He was found on the atoll by a group of Marine planes. He wears the Purple Heart.

Helps Reorganize Frankfurt

■ Capt. Hugh Hinman, *Calif. A '41*, is one of several American officers who has been setting up the military government in Frankfurt and trying desperately to bring comforts to the people. When news of his work came in April, he was averaging one meal a day, if he were lucky, in that thoroughly bombed city. Captain Hinman and the other officers have been trying to run the city without medical, legal or Allied liaison officers and without loudspeakers, telephones, radio stations or newspapers.

Capt. A. J. Ortmeier, Jr., Fla. T '37, missing in action in a flight over Burma, November 27, 1943, Distinguished Flying Cross, presented to his father at Drew Field, Tampa, Fla. The award was made for fighting against odds on the longest known fighter escort missions.

William B. Stark, Ga. B '44, commissioned a second lieutenant on the battlefield, March 24, the day the 9th Army crossed the Rhine. He previously held the rank of staff sergeant.

1st Lt. David E. Dunn, Ga. E '44, pilot of a B-17, a second Oak Leaf Cluster to Air Medal for meritorious achievement on 18 bombing attacks on strategic and tactical objectives in Germany.

Comdr. Harold E. Stassen, Minn. A '29, Legion of Merit for exceptionally meritorious service while serving as assistant chief of staff and flag secretary to Admiral William F. Halsey of the Third Fleet. ing an enemy cargo ship and making a daring attack on two German destroyers. He also has the Purple Heart for wounds received in action in August, 1944.

Cpl. Jack E. Galt, Mont. A '44, Bronze Star for work in connection with the invasion of Holland. With an Airborne Medical unit, he later was engaged in the Bastogne, Belgium affair. He is the brother of Capt. William W. Galt, Mont. A '42. ΣAE's 261st Gold Star, who received the Congressional Medal of Honor for gallantry above and beyond all call of duty at Villa Crocetta, Italy.

Capt. Frank D. Strong, Mont. A '39, Bronze Star for gallantry in action during the Battle of Hollandia.

S/Sgt. Richard C. Reinhardt, Neb. A-II '43, battlefield commission in European theater of operations.

2nd Lt. William E. Taylor, N.Y. M '43, Bronze Star for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy, November 29, 1944. He was leader of a section of a patrol which killed an unknown number of the enemy hiding in a shack in a swamp. He has seen action on Guam and Leyte and received an Oak Leaf Cluster for his part in the Leyte campaign.

2nd Lt. Maurice P. Murphy, N.Y. P '30, Purple Heart for wounds received in the battle for Zigzag Pass on Luzon. A veteran of Bataan and Corregidor, he also holds the Combat Infantry Badge and the Philippines Liberation ribbons with two campaign stars.

Lt. Edwin M. Wilson, Jr., N.C. N '42, pilot of a carrier-based dive bomber, Gold Star in lieu of second Distinguished Flying Cross at Pearl Harbor, February 15, 1945, for heroism and extraordinary achievement while participating in an aerial fight against the enemy in Formosan waters January 21, 1945; returned to the States in March for leave.

Pfc. Earl G. Naumann, N.D. B '44, ΣAE's 358th Gold Star, Purple Heart posthumously.



2nd Lt. Hayden D. Davis, Jr., Ohio Θ '42, Silver Star for gallantry in action in Germany, November 17, 1944; despite a wound, he remained at his post under enemy fire.

1st Lt. Joseph E. Bainer, Ohio M '36, Bronze Star posthumously for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy from June 14, to July 18, 1944. He was Σ AE's 240th Gold Star and the son of John D. Bainer, III, B '13.

1st Lt. Robert M. Weisbrod, Pa. A-Z '43, Air Medal with two Oak Leaf Clusters and the Distinguished Unit citation. He is the son of Raymond Weisbrod, Pa. '21.

Capt. Edwin M. Shanks, Pa. Z '41, Air Medal with five Oak Leaf Clusters and the Purple Heart; returned to the States after 13 months in the Southwest Pacific as a bomber pilot and operations officer of a B-25 squadron.

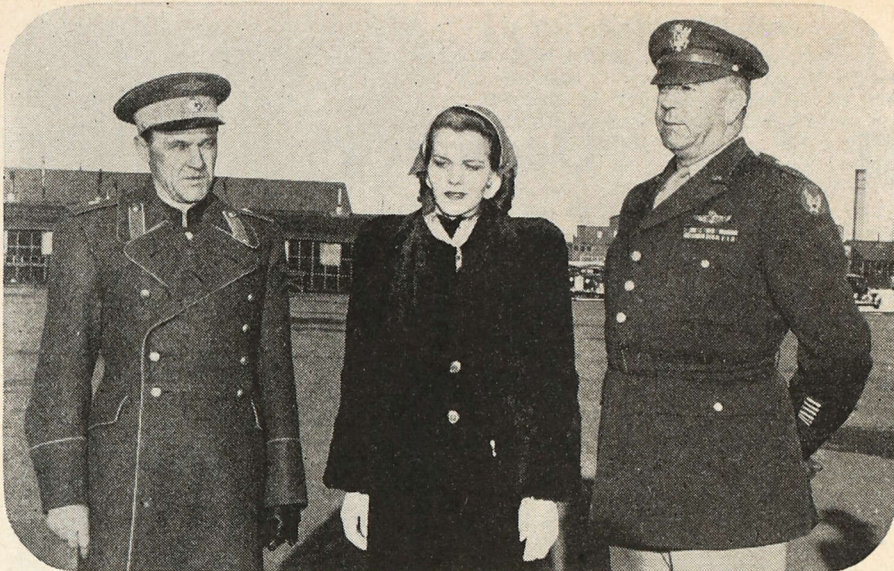

Colonel Bell's engineer general service regiment received the meritorious service unit plaque for mine clearing and construction operation in opening a port in France.

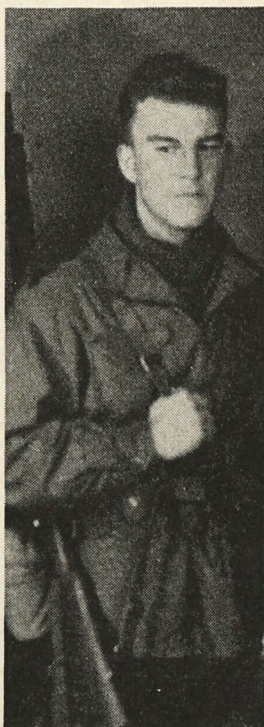
Lt. Harold H. McLean, Mass. K '42, was wounded in action in France in January, 1945.

Whitehead Back in ETO

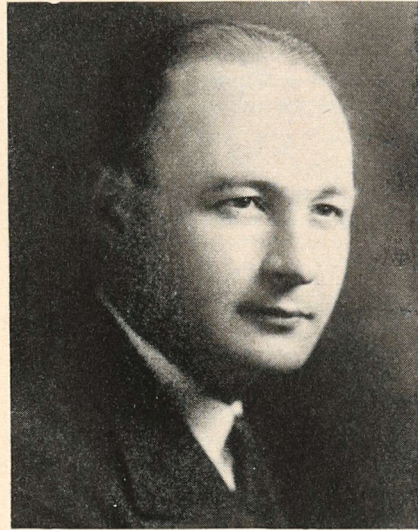

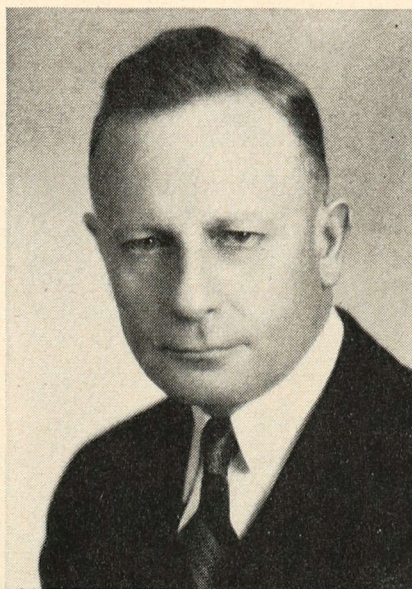

Defer School And Convention

AT ITS meeting held in Evanston in February the Supreme Council voted to call off the 11th Leadership School and the 89th Anniversary National Convention, which normally would be held during the last week of August unless the government restrictions on travel for conventions and other meetings are relaxed in time for arrangements to be made for holding these meetings.

This action was taken in compliance with the regulations promulgated by the Office of Defense Transportation which prohibit meetings of more than 50 persons, unless it can be shown that not holding such meetings will seriously interfere with the war effort of the Nation. The members of the Supreme Council were anxious to cooperate with the measures being taken to further the prosecution of the war and felt that it would be futile to try to get a permit for holding either the School or the Convention.

A meeting of the Supreme Council will be held in Evanston, Thursday, Friday and Saturday, August 23-24-25, and the Province Archons, the Director of Leadership Training, the Scholarship Commissioner, and a member of the National Board of Trustees have been invited to attend this meeting to take part in the discussion of such emergency questions as may be brought up for decision. If possible, a date for holding the National Convention will be set at this meeting.

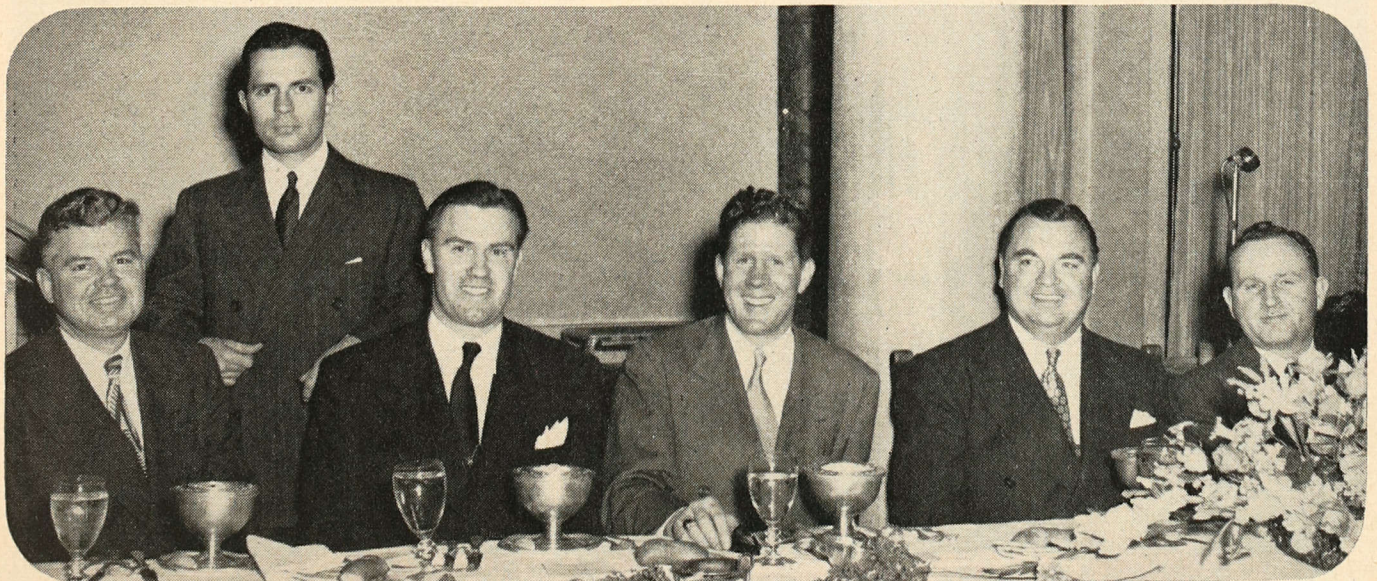

Information as to the amount standing to the credit of any member will be furnished by the Eminent Supreme Recorder on request.

In addition to the 3,203 Life Members who have paid \$50.00 each, there are 60 Founders who have paid \$1,000 each and several members who are becoming Founders by paying in instalments.

Receipts from Founders and Life Members are credited to the National Endowment Fund when checks are drawn in favor of Sigma Alpha Epsilon and to the Levere Memorial Temple Sustaining Fund when checks are drawn in favor of the Levere Memorial Foundation. Donations to the Foundation are deductible from Federal income tax returns but donations to the Fraternity are not.

Province Kappa Alumni School

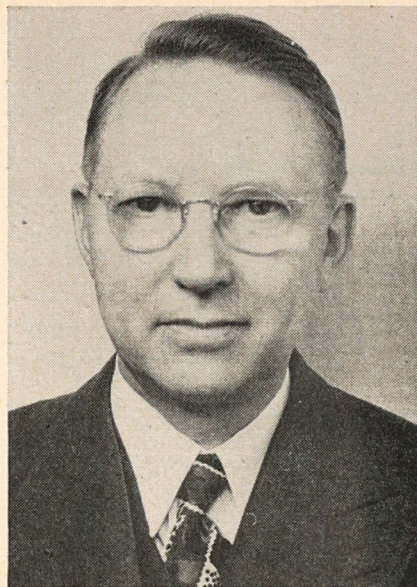
The alumni conference was held primarily for "key men" who had been selected and assigned to specific work through The Alumni Program, sponsored by the National Fraternity. The first alumni indoctrination school of The Alumni Program was held in Province Gamma and was reported in the March issue of THE RECORD.

Thirty members including 24 alumni, 18 of whom were "key men," and six Active Chapter representatives attended the school which was under the direction of Edward G. Hathcock, Calif. Δ '30, Archon of Province Kappa and a member of The Alumni Program Committee.

Archon Hathcock started the conference by discussing The Alumni Program's background and purpose. This was followed by a general discussion on the program. "Analysis of the Job to be Done on the Active Chapter Front: A Challenge to Key Men of ΣΑΕ," was given by Clyde S. Johnson, ΦΚΣ, assistant dean of undergraduates and fraternity adviser at the University of California at Los Angeles. Archon Hathcock then discussed "ΣΑΕ, It's Government, Organization and Strength."

Calvin Smalley, Calif. Δ '27, Province Recorder, read "The Perpetuation of ΣΑΕ," a paper by Cobb C. Torrance, Ga. B '21, ESDA. This was followed by a panel discussion by Chapter representatives and Province officers on Active Chapter work and problems.

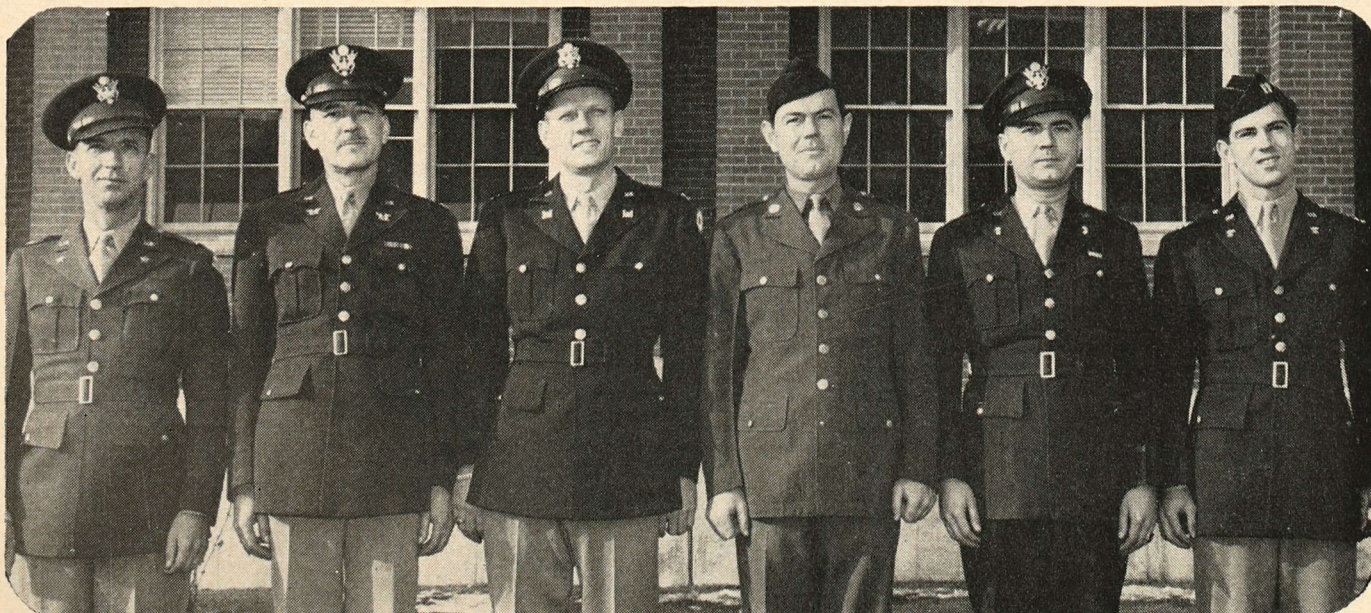

Reaction to the alumni conference was that The Alumni Program as planned by the Committee and sponsored by the National Fraternity is sound and a big stride ahead of anything yet undertaken to strengthen the Fraternity; that it will work in the local situation and that great progress already has been demonstrated. Adherence to a policy of local autonomy in carrying out The Alumni Program and avoidance of duplication of effort and possible friction between various alumni organizational units were points stressed by several "key men."

The conference discussion indicated what the Committee on The Alumni Program believed: namely, there is a real desire for leadership indoctrination among alumni, and they will respond enthusiastically to a call for participation in a program geared to youth guidance.

14,100 IN SERVICE

Up to April 1, 1945, the names of 14,100 members of Sigma Alpha Epsilon who are serving in the armed forces had been reported to the National Office, 375 having been reported since January 15, 1945, when the list which was carried in the March issue of THE RECORD was compiled. The new names are listed herewith and also the names of 637 (indicated by asterisks) who have been promoted or transferred.

Because of censorship regulations THE RECORD does not use the names of outfits or units and their locations in combat areas but the service man as an individual may be listed as in a specific area without including the name of his outfit, etc. Also names of ships on which men are serving are not printed in THE RECORD and service men overseas, or about to embark are not identified or linked with their ships or units.

Men in service, their parents and friends are requested to give information which will aid the National Office in holding a complete file, regardless of what may be printed in the magazine. The magazine can be sent overseas if their APO or Fleet address is given for our files but THE RECORD may not be forwarded from their home addresses.

Reconversion in Oklahoma

■ "Postwar fraternity reconstruction, or reconversion, if you will, has a year long start in the state of Oklahoma, through the Oklahoma Interfraternity Alumni Council organized July 1, 1943. Adopting the Fraternity Criteria and Principles of Democracy of the National Interfraternity Conference as a basis, the organization is composed of dues-paying representatives of 17 national men's fraternities which have either chapters on Oklahoma campuses or organized alumni groups, among the representatives being the district officers of three of the nationals. The council was the brain child of Errett R. Newby of Sigma Nu, an Oklahoma City oil man, who began to talk it among other Oklahoma Greeks shortly after the freeze order closed all houses and chapters on the Oklahoma and Aggie campuses in February, 1943. A general meeting October 19, 1943, was attended by 50 who adopted the constitution that the organizing committee had previously drawn up. A banquet of the entire body of fraternity men is held annually and a meeting of the delegates of the various member bodies quarterly. The most recent sessions, November 15 and January 30, were attended by a committee from the faculty of the university. These meetings came right down to brass tacks with a discussion of certain reforms in fraternity life on which they will co-operate and finally named a committee of five to work with the faculty committee to formulate definite policies to present to the annual meeting. The council-faculty committee held several meetings and, in January, joined in approving and recommending to the regents an agreement covering the following points:

1. Approving deferred pledging in principle, but not recommending its adoption until further study of its effect in other schools.
2. Approving financial supervision of chapters and members to the extent that chapters must report to the university each month all men 60 days in arrears on house bills; and all accounts owing by the chapter that are 60 days old. The report recommends the refusal of diplomas or semester grades to any students so in arrears.
3. "Unfreezing" to be after all chapter houses have been released (now leased to the school), and at a date to be determined after May 1, 1945. The affairs of each chapter to be under the supervision of a committee of their alumni.

Not stated in the objectives, but the real one, embracing all others, with the school and the council solidly together, is the elimination of Joe College.—*The Caduceus* of Kappa Sigma.

Plan Memorial

■ Pi Kappa Alpha opened a campaign in February, 1945, to raise \$250,000 for a War Memorial in honor of the 12,000 members in the armed services and their 200 dead and missing. The drive was announced by Maj. Roy D. Hickman, national president, and it is to close, December 7, 1945. The War Memorial Fund is being supervised by the fraternity's trustees and the director is Harold E. Rainville of Chicago. The Campaign urges each of the fraternity's 30,000 members to contribute a \$25.00 war bond to the fund to erect a memorial building. Many committees have been selected throughout the country

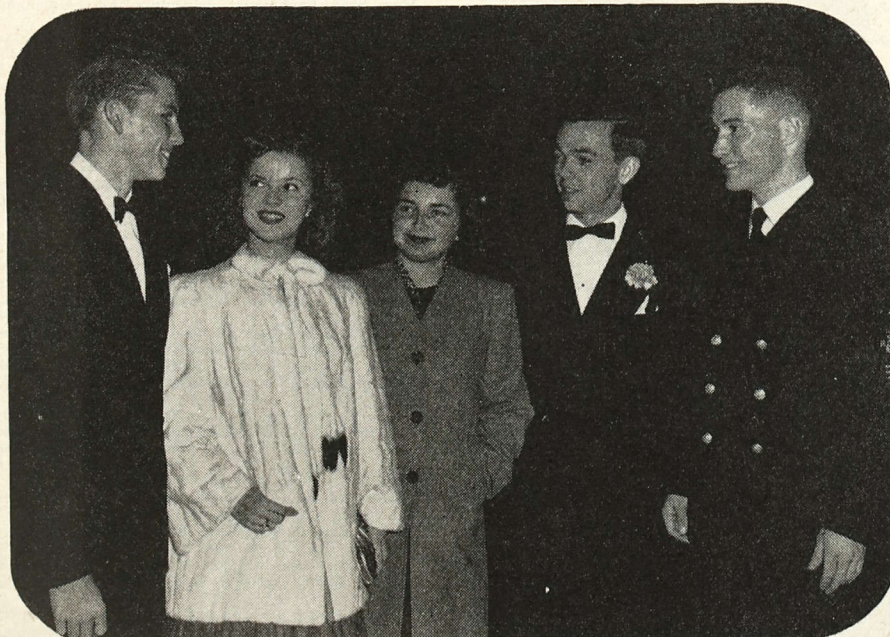
and the Committee on Architectural Design is at work on sketches of the proposed exterior.

"Expect the Unexpected"

■ President Edward C. Elliott of Purdue University challenged 157 graduates of the University at commencement exercises in February with: "Expect the unexpected and from the stuff of the unexpected, create new expectations for yourself and others whom you will serve." He urged them to use their minds "to control those things that need to be controlled" and to become "students of the human mind because it will play a more important role in the future than materials of nature." President Elliott pointed to the efforts of America to attain national unity since the days of the founding of the Republic and he urged the graduates "as educated men and women" to use their education and talents to speed national unity.—*The Purdue Patrol*.

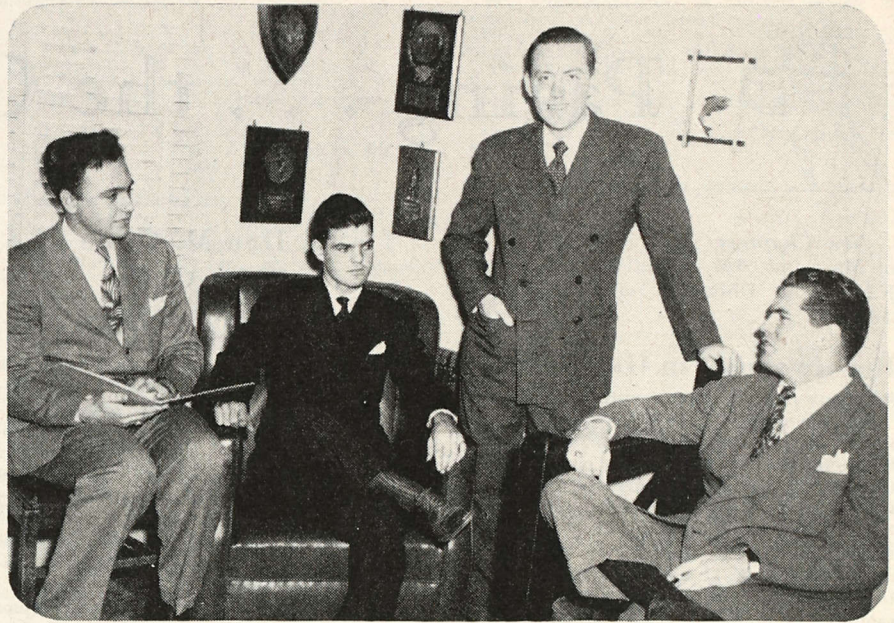

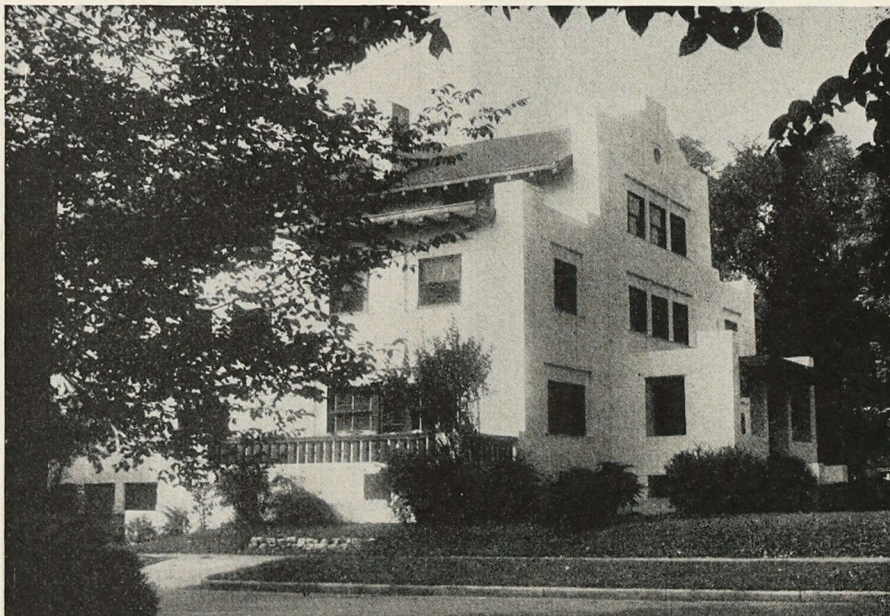

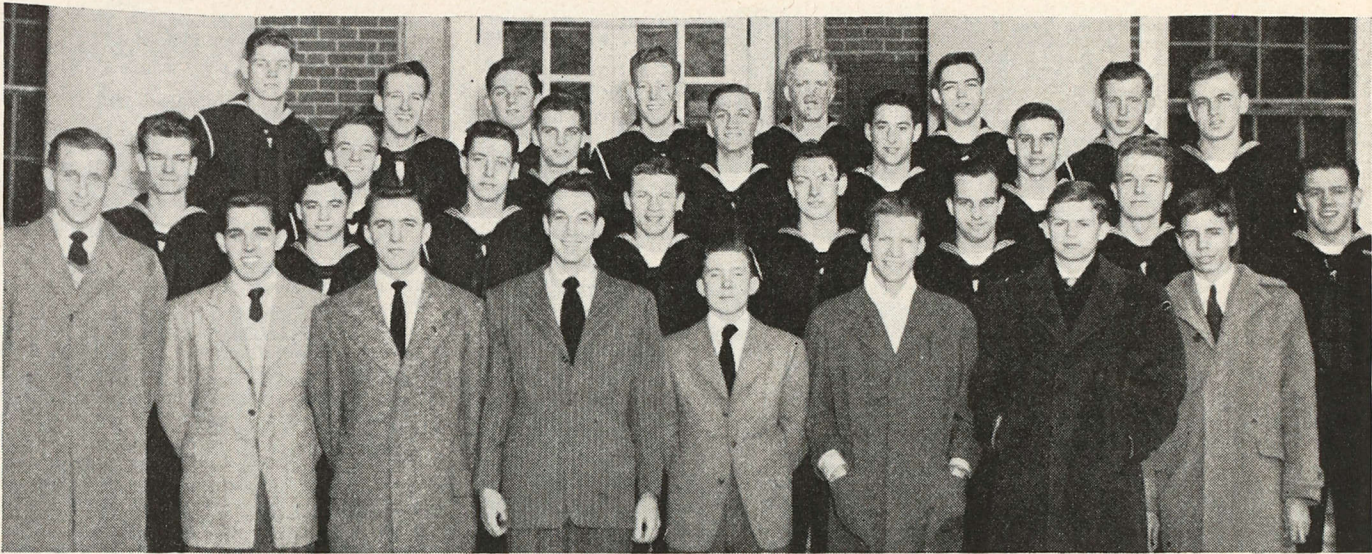

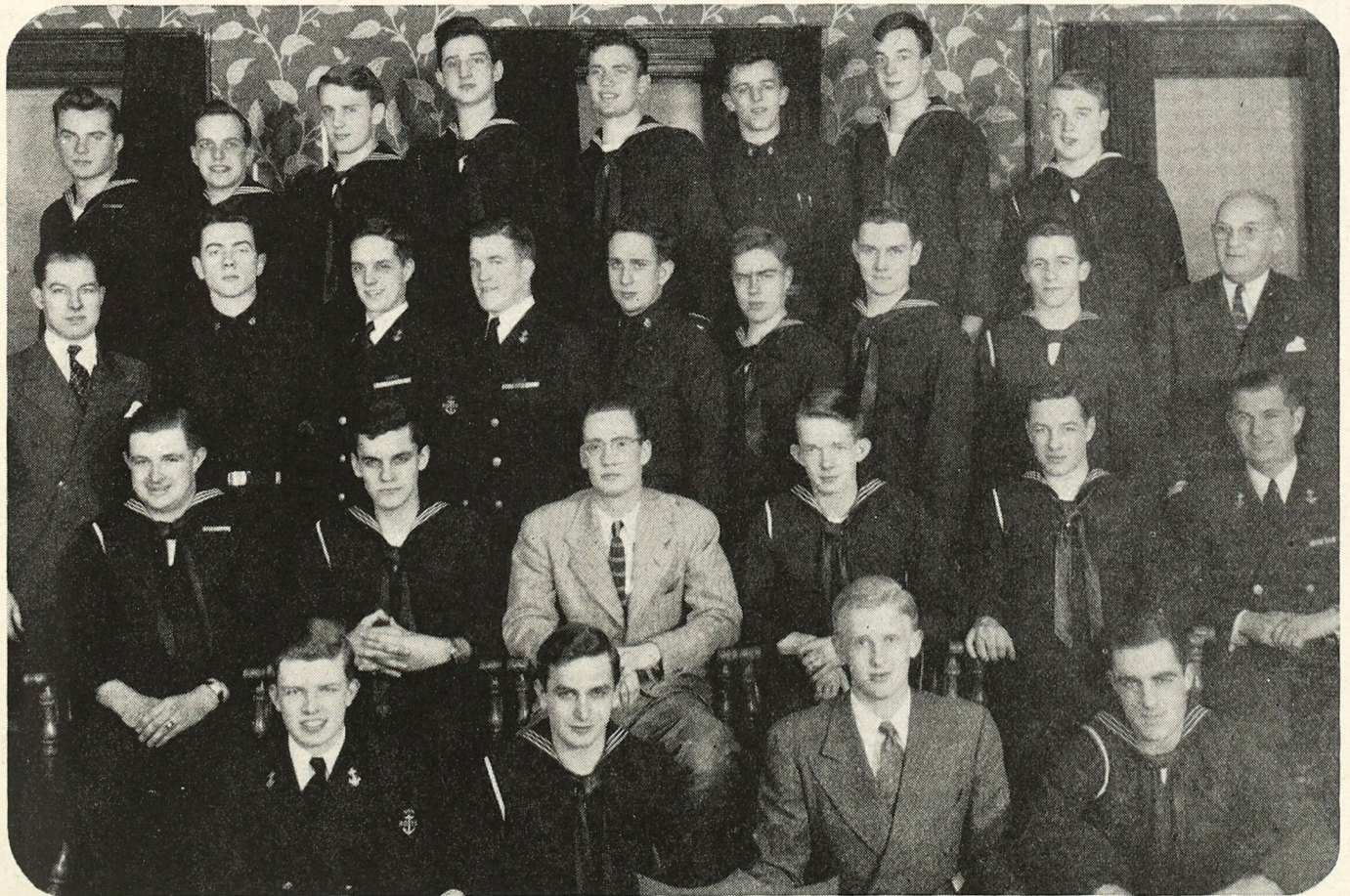
