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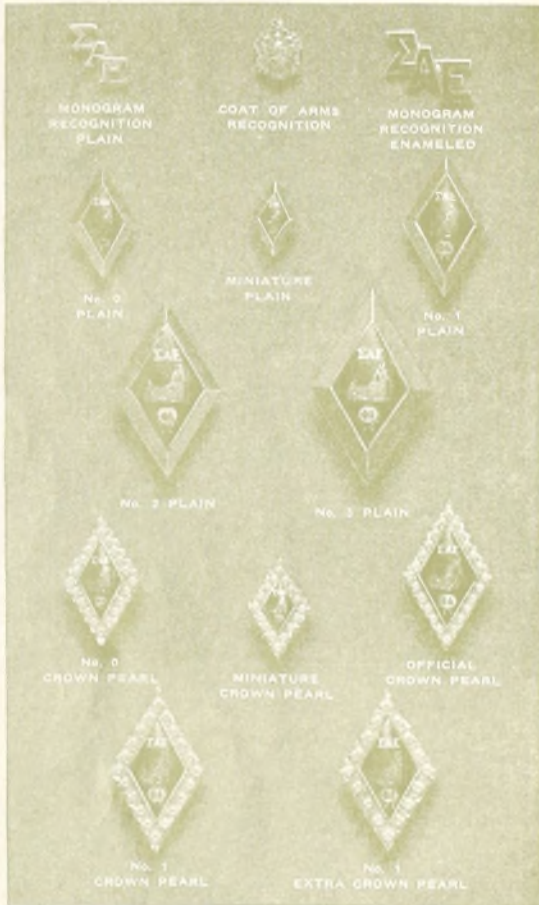

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New Secretary of Agriculture Brannan

Serving ably as Assistant Secretary of Agriculture in Washington, D.C., for some time, Charles F. Brannan, *Colo. Z '29*, became a Cabinet Member in May when he was named Secretary of Agriculture after being nominated by President Harry Truman. His nomination was unanimously confirmed by the Senate, May 28. He succeeded Clinton P. Anderson who resigned to run for the senate in New Mexico.

Brannan, a native of Colorado, specialized in irrigation and mining law during practice in his home state. He began his agricultural public service in 1935 as assistant regional attorney for the resettlement administration. Two years later he was appointed regional attorney for the solicitor of the Department of Agriculture. In 1941 he was regional director of the farm security administration with headquarters in Denver. He was brought to Washington in April, 1944, as assistant administrator of the farm security administration and two months later became assistant secretary of the Department of Agriculture.

He Recommends

Mr. Brannan has been in charge of agricultural policy and program activities at the department, preparing recommendations for the future long range farm programs. He served as agricultural adviser to the U.S. delegation at the post-war security conference in San Francisco. He has been interested in fraternity work since being graduated from the University of Denver and served as Archon of Province Eta, covering Chapters in Colorado, New Mexico, Wyoming and Utah.

Following his elevation to the agricultural post, a feature by Mary Spargo appeared in *The Washington Post* of which Philip Leslie Graham, *Fla. Y '35*, is publisher. She

commented: "Mr. Brannan is as 'plain as an old shoe.' As an executive he is so considerate of others that the work of his department flows along in a steady fashion unruffled by storm and stresses. At least that is the opinion of the folks in the department and they have had a while to learn about the personal characteristics of this Denver attorney. All 68,377 Agriculture Department employes, it is reported, are delighted to see this promotion come from within the ranks. That, they say, is good practice in government.

Social Career?

"A husky blond, now balding, Brannan went out for baseball, football and track in college. But his 'total social career,' he said, was a girl named Eda Seltzer, a pretty Pi Phi, who is now Mrs. Brannan. Incidentally Mrs. Brannan is the second Cabinet wife to belong to Pi Beta Phi. The other is Mrs. Tom Clark, wife of the Attorney General. Miss Margaret Truman belongs to the same sorority. Brannan belonged to Sigma Alpha Epsilon and

Phi Alpha Delta, a legal fraternity.

"Brannan, a quiet, modest man, makes one boast—when he lived in Denver he had the most beautiful lawn that anyone ever had anywhere in the United States. An apartment dweller now, he can't get out and garden anymore. And as he puts it, there was something mighty pleasant in getting out and watering the lawn two or three evenings a week."

Whitaker in 80th Congress

John A. Whitaker, *Ky. E '25*, of Russellville, Ky., has been elected to Congress from the second Kentucky Congressional district, to fill the unexpired term of Governor Earle C. Clements. Mr. Whitaker, a Democrat, was unopposed by either party and his election brought the Fraternity's total of Congressmen to 13.

Active in the civic and political life of Kentucky for the past 20 years, Mr. Whitaker has been county attorney of his home county, Logan, for almost two decades, has served as district governor of Rotary International and president of his home Rotary Club. He is on the board of the Kentucky Society for Crippled Children, in which organization he takes an active interest, and has served as president of the Alumni Association of Σ AE in Kentucky, having been among the founders of that organization.

While a student at the university, Mr. Whitaker was a member of $\Lambda\Delta\Sigma$; Strollers, student dramatic group; Su-Ky, school pep organization, and many other campus groups. He is a member of the State Bar Association, the Kentucky

County Attorneys Association and has served on the executive committee of the University of Kentucky Alumni Association being a life member of the association. Mr. Whitaker and his wife are now in Washington.

Another Founder, 105 Life Members

Seventy-fifth Founder of The Levere Memorial Foundation and of the Chapter National of Sigma Alpha Epsilon is Robert W. Hammerstein, Mo. B '24, St. Louis attorney, who celebrated the 1948 Founders Day by writing his check for \$1,000 in favor of the Foundation on March 9.

As of June 10, 1948, there were 4,317 fully paid Life Members of the Chapter National, 105 members having completed the \$50 payment since January 1, when the list of new Life Members which was carried in the February issue of THE RECORD was compiled.

Mr. Hammerstein has been one of the most loyal supporters of his Chapter, Missouri Beta at Washington University, and has shown his interest in ΣAE in many ways. His son, Robert W., Jr., was recently initiated by Arizona Alpha.

personal income tax returns but donations to the Fraternity are not.

Both these funds are carefully guarded by the National Laws and investments for them are made by men who are especially fitted for this responsibility. Investments for the Sustaining Fund are made by the Trustees of the Foundation on the advice of the Advisory Council, consisting of five alumni living in the vicinity of Chicago. The National Endowment Fund is administered by the National Board of Trustees, made up of five alumni living in or near New York.

Donations made to either of these funds will serve the Fraternity during the years to come and assist in carrying out its objectives for the benefit of the Chapters Collegiate.

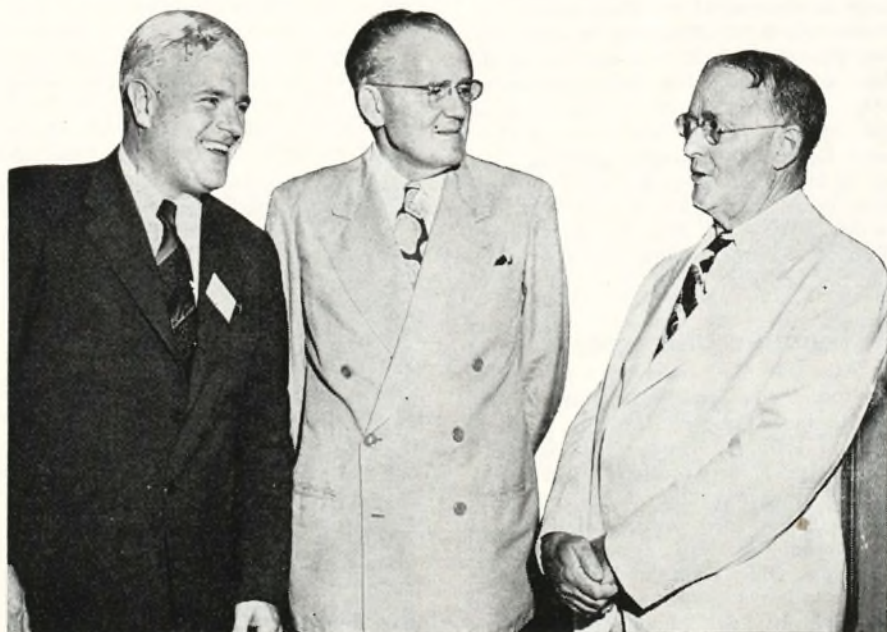
14th Leadership School Will Open on August 29

Prospects for the 14th Leadership School of Sigma Alpha Epsilon, to be held in the Levere Memorial Temple, 1856 Sheridan Road, Evanston, Ill., the national shrine of the Fraternity, Sunday, August 29, to Friday, September 3, indicate that it will be one of the most successful of the series of schools, held since this unique venture in fraternity training was inaugurated in 1935 under the direction of Dr. John O. Moseley, *Okla. Σ '16, Calif. A '30*.

The program for the School has been practically completed by Dr. Moseley and will include the majority of features which have proved successful in the past. The faculty will be composed of the members of the Supreme Council, Province Archons and other officers of the Fraternity. Mr. Leroy A. Wilson of New York, president of the American Telephone & Telegraph Co., a past chairman of the National Interfraternity Conference, and Mr. Francis Craig, of Nashville, Tenn., will be guest speakers. South Africa Diplomat

● North Winship, *Ga.* Ψ '10, is minister to the Union of South Africa, having been named to this new diplomatic post by President Truman and confirmed by the Senate, March 23. Mr. Winship is a career diplomat like his distinguished colleagues, Jefferson Caffrey, *La.* T-Y '06, ambassador to France; John Carter Vincent, *Ga.* Ψ '22, minister to Switzerland, and Dr. Antonio Espinosa de los Monteros, Jr., *Pa.* Δ '25, ambassador from Mexico. Ten years ago Mr. Winship was counselor of the American Embassy in Warsaw, Poland. A native of Macon, *Ga.*, Mr. Winship is a Class One Foreign Service Officer—the State Department's highest rating. He entered the service in June, 1910 and in 38 years has served thruout Europe, the Near East and Africa. His last appointment, October 12, 1944, was consul general at Montreal, Canada.

New College Prexy

● Dr. Charles W. Burts, *S.C.* Φ '29, is president of Shorter College in Rome, *Ga.*, having been elected by the Shorter College Board of Trustees at a meeting in Atlanta in May and assuming his new duties on July 1. He was formerly dean of Meredith College at Raleigh, *N.C.* Mr. Burts is the son of the Rev. Charles E. Burts, *S.C.* Φ '93. The late Dr. Azor W. Van Hoose, *Ga.* Δ '82, was formerly president at Shorter. After being graduated from Furman University, Burts took graduate work at the University of Chicago, Columbia University and Yale. He served in the U.S. Navy for three and one half years, returning to the Furman faculty after Navy days. He was named dean of Meredith in 1946. He is married and has one son.

At Hamline University

● Hurst Robins Anderson, *Ohio* Δ '26, former adviser of Pennsylvania Omega at Allegheny College, Meadville, is president of Hamline University at St. Paul, Minn. He is the brother of Dr. Paul Russell Anderson, *Ohio* Δ '28, president of the Pennsylvania College for Women at Pittsburgh, *Pa.* After graduating with honors at Ohio Wesleyan University and receiving honor grades at the University of Michigan Law School, Mr. Anderson joined the faculty of Allegheny College in 1929 and continued on the staff thru the faculty ranks to a professorship, registrar of the college, and dean of the summer session. In 1943, he became president of Centenary Junior College, a school for 350 women, at Hackettstown, *N.J.*, 45 miles west of New York City, and 23 miles from Lafayette College, domicile of Pennsyl-

vania Gamma at Easton, where he attended several chapter functions. He completed his Master's degree at Northwestern University in 1934 and spent additional time in the field of education at the University of Chicago. He was granted a fellowship by the Rockefeller Foundation in 1911 for the study of general education in the American college. He is president of the New Jersey Association of Colleges and Universities and treasurer of the National Association of Schools and Colleges of the Methodist Church. Mr. Anderson was married in 1932 and has three children. The Anderson brothers' father is Foster C. Anderson, *Mass.* B-Y '99.

Heads Allegheny

● At press time it was learned that Dr. Louis Tomlinson Benezet, *N.H.* Δ '36, was named president of Allegheny College at Meadville, *Pa.*, and probably is the youngest college president in the country. He, 32 years of age, formerly was assistant to the president of Syracuse University. His brother is Roger Paul Benezet, *N.H.* Δ '32.

Dean at DePauw

● Dr. Edgar C. Cumings, *Ind.* Γ '31, is now dean of DePauw University in Greencastle, *Ind.*, where a local group of members of ΣAE are colonizing for a Chapter. Dr. Cumings formerly was president of Canterbury College in Danville, *Ind.* From 1936 to 1943 he was a member of the University of Rochester faculty. Ariz. Vice President

● Robert Logan Nugent, *Ariz.* A '23 little thought when he was attending the University of Arizona that he would return to Tucson and become the vice president, the jack-of-all-trades when the president is out-of-town. Build City on Nerve

On nerve mostly, it seems, two former Air Force pilots are building a little city called Cloverland at Montgomery, Ala., and when finished it will cost more than four million dollars and contain 539 housing units and a complete business district, accommodating some 3,000 people. The young builders are Jimmy Folmar, Ala. M '39, Ala. A-M, and Henry Flinn, N.Y. A '42, Ala. A-M, and they are referred to as "Flormat and Flint." Cloverland is the biggest single housing project ever undertaken in Alabama and one of the biggest in the South. At Auburn before the war Folmar had been an engineer and Flinn a designer, and returning from war, they were still thinking in terms of big Air Force operations. So when they decided to build together, they were still not down to earth but they had no money. However an insurance company put up the money and instead of looking at a 50-foot lot for their first house, they looked at a 100-acre field for their first 535 houses. At one swoop they bought \$10,000 worth of heavy construction equipment from war surplus. Like their city the young contractors have come up fast, amassing about 10 years experience in two years. They offer a veteran an \$8,750 house and lot for about what it costs them with no down payment and \$62 a month, less than the cost of rent. Two other ΣAE veteran home builders were featured in THE RECORD in March, 1947. They were James L. Bishop, Ky. E '31, and C. Frank Stone, Ky. E '32, of U.S. Homes, Inc., builders of prefabricated houses in Marietta, Ga.

Realty, His Business

Aids Polio Victims

Last year Dr. Guyton watched patients at Warm Springs, Ga., and decided to try to help them. He rigged a motor to a wheel chair and attached to the arm rest a single switch which operates like the joy stick on an airplane, enabling a patient to move his chair for-

ward and backward, to the right and left, simply by tilting the switch. The chairs are made in Oxford, Miss., and sell for less than \$300. In addition to the chair, Dr. Guyton has invented two other aids to infantile paralysis victims, a hoisting device or lift and a walking brace. On the Ole Miss faculty, Dr. Guyton is 28 years old and a Navy veteran. He contracted polio in October, 1946. At present he is attempting to find the cause of high blood pressure.

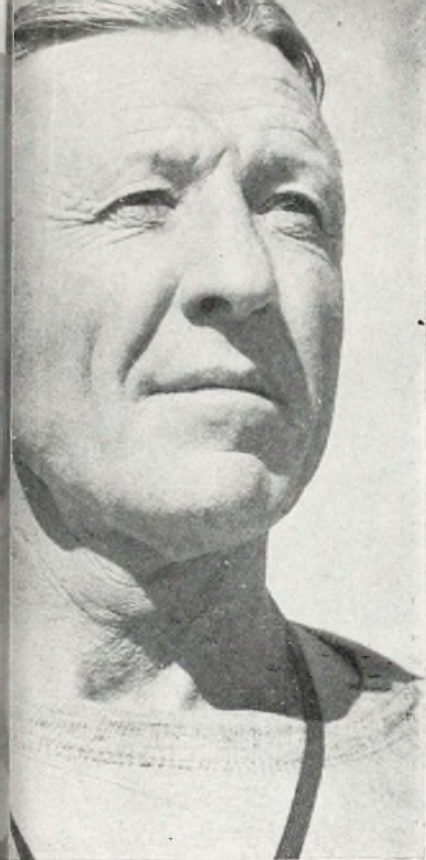

Brundage in Print

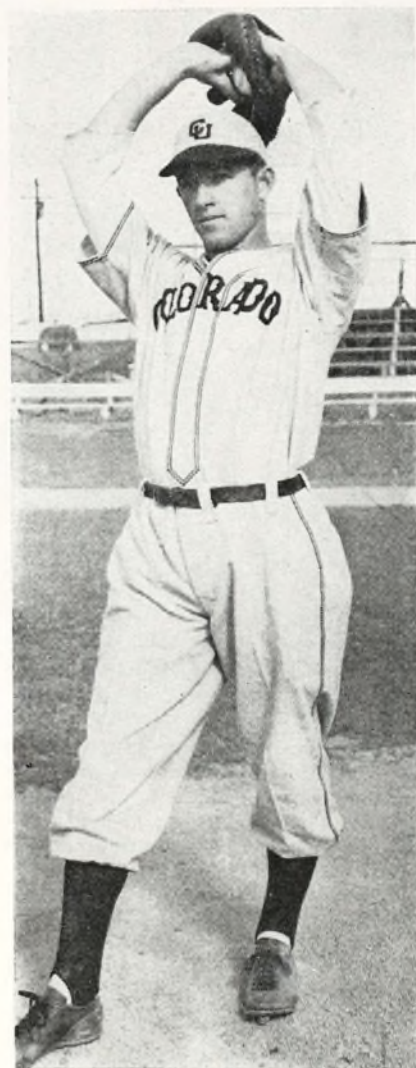
● Two popular magazines recently featured Avery Brundage, III. B '09, chairman of the U. S. Olympic Committee, president of the U. S. S. *LIFE Magazine*, June 14, 1948, carried a "close-up" and long article on Brundage's life, making this reference: "Self-made millionaire and heel-and-toe champion, he is the irascible high priest of amateurism in sports." The article by Roger Butterfield started thus: "On Thursday, July 29, 1948—barring an unpredictable accident or international calamity—the U. S. Olympic team will parade into the Empire Stadium at Wembley, England, preceded by a shield-carrier, a flag-bearer and a thick-shouldered, flat-stomached millionaire building contractor from Chicago named Avery Brundage. Brundage will not compete in the Olympic Games himself, but he will be the most important American present. *Saturday Evening POST* also carried a long article entitled "Bogeyman of Sport," by Pete Martin in the June 12 issue. The headlines read: "Avery Brundage, arbiter of athletic purity, has been called everything from a 'sanctimonious snob' to a 'professional snoop.' Did he really crack down on Canada's Barbara Ann Scott? And what is the truth about his historic banishment of Eleanor Holm?"

First-Year Man

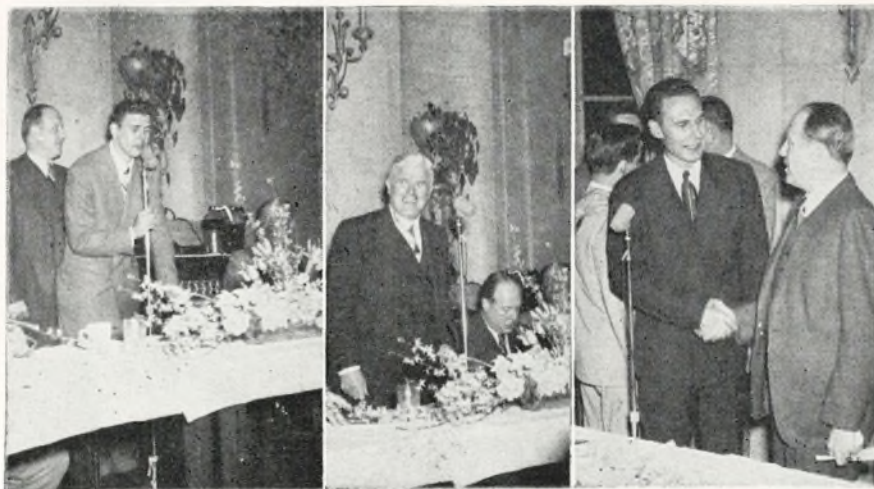

That 50-Year Feeling

One of the features of Founders Day for 1948 was the awarding of 50-year membership certificates to "oldtimers" thruout the country by Chapters and Alumni Associations. Members being thus honored for holding memberships for 50 years or more, responded in various ways. An interesting one came out of the ceremony at the Founders Day banquet of the Chicago Alumni Association, March 4. The award went to Allen S. Pearl, *Ohio O* '94, charter member of Ohio Theta at Ohio State University and long-time secretary of the Delta-Star Electric Company in Chicago. Mr. Pearl responded in part:

"Having the honor of being presented with a special 'shingle' was something I had not dreamed of until the receipt of the invitations of President Parks and Secretary Lundquist to be present at this Founders Day banquet. I can assure you it is accepted with great pleasure, humility, and curiosity, knowing that the 'paddle' had been obsolete. Perhaps I can best tell you what worshipping at the Shrine of Minerva means to me, by recalling events of the year 1892 when a group of undergraduates at Ohio State University were approached by a visitation officer to organize a Chapter there. The idea appealed to us and we soon had 14 founders of Ohio Theta. On June 6, 1892, William McKinley was initiated into Ohio Sigma Chapter of Mt. Union College at the Governor's office at the state capitol. That evening at the Chittenden Hotel in Columbus, the 14 charter members of Ohio Theta were initiated. Governor McKinley was there and greeted each one of us with a cordial handshake. He had in his buttonhole, a carnation such as he habitually wore and that flower became the university flower.

"You can imagine the pride and enjoyment we took in being in such close association with such a distinguished man and how it resold us on being brothers in ΣAE. It also gave us a better standing among other fraternities at the university and was a good argument in securing pledges. We soon had a house rented on Neil Avenue and this gave us some further standing.

"As time went on we were anxious to have one of our number elected president of our class as another increase in our standing. As usual, there was much jealousy among fraternities so that no fraternity, especially a newcomer, could easily elect one of its members. We reasoned that a student who was not a member of a fraternity would have a much better chance of election. Our problem, in a very small way, was the same as that of the two great national political parties. Namely, to get the man nominated who could probably be elected. We had a man secretly pledged who was very popular. In due time he was nominated and elected. Then after an appropriate time, he was initiated into our Chapter. His name is George S. Marshall. He was afterward admitted to the bar and is still practising law in Columbus. The lesson in politics may have helped him later to be elected Mayor.

"In 1942, we six surviving founder members were invited to Ohio State by the 55 Chapter members to a celebration of the 50th Anniversary of the Chapter. Lieutenant General Ford, then retired, was the guest speaker at the banquet. Among other things, he told of several visits Brother Zurfluh made to him 50 years before to induce him to join and finally was successful.

"We have for years kept up a round robin letter that circulates once a year among us founders. When my turn comes to write again, I will have a fine tale to tell them of this delightful occasion.

"A few years ago I was a member of a board of nine trustees of the First Congregational Church of Oak Park. Two other ΣAEs were also trustees, A. Boyd Pixley of Pixley & Ehlers. And by the way, if you have never eaten any of Boyd's doughnuts, you have missed something. The other was G. B. Hattersley now heading the Eastern Division of Sears, Roebuck with headquarters at Philadelphia. We elected 'Hat' chairman and needless to say, the church ended the year with a balanced budget and several thousand dollars surplus.

"Finally, a young G.I. undergraduate in a speech at the 1947 Convention tells what the Fraternity means to me better than I can. I quote from J. E. Barry of Oklahoma Kappa.

"At a Founders Day banquet an elderly and revered alumnus of my Chapter used, as the topic on which to speak, a poem; a jingle of four lines, rather juvenile in construction, if not corny. The lines went something like this:

In Eighteen Hundred and fifty-six
Noble Leslie De Votie did fix
Upon a plan
To better man'

"Here, simply stated, was what seemed to me the very essence of the Fraternity, for if there is any organization in the world today, the existence of which is justified—more than that, vitally needed—it is an organization that provides a plan for a better man; whether it be the Church, the United Nations, or the Red Cross, or the ΣAE Fraternity. If a better organization can present a plan, can give as its reason for existence the betterment of man; then in that, the Fraternity finds its justification, its life, its reason for being.

"That is why I, speaking for the undergraduates, can say proudly tonight that we are glad to be ΣAEs."

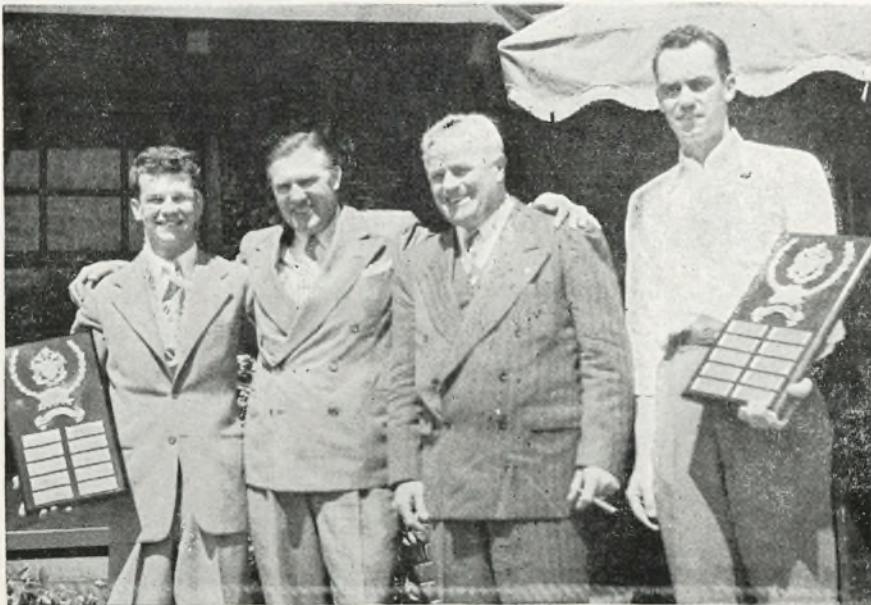

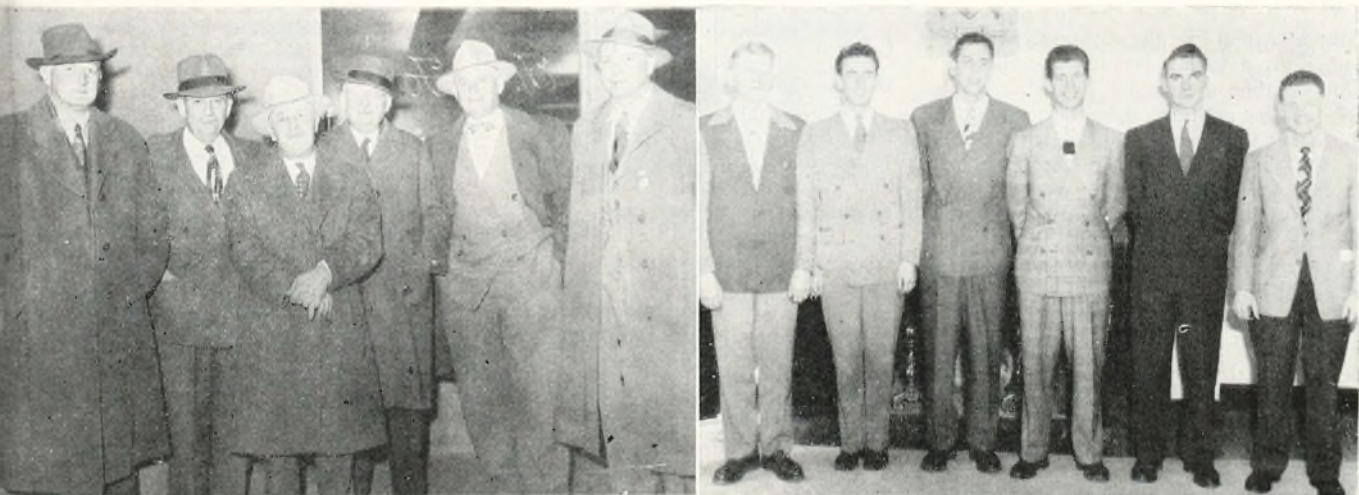

Editor Killed in Crash

Generous Benefactors

Durham; John Motley Morehead, '91, Rye, N.Y.; William Rand Kenan, Jr., '94, Lockport, N.Y. To contemporaries in college they were known as "John" Hill of Faison, "Mot" Morehead of Spray, and "Billy" Kenan of Wilmington. All three are natives of North Carolina, although two now reside elsewhere. Each man over the years has maintained close family, social and business relationships in North Carolina. Particularly have they continued intimate associations with the University since student days more than 50 years ago.

The picture was taken in Chapel Hill on November 28 at the time the University gave a dinner honoring Mr. Morehead on the eve of the laying of the cornerstone of the Morehead Building.

In addition to the planetarium and gallery, other Morehead benefactions to the

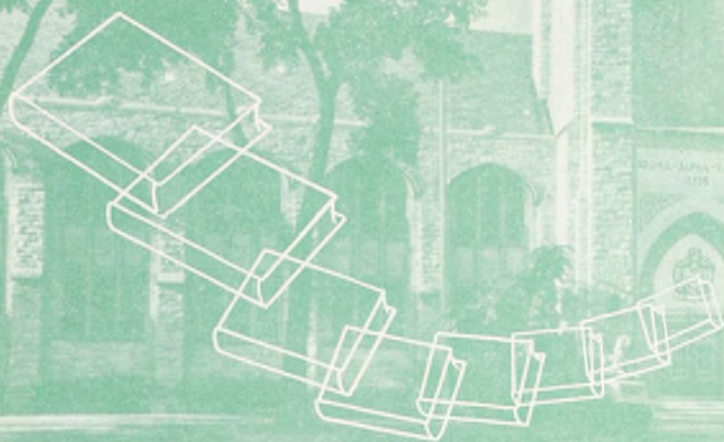
University include the Morehead-Patterson Bell Tower in which Mr. Morehead was joined in 1931 by the late Rufus L. Patterson '93.

Mr. Kenan's gift of Kenan Stadium in 1927 provided the University with one of its most widely known exhibits of alumni generosity. Other interests of Mr. Kenan which have received his generous support at Chapel Hill include the chemistry department library and the Kenan Foundation, established by the will of Mr. Kenan's sister.

Mr. Hill's benefactions at the University likewise are widely known. They include his long support of the University Library, particularly the North Carolina Room and Collection; the Carolina Inn, the auditorium and pipe organ of Hill Hall, and recently, the gift of valuable real estate in downtown Chapel Hill.

NEW BOOKS in Temple Library

THE GREAT REHEARSAL—The following review of *The Great Rehearsal* (Viking) by Carl Van Doren, Ill. B '07, was written by Orville Prescott for the column "Books of the Times" which appeared in *The New York Times*. Permission for the reprint of this review was obtained from Mr. Prescott after many reviews on this popular book had been considered.

The summer of 1787 was the hottest in many years. For four months, with the exceptions of Sundays and a ten-day adjournment, a small group of men dressed in the stiff, formal clothes of the period gathered for five to ten hours a day in the State House in Philadelphia. There they argued and debated, compromised and denounced, persuaded and orated, while sentries paraded outside to make sure that their deliberations were kept secret. Probably no single gathering of men ever assembled in world history has contained a higher proportion of individuals of outstanding integrity and intellectual capacity, for the hot, tired men of 1787 were the framers of the Constitution of the United States.

How they produced that momentous document is the subject of Carl Van Doren's scholarly and educational *The Great Rehearsal*. Mr. Van Doren is an authority on the American colonial period, author of a notable biography of Benjamin Franklin and many other works. He is a marvelous researcher, judicious and objective in appraisal, orderly in presentation; but he is never a facile and rarely an entertaining writer. His manner is generally dry and heavy; his matter is often abstract and tedious.

In *The Great Rehearsal* he has written a worthy book rather than an engrossing one, a useful book rather than a novel or provocative one. He calls it a story of "arguments in action," which is a precisely accurate description, for he has summarized or quoted extensively from the arguments which accompanied every resolution which came before the Constitutional Convention. For the most part he has had to depend on Madison's notes; but he has

supplemented these with all the other evidence there is, scanty at best.

Although there were many points about which the delegates were at odds, much the most difficult was that of the sovereignty of the separate states. Small states like Delaware were determined that they would not be "swallowed up" by big states like Virginia. The matter, of course, was finally compromised by proportional representation in the House of Representatives and equal representation in the Senate. Mr. Van Doren by his very title stresses that similar compromises, similar willingness to give up some cherished ideas in order to achieve an imperfect but desirable union, are essential to the United Nations and are the hope of mankind. The Constitutional Convention could be a rehearsal for an even more epochal and statesmanlike compromise.

Mr. Van Doren has not belabored his historical parallel in his text, but he has emphasized it in a preface. "In 1787 the problem was how the people could learn to think nationally, not locally, about the United States. In 1948 the problem is how the people can learn to think internationally, not nationally, about the United Nations. * * * It is obvious that no difficulty in the way of world government can match the danger of a world without it."

But all appeals to the example of 1787 are inclined to overlook the elementary fact that the thirteen original states shared a common heritage of recent allegiance to one central authority, of language, religion, political experience and even of moral concepts. They all were affiliated parts of the same civilization. None of these factors, which smoothed the way for the American union, is common to such nations as China, Russia, Pakistan, the United States and Ethiopia.

The two greatest men at the convention, Mr. Van Doren believes, were Washington and Franklin. He quotes a number of Franklin's humorous, tolerant, practical remarks which did much to pour oil on troubled waters. He quotes several of Washington's also, which show that, al-

though he took no part in formulating political concepts, Washington's grandeur of character was a force of great influence. "If to please the people," Gouverneur Morris quoted Washington as saying, "we offer what we ourselves disapprove, how can we afterwards defend our work? Let us raise a standard to which the wise and honest can repair. The event is in the hand of God."

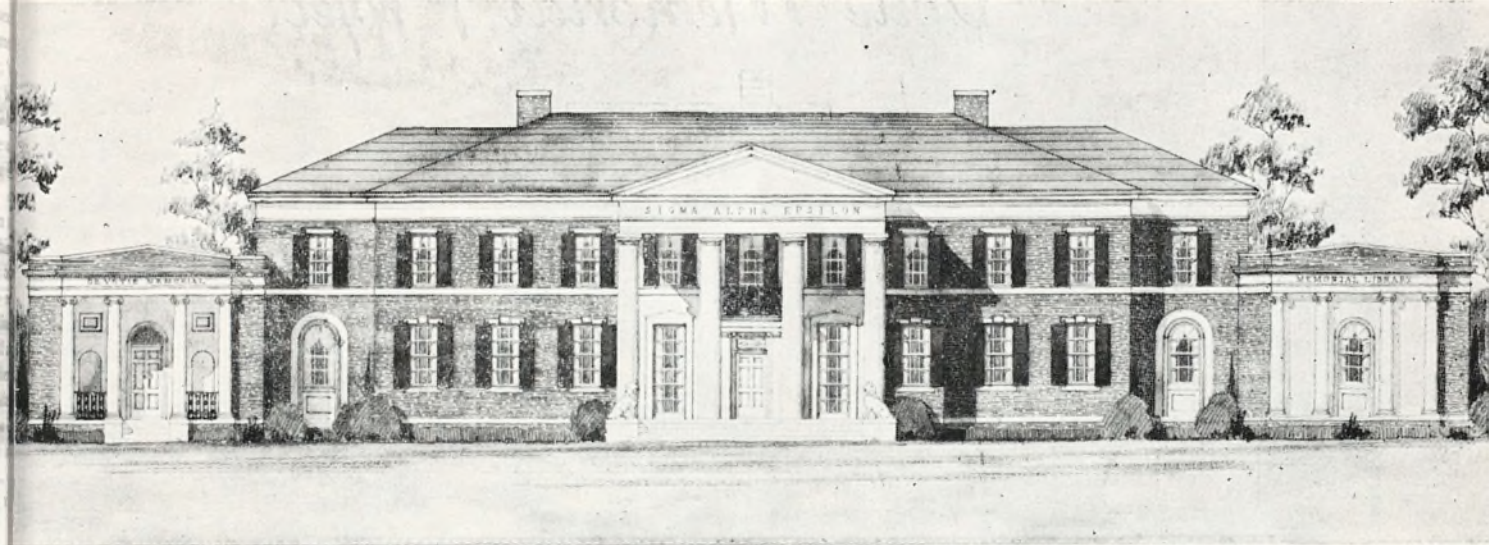
After the Constitution was drawn up Washington wrote to Bushrod Washington: "The warmest friends and the best supporters the Constitution has do not contend that it is free from imperfection; but they found them unavoidable and a sensible; if evil is likely to arise therefrom, the remedy must come hereafter. For in the present moment it is not to be obtained. * * * I do not think we are more inspired, have more wisdom, or possess more virtue than those who will come after us."

In addition to recording the history of the convention in almost excessive detail Mr. Van Doren has described the events which took place at the ratifying conventions of the various states. The sharp politics and eloquent oratory which marked those occasions, particularly the New York and Virginia conventions, make them in many ways more dramatic than the original deliberations. Even more picturesque were the spectacular parades with which ratification was celebrated in many cities.

The Great Rehearsal is enriched as a work of reference by a copious appendix which includes the texts of the Articles of Confederation, of the "Virginia Plan" and the "New Jersey Plan" of the Constitution itself and of the amendments.

THE BABE RUTH STORY—International News Service Columnist Bob Considine, W.C. P '33, comes along with another important book and this time about a real important guy, none other than Babe Ruth. *The Babe Ruth Story* (P. Dutton & Company, Inc.) by Babe Ruth as told to Considine is the famous baseball player's "only authorized story." This book with 49 interesting photographs Babe Ruth tells about his unhappy childhood with frankness and indicated good fortune in his relation with Brother Matthias, C.F.X. of St. Mary's Industrial School. It is a straight-from-the-shoulder tale of a person who starts out as a "bad kid" and finds the right track to success. The autographed copy of *The Babe Ruth Story* has been added to Temple's collection of books, *Thirty Seconds Over Tokyo*, *General Washington's Story*, *MacArthur the Magnificent* and *Where's Sammy?* Babe picked a good man to write his story. Considine has known him since 1933 at which time the author started covering big league baseball for the *Washington Herald*. Babe pitched the first big league game Considine ever saw—during the summer of 1918. Considine, a war correspondent for INS, now writes a mixed news and sports column named "On the Line" for that service.

Calif. Epsilon Plans House

● California Epsilon at Occidental College in Los Angeles has been busy for the past several months planning a new Chapter house, according to details learned from Lucien W. Shaw, Calif. E '30, chairman of the Building Committee.

When members returned from World War II, they had no home and found it necessary to purchase a residence near the campus. This house served its purpose well but has not been adequate. Thus, a well-planned program for early construction has been underway. Committee workers are Paul McKalip, Calif. E '33; Earl Murphy, Calif. E '39; Harmon Northrup Swanson, Calif. E '45, and Don Swett and Howard Annin of the Chapter. In addition, Messrs. E. R. Chilcott and Francis Lawson, parents of active members, have participated most helpfully in the committee's planning work.

Plans for the house were prepared by John C. Austin, Calif. E '33, a leading architect in Los Angeles who designed the Los Angeles City Hall and the Griffith

Planetarium. A site adjacent to the Occidental campus has been selected.

A large portion of the funds necessary for the new house are in sight and a well-organized program for raising the balance has been worked out. It is hoped that within a short time a new house, worthy of ΣΑΕ, will be constructed. California Epsilon was established at Occidental in 1931.

Iowa Delta to Aid Student

● Iowa Delta Chapter hopes by next month to greet the first of a succession of students from Germany, each of whom the Chapter will sponsor thru a year's study each at Drake University.

The active Chapter, 70 percent of whom are veterans, is convinced that life on the fraternity level at an American university will afford these lads hope for a good future in a world where the welfare of the individual is the first consideration.

German schoolboys, the members reason, have been crushed intellectually and psychologically by education slanted toward Nazi doctrines. The free, liberal attitude of American schools should therefore send these boys home after a year as super salesmen for democracy.

A letter from Tom Wright, Iowa Δ '48, to each Chapter of ΣΑΕ and to all National Officers and Province Archons recently urged the adoption of the plan on a fraternity-wide basis. "The idea deserves the complete support of the entire fraternity," Brother Wright said.

"Such a plan, adopted by the entire fraternity, would be the largest-scale attempt since the war's end to educate victims of the Nazi philosophy. It would place ΣΑΕ first on the list of private organizations to carry freedom to Germany by practical means inside this country, where lessons in democracy are really learned."

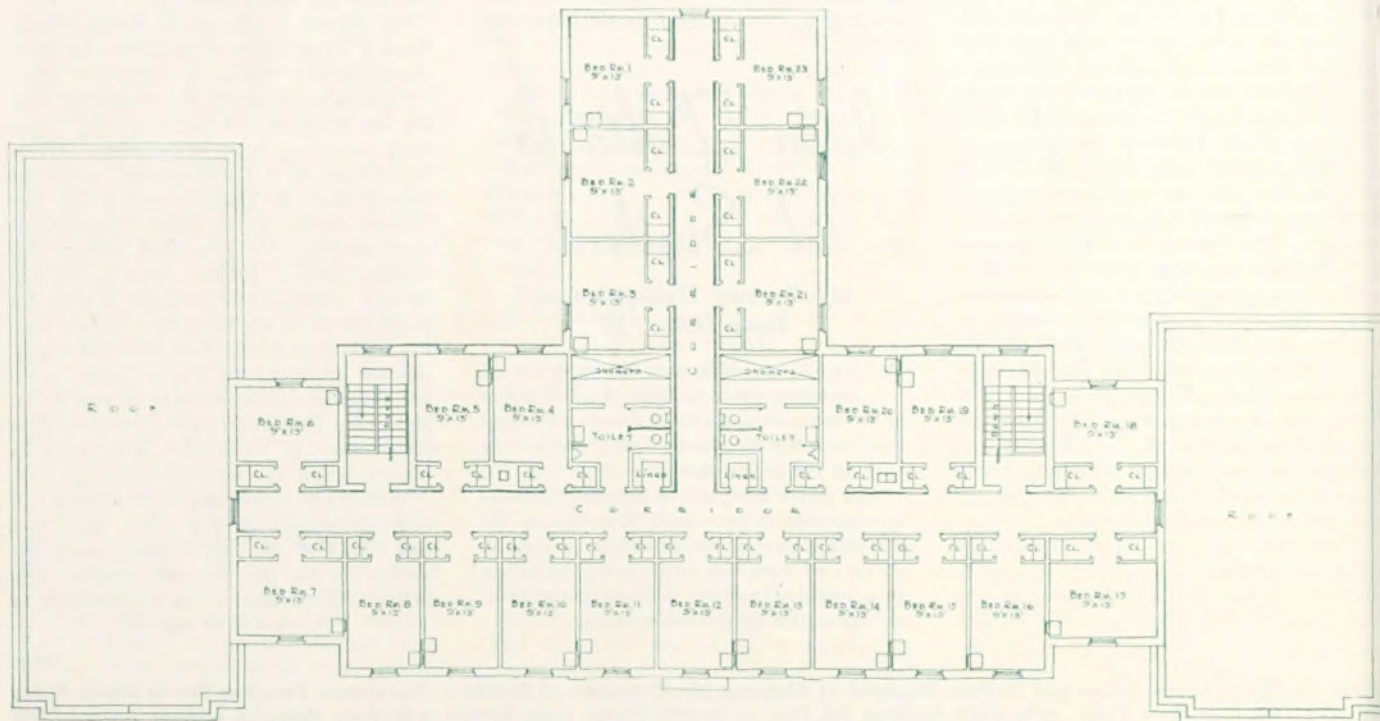
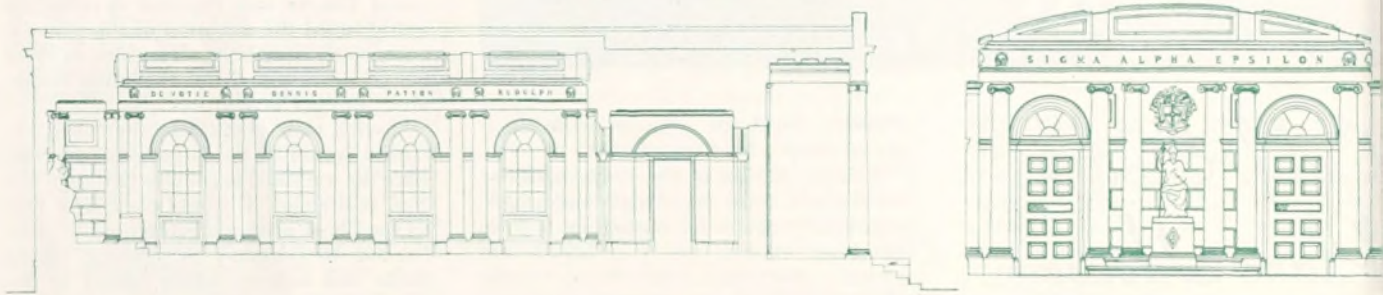
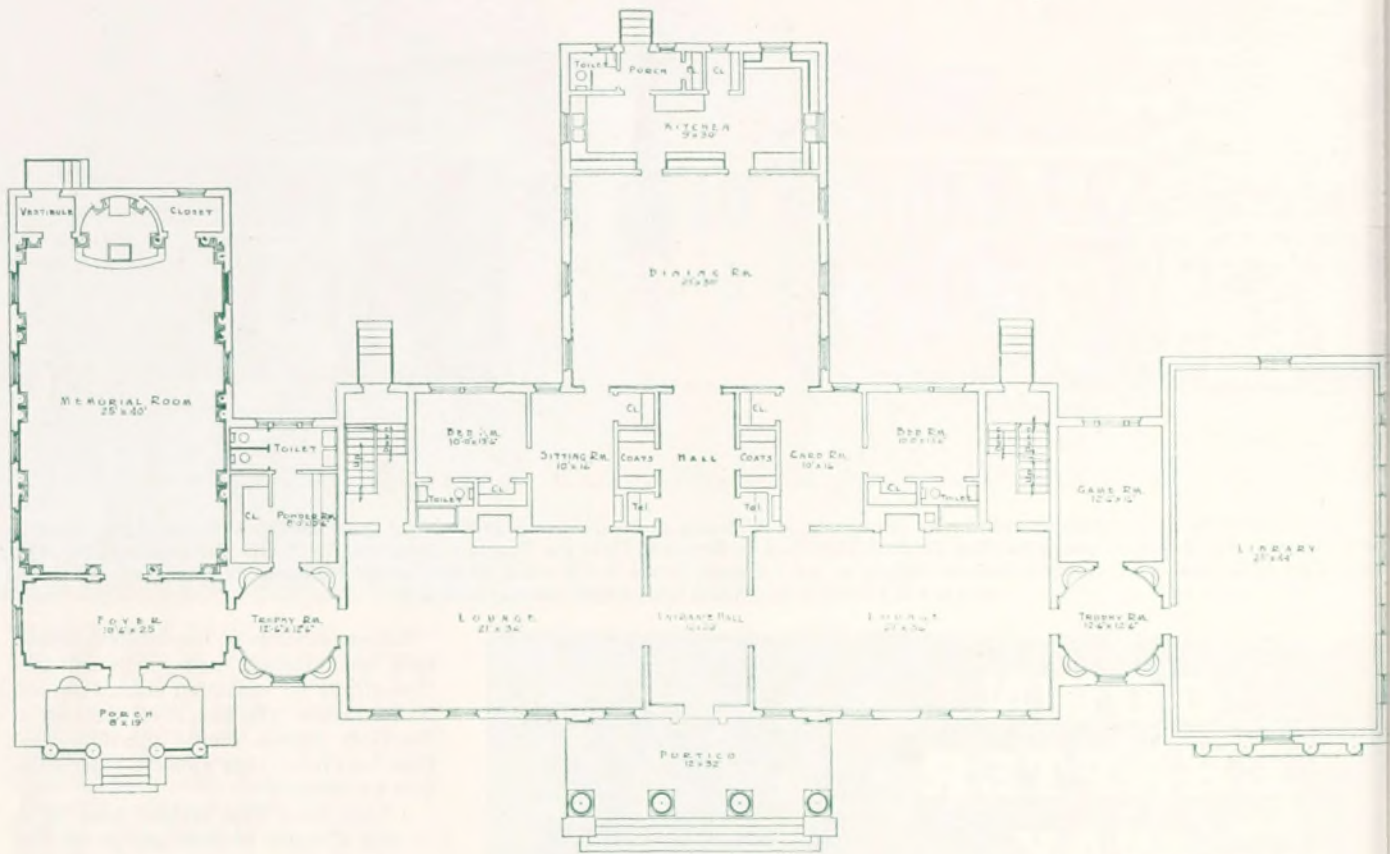
An address by Charles F. Wennerstrum, Iowa Δ '14, at the Iowa Founders Day banquet this year detailed observations made by the Iowa Supreme Court Justice during his term on the bench at the Nurnberg war crimes trials in Germany. During the course of a "bull session" after the speech, Ray R. Lamb, Iowa Δ '26, Des Moines osteopath, suggested "importing" German boys for education within this country. Walter Johann, Iowa Δ '49, and Wright subsequently outlined a plan for presentation to the Chapter at Drake during its next meeting. The plan was unanimously approved by the Chapter in an enthusiastic session and was carried by an eight-man delegation to the Province Zeta Convention in Vermillion, S.D., later in March—where the idea was also approved.

Within two weeks after local alumni had been informed of the plan, they had donated \$500 to pay transportation expenses for the first German student. The active Chapter then voted unanimously to

"Your project is a most welcome plan," he wrote.

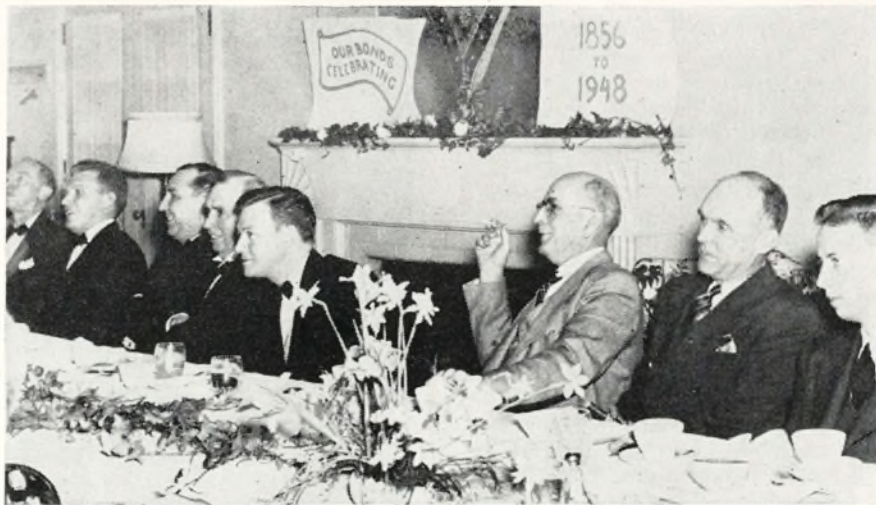
Roy L. Miller, Iowa Δ '27, Province Zeta Archon, lent his support in joining William K. Nieman, Mich. I-B '17, in administering the plan. Mr. Nieman is an insurance man. Mr. Wright states that the project is a logical extension of the Leadership School idea. "It is another trail that ΣΑΕ will be the first to travel. I know of no other organization better disposed to carry out such a plan."

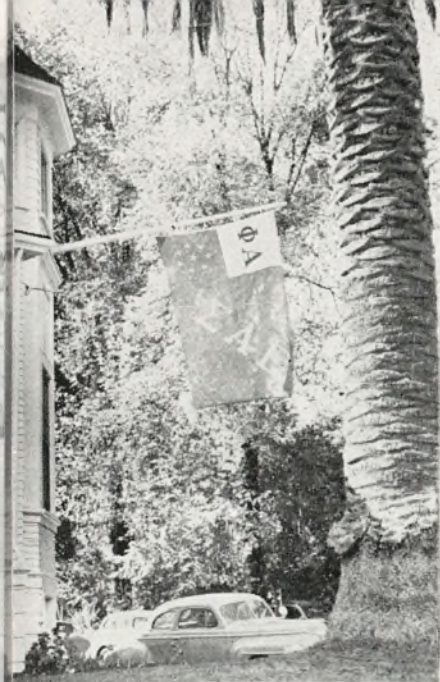

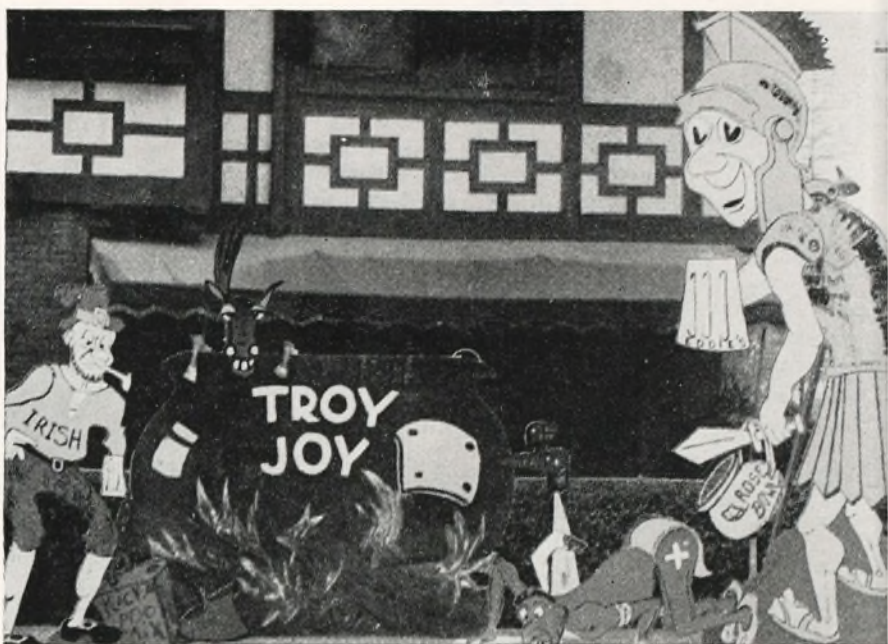

there in 1857. The plan was adopted by the board of visitors of the college a year after a faculty administration committee had made a study of student organizations. Original estimate for the structures called for the expenditure of \$110,000 but costs to date indicate that this sum will be exceeded by a considerable amount. All 11 lodges have identical floor plans, but varying exteriors. Included in the one-story buildings are an 18 by 34 foot living room with large fireplace and a high open ceiling with hand-hewn trusses; one bedroom with private bath; a ladies powder room with adjoining toilet; a kitchen, utility room housing the oil heating plant, a storage closet and a terrace. The college is furnishing the bedroom and is providing a refrigerator and electric range for the kitchen. Individual fraternities are expected to furnish the living room and ladies powder room. The lodges are arranged in a court on both sides of a winding road running thru a wooded section adjacent to the main campus. Present plans call for a rental of \$800 per year from each fraternity. Of this amount the fraternity expects to collect about \$500 from three students who will reside in the lodge, thereby reducing the rent paid by each group to \$300 per year.

Wofford Basketball Star

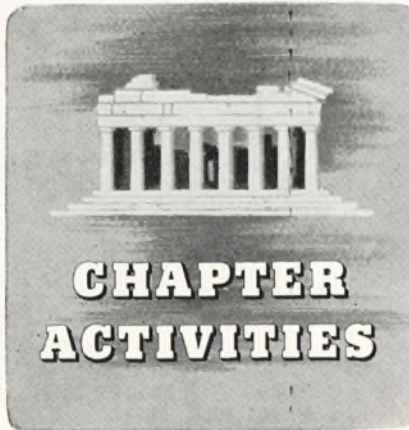

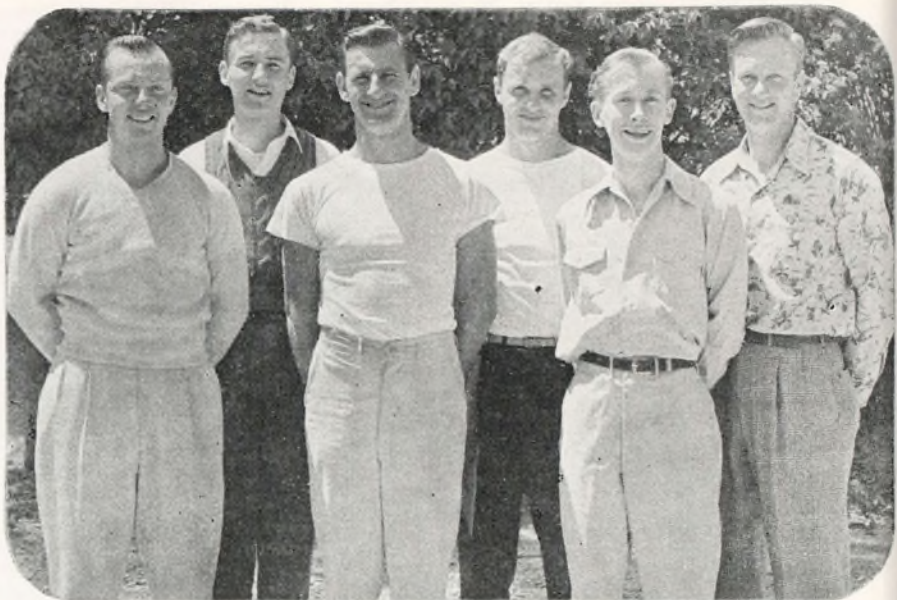

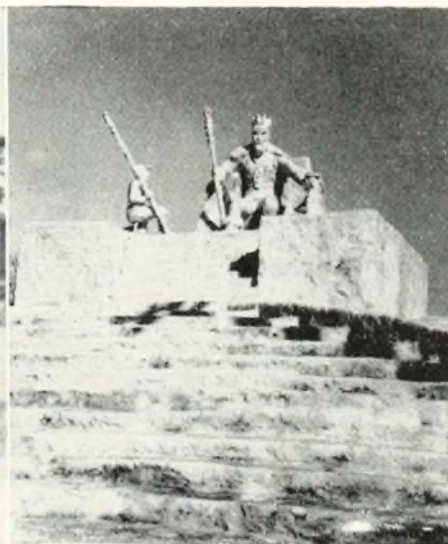

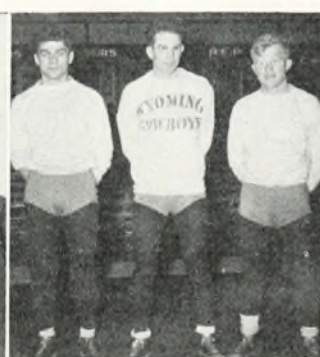

First ESA, DS Award Winner Dies

● Thomas Sumner Mell, Ga. B '78, first Eminent Supreme Archon of Sigma Alpha Epsilon, who served as the Fraternity's chief executive from November 15, 1885, to December 30, 1890, died at Athens, Ga., March 28, 1948, after a long illness, in his 89th year, and the Fraternity's 92nd anniversary month, March 9.

Born in Athens, Ga., February 1, 1859, on the campus of the University of Georgia, he was the son of the late Dr. Patrick Hughes Mell one of the early honorary initiates of Georgia Beta who was then a member of the faculty and later chancellor. He was one of five ΣΑΕ brothers, all initiates of Georgia Beta, the other four being: Dr. John D., '84; the late Charles I., '86; James C., '88; and Edward B., '93.

Due to temporary opposition to fraternities at the University of Georgia, Mr. Mell was not initiated until August, 1878, a month after his graduation, following the installation of his father as chancellor, but he immediately took an active part in the affairs of the Fraternity.

Although he was not a delegate to the Athens Convention of 1884, he was given a seat and elected as its presiding officer. When the Nashville Convention of 1885 adopted the Supreme Council system, Mr. Mell was unanimously elected Eminent Supreme Archon, although he was not present. He was unanimously re-elected by the conventions of 1886, 1887, 1888, 1889 and retired voluntarily at the close of the Cincinnati Convention, December 30, 1890, having announced previously that he would not accept re-election for another term.

Mr. Mell guided the Fraternity through one of the most critical periods of its existence during the transition from the Grand Chapter system to the Supreme Council system and transmitted it to his suc-

cessor in much stronger condition than he had found it. During his administration, the policy of northern extension which had been debated for many years was finally adopted and he issued charters to seven Chapters outside the South.

After retiring as head of the Fraternity, Mr. Mell continued to take an active interest in its affairs and attended many national conventions. He was a speaker at the 50th Anniversary Convention in Atlanta, Ga., in 1906. He was the guest of honor at the Chicago Convention of 1939 and attended the Fort Worth Convention of 1940, at both of which he was feted continuously and won the admiration and affection of all with whom he came in contact, especially the younger men from the Chapters Collegiate.

He was the first man to receive a 50-Year Membership certificate and one of the first seven selected to receive the Distinguished Service Award which was presented to him at Athens, Ga., January 7, 1948, by the Eminent Supreme Recorder with the following citation:

For outstanding service for five years as the first Eminent Supreme Archon of Sigma Alpha Epsilon. Brother Mell, selected by the 1885 Convention which adopted the Supreme Council plan, was in effect the sole administrative officer of The Fraternity and it is a tribute to his ability that the transition was successfully completed and The Fraternity embarked upon the second phase of its growth.

Mr. Mell was buried in Oconee Hill Cemetery at Athens, March 29. Cobb C. Torrance, Ga. B '21, past ESA, attended as the official representative of the Supreme Council and Alumni of Athens and members of Georgia Beta served as an escort of honor.

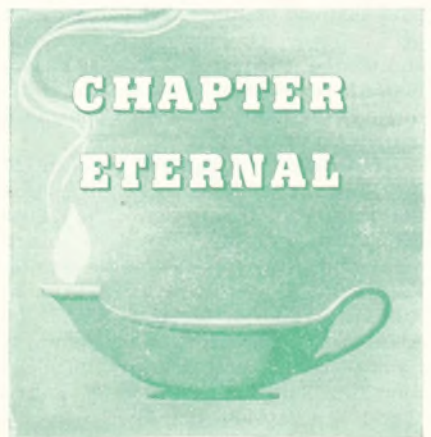
Mr. Mell practiced law at Athens from 1880 until a few months before his death. He served as mayor of Athens from 1936 to 1938, had served in the state legislature and on various civic boards and commissions. He also took a prominent

part in the affairs of the Baptist Church of which he was a member for 77 years.

He was widely known as an orator and after dinner speaker and was in great demand for addresses on patriotic occasions. At any ΣΑΕ function he attended, he commanded unusual attention and respect. With his passing, The Fraternity has lost one of its great historic figures and he will be mourned by thousands of those who knew him as a brother in the bonds. Late announcement of his death comes as a result of the May issue of THE RECORD being devoted exclusively to Gold Stars of World War II. Mr. Mell was cover man for the February issue, showing him receiving the DS Award.



RICHARD H. W. JONES

● Richard Hooker Wilmer Jones, Ala. A-M '40, was killed in a plane crash in Cuba, April 19, 1948. He was serving

as an aerial surveyor and pilot for the St. German Sugar Central. His brother is Harvey E. Jones, *Tenn. Z* '36, of Mobile, Ala. A memorial service was held at the Episcopal Church of the Ascension in Montgomery, Ala., April 25, and his Chapter at Alabama Polytechnic Institute was represented by a group including Harris M. Allen, Eminent Archon. As request his body was cremated and the ashes scattered by a Navy plane in the ocean. A service was held by the Navy at Miami, Fla.

EUGENE V. HAYNES, JR.
Georgia Beta '42

● Eugene VanValkenburg Haynes, Jr., *Ga. B* '42, lieutenant commander in the Navy Volunteer Reserve and veteran of World War II, was killed at Atlanta, Ga., March 18, 1948, when the plane he was piloting developed engine trouble and crashed into the corner of an unfinished apartment house. During the war, he served in the Pacific Theater as a fighter pilot and won the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Air Medal with three gold stars and other awards. He was initiated at the Leadership School in Evanston, August 29, 1940. After being discharged from the Navy in November, 1945, he re-entered the University of Georgia where he was again active in Georgia Beta and was graduated in January, 1947. He was a Life Member of the Chapter National.

CHARLES B. SHAEFFER
Kansas Alpha '16

● Charles Bunting Shaeffer, *Kan. A* '16, died of a heart attack induced by flu, March 24, 1948, at St. Luke's Hospital in Kansas City, Mo., at the age of 54. He was the nephew of the famous four Bunting brothers and all his life had been active in the affairs of Kansas Alpha at the University of Kansas, having served for 18 years as president of the board of trustees which built the Chapter house and conducted its financing on a sound basis.

He was prominent as a civic leader, for many years was president and general manager of the Bunting Hardware Company that had been founded and was built up by George H. Bunting, *Tenn. Z* '91, and for the past year had lived at Miami, Fla., where he went to assume the presidency of the Frank T. Budge Company, a hardware concern.

Mr. Shaeffer was national president of the University of Kansas Alumni Association in 1945-46, was director of the Kansas City Chapter of the university's alumni association, was president of the Greater Kansas City University of Kansas Alumni Association, and for five years was on the board of the national group. He was a member of the executive and financial committee for the University of Kansas World War II Memorial Association.

In World War I Mr. Shaeffer, holding a commission as an Army lieutenant and being completely familiar with the hardware trade, served with distinction and carried vast responsibilities on the Army's central purchasing board in Washington. In World War II he served as district manager of the War Production Board

from 1941 to 1945 and made a reputation for cutting redtape and getting difficult things done. His public activities included membership in the Kansas City Chamber of Commerce, Real Estate Board, the business and industry committee of the Citizen's Planning Council, the American Legion and the Sons of the Revolution.

He served on the board of directors of the Sons of the Revolution of both the Missouri and the Greater Kansas City associations. He had served as vice president of the Merchants Association and of half a dozen other public and trade institutions. Mr. Shaeffer was a member of St. Paul's Episcopal Church and for three years was commander of the "Every Member Canvass" and was twice delegate to the Western Missouri Episcopal diocese convention. He was an inordinate worker and carrier of executive and financial responsibilities for all the causes that he loved. In the Missouri-Kansas region he carried on for a second generation the work of George and Billy Bunting for Minerva's institutions.

Surviving relatives are his widow, Mrs. Willis Munger Shaeffer of Kansas City; his son, the Rev. Richard Munger Shaeffer, *Kan. A* '44, *Ariz. A*, teacher and assistant chaplain at the Virginia Episcopal School, Lynchburg, Va.; a daughter, Miss Anne Shaeffer, a junior at the University of Kansas, and his mother, Mrs. Bella Bunting Shaeffer of Kansas City.—*Harry S. FRANCIS B. SNAVELY, JR.

● Francis B. Snavely, Jr., *N.Y. A* '49, Eminent Archon of New York Alpha at Cornell University, Ithaca, died suddenly in the Cornell Infirmary, May 22, 1948. Francis collapsed on Saturday morning, May 22, and remained unconscious until his death early that afternoon. A post mortem showed the cause of death as a type of cerebral hemorrhage. He had attended every GOP conclave since the turn of the century. 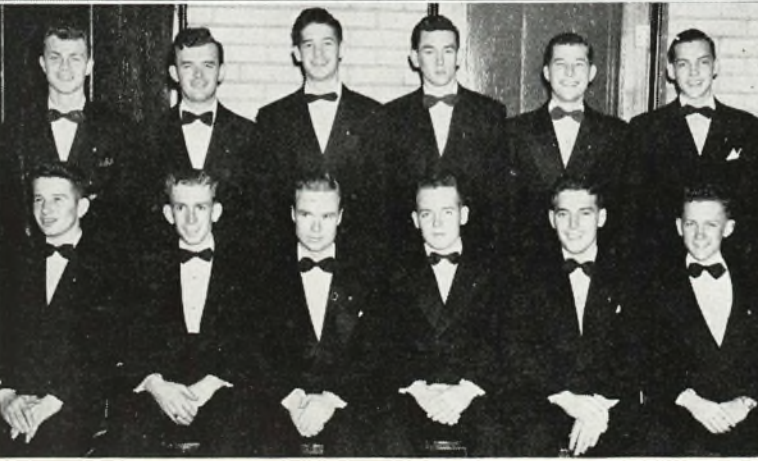

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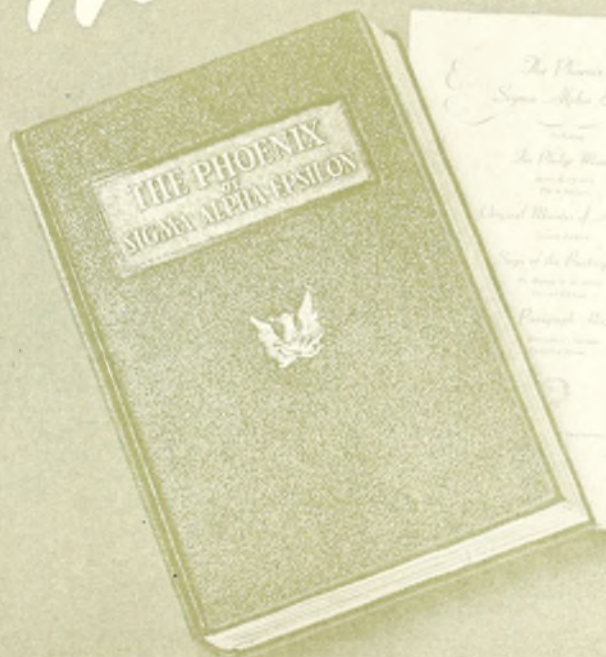
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
