California in '49

93rd Anniversary National Convention in Los Angeles, Calif. September 6-7-8-9, 1949

"California in '49" is now the slogan of SAEs thruout the land. With the announcement of convention plans by the National Officers and the California Committee, unmistakable signs of the greatest convention attendance in ΣΑΕ history is already evident. Building upon the great success of the previous Los Angeles Convention which was held at the time of the Olympics in 1932, the California Sons of Minerva promise to outdo themselves in preparing a program of the greatest interest to ΣAEs and their wives, sons and daughters.

Planned with the whole SAE family in mind, there will be a series of glamorous events in the best tradition of the Golden State. Famed for its hospitality, experienced in the role of host to all the

world and, in 1949, in the midst of a great statewide celebration of its Gold Rush Centennial, California will be at its tip-top, postwar best and on September 6-7-8-9, the Hotel Biltmore in downtown Los Angeles will become the crossroads of the fraternity world.

A series of meetings of inspirational quality and dedicated to the continued development of SAE's role in the colleges and universities of the nation will feature the more serious side of the convention. Social and recreational features of the convention will be highlighted by a wide variety of activities designed to offer some of the best of California's famed scenic beauty and the pageantry and showmanship of the State's Centennials celebration.

In announcing these plans and in naming committee chairmen who will have the responsibility of the myriad details, Chairman John F. S. D'Aule, *Mass.* B-Y '10, stated that he confidently expects this to be the greatest convention of its kind ever held by the Fraternity.

Δ '27, Province Kappa Deputy Archon, and Chairman D'Aule, Allen, Austin, Mitchell, Sadler, Whited and Cobb of other committees.

Plans for Ladies

The Minerva Clubs in Province Kappa will be prominent in the plans and preparations for the convention because of the special emphasis placed on the participation of SAE wives and daughters, and the many special events designed for their enjoyment. Special significance will also be attached to the role of the Chapters at the University of California at Berkeley (Beta), Stanford (Alpha), UCLA (Delta), Occidental (Epsilon), University of Southern California (Gamma), San Jose State College (Zeta), Nevada (Alpha), and Arizona (Alpha), a total of eight Chapters in the Province. In anticipation of greatly increased interest thruout the area, a number of new Alumni Associations are being formed and they are expected to join

with existing associations for the discharge of responsible assignments. There are now more than 3,600 members of the Fraternity residing in California and an additional 248 in Arizona and 277 in Nevada.

So plan now, members thruout the realm, to follow the trails of the Argonauts of 100 years ago, that you, too, may find in California in '49 a real bonanza of enduring rewards—in fun, friendship and inspiration thru the teachings of Sigma Alpha Epsilon. Details of the convention program will appear in the next issue of The Record. Tentative plans are being made for the 15th Annual Leadership School to be held on the campus of the University of Southern California just prior to the convention rather than

at its customary location, the Levere Memorial Temple in Evanston, Ill., for 14 years.

Add 2 Founders, 26 Life Members

Two Founders of The Levere Memorial Foundation and of the Chapter National of Sigma Alpha Epsilon and 26 Life Members have been added since June 10 when the list which appeared in the August issue of The Record was compiled, thus bringing the total as of October 1, 1948, to 77 Founders and 4,343 Life Members. The two new Founders are:

Payment of \$795 to complete the \$1,000 for the Founders membership for Dr. Brown was made by Province Beta, payments of \$50 for a Life Membership by Dr. Brown himself, of \$115 by individual members of the Fraternity and of \$40 by Pennsylvania Theta having been previously made.

All sums contributed for Founders or Life Memberships are permanently invested in the Levere Memorial Temple Sustaining Fund when checks are drawn in favor of The Levere Memorial Foundation and in the National Endowment Fund when checks are drawn in favor of Sigma Alpha Epsilon. The investments yield a constantly increasing income which helps to pay the operating expenses of the Fraternity which continue to mount as the alumni list grows. Donations to the Foundation are deductible from personal income tax returns but donations to the Fraternity are not so deductible.

Investments for the Sustaining Fund are made by the Trustees of The Levere Memorial Foundation on the advice of the Advisory Council, consisting of five alumni living in the vicinity of Chicago, while investments for the National Endowment Fund are made by the National Board of Trustees, consisting of five alumni, living in the vicinity of New York.

Members who pay the annual \$3.00 Chapter National dues are given a credit of \$2.50 on a Life Membership for each such payment and may become Life Members by paying the outstanding balances at

Big Brother Movement Features 14th School

Sigma Alpha Epsilon's 1948 Leadership Training School was not only the largest since its birth in 1935 but also it instigated a program which probably will influence the entire realm of the Fraternity for years to come.

The 14th Annual Leadership School attracted a capacity crowd beyond the 1947 School with 380 members in attendance, including 350 active Chapter members representing 114 of the 119 Chapters and 30 National and Province officers, faculty members and visitors. Last year the School had 344 members and represented

110 Chapters.

Prior to the 14th School held at the Levere Memorial Temple, shrine of ΣAE in Evanston, Ill., Sunday, August 29, thru Friday, September 3, the annual joint meeting of the Supreme Council and Province Archons was held, August 26-27-28, and features of the meeting included the presentation of a Merit Key thru The Alumni Program to Park W. Stickney, N.H. A '08, member of the Levere Memorial Temple Building Committee and the election of Vallee O. Appel, Ill. Θ '11, to the Advisory Council of the Levere Memorial Foundation.

Theme of the 14th Leadership School was "The Big Brother Program of Province Kappa" introduced at the School on Tuesday afternoon, August 31, by Dr. George H. Kress, *Ohio* E '96, honorary Eminent Supreme Archon, of Los Angeles, Calif. He was introduced by Dr. Chester D. Lee, *Iowa* T '27, ESH, and chairman of The Alumni Program, after an announcement was made that 11 chapter members were "repeaters," having attended previous schools: They were Merlyn Jones of *Utah* Y; Bill Williams of Pa. Program Supported

Honorary ESA Kress stated that "The Big Brother Program," introduced at the 1948 Province Kappa Convention in Los Angeles, was proposed to stimulate active Chapter-alumni relations and to "fill the great gap" in fraternity relations after a member leaves school and finds his place among active alumni. "The movement is putting into practice for alumni what has been transpiring in the Chapters for years," Dr. Kress commented. "The object of the movement is to interest an active Chapter man in an alumnus, as a 'Big Brother,' and the alumni to be interested in the Chapter members. Judge Alfred K. Nippert, Ohio E '94, past ESA, supported the program by enthusiastically stating that the Fraternity was at the threshold of a new era thru this plan and that Dr. Kress had presented the greatest idea and the most far-reaching since the origin of the Leadership School.

The program was further supported by Edward G. Hathcock, *Calif.* Δ '30, ESCh., and a strong member of The Alumni Program. He commented: "'The Big Brother Movement' will be of great significance, as it

only takes two persons to make a fraternity." Literature on the program has been presented to the active Chapters and Alumni Associations. Other details will appear in the February, 1949, issue in a special article.

Moseley Started Plan

The 14th Leadership School got under way Sunday, August 29, under the direction of its originator, Dr. John O. Moseley, Okla. K '16, Calif. A, past ESA and president of the University of Nevada in Reno. The ever-busy Dr. Moseley had arrived in Evanston the week before to give a series of talks at the silver anniversary session of the National Institute for Trade and Commercial Organization Executives on the Northwestern University campus. It is interesting to note that Dr. Moseley used as his theme, "The Big Brother in Fraternity," at his 3rd Leadership School. At that time a special effort was made to bring Chapter Advisers and alumni workers to the School. Thus the program presented by Honorary ESA Kress was an enlargement on the "Big Brother" idea created by Past ESA Moseley.

Rev. Erskine M. Jeffords, N.Y. Δ '18, Σ AE chaplain, gave a sermon for early arrivals in the Chapel of the Levere Memorial Temple on Sunday morning. Registration took place at Willard Hall on the Northwestern University campus. Registration of delegates was handled by Mrs. Florence Bertalot, keeper of records, in charge, and Miss Grace Johnson, cashier; Miss Ruth O'Malley, secretary to Lauren Foreman, Ga. E '01, ESR; Miss Edna Anderson, Mrs. Eva Hansen, Miss Janet Nilles, Miss Ruth Tharpe and Miss Leta Kling.

An informal lunch was held at Cooley's Cupboard followed by motion pictures by G. A. Ginter, *Ohio* E '97, ESA, and Dr. Burton A. Hoffman, *Ill.* Ψ - Ω '26, past Archon of Province Beta. When the buffet hour at the Temple arrived Sunday evening, more than 300 Chapter members had registered and 370 members and alumni attended the supper. Welcoming the guests were members of the Supreme Council, Province Archons, faculty members and Past ESAs Charles F. Collins, *Mass.* B-Y '12, O. K. Quivey, *Ind.* B '12, and Dr. Fred H. Turner, *Ill.* B '22. Songs during the buffet supper were supported by Mr. Harold Anderson and his Hammond organ.

Following the buffet supper the Chapter members gathered in the Chapel and received the address of welcome from ESA Ginter. An impressive talk on the songs of SAE was given by Past ESA Quivey, who introduced the new songbook (1948 edition, first since 1929). Songs were directed by last year's leader, William Fawcett, *Ind.* B '44, associate editor of the songbook, and assisted by Roger Markle, *Mich.* I-B '49. That night first meetings of committees and activity groups were held.

When the School officially opened on Monday morning, August 30, the Panhellenic Room of the Temple was filled beyond capacity and the official roll was called by ESR Foreman, assisted by Miss O'Malley. Director Moseley stated that the delegation from the Chapters was the best-appearing group ever to attend a Leader-




Left. "Bill," the House Man, Raised the American and Phi Alpha Flags Daily during the Leadership School.



ship School, and due to crowded conditions, each delegate should bear with the situation. "Altho a certain amount of regimentation is necessary under the circumstances, there would be no jeopardy on personalities," Director Moseley commented.

Following an introductory talk by Director Moseley, the delegates met in the Chapel to get impressions on the beauties of the Ritual, with the badge and crest of The Fraternity in the background of the Chapel. Prayers were offered by four Chapter delegates and the new "Sweetheart Song" was sung by members of Iowa Delta.

After lunch at Willard Hall on the Northwestern campus, where the delegates were housed, the group heard John Baugh, Okla. M '35, assistant Chapter Supervisor in the Chapel on the subject, "Chapter Reports and Paper Work." This was followed by a talk on "Publicity and Public Relations," by Don Gable, Ohio Δ '35, Ill. Ψ - Ω , editor of THE RECORD, who was introduced by Prof. Emmett B. Moore, Mont. A '24, ESDA, and who was introduced by Director Moseley as the assistant Director of Leadership Training. This was followed by a paper presented by Tom Wright, Iowa A '48, on the "Iowa Delta Foreign Student Aid Program." Wright was introduced by Roy L. Miller, *Iowa* Δ '27, Archon of Province Zeta. During the course of Monday's activities, Past ESA Quivey was busy in the library, autographing his "best-seller," the new songbook for Chapter delegates. The afternoon's work was completed with committee meetings on initiation arranged by Fairbairn Gilkeson, N.Y. A '14, honorary Archon of Province Beta, and rehearsal of the Leadership School chorus directed by Song Leader Fawcett.

Sectional Sessions

Following dinner at Willard Hall, delegates returned to the Temple for the first of a series of sectional conferences. Chapter Finances were discussed by Albert J. These meetings were held in the various rooms of the Temple, and gave the delegates and visitors a chance to air their views on various problems and compare methods among the Chapters.

The second morning session, Tuesday, August 31, brought more organization to the large School and sectional conferences were again held thru-out the building. Later the delegates gathered in the Chapel to hear Director Moseley speak on "The Dream of Noble Leslie Devotie." The Chapel meeting started with sentence prayers by Chapter members, followed by a poem, "Born of the Sun," by Moseley. Following the presentation of "The Big Brother Program" by Honorary ESA Kress in the afternoon, the third of the series of sectional conferences was held during the evening.

On Wednesday ESR Foreman gave a talk on "The History of SAE" in the Chapel. This was followed by photographs in the Court of the Archons of the Temple. Director Moseley took the delegation back to the Chapel for "Some Marks of Fraternity Leadership." Following lunch, a conference on



A side feature of the School on Thursday was the participation of members at the luncheon meeting of the Evanston Rotary Club. Serving on the program were ESR Foreman, Director Moseley, Glen T. Nygreen, Wash. A '39, Province Lambda Archon, and Chapter representatives, Bill Williams, Pa. @, Drew Minteer, N.M. T, Merlyn Jones, Utah Y and Gene LaFitte, La. E.




Past ESA Quivey, Author of the New Song Book, Autographed Hundreds of Copies for Delegates in the Temple Library.

Nippert was introduced by Director Moscley and referred to as a "14 Striper," having attended all of the Leadership Schools.

Mr. Nippert paid tribute to both Moseley and Foreman, respectively, on the Leadership School and the condition of the Temple. He also introduced Arthur H. Knox, Ill. Ψ - Ω '02, architect of the Temple and a member of the Building Committee. Mr. Nippert spoke of the Temple embellishment work of the late Johannes Waller, Ill. Ψ-Ω '35, referring to his first project for the shrine, the mural, "Sinking of the Lady Elgin," after he had been brought from Germany, and then listed the important portraits by Artist Waller, Mr. Nippert completed his talk on the members who died in the Civil War and World War I and II. The delegates passed the hat and more than \$200 was collected with instructions to apply the money toward wire-recording equipment for the Temple.

With beautiful weather in favor of the School, the delegates then witnessed "The Founding of SAE," in the Court of the Archons by members of Tennessee Kappa in costume. The players were: Baxter Ragsdale, Jr., who took the part of the principal Founder, Noble Leslie DeVotie; Hugh Frantz Eakin as Rudulph; William E. Trickett as Kerr; Harold Lucas as Foster; Roy D. Cummins as Cockrell; Donald C. Snoddy as Patton; William F. Reeder as Dennis, and Pledge Paul Aycock as "Clem."

Following the playlet, written by Honorary ESA Kress, Director Moseley introduced Joseph C. Poulter of Iowa Beta, who in turn introduced Wally Ris of the same Chapter, 1948 Olympics Star in England who won the 100-meter free-style race and participated with the record-setting team for the 800-meter relay. Ris returned to the University of Iowa for his senior year. Among the guests at the playlet were Mrs. John O. Moseley and daughter, Margaret.

Friday afternoon the delegates boarded buses at Willard Hall for the pilgrimage to the grave of William C. Levere, $Ill. \Psi \cdot \Omega$ '98, past ESA and ESR, in Memorial Park Cemetery. The memorial service, headed by Director Moseley, was short and impressive. "Violets" was sung by the Glee Club and the

351 Attend Banquet











Archambault was defeated for the Republican nomination by Mayor Albert P. Ruerat of Warwick, who will oppose the present Democratic governor this month. Archambault polled 18,879 votes against Ruerat's 30,045. Archambault then became state chairman of a national organization of Republican Veterans for Dewey.

Seeks Supreme Court



Coach at Rugby Helm since 1917

The mention of rugby always brings to mind the name of Jim Wylie, Calif. A '17, as ever since 1917 he has been constantly at the helm of this sport. In 1917 he first served his alma mater, Stanford University, as rugby coach, but his connection with the game dates back to his early boyhood days in New Zealand, his birthplace.

During the course of his colorful career Wylie has played with nu-

merous international all-star fifteens, and while in college distinguished himself as one of the finest ruggers Stanford has ever produced. In 1911, at the age of 18, young Wylie had his first experience with big-time rugby when he played for New Zealand against the Pacific Coast All-Stars from this country.

In 1912 he went on tour with the Australian Waratah, and the following year was a member of the New Zealand All-Blacks, the world's rugby champions. He had the distinction of being the only rugger ever to represent New Zealand and Australia in consecutive years. In 1914 he was honored by being selected to play with the British ruggers in an all-star game between English and American teams.

Two years after Stanford returned to American football and rugby was maintained as a minor sport, Wylie returned as coach, a position which he has retained ever since. At the present he says there is an increased interest in the game, according to the large number of turnouts during the last season.

After learning about Mr. Wylie from The Stanford Daily, February 2, 1948, a little research in the National Office brought out the fact that rugby has been played on the Pacific Coast since 1906 and ΣΑΕ always has been prominently identified with the game. In the December, 1913, issue of THE RECORD, an article by J. A. Stroud, Jr., Calif. B '13, was entitled "Rugby in California." The article revealed that James Lanagan, Calif. A '00, coached Stanford's first rugby team and was famous as never having lost a game. Mr. Stroud stated: "On the last Stanford team that Lanagan coached in 1908, there was a freshman, Ben Erb, '12, who was destined to be one of the greatest fullbacks the Coast was ever to know. On the Stanford '10 team Jack Partridge, '12, made his letter and Ned Corbett, '12, did likewise on the '12 team. Erb was the captain of the 1911 team at Stanford.

Mr. Stroud continued: "A member of the Australian team, Danny Carrol, is noted as one of the fastest '3/4's' in the world. He decided to go to Stanford, and was of such caliber that he now wears a SAE pin. On the first California rugby team were two SAEs, George Bell, '09, and Pete Freeman, '10. Bell was elected to captain the '08 team, but had to resign on account of injuries received. He was made assistant coach and served in that capacity for a year. Freeman played for three straight years on the team. The only California SAE representative on the varsity from '09 to '12, was the author, who captained the '12,

No doubt Mr. Wylie can recall some of these names and perhaps he played against them at one time. Mr. Stroud described in his article the competition with foreign teams, referring to Vancouver, British Columbia and Australia, just about the time Wylie was with big-time rugby.

Joins the Eagles

Brothers Meet in All-Star Game

Sigma Alpha Epsilon had two members in the Annual All-Star Football Game between the College All-Stars and the Chicago Cardinals at Soldiers' Field in Chicago, Ill., August 20, 1948, and the unusual situation this year was the fact that one of the members on the College All-Stars played against his blood brother on the Cardinals' team

Members of SAE on the teams were Knox Ramsey, Va. K '48, guard from William and Mary, of the All-Stars, and Marlin ("Pat") Harder, Wis. A '44, of Wisconsin, fullback for the Chicago Cardinals. Garrard Ramsey, also a guard from William and Mary in 1942, and brother of Knox, served with the Cardinals.

Knox Ramsey completed four straight seasons at William and Mary last year and was All-South selection for three years. He had more varsity minutes' playing time than any player in William and Mary history. He blocked three punts in 1945 against Maryland.

Pat Harder of the Cardinals led the Big Nine in scoring while at Wisconsin and topped National Football league in scoring last year with 102 points. He has kicked 44 out of 45 points after touchdown since the 35 to 28 victory over the Bears in the final game of the 1946 season. He was named All-Conference and All-American fullback in 1941 and was named the Big Nine's most valuable player in 1943 and Most Valuable in 1943 All-Star game. He holds the Cardinal record of scoring in 13 consecutive games and is in his third year with the Cardinals.

Is Baltimore Ace

Charles B. Tichenor, Minn. A, N.C. N '45, captured the men's singles championship in The Evening Sun Municipal Tennis Tournament in Baltimore, Md., by defeating Nate Askin, 7-5, 5-7, 6-4, 6-3, in finals July 21, 1948. The triumph gave "Chuck" the distinction of winning both the city and municipal titles in the same season, the last to gain that honor was Tom Thaler, in 1941. The new titleholder, ranked fifth, eliminated the favored Thaler in quarter-final action the previous week. After winning the city's singles championship, Chuck together with

his partner Mickey Pardew won the men's doubles championship from Tom Thaler and Al Borleis. A native of Indianapolis, Chuck made quite a name for himself in sports events in the West and mid-West as a youngster and later at the University of Minnesota and Duke University, His first claim to fame was in table tennis, being a two-time winner of the national boys' championship. For three years, from 10 to 12 years of age, he won 125 table tennis trophies all of which, during the war, he donated to the scrap-metal drive. Tichenor captained the Indianapolis Shortridge High School net varsity for four years. His teams copped the state title each year. In 1941 he ranked third in tennis in the boys' division for the entire U.S. As an NROTC midshipman at Duke University, he captained the Blue Devil's netters for two years, won 16 starts and led them to the Southern Conference title in 1945. While at Duke he served as president of the student body, as Archon of North Carolina Nu and was a member of OΔK. Upon being graduated from Duke, Tichenor was commissioned an ensign in 1945 and that winter was a member of the Norfolk Naval Training Station's basketball team which won the national service championship. Returning from a year in China, Chuck was released from service in July, 1946, in time to enter the University of Maryland for a year's postgraduate work where he met his wife, the former Suzanne Stevens of Baltimore. Tichenor is associated with his father-inlaw, James W. ("Jim") Stevens, Md. B '19, as a member of Stevens Brothers, Maryland's oldest commission firm. Mr. Stevens is president of the Baltimore Alumni Association.-O. K. Quivey, past ESA.







WILLIAM F. HAND Mississippi Theta '93

 Dr. William Flowers Hand, Miss. Θ '93, noted scientist and beloved vice president of Mississippi State College, Starkville, died in his campus home, September 25, 1948, at the age of 75. He was one of the south's most prominent figures and one of the nation's leading chemists. The flag was flown at half staff and college activities were suspended until burial services at Enterprise on September 27. Declining health had caused his retirement in 1945 as professor of chemistry, dean of the School of Science, and state chemist, but he was prevailed upon to continue as vice president. Since his graduation in 1893, he had spent 55 years of continuous service to his alma mater, declining high honors and positions to stay with his "lab" and teach his "boys." In 1941 the Georgia section of the American Chemical Society selected him as the recipient of the Herty Medal. He was also presented with two silver cups which he had won three times to gain permanent possession for analytical success on a series of check samples sponsored by the American Oil Chemists' Society. His devotion to his fraternity, State College and the State of Mississippi, became a tradition. When fraternities were banned at one time from the campus, Dr. Hand was expelled because of his continued connection with the sub rosa fraternity. In later years he still had a keen interest in the Fraternity and visited the Chapter as often as possible. He wore his Eminent Archon badge on his belt. Mississippi Theta unveiled a portrait of Dr. Hand for the Chapter house, March 13, 1942.

BISHOP EDWIN F. LEE Illinois Psi-Omega '08

Bishop Edwin F. Lee, Ill. Ψ-Ω '08, retired Methodist missionary at Malaysia and the Philippines, died in Rochester, Minn., September 14, 1948, where he had been under treatment for a heart ailment. Bishop Lee who was 64 years of age had gone to Rochester to undergo treatment and had been residing in Fayette, Iowa, after many years of foreign service. He appeared on the cover picture of the August issue of THE RECORD with three other bishops of the Methodist Church as members of the Council of Bishops who attended the General Conference in Boston, Mass., April 28-May, 1948. Bishop Lee had received degrees from Northwestern University, Garrett Biblical Institute and the University of Chicago. He entered missionary work in 1910, was an American Army chaplain in France during World War I and was elected missionary bishop in 1928. Bishop Lee maintained headquarters in Singapore from that time until early in 1942, when he left the city one day before it fell to the Japanese. In 1944 he was made director of the Methodist general commission of Army and Navy chaplains. He retired last July.

ARTHUR D. HEALEY New Hampshire Alpha '13

Judge Arthur D. Healey, N.H. A 13, of the U.S. District Court and former Representative of the 8th Congressional District of Massachusetts, died of a cerebral hemorrhage at his home in Somerville, Mass., September 16, 1948, at the age of 58. He had been stricken with a heart condition two years ago, but after several months' convalescence returned to his judicial duties and had since served without interruption. He was serving his 5th term in Congress when he was appointed a judge by President Roosevelt in November, 1941, and took office in July, 1942. He was elected to Congress in 1932 and was re-elected four times. Judge Healey presided in a federal court in June when he sat on the bench of the U.S. District Court in New York.

Alexander E. Patterson, Pa. X-O '17, president of the Mutual Life Insurance Company of New York and a member of the Board of Trustees of Sigma Alpha Epsilon, collapsed and died of a heart ailment while visiting in a hospital in East Orange, N.J., September 10, 1948. May Issue Well Received

According to dozens of letters received at the National Office, the Gold Star edition of THE RECORD published in May, 1948, was worthwhile despite the high cost (such a project needed an angel). The issue in honor of the Fraternity's 850 Gold Stars reported at the time contained 850 reproductions of Gold Star photographs thru the cooperation of families and friends. Fifty-nine thousand copies were distributed and the Fraternity has kept a reserve of 1,000 for future requests. Naturally a majority of the fine letters came from parents of Gold Stars but on the other hand many were received from alumni, other fraternity editors and officers, etc. Since the May issue, eight more Gold Stars have been reported and photos of these have been obtained for supplementary pages for the bound volume of THE RECORD for 1947-48 which will include the Gold Star edition, and for specially prepared copies of the Gold Star edition containing the additional deceased members for the parents and families.

More Albums Available

Due to the popularity of the Record Album of Sigma Alpha Epsilon Songs produced following the 13th Leadership School in 1947, another supply is on hand for sale to the Chapters and alumni. The

Record Album containing two 12-inch records with 18 songs in four-part harmony was the result of 60 voices in the Glee Club at the 13th Leadership School in Evanston, Ill., August, 1947, under the direction of Bill Fawcett, Ind. B '44. The recordings were made in the RCA Studios in Chicago and were ready for distribution before Christmas. The first order of 300 albums at \$4.50 each was exhausted just after the 14th Leadership School in 1948. Thus, an additional supply of 250 was obtained in the fall and albums are now available. Also copies of the new Song Book, edited by O. K. Quivey, Ind. B '12, and assisted by Mr. Fawcett, introduced at the 14th School, are available at \$2.00 each thru the National Office.

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
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
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
