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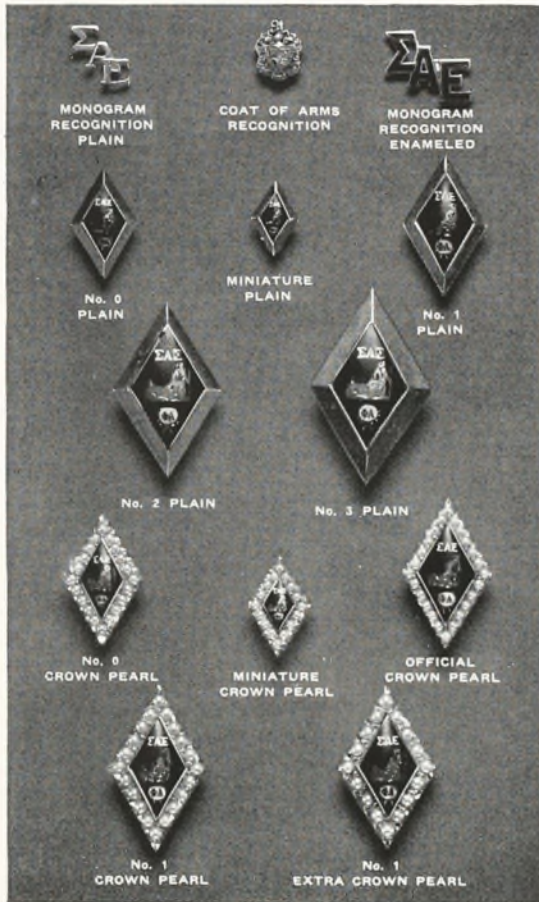

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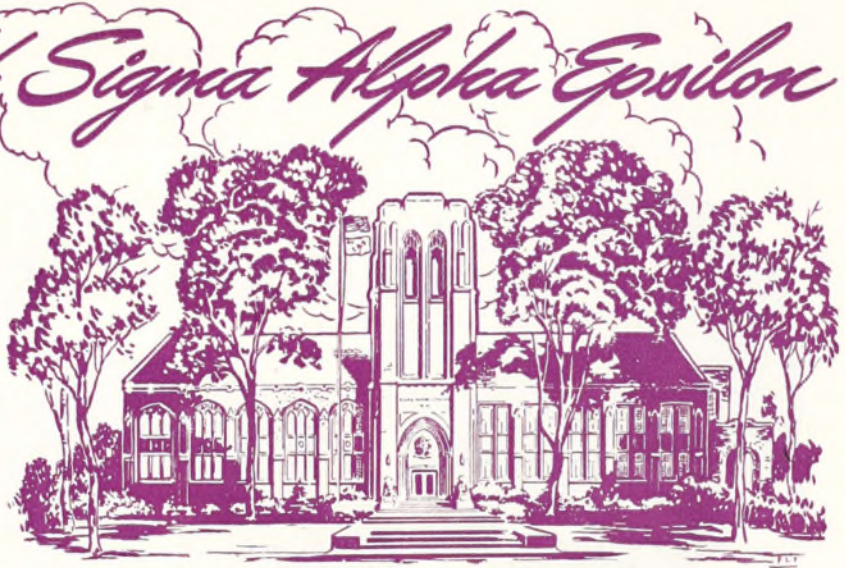

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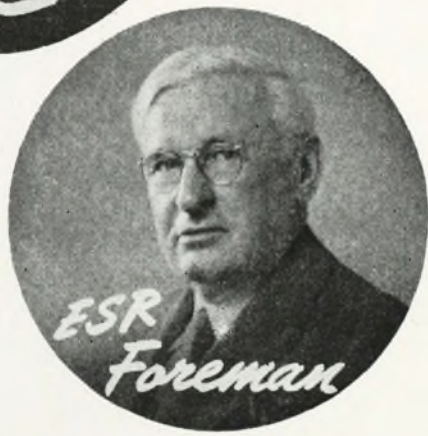

Mo. Gamma Installed as 124th Chapter

Exemplifying one of the traits and requirements of a good Chapter, *hospitality*, Gamma Sigma Society at Westminster College at Fulton, Mo., was installed as Missouri Gamma of Sigma Alpha Epsilon, April 23, 1949, thus completing the installation of six new Chapters which had received charters thru a mail vote closed on February 15, and giving the Fraternity a total of 124 Chapters in 45 states.

Missouri Gamma came into the fraternity family as the third Chapter in the state and the sixth national organization on the Westminster campus. The birth of the Chapter was largely due to the efforts of Roy L. Miller, *Drake '27*, Archon of Province Zeta; four members from other Chapters, namely Roy A. Kinnaird of Missouri Alpha and first president of Gamma Sigma, Robert A. Settlege, and Theodore C. Wetterau of Missouri Beta, Charles J. Stalder of New Mexico Tau, and Charles F. ("Dog") Lamkin, Westminster alumni secretary and past president of the General Council of Phi Delta Theta, who was very instrumental in the election of ΣΑΕ.

Initial installation activities started on Friday night, April 22, with an Indoctrination School at Swope Chapel, following a sumptuous buffet supper and

smoker at Gamma Sigma's temporary living quarters, called the "barracks," on the campus. Leader of the school was Province Archon Miller who introduced the following instructors: G. A. Ginter, *Cincinnati '97*, ESA and installation officer for the six new Chapters: Lauren Foreman, *Emory '01*, ESR; Dr. Chester D. Lee, *Iowa State '27*, ESH, who spoke on pledge training; Albert J. Schoth, *Ore. State '18*, Chapter Supervisor, who discussed the qualifications of a good Chapter, emphasizing hospitality; Don Gable, *Ohio Wesleyan '35*, *Northwestern*, editor of THE RECORD, who discussed the magazine, and John Baugh, *Okla. A. & M. '35*, assistant Chapter Supervisor.

The school closed with the introduction of Dean Emeritus Wilber J. Teeters, *Mt. Union '93*, of the University of Iowa, honorary Archon of Province Zeta, and his son from Iowa Beta; Leslie L. Shaw, *Kan. State '12*, president of the Greater Kansas City Alumni Association; John R. Hoff, *Drake '30*, Province Zeta Deputy Archon; Ray C. Dein, *Neb. '30*, Province Zeta Recorder; Judge Paul V. Barnett, *Mo. '12*, and representatives from Chapters, Indiana Alpha, Iowa Beta, Gamma and Delta, Kansas Alpha and Beta, Missouri Alpha and Beta, Nebraska Lambda-Pi and South Dakota Sigma were the only Province Zeta Chapters not represented at the first night's session.

Convocation Held

Perhaps the most unique feature of all the six installations was the College Convocation held in Swope Chapel on Installation Day, Saturday, April 23, a tradition on the Westminster campus. The procession started from the Administration Building at 11:20 A.M., under the direction of Mr. Lamkin. The service was open to the entire campus, the public and co-eds at William Woods College nearby.

The invocation was given by President William W. Hall, Jr., ΦΓΔ, who also gave the introductory address, welcoming the new Chapter to the college and paying tribute to Mr. Lamkin and Province Archon Miller. Paul B. Jamison, chairman of the Board of Trustees, presented a welcome from the trustees. Province Archon Miller gave a fitting response and details concerning the organization of Gamma Sigma Society in 1946. ESA Ginter presented the Convocation address, referring to the progress of fraternities since the war. The benediction was given by President Hall and the recessional was accompanied by the choir in which several members of Gamma Sigma took part. National and Province officers and presidents of the Province Chapters were in academic robes for the occasion.

Following the Convocation National and Province officers, visiting alumni and Chapter representatives were luncheon guests at the college president's

home on the campus, with Dean Charles W. McKenzie, ΣΦΕ, at the Fulton Country Club, and at four fraternity houses, ΦΔΘ, KA Order, ΔΤΔ and ΦΓΔ. In the afternoon a reception was given by President and Mrs. Hall at Washington West House.

The initiation of 41 men took place at the Odd Fellows Hall at 4:30 P.M., with 75 Chapter representatives and alumni in attendance. The various roles were taken by ESA Ginter as installing officer; ESR Foreman, EA; Assistant Chapter Supervisor Baugh, EP; William Norton of Nebraska Lambda-Pi, ER; James McBride of Kansas Alpha, ECh.; Warren Smith of Missouri Alpha, EH; Richard R. Summa of Iowa Delta, EW; Clemence Schaverte of Missouri Alpha, Chaplain. Others assisting were the four organizers of Missouri Gamma, Kinnaird, Settlege, Stateler and Wetterau; Russell Paulding and Dick Griffith of Iowa Beta; Fred Tinkham and Lucien Wood of Iowa Gamma; Howard Genrich of Iowa Delta; Dick Griffing and William Johnston of Kansas Beta; William Beavers of Missouri Alpha and James Harris of Missouri Beta. Chapter Supervisor Schoth acted as Master of Arrangements, assisted by Baugh and Gable.

Among the initiates were four alumni including three faculty members at Westminster. They were Rev. Robert G. Herrmann, Bible instructor; Herman R. Schuessler, business manager; Kenneth H. Hansen, associate professor of English. Walter O'Don Kurtz is business manager of the Missouri School for Deaf.

Finale to the installation was the banquet for 165 persons at the Fulton Country Club at 7:30 o'clock Saturday night, with Kinnaird, former ΨΣ president, serving as master of ceremonies. The Genesis of Florida Beta

● Florida Beta, installed at Florida State University, Tallahassee, Fla., March 5, 1949, under a charter granted to the Phi Alpha Fraternity by a mail vote, will in all probability always occupy a unique place in the history of Sigma Alpha Epsilon: first, as having been organized and perpetuated by the largest group of transfers from other Chapters ever engaged in such an enterprise; and second, as having been one of seven Chapters of as many college fraternities installed at the same institution on the same day.

The opportunity to establish fraternity Chapters at Tallahassee came as the result of a bill passed by the Florida Legislature in May, 1947, making both the University of Florida at Gainesville and the Florida State College for Women at Tallahassee co-educational and changing the name of the latter institution to Florida State University. This legislation became effective May 15, 1947, but during the preceding college year approximately 700 male students had attended a branch of the University of Florida which had been established at Tallahassee as a temporary measure by the Governor of Florida and his Cabinet.

Among the men attending the temporary branch were members and pledges of

ΣΑΕ Chapters who sensed the opportunity to plant a Chapter of their fraternity in a promising field. In March, 1947, they organized the Phi Alpha Fraternity with nine members, five of them transfers from Florida Upsilon at the University of Florida, Fred O. Drake, Jr., '47, Byron K. Godwin, '47, William C. Henry, '49, Richard P. Lamb, '50, and Joseph M. Caswell, '43; two transfers from North Carolina Nu at Duke University, John W. Sullenberger, '46, and James Homer Turner, '45; and James G. Dillenbaugh, a pledge of Tennessee Omega at the University of the South and John H. Patterson, a pledge of North Carolina Theta at Davidson College, both of whom were initiated by Florida Upsilon before Florida Beta was installed.

Phi Alpha was the first fraternity organized at Tallahassee. Its members quickly won the support of the local alumni and were especially fortunate in having as their adviser Roderick K. Shaw, *Davidson* '22, business manager of Florida State University. The first information about the organization of Phi Alpha, received at the National Office, came in a letter from John W. Sullenberger, written under date of May 24, 1947.

There were Chapters of 14 sororities at Florida State College for Women and when the institution became Florida State University the Administration proved itself hospitable to fraternities. A committee on fraternities was set up which adopted regulations governing the organization and operation of local fraternities. Only groups which could meet the established standards were permitted to operate. Finally, March 5, 1949, was set as the date on which Chapters of national fraternities could be installed.

In the meantime, the extension ma-

chinery of ΣΑΕ had been set in motion and, after careful investigation, Florida State University was approved as a suitable domicile for a ΣΑΕ chapter by the Permanent Extension Investigation Committee, the Supreme Council and Pro Epsilon. Phi Alpha then petitioned for a charter. The petition was submitted to the electorate of the Fraternity by mail and was approved just in time to permit ΣΑΕ to be one of the seven fraternities installing Chapters on March 5, 1949.

In the meantime, other transfers from ΣΑΕ Chapters had entered Florida State University and in the fall of 1947 Florida Alpha was successful in pledging 11 men to whom it had extended bids. The dominant part played in the establishment of Florida Beta by transfers is shown by the fact that of its 29 charter members 17 are initiates of other Chapters, as follows:

Robert Lee Bannerman, *Ga. Tech.* '50; William Mercer Bishop, *Ala.* '50; Walter Bryson, III, *Emory* '51; Henry Turner Kline, Jr., *Penn.* '50; John W. Sullenberger, '46; James Homer Turner, *Duke* '45; and following from *Fla.*: James Francis Collins, III, '51; Joel Walter Collins, '49; James G. Dillenbaugh, '48; Fred O. Drake, Jr., '49; K. Godwin, '47; William Lawson Hancock; William Cameron Henry, '49; Richard Hensin, '50; Leon George Kazantzis; Richard Pringle Lamb, '50; and John H. Patterson, '48. John Walter Drew, one of the initiates at the installation was a former of Georgia Phi at Georgia Tech.

An interesting historical coincidence is that the original Florida Upsilon had a brief existence from February 11, 1885, to March 2, 1885, at the University of Florida when it was located at Tallahassee.

City Alumni Association; E. G. Keefe, Wyo. '28, treasurer of the Kansas City Alumni Association; Association President Shaw, James B. Eldridge, Kan. '27, of Kansas City.

MC Kinnaird introduced President Hall who welcomed the Chapter again, stating the college and Chapter were "together for keeps," and saying to the Chapter, "There will never be another 'you'," following a clever story. He also introduced Dean McKenzie and Dean H. L. Knight. ESA Ginter brought greetings to the Chapter and discussed loyalty and the history of the Fraternity. ESR Foreman gave a survey of the other five installations held since February 25. After a short talk by ESH Lee, MC Kinnaird introduced three new pledges and placed the pledge pins on them. He then introduced the campus presidents of ΒΘΠ, ΦΔΘ, ΚΑ Order, ΔΤΔ, ΦΓΔ and ΤΣΤ. Archon Miller gave praise to Mr. Lampkin in his backing of ΣΑΕ on the campus and mentioned the hospitality of Gamma Sigma. He introduced representatives of the Chapters in Province Zeta including Nebraska Lambda-Pi, Honorary Province Archon Teeters and the Province officers Hoff and Dein. Archon Miller informed Missouri Gamma that the Chapters in the Province would provide a large carved crest for the mantel of the new Chapter house, soon to be constructed by the college at an approximate cost of \$90,000. He stated that the crest was to be similar to the one made for Nebraska Lambda-Pi at the University

of Nebraska. He presented EA Wetterau with a color transparency of the crest. Wetterau expressed his thanks dramatically for the Chapter and paid tribute to Judge Barnett who had greatly assisted Gamma Sigma Society.

"Smooth Installation"

MC Kinnaird introduced Association President Shaw who stated that the Kansas City alumni would provide funds to send one member of Missouri Gamma to the 15th Leadership School in California in August. Mr. Shaw then presented a handsome engraved gavel to Wetterau as a gift of the Kansas City Alumni Association. Kinnaird then introduced Chapter Supervisor Scoth who referred to the "smooth installation." It was announced that Missouri Beta at Washington University would present a separate gift, a plaque for the front door of the new Chapter house. Others introduced and saying a few words were Editor Gable and Assistant Chapter Supervisor Baugh. MC Kinnaird then presented a watch as gift to Mr. Lamkin who could not attend the banquet. He also opened a gift from the Mothers Club, a sterling silver punch bowl ladle. The banquet closed with special tribute for the Chapter organization work and guidance of Kinnaird. Following the banquet the Chapter serenaded the co-eds at William Woods College. The Chapter's installation activities ended on Sunday, April 24, with church attendance and open house.

Moseley Takes Newly Created Position of Alumni Secretary

● Carrying out the mandate of the 1947 National Convention that it employ an Alumni Secretary of Sigma Alpha Epsilon to conduct a campaign to raise funds which can be used to assist Chapters in building houses on a more liberal basis than is possible with the present endowment funds of the Fraternity under the provisions of the National Laws, the Supreme Council has elected Dr. John O. Moseley, Okla. '16, Stanford '30, Past Eminent Supreme Archon and Director of Leadership Training, to this new position and he resigned as president of the University of Nevada to accept on July 1 with tentative headquarters in California.

In creating the position of Alumni Secretary, the Supreme Council was carrying out the will of the 1947 Convention, as expressed in the adoption of the following resolution which had been introduced by Charles M. Carpenter, Adrian '17, member of the National Board of Trustees and Past Archon of Province Beta:

"Resolved that the Supreme Council be authorized to employ an Alumni Secretary who shall have such duties as shall be defined by the Supreme Council but whose primary duty shall be the development of the resources of the Fraternity."

Dr. Moseley was elected as Alumni Secretary at the meeting of the Supreme Council, held in August, 1948, and accepted tentatively but announcement was withheld until he could secure a release from the Board of Regents of the University of Nevada.

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
In accepting the position, Dr. Moseley stated to the National Fraternity:

Dear Brothers:

The 1947 Mackinac Island National Convention authorized the employment of an Alumni Secretary. The Supreme Council has offered me the job. I have accepted it.

As many of you know, I have for more than 30 years given every extra bit of time and energy I possessed to the upbuilding of our beloved fraternity. I am grateful for the opportunity now afforded to serve ΣΑΕ on a full time basis. I ask humbly for your guidance, loyalty and support.

Born in Mississippi, Dr. Moseley was graduated from Austin College, and the University of Oklahoma, was a Rhodes Scholar, Oxford University in England and attended other educational institutions. Beginning in 1912 as a teacher in Durant, Okla. High School, he has served continuously in his chosen profession as principal of the Academy, Henry Kendall College, Tulsa, Okla.; professor of Latin at the University of Oklahoma; president of Central State College, Edmond, Okla.; dean of students at the University of Tennessee, Knoxville, and president of the University of Nevada, Reno. He served as a commissioned officer in World War I and was

with the famous 32nd (Red Arrow) Division.

After he was initiated into ΣΑΕ by Oklahoma Kappa at the University of Oklahoma in October, 1915, he held all Chapter, Province and National offices, including Eminent Supreme Archon from 1934 to 1937 and was Honorary Eminent Supreme Archon from 1937 to 1939. Since 1937 he has served as Director of Leadership Training, originating the School at the Levere Memorial Temple in Evanston, Ill., where it has been held for 14 years. He is serving as director and business manager of the 15th School in Los Angeles, Calif., this year. Dr. Moseley has probably been in the active service of the Fraternity on a voluntary basis longer than any other man who was ever initiated into ΣΑΕ. Beginning in 1919, he chose the initiation as a special interest and continuously since that time has conducted initiations in scores of Chapters thruout the realm of Minerva.

Meridian, Miss. was Dr. Moseley's birthplace, October 21, 1893, and he was named John Ohleyer. His father was the late Rev. John W. Moseley, Jr., Presbyterian minister for 45 years in Mississippi and Oklahoma and his mother was the late Sophie Ohleyer of Brandon Miss. His grandfather, the Rev. John W. Moseley, Sr. was a Presbyterian minister for more than 70 years in southern states. Dr. Moseley was married to Miss Marie V. Nichols of Los Angeles, Calif., December 19, 1923 and they have a son, John Nichols, *Tenn. '46, Stanford* and a daughter, Margaret Marie, KAΘ, both married.

Dr. Moseley, who has traveled widely in Europe, Africa and Asia, is a member of the Presbyterian Church, Rotary Club, Kiwanis Club, ΦΔΦ, ΗΣΦ, ΣΤΔ, ΑΦΣ, ΦΚΔ, ΦΚΦ, ΦΗΣ, Classical Association of

the Middle West and South, American Philological Association, American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars and is a 32nd Degree Mason. He is the author of a text book on Legal Latin and has written articles on fraternal, classical, travel and military subjects for various magazines. He was a member of the Advisory Board of the University of Oklahoma Alumni Association in 1920; member of the Co-ordinating Board of the State of Oklahoma from 1937-1939; president of the Oklahoma State Council in 1939; president of the Alumni Association of Southeastern State College, Durant, Okla., in 1915; member of the Panel and Chairman of Greek Week Committee of the National Infraternity Conference, and was awarded the Gold Medal of the NIC in 1947 as well as the Distinguished Service Award of ΣΑΕ.


The following statement was made by G. A. Ginter, *Cincinnati '97*, ESA, in regard to the appointment of the Alumni Secretary.

At the National Convention of Sigma Alpha Epsilon held at Mackinac Island in August, 1947, a resolution was adopted which authorized the Supreme Council to employ an Alumni Secretary, with duties to be fixed by the Council, but whose primary duty should be to develop the resources of the Fraternity. This resolution was introduced by Charles M. Carpenter, Secretary of the Board of Trustees, who stated that the Fraternity needed to develop its emergency fund, the National Endowment Fund,

and that the first duty of such Alumni Secretary should be to canvass our membership in an attempt to secure money for this fund.

The Supreme Council, taking the resolution passed by the Convention as a mandate, considered the matter at length, and especially the character of the man best suited to fill the position. After much discussion, the Council decided to offer the position to Dr. John O. Moseley. Dr. Moseley indicated that he was interested in the place, and at a meeting with the Council at Evanston in August, 1948, accepted the position. Due to his commitments at the University of Nevada, where he was serving as president, no announcement could be made of his appointment until his resignation was formally accepted by that institution, which now has been done. Dr. Moseley assumed his new duties with the Fraternity on July 1 of this year.

To members of Sigma Alpha Epsilon, Dr. Moseley needs no introduction. 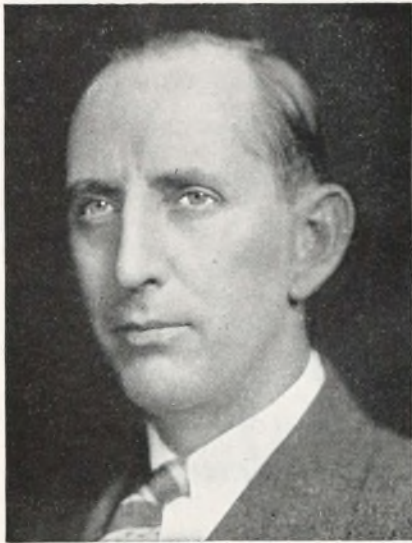

The Billings, Mont. Alumni Association held a dinner-dance at the Skyline Club. About 50 persons attended.

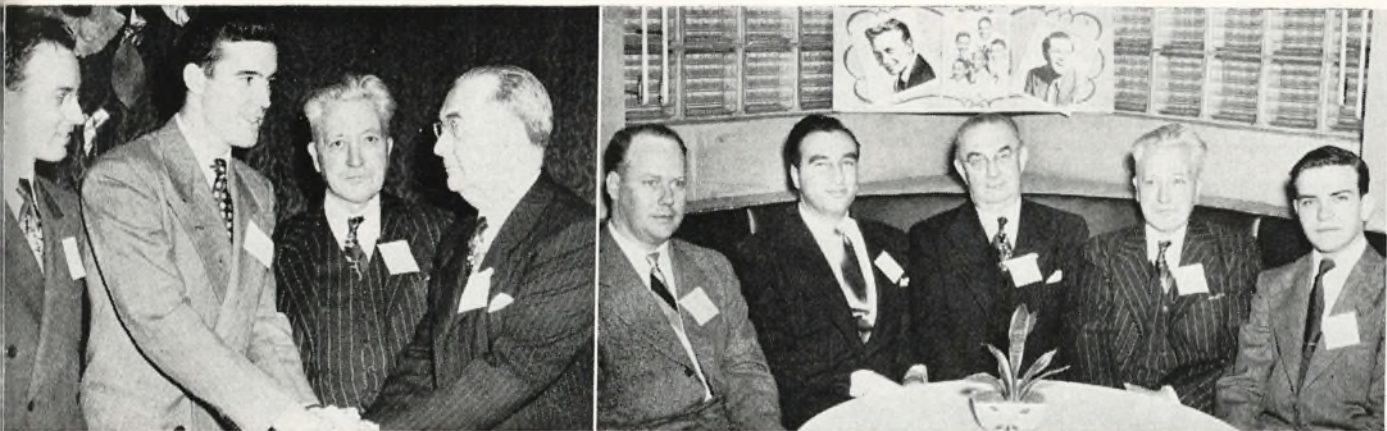

Earliest Fraternity Editor, Now Over 90, Lives Near Atlanta

● As a ΣAE pledge 43 years ago at Evans-ton I had always envied the pilgrimage taken by my fellow New Englander, Billy Levere, to Pleasant Hill, Ala., to discover our last living founder, John Barrett Rudolph. There being no more founders extant, I had allowed the thought of such fraternal romance to perish until perusal of the last ΣAE Directory (vintage 1929) chronicled the fact that Piromis Hulsey Bell, 91-year-old resident of Route 1, Decatur, Ga., Ga. '82, was listed as editor of THE RECORD in 1884, which according to the Gregorian calendar is or was 65 years ago, and would give Brother Bell fair title to being the world's oldest ex-editor of any publication of any fraternity.

With my favorite cartoonist, Jack Davis, Ga. '50, as chauffeur, I headed eastward from Atlanta one sunny June day and found cooling, hospitable shade in the virgin forest that all but conceals the cozy two-room cottage where Brother Bell lives alone on the outskirts of Panthersville.

In 1900 he was advised by physicians to give up his law practice in Atlanta and get out into the country if he wished to regain his health, which has been impaired by a severe attack of bronchitis. The doctors evidently knew their stuff because Piromis Hulsey Bell is still there, keeping house and making daily jaunts to the nearby grocery. His carriage is erect; his mind is keen; but failing eyesight is becoming a handicap to this active alumnus who last year received a 50-Year member-

ship certificate at the Founders Day dinner in Atlanta.

Jack sketched a portrait of this pioneer ΣAE as he told of listening to a fiery speech in the halls of the old Georgia State Capitol delivered by Thomas E. Watson, Ga. '76, later to become famous as "The Father of Rural Free Delivery."

Brother Bell's memory journeyed back

to the War Between the States when a lad of six his mother fled with him and sisters from Atlanta to Elberton to escape the Yankee invaders. "The Calico House" where his family had lived was used as headquarters both by Gen. O. O. Howard and Gen. William Tecumseh Sherman.

After the war, Bell recalls, several former Confederate officers started private schools in Atlanta. Today he stands as the oldest living graduate of Atlanta's old Berry College. High. In his years as a member of Gamma Beta the fraternity had no house. Meetings were held in students' rooms. Bell recalls that student elections often were spiced with fist fights involving Sigma Kappa Alpha, Chi Phi and ATΩ.

Succeeding Brother Bell as editor of THE RECORD was Alexander Jeffrey Smith, Emory '84. Many prized memories of his early work for the Fraternity were destroyed when his home burned in 1900. Soon after Mrs. Bell died, and he remained in solitude on the acres he loved so well. His flowers and small vegetable garden are carefully husbanded.

"I get just enough exercise," says Brother Bell. "I have my doubts as to the benefits of college football. Football players crowd into one hour activity they should spread out over a day. I believe exercise should be taken in moderation."

Anticipating that we younger brothers were probably mystified at his unusual name, Brother Bell beat us to the punch and explained that he had not liked his name even when it was whittled down to the nickname, "Pi."

"I once asked my father why he named me Piromis," said Mr. Bell.

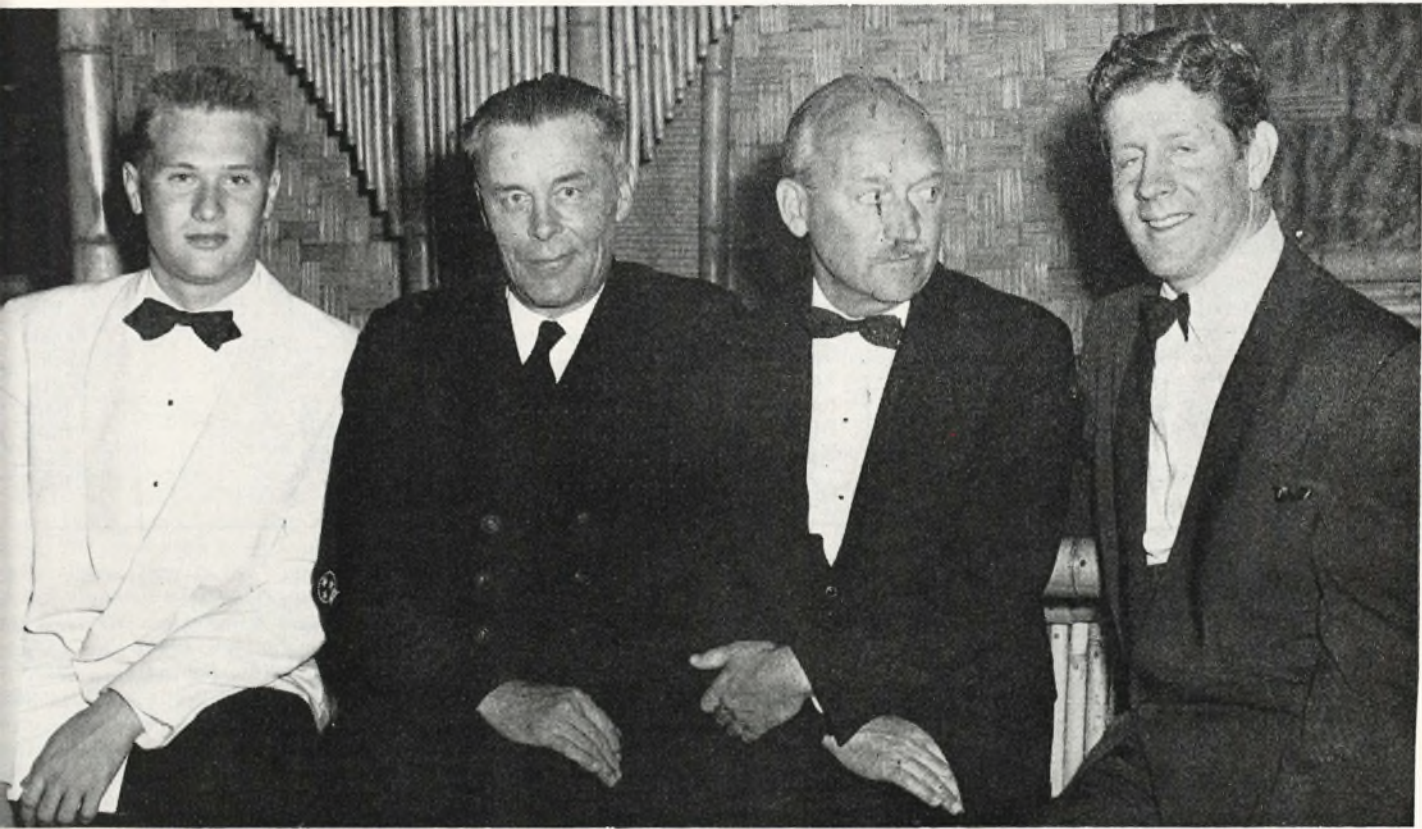
"My father replied, 'Son, if I had named you John, you would probably be getting mail intended for some other John; or you would be served with warrants involving still another John Bell; but Piromis Bell you will be a distinctive individual.'"

Jack and I agreed that our elder brother has been eminently successful in coming any handicaps.



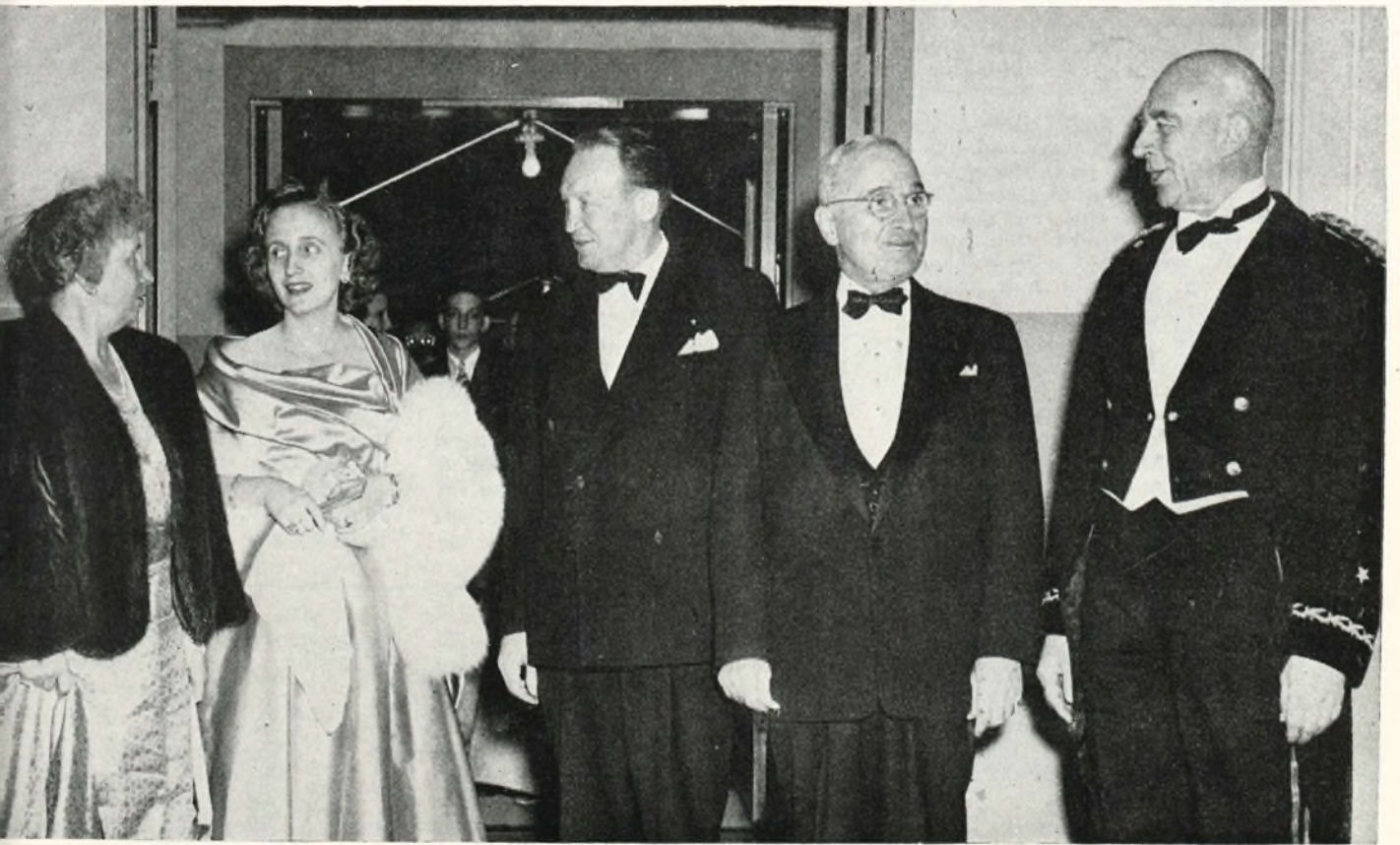

7th Annual All-America Football Team

● With the passing of each year, it becomes increasingly difficult to select a truly representative ΣAE All-America Football Team. This is partially due to the ever increasing number of Chapters which must be considered, but primarily to the fact that colleges and universities everywhere are constantly enlarging the manpower of their football squads. In football, as in practically everything else, this is the age of specialization, and no longer do we find 11 iron men playing the entire game.

It was therefore with a feeling close to frustration that your humble football editor approached the deadline of the February issue of THE RECORD with the task of reducing the galaxy of ΣAE pig-skin talent to the necessary minimum acceptable for a 1948 All-America Eleven. And, if it be the will of the Fraternity that these selections be made in the future, it will be necessary to enlist greater cooperation from members everywhere.—But more about that later.

In picking a Captain for the team, there is no hesitancy in naming William Raymond Healy, better known as Bill "The Moose" Healy, a Rambling Wrecker from Marietta, Ga. A repeater from the 1947 All-America Team, Bill has completed his last year of collegiate football at Georgia School of Technology, where he was a gentleman of distinction at the right guard spot. He was the one member of ΣAE to be picked by Grantland Rice for the *Look* 1948 All-America and among a number of similar all-star honors. International News Service placed him on its Defensive Eleven. He is beloved by his Chapter for his outstanding activities on the campus, and we salute him as a credit to his fraternity.

At the ends, Bob Cox of North Carolina and Don Stonsifer of Northwestern did outstanding jobs.

A senior on one of the top teams of the country, Cox completed his college football career in a blaze of glory, out-performing his end team-mate, Art Weiner, who was awarded a coveted spot on Grantland Rice's 1948 All-America. Bob was the regular right end, and kicked 33 out of 37 attempts for extra points, one of which was missed after a 15-yard penalty. This

was the third highest average for the nation. As a pass snagger, he had no equal on the team. On all-star teams, he won All-Southern and All-State recognition.

Don Stonsifer, only a sophomore, had the most unusual and difficult assignment of playing understudy to both the regular right and left ends, and because either of the two regulars were out with injuries most of the season, Wildcat Don started in most of the games, in one of the toughest schedules of 1948. He was equally effective on offense or defense, and played aggressively in every game. Stonsifer is a Chicago boy.

Lauri Niemi of Washington State and Ralph Kohl of Michigan were teamed at tackle.

The 240 pound Lauri "Finn" Niemi was selected by International News Service for its Offensive All-America Eleven, and was named first team tackle on every Pacific Coast all-opponent team, including those of California and UCLA. Niemi played in the East-West All-Star game at Kezar Stadium on New Year's Day and in two collegiate all-star games in Hawaii. He has completed his senior year.

As was the case with Bob Cox of North Carolina, Ralph Kohl was the victim of his over-publicized team-mate tackle, Al Wistert, who was nominated for the key berth on *Collier's* All-America. Few people realize it, but Al was the third Wistert to play for Michigan, and the name has become a tradition with sport writers. "Beef," as members affectionately call

Ralph Kohl, packed 255 pounds on his 6 foot 2 inch frame after serving three and a half years in the Army Air Force and had to scale down to 220 to earn a regular berth on Michigan's defensive team last junior year. As a senior, he was made first string offensive tackle. *The Cleveland Press* placed him on its first All-Midwest Team. He also played in the East-West Game on New Year's Day, and was Heavyweight Boxing Champion of the camp. Who can deny this stalwart of the top football team of the country a place on ΣAE's All-America!

Gets Pro Offers

Strong California's bid for fame came from Bob "Stormy" Hileman, who teamed up with Captain Bill Healy at the other guard post. Playing a rugged game at center, it was necessary to move him over one spot to find a place on the line. He played a brilliant defensive game, although only a pledge at the time of competition, with plenty of schooling behind him. He has completed his final year of football. This 22-year-old lad from Ventura, California, received offers from the New York Yankees to play pro football, but due to his unfinished academic efforts at the university it is doubtful that he will be able to accept at this time.

Our members at William and Mary took their football seriously with 16 men on the squad, two student football managers and an assistant coach. A senior, foot, one inch, Tommy Thompson from Woodbridge, N.J., was a natural for

pivot spot. One of the outstanding centers of the nation, he was named All-Southern Conference, All-State, as well as the outstanding athlete of the State of New Jersey. He will continue his football career with the Cleveland Browns.

Starting the season at quarter, and later taking over at fullback, Robert T. Dean led Cornell to the championship of the Ivy League. He averaged 5.1 yards at rushing, 39.3 yards as a coffin corner punter, kicked the extra points for his team, and called the signals, when necessary. He made the winning touchdowns and conversions to win the Dartmouth and Pennsylvania games. His name was included on the rolls of several All-Eastern selections and the Ivy League teams. He was also invited to play in the Shrine East-West Game and the Hawaii All-Star contests. Such is the record of this Bloomington, Ind., boy who has completed his final year for Cornell.

Southern Methodist is another university that is well-manned by members of ΣAE, and it was impossible to pick junior Dick McKissack for another year without adding the name of sophomore Kyle Rote, both of whom contributed largely to the success of the highly publicized Doak Walker.

A fullback, Dick McKissack is exceedingly versatile as an outstanding runner, blocker and tackler, and his name figured prominently in All-Southwestern selections.

In 1946, Kyle Rote was one of the most heralded high school players in the country, and as a varsity player in 1948 his 6 foot, 2 inch, 195-pound bundle of dynamite lived up to expectations. He is fast, a great punter and passer, and a power runner, reminiscent of the great Doc Blanchard.

Other Selections

Completing this exceptional backfield is another All-America repeater in the person of Jack Cloud of William and Mary. He was picked by Grantland Rice on his season All-America team, and was also included on other All-America and national elevens. Jack has another year of competition, and Cloud, Rote and McKissack will be the backfield trio to watch during the coming season.

Having presented some of the data that led us in selecting the first string All-America, we also submit second and third team selections, which, in our humble opinion, make up a 33-man squad which is superior to any similar fraternity group in the country. Naturally, there are other ΣAE football players who might all be entitled to share honors with the other 33, but from the mass of evidence on hand, we'll rest our case.

Our heartfelt thanks to the many who responded promptly to the requests for information, and the others who submitted their versions of All-America Elevens. Outstanding in this latter group may we name William H. Maclay, Jr., a recent alumnus of the Texas Delta Chapter, who must have given considerable thought to the line-up, arriving at an All-America team that differed only in one position from that which originally appeared in the February issue of THE RECORD.



Province Zeta Awards

Many Chapters, Alumni Associations and Provinces find ways to assist in sending more than one man from each Chapter to the annual Leadership School, but Province Zeta covering Chapters in Iowa, Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska and South Dakota has provided a plan to assist one freshman from each Chapter to attend this year. At a Province meeting in Fulton, Mo., during the installation of Missouri Gamma at Westminster College, the Province was authorized to contribute \$50.00 to each Chapter which would send as one of its representatives to this year's Leadership School a freshman selected under the terms and conditions of the Province Zeta Leadership School Award. The award goes automatically to the freshman with the highest rating in scholarship, general attitude, etc., as computed from points set up by the Province.

One tuition scholarship was offered to each national organization to be awarded by the organization to the housemother of its choice to attend the school and serve as a "student leader." A national officers day was held toward the end of the school and Sigma Alpha Epsilon was represented by Albert J. Scoth, Ore. State '18, Chapter Supervisor, who is a staunch supporter of the housemother plan.

Calif. Alpha Top Star

● According to Walt Gamage in his "Sports Shots" in the *Palo Alto Times*, April 20, Gaylord Bryan, *Stanford* '50, is one of the "greatest all around athletes that the world has ever seen!" Gamage said: "So, you think we took in too much territory with that 'one of the greatest in the world' business? O.K., but we still maintain if he doesn't belong in the same class with men like Jesse Owens, Jim Thorpe, Glenn Morris, Bob Mathias and Jim Bausch at the present time . . . he will before his athletic career is over. We contend that Gay would rank right up near the top of the list if he could be matched with the great all around stars of the past and present in a series of tests in track and other sporting events. It is reported now that the amazing 21-year-old star from Orange will display his talents in still another sport this coming fall when he gives football a whirl. Track, of course is his main forte. Last Saturday against San Jose State, he gave a demonstration of what he can do by winning the 100, 200, low hurdles and broad jump. It took the best high jumper on the coast, Mel Martin, who did six-feet-five, to deprive Gay of five first places." Two pages of the May 23 issue of *Life* were devoted to the achievements of Bryan and he was referred to as "Iron" Bryan. His most satisfying performance took place May 7 at Berkeley, where he scored 23 points to lead Stanford to a 74 to 57 victory over the University of California. Bryan started off by winning the high jump, then took first in the 100-yard and 220-yard dashes and in the low hurdles. The best he could do in the broad jump was second, but his admirers were inclined to excuse that.

Student Moderator

● Jack Hart, *Millikin* '49, who has served as Moderator of the Westminster Fellowship National Council of the Presbyterian Church, was featured in the May issue of *Presbyterian Life*, a journal of Protestant Christianity. Said the publication: "Tall and blond, courteous but modest to the point of shyness, Moderator Hart invariably wins the respect of adult audiences. His simple and sincere speeches leave his listeners with the feeling that the younger element in the church today counts as a real force." Jack became the first Westminster Fellowship Moderator in his home town church in Mattoon, Ill., still later a district and state moderator. Considerable reference in the feature article on Jack was given to his Chapter, Illinois Delta at James Millikin University, where the members call him "Rev." but say he is an all-around man.

● Robert Wright of Illinois Psi-Omega at Northwestern University appeared as "Brunet" in the first production of "The New Moon," sponsored by the Municipal Theatre Association in St. Louis, Mo., June 9 to June 19. Lyrics for the show were by Lawrence Schwab, *Harvard* '14, well-known playwright and producer, and others. The municipal opera is held in the open air theatre in Forest Park. Wright had been president of the Speech School Senate at Northwestern for two years and had leading roles in several speech school productions. He also had the leading role in the 1947 Waa-Mu Show, "Break the News." In the 1948 show, "See How They Run," he was again in the cast, this time as a member of the double sextet dancing unit. In the 1948 show were others of Illinois Psi Omega, namely, Lloyd Thaxton, Glenn Wasson, Dave Wilkenson, Barry Dahm, Bill Traeger, John Neuman, Dick Wheelan and Bill Luney. In the 1949 show, "What's the Rush," were Thaxton, Wasson, Luney and Al Kunerth. While at Northwestern, Wright was holder of the Cherub Scholarship during his freshman year and the Edgewater Drama Scholarship in his senior year. Recently he was awarded the Lovedale Scholarship for his Masters Degree. His St. Louis engagements run until September 5. He has been doing chorus work and minor roles in all 11 of the shows during the summer.

Ind. All-Star Footballer

● Harry ("Chick") Jagade of Indiana Gamma at Indiana University has been selected for the All-Star football team according to word received in June. He not only has been an outstanding man on the gridiron but was one of the best liked men in the Chapter house. He served as president of his pledge class, was a member of the interfraternity pledge council, a member of Skull and Crescent, president of the Falcon Club, a member of the Young Republican Club, treasurer of the "I" Club and served on the governing board of the Chapter for two years.

"Horses Under Hood"

● "Horses Under the Hood" was the caption *Time* Magazine gave to its article leading the sports department of the April 11, 1949, issue, featuring Wally Ris, the University of Iowa's Olympic swimming star and a member of Iowa Beta Chapter, who appeared on the cover of the November, 1948, issue of *THE RECORD*. Said *Time* in part: "At Daytona Beach's Welch Pools, he (Ris) sized up his competition for the National AAU 100-yd. race with a clear water eye. With the gun, he launched himself into the water like a spent torpedo. When Wall's big hand touched the tile 51.4 seconds after the start, he could add another AAU championship to his collection of titles (fortnight ago, he was voted the all-collegiate swimmer of 1949). Wally Ris, the only man to captain Iowa's team two years running, was ambitious to be a varsity football player rather than a swimmer, still regrets that he didn't make the gridiron grade. He didn't take up swimming until he hurt a knee playing high school football. He managed to sneak in ahead of ex-Yale Alan Ford at London last year; but he has yet to sneak inside Ford's world record of 49.7 for 100 yards."

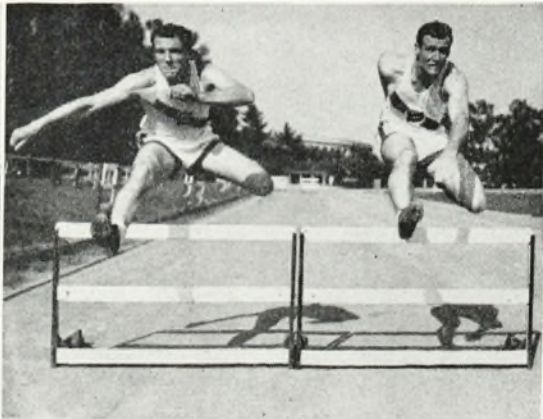
Iowa Delta Plan Expands

• After an experimental year, the Iowa Delta Foreign Student Plan at Drake University will be expanded by the Chapter sponsoring another German student this fall and the transferring of Bernie Dehmelt of Berlin after a school year at Drake to the University of Pennsylvania where he will be sponsored by Pennsylvania Theta Chapter. Bernie, who entered Drake in the fall of 1948 was provided with room, board and clothing thru the Chapter

and alumni, and his tuition was handled by the university. After a few months of student work and adjustment to American life, Bernie was pledged by Iowa Delta in January and after summer school at Drake is scheduled to be initiated at the 15th Leadership School in Los Angeles in September. As the result of the plan started by Iowa Delta and alumni and introduced to the Province and to the 14th Leadership School in 1948, Iowa Gamma at Iowa State College has selected a German student. Also Iowa Beta at the University of Iowa plans to sponsor a German boy this fall if transportation can be arranged in time. Bernie was to return to Germany within one year, but thru the co-operation of Pennsylvania Theta and the university of which Harold Stassen, *Minn.* '29, is president, he will be maintained in America until September, 1950. The cash fund of \$500 started by Iowa Delta alumni is being maintained by a voluntary contribution from each member and pledge of 50 cents per man each month. The Chapter will adopt a two-year plan for foreign students if it is decided the scheme

is more effective. The germ of the Foreign Student Plan came to Iowa Delta thru a Founders Day speech by Justice Charles F. Wennerstrum, *Drake* '12, of the Iowa Supreme Court, March 14, 1948, after he had returned from War Crimes trials in Germany. Details of the plan and the first German student's progress have been carried in past issues of *THE RECORD*. A few of Bernie's reactions are interesting. Says he: "I may say that I have come to cherish group life on a basis of equality of the members. It provides a testing ground for later life. It makes a person socially minded. I have come to think of fraternities as the association of young men, on the basis of talent and accomplishment, with equal, harmonizing minds, desirous to prepare themselves for life by obtaining a profound understanding of the art of living together. Fraternities are one of the best experimentation fields for living in a democratic way of life. It is here that a growing person can familiarize himself with all the problems, difficulties and complexities which are connected with this art."

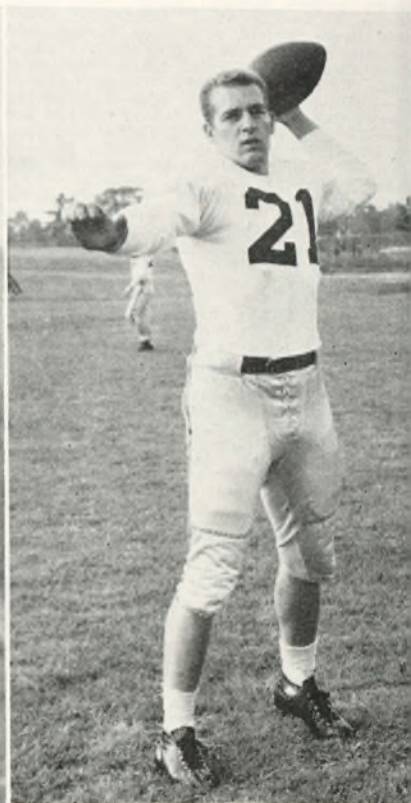

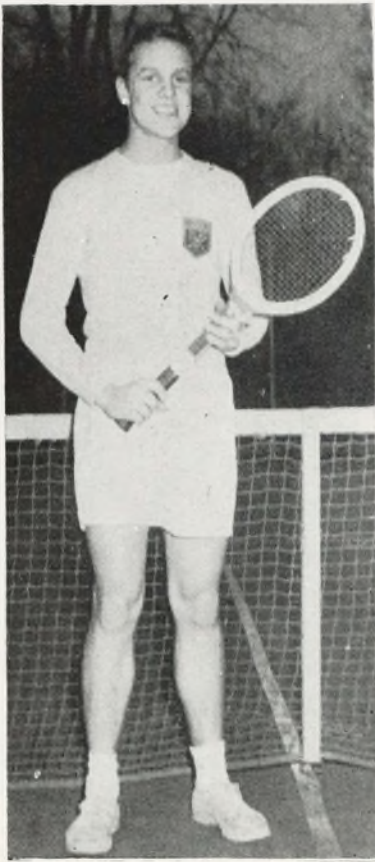

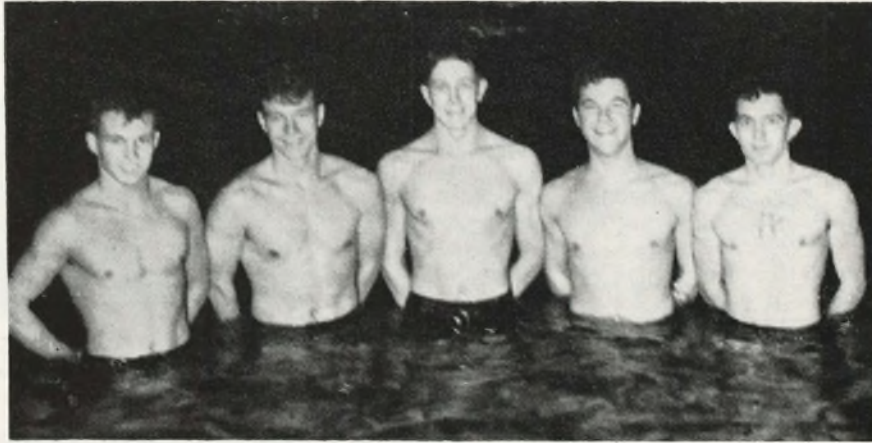

Va. Kappa Lodge

● Virginia Kappa's lodge occupies an imposing position on a little knoll at the very entrance to the unique circle of lodges among the trees at the College of William and Mary. All of the fraternities are located in the series of lodges which were built by the college in an effort to provide them with centers of activity, both social and fraternal. Simple in design and sturdy of construction, the

lodges are designed for maximum efficiency and long use. The structures are of cement blocks which are faced with brick, and feature radiant heating, and small kitchenettes complete with stoves and refrigerators. For the convenience of the co-ed visitors, a handy little powder room is provided. It was the responsibility of the Chapter to outfit the lodge. Hence Virginia Kappa selected furniture of heavy leather in red, green and tan. Large green rugs cover the floor, and brass lamps provide soft indirect lighting. Con-

veniently located near the rear door to the verandah is a large radio-phonograph which can provide music and entertainment both for the inside and the verandah as well. The wall above the fireplace is graced with an oil painting of the crest of the fraternity. At the opposite end of the meeting room, hunting scenes are depicted, while a copy of the original charter (re-issued to replace the one lost during the war in 1865) and a color photograph of the Levere Memorial Temple hang on the rear wall.

VILLIAM STOKES WALKER Georgia Beta '77

Rev. William Stokes Walker, D.D., *Ga. Wesleyan* '77, distinguished Baptist minister, who served as a missionary in China for 37 churches and later as the pastor of 37 churches in North Georgia, died at Clearwater, Fla., May 5, 1949. He was one of five ΣAE brothers in Georgia Beta and had two ΣAE sons, Horace W. Mercer '05, and Clarence N., Mercer '07, who survive him. His brothers were: Billington W., '72; Thomas N., '74; Charles M., '87; and Joseph Henry, '87. Charles M. is the only brother surviving. He was also the uncle of Clifford M. Walker, *Ga. Wesleyan* '97, former governor of Georgia.

BRENTON T. BADLEY Ohio Sigma, Ohio Delta '97

Bishop Brenton T. Badley, *Simpson, Ohio Wesleyan* '97, well-known Methodist Episcopal Church missionary, died from a stroke in Delhi, India, February 1, 1949. Bishop Badley had returned to India to remain the rest of his life when he became ill. He was born in India in 1876 and was the son of pioneer missionaries. He served in missionary work for 25 years before his election to the episcopacy in 1924. He retired from active service in 1944 but continued his literary work. In his command of the Urdu language was like that of a native of India. His episcopal residence was first in Bombay and later in Delhi. Bishop Badley died in 1946 as the couple was preparing to return to India for retirement. He and one son, Brenton Hamline Badley, *Ohio Wesleyan* '27, are buried in Delaware, Ohio, domicile of Ohio Delta Chapter at Ohio Wesleyan University. Bishop Badley has two other brothers who are members of ΣAE, Ernest V., *Simpson* '95, and Theodore C., *Simpson* '99, *Ohio Wesleyan*, the latter being with Bishop Badley at the time of his death.

Robert T. Davis, *BU* '49, who was Boston University's "Man of the Year" for 1949 and president of his graduating class, was killed when his automobile collided with a truck at Rensselaer, N.Y., June 10, 1949. A war veteran, Davis was one of the most popular students on the Boston campus. Following service in Alaska, he was discharged from the Army in 1946 and re-entered Boston as a sophomore. He had been admitted to Harvard and had planned to enter in September. He had served as president of the Inter-

fraternity Council, was a member of the all-university Senior Senate and was Eminent Treasurer of Massachusetts Beta-Upsilon Chapter. A special feature on Davis' activities appeared in the May issue of *THE RECORD*. A memorial service was held at the Massachusetts Beta-Upsilon house, June 13, conducted by Richard Hayes, Jr., EDA. The chaplain of the Chapter, Richard Batchelder, officiated as did the chaplain of Boston University, Stanley Martin. An eulogy was given by Charles F. Collins, *BU* '12, past ESA, for the alumni, and C. Bruce Wright for the Chapter. A double funeral for Davis and his mother was held in Buffalo, June 14, and was attended by William W. Paddock, *Geo. Wash.* '06, Province Alpha Archon, and Russell Kneen, John Miles and Thomas Hoban from the Chapter.

Mr. Heath, author of *Yankee Reporter*, won the Pulitzer Prize for outstanding work as a reporter during 1939, based on his exposé of the activities of Martin T. Manton, former Circuit Court judge.
