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

Memorable Convention at Los Angeles

Most elaborately entertained gathering in the history of Sigma Alpha Epsilon, the 93rd Anniversary National Convention, held at the Biltmore Hotel, Los Angeles, Calif., Tuesday to Friday, September 6-9, 1949, will live long in the memory of every one who was fortunate enough to attend and the gracious hospitality of the alumni of Southern California and their charmng ladies will always be held in grateful appreciation.

The Convention was notable for the large number of adies in attendance, in keeping with the theme, "The AE Family," which had been adopted for the Convention.

Delegates were present from 121 Chapters Collegiate and 39 Alumni Associations who, together with the 12 Province Archons, seven past ESAs, five members of the supreme Council and four other National Officers, gave he Convention a voting strength of 188, a new high n this respect. The total registration of delegates, alternates and visitors was 738.

Past ESA Marvin E. Holderness, *Vanderbilt* '02, of t. Louis, Mo., was the guest of honor of the Convenion and took an active part in all its proceedings.

Following immediately after the 15th Leadership chool which had been conducted Tucsday to Monday, tugust 30-September 5, the Convention brought the elegates from the Chapters Collegiate and the memers of the school faculty in from the University of outhern California campus at an early hour Tuesday norning. The Ballroom of the Biltmore Hotel had been rranged so that voting delegates and officers were eated in a special section at the front of the room, usiness sessions were held at the Biltmore Tuesday norning and afternoon, Thursday morning and afternoon and Friday morning with the final session Friday ternoon in the Embassy Room of the Ambassador totel where the business sessions of the 1932 Conventon had been held. Wednesday was devoted entirely to intertainment.

Eminent Supreme Archon G. A. Ginter, Cincinnation 7, called the first session to order at 10:30 o'clock useday morning. The invocation was pronounced by ev. Edward F. Norton, Fla. '28, alternate delegate on the Lakeland, Fla., Alumni Association. Delegates and visitors were welcomed to Southern California in stirring address by Zack Lamar Cobb, Ga. '99, and fitting response was made by Charles F. Collins, BU 2, past ESA.

Due to the crowded entertainment program, all the siness sessions were hurried but the delegates were ompt in attendance and attentive at all times and sisted ESA Ginter in pushing the reports of officers d committees and important business so that all had en given necessary attention before final adjournment.

Alumni Dues Increased

The most important change in the National Laws s the adoption of an amendment increasing the an-

nual Chapter National dues of Alumni from \$3.00 to \$6.00, effective January 1, 1950, with the provision that \$1.00 from each such payment shall be set aside for the memorial to the Founders to be erected on the campus of the University of Alabama at Tuscaloosa, Ala., until \$35,000 is on hand for this purpose. The remaining \$5.00 from each payment is to be credited on a Life Membership for the donor, as a result of which Alumni will become Life Members after making 10 payments.

Other amendments adopted were of a routine nature. Several controversial questions which had been expected to rock the Convention did not come on the floor for official action. The Convention authorized the appointment of a committee to make a thoro study of the "discrimination" question and report its findings to the 1951 Convention.

On the recommendation of the Extension Committee, charters for Chapters Collegiate were granted to three petitioning locals:

Epsilon Eta, San Diego State College, San Diego, Calif., (installed as California Theta October 8);

Zeta Mu, Fresno State College, Fresno, Calif., (installed as California Iota October 15);

Rho Epsilon Chi (the Rex Club), Florida Southern College, Lakeland, Fla., (to be installed as Florida Gamma November 12).

Loyalty Fund Announced

The Thursday morning session of the Convention was thrilled by Alumni Secretary John O. Moseley's announcement that Judge Alfred K. Nippert, *Cincinnati* '94, past ESA, had offered to start a "Loyalty Fund." to serve the Fraternity in emergencies, with a gift of \$10,000, conditioned upon gifts of \$15,000 by others, so that the fund will get off to a flying start with \$25,000 in hand. At the dinner Thursday evening, subscriptions for Founders memberships at \$1,000 and Life Memberships at \$50, totaling approximately \$6,000, were announced. The majority of subscribers for Life Memberships were active members of Chapters Collegiate.

Award of Trophies

During the Convention, the award of trophies to Chapters Collegiate was announced as follows:

On the recommendation of the ESR, the Efficiency cup for the Chapter which had been most prompt in submitting reports and meeting financial obligations during the 1947-1949 biennium, was awarded to Pennsylvania Sigma-Phi, Dickinson College, with honorable mention for Alabama Mu, University of Alabama, and Illinois Beta, University of Illinois.

The report of the Committee on Scholarship showed

that Virginia Sigma, Washington and Lee University was the highest ranking SAE Chapter in 1947-48 and second in 1948-49 and that Minnesota Alpha, Univer sity of Minnesota was the highest ranking Chapter in 1948-49. The committee recommended that the names o both Chapters be engraved on the Scholarship cup, given by the Miami, Fla. Alumni Association, and that Minne sota Alpha be given custody of the cup during the year 1949-50. The Committee further recommended that hereafter this cup shall be awarded annually by th Supreme Council on the recommendation of the Scholarship Commissioner. The Committee recon mended that the Scholarship Improvement cup b awarded to Georgia Phi, Georgia Institute of Tecl nology, and that this cup be awarded annually by th Supreme Council on the recommendation of the Schola ship Commissioner.

The Committee also recommended that a special plaque be awarded to Washington Beta, Washington State College, as the highest ranking SAE Chapter durin 1947-48, under the ranking of the National Interfreternity Conference, based on the all-men academic ave age for each institution. All recommendations of the Committee were approved by the Convention.

On the recommendation of the Committee on Pullications, the Chapter Publication cup was awarded to




For outstanding service as President of Province Epsilon in 1902, as a member of the Supreme Council for 10 years during which he served as Eminent Supreme Deputy Archon, Eminent Supreme Recorder, Eminent Supreme Archon and Acting Eminent Supreme Recorder, his service in the last position being during the years, 1917-1918, while William C. Levere was in Europe as a YMCA Secretary with the American Expeditionary Forces, constituting a task of loyalty and sacrifice on his part which will always be remembered as one of the finest examples of devotion in time of need which the Fraternity has claimed from its sons.

GEORGE H. KRESS Ohio Epsilon 1896 (University of Cincinnati)

For outstanding service to the Fraternity as its first historian, being the author of the Sigma~Alpha~Epsilon~Manual, which appeared in 1904; as the co-author with his Chapter mate, Alfred K. Nippert, of the famous ΣAE song, "Sing, Brothers, Sing"; as the founder of the Los Angeles Alumni Association; and as a loyal worker in the ranks for more than half a century whose devotion earned the recognition given by the Mackinac Island National Convention of 1947 in electing him Honorary Eminent Supreme Archon.

LAUREN FOREMAN Georgia Epsilon 1901 (Emory University)

For exceptionally meritorious service to Sigma Alpha Epsilon as Archon of two Provinces, as a member of the Supreme Council, as Eminent Supreme Archon, and as a brilliant administrator for 16 years in the office of Eminent Supreme Recorder. It was he, when Eminent Supreme Archon, who appointed the building committee under whose efficient supervision the Levere Memorial Temple was erected, and it was due to his zealous husbanding of the funds of the Fraternity that the debt on the Temple was liquidated long before it was due. For more than 50 years he has faithfully and unselfishly served Sigma Alpha Epsilon, and has earned the love and respect not only of the brothers of his own fraternity, but also of those many members of other fraternities with whom he has come in contact in his long career.

15th School in Sunny California

Sigma Alpha Epsilon's 15th Leadership School, the first "away from home," just 2,300 miles from the site of its origin, the Levere Memorial Temple in Evanston, Ill., was off to a good start on the University of Southern California campus in Los Angeles, Tuesday afternoon, August 30, 1949, with 266 delegates and visitors mostly in sport shirts under the warm California sun, from 117 of the 124 Chapters and 20 administration and faculty members. Following registration and room assignment at Elizabeth von KleinSmid Hall, under the supervision of Glen T. Nygreen, U. of Wash. '39, and assisted by Emmett B. Moore, Mont. State '24, ESDA and Assistant Director of Leadership Training; John H. Baugh, Jr., Okla. A. & M. '35, assistant Chapter Supervisor; young ladies from the university and the Chamber of Commerce, movies were shown in the Law Building. These were handled by G. A. Ginter, Cincinnati '97, Eminent Supreme Archon, and Dr. Burton Hoffman, Northwestern '26, former Archon of Province Beta.

Immediately following a buffet supper in the Town and Gown Cafeteria, the delegation gathered in the lounge for a song fest with C. R. Samuelson, Neb. Stresses Leadership

(Editor's Note: The following excerpts are from a talk given by Sam C. Bullock, of Los Angeles, Calif., Grand Consul of Sigma Chi, at the 15th Leadership School of Sigma Alpha Epsilon in Los Angeles, September 3, 1949.)

"You are to be congratulated for a most progressive attitude that but speaks of enlightenment for your every member. You are doing much for the entire fraternity picture in these meetings. I am sure every one of us will get a better understanding of what fraternity really means when we take heed of the lessons so well advanced here, lessons which fraternity men everywhere will accept with understanding and approval. I congratulate Sigma Alpha Epsilon for providing a better understanding among all men in the Greek Letter World. I congratulate every man here for his interest and participation in these fine series of meetings. I congratulate you because in the college men of today we find the leaders of our nation tomorrow


"We find the hopes of the generation ahead of us and those who will keep Democracy alive, the Democracy that we know and appreciate. And let me emphasize that of those college men who will constitute the bulk of the leadership of this nation tomorrow, the greater percentage will be fraternity men. You men, whether you know it or not, are the hope of America. Don't take that statement lightly. You are on the threshold of a great adventure. You are the promise of this great country of North America. Wherever you are enrolled in classes, wherever may be your alma mater, there you are engaged in building for the tomorrow that will but emphasize that great word 'Democracy.'

"The destiny of our democracy is in your keeping. You must guard it well. You must

nourish it constantly. You must cherish it forever.

"There is nothing unreal about fraternities. Rather are they outstanding in their presentation of a philosophy of life. To many of us fraternity is little short of our religion. To gain the truths which fraternity would hold for us we must always strive for the highest attainment. We must remember, too, that to attain that pinnacle, we must give service. We must learn to sacrifice. Nothing is ever achieved without sacrifice.

"It would be well for us all to remember that the greatest asset of our fraternity is not our social prestige, not our age, not our great numbers, not our large endowment funds, not our beautiful Chapter houses, not our prominent members. Better should we remember that in building men, in building good citizens of this great country, are we emphasizing our right to be acknowledged leaders in the educational picture of American Collegiate life.'

Memorial Service



Quivey, Purdue '12, of Baltimore, Md., past ESA, who died on July 21, 1949. Prayers were offered by Chapter delegates for Mr. Quivey and Harry Bunting, Southwestern '91, past honorary ESA, who died December 2, 1948. Three members read Mr. Quivey's discussion of "The Songs of SAE," which was his regular spot on the school program's opening night for several years. "Violets" and "Friends" of which Mr. Quivey was author, were sung, Bud Jones of California Delta gave a solo of "Longing." The evening session closed with announcement of first meetings of committees and activity groups.




Tour Movieland

On Sunday the faculty members we the guests of Charles Reagan, Nev. '2 and Mrs. Reagan at their beautiful hom







Okla. Kappa Founder

• Dr. Edward Marsh Williams, Chicago '06, of Oskaloosa, Iowa, has retired from the medical field and is now located at his residence in Iowa. It is of interest to remind readers of Της Record that Dr. Williams, now 80 years of age, was largely responsible for the founding of Iota Tau local fraternity which became Oklahoma Kappa Chapter of ΣΑΕ at the University of Oklahoma in 1909.

For many years he had engaged in the practice of medicine and in state and local health organization work at Oskaloosa. The founding of Oklahoma Kappa grew out of most unusual circumstances. In 1904, when Paul A. Walker, Chicago '05, Okla., was a student at the University of Chicago, he knew Edward Marsh Williams who was teaching in the LaGrange, Ill. High School. The two exchanged visits frequently on weekends and on one occasion, when Walker was presumed to be with the Williams family, his roommate, Charles Berta, Chicago '05, discovered a stranger in Walker's room at the Chapter house.

When accosted by Berta, the stranger inquired about Paul. When Berta surmised that Walker had gone to LaGrange, the stranger said that he was Williams, Paul's cousin. The stranger then borrowed \$10.00 from Berta and said that he would return the money thru Paul. Of course that was the last seen of Paul's "cousin" or the \$10 bill.

It seemed that the "cousin" was a swindler and had worked a similar racket at several other houses. The following Saturday a young man called to see Walker when both he and Berta were absent from the house. When he said that his name was Williams, Harry Mock, Franklin '04, Chicago, decided on a plan to keep the swindler in the house until Walker and Berta returned When Walker came back, he was informed that the swindler had been caught. Imagine Walker's surprise when he walked into the dining room and found his friend Williams surrounded by most the Chapter members who were amazed to see Walker greet Williams.

In spite of the unusual circumstances, Williams never forgot the fine treatment he received nor did he forget the impressions made on him by the members of Illinois Theta. Later Williams was initiated by the Chapter. He then went to the University of Oklahoma as head of the pathology department. He was so fired with enthusiasm for his fraternity that he began casting about immediately for suitable material for the organization of a local fraternity pledged to petition ΣAE .

Mr. Walker was then located at Shawnee, Okla., as principal of the City High School. The two often visited and talked about the desirability of establishing a Chapter at Oklahoma. Shortly thereafter Dr. Williams organized Iota-Tau which eventually became Oklahoma Kappa.

Editor's Note: Dr. Williams died at Mercy Hospital in Oskaloosa, Iowa, May 17, 1949, after an extended illness, according to word received from Paul A, Walker, Chicago '05, who contributed the above information and who had been in Paris, France, for the summer.

 When shells destroyed the library of the University of Louvain, Belgium, 900.000
 books were lost. The Research Institute of Medical History at Charles University, Prague, Czechoslovakia, lost 16,000 of its prewar 20,000 books. The library of the University of Caen, France, was destroyed. More than 150,000 books were lost at the University of Vienna. The figures tell the story of the staggering wartime loss of books abroad, a loss that began with the Nazis' book-burnings, a loss that swelled when libraries were caught in the crossfires of battle. These are the reasons that led CARE, the non-profit agency which has delivered millions of food and textile packages overseas, to add a book program thru which Americans can help rebuild the war-wrecked libraries of Europe and Asia. Because the education of future leaders is vital to the reconstruction of the world, CARE's book program is aimed at supplying educational institutions with gifts of new scientific and technical books. Universities, libraries and technical schools in 14 countries are submitting lists of their book needs to CARE. With the funds made available by organizations and individuals here, CARE is then filling those needs as closely as possible by purchasing the latest and best scientific and technical books published in English. This new CARE "Food for the Mind" plan has been approved by the State Department's Advisory Committee on Voluntary Aid and is being carried out in cooperation with UNESCO. No used books car be accepted. 



Besser-Lindsey Award

Chapters having members of the 1949 senior class who can qualify for the Besser-Lindsey Award should send their credentials in as soon as possible, so that this honor may go to the deserving member and to the Chapter.

In 1924 this award was conceived by Edwin E. Besser, Northwestern '16, and J. Frank Lindsey, Ind. '13, who presented to Sigma Alpha Epsilon five hundred beautiful medals, handsomely engraved with suitable inscriptions, to be awarded at the fulfillment of the conditions to a senior in any Chapter. The donors were interested solely in promoting leadership in the three great phases of college life-scholarship, fraternity, and athletics. This award is one of the great honors that may come to a member of the fraternity during his four years of college life.

Qualifications: Only one senior per year in each Chapter is eligible for the award. There are three credentials necessary before the committee can pass upon the qualifications of any given candidate: (1) a statement from the athletic department of the college or university to the effect that the candidate has received two major letters in any given sport; (2) a statement from the registrar or corresponding officer of the college or university to the effect that the candidate has averaged 80 or thereabouts in scholarship during his college career; (3) a statement from the Chapter to the effect that the candidate has held office in the Chapter or has been an outstanding man on the campus and in the Chapter.

He went with the B&O as agricultural agent immediately after his graduation and served in that capacity until 1918 when he resigned to enter the U.S. Army. Discharged in 1919 as first lieutenant, he went with the Kansas City Chamber of Commerce as agricultural commissioner. He gave up this place in February, 1921, to become grand secretary of the Fraternity but resigned in July of that year to return to the B&O. He was highly regarded in his field and had served as president of the Railway Development Association, a national organization of railway development officers.

Attended Many Affairs

He was a delegate to the Pittsburgh Convention of 1916 and attended numerous other conventions and celebrations. He was an accomplished ritualist and no initiation or Founders Day dinner at Indiana Beta was considered complete without him. On moving to Kansas City, he took a lively interest in the alumni association and was made vice president. When the Central Office was established at Evanston, he was selected by William C. Levere, Northwestern '98, ESR, as Grand Secretary, being the only man ever to hold this office. Altho his service in this office was brief, its value was recognized by his election as Eminent Supreme Herald at the Detroit Convention of 1922. He was elected Eminent Supreme Deputy Archon at the Atlanta Convention of 1924, altho illness prevented his attendance, and was re-elected by the Boston Convention of 1926. He was elected Eminent Supreme Archon by the Miami Convention of 1928 and served during the

years, 1929 and 1930. He was the installing officer for Rhode Island Alpha at Rhode Island State College February 23, 1929. and for Vermont Beta at the University of Vermont, March 2, 1929.

During his administration as ESA, construction of the Levere Memorial Temple was started and completed. He turned the first spadeful of earth at the ground-breaking on June 22, 1929, and presided at the dedication services. December 28, 1930.

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
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
