

INDIANA BETA—This 62-year-old Chapter was chartered at Purdue University in Lafayette, Ind., May 18, 1893, and thus the Chapter is having a birthday this month. The huge home high on a hill materialized in 1922-23 when the old house was torn down. "The Mansion" as it was called in early days cost \$48,000 unfurnished. The Chapter, established just 31 years after the founding of Purdue, has grown with the university and among its list of prominent alumni are such names as the late O. K. Quivey, Past ESA; the late Matthew Luckiesh, lighting wizard; Etheridge B. Baugh, executive secretary of the Purdue Alumni Association; Willis B. Dye of Kokomo. Ind. The Chapter has produced many football stars including Johnny Drake, '37, of professional fame.

IDAHO ALPHA—This Chapter was chartered at the University of Idaho in Moscow on November 1, 1919. The house built on a large tract of land overlooking the campus was completed in 1933. The architect's drawing appeared in The Record in September of that year. Among the Chapter's prominent alumni are U.S. Representative Sam H. Coon, '25, of the 2nd Oregon District; Richard H. Kube, '43. Archon of Province Phi, and Maj. Reginald R. Myers, '41, Congressional Medal of Honor winner.

FOSS RECEIVES SIMILAR AWARD IN SOUTH DAKOTA

A diamond badge was also presented to Gov. Joe Foss, S.D. Sigma '40 (South Dakota), by Dr. Chester D. Lee, ESA, of Ames, Iowa, at a banquet in the Union Building at the University of South Dakota, Vermillion, on Sunday, April 17, 1955, Details of the event will be carried in the August issue of The Record.

THE BIGGEST event in the young history of Florida Beta at Florida State University, Tallahassee, took place on March 22, the month of the Chapter's sixth birthday, when a diamond studded badge of Sigma Alpha Epsilon was placed over the heart of the new governor of Florida, LeRoy Collins, Tenn. Lambda '31 (Cumberland).

The presentation for the National Fraternity was made by John O. Moseley, $Okla.\ Kappa$ '16 (Oklahoma), $Calif.\ Alpha$ (Stanford), Eminent Supreme Recorder, of Evanston, Ill., representing the Supreme Council. It is customary for the fraternity to present a jewelled badge to each new governor who is a member of ΣAE .

ESR Moseley arrived in Tallahassee on Sunday, March 20, prior to the ceremony, to visit with Governor Collins and help organize the ceremony with the Chapter. On Monday night he presided at the initiation of Carmen Battaglia of Niagara Falls, N.Y.

Presentation of the badge was made at a banquet in the Suwanee Banquet Hall of Florida State University in the presence of 150 invited guests. Among the guests were Province Epsilon officers, Eminent Archons of Chapters in

Upon receiving the badge Governor Collins gave a brief but inspiring talk about the universality of ΣAE and the uncountable benefits both material and mental which can be reaped from membership. Stassen Named Arms Adviser

Harold Stassen, Minn. Alpha '29 (Minnesota), former governor Minnesota, has taken over the task of working out the policies which will guide the United States in disarmament matters in the atomic weapons age. He was appointed to this position by President Eisenhower on March 19. Stassen has the title of "special assistant to the president." He was foreign operations administrator at the time of the new call but continued with this despite immediately taking over the additional duties. This lasted until he gave his mutual security program to Congress in April. FOA will expire in June unless Congress extends its

Caffery Quits after 44 Years

♦ After 44 years of diplomatic service, which started out as a "lark," Jefferson Caffery, La. Tau-Upsilon '06 (Tulane), has retired from his most recent post as ambassador to Egypt. He retired on February 28 after serving in most of the world's hot spots and coming close to death "only twice," as he puts it. At 68 Caffery looks like only a slightly mellowed version of the adventure-seeking youngster who quit Louisiana plantation life in 1911 to roam the globe. He held the rank of ambassador longer than any other man-20 years. He plans to return to his home in Lafayette, La., temporarily and write a book.

NEW JUSTICE-Earl B. Smith, Idaho Alpha '19 (Idaho), who was recently named a justice of the Idaho Supreme Court. He practiced law in Idaho from 1923 until 1954 when he was appointed justice. He served as commissioner of the State Bar from 1942 until 1948 and was president in 1945 and 1948.

1st "Presidential Candidate"

Merle Thorpe, Calif. Alpha '05 (Stanford), former editor of Nation's Business and now executive of Cities Service Company was nominated as a candidate for the 'presidency of the United States" by the Alfalfa Club of Washington, D.C., at a dinner in January. The club has entertained its members and guests for 42 years with the annual "Alfalfa Party" and stages a mock political convention to nominate a "candidate." The nomination is followed by an acceptance speech from the nominee who spoofs the Administration, its "loyal opposition," and Washington affairs in general. President Eisenhower was at the head table with members of the Cabinet. Mr. Thorpe's acceptance speech was printed in the U.S. News & World Report, February 11, 1955.

Heads Engineering Firm

♦ Dr. James Hodge, Ohio Rho '21 (Case), is president of the Wellman Engineering Company in Cleveland, Ohio, having been named to this position in November. He stepped up from the executive vice-presidency of Wellman which he joined in 1940 and succeeds Alfred E. Gibson, Ohio Theta '09 (Ohio State), who retired as president but remains as a consultant. Dr. Hodge has devoted much time to the fields of metallurgy and industrial welding processes. Mr. Gibson will devote a lot of his time to YMCA work. He has done much international Y contact work on his world travels.

Three Pan American Wins

William Kerslake, Ohio Rho '51 (Case), of Cleveland, Ohio, won the heavyweight wrestling championship of the Pan American games by defeating Eruro Meneses of Mexico in one minute and 25 seconds, in March. Kerslake became the first ever to win three consecutive national AAU heavyweight wrestling titles. He finished fifth in the 1952 Olympics, Franklin ("Bud") Held, Calif. Alpha '50 (Stanford), world record holder in the javelin from Los Angeles, won the javelin event with a toss of 228 feet, 11 inches, shattering the Pan-American record of 223-43/8 set by Ricardo Heber of Argentina in 1951. Fortune Gordian, Minn. Alpha '51 (Minnesota), hurled the discus 175 feet, 21/2 inches, to win the event and a new Pan-American games record in Mexico City.

A Young Man of the Year

Ben Carpenter, Texas Rho '48 (Texas), executive vice president and director of the Southland Insurance Company, was among five young Texans to be selected by the Texas Junior Chamber of Commerce as the state's outstanding young men of 1954. The Southland Insurance Company is one of the largest in the country and soon will build a center in Dallas comparable to Rockefeller Center in New York. In World War II Mr. Carpenter won a combat award, the Silver Star, as an officer in the China-Burma-India theater. He is also president and general manager of The Crockett Company, general manager of extensive farm and ranch properties in six Texas counties and a director in the American Brahman Breeders Association, the National Finance Credit Corporation and the Texas Livestock Marketing Association.

What's in a Name—Faulkner?

The famous name Faulkner has caused confusion in the National Office of Sigma Alpha Epsilon for many years as the fraternity has quite a list of members by the name of Faulkner or Falkner (spelled without the "u"). The well-known writers, William Faulkner, Miss Gamma '19 (Mississippi), and John W. T., Faulkner, III, Miss. Gamma '29, spell their name with the "u," and the fraternity's current records are labeled accordingly but both names appear in the 1929 Directory as Falkner. Why all this confusion has never been explained. However, a recent newspaper article featuring the mother of William and John as a tamous painter in her own field may

throw some light on it. The article read: "It is no mistake that she (Maud Falkner) spells her name 'Falkner' while her writing sons spell it 'Faulkner.' Col. William Clark Falkner, grandfather of Mrs. Falkner, dropped the 'u' many years ago. He was the railroad builder, lawyer and politician who wrote as a hobby, and his long novel, White Rose of Memphis is still read in the mid-south. Mrs. Falkner who is 82 estimates she has painted about 500 pictures since 1941 and has sold most of them." She earns her own living and lives alone in the big house built by her late husband in Oxford, Miss. William Faulkner's controversial novel, A Fable, won the National Book award at the sixth annual awards ceremonies in New York in January. His Collected Stories won the award in 1951.

The \$300,000 mansion is a one-story typhoon-proof structure built on a hillside. The Governor and Mrs. Elvidge opened the Governor's annual charity ball on Guam, December 11, 1954. Governor Elvidge was featured in newspapers last fall in connection with elections on the island. One article stated: "Guam natives, who are citizens of the U.S., but can't vote in our general election, will have their own island election on November 2 to pick 21 legislators. Approved bills become law on Guam after they are approved by the legislature and signed by Governor Elvidge, a Seattle lawyer who received his appointment from President Eisenhower in March, 1953."

Benezet Heads Colorado College







A PERSON CANNOT stand watching the tremendous power being generated at Niagara Falls without also realizing that much of it is not being used. Likewise, as we look at the tremendous power we have among the unused alumni in Sigma Alpha Epsilon, do we realize that something must be done about this part of fraternity activity.

At our last national convention your National Alumni Committee was instructed to take immediate steps to formalize a program that would lead to the eventual enlistment of every possible alumnus in an effective working relationship with our active Chapters. To that end the committee was appointed from every part of Minerva's realm.

During the past six months many general bulletins and letters have been issued to Alumni Associations and Chapters soliciting their help in establishing new alumni associations and reactivating old ones at the same time outlining the proper procedures. A goal has been established for each present alumni group to found at least one new association by the 100th Anniversary of Sigma Alpha Epsilon on March 9, 1956.

Since the reorganization of our Provinces last year many more Province Alumni Secretaries have been elected. These members have elected in many cases to have Alumni Secretaries in each state selected to carry on in a more effective manner. In order to assist these many members in their efforts, the National Office has supplied a great many lists of alumni by towns and cities so that we can find where our members are living currently and so that we may contact them in forming new units of work.

Many Chapters have appointed an alumni chairman, whose responsibility it is to bring up-to-date his own Chapter's

alumni roll and issue a current directory. This part of the work has been very important as we have many thousands of alumni who are in our lost files. As these addresses are corrected we again hope to see these brothers become active and start receiving once more their copies of The Record which must of necessity have been discontinued.

More and more of our Chapters are turning to the use of the Chapter Advisory System. Under this plan a Chapter uses a number of interested alumni to advise the Chapter officers and members in their various duties and obligations. Special attention is given to such things as rushing, pledging and pledge training, finances, scholarship and Chapter administration. Many hours of counseling and advice have been given cheerfully and advisedly. Many weak Chapters have been strengthened materially and in some cases strong Chapters have been prevented from slipping into the sickly class.

Under the impetus of the stepped-up Alumni Program more and more brothers are paying up their Life Memberships in the Chapter National. Any brother, by writing to the National Office, can find what his balance is. The income from the investment of these Life Memberships is a source of very effective income in the running of our national organization.

The members of the Supreme Council and the National Alumni Committee are intensely interested in making this program useful, helpful and effective. As requests are received for help, every effort is made to see that the requests are granted. Such a program of enlistment and cooperation reaches out to every loyal initiate whether he be young or old. Each Founders Day finds some re-awakened brother ready to start again.

A PAGE FROM THE RECORDER'S BOOK

DECENTRALIZATION:

THE WATCHWORD FOR THE NEXT HUNDRED YEARS

A FRIEND RECENTLY asked, "What is the next big forward step in fraternity work?" Without hesitation I replied, "Decentralization." "Why! we are decentralized NOW," he said, "our fraternity is just now getting centralized." "That's just it," I assured him, "first of all you have to build up a strong central organization and then you can begin to decentralize. Centralization, and then decentralization, as the slogan

makers would put it."

I have thought about that conversation many times lately. It does seem like a foggy idea that you must be strong centrally before you can build up strength locally. That is just exactly what Sigma Alpha Epsilon has been doing during the past forty years. Oh, yes, I know that we have had elements of strength locally through these years, some stronger in some places than in others. I thought of my friend and his aspirations for a strong central government for his fraternity. His fraternity is not a newcomer to the Greek letter field by any means, but somehow or other it never has built up a very strong central organization. Very properly he and the other national officers of that faternity are thinking in terms of central office building, Chapter supervisors and the many other things that go along with building up a central government for a national college fraternity.

No doubt about it, Sigma Alpha Epsilon can claim to have a strong central organization. Perhaps it would not be too much to say that ΣAE is probably the most closely supervised of all national college fraternities. It all goes back to the Nashville National Convention of 1885, where the Supreme Council Form of Government was inaugurated, and to the St. Louis Convention of 1920, where the Centralization Plan was put into effect, and to the outstanding work of our first full time General Secretary, William C. Levere.

I think often of the work which Billy Levere did in building a national spirit in Sigma Alpha Epsilon. In addition to running the Central Office as Eminent Supreme Recorder, he was also the Editor of THE RECORD, the National Treasurer, a member of the Supreme Council, and in addition to all of these duties, managed to visit every Chapter in the Fraternity at least once every two years. Someone will say that the Fraternity was small at that time. It is true that it was smaller, but not small. The Fraternity was just as widespread as it is now and travel was more time consuming and tedious than it is now. No wonder Billy went to an early grave in trying to keep up with everything that can happen in an aggressive, wide awake, modern college fraternity.

Just exactly what is this decentralization which is to be the watchword of the second hundred years? In brief, it means the taking away of much responsibility and authority from the Central Office and placing it on Province, state and local levels. where it properly belongs. It is absurd to think that a Central Office, no matter how completely and efficiently manned, can maintain the prestige of Sigma Alpha Epsilon in every section of the country. It can't even keep down the pagan practices of hell week, or keep up a decent standard of scholarship-to say nothing of seeing to it that local tradesmen are promptly paid their just debts.

It has long been observed that the socalled great Chapters of SAE have very close ties with their alumni, both in an official capacity as Chapter advisors and as just plain, old fashioned, interested alumni who are willing to work without office, or title, or praise, or even thanks. By the same token, it has been noticed time without end that the Chapters which habitually get into trouble scholastically and financially do not have local alumni to keep them in the straight and narrow path. In addition to the regularly appointed Chapter advisors, every Chapter needs to have a solid corps of hard working alumni, who are willing to rush to the scene of every disaster to put out the fire when one happens to the Chapters which they serve. It's these buck privates in the rear ranks who really do the work. I believe that I can count on my fingers and toes the Chapters of SAE which really have such a fire squadron as I have just described. It will not suffice to enumerate the prominent and interested alumni possessed by a Chapter. Nor is it the same thing to count some alumnus who has a great name for being a fraternity worker and yet allows a Chapter next door to him to go badly into debt.

Let us consider some of the preparatory steps taken by SAE in this next great progressive movement toward decentralization. First of all, the Leadership School in its true nature is simply an attempt to standardize many of the operations of the Fraternity and many Chapter practices, but above all, to put men in the various localities who have had this training and experience and will be able to pass these traditions on to the Chapters to which they owe loyalty. The multiple Chapter Advisory System, about which much has been written in recent years, is another attempt to put more workers in the field at the scene of action. I hope to devote an entire page in some succeeding issue of THE RECORD to this definite step toward decentralization.

Reorganized and revitalized House Corporations constitute another step toward decentralization. I would dearly love to see the day when every Chapter of Sigma

Alpha Epsilon has a well organized House Corporation with Constitution and By-Laws; with a charter from the state, and a Board of Directors elected annually and on the job every day. I do not ever expect to see it, but at least you can't keep a fellow from wishing. Often the question is asked, why is it that some Chapters have big, fine houses and are able to pay their bills promptly and, by the same token, promptly and regularly collect the money which is owed to them. One does not have to look far for the answer to that question. It is in the House Corporation. Everyone knows that Chapters which have good House Corporations, and have had them for thirty or forty years, have very little financial trouble; and those Chapters which struggle along with some quiescent corporation, or none at all, are always the ones which are calling on their alumni in a scattered and diverse fashion to help them with contribution to pay for dead horses.

At the last National Convention, one great forward step toward decentralization was taken, namely the division of the Provinces. Some further division should be made now: and of course as the years roll on we will see much more province division as Chapters are added to the Fraternity.

The final answer to the problem of decentralization is wrapped up in the phrase: "The Hero Alumnus." Decentralization is not something that is done all at once. As I told my friend, the patterns of centralization have been fairly well crystallized by the various fraternities; and that can come on without too much delay. Then I told him that I would be very happy if in the next one hundred years we would be completely decentralized. By that I mean, every Chapter with a metiple advisory system, a realistic House Corporation, a devoted housemother, an auditor with authority, a Province Archon near at hand, and above all, that strong corps of hard-working alumni, who are ready to step in at a moment's notice and solve the problems of a Chapter Collegiate.

And so we see that decentralization comes slowly. It also will come in spots one locality at a time. Every SAE takes real pride in the pin which he wears. He wants every wearer of it to represent in his person all of the attributes of the True Gentleman. Is it not a worthy project for the second hundred years that we should build around every SAE Chapter those coercive influences which will guarantee that it will not slip from the straight and narrow path leading toward the ideals of the Founders? Then for the third hundred years, we can really start climbing toward those ideals.

The distinguished service award to General Carl Gray read: "Initiated by Missouri Beta Chapter of Sigma Alpha Epsilon, September 27, 1907; affiliated with Illinois Beta Chapter, October 20, 1909; A.B., the University of Illinois, 1911, Carl Gray has served his fraternity with honor and distinction, as active member, Chapter officer, Convention delegate and Honorary Eminent Supreme Archon.

"An able railroad official, whose Epsilon, he has given unselfishly of his time, his talents, and his financial resources, in the promotion of the best interests of the fraternity and the assistance of his brethren.

"An able railroad official, whose services were called upon for active duty with the Armed Forces of the United States, in national emergencies, he served with honor and distinction as Captain, Major and Lieutenant Colonel in World War I. as Director General, Military Railway Service in North Africa, Italy, and Southern France, and in the European Theater of Operations, in World War II, he was given the rank of Major General and received the highest commendations and citations of both his country and its allies.

"As administrator of Veterans Affairs, he served with great ability. December 31, 1947-June 30, 1953, when he retired to write his book. "Railroading in Eighteen Countries."

the fire is as yet undetermined in that when the blaze was first discovered on the third floor of the fraternity house, the smoke was so dense that it was impossible to ascertain the origin. The members and members of neighboring fraternities formed a human chain to remove as much furniture and contents as possible during the fire. Loss is tentatively estimated on contents at \$4,000.00, although no accurate figure can be given until an appraisal and inventory are completed.

Loss to the three story brick veneer structure is estimated from \$35,000.00 to \$45,-000.00, although a complete investigation may reveal different figures. The house is covered by \$88,000.00 fire insurance and contents are insured to approximately \$6,000.00. Greatest loss was suffered on the third floor, which was almost completely gutted. The heavy slate roof collapsed in several places leaving the house exposed to the weather. A temporary roof was installed immediately.

The Chapter house underwent extensive improvement last summer, at which time a new dining room, kitchen, shower room and quarters for the housemother were added. Most of the new portions of the house escaped damage and, aside from minor water damage to these parts, the new sections can be used again immediately. All sleeping quarters with the exception of one room on the second floor over the loggia and the new housemother's quarters were left unfit for occupancy. The dining room operations, however, resumed on Thursday, March 31, through the competent and strenuous work of the housemother, Mrs. B. H. Barrett, and the Chapter members and pledges. Plans for rehabilitation of the house were begun by the House Corporation headed by H. M. Harton the day after the fire.


