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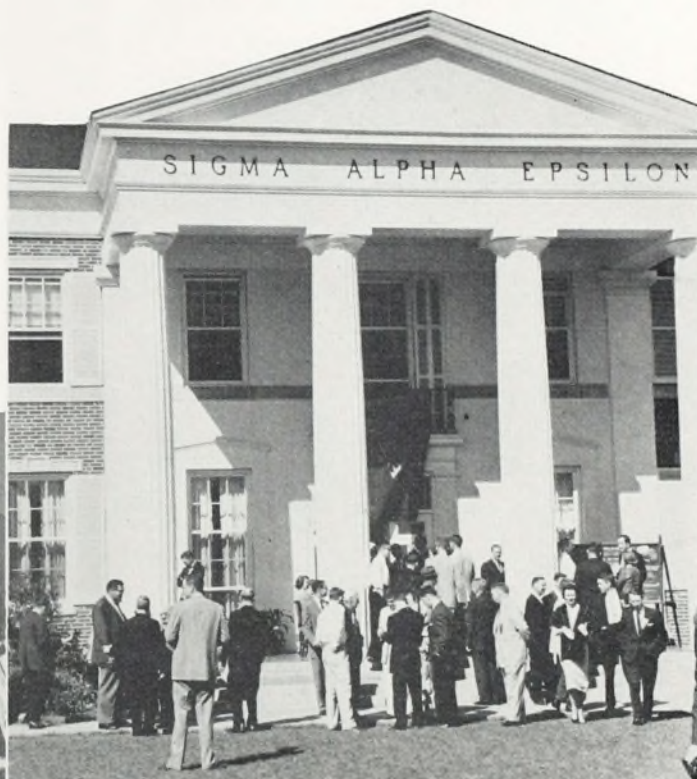

Perfect weather and precision program planning allowed members, relatives and friends of Sigma Alpha Epsilon to leisurely and thoroughly enjoy celebrating the fraternity's 100th birthday at its founding site, Tuscaloosa, Alabama, Friday, March 9, 1956.

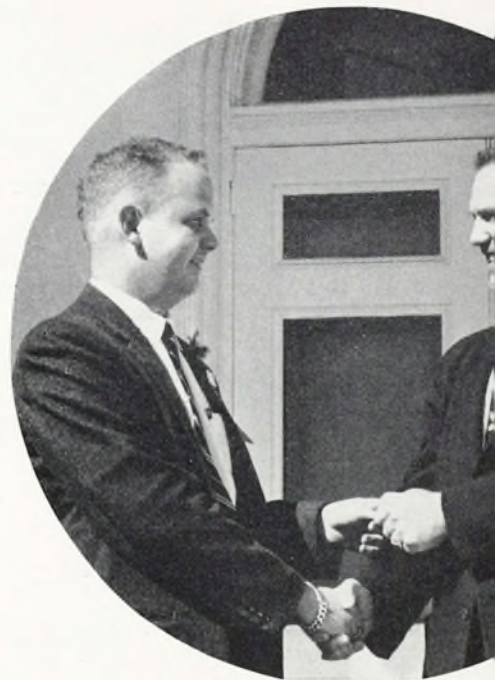
Thousands of members throughout the country shared in the Tuscaloosa celebration as they were able to "listen in" to a closed circuit hour's broadcast in the Alabama Union on the University of Alabama campus. While 425 persons banqueted and listened to the dramatic story of Sigma Alpha Epsilon in Tuscaloosa, 450 were sharing the same experience at the Edgewater Beach Hotel in Chicago, 500 in Des Moines, Iowa, 400 in Denver, Colo., 250 in New York City, 300 in Los Angeles, and some 90 other cities throughout the country as 100 Chapters and Alumni Associations had contracted with the National Fraternity to join in the hook-up by American Telephone and Telegraph Company of Chicago.

Activities started, in "Tushkalusa" (Tuscaloosa having been named from the most famous Creek Indian chief of the area, Chief Tushkalusa), leading city of West Alabama, on Thursday, March 8, when hundreds of persons arrived for registration and a tour of the \$250,000 Alabama Mu Chapter house and DeVotie Hall, a wing of the house dedicated to Noble Leslie DeVotie and the other seven Founders of the Fraternity in 1856.

On hand to greet the visitors and plan their stay in Tuscaloosa's attractive motels, motor courts and university buildings, were members of the Centennial Committee, Tom McClellan of Birmingham, chairman and Eminent Archon of Alabama Mu; Edward G. Hathcock of Beverly Hills, co-chairman and Eminent Supreme Archon, and other members of the Supreme Council, Leo S. Cade of Oklahoma City, Howard P. Falls of Richmond, Va., Arther L. Beck of Buffalo, N.Y., and Dr. Glen T. Nygreen of Kent State University; Lauren Foreman of Evanston, Ill., Acting Eminent Supreme Recorder; Albert J. Schoth, Chapter Supervisor; Don Gable of Evanston, Ill., Editor of THE RECORD and general Centennial Committee assistant; Chapter Committee, James B. Mercer, John W. Harrison, Barrie H. Thrasher, Jr., and William G. Thames; other members of Alabama Mu; Mrs. Louise Moore, house mother; members of the Minerva Club who had completed furnishing the Chapter library and prepared floral arrangements. ### DeVotie Hall Dedicated

Everybody then gathered in front of the Alabama Mu Chapter house for the colorful dedication of DeVotie Hall. A large cement cornerstone had been placed to the left of the entrance of the hall for the befitting occasion. The plaque is carved with the names of the Founders and the founding date. Presenting the key to the DeVotie Hall was ESA Hathcock and recipient of the key in the brilliant sun and cool breeze was EA McClellan who had directed completion of the interior of the hall with funds provided by the National Fraternity.

Many photographs for newspapers and other publications and personal use were taken during the ceremony. A reception line was then formed at the entrance of DeVotie Hall. The receiving line was made up of Faculty Adviser and Mrs. Garner, EA McClellan, members of the Supreme Council and their wives, Acting ESR and Mrs. Foreman and Housemother Moore. More than 1,200 persons inspected the house and 600 signed the two separate guests books, one for the Chapter and the other to be placed in the archives of the Levere Memorial Temple, national shrine, in Evanston.

These more than 1,200 people were able to view the beautiful memorial completely decorated in purple and gold including a tremendous purple rug, gold walls and draperies, purple and gold chairs and lamps and a handsome conference table and altar with purple velvet draw curtains for the altar. Portraits of the Founders provided by the National Fraternity had been appropriately identified with bronze plates.

With the university highly represented by officials including the president and his wife, 16 campus national fraternities were represented along with 18 sororities. Alumni and active members from 28 states, the District of Columbia and the Canal Zone (Thomas C. Peterson, Wis. Phi (Beloit) '53, Ala. Iota (Birmingham-Southern), of Cristobal, C.Z.), gave their signatures and 48 different Chapters were represented.

Highnote of the Centennial celebration finally came at 6 o'clock Friday night, March

9, when more than 400 persons gathered in the dining halls of the Alabama Union to dine and enjoy a brief program prior to the Centennial broadcast.

Following the invocation ESA Hathcock introduced Scott Hollaender, *Ohio Theta '47* (Ohio State), of Phoenix, Ariz., who had revamped the broadcast script from the original manuscript prepared by Dr. John O. Moseley, ESR and Past ESA, prior to his death in October, 1955. Hathcock then read a resolution from the Legislature of Alabama in honor of the Fraternity, followed by a telegram from Judge Walter B. Jones of Montgomery, Ala., Past ESA, who was confined to the hospital. Past ESA Torrance then gave a few words on "The Accepted Leaders of ΣΑΕ." ESA Hathcock referred to the work of the late Dr. Moseley in his plans for this particular program, and stated that it was "really Moseley's program." ESCh. Nygreen, Director of Leadership Training, succeeding Dr. Moseley, described Director Moseley's fraternal spirit and his recognition in the interfraternity world. This was followed by a silent prayer on behalf of Moseley as the pioneer leadership school leader.

### Then Comes History

After inspirational words from President Carmichael, Past ESA Nippert gave a 30-

minute account of the history of the fraternity. He stated: "It would be quite a trick to present 100 years of an organization in 30 minutes, covering the high spots, discouragements, tears, blood of wars, struggle for Southern independence, no reconstruction—just destruction; now the fraternity is on the ashes of the old." He introduced Past ESAs Austin and J. Washington Moore, referring to their unforgettable places in history. He made reference to the late William C. Levere, Past ESA and ESR, to his plans for the Levere Memorial Temple, and to

Arthur H. Knox, Temple architect. He stated that no one could visualize the magnificence of the Temple until he had seen it. Past ESA Nippert gave credit to Acting ESR Foreman for his work with the Temple's finances and to Editor Don Gable for his centennial issue of *THE RECORD*.

And thus the "ΣΑΕ Story" was on the air that night in Tuscaloosa with members, wives, families and friends finding themselves under a spell for a full hour. At the end comments spread throughout the banquet hall. "Very dramatic; never realized the real thought behind the founding of the fraternity; wish I had heard this before I was initiated; I'll leave here a much better ΣΑΕ; too long, I should say not; I'll admit I had tears in my eyes at times; it made me tingle," etc. And so the story went, details of which will be presented elsewhere in this issue and recordings in album form will be presented to the Chapters as a result of demands. It is hard to believe that the actual voices of fraternity leaders and leaders of the U.S. were heard including Senator Russell, Governor Clement, Harold Stassen, Governor Foss, Bobby Jones, Dick Powell, Rudy Vallee, Robert Young, the latter who said: "If an organization like ΣΑΕ can go on for 100 years, it deserves to go on forever."

### ESA Hathcock Praised

Following the broadcast a standing applause was given to ESA Hathcock and his

# TEXAS EPSILON INSTALLATION AT UNIVERSITY OF HOUSTON

HOUSTON, TEXAS • FEB. 4, 1956  
139th CHAPTER IN 46 STATES

AS THE MONTH of February began its reign for 1956, it was ushered in by storms of varying degrees over the Southwest and for those in Houston, Texas, working for and awaiting the date for the installation of the 139th Chapter of Sigma Alpha Epsilon at the University of Houston.

It was an anxious period and all wondered what changes might be necessitated because of the inclement weather in this and the surrounding area. However, nature saw fit to honor ΣAE and all were pleased to see February 4, 1956, a bright clear day, which was entirely fitting for this eventful day, and though attendance was lessened to some degree from the Chapters in Texas and the others in Province Sigma, all members who had planned to assist in the initiation and installation, arrived, though some at a later time than originally planned.

The Kappa Delta Kappa Fraternity, local group on the University of Houston campus, had been granted a charter by a mail ballot which was completed in early De-

ember. When the ballots had been counted and the results were affirmative for the local group, the Supreme Council immediately selected Howard P. Falls, *Va. Tau '33* (Richmond), ESW, as the installing officer and Morris K. Womack, *Va. Omicron, Texas Rho* (Texas), representing the Houston Alumni Association of Sigma Alpha Epsilon, was chosen as the Houston co-ordinator and worked closely with the Chapter, the alumni and the National office. Womack was ably assisted in his work by Jerry Slaughter, of *W.C. Rho* (Geo. Wash.), a student of the university of Houston, who had been very active in working with the Kappa Delta Kappa group. John Baugh, Chapter Supervisor, was in charge of making necessary arrangements and worked with the above mentioned and also closely with Ralph R. Carlin, Archon of Province Sigma. These members had the assistance of Frank T. Abraham, president of the Houston Alumni Association, the many members of the association and the

officers of both the active and alumni groups of Kappa Delta Kappa.

### *Preliminary Work*

Preliminary indoctrination was held for the group by John Baugh, who visited the Chapter in early January and with the assistance of the above men, formally pledged the men of Kappa Delta Kappa to ΣAE, and put the group through a series of talks and an examination was given which included all phases of the fraternity available at that time to them, and as a final measure the local men wrote a Topoi, in keeping with the early tradition of the Founders. During the period of indoctrination the Kappa Delta Kappa Chapter held an Open House one afternoon and early evening at which time the opportunity was given for the ΣAE alumni of Houston to again meet the men of the Chapter and the alumni of the local Chapter.

This cooperation is ever needed and it is indeed a challenge to all concerned and it is the wish and prayer of all that Texas Epsilon will have a glorious future and will ever be a strong link in the chain of Chapters in the Realm of Minerva.

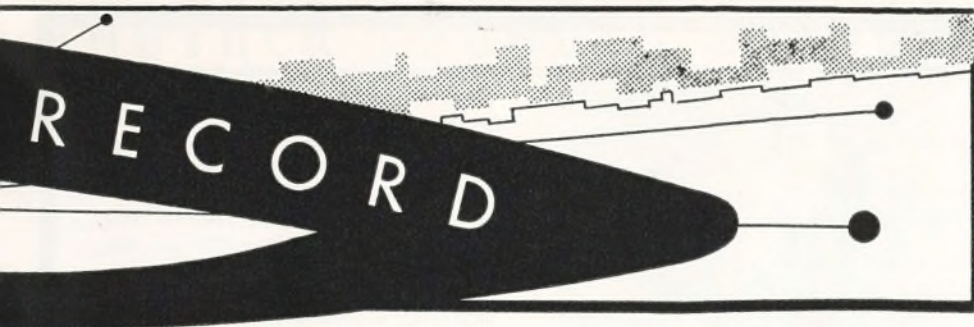

# JOHN O. MOSELEY



EDITOR'S NOTE: This obituary was written by George C. McGhee, *Texas Delta '33* (SMU), of Dallas, Texas, and was submitted at the request of the editor for publication in the January issue of the *American Oxonian*. Mr. McGhee, former assistant secretary of state, was named ambassador to Turkey in 1951 and was believed to be the youngest diplomat in service at the time. He was assisted in his career by the late John Moseley, Past ESA and ESR, and they were well acquainted as Rhodes Scholars.

DR. JOHN O. MOSELEY (Oklahoma and Merton, '17) died on the evening of October 10, 1955 at the age of 62, at the Presbyterian Hospital in Chicago, after suffering a heart attack on September 27. At the time of his death Dr. Moseley was living in Evanston, Illinois, and serving as the Executive Secretary of his social fraternity, Sigma Alpha Epsilon. He is survived by his wife, Marie Nichols Moseley; a son, John Nichols Moseley; a daughter, Margaret (Mrs. William J.) Newman; two grandsons; and two sisters.

John Moseley's death was widely recorded in the press of the nation, which cited the varied accomplishments of this remarkable man as an educator, scholar, and fraternity worker. In academic and fraternity circles John Moseley has been and will be accorded the honors due a man who has attained the highest distinction in his chosen life's work.

But there was in John Moseley's passing a much greater loss. Few men have had such a capacity for friendship, and his friends were legion. To the thousands of young men and young men grown to be older men all across the nation, who had known John Moseley the wise counselor and friend, his death left a great void. In their hearts and minds there will always remain the memory of this warm, kindly man—with such a zest for life—and who gave that life in unselfish service.

John Moseley was indeed a classicist and teacher of the first order, having taught for over 35 years in the public schools and in institutions of higher learning, principally as a teacher of Latin. Leaving behind the purely academic, he occupied a series of important executive positions in the university field, his last being the presidency of the University of Nevada.

It was, however, perhaps through his work with his social fraternity, Sigma Alpha Epsilon, of which he was



national President from 1934 to 1937, that the real motivating force in John Moseley's life was best expressed. His basic interest was in young men and in helping them in both a spiritual and an academic way. It was in them that this handsome, distinguished looking man, with a twinkle in his eye and a soft well-modulated southern voice, found his real mission in life. No man ever gave more wholly of himself nor with less thought for himself. Many young men he helped in a financial way, often at a sacrifice to himself.

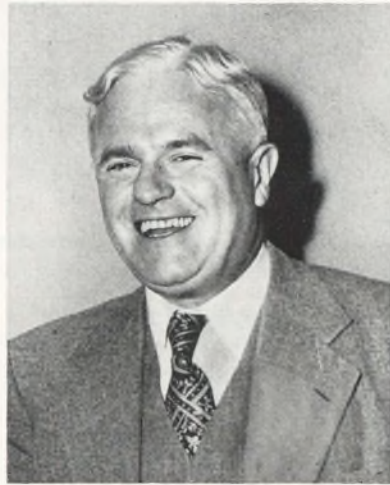
### ***He Was Inspiration***

It was my privilege to know John Moseley first in 1929 at the University of Oklahoma where I was a member of the same social fraternity. He had been a member and president of the Oklahoma Chapter of the fraternity and later its highest officer at the regional level. Although he was at the time not only Professor of Latin but Coach of Tennis at the University, he always found time to come to the fraternity house and talk with us and attend our meetings. It was largely through John Moseley's inspiration that I, as did many others, first found real interest in our studies. It was through him that I first became interested in the Rhodes Scholarships. I can see him now, as I am sure many others can, talking quietly and earnestly to a group of young men surrounding him, a half smile behind his rimless glasses, deliberating occasionally for the right word or thought, leaning forward and gesticulating for emphasis.

To begin with his beginning, John Moseley was born in Meridian, Mississippi, the son and grandson of Presbyterian ministers. His southern origins were an essential part of him. He embodied the best of the tradition and the charm of the Old South. In his youth he lived at various places in Tennessee and Mississippi, attended the public schools in Mississippi, and later entered Southwest Presbyterian University at Clarksville, Tennessee, in 1908, where he stayed for two years. He graduated from Austin College, Sherman, Texas, in 1912 with an A.B. degree; and from Southeastern Teachers College, Durant, Oklahoma, in 1913. He received his M.A. degree from the University of Oklahoma in 1916.

### ***Named Rhodes Scholar***

He was elected a Rhodes Scholar from Oklahoma in 1916; received his B.A. degree from Oxford in 1922 and his M.A. in 1928. He studied also for two years at the Graduate School of Stanford University, where he was the holder of a Royall Victor Fellowship. He also attended one summer session at the University of California, Southern Branch, and Colum-



bia University, and studied for a brief time at the English Academy in Athens and the American Academy in Rome. An LL.D. degree was conferred upon him by Austin College in 1936.

John Moseley's academic career was interrupted, as was that of many of his contemporaries, by service in the first world war. Although military life might be considered alien to his nature he had long been a member of the National Guard of Oklahoma. He took his First Officer's training at Fort Logan and was commissioned as a Second Lieutenant in 1917. He went overseas with the 32nd (Red Arrow) Division, where he served with gallantry for a year and a half on five fronts and was discharged as a First Lieutenant in 1919.

War did not, however, as it did to many, deter him from the pursuit of his chosen career. It merely postponed his entry at Oxford and resulted in his taking his work there as a more mature man and in the company of other mature men, whose education had been similarly interrupted. In the mellow atmosphere of Oxford, John Moseley found the calm and leisure which suited his contemplative nature. He found there the nourishment for his love of the classics. There could not have been a more appropriate selection to the Rhodes Scholarship—a more successful merging of the man with the University and all it stood for.

Oxford was doubly kind to John Moseley in that it brought him a romantic marriage. Returning to Oxford from the states he met Marie Nichols,

traveling in Europe with her parents from her home in California. They were married in 1923 and she bore him a fine son and a lovely daughter. In 1953 John and Marie Moseley visited Oxford for the last time together, on the occasion of the Fiftieth Anniversary of the founding of the Rhodes Scholarships. They stayed together in John Moseley's Merton and saw many old friends.

### ***Resumed Teaching***

Upon his return from Oxford, John Moseley resumed his career of teaching which he had actually begun in the Durant High School in 1912. From 1919 to 1934 he served as Assistant Professor of Latin and Classical Archeology and later as full Professor in the University of Oklahoma. For four years he was President of Central State Teachers College, Edmond, Oklahoma; for five years Dean of Students at the University of Tennessee; and for five years President of the University of Nevada, which he left in 1949 to return to the work of his beloved fraternity.

John Moseley was the author of several textbooks and manuals and contributed widely to fraternal, literary and professional magazines. He was widely known as a lecturer, being sought after especially for his illustrated travel lectures, his discussion of Oxford University, and a lecture on the Chalice of Antioch. His experience with leadership training brought him prominently into the lecture field on this subject.

John Moseley was a member of many learned societies, service groups and fraternity organizations. He was a 32nd degree Mason. He was a member of the permanent committee of the National Interfraternity Conference of New York City. He was the originator of a leadership training school for college fraternity men which has served as a model for similar developments throughout the Greek letter system. Since the establishment of the Leadership School in Evanston in 1935, twenty-one schools have been held attracting more than 5,000 undergraduates. He also established Greek Week on many campuses.

### ***Receives Gold Medal***

In 1947 John Moseley was awarded the National Interfraternity Conference Gold Medal for "Outstanding Service to Youth Through the American College Fraternity." There could have been no more fitting or final tribute.

John Moseley has passed from our midst, but his memory and influence will remain—with all whom he knew, but particularly with the young men—to whom he dedicated his life of "outstanding service."

# The Dilts ... at Purdue

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** This article is a reprint from the March 1956 issue of *Purdue Alumnus* and was suggested by Eth Baugh, Ind. Beta '23 (Purdue), editor, as Russell Dilts and his seven sons were all initiated into Sigma Alpha Epsilon by Indiana Beta. The article first appeared in *The News-Dispatch*, Michigan City, Ind., by Mr. Spiers.

ASK RUSSELL DILTS how many children make a happy family and you'll get a soft smile and this: "As many as possible."

Dilts, a big, slow-moving man with wise, gentle eyes in an honest, homespun face, knows whereof he speaks. He's quite a dad.

There are, of course, no dads without moms, and in this case much credit belongs to Lenora Obright, the girl Dilts married Nov. 26, 1914.

Lenora was one of two children born 20 years apart.

"That," she told Russell early, "isn't the best way to raise a family. So let's have lots of children."

"Fine," replied her new bridegroom, "how many?"

"An even dozen would be nice."

Dilts was mildly startled, but agreeable. He, too, loved kids.

Thus it began, and while Russell and Lenora fell short of a dozen they did create a truly remarkable family—one of the finest I've found in Hoosierland.

Behind it lies a warm, inspiring story.

DILTS GREW UP in Winamac, where his father, Moses, was a modestly successful realtor, able to help his son get an agriculture degree at Purdue in 1912.

After marriage, Russell farmed awhile. Then he opened the insurance agency he still has today.

Children arrived like clockwork—John, 1915; Allen, 1917; Richard, 1919; Mary, 1921; Elizabeth, 1923; Moses, 1926; Robert, 1928; Thomas, 1930, and Dan, 1934.

From the beginning, Russell and Lenora made it a close-knit, fun-loving, share-and-share-alike family. They were firm parents—but gentle, understanding and just.

"We never bossed our children, in the strict sense," Russell told me. "We preferred to give them all the facts and let them make their own decision." He grinned, then added: "They never let us down. Children have more basic honesty and intelligence than many parents realize."

Dilts loves to hunt and fish, and as soon

as his boys were old enough he taught them to handle rod and gun. Together they made many happy trips afield.

Often, too, Russell and Lenora would pile their whole, squirming tribe into the car for a Sunday afternoon picnic or outing.

And they prayed together, just as they played together. Sunday school was a weekly-whole-family habit.

LIKE MANY, I wondered whether big-family parents have trouble keeping track of so many small fry. Did they, perchance, call the roll at supper?

"Gosh no," laughed Dilts. "I could walk into the house and know instantly whether all nine were home. If one was absent, I felt uneasy. If two were gone, I was downright lonesome."

Dilts wasn't often lonesome. In the atmosphere their wise parents created, the kids usually had more fun with Dad, Mom and each other in their big, 10-room house than anywhere else.

Dilts admits that supporting such a big family wasn't easy. Until the late '30s—by which time all nine little Dilts were on the scene—Russell's income rarely topped \$3,000 a year.

"Sure we did without things for the chil-

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dren's sake," *Dilts* admits. "That's the price of a big family. But we never had a moment of regret. And when things got tough—like during the depression years—the children did without things, too. But they didn't complain. They understood the situation, and made the best of it."

Often *Dilts* is asked if he'd have nine children again if he could relive his life. Always he grins and says:

"No sir! We'd start earlier and have a dozen!"

Nice as it is, this is only half the *Dilts* family's story. The second half is even more remarkable and inspiring. It began soon after *John*, the first-born, graduated from high school in 1933. Those were tough times—and *John* wanted college.

As usual, son and dad talked things over. *Russell* was frank. Even in those days, college figured to cost \$1,000 a year. Whatever help *John* got, the other eight children would have a right to expect. Nine times \$4,000 was \$36,000—a sum far beyond *Russell's* means alone.

They kicked the problem around until a potential evolved. *John* would work two years and save all he could. He'd also work at college. When he ran out of money, dad would start paying.

"But," said *John*, "what you pay will be a loan. When I graduate and get a job, I'll repay you—and that money can be loaned to *Allen*, then *Richard*, and so on through all the kids. Think it'll work?"

*Russell* grinned. "There's one way to find out," he said. "Let's give it a try."

As with most important matters, they talked it over with the rest of the family. Everybody was enthusiastic, so *John* got a filling station job. He also bought a truck and did hauling on the side.

Two years later *John* entered Purdue. Brothers *Allen* and *Richard* took over his truck business on shares. *Allen*, out of high school, also got a job.

The *Dilts* boys were on their way.

THIS FAMILY'S rare faith and trust in each other was typified by *Russell's* way of giving needed financial help. No *Dilts* ever wrote home for money.

"Just write a check on my account," said dad. "It will be honored."

None abused this rare privilege, but *Russell* admits there were some tight moments—especially the year *John*, *Allen* and *Richard* were all at Purdue and the other six were in school at Winamac.

"Seemed like I was always overdrawn that year," *Russell* chuckled. "A few times I had to borrow money—but the boys never knew it."

Similarly, although he was an old Purdue grad (1912) and loved his school, *Russell* never pushed it. All the kids had a free choice.

"In fact, we secretly hoped the girls would go to DePauw, which was *Lenora's* college," *Russell* said. "But *Mary*, and then *Elizabeth* picked Purdue. I'm kinda glad, now, because they were there during the war and kept our record unbroken while the boys were in service."

Six of the seven *Dilts* boys saw War II service. (*Dan* was too young.) They were overseas. Luckily, none was hurt.

The war, however, made *Elizabeth* the only one not to get a degree at Purdue. She married Ed Applegate, who wound up with Patton's army and got blown out of a fox-hole. When he came home, hurt and hospitalized, *Elizabeth* left school to help nurse him back to health.

Today, fully recovered, Applegate is a Bloomington attorney—but sometimes at family gatherings he takes a worse beating than he took in Europe. He's the only IU graduate in the clan!

AFTER THE WAR, *Moses*, *Robert* and *Tom Dilts* got Purdue degrees, and *Dan* entered school. By then, *Russell* was over the financial hump. *John*, *Allen* and *Richard* had repaid their "loans." The GI bill eased the strain for the others.

In conclave, the boys agreed that the girls needn't repay the revolving college fund after their marriages. Not fair to their husbands, they said.

Part of *Tom's* debt was also written off—but for a tragic reason. Last November he died, at 25, of a cranial aneurism. *Tom's* death was a severe blow to the whole fine family, and it hurt to have people say, "It's not like losing an only child. You have so many..."

"How can you explain to such people that it's exactly like losing an only child?" *Russell* said, the pain still in his gentle eyes. "That's how we feel."

Today the *Dilts* clan is widely scattered. Only *John*, an implement dealer with outlets in Winamac and Francesville, stayed close to home. *Allen* is an industrial engineer with Procter and Gamble at Cincinnati. *Richard* and *Moses* are insurance executives—one at Davenport, Iowa, the other at Gary. *Robert* is a patent attorney with RCA at Princeton, N.J. *Elizabeth* is at Bloomington, *Mary* at Galesburg, Ill.

All but *Dan* have married. Together they've given *Russell* and *Lenora* 20 grandchildren, counting *Tom's* two.

After the children left, *Russell* considered selling their big, strangely quiet 10-room house. But *Lenora* wouldn't think of yielding so many happy memories to strangers.

"So we turned the first floor into a modern, ranch-type dwelling and left the second floor as a sort of barracks for the gang when they come home," *Russell* told me. "We also keep a large closet full of toys for the grandchildren—and they make a beeline for it whenever they come."

Each summer there's a gay Winamac reunion. *Russell* and *Lenora* rotate Thanksgiving visits among their far-flung offsprings.

Today *Dilts* has no money worries. His agency provides a steady income, and his banker no longer calls to say his checking account is overdrawn. On the other hand, he hasn't acquired a large (and useless?) fortune. Few men do who raise and educate nine children. But *Russell Dilts* can say:

"I'm the richest man in the world!"

And be right!

When *Dan Dilts* graduates this year he'll write "finis" to a unique remarkable saga entitled, "The *Dilts* at Purdue."

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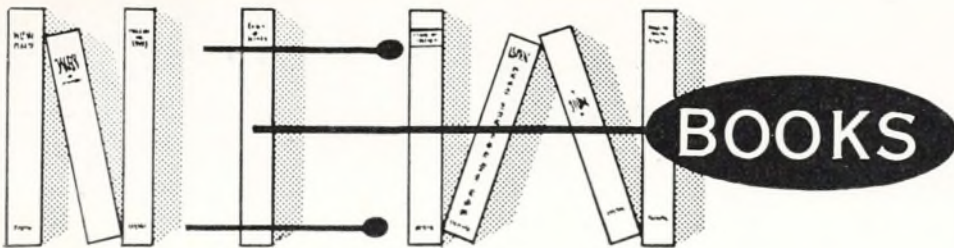

## Madison Cooper's *The Haunted Hacienda*

"It came after something longer than *Gone with the Wind*"

**T**HIS NOVEL, *The Haunted Hacienda*, like *Sironia, Texas*, by the same author, Madison Cooper, *Texas Rho '15* (Texas), is a tale based on Texas and its people. The author's intimate knowledge of the people and history of that state makes this book both readable and somewhat historical. The principal character of the story, however, is an athletic, handsome and thoroughly human son of an Italian immigrant merchant who was raised in Chicago.

Guido, the leading character has been sent to visit some of his father's holdings in California and has detoured through Texas. The trip is really to get him out of Chicago and away from an infatuation with the wife of his father's good friend in that city.

From that point, the story takes on the experiences of the romantic Italian boy, suddenly thrust on the growing and still rustic state of Texas. He meets with an old and trusted friend of his family, Fant Cullodon, who not only is the most important man in his rural community, but the picture of all that is rugged and individualistic of the early pioneers of the southwest country.

The story gives a complete picture of the family life of a rural Texas community of the latter years of the 19th century, its church manners, town gossip, family skeletons, social relationships. Frequent throw-backs are used by the author to connect some events of Texas history to the characters of the story.

One of the many themes that runs through the story is that of Miss Stella, the wife of Fant Cullodon, who, in the style of proud women of the time, lived in two worlds. One of these was the ever-active wife of the town's leading and most respected citizen, and the other in the reflection of a past romance that nearly ended in disaster for all concerned.

The book is well written from a point of interest and covers life in one form or another from the cradle to the grave. It is the type of book that one would never put down and not pick up again. The story is such that each page is important and the theme very understanding. The characters are all human, very understandable much of the story is concerned with their physical lives and relationships. All in all, it is a story of life in a period, and section of country, but the theme and characters are universal.

Incidentally, the title of the book, *The Haunted Hacienda*, refers to deserted hacienda near which church picnics and rendezvous took place and which lent enhancement on moonlight nights!

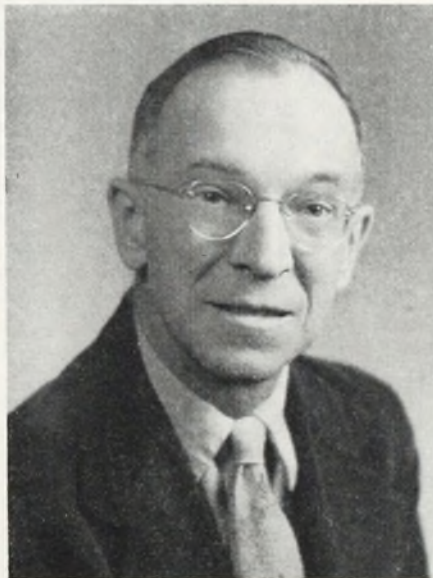

Plans for a Chapter home are maturing at Birmingham-Southern and the campaign for the new home at Auburn is making progress. The report from Scholarship Commissioner Nygreen states that "the Province as a whole improved in relation to their all-men's averages and the Convention may well take pride in their Chapters' achievements."

Special awards made included the Province Award of Merit to Tom McClellan, III, of Ala. Mu, for his service in connection with the Centennial Celebration, and the National Merit Key Award to Robert L. Cousins for his work on The Alumni Program. The highlight of the occasion was an address by Eminent Supreme Archon Ed Hathcock, who entertained the guests with humor and inspired them with his forceful presentation of the characteristics of a good member of Sigma Alpha Epsilon. Listed among the business items transacted were:

3. Set up a work program for the next two years whereby each chapter will select one problem each year, work intensively toward its solution and then share its experiences with other chapters through written reports.
4. Substituted for the biennial citation of the Award of Merit a Man of The Year Award in each Chapter and provided for publicizing such awards.
5. Provided for increased emphasis on The Alumni Program by electing an Alumni Secretary for each state.
6. Voted not to recommend any new institution in the Province to the Permanent Extension Investigation Committee as a worthy domicile for a Chapter of ΣΑΕ.
7. Accepted the invitation of Florida Upsilon Chapter to hold the next Province Convention in Gainesville, Fla., starting on Friday evening, April 25, 1958.

The Convention proposed no amendments to the National Laws.

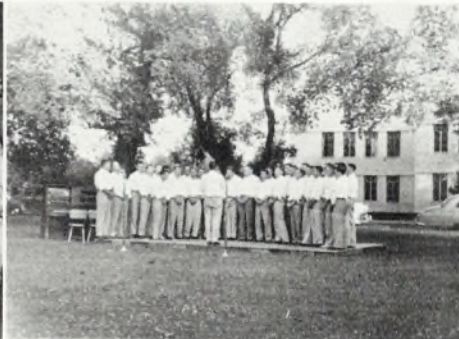
## Ga. Epsilon Award—Foreman

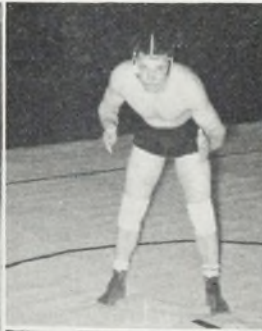

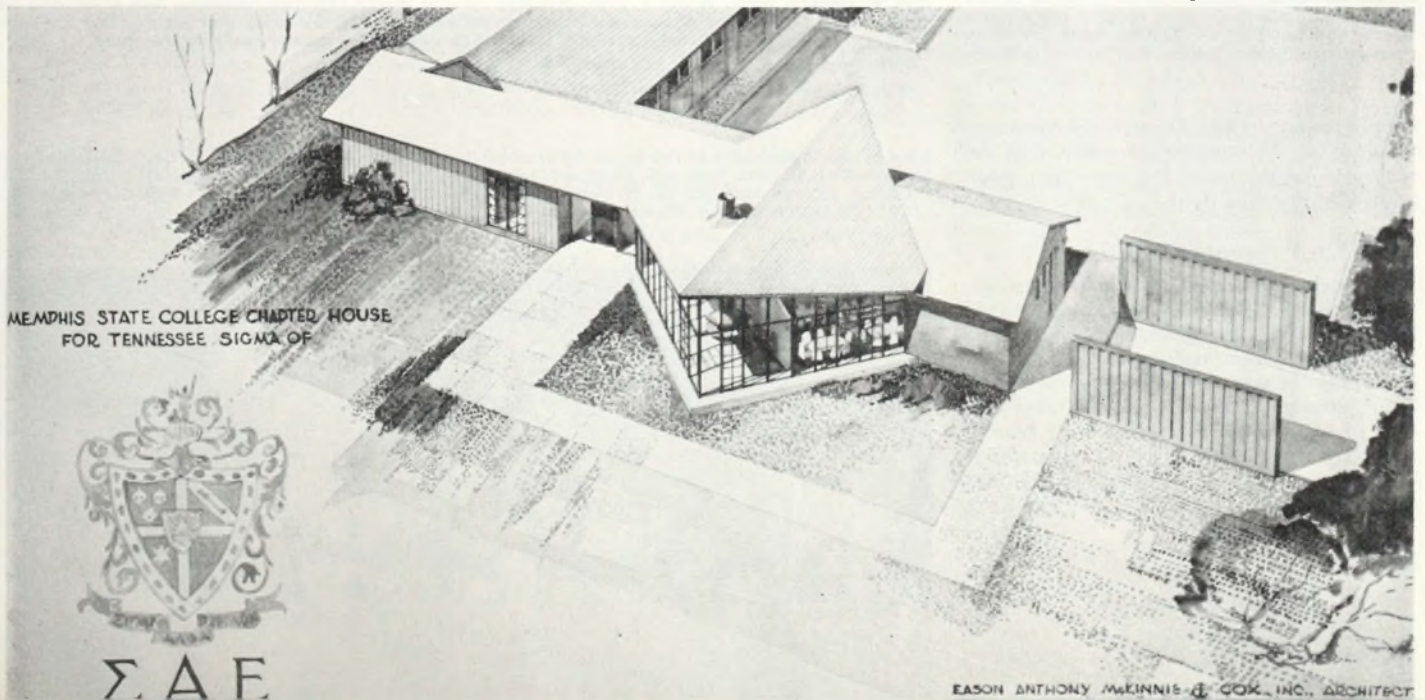

# CHAPTER ETERNAL

## EDWARD F. NIPPERT Ohio Epsilon '07 (Cincinnati)

Dr. Edward Frederick Nippert, *Ohio Epsilon '07*, (Cincinnati), Founder of the National Endowment Fund, godfather of California Delta at UCLA, long an active and valuable member of the Los Angeles Alumni Association, brother of Judge Alfred K. Nippert, Past ESA, died at Los Angeles, Calif., March 22, 1956.

Dr. Nippert headed the alumni group which was instrumental in securing the charter for California Delta from the Miami, Fla., National Convention of 1928. He acted as advisor for the Chapter for many years and was always its good friend.

Dr. Nippert was in a hospital on March 9, but heard the Centennial broadcast from Cincinnati, a special telephone line having been installed to carry the program to his sick room at the request of Judge Nippert.

Funeral services were held in Pierce Brothers Mortuary Chapel on March 24, conducted by Dr. Wm. B. Hessel of the First Methodist Church of Hollywood, followed by the ΣAE burial ritual, conducted by ESA Edward G. Hathcock. Deputy Archon Calvin D. Smalley of Province Chi paid a tribute to Dr. Nippert's services to ΣAE. A delegation from California Delta sang "Violets." A large number of alumni were also present including Past ESA Albert M. Austin of New York and Louis Nippert, *Ohio Epsilon '28*, of Cincinnati. Due to doctors' orders, Judge Nippert was unable to go to Los Angeles for the funeral. The remains were cremated and the ashes taken to Cincinnati for interment in Spring Grove Cemetery.

## DR. PAUL HUTCHINSON Pa. Gamma '11 (Lafayette)

Dr. Paul Hutchinson, *Pa. Gamma '11* (Lafayette), long-time editor of the *Christian Century* magazine, died in a Beaumont, Texas, hospital, April 15, 1956. His home was in Winnetka, Ill. He had retired as editor of the *Christian Century* in January and was under contract to publish an article, "The World's Great Religions," and a book, *A History of Christianity*. He began his career in religious journalism as assistant editor of the *Epworth Herald* in Chicago in 1914. From 1916 to 1922 he was an editor and missionary in China. He became managing editor of the *Christian Century*, an influential non-denominational Protestant magazine in 1924 and editor in 1947.

## JOHN GRANNIS Tenn. Lambda '03 (Cumberland)

John Avery Grannis, *Tenn. Lambda '03* (Cumberland), *Tenn. Nu '06* (Vanderbilt), died in Nashville, Tenn. March 30, 1956. He was founder and partner in the firm of Grannis and Associates, accountants. He was a charter member of Tennessee Lambda and had served as Eminent Archon. He also was a Life member of the Chapter National. In 1904 he helped the late William C. Levere. ESR, compile the fraternity's catalog.

## JOHN L. PIPA, IV Pa. Sigma-Phi '58 (Dickinson)



John L. Pipa, IV, *Pa. Sigma-Phi '58* (Dickinson), of Shamokin, Pa., died as the result of an automobile accident en route to his home when his car left a curve, February 4, 1956. He was the son of John L. Pipa, Jr., *Pa. Sigma-Phi '21*, and was initiated posthumously by the Chapter. While at Dickinson, John, IV, was president of his pledge class and was an outstanding halfback on the freshman football squad.

**HATHCOCK:** Greetings Adelphoi, one and all, throughout the Realm of Minerva. From the Banquet Hall of Alabama's Student Union in Tuscaloosa we salute you and wish you a glorious Centennial Founders' Day. The Phi Alpha Spirit is running high here tonight! Gathered at this festive board are a host of Minerva's most distinguished and zealous sons, who have made the pilgrimage from the far reaches of her realm to pay a tribute of honor and devotion at ΣΑΕ's founding

shrine on this historic and sentimental occasion. Today they have relived in reminiscence, with the old "warhorses," as we affectionately call our Past ESAs, the hardships and for-



tunes of the Fraternity. Tonight their hearts are aglow with pride and excitement as they sense the significance of this hour. But indeed every loyal brother, present or listening in, should be proud and thrilled for this is a moment supreme in the living drama of Sigma Alpha Epsilon!



Founder Noble Leslie DeVotie

Of what basic ingredients and component alloys did Noble Leslie DeVotie and his followers compound the enduring foundation of our order. Indeed, one might ask, as the uninitiated often do, "What is ΣΑΕ?" Well, there are some obvious answers to those burning questions, but enigmatically, just as Moses found his in the burning bush, the real answers may be seen only in the light of the unconsuming fire and inner lamp of life, the fire of the heart.

They will be revealed to us in a remarkable story that we are to share tonight, in this, our finest hour, "The ΣΑΕ Story." The story begins in the words of the late great Billy LeVere: "The fraternity did not spring full panoplied from the brain of Jove, as did Minerva. Instead it grew quietly and silently from a seed planted in the hearts of our eight founders. The seed—from which has grown the greatness of our Fraternity—was *friendship*."

MUSIC: *Glee Club hums chorus of (College Music). Up full to establish then fade to BG and hold under.*

NARRATOR: Picture a pleasant afternoon in the autumn of 1855, as Noble DeVotie and John Rudolph stroll under the oak trees along the banks of the Black Warrior River . . .

MUSIC: *Humming of Glee Club Up Slightly then Segue to:*

SOUND: *Footsteps of two men walking on gravel, under voices fade in.*

SCENE:

RUDULPH: (*Chuckling*) And did that translation satisfy him?

DEVOTIE: (*Amused Too*) I doubt it would have pleased Caesar, but it satisfied the professor.

RUDULPH: Amazing, isn't it, Noble, how well you learn a professor's foibles in—what is it—two years we've been at Alabama?

DEVOTIE: Yes. And I've known you just two years. That's almost incredible! Not counting Howard College because I didn't know you well then.

RUDULPH: Just two years . . . And I must say, besides finding you a handy reference library, I've really enjoyed knowing you.

DEVOTIE: Y'know, John, maybe it's part of growing up—or maybe it's the kind of people at Alabama—but you and some of the other boys I've met here are a lot closer to me than friends back home I've known all my life!

RUDULPH: I know. I always had friends—good friends, but somehow I never had the—well—the *loyalty*, I guess it is, that I feel toward you and a few of our classmates. Sounds a little naive talking about loyalty and such things.

DEVOTIE: No! I think "loyalty" expresses the way we feel. And while we're talking, John, I've been thinking that these friendships should find expression in a solid, lasting way. Would you be interested in becoming part of a fraternal organization?

SOUND: *Footsteps Stop Abruptly.*

SCENE:

RUDULPH: Yes. Are you serious?

DEVOTIE: I am. I approached John Kerr a long time ago, and we've been discussing it. We've even picked out the boys we'd like to have: You, John and myself, and Sam Dennis, Abner Patton, Nate Cockrell, Tom Cook and Wade Foster.

RUDULPH: That's just about the group I'd pick! Have you talked to any of them yet?

DEVOTIE: No, but by George, this is as good a time as any! Let's go see Sam—he lives near here—then (*his voice fades out*) we'll get the rest of the boys together as soon as . . . (*Long pause, then DeVotie's voice fades back in*) . . . so we came right over, Sam, to see what you thought of the idea. Are you with us?

DENNIS: A hundred per cent! But will this Fraternity be composed of just the eight you mentioned?

DEVOTIE: At first. But we'll plan on growing. Of course, we'll be particular about whom we take in. It'll be restricted to male students . . . I'd say at least 15 years old. And we'll want only those with good scholastic records, or refined character and deportment. In other words, *gentlemen* . . . gentlemen who would be accepted in the finest social circles!

DENNIS: Good! But we'll have to work fast! It's only a few months till Spring, when most of us leave school.

DEVOTIE: You're right! Let's get started. John, why don't you turn your artistic talents toward designing us a badge? You don't have much to go on yet, but you will soon.

MUSIC: *Glee Club hums chorus of "Friends." Sneak in under, hold in BG:*

SOUND: *Four deliberate raps of gavel.*

SCENE:

DEVOTIE: I will now call the roll. Samuel Dennis . . .

DENNIS: Present, Brother DeVotie.

DEVOTIE: Abner Patton . . .

PATTON: Present.

DEVOTIE: Nathan Cockrell . . .

COCKRELL: Present, Brother DeVotie.

DEVOTIE: Wade Foster . . .

FOSTER: Present.

DEVOTIE: John Rudolph . . .

RUDULPH: Present.

DEVOTIE: John Kerr . . .

KERR: Present, Brother DeVotie.

DEVOTIE: (*In a conversational tone, completing the Roll-Call*).

Thomas Cook regrets that he is unable to attend tonight and sends his good wishes.

(*His tone changes as he delivers a formal address*).

Gentlemen, we have gathered for the purpose of organizing a fraternity.

I had anticipated experiencing a great warmth in sharing with you, my dearest friends, the mutation of our friendship into brotherhood. But I find besides that a sense of awe—of solemnity—beyond my expectation—as if Destiny hovers over us here. Perhaps this night will have a meaning for all the centers of learning of the South as the founding-time of an important fraternity. I suddenly see that as we pledge ourselves in this purpose we may be building a living monument to friendship.

Brother Foster, will you oblige us by taking the secretarial notes of this meeting?

FOSTER: Thank you, Brother DeVotie. I've already begun.

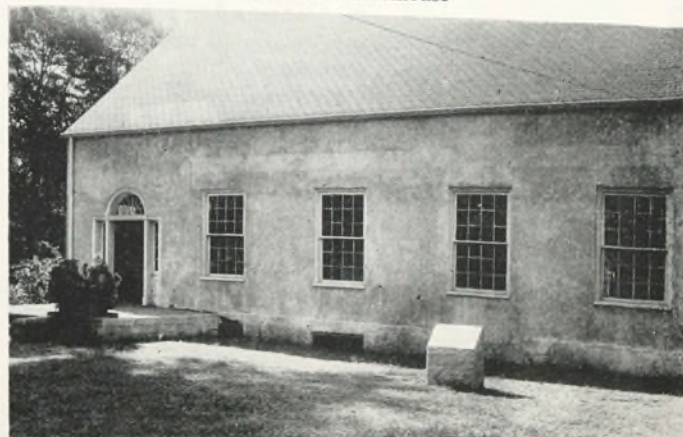

As the goddess of wisdom, *Minerva* charges us to be *scholarly*; as the goddess of purity and refinement, she expects us to be *gentlemanly*.

Brothers, meet the man who was ESA of this Fraternity when he was 22 years of age . . . our oldest living past ESA . . . Brother J. Washington Moore!

SOUND: *Applause of large group. Up full briefly then fade out.*

SPEECH:

MOORE: You are most kind, Brother Hathcock.

In reading our earliest records and studying the lives of our Founders, I am more conscious than ever of the fact that ΣΑΕ was founded as a man-making organization. Noble DeVotie has always personified to me all the traits of gentlemanliness. I have never read nor heard of one little selfish or disgraceful act during his whole life. He wrote in the preamble to our original constitution that our business as a fraternity is to

cultivate, first in ourselves and then in others, those noble and manly qualities which induce the most intimate and lasting friendship. There are many ways by which each of us may cultivate the qualities which will win for us the respect and admiration of our fellows. May I suggest the quality in which DeVotie himself was so preeminent—high scholarship. Not many of us can excel or even reach his record. But all of us, by striving for better than average grades, can demonstrate that we are true followers of DeVotie. True it is that scholarship is only one of the qualities of lasting friendship. But it is number one. Without it, the rest fall to the ground.

Let this hundredth year be a time for reappraisal and a resolution never to stray from the paths of refined conduct so clearly laid out for us by the first eight members of Sigma Alpha Epsilon!

SOUND: *Applause of large group. Up full briefly then fade out.*

NARRATOR: Our deepest thanks, Brother J. Washington Moore. It might be well to mention that scholastic activity actually played an important part in the early meetings of ΣΑΕ. Influenced by the popularity of literary societies at that time, our Founders resolved that *essays* be prepared and presented in meetings by designated members. We find, too, that our Founders were every bit as human and fun-loving as are the college boys of today. Let's listen in on an early meeting . . .

SOUND: *Babble of about ten men's voices, fading as gavel is rapped.*

SCENE:

KERR: (*As Gavel is Rapped*) Gentlemen! Gentlemen! Gentlemen! Please! That's better . . . thank you. Now, if there is no more new business, we will hear the essays. Our essayists will be Brothers DeVotie and Cockrell. Brother DeVotie, what topic are you using as a basis for your series of essays?

DEVOTIE: My topic is: "The part a college fraternity can play in helping its members achieve higher scholastic standing." All my essays this year will be based on this topic. Which brings to mind a suggestion, Brother Kerr. Since so much of our Fraternity's policy is based on ancient and ritualistic language, why don't we use the Greek word "Topoi" instead of the common word "topic"? It would be so much more . . .

KERR: (*Interrupts*) We'll discuss that at a later time, Brother DeVotie. What's the subject of your essay tonight, based on your chosen topic?

DEVOTIE: The title of my essay is: "Mutual aid in studying for examinations." But I do think the use of the word "topoi" would add much to the . . .

KERR: (*Interrupts*) That can wait! Right now, we're primarily interested in seeing if the assignments for tonight have been prepared. I'll now call on . . .

DEVOTIE: (*Interrupts*) But as long as we are talking about essays . . .

KERR: (*Interrupts*) That is all, Brother DeVotie! No more sounds from you about "topoi" or anything else until we call on you to read your essay. Please be seated.

DEVOTIE: Well, I—uh—yes, Mr. President.

KERR: Now then, who's next? Oh yes . . . Brother Topoi—Brother Cockrell, I mean. Brother Cockrell, your topic for your essay series is . . .

COCKRELL: The final decision has not been made.

KERR: That sounds like a rather interesting topic. And what's the subject of your essay for tonight?

COCKRELL: Oh no . . . what I mean is, after *very* much studious thought, I have still been unable to make a final decision as to what my topic for the year should be. You see, there are so *many* worthwhile topics that the brain is staggered by the immense . . .

KERR: (*Interrupts*) In other words, you never got around to writing your essay.

COCKRELL: Well, you might say that, yes.

KERR: Brother Cockrell, your negligence is going to enrich the treasury of Sigma Alpha Epsilon by the sum of ten cents! You may pay Brother Patton after the meeting!

COCKRELL (*Outraged*) Ten cents?

KERR: Yes! If the penalty is severe enough, perhaps you'll remember next time. Well, at least we have one Brother who is prepared. Brother DeVotie, please rise and present your talk about "Mutual aid in studying for an examination."

#### The Founders



DEVOTIE: Mr. President, while you were talking with Brother Cockrell, I quickly outlined a new essay, and, with your permission, I'd like to present it rather than the original one.

KERR: I guess that's all right. What's the title of this new essay of yours?

DEVOTIE: The title is: "Why we should drop the word 'topic' in favor of the word 'topoi' . . ."

KERR: (*Groans*) Oh no!

SOUND: *Loud laughter of about ten men. Segue to:*

MUSIC: *Instrumental Mood Bridge.*

NARRATOR: But the carefree days were short-lived at Alabama Mu. The following autumn, when the little band of Brothers returned to campus, they were faced with a decree issued by the University . . .



OFF-MIKE VOICE: (*Sternly*) Effective immediately, all fraternities are abolished at the University of Alabama!

NARRATOR: Here was the threat of complete destruction of ΣAE. Other fraternities on campus had other chapters to carry on their work. Sigma Alpha Epsilon had not another chapter, anywhere. But our Brothers were busy. They continued to meet in secret. And some of them transferred to other schools where they began to transplant the idea, as DeVotie had outlined earlier. Finally, the pressure brought by authorities at the University of Alabama proved too great. The Mother Chapter was forced to disband. The following words concluded the minutes of the meeting of January 9th, 1858 . . .

YOUNG VOICE WITH ECHO CHAMBER EFFECT: We adjourned to meet no more.

NARRATOR: Mother Mu began her long sleep. But the Brothers had done their transplanting job well. By the time Alabama Mu disbanded, Tennessee Nu, North Carolina Xi, Tennessee Eta, Virginia Kappa, Georgia Pi and Virginia Omicron had come into the fold. Then followed seven more chapters. The future of ΣAE looked bright . . . until . . .

SOUND: *Rifle Shot and Ricochet.*

NARRATOR: That first shot was fired in the war between the States. And ΣAE went to war!

MUSIC: *Organ plays "Dixie." Establish briefly then fade to BG and hold under:*

NARRATOR: Chapter after Chapter disbanded as the members took up arms. Georgia Pi at the Georgia Military Institute distinguished herself by marching to battle as a brave unit. Most ΣAE's pledged to uphold the honor of the South and fought for the Confederacy.

MUSIC: *"Dixie" up full to end. Upon completion, organist plays "Battle Hymn of the Republic." Up to establish then fade to BG and hold under:*

NARRATOR: There were others who felt differently . . . who wore the Blue and wore it bravely and proudly. But the national disunity that put our Brothers into opposing battle lines was never strong enough to dim their loyalty to a united ΣAE. The rebirth of Sigma Alpha Epsilon after the war was the fond dream of Brothers on both sides of the conflict.

MUSIC: *Fade out "Battle Hymn."*

NARRATOR: One Chapter made special provisions for maintaining the safety of their sacred records during the war. While the act may have been prompted more by romance than by practicality, it proved prophetically wise. Listen . . . as Brother John Kent of Kentucky Chi at the Kentucky Military Institute talks to his sweetheart . . . the girl who was later to become the *sweetheart* of all ΣAEs. . .

SCENE:

KENT: Well, honey . . . tomorrow's the day! Tonight I'm a

college student; tomorrow I'm a soldier.

PATTIE: I'm very proud of you, Johnny . . . but I'll miss you. And I'll wait for you.

KENT: About that waiting, Lucy—I was thinking about it and I—It thought—

PATTIE: What were you thinking?

KENT: Whenever I want to say something important I always get tongue-tied! But I was thinking—as long as we're going to get married some day—and who knows how long I'll be away . . .

PATTIE: (*Tentatively*) Yes, John?

KENT: Do you think it would be terrible of me to ask the greatest favor I could ever—I mean it's only because I love you very much that I can ask a think like—Gosh . . .

PATTIE: Johnny?

KENT: You say no if you don't want to, and I'll understand. It's about the Sig Alph documents—chapter records and all our secret material—There's a lot of it—Suppose you could keep it for us while we're all away?

PATTIE: Why, sure, Johnny, if it's all right. I'd be honored.

KENT: And if I didn't come back—I'm just saying anything can happen—and we've got to be sure things get into the right hands after the war. So if I'm not here myself, you'll need some way of identifying anybody who claims them to know he's a bona fide ΣAE. So—I'll show you our secret grip. It's like this—What a tiny hand this is!—and give you our secret password . . . (*His Voice Fades Out*)

SOUND: *Drums.*

NARRATOR: Lieutenant John B. Kent did not come back. He was killed at the Battle of Murfreesboro. One day members of Kentucky Chi came to claim their chapter's documents.

SCENE:

PATTIE: They are all here, Gentlemen—just as they came to me.

GEORGE: I hope it hasn't been too inconvenient, Ma'am, keeping them.

PATTIE: Inconvenient! What would I have done without them! I can only give them to you trusting they mean as much as they did to him, because since I've had the news—these have been my dearest possessions.

DON: We are all most deeply grateful.

PATTIE: (*Bravely Cheering Up*) I was told to demand proof. Lieutenant—your hand—the secret grip—to discharge my duty according to my instructions.

DON: My honor, Miss Pattie. (*Pause*) What a tiny hand.

PATTIE: (*In Reverie*) So I've been told.

NARRATOR: In appreciation for her devoted service, the men of Kentucky Chi initiated the young lady into the mystic Bond of Sigma Alpha Epsilon. *Lucy Pattie* . . . the only woman ever to join our Fraternity.

MUSIC: *Fade out humming.*

NARRATOR: At the time the Civil War began, the total roster of SAE numbered some 500 Brothers. Of this number, 377—almost four-fifths of the entire membership—responded to the call to arms. 60 of our Brothers lost their lives in this conflict. And . . . Noble Leslie DeVotie was the first soldier to give up his life for the Confederacy. (*Pause*) Now, here again . . . Brother Hathcock.

SPEECH:

HATHCOCK: Twice again, since the war between the States, our Fraternity has had her progressive program disrupted and her manpower drained by all-out conflict . . . yet we have rebounded each time and have continued our march toward greater heights. And thousands of our ΣAE veterans can tell you how, during dark moments of battle, they were cheered and comforted by the discovery of a Brother ΣAE among their comrades in arms.

In the first World War, 8,000 of Minerva's sons answered the call . . . and 156 never returned. In the second World War, almost 19,000 Brothers served, and 868 Gold Stars were added to the Chapter Eternal. And many additional Brothers

have fought and died in other, more localized conflicts.

The magnificent response of Sigma Alpha Epsilon when our nation is endangered is true not only to the teachings of Minerva, as the goddess of military wisdom, but true, also, to the ideals of our Founders. Our Fraternity expects each of us to do the noble and manly thing in such a crisis . . . to enter willingly and bravely into the battle to protect our families and preserve our American heritage of freedom.

Thus, we find one more answer to, "What is ΣAE?" ΣAE is friendship, scholarship and gentlemanliness. And . . . Sigma Alpha Epsilon embodies patriotism!

SOUND: *Retreat Bugle.*

NARRATOR: When the smoke of battle cleared after the War between the States ΣAE's returned to their colleges and universities. The returning warriors of Washington City Rho were delighted to find their chapter had remained active through the war . . . the only chapter to do so. Virginia Omicron at the University of Virginia was quickly reactivated. And three Brothers of old Georgia Pi—Samuel Spencer, George Goetchius and James McCleskey—revisited their campus at the Georgia Military Institute only to find . . .

SCENE:

GOETCHIUS: . . . nothing but a rubble of bricks and burned pieces of wood! Why in the world did they tear down our little school?

SPENCER: They said it was a hatching place for rebels.

MCCLESKEY: Well, what's done is done. I don't know about you boys, but I'm going to enroll at the University of Georgia.

GOETCHIUS: Sam and I have the same plans, Jim. And we have other plans, too! We've decided to re-establish our ΣAE chapter over at the University! And we're counting on you to help!

MCCLESKEY: You'd better count me in! Actually, as far as I know, we'll be the first ΣAE chapter to re-open its doors . . . I doubt if there's anybody even to grant us a charter. So why don't we call our new chapter "Alpha"?

GOETCHIUS: We don't need a charter! Alpha it is! Sigma Alpha Epsilon lives again! Phi Alpha!

SPENCER, MCCLESKEY (*In Unison*) Phi Alpha!

NARRATOR: Later, learning that Virginia Omicron had actually preceded them in reactivating—but still unaware of the continued life of Washington City Rho—the Georgia boys changed the name of their chapter to "Beta." And Georgia Beta has consistently, since that time, been one of the brightest jewels in the crown of Minerva! The oldest chapter in continuous existence . . . the spawning bed of many more chapters of ΣAE. And yet, it's interesting to note, Georgia Beta still has no charter! And the Fraternity continued to grow, striving bravely to reach and surpass the promising pre-war days. Soon, eyes were turned northward, to them any fine northern schools. The writers of the Constitution of 1869 succeeded in having this provision inserted . . .

OFF-MIKE VOICE: Chapters may be established beyond Mason's and Dixon's line.

NARRATOR: But there were bitter protests. And the following year, at the Convention of 1870 in Memphis, this provision was repealed . . .

OFF-MIKE 2ND VOICE: There will be no extension north of the Mason and Dixon line, or north of California and Kansas!

NARRATOR: And so, the dreams of widespread extension were crushed . . . or so it seemed. (*Pause*) The 1870's were lean and difficult years for the Fraternity. Finally, in 1877, the Grand Chapter, Kentucky Chi, called a special convention and a sound financial program was mapped out, due largely to the efforts of Brother Robert H. Wildberger of the Grand Chapter. Then, at the Nashville Convention in 1879, the remarkable Brother Wildberger was heard from again . . .

VOICE:

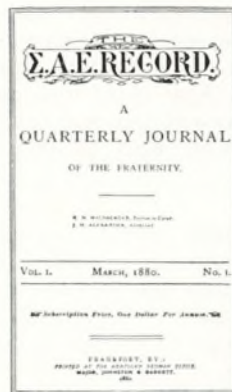
(WILDBERGER): Brothers, we're being held back by the lack of communication. I propose a magazine, to be sent regularly to all the chapters!

VOICES (*Off-Mike, Semi-Shout*) That's a big order, Bob! Are you willin' to take on the job of editor?

VOICE:

(WILDBERGER): I was hoping somebody would ask that question!

SOUND: *Laughter of large group.*



The Record

NARRATOR: And so the RECORD of Sigma Alpha Epsilon was born . . . and the first issue appeared in 1880, edited by Brother Wildberger.

As ΣAE began, once again, to grow and prosper with newfound vitality, other fraternities, many of them, looked with great interest at our strongly-entrenched Southern chapters and suggested that we amalgamate . . . give up our identity and merge with them as one fraternity. These situations, as they arose, were dealt with in

short order . . .

VOICE (*Off-Mike, Semi-Shout*) As long as I have a vote at this convention I'll never agree to be absorbed by another fraternity! Beta Theta Pi, indeed!

SOUND: *Cheers from a group.*

NARRATOR: And that—was that! (*Pause*) All was peace and harmony within Sigma Alpha Epsilon until the Atlanta Convention of 1881, when Brother Oliver Mitchell of Georgia Beta rose to his feet and, with no small amount of bravery, declared . . .

VOICE:

(MITCHELL): Brothers, it's time we stopped restricting this Fraternity to Southern schools. We should press on with our good work whether it takes us into the West or the South or the North or the East!

VOICE (*Off-Mike, Shouts Angrily*) Who says we should? This is a Southern fraternity!

2ND VOICE: I agree . . . and we should keep it that way! We'll stay where we belong . . . and let the damyankees do the same!

VOICE:

(MITCHELL): All right, Brothers, I give in . . . for now. But mark my words, the day will come!

NARRATOR: The day came a lot sooner than anybody expected! In 1883, a representative of the Grand Chapter, Kentucky Chi, installed a chapter at Gettysburg College, in Pennsylvania . . . and the Northern extension of ΣAE was a fact. This act was later ratified at the convention of 1885. Soon followed Ohio Sigma at Mount Union College; Michigan Alpha at Adrian; Pennsylvania Omega, Ohio Delta, Ohio Epsilon and many others. Who, now, would like to see Sigma Alpha Epsilon deprived of any of these chapters and of the many loyal workers they have produced and are producing . . . including such illustrious Eminent Supreme Archons as Austin, Nippert, Brown, Short and Ginter?

MUSIC: *Glee Club sings first verse (Lyrics altered as below) and chorus or "Sing, Brothers, Sing."*

(When we came up from Dixie Land, o'er seventy years ago . . . our rivals met us with a band, they thought we were a show!

I tell you sing, brothers, sing . . . sing, brothers, sing . . . and let Phi Alpha ring, brothers sing!)

NARRATOR: During this entire period, ΣAE had been governed on the national level by a Grand Chapter . . . a collegiate chapter selected for the job at each national convention. But, at the Nashville Convention of 1885, Brother James



G. Glass of Tennessee Omega—the University of the South—addressed the delegates . . .

VOICE:

(GLASS): Brothers, we appreciate your continued faith in us as your Grand Chapter. However, we feel we should relinquish the reigns of government. Sigma Alpha Epsilon has 35 Chapters now . . . and the task of management is just too great for a group of college men. We humbly suggest a more efficient and tightly-knit form of government for our Fraternity.

NARRATOR: The convention was pleased by the unselfish suggestion of Tennessee Omega and created the Supreme Council, which, in turn, divided the Fraternity into provinces . . . the same basic form of representation and control we have today. (Pause) Here again is our ESA, Brother Ed Hathcock.

SPEECH:

HATHCOCK: As we re-live the exploits of the men, who, with extraordinary drive and determination, guided the course of Sigma Alpha Epsilon, we realize that we have been blessed with an exceptional number of true leaders. Take, for instance, the Bunting brothers, and to tell us of their bright chapter in the ΣΑΕ story is one of our old warhorses who knew and worked with them. Here's a man, who, just out of school, gave freely of his time and talents in the up-building of the business side of ΣΑΕ. He received the ΣΑΕ treasury in a cigar box and passed it on in stocks, bonds, trust funds and well-conceived legislation for the conservation of our resources. And this is the man who instituted the policy of a badge for every man and a number on every badge. Brothers, listen to the words of our honored past ESA—pride of Class of 1894 of Ohio Delta—Brother Albert M. Austin!

SOUND: *Applause of large group.*

SPEECH:



Past ESA Austin

AUSTIN: When Tennessee Zeta pledged the Bunting Brothers. ΣΑΕ caught a comet by the tail. There were showers of sparks, new life, excitement, and a burst of forward motion. And the whole thing didn't happen a moment too soon. Frank, William, George, and irrepressible Harry. They were inspired by the value of the founders' ideals and were curious about the size and dimensions of the organization they had joined. It was rather loosely knit, they found, so they set up a work-

shop in their bedroom and wrote to every chapter they found recorded. Only two dozen replied, and their reports were vague. In place of membership statistics there were glib phrases about the preferability of quality over quantity. In place of other organizational details there were peans of praise to Minerva. Harry summed it up by observing that ΣΑΕ was suffering from galloping consumption. Old chapters were dying as fast as new ones were launched. Undoubtedly the postwar chaos in government and in education was largely to blame, but perhaps too the original light of inspiration needed re-kindling. The Buntings—particularly George and Harry—were on fire in a way that was very catching. Even their letters could start a blaze. Or as Harry put it: "We Found our letters could activate the living and wake the dead!"

They activated 35 new Chapters, and they awakened 12 that had been dead—among them the mother-chapter, Alabama Mu, whose book of minutes had become a scrapbook full of paper dolls for the little daughter of Newton Nash Clements, who incidentally was the first pledge—the 9th

member of Sigma Alpha Epsilon—and last recorder of the Ante Bellum Chapter. Thanks to Harry's ferreting, this book is among our prized souvenirs. If their zeal and hurry seems reckless in the telling—and it did to some while they were at work, just take note that not one seed they planted—not one chapter they installed ever died. So daring was their thinking that they confided one secret to very few—the fact that on their bedroom wall they had early placed a map of the Union bearing all the major colleges and universities, and marked *one hundred* of them for the installation of ΣΑΕ. Those who knew about this thought they were crazy. Harry, who was the leader, always counted his greatest contribution, however, as his initiation of Billy Levere.

SPEECH:



Past ESA, ESR Levere

HATHCOCK: That evaluation of William C. Levere is shared by us all. To spotlight Levere's place in the ΣΑΕ story, here is a brother who was probably his closest friend and confidant—ESA while Billy was traveling—holder of the fort during Billy's absence for YMCA in Europe, one of the elder statesmen of ΣΑΕ: Marvin Holderness, *Tennessee Nu*, 1902. Brother Holderness:

SOUND: *Applause of large (500) group.*

SPEECH:



Past ESA Holderness

HOLDERNESS: William C. Levere's approach to ΣΑΕ was a complete dedication. For 33 years he was the principal creative force, and a kind of North Star by which the young brothers could guide their lives toward everything cheering, contenting, and constructive. He was ESA for two terms, 1902 to 1906. Then he became the first traveling Eminent Supreme Recorder. His traveling was so assiduous, and his magnetism so pervasive, that almost every brother present in

any chapter of the Fraternity from 1913 to 1926 feels to this day that Billy Levere was a personal friend, and has warm memories of that huge, kindly, spellbinding giant implanted in the biggest chair available, weaving tales and histories with the glow of enchantment in them, and hearing their problems and their plans with understanding and buoyant hope.

The new growth of ΣΑΕ engendered by the Buntings was channeled and integrated by Billy. His scholarly qualities, like DeVotie's, brought it new dignity. His energy was a powerhouse.

When he took full command of YMCA overseas activity in World War I, in addition to superb administration—when it was needed—he would sweep floors, wash dishes, cook, prepare literally hundreds of turkeys with his own hands at holiday times. Once he whooped up a celebration near to riot proportions by cooking and distributing several thousand doughnuts which were received like manna by homesick doughboys.

At his passing in 1927 he left the major part of his estate toward his favorite project: the plan for a War Memorial Building which we have since erected and honored with his name. Looking over his life, we can sum it up no more succinctly and truly than *he* once did when he remarked,



"Well, it has all been for ΣAE."

SPEECH:

HATHCOCK: So important has that War Memorial Building become as ΣAE's first consolidated headquarters and as a shrine, that it deserves a place in the ΣAE story. No man is better qualified to speak of it than the one who gave lavishly of his tremendous energy and his personal fortune to bring it into being—a brother who has distinguished himself with service to the Fraternity since his initiation into Ohio Epsilon in 1894. His accomplishments and his devotion to ΣAE are familiar to us all. Our esteemed Past ESA, Judge Alfred K. Nippert!

SOUND: *Applause of large (500) group.*

SPEECH:



Past ESA Nippert

NIPPERT: Many of us feel a deep personal attachment to that Gothic structure which stands opposite Northwestern University in Evanston, Illinois, the Levere Memorial Temple. And, strangely enough, we who have been most intimately concerned with the mundane problems of its planning, financing, and building, who have seen its component parts clearly for what they are: stone, steel, wood, and glass feel most keenly the spell—the presence—of the Temple. And

this points up a natural phenomenon. When a building is conceived in a spirit of devotion, planned with affection, and built with beauty as the ultimate end, it is, when it stands completed, something larger than its physical dimensions, something more alive than the inanimate materials of its construction—and something more thrilling than the vision that preceded it. The Temple is a fitting memorial to a man like Billy Levere. It has dignity as he had. Part of it is devoted to hard work for ΣAE as he was, part of it to study, part of it to comradeship, music, and the worship of God. These were in Billy's nature too. And all of it is dedicated to the men who have served this nation in time of war. Billy's great service in this quarter is world-renowned. I hope that you will visit this impressive shrine of our fraternity. Then you will discover for yourselves its greatest quality—which also was a quality of Billy Levere—the power to warm, inspire, and strengthen you.

NARRATOR: Sigma Alpha Epsilon produces leaders, not only *within* the Fraternity, but in every walk of life, as well. There is not time to honor all our illustrious leaders by name, but by direct telephone recording, here are the voices of a few of our Brothers who represent examples of the varying fields in which ΣAEs are leaders. In the field of government, we switch to Atlanta for the words of one of the most highly-respected of all United States Senators . . .

RUSSELL: (*Telephone Recording*) This is Dick Russell of Georgia Beta, Class of '18. Let us always remember, Brothers, that a good ΣAE is automatically a good citizen!

NARRATOR: Let's go to Nashville where we hear from the Governor of Tennessee, the youngest governor in the nation . . .

CLEMENT: (*Telephone Recording*) This is Frank Clement, *Tennessee Lambda*, 1941, rejoicing with you that Sigma Alpha Epsilon has come through the first hundred years with flying colors.

NARRATOR: To the White House in Washington, where a trusted aide of the President of the United States is standing by . . .

STASSEN: (*Telephone Recording*) Harold Stassen speaking, *Minnesota Alpha* 1929. Brother Sherman Adams and I

are proud of our association with ΣAE, and we don't let anybody forget it . . . including the boss!

NARRATOR: In the field of *education*, we hear from the President's office at Pennsylvania State University . . .

EISENHOWER: (*Telephone Recording*) Good evening. I'm Milton Eisenhower, *Kansas Beta '22*. I urge you Brothers in the active chapters to remember those words spoken by Brother J. Washington Moore on the importance of *scholarship*!

NARRATOR: Representing the business world, a vice-president and director of the Ford Motor Company speaks from Dearborn, Michigan . . .

BUGAS: (*Telephone Recording*) This is John S. Bugas, *Wyoming Alpha* 1930. With 139 Chapters, Sigma Alpha Epsilon is big business, too. I want to commend our leaders who conduct the affairs of ΣAE in such an orderly and accurate fashion.

NARRATOR: One of the country's outstanding military heroes—winner of the Congressional Medal of Honor and now Governor of his state—reports from the Governor's Mansion in Pierre, South Dakota . . .

FOSS: (*Telephone Recording*) Hello, Brothers. This is Joe Foss, *South Dakota Sigma* 1940. I had the pleasure of meeting a lot of you overseas, and I hope to meet a lot more of you in the future.

NARRATOR: And here, representing the professions, is the newly-elected President of the American Medical Association, speaking from Napa, California . . .

MURRAY: (*Telephone Recording*) My name is Dwight H. Murray, *Indiana Gamma '17* (Indiana). My diagnosis is that ΣAE is a pretty healthy body, and I prescribe liberal doses of brotherhood to keep it that way!

NARRATOR: And the President of the American Bar Association from Atlanta . . .

GAMBRELL: (*Telephone Recording*) This is E. Smythe Gambrell, *Massachusetts Gamma* 1922. Whenever you hear opposition to the fraternity system, always remember this: the policies of ΣAE are entirely consistent with the laws of the land!

NARRATOR: In *religion*, one of our Brothers is a Bishop in his church and President of the World Methodist Council of Churches. Come in, St. Louis, Missouri.

HOLT: (*Telephone Recording*) Ivan Lee Holt is the name, *Tennessee Nu* 1904. My sermon is this: let the spiritual goals of DeVotie be your goals, too, and ΣAE will be well represented in Heaven!

NARRATOR: In sports . . . The greatest golfer of all time—and a real Southern gentleman—greet us from Atlanta, Georgia . . .

JONES: (*Telephone Recording*) This is Bobby Jones, *Georgia Phi* 1922. Of all the satisfying experiences I've enjoyed in my lifetime, none has given me more pleasure than seeing ΣAE so strong and prosperous on her 100th anniversary.

NARRATOR: And in the realm of *entertainment*:

POWELL: (*Telephone Recording*) Greetings from Hollywood! And from Dick Powell, *California Epsilon* 1924 (Occidental). I'm really enjoying this show tonight . . . I can hardly wait 'til the next installment on our two-hundredth birthday!

VALLEE: (*Telephone Recording*) I agree with Dick Powell, this is a great birthday. Rudy Vallee speaking. I'm in a play in San Francisco, but my heart and my good wishes are with my brothers in Tuscaloosa.

YOUNG: (*Telephone Recording*) I wouldn't miss this chance to add my good wishes. This is Robert Young, *Cal-*



for *nia Gamma* 1933. A thing that's good enough to last a hundred years deserves to go on forever.

SOUND: *Applause of group (500).*

NARRATOR: Thank you, Brothers. Yes . . . Sigma Alpha Epsilon does represent leadership in every sense of the word! And leadership is the keystone of that arch of character upon which stands the greatness of a nation and the continuance of the best institutions.

SOUND: *Applause of group (500).*

MUSIC: *Glee Club hums chorus of "Friends." Up briefly to establish then fade to BG and hold under:*

NARRATOR: ΣAE is noted for the beauty of her fraternal songs. Almost without exception, these songs were composed by Brothers who were moved to creative inspiration by the magic spell of friendship and brotherhood known only to members of our beloved Fraternity.

MUSIC: *Fade out humming.*

NARRATOR: Many years ago, a student of Purdue University sat alone in the ΣAE chapter house on a Saturday night, basking in the mellow afterthoughts of a wonderful day. The University of Illinois had played football at Purdue that afternoon, and, after the game several ΣAE's from Illinois had visited their brethren at Indiana Beta to strengthen the Bond of friendship between these two great chapters. Finally, train time arrived, and the boys from Illinois left for the station, accompanied by most of the men from Purdue chapter. This one lone boy, remaining behind in the empty house, could still feel the warmth and congenial fellowship that had been generated that evening, and putting pencil to paper, expressed his thoughts in the form of this beloved song . . .

MUSIC: *Chorus sings "Friends."*

NARRATOR: The young Purdue student who wrote that song so many years ago was dedicated to the service of ΣAE during all his days on earth, and served with honor as Eminent Supreme Archon. His name, familiar to us all, was Oliver K. "Ken" Quivey.

VOICE: (*Off Mike Semi-Shout*) Hey . . . how 'bout some facts and figures?

NARRATOR: Beg pardon, Brother?

VOICE: You know . . . how many of us are there, now? And

what's our financial state on our hundredth birthday? How do things look for ΣAE?

NARRATOR: Brother Hathcock, do we have someone who can answer these questions?

SPEECH:

HATHCOCK: We sure do! We have a man who can answer any question about ΣAE . . . especially in what I like to call our "Strength and Glory Department." Brothers, let's welcome a great man . . . Past ESA, past and present ESR, and tireless Fraternity historian . . . our Archivist, Brother Lauren Foreman!

SOUND: *Applause of large group. Up full briefly then fade out.*

SPEECH:

FOREMAN: Thank you, Brothers. I'm not only the *historian* . . . it's getting to the point where I'm history.

SOUND: *Laughter of large group.*

SPEECH:



Acting ESR Foreman

FOREMAN: In fact, I'm one of the very few in this nationwide audience who has known one of the Founders. So, if you want to shake the hand that shook the hand of John B. Rudolph, the designer of our badge, I'll be glad to accommodate you!

SOUND: *Laughter of the group.*

SPEECH:

FOREMAN: But, you wanted facts and figures. So, at the risk of making swell-heads out of the whole bunch of you, I'll give you an up-to-the-minute pic-

ture of the size and strength of ΣAE on her one-hundredth anniversary. And a pretty picture it is.

As of the moment, we have 139 active chapters in 46 states. Of these 139 chapters, 118 of them own their own homes, the combined value of these houses being \$8,150,000.00.

Including the Brothers who joined our mystic circle during our centennial celebration here in Tuscaloosa, we have 7,365 ΣAE's now in college. And our total number of initiates, from the very beginning up till now, is 94,175. Just think . . . we'll be issuing ΣAE Pin number 100 thousand within the next few months! And 83,359 of us are still alive, the Chapter Eternal numbering 10,816.

Our old wheelhorses are still carrying on the work through 130 active alumni associations.

Looking at the financial side, we find the investment funds of the Fraternity amount to \$112,779 in the National Endowment Fund, and \$767,613 in the Record Life Subscription Fund. The Student Loan Fund totals \$21,243; and there is \$50,888 in the Special Scholarship Fund.

Now, if I may, I want to interject a tribute to one of your previous speakers . . . the man who made a great dream of Billy Levere's come true. The dream was a beautiful, functional national headquarters for our Fraternity. And the man who brought it to reality was Brother Alfred K. Nippert. In a rare burst of wisdom, I appointed Judge Nippert chairman of the building committee when I was ESA. Work? You never saw anybody devote himself to a job like that Nippert! And thanks to his tireless labors, the Levere Memorial Temple was completed and occupied by the National Headquarters within three years, and the financial obligation disposed of in 15 years.

SPEECH:



Past ESA, ESR Moseley

HATHCOCK: Thank you, Brother Foreman, for that report. The Fraternity is extremely blessed to have a man of your wisdom in command of headquarters. As grateful as we are for ΣAE's material prosperity and wellbeing, as we ring down the curtain on Century Number One, we know that her true strength and glory lies not alone in these things, but in the things of the spirit.

The closing of "The ΣAE Story" is essentially the story of John O. Moseley. He held

with distinction every office at every level of service in Sigma Alpha Epsilon and received every honor possible for the Fraternity to bestow. But his favorite office, which he held for 21 years, was Director of Leadership Training. He conceived and established the Leadership School while he was ESA in 1935. The end result was the attainment by our



Chapters Collegiate of the highest level of spiritual morale, intellectual and social wellbeing reached since the days of DeVotie. Since 1935 over 5,000 of the finest young men in America have come from their chapters to the Temple in Evanston to spend the most inspiring week of their lives studying exemplary fraternity leadership methods at the feet of a master. John Moseley was one of America's leading educators and citizens. His passion in life was the liberal education of the whole man. To him education was a process of developing the total personality, not just the intellect. Toward this end he regarded the National College Social Fraternity as potentially the greatest educating and humanizing influence in the college environment. To the fraternity principle his life was completely dedicated, and he worked constantly for the advancement of ΣΑΕ. It was because he believed that through this medium he could reach more lives with the touchstone of inspiration that he resigned a university presidency to accept the position of Eminent Supreme Recorder of ΣΑΕ in 1950. His innovation of the Greek Week idea, his copious writings and extensive lectures on fraternity subjects, have enthroned his name in the Interfraternity Hall of Fame. It has not been easy to tell this story because our dearly beloved brother, John, last October 10th joined hands with our Founders and nearly 10,000 other brothers of our Chapter Eternal. This was to have been his program tonight. He wrote the original script and his constant prayer was to be present to share this glorious Centennial Celebration with us. He regarded it not as the end of one century, but the beginning of a bright new era of accomplishment for the fraternity of our dreams. But like so many of history's great leaders, he was permitted to see but never enter his promised land. Nonetheless, his presence is very real among us tonight. The example of his noble life will radiate the light of his smile and his immortal spirit

down the pathways of the Fraternity's future, shining ever more and more unto the perfect day. Echoing the faith of the Founders and his own devout belief in the practical idealism of ΣΑΕ, these words of John O. Moseley penned shortly before his passing will reverberate down through the halls of time:

**SPEECH:**

**MOSELEY:** Let our program for the future keep us continually on the alert against complacency. Let us bring to our altars young Americans who believe in God and the destiny of our country. Young men who come to school to get an education. Pledges who by home training have been taught the inviolability of the human personality and the sanctity of private property. Brothers who will respect their oath, live the ritual and regard their fraternity as a vehicle of self-improvement.

With a membership like that, we shall continue to "show the way."

**MUSIC:** *Music up and down to BG.*

**NARRATOR:** One hundred years and all is well. (*Music Background*). One hundred years are gone (*Music*) and the minutes of this meeting will be with the mellow pages of the past. Our possessions, our work, our songs, our very lives—in our turn—we shall surrender to Time!

But something our eyes never saw, our hands never touched, but which we fed with our hearts shall live for us beyond our days.

As it dwells among us—shining and real at this moment—the treasure which Sigma Alpha Epsilon keeps for the men who follow: Friendship, Scholarship, Gentlemanliness, Patriotism, Leadership, and Honor. And they shall find—as we do now—this treasure blesses those who keep it safe—for those who defend the nobility of man touch the Hand of God.

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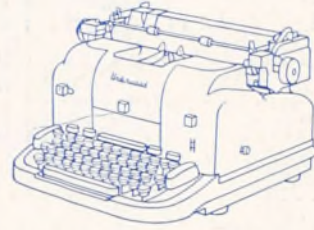
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
