MISSISSIPPI GAMMA was chartered at the University of Mississippi (more commonly known as "Ole Miss"). Oxford, in 1866, and thus is in its 91st year and enjoying the facilities of a brand new home. In 1869 the Chapter became inactive as a result of Federal Control and the Negro Invasion, but was re-established in 1882. In 1912 the Chapter was removed from the campus with other fraternities by the State Legislature. The Zeller Bill to repeal the anti-fraternity law brought the Chapter back in 1926. The Chapter did not have a house until 1935 when the famous "Eric Dawson Hall" lodge was built. After its destruction by fire five years ago, the new house on the same property was dedicated in December, 1956. It is located on L.Q.C. Lamar Road named in honor of the famous statesman who founded the Chapter. Standing out among prominent alumni today is Author William Faulkner, Pulitzer Prize winner, who lives in Oxford. ILLINOIS DELTA at Millikin University, Decatur, was chartered on January 11, 1911, the youngest of three Illinois Chapters, with Illinois Psi-Omega at Northwestern having been chartered in 1894 and Illinois Beta at the University of Illinois in 1899. The present house was acquired in 1952. The Chapter boasts of such alumni as Eugene Sutherd, former athletic director, and Elbert S. Smith, Illinois State Auditor.

Eminent Supreme Archons in Oklahoma City: Edward G. Hathcock, Calif. Delta '31 (UCLA), of Beverly Hills, Calif., who presided at the 101st Anniversary National Convention in September, and Leo S. Cade, Okla. Kappa '22 (Oklahoma), of Oklahoma City, who was elected as Eminent Supreme Archon after serving as Eminent Supreme Duty Archon.

HARMONY OF SESSIONS and hospitality of local alumni marked the 101st Anniversary National Convention of Sigma Alpha Epsilon and the 57th biennial meeting held at the Skirvin Tower in Oklahoma City, Okla., September 1-2-3-4, 1957, immediately following the 23rd Annual Leadership School at the Levere Memorial Temple in Evanston, Ill., August 18-30.

Highlights of the Convention presided over by Edward G. Hathcock, Calif. Delta '31 (UCLA), Eminent Supreme Archon, of Beverly Hills, Calif., included the granting of three charters to petitioning local fraternities at Simpson College, Indianola, Iowa, Ripon College, Ripon, Wis., and Evansville College, Evansville, Ind.; presenting Distinguished Service Awards and Citations to two Past Eminent Supreme Archons, Judge Walter B. Jones, Ala. Alpha-Mu '10 (Auburn), Ala. Mu (Alabama), of Montgomery, Ala., and Charles F. Collins, Mass. Beta-Upsilon '12 (BU), Acting Archon of Province Alpha, of Port Clyde, Maine, and to a former Province Archon, Dr. Edley H. Jones, La. Tau-Upsilon '22 (Tulane), of Jackson, Miss., Archon of old Province Theta; bestowing the title of honorary chief of the Otoe-Missouri Indian tribe upon Gen. J. Washington Moore, Tenn. Nu '91 (Vanderbilt), of Nashville, Tenn., oldest living Past ESA, by Chief Baptiste B. ("Bat") Shunatona, Sr., Okla. Kappa '27 (Oklahoma), attorney in Wewoka, Okla.

Other highlights included the Convention banquet informal talk by Joe Foss, S. D. Sigma '40 (South Dakota), Governor of South Dakota, who flew by Beech Bonanza from Pierre with John Dewell, S. D. Sigma '53, and was greeted at the airport by Governor of Oklahoma, Raymond Gary, a banquet guest, and Earl Foster, Jr., Okla. Kappa '39, general chairman; the representation of 35 Alumni Associations, the largest number recorded at any convention, and the addition of another Province making a total of 21, Province Zeta having been confined to Kansas and Missouri and creating Province Tau for Iowa, Nebraska and South Dakota.

Oklahoman Elected ESA

Leo S. Cade, *Okla. Kappa* '22, of Oklahoma City, was unanimously elected Eminent Supreme Archon during the afternoon session of Tuesday, September 3. Mr. Cade, who deals in farming and investments, is manager of the Touchdown Club with office in the First National Building. He is also manager of the Cimarron Club and a member of the Petroleum Club and the Oklahoma Historical Society. He is a former vice president of the First National Bank of Geary, Okla., and a director of the Bank of Meeker. Former Archon of old Province Theta, Mr. Cade has held every office on the Supreme Council since his election as Eminent Supreme Chronicler at the Los Angeles, Calif., Convention in 1949.

Other members unanimously elevated on the Supreme Council were Howard P. Falls, Va. Tau '33 (Richmond), of Richmond, Va., Eminent Supreme Deputy Archon; Arthur L. Beck, Pa. Phi '22 (Carnegie), of Buffalo, N. Y., Eminent Supreme Warden, and Dr. Glen T. Nygreen, Wash. Alpha '39 (Washington), of Kent State University, Ohio, Eminent Supreme Herald and who was also elected Director of Leadership Training.

The new member of the Supreme Council is Gurnett Steinhauer, *Colo. Zeta* '31 (Denver), business manager of the Colorado School of Mines in Golden, and Archon of Province Eta (Colorado and Wyoming). He was named Eminent Supreme Chronicler, one of the most important offices on the Council due to the customary procedure of rotating in office by election at each Convention. Mr. Steinhauer is the brother of George N. Steinhauer, *Colo. Chi* '27 (Colorado), of Denver, former Archon of Province Eta, and Stuart Steinhauer, *Miss. Gamma* '41 (Mississippi) and the son of the late Frederick C. Steinhauer, *Colo. Lambda* '03 (Colo. Mines), who died in Denver in 1947.

Unanimously elected Eminent Supreme Recorder was Rex A. Smith, Neb. Lambda-Pi '24 (Nebraska), who had been appointed to the Evanston office position by the Su-

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
preme Council in July, 1956, following the death of Past ESA John O. Moseley, Okla. Kappa '16, Calif. Alpha (Stanford), in October, 1955. Honorary Eminent Supreme Archon named at the Convention was Neil H. McElroy, Mass. Gamma '25 (Harvard), U. S. Secretary of Defense and former president of Procter & Gamble of Cincinnati. Details concerning his Cabinet post are carried elsewhere in this issue.

A new member of the Board of Trustees is Charles G. Gambrell, Mass. Gamma '27, of New York City. He is vicepresident of the Irving Trust Company on Wall Street and has been with this bank during his entire business life. He was a lieutenant colonel in the Air Force from 1942 to 1945. A deacon in the Brick Presbyterian Church, he is a member of the Harvard Club, University Club, the New York Southern Society and the Newcomer Society. He and his four blood brothers and a sister are listed in Who's Who in America. Two of his brothers are E. Smythe Gambrell, Mass. Gamma '22, Atlanta, Ga., lawyer and president of the American Bar Association in 1955-56, and William H. Gambrell, Mass. Gamma '25, vice president of the New York Trust Company, New York City. The new Board of Trustees member, elected for a term of 10 years, was nominated at the Convention by Halford J. Pope, Mass. Gamma '25, vice president.

Initiation Fee, Dues Raised

In order to assist the National Fraternity to meet operating costs and give greater service to the Chapters, the Convention voted to increase the national initiation fee of \$25.00 to \$30.00 and raise semi-annual Chapter membership dues from \$7.50 to \$8.50. This action was taken following



then introduced Earl Foster as general chairman who praised the co-operation of the Oklahoma City Alumni Association. ESR Rex Smith then called the first official roll. George Kallusky of California Delta led the convention in song. ESA Hathcock then gave his report, stating "Because Oklahoma is a great ΣAE state, it deserves the honor of hosting a National Convention." In referring to the strength of ΣAE , he strongly recommended a fourth visitation officer to be employed. ESR Smith then announced committee appointments.

The Monday morning session, September 2, started with the invocation being given by Phil Bernhart of W. Va. Alpha. The first order of business was the presentation of the Credentials Committee report by Charles Motley, Archon of Province Gamma. Past ESA Lauren Foreman then gave the report of Committee on Rules and Order of Business. Leo S. Cade then gave his report as ESDA, Howard P. Falls as ESW, Arthur L. Beck as ESH and Glen T. Nygreen as ESCh., who gave a detailed account of the Leadership School as director. This was followed by the report of ESR Rex Smith. Following his report in which he listed prominent deceased members since the 1955 Convention, ESA Hathcock called for a moment of silent prayer.

Scholarship Commissioner Report

Scholarship Commissioner Ray Dein then gave his report to the Convention. He said in part: "High scholastic attainments can be achieved if some real effort is put on the job. Figures indicate that in some parts of the country our fraternity system is not living up to its possibilities or its challenges scholastically. I should like to remind you that improved scholarship for our individual members is much more than a matter of pride to the fraternity system. We are literally failing our own members if we do not set up as a desirable precept of full fraternity membership the goal of acceptable scholastic attainment."

ESR Smith then gave a report as Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the Levere Memorial Foundation. This included a report of Park W. Stickney, N. H. Alpha '08 (Dartmouth), as chairman of the Levere Memorial Temple Building Committee, the Sustaining Fund, Special Scholarship Fund, Student Loan Fund, Lt. Fred E. Hummel, Jr. Memorial Scholarship Fund and the Advisory Council.

Prior to the Convention photograph at the Monday afternoon session, ESA Hathcock introduced Past ESAs J. Washington Moore, Marvin E. Holderness, Lauren Foreman, Charles F. Collins, G. A. Ginter, Emmett B. Moore, Robert R. Aurner, Cobb C. Torrance. Counsel Norman H. Pritchard then suggested that the report of the Permanent Committee on the National Laws be turned over to the Committee on National Laws. Past ESA Emmett B. Moore read the report on the Permanent Extension Investigation Committee in the absence of Past ESA Fred H. Turner, chairman, in which was given the committee's list of approved institutions for possible Chapters. Neil H. McElroy, Mass. Gamma '25

Accepting appointment to probably the most responsible governmental position outside the Presidency of the United States and resigning as head of one of the country's top soap companies was the August action of a member of Sigma Alpha Epsilon, Neil H. McElroy, *Mass. Gamma* '25 (Harvard), who was named U. S. Secretary of Defense by President Eisenhower and confirmed by the Senate, and who left his job as President of Procter & Gamble of Cincinnati, Ohio.

Mr. McElroy who zoomed to the Procter & Gamble presidency in 23 years after joining P&G's Adversiting Department in 1925, began a tour of certain continental military installations, prior to taking office as Secretary of Defense in Washington. Shortly after he moved to Washington he was named ΣAE 's Honorary Eminent Supreme Archon at the 101st Anniversary National Convention in Oklahoma City, Okla., September 3, 1957.

To greet him in Washington was Senator Richard B. Russell, Jr., Ga. Beta '18 (Georgia), who was chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee when McElroy went before the group for a public hearing on his nomination on August 15. Senator Russell was TIME Magazine cover man on August 12, concerning the civil rights bill.

Leader In Activities

As president of Procter & Gamble, McElroy directed the varied activities of a large diversified company, but he also found time for a substantial number of local and national civic activities. In 1955 he devoted much of his time to the many responsibilities as Chairman of the White House Conference on Education. After joining P&G in 1925, his year of graduation with an A.B. degree from Harvard, he held positions of Promotion department manager and advertising and promotion manager, and in 1943 was made a director and vice president in charge of advertising.

Procter and Gamble President Becomes U.S. Secretary of Defense

Born in 1904 in Berea, Ohio, he was married to Miss Mary Camilla Fry in 1929. They have three children, Nancy Sue, Barbara Ellen and Malcolm Neil, residing in Hyde Park. In addition to his responsibilities as P&G's chief operating executive, Mr. McElroy was a director of the General Electric Company and a director of the Chrysler Corporation.

McElroy has served as a trustee of the National Fund for Medical Education, a director of the Council for Financial Aid to Education, a member of the Business Advisory Council—U. S. Department of Commerce and vice chairman of the United Community Campaigns of America. He is a former chairman of the National Industrial Conference Board, a former member of the Board of Overseers of Harvard University and is a past president of the Association of Soap and Glycerine Producers and the Associated Harvard Club.

In Cincinnati he was a trustee of the Institute of Fine Arts, chairman of the Advisory Committee of the College of Medicine of the University of Cincinnati, vice chairman of the Board of Trustees, Cincinnati and Hamilton County Community Chest, and a member of the executive committee of the Citizens Development Committee and the Summer Opera Association.



Caffery on Special Missions

Jefferson Caffery, La. Tau-Upsilon '06 (Tulane), record holding diplomat in length of service, has retired as ambassador after 29 years of foreign duty and 44 years of governmental work, but he has been on special assignments from Washington. In September he was located at the American Embassy in Rome, Italy. During 1956-57 he acted as representative of the special Senate Committee to study Foreign Aid Programs in Italy, France, Spain, Portugal and Great Britain. He was on a mission to Karachi as personal representative of President Eisenhower for the inauguration of the first president of the Pakistan Republic and of the Pakistan Republic. Caffery started his diplomatic career when he went to Bucharest as consular in 1924. He was consul in Cuba, Costa Rica and Canada. He became assistant secretary of state and then ambassador to Cuba and Brazil. He became ambassador to France in 1944, during World War II, and ambassador to Egypt in 1949, where he witnessed the construction of a magnificent embassy.




Cited for Industry-Kenan







Leadership—The Ideal



listed qualifications for entering the publication contests at the National Convention.




SECOND SESSION

Following sectional conferences on Tuesday morning, guest speaker was William S. Zerman, Phi Gamma Delta, dean of men at Ohio Wesleyan University, and former traveling secretary for the Phi Gams. He called strong attention to the rising tide of enrollment in colleges and universities. Said he: "As leaders in your college communities and in communities after you leave school you will be more and more concerned at increased enrollment. Millions of dollars are going into dormitories and other student buildings, but what about actual education? How will this affect the four-year college and the junior college? Statistics show that not enough people are going into educational fields.

"And how do fraternity organizations fit into this picture?" Dean Zerman asked. "How are we going to rebuild our houses? This is a serious problem. Fraternity—what is friendship and how is it expressed? Formal Chapter meetings are very important. With fraternity and friendship you still have a business to run and it must be thought out.


"We have responsibility for each other. You should worry about scholarship early in the year for as a leader you can't just sit back and be popular on the campus. This is your opportunity to learn how to lead. Everything that you learn at your Leadership School is common sense, but you must think what the objectives are."

Tuesday afternoon was devoted to Archivist Lauren Foreman on his glowing "History of ΣAE " and a second general discussion based on alumni relations under the direction of Bill Hovan, *Ill. Psi Omega* (Northwestern) adviser. Sectional conferences followed that night after dinner at Willard Hall.

Wednesday morning, following sectional conferences, Director Nygreen delivered his message on "Leadership." Said he: "The leader of your Chapter, the EA, should trade credit for work; give the other member credit for what he does. Watch the scholarship. If a man is a leader in some field on campus but does not meet the scholarship requirements, speak up and keep that man out. Of course you will be criticized, but that you must take. A Chapter cannot afford a low scholarship man."

With a dreary, drizzly rain most of Wednesday in lieu of ideal weather since the previous Friday, a group photograph was arranged in the "Court of the Archons" following a conference on the initiation held in the Panhellenic Room with Jay Beck, Director Nygreen and ESA Hathcock taking part. This was followed by a pilgrimage to the graves of Past ESAs William C. Levere and John O. Moseley.

The Powers allowing, the ceremony went off beautifully with not too many members running to their cars for raincoats. Oddly there actually was no rainfall during the services. As of the previous week Archivist Foreman gave the memorial talk for Billy Levere. A prayer was given by Prentice E. Brown, Jr. of North Carolina Theta. The octet made up of Paul Wright, Jim Donahoe, LeRoy Banks, Bill Mitchell, Gary W. Goldenbogan, Lauren Stanley, Bob Colness and John Heilig, was led by George Kallusky. 

Iowa Beta, although there was no award to be presented as this Chapter had previously won it. Nebraska Lambda-Pi won the award for the most improved scholarship in Province Zeta.

ESR Smith presented the Chapter Efficiency trophy to Missouri Gamma and Pennsylvania Zeta, with Pennsylvania Zeta holding the cup for the first year and then to be passed on to Missouri Gamma. Honorable mention went to Alabama Mu, California Alpha and Indiana Alpha. Province Kappa Ralph Klindt presented the Publications Awards to Florida Alpha for the best newspaper-type publication with Wisconsin Phi as runner-up; best magazine-type to Georgia Beta with Kansas Beta as runner-up; best scrap book to Ohio Epsilon with Indiana Delta and West Virginia Alpha as runners-up.

Following the introduction of Gov-

ernor Gary of Oklahoma by Hathcock, the new officers of the Supreme Council were installed by Past ESA Marvin E. Holderness. Hathcock then introduced Chairman Earl Foster again and called attention to the souvenir glasses on the tables given as gifts by the Oklahoma City Alumni Association.

Governor Foss Speaks

After being introduced appropriately by Mr. Hathcock, Governor Joe Foss of South Dakota indicated his pleasure of attending his first ΣAE Convention. The Governor said: "Now one of the first things that you learn in a fraternity, you worry about doing something about your fellow man. In this life you have to piece things together, you have to fit things together. You can be the smartest individual in the world but if you don't know when to put these things that you know forward, or to whom to put them forward, you are going to run into just a little bit of trouble."

In ESA Hathcock's farewell message at the banquet he stated: "Some wise man has said that service to our brothers and mankind is just the price we pay for being able to live here on earth. And I certainly subscribe to that idea." Hathcock then introduced Leo S. Cade as the new ESA, who said: "A fraternity Chapter continues on a campus only by invitation of the institution. A partnership relation must exist and there should be mutual and cooperative interest with the ultimate goal of both contributing to the education of college youth. A fraternity is composed of things material and spiritual. They are distinct, separate, yet both are important. One should not interfere with the right of the other although they should mutually support the other."

Distinguished Service Awards

ESA Hathcock then announced the awarding of three Distinguished Service Awards and Citations. The first award was made by Past ESA Lauren Foreman to Judge Walter B. Jones, Past ESA, who had made history by receiving one electoral vote for U. S. President in the last election!

Charles F. Collins, Past ESA and Acting Archon of Province Alpha received the Distinguished Service Award from ESA Hathcock, who announced him as Founder No. 121 of the National Endowment Fund. The third Distinguished Service Award to be presented at the banquet was postponed until the following day due to the absence of Dr. Edley Jones.

Past ESA Chester D. Lee then presented to Mrs. Edward G. Hathcock a silver table set on behalf of the Fraternity in appreciation for her efforts and her stimulation to ESA Hathcock for his work. In appreciation of the gifts for his wife, ESA Hathcock introduced his two daughters, April and Penny, and son, Gordy to the audience. Prior to the close of the banquet, Past ESA Foreman suggested that the Citation for Dr. Edley Jones be read in order that all would understand why he was to receive it.

The Wednesday morning session, September 4 was called to order by Retiring ESA Hathcock. The invocation was given by Past ESA J. Washington Moore. A telegram from Past ESA Albert M. Austin and a letter from Theta Upsilon were read by Hathcock. The Distinguished Service Award was then presented to Past Province Theta Archon Edley Jones by the new ESA, Leo S. Cade. Dr. Jones had been absent at the banquet due to the illness of his wife. ESR Smith then read a telegram sent to the new Honorary ESA, Neil H. McElroy.

ESH Nygreen led the final discussion and action on the report of the Committee of the National Laws, involving original proposals in *Phi Alpha* and revised proposals. One of the final reports was made by ESH Glen Nygreen regarding the setting up of basic libraries in Chapter houses, with the Levere Memorial Foundation bearing most of the expense and the individual Chapter bearing the remainder.

After again paying tribute to the Convention success to the Oklahoma City Alumni Association, and namely, Earl Foster, Norman Reynolds and Ralph Carlin, Retiring ESA Hathcock presented the tradition instigated by Past ESA Chester D. Lee, of handing down the badge of the ESA, a replica of the original badge, to the new ESA Leo S. Cade. Mr. Cade in turn presented to Hathcock on behalf of the Supreme Council a gavel engraved with Hathcock's name and his 1955-57 tenure of office as ESA.

After announcing that the Supreme Council would meet with the locals having been granted charters to plan installation dates and other matters immediately following the Convention, plans were confirmed in regard to delegates going by chartered bus to visit Oklahoma Kappa at the University of Oklahoma, Norman in early afternoon, in order to be back at the hotel and to check out for the special train for Chicago and to meet other transportation arrangements.

The Convention closed with the singing of "Friends" under the direction of George Kallusky and John Heileg. Thus the concensus of opinion was that it was one of the most smoothly operated, harmonious and hospitable conventions of Sigma Alpha Epsilon.


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
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
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
