109th ANNIVERSARY NATIONAL CONVENTION IN ATLANTA, GEORGIA

Sessions To Be Held at Biltmore Hotel, June 20-23, 1965

FOR THE SEVENTH TIME Atlanta, Ga., is the site of Sigma Alpha Epsilon's National Convention. This, the 109th anniversary session will be held at the Biltmore Hotel, Sunday through Wednesday noon, June 20 to 23, 1965. Former conventions were in Atlanta in 1872, 1881, 1886, 1891, 1906 and 1924.

Co-chairmen of the Atlanta Convention Committee are John R. Maddox, III, and William A. Dunlap with the help of members of the Atlanta Alumni Association. The committee includes such outstanding ΣAE workers as Robert L. Cousins of the Extension Investigation Committee; Dudley L. Moore, Deputy Archon, and John B. Warren, Georgia Alumni Secretary of Province Epsilon.

Unique this year will be a complete change in convention procedure with the distribution of the officer, standing committee and financial reports in loose-leaf form at the time of registration. There will be panel discussions and presentation of awards during the business sessions. Details are being worked out by Rex A. Smith, ESR, and the National Office staff.

Registration will take place on Sunday morning, June 20, in the Petite Lounge on the lobby floor of the Biltmore. It is expected that some 400 registrants will receive certification, convention tickets and necessary material at that time.

Honorary ESA Ivan Allen, Jr., Mayor of Atlanta, will give the welcoming to the delegates at the opening session Sunday afternoon. That night at a buffet supper on the Garden Terrace Dr. Glen T. Nygreen, ESA, and the other members of the Supreme Council will be present to greet all Chapter and alumni representatives and their ladies.

The business sessions will commence Sunday afternoon and will conclude by noon on Wednesday, June 23, at which time convention mileage checks will be issued by the ESR and National Treasurer. Every delegate will be assigned to a committee and assignment information will be available at the time of registration.

Monday night all delegates and ladies will be the guests of Mayor Allen at an outdoor barbeque on his estate. Buses will be provided for all, thus autos will not be necessary.

On Tuesday night the convention banquet will be held at the Biltmore, followed by a dance. Banquet speakers will be announced in the May issue of THE RECORD. Dates for the dance will be provided for undergraduates by members of Georgia Beta, Epsilon, Phi and Psi living in the Atlanta area.

During the convention a special luncheon will be held for the ladies, followed by a tour of Atlanta and Stone Mountain. A hospitality room will be maintained on the mezzanine floor of the Biltmore during the three-day period for the ladies.

Information concerning hotel reservations and credentials will be sent directly from the National Office in April to those entitled to seats in the convention and others who plan to attend.

PHI ALPHA BETA—Little Rock University, Little Rock, Ark. This petition was received on March 17, 1964.

PHI ALPHA—University of Southern Mississippi, Hattiesburg, Miss. This petition was received on April 27, 1964.

PHI TAU ALPHA—General Motors Institute, Flint, Mich. This petition was submitted on April 28, 1964.

BETA CHI-California State College at Los Angeles, Los Angeles, Calif. This petition was received on September 25, 1964.

DELTA KAPPA NU—Western Kentucky State College, Bowling Green, Ky. This petition was submitted on November 25, 1964.

PHI ALPHA—Lewis and Clark College, Portland, Ore. This petition was received on December 9, 1964.

DELTA PHI BETA—Northern Illinois University, DeKalb, Ill. This petition was presented on December 17, 1964.

Convention Chapter Awards

Excerpt from the National Laws

TITLE XVIII—TROPHIES

ARTICLE 73.—How Awarded.

Sec. 227. Trophies. At every National Convention, the following trophies shall be awarded to Chapters Collegiate selected from among those entering the several competitions and meeting the conditions prescribed:

(1) The Scholarship Cup, offered by the Washington Alumni Association, on the recommendation of the Scholarship Commissioner, said cup to become the permanent property of any chapter which wins it three times;

(2) The Scholarship Improvement Cup, on the recommendation of the Scholarship Commissioner, to become the permanent property of the Chapter which wins it at each Convention;

(3) The Chapter Efficiency Cup, on the recommendation of the Eminent Supreme Recorder, said cup to become the permanent property of winning Chapter at each National Convention;

(4) The Chapter Publications Cups, one for newspaper-type publication and the other for magazine-type publication, upon the recommendation of the Editor of THE RECORD to the Convention Publications Committee, said cups to become the permanent property of the Chapter or Chapters which wins or win them at each Convention;

(5) The Scrap Book Cup, on the recommendation of the Convention Scrap Book Committee, said cup to become the permanent property of any winning Chapter.

Chapters that have not already submitted copies of their publications since the 1963 Convention should do so prior to the June Convention. Chapters taking part in the scrap book competition must have their books on display at the Convention in Room 1007 at the Atlanta Biltmore Hotel.

1965 NATIONAL CONVENTION FUND

THE CONVENTION FUND, to be divided among eligible delegates in attendance at the 1965 Convention, will amount to \$30,737.48. As established in Section 38 of the National Laws, "Until June 30, 1964, twelve percent of all monies received from National Dues from Chapters Collegiate shall be set aside for a Convention Fund. After June 30, 1965, five dollars (\$5.00) out of each initiation fee received from Chapters Collegiate shall be set aside for a Convention Fund."

Delegates eligible to share in the Convention Fund include all Past Eminent Supreme Archons, the Supreme Council, the Eminent Supreme Recorder, the Honorary Eminent Supreme Archon, the Scholarship Commissioner, one delegate from the Board of Trustees, the Director of Leadership Training, the Chairman of the Extension Investigation Committee, Province Archons or Deputy Archons in the absence of the Archon, and one delegate from each Chapter Collegiate. Alumni Association delegates do not share in the Fund.

Each of the 183 delegates entitled to a share in the Fund this year will receive the equivalent of \$10 per day or a total of \$30.00. This \$30 will not be given to the delegate, but rather will be used to pay his Registration Fee. Registration Fees for the 183 delegates amount to \$5,490, which when deducted from the total Convention Fund, leaves a balance of \$25,247.48 to be distributed for mileage allowances.

Each delegate will receive a proportionate mileage allowance for the distance he travels in relation to the total distance traveled by all delegates. The Standard Highway Mileage Guide of Rand McNally & Co. was used to determine the one-way mileage to Atlanta from the delegate's home, or in the case of chapters from the city in which the chapter is located. The total mileage thus determined is 182,949 miles, allowing approximately 14 cents per mile.

Shown below is a breakdown of the Convention Fund: \$30,737.48

The distribution of mileage checks will be made after adjournment of the final session of the Convention and they may be cashed at the Biltmore Hotel. Chapter delegates should be particularly aware that their mileage check will be made payable to the chapter and is the property of the chapter. The chapter should make arrangements with its delegate regarding any additional expense incurred or any unspent portion of the mileage check. Delegates should be prepared to pay their expenses to Atlanta and through the days of the Convention.

As stated earlier, the \$30 registration fee will automatically be paid by the \$10 daily allowance for delegates entitled to a share in the Convention Fund. However, Alumni Association delegates and alternate Chapter and Province delegates will have to pay the \$30 registration fee. Among other things, the registration fee includes the Sunday evening terrace buffet, the Monday evening bus transportation and barbecue, and the Tuesday night banquet and dance. The registration fee for ladies will be \$20.00, which includes the above events and the special luncheon and tour mentioned on the first page.

If a delegate does not attend or is not eligible to be seated in the Convention, his share of the Fund shall be forfeited to the Student Loan Fund as provided in the National Laws. Any chapter not represented at a National Convention by a regularly elected delegate shall pay a fine of \$25.00 unless excused by the Convention.

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE NATIONAL LAWS

EACH of the proposed amendments to the National Laws presented herewith was submitted to the Eminent Supreme Recorder not later than December 20, 1964, and may therefore be considered at the 109th Anniversary National Convention meeting on June 20, 1965, under the provisions of Section 215 of the National Laws. Unless otherwise noted, the proposals are submitted by the Eminent Supreme Recorder with the approval of the Supreme Council.

Proposal (1). (Submitted by California Epsilon) Amend Section 5 by deleting from the fifth line the following: 'and socially acceptable throughout the Fraternity"

Proposal (2). (Submitted by John H. Baugh, Jr.) Amend Section 15 by adding the following to the present list of officers.

"(11) An Alumni Secretary:

(12) An Assistant to the Eminent Supreme Recorder."

Proposal (3). Amend Section 26 (B) (12) to read as follows:

"(12) Regularly to file one copy of THE RECORD and Phi Alpha for each Chapter Collegiate, and at the close of each two-year period have both publications bound together and sent to each Chapter Collegiate, the expense therefor to be paid from the National Treasury.'

Proposal (4). Amend Section 26 (C) (14) to read as follows:

"(14) To submit annually, for the information and approval of the Supreme Council, a budget of the probable income and expenditure for the following year;'

Proposal (5). (Submitted by John H. Baugh, Jr.) Amend Section 30 by re-numbering it Section 32, and at the end of sub-paragraph (1) add the following:

"the Alumni Secretary and the Assistant to the Eminent Supreme Recorder."

Proposal (6). (Submitted by John H. Baugh, Jr.) Amend by making a new Section 30 to read as follows:

'Section 30. Alumni Secretary. An Alumni Secretary appointed by the Supreme Council as soon as is possible after each National Convention, shall work with the Eminent Supreme Herald and the Eminent Supreme Recorder in promoting interest with the alumni throughout the Fraternity. He shall work with the Chapters and various alumni groups in every manner possible to better relations and communications and shall further the establishment of alumni associations and, in general, promote alumni interest."

Proposal (7). (Submitted by John H. Baugh, Jr.) Amend by re-numbering the present Section 31 making it Section 33 and making a new Section 31, which will read as follows:

"Section 31. An Assistant to the Eminent Supreme Recorder.

An Assistant to the Eminent Supreme Recorder appointed by the Supreme Council, when deemed practicable, as soon as is possible after each National Convention, shall work closely with the Eminent Supreme Recorder and assume responsibilities as so designated by the Supreme Council and the Eminent Supreme Recorder. It shall be the duty and responsibility of this officer to promote the progress and further the interest of the Fraternity in every manner possible by assisting the Eminent Supreme Recorder, as so designated."

Proposal (8). (Submitted by John H. Baugh, Jr.) Amend the present Section 33 by re-numbering it properly, deleting the present second paragraph and substituting the following:

"The salaries of the Chapter Supervisors, the Associate Editor of THE RECORD, the Treasurer, the Alumni Secretary, the Assistant to the Eminent Supreme Recorder, and office employees shall be determined from time to time by the Supreme Council after consultation with the Eminent Supreme Recorder."

Proposal (9). Amend Section 69 (5) (c) by deleting the entire sub-section and making it read as follows:

"Program Content. The emphasis of all programs with Pledges and/or Active Members shall be on the development of spirit and understanding of the dignity and worth of each and every individual. The purposes and objectives of all programs shall be discussed with all participants in advance. Because they are inconsistent with the Ritual and the objectives of the Fraternity, these practices specifically and all other similar activities are prohibited at any and all times in all Chapters for Pledges and all others: paddling, physical exercises resulting in excessive fatigue or exhaustion, deprivation of normal sleep and rest, any form of corporal or mental punishment, the placing of anyone in actual or simulated peril or jeopardy of health, undignified methods and stunts, either private or public quests, treasure hunts and road trips.'

Proposal (10). Amend Section 82 by inserting the words "in good standing" after the word "members" as it appears both times in this section.

Proposal (11). Amend Section 86 (1) by substituting may" for "shall" in the second line, making it read as "may" follows:

"Whenever a Chapter Collegiate furnishes table board, it may be under the management of a Steward, to be elected annually."

Proposel (12). Amend Section 97 by adding a sub-paragraph (3), as follows:

"Promote and coordinate the alumni program of the Chapter." Proposal (13). Amend Section 100 (8) to read as follows:

"Prepare and forward to the National Office and the Province Archon by the twentieth of the following month, the monthly report as required in paragraph (3)."

Proposal (14). Amend Section 100 (9) by removing subsection (c).

Proposal (15). (Submitted by Edwin L. Knowles, Adviser to Province Pi) Amend Section 107 by substituting "one hundred dollars" in place of "twenty-five dollars."

Proposal (16). (Submitted by Edwin L. Knowles, Adviser to Province Pi) Amend Section 110 to read as follows:

"No Chapter, delinquent with respect to any sums or reports to the Province or National Fraternity, is entitled to representa-tion in the National or Province Convention, unless cleared five days prior thereto."

Proposal (17). (Submitted by Howard E. Hansen) Amend Section 114 (2) by starting this section with: "After July 1, 1966," and substituting "\$100" for "\$50".

Proposal (18). (Submitted by Howard E. Hansen) Amend Section 117 by changing "fifty-dollar" to "one hundreddollar".

Proposal (19). (Submitted by National Board of Trustees) Amend sub-paragraph 139 (1) (b) (i) by deleting the words: "in the case of the National Endowment Fund,"

Proposal (20). (Submitted by National Board of Trustees) Amend sub-paragraph 139 (1) (b) (ii) by insert-ing in the first line, atter the words "unsecured loans," the words "to be made only from the National Endowment Fund" and by inserting in the fourth line of the sub-paragraph, just before the words "to bear interest" the words, "or up to \$5,000 when note is co-signed or guaranteed by not less than five responsible alumni or others to amounts that total the principal amount of the note"; so that the sub-paragraph as amended shall read as follows: "(b) (ii) when unsecured: unsecured loans to be made only from the National Endowment Fund, however, not to exceed the less of \$5,000 or 10 per cent of the net value of the assets of the borrower, valued in such manner as shall be determined by the Board of Trustees, or up to \$5,000 when note is co-signed or guaranteed by not less than five responsible alumni or others in amounts that total the principal amount of the note, to bear interest at a rate to be determined by the Board of Trustees, to be repaid in installments not less than quarter-annually over a period of not exceeding three years, and to be represented by the promissory note of the borrower accompanied by its written representation as to the amount of the assets and liabilities of the borrower and the purpose for which the funds are to be used, and the covenant of the borrower that it will use such funds for such purpose only, and that, except for interest, taxes assessments, insurance premiums and necessary charges for maintenance and repairs, the borrower will not without the prior written approval of the Board of Trustees incur any other debts or obligations until it shall repay in full the loan from the Board of Trustees, together with interest and such charge, if any, as may be imposed by the Board of Trustees to reimburse it for expenses incurred in connection with the making of the loan.

Proposal (21). (Submitted by National Board of Trustees) Amend sub-paragraph 139 (4) by striking out the figures "75%" in the third from the last line of the sub-paragraph, and substituting therefor the figures "100%".

Proposal (22). Amend Section 142 by inserting the word "National" in the next to the last line to make it read "the National Board of Trustees".

Proposal (23). (Submitted by Kenneth E. Oakley, Auditor) Delete sub-section 162 (4) entirely and amend subsection 162 (8) to read as follows:

"Any portion of the Fund from time to time not loaned to students shall be invested in such securities or other property as may be approved by the members of the Advisory Council as provided in Section 164."

Proposal (24). Amend Section 186 by deleting the entire section and making it read as follows:

"Summary Expulsion. No member of any student organization, the program of which is primarily devoted to or includes the use of narcotics and marijuana, over-indulgence in the consumption of alcoholic beverages, participation in perversion and/or illicit sexual activities, the preparation and/or distribution of pornographic materials, and the clandestine control of student politics, shall be eligible to membership in the Sigma Alpha Epsilon Fraternity. Examples of such organizations are Theta Nu Epsilon, The Ivy Club, Kappa Beti Phi, and others. Any member who violates this law shall be expelled from the Fraternity. All questions of violation of this section of the law shall be tried by the Supreme Council or Special Commission appointed by it or the Eminent Supreme Archon under Section 177."

Proposal (25). (Submitted by Henry H. Perritt, Jr., Mass. Iota-Tau) Amend Section 190 (5) by striking out the words on lines 7 to 10 which reads as follows, "but no such action shall be taken unless it is impossible for the petitioning group to present its petition to the next National Convention."

Proposal (26). (Submitted by Howard P. Falls, Past ESA) Amend Section 198 by striking out the last sentence.

Proposal (27). Amend Section 200 by substituting the word "private" for the word "secret" in the first line.

Proposal (28). Amend Section 205 by adding the following:

", except by authorization of the Supreme Council."

Proposal (29). Amend Section 214 (a) by striking out the entire sub-section and substituting the following:

"(a) Any member of a Chapter who owes his Chapter more than twice the average sum charged against him monthly, exclusive of initiation fee, shall lose his good standing as a member."

Proposal (30). Amend Section 218 by adding the following to the present section:

"in which case he shall not vote on any question before the Chapter, including proposal of members, or have the privilege of the floor to influence the vote of others."

Proposal (31). (Submitted by Dr. Gary R. Anderson, Scholarship Commssioner) Amend Section 219 (2) (b) by deleting the present sub-section and making it read as follows:

"If his cumulative average is below the average required for graduation from the Institution of which his Chapter is a part, or"

Proposal (32). Amend Section 221 (2) by striking out "and with the approval of the Supreme Council," in the fourth line of the first paragraph; striking out "by the Supreme Council" in the first line of the second paragraph; and by changing the word "certified" to "established" in the third line of the second paragraph.

Alternate Proposal (32A). Amend Section 221 by striking the entire section and substituting the following:

"Section 221 Active Members. Every member shall remain an active member of the Chapter Collegiate by which he was initiated as long as he is a student of collegiate rank at the domicile of such Chapter. Upon transfer to another institution at which there is a Chapter of Sigma Alpha Epsilon, a member shall gain status as an active member of that Chapter under the provision set forth in Article 23 of the National Laws.

Proposal (33). Amend Section 222 by inserting the following after the word "members" in the fifth line: "who are present and in good standing"

Convention Committees

IN ALL deliberative assemblies, the preliminary work in the preparation of matter for their action is accomplished by means of committees. In order to acquaint the delegates to the 109th Anniversary National Convention of Sigma Alpha Epsilon with the committee structure which has evolved through the years, a short resume of some of the major committee functions is presented:

FINANCE—The Finance Committee examines the operating and financial statements for the biennium preceding and approves a budget presented by the Eminent Supreme Recorder for the next two-year period. It also examines the financial reports of the Board of Trustees. It reviews the overall financial management of the Fraternity and makes any suitable suggestions for increasing the amount of support and improving the general operations.

NATIONAL LAWS—All proposed changes to the National Laws which are presented in this Phi Alpha are considered by the National Laws Committee and a recommendation on each is made either for or against adoption.

STATE OF THE ORDER—This Committee considers matters presented at previous Conventions and by members of the existing Committee relative to the general welfare of the Order and makes recommendations for the continued advancement of the Fraternity.

EXTENSION—The eight locals that are petitioning the Convention will first be considered by the Extension Committee. A thorough investigation is conducted by this Committee and a recommendation either for or against granting a charter is presented to the Convention.

SCHOLARSHIP—From information supplied by the Scholarship Commissioner, this Committee selects the recipients of the various Scholarship Awards, reviews the scholastic position of the Fraternity, and makes suitable recommendations for improvement.

In addition to the above, other Committees appointed are: Alumni, Credentials, Convention Fund, The Levere Memorial Foundation, Publications and Scrapbooks, Reinstatements, Resolutions, Rules and Order, and Time and Place. All of these committees serve to expedite the work of the Convention.

If any delegate desires membership on a particular committee, he is asked to submit his request to the Eminent Supreme Recorder. Every effort will be made to honor such requests when the committee assignments are made.
