WOIE ON FINANCE

NATIONAL FINANCIAL REPORT: LOOKING FOR BETTER SECOND QUARTER

The end of September marked the passing of the first quarter of the 1976-77 fiscal year and the assessment proves to be generally encouraging. Potential budgetary problems loomed when many of the start-up costs were received in September. Costs such as badges, merchandise, the annual giving campaign, the RECORD, and initial chapter coordination totaled about \$40,000. This sizable expenditure was met with the cash reserve realized at the end of the 1975-76 fiscal year.

In monetary terms, the Fraternity experienced income of \$91,863 and expenses of \$175,729 or a deficit of \$83,865 during the first quarter of 1976-77. The deficit figure should reduce with increased pledge and initiation fees and alumni contributions during the second quarter. In this manner, the Fraternity will have weathered its low income period and should have a healthy financial year.

WORK NEAR COMPLETION ON NEW MFR

The Fraternity currently supplies bookkeeping forms to chapters included among them an MFR form, (Monthly Financial Report). The form has been under attack for quite some time because it is difficult to understand and complete. We are working on a new MFR, which we hope to complete by January, and we would appreciate any input you would care to give. The present form will remain in stock for those chapters who rely on that format. All chapters are required by National Law to submit a monthly report of their financial transactions.

PLEDGE AND INITIATION REPORTING: DOWNTREND

Many chapters have faithfully reported their initiations yet there remains in Minerva's Realm a silent minority of chapters from whom we have not heard. This presents problems for the Fraternity and the chapter. First hand experience reveals that the chapters that have collected the fees and do not promptly report them to the National Office bring upon themselves enormous management and financial burdens in the future.

As an illustration, a chapter last year misapplied a considerable sum of initiation fee money to social and other areas. When the fees became considerably past due the chapter treasurer had to send out a surprise assessment of \$60.00 to each brother over the summer. Many brothers, needless to say, were quite upset.

We encourage all treasurers to exert sound management and financial practices by applying income toward the proper expenses, especially regarding prompt payment of pledge and initiation fees.

FIRE!

After a 24 hour study stint one Vanderbilt SAE slept right through the alarm, according to ESDA Louis Smith who visited the chapter right after the fire. An alert brother, however, searched through the rooms and was able to rescue the sleeping student in time. Lou indicated that this and other precautions, like the smoke detector installed only weeks before prevented great tragedy at the venerable Tennessee institution. The overall damage to the old house was not too extensive, however smoke damage caused five or six brothers who were residing there to find temporary quarters for several weeks. EA, Brad Wigor, has organized the effort to restore the upper levels to livable condition. The fire was apparently caused by an over-loaded circuit and ancient wiring. Good spirit and the will to carry on mark the attitudes of the Tennessee Nu brothers.

TEXAS DELTA NETS 16 GRAND

The October 3 edition of the Dallas Morning News reported that the SAE's at Southern Methodist University in conjunction with the Chi Omega Sorority raised over \$16,000 in a 30 hour Dance Marathon. The name of the game was raising money for the Muscular Dystrophy Association.

The 1976-77 SAE-FAD Campaign is well underway. The SMU \$16,000 plus the \$1,500 raised by our Clemson Chapter, puts us well on our way toward doubling the \$40,000 check presented to Jerry Lewis last Labor Day by Rick Kelley, National Collegiate Council Chairmar Last year's check doubled the check presented in 1975, bringing our total raised since FAD's inception to over \$60,000. The funds will help find the causes of and the cures for Muscular Dystrophy and related neuromuscular diseases.

SAE chapter participation in this year's "FAD" project looks to be bigger than ever as many events are in the planning stages. Opportunities for involvement in this voluntary program aren't restricted to fund raising. In addition to promoting chapter unity, leadership, and good alumni relations, a project for MDA can help substantially to enhance a chapter's image on campus and in the community. Direct Patient service programs can be organized, brothers can apply on an individual basis for summer camp positions, and chapters can sponsor parties and dinners for stricken members of their communities.
