SPORTSWEAR

Due to the high prices being charged for SAE sportswear items, the National Office decided to stock jerseys, jackets, and tennis-golf shirts as a service to chapters and alumni. These items are priced about 20% below retail and are available for delivery in 2 to 5 days. (Most fraternity sportswear companies require 3 to 8 weeks for delivery). All items are top quality. Please give us your suggestions for future items.

BULK PERMITS CUT COSTS

Chapters of SAE are eligible for non-profit bulk mailing permits. These permits allow mail up to 2 ounces to be shipped anywhere in the U.S. for 1.8¢ per piece which can save a lot of dollars when you compare this to the first class rate of 13¢ per piece. Your chapter can apply for the permit through your local post office. Simply complete Form 3624 and submit the \$15 filing fee along with the National Fraternity IRS exemption letter (available through the National Office), copies of your House Corporation Articles of Incorporation, and copies of your constitution and by-laws. Once your application is accepted, you will be required to pay a \$40 annual fee. If you mail over 400 pieces you will save money. Mailings must be arranged in zip code order and must contain at least 200 pieces.

LMF SEEKS TUTORS

Assistance is available through Tutor-in-Residence fellowships according to Educational Advisor Bob Hamrdla. The Levere Memorial Foundation will make available fellowships of \$1,500 each to be awarded to graduate students who will serve as Tutorsin-Residence at qualified chapters. Host chapters will provide, at their own expense, room and board for the Tutor for the entire academic year. The primary role of the Tutor is to serve as an educational and academic resource for the individual brothers and the entire chapter. PENN EPSILON HOUSE DESTROYED

A two alarm blaze routed 15 brothers from the chapter house at Drexel Institute in Philadelphia early Saturday morning, February 21. Around 2:00 A.M., as a previous night's party was breaking up, a homemade device attached to a door in the second floor library exploded. A series of small fires were extinguished at that time but apparently the fire continued to smolder until a blaze erupted shortly before 5:00 A.M The third floor was almost totally destroyed and there was massive fire, smoke and water damage on the first and second floors. The explosive device was meant as a practical joke which backfired and produced some serious results.

There were no injuries but all personal effects of those living in the house were lost. It appears that the automatic alarm system sounded shortly after the fire broke out and there was a very rapid evacuation. About two weeks earlier the alarm system was discovered to be not operating and had been repaired.

There are a number of lessons to be extracted from this experience. First and foremost, all alarm devices and fire equipment should be regularly checked. Second, it should never be assumed that a fire has been extinguished without confirmation by the fire department. Third, pranks that could conceivably cause fire should be prohibited and if they do occur, dealt with forcefully.

In the case of Pennsylvania Epsilon, the Dean of Students tells us, "please be assured that we are taking all necessary steps to protect the property and organizational interests of Drexel's SAE chapter." There has been a massive response to the chapters needs by the University, the IFC, other fraternities individually, and many SAE's in the Philadelphia area. The chapter will have a difficult time during the next few months, but we are confident that they will overcome all obstacles to assume their previous strong position.

MOTHERS AND OTHERS

Mothers, wives, and sisters, what part do they play in SAE? Out of 185 chapters, 59 have found a way to utilize this valuable resource. The answer is Minerva Clubs.

Minerva Clubs complement alumni associations and give of their time to the active chapters. They may assist with rush entertainment, making draperies for the chapter house, or contributing funds for new furniture. They assist the chapter in many ways, thus making the fraternity experience more rewarding.

The clubs provide many services to the chapter, but what National Office services are available to them? Each Minerva Club is entitled to a charter, membership cards, model constitution and sample ritual. All are provided at no cost. The National Office also offers a badge for \$18.40, tax and gold surcharge included.

As stated in the <u>Phoenix</u>, "what these women have done, they have done with a pure design to help. And they have done it where the need and the ability to help were both present."
