Portland Alumni Present Memorial At Convention

The year is 1967. American involvement in the growing conflict in southeast Asia is escalating. American men, for the most part men the age of today's undergraduate college students, are learning about "the lottery," and "the draft," and, for some, the horrors of war in a distant land called Vietnam. Some of those men are SAEs, brothers. And many never return.

Today, twenty years later, through a gift of the Portland Host Committee of this summer's 131st Anniversary National Convention, a new generation of SAEs will be able to look to the Levere Memorial Temple finally as a structure dedicated to the memory of all of those who died for their country in this most recent war, and as the home of the *ΣΑΕ Vietnam Memorial*, remembering those brothers who lost their lives in Southeast Asia.

The final banquet of the biennial National Convention of ΣΑΕ has traditionally been a time to induct a new Supreme Council, and to thank and say farewell to the outgoing Eminent Supreme Archon. Speeches are made, gifts exchanged, toasts offered.

But no one expected the level of emotion that would be reached that night in Portland. Outgoing Eminent Supreme Archon J. Clarke Houston III delivered a farewell address to the convention, thanking the fraternity and his family, that touched every heart in the room. The assemblage responded with a standing ovation. Then, when it looked like the level could go no higher, Portland host committee member Gary Garnand hushed the assembled brothers to make an important announcement.

Garnand dedicated the ΣΑΕ Viet Nam Memorial to the memory of those who died. The memorial taking the form of a bronze bust in the likeness of immediate past Eminent Supreme Archon J. Clarke Houston, III, will be inscribed at the base with the names of all of those brothers who died as a result of the war. ESA Houston served as a Marine Corps Captain in Vietnam. "Billy Levere had a dream to remember our brothers who fought and died for their country," said Garnand, "however, there is a gap for Vietnam. We wanted to do something special for Clarke, and to remember them."

The clay mold for the bust, executed by a local artist from pic-

tures lent by Houston's wife, Linda, was then unveiled by a Marine Corps Honor Guard. It will be on permanent display in the Levere Memorial Temple.

The sculpture, however, was only a part of the full concept of the memorial. Organizers hope to collect the names of all of the brothers that Sigma Alpha Epsilon lost to the war, so that they may be inscribed on the side panels of the pedestal. A survey of "Chapter Eternal" listings from the 1965 to 1975 volumes of the Record yielded forty-nine names. And an additional search of personal correspondence on file in Evanston added four to the list.

This issue of *The Record* contains the preliminary list, as well as an appeal for information about those who were and were not listed. Please take the time to read over the list, and to let brothers who may not receive *The Record* know about the plans for the memorial.

The Levere Memorial Temple was built and dedicated as a memorial to those who gave their lives for their country as members of the armed services. All throughout the building there are reminders of this theme such as the wood carved busts of men in the various uniforms, service branches, and wars and plaques bearing the names of the gold stars of the War Between the States and the Great World War.

Now we have a memorial to the dead of the Viet Nam conflict due to the inspiration and forethought of the alumni of Portland, Oregon. In a very emotion filled convention banquet last June, the Portland Alumni unveiled the memorial, which is in the form of a Marine Captain in Viet Nam era fatigues. The bust is in the likeness of the outgoing Eminent Supreme Archon, J. Clarke Houston III who served as a captain in the United States Marine Corp during the Viet Nam War. On the right is the historic photo from that event. The bust was unveiled as part of the convention banquet by members of the U.S. Marine Corp in front of Brother Clarke and his family.

Living with Dry Rush

How One Chapter Met the Challenge of Adapting to the New Rules

TO AN INCOMING FRESHMAN, college is a new and confusing experience. Confronted with unfamiliar surroundings and a heavy academic work load, most new students have a hard time acclimating to their new environments. One added pressure that freshmen face is the pressure to be accepted socially. With most fraternities, rush revolves around alcohol and they base their judgments on the rushee's ability to "party." The consumption of alcohol and pressures associated with it need not be a part of the fraternity rush environment. We, the Pennsylvania Sigma Phi Chapter of Sigma Alpha Epsilon, are taking strides to alleviate the burdensome pressure of alcohol.

Dickinson is a small liberal arts college located in the rural town of Carlisle, Pennsylvania. With an enrollment just under 2000 students, more than fifty percent of the campus has chosen to go Greek. Because of their large involvement, the Greek system serves as an instrumental part of campus life. Being as highly visible as we are, the fraternities regard rush as one of the most important periods of the year.

Last fall we were well into our rush program when we received the newly adopted alcohol-related policies from the National Supreme Council. These new regulations forbade the use of alcohol at any rush function and were negatively received by our chapter at first. This was due to the fact that, not only were we in the middle of our program but we were to be the only fraternity on campus to follow a dry rush format.

To clarify our situation, we distributed a campus-wide statement explaining to the student body what exactly dry rush entailed and why we implemented the change. Even though we turned dry in the middle of our program, we still were able to attract thirteen quality "true gentlemen." Our new dry rush program gave us the opportunity to attract

those individuals whose lives did not revolve around the false pretenses of alcohol.

More importantly, dry rush helped

Rush at Dickinson is different from most campuses because the entire fall semester is designated for rush. A six week formal dry rush period enables the



distinguished us as leaders and innovators on campus. Last spring, following the regulations given to us by National, we as a fraternity formulated a campus wide dry rush policy. We submitted our proposed policy to the Administration and the Interfraternity Council and it was subsequently adopted by both.

At the beginning of this fall semester, leaders of our chapter and members of IFC met and ironed out the details for dry rush. What this entailed was a six-week period of a formal dry rush in which from Sunday through Thursday evenings alcohol was prohibited from any rush function. To ensure that the regulations were being adhered to, a supervisory patrol was established to circulate around to all of the fraternities and monitor rush activities. Strict monetary fines and a loss of social privileges also served as deterrents against violating the policy.

brotherhood to become well acquainted with the rushees. Having a six-week dry rush period also calls for creativity and ingenuity in planning rush functions and activities. Brothers Jay Lind and Bill Smith headed up the Rush Program by serving as co-directors. Through their supervision, we had one of the most successful rushes on campus.

We kicked off our formal rush with a trip to a professional baseball game. With the chapter picking up the cost of transportation and tickets, we traveled to Baltimore's Memorial Stadium and watched a game between the Boston Red Sox and Baltimore Orioles. This event was a tremendous success; every brother and rushee had a great time.

Throughout the six week period we held various rush activities and events. We publicized our events by putting up posters and taking out advertisements in the school newspaper. Well-publicized

events were a key element in attracting a good variety of rushees.

One very successful event we held was Casino Night. Different tables were set up around the social floor with each table providing a different game. Poker, Blackjack, Acey Deucey and Craps were a few of the different games offered. Each rushee was given 100 points worth of poker chips in the beginning of the evening, and at the end of the evening the top three-point winners were awarded prizes. A great turnout provided fun for everyone. According to Smith, "The brotherhood enjoyed this evening al-

most more than the people we were rushing."

Casino night, as well as other events, were very successful through the help of Domino's Pizza. Domino's was our official sponsor of dry rush. Besides giving us a discount on food purchases, they contributed several hundred dollars worth of free pizza. Lind stated that, "With the sponsorship of a major pizza chain, our overall costs were kept to a minimum and we even were under our allotted budget." The money saved, which in previous years would have been spent on wet social events, is being re-

allocated into the House Improvement Fund.

Positive feedback has come from the Administration, professors and other fraternities. Our pledge class from last year, who experienced the implementation of dry rush, are very positive about the way rush is going. Brother Mark Landini feels, "The best thing about dry rush is that it works; it is much easier to meet and get to know people."

Rush without alcohol gives the chapter the opportunity to meet people in a sober state of mind. This is important because our judgment is not based on how many beers one can drink, or how wild they get when drunk. Brotherhood involvement and commitment is the only way dry rush can be successful.

For our chapter, dry rush has been a great time for everyone. We recognized a challenge last year, responded to that challenge, and set a goal of having a successful rush. As our program comes to an end, we can confidently say that we have had the most successful rush in years. Our program will only continue to improve and attract the type of men that fit the ideals of SAE.

CALIFORNIA STATE AT FULLERTON: Dez Chatleton transferred to Cal State Fullerton to finish graduating requirements after attending San Jose State. He was on the Lengeno team of Italian football and was quoted in **The Register** as having a grasp of the game far exceeding Italian natives raised on European football or soccer.

UNIVERSITY OF LA VERNE: This chapter in Spring 1987 won Highest GPA Award for All Greek CPA competition, won Greek Award with a clean sweep for the third consecutive year, capturing first place in all events; won the All Campus Blood Drive for the 4th consecutive year and the Red Cross Trophy.

UNIVERSITY OF WEST FLORIDA: Six brothers hold leadership positions: Frank Davis, parliamentarian for the Inter-Greek Council; Brian Haugen serves on the IGC as secretary; Kiley Evans, Senator in Student Government; Brian Rogers, Battalion Commander for ROTC; and Dave Murzin, President of campus BACCHUS chapter. Robert Lee anchors the campus television news.

UNIVERSITY OF NORTHERN IOWA: Iowa Chi is now the proud new owner of land adjoining their current fraternity house, which will be used for their future and first "real" fraternity house. For nearly two decades a modern colonial style brick house has been their dream. This chapter is expanding with leaps and bounds, and is already three times as large as the second biggest fraternity on campus!

They not only won the Greek Cup again (this makes five times in the last seven years), but set a record at GMI for the highest number of Greek Cup points in one season with 49 points.

BIRMINGHAM-SOUTHERN: Community service is not just raising money for charity, reports Kinnon Phillips of Birmingham-Southern, but assisting personally those in the community who need our help. In an effort to add more meaning to community service projects, brothers and pledges have volunteered as "hosts" at a local homeless men's shelter. One evening a week, two brothers go to the shelter to help admit the men, assist with the washing of clothes and cooking of dinner. After dinner, time is spent with the men talking and playing games. The "hosts" spend the night and help prepare breakfast for the men the following morning. This project has also been implemented into the Big Brother/Little Brother program and the relationships are strengthened by this meaningful experience.

Maryland Omicron-Pi installed at UMBC

THE UMBC EARLY DAYS

University of Maryland-Baltimore County was founded in 1966 in suburban Baltimore, six miles from downtown. It has a liberal arts and science emphasis with 27 majors. Ninety-six percent of the faculty are Ph.D.s, or the highest degree in their fields. There are 5,781 full time undergrads, with almost thirty-three percent living on campus.

When SAE colonized in Fall 1985, there was only one national fraternity and two national sororities on campus. Today the system is flourishing and, under the leadership of SAE, has established a Greek council and an Interfraternity Council.

Maryland Omicron-Pi began with a Maryland Beta alumnus, George Parma, who was enrolled at UMBC. He saw the need for a stronger Greek system. It was through the friendship of Parma and Michael O'Keefe that a local SAE fraternity was formed on October 28, 1986. Woody Wood, Emory '83 (Georgia Epsilon), met with the group to explain what SAE was all about.

During the Spring of 1985 the local held its first rush, and by the time it was over the group was 25 men strong.

On April 13, 1985 the Eminent Archon attended the Province Nu convention at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, where they received unanimous approval to become a colony. On September 29, 1985 they became an official colony of Sigma Alpha Epsilon.



The colony began laying its solid foundation. Besides developing rush, pledge programming and by-laws, the group has been extensively involved in fundraising. More imaginative and diverse events have replaced the common open party as a primary source of revenue. These events included raffles, car washes, produce sales and concession work at major areas in the vicinity. The colony built up a fund of almost \$6,000 in a year and a half.

On December 1, 1986 the colony sent its petition to the national fraternity for a charter. An out-of-province investigation was conducted for the group and a very favorable response was received, thus allowing the colony to petition at the Portland Convention. On June 20, 1987 the UMBC colony was informed before the National Convention that they had unanimously been approved to receive a charter from Sigma Alpha Epsilon.



THE INSTALLATION

A tremendous applause overtook the ballroom at the Baltimore Marriott as ESA Ben Allen handed Matt Tormollen a very special gift, a scroll that was rolled and tied, giving it the appearance of a diploma. This gift, in many ways, is a diploma. It is a charter, the final step in a four-year quest to become a chapter.

On October 10, 1987, forty-five men from the University of Maryland Baltimore County (UMBC) became Maryland Omicron-Pi, officially joining the University's young and rapidly growing Greek community.

This group has already established themselves as campus leaders. Through unyielding drive and dedication this colony, which was established in the spring of 1984, was able to prove their worth to the University and the fraternity. Their hard work finally paid off in a festive weekend that was highlighted by their own initiations.

The initiation setting was perfect for this proud occasion. The light gleamed through the clear windows atop the Old Ottebein Church, a 202 year old structure which is the oldest church on the

east coast. The ceremony, which was performed completely from memory, was lead by the ESA along with Maryland Beta EA Greg Drohat. Other parts were performed by both National and Province officers along with members of Maryland Alpha and Maryland Beta. There was also a talented choir which was led by Dan Gladding (Maryland Sigma).

"It was an honor to take part in the initiation of an entire chapter," said Mitch Wolf (Maryland Alpha), who performed the part of Herald of the initiation. "The whole event was extraordinary."

The evening affair, which took place at the Baltimore Marriott, was equally as impressive as the initiation. Honored guests from National included ESA Ben Allen, ESR Ken Tracey and Extension Director Brad Cohen. Also in attendance were Province Officers Jim Sakers, Mike Aquino and Ray Sewell, as well as several University officials.

Maryland Omicron-Pi EA Matt Tormollen accepted several other gifts for the chapter in the banquet program. Ben Allen presented the charter and gavel, Ken Tracey presented the ritual

equipment, Brad Cohen presented the EA badge and Province Archon Jim Sakers gave the chapter the fraternity flag.

The credit of organizing the banquet goes to Omicron-Pi's EDA Mike Hurst and his committee, who arranged an affair that truly captured the spirit of the occasion. The other three chapters in the state were well represented, as well as other chapters from around the country. There were also representatives from the other Greek organizations at UMBC.

Since their initiation, the chapter has been hard at work upholding the commitment they made as a colony to fraternity, university and community excellence. They have established their goals and are devoting time to executing their completion.

"I don't think we have had any transitional problems in going from a colony to a chapter," Tormollen said. "Most of our time in the past was spent working toward our goal of becoming a chapter. Now that is completed, we have set new goals that we have started working on."

The main objective of the chapter is getting a house. There is no established

Greek housing system at UMBC and, along with other Greeks, they are trying to create some type of situation. There are currently six national organizations on campus and four local groups.

"We are shooting for a house with ten or more brothers in the fall of 1988," said Tormollen "We don't want to jump in too fast because we want to strengthen ourselves as a chapter before getting involved in something like this."

In preparation for obtaining a chapter house, the group has helped the establishment of Catonsville Alumni Association. With the help group, they hope to form a House Corporation. Much of the success of this endeavor is due to the work of Jim Sakers, who helped to establish the House Corporation at Maryland Alpha.

The UMBC chapter also set up the Interfraternity Council on their campus when they were still a colony. Mark Bohanan, a transfer student from Towson State, was a big influence in creating the IFC and is the current president.

"Now the IFC is set, we want to keep some of the brothers in the top office and continue to serve as leaders of the group," Hurst said.

Other goals the chapter has set include philanthropic endeavors such as their work with the elderly and area orphans. Through the guidance they have received from chapter advisor Mike Aquino, they have been able to channel their positive energy.

"These guys have a lot of pride and enthusiasm," Aquino said. "I know that if they apply themselves the way they are capable, which they have, they can be not only leaders on campus, but leaders in SAE."

Winthrop school

In one of the more imaginative community service projects undertaken by an SAE chapter, South Carolina Sigma at **Winthrop College** conducted a leadership school for high school juniors and seniors.

Community service chairman **Chris Hanlon** was responsible for the idea, and the chapter backed the proposal fully. When Hanlon and Eminent Archon **Mark Rodman** visited the five high schools in the area, they found school administrators to be totally supportive as well.

Waldrop worked for a year with several other committee chairmen formulating general guidelines, planning the theme of the pageant, selecting the accompanying musical production numbers and performers, constructing a budget, conducting contestant meetings, reserving facilities and appointing committee chairmen.

More than 900 people attended this year's pageant, won by Dar Ann Tarbuk of Nashville. A surprise for the audience was the appearance of 1986 Miss America Kellye Cash, who performed for the crowd for 20 minutes. Miss Cash told the brothers that the pageant was one of the best she had seen while touring the country.

THE FRATERNITY IN 1987

1987 has been marked by the prosperity of our beloved Fraternity. Our position in the fraternity world is extremely strong and ΣAE continues to provide leadership to our fellow Greeks in many areas. In the last two years we have taken a special interest in providing leadership in the area of risk management and men's health issues.

Our growth in numbers of members and chapters continues steady and sure. We have made significant progress on our five-year administrative plan, now in its fourth year. We continue to strive to provide quality programs and timely service to our members with enthusiasm, pride and love.

Our financial position has been solidified, especially in light of the reinstatement of annual undergraduate dues by the National Convention last June. Annual dues had been consolidated into one fee (an initiation fee) in 1963.

Most other fraternities had gone to a dues system. Even though our initiation fee had become one of the highest in the fraternity world, the total four-year cost was one of the lowest. With the dues system, our undergraduate membership cost will now be spread out over the four-year collegiate experience, and still only put us in the middle of the pack regarding four-year costs among all fraternities.

Part of the dues, about one-third, will be put away for the future (in the National Endowment Fund), a practice that had ceased in 1971.

Chapter Affairs

Although the statistics are impressive, what is important is that the quality of our chapters is the best it has been in many years. Our undergraduates today are among the most generous and cooperative. There are exceptions to be noted as there have always been but, by and large, most chapters today are made up of men of excellent character and deportment. We are extremely proud of our chapters and confident of their ability to continue this trend in years to come. We are working with the chapters that need help and direction.

Our staff and hundreds of volunteers across the country are dedicated to making the ΣAE experience a wholesome and healthy one for all of our brothers.

By November of 1987 we had 198 active chapters, the highest number in our history.

Unfortunately, three charters were forfeited in the past year for a variety of serious disciplinary reasons — California Gamma at the University of Southern California, Georgia Psi at Mercer University, and Alabama Mu at the University of Alabama. All three chapters are now undergoing reorganization by local alumni with the assistance of national staff. Rechartering should occur some time in 1988.

Work continues on improving chapter standards, and the staff and volunteers charged with this responsibility appear to be doing an increasingly effective job. Many chapters were assisted lovingly by the staff with their disciplinary problems. As of November 1987, there were only five active chapters under alumni commission and five chapters on probation.

Risk Management situations, especially those caused by hazing and alcohol abuse, continue to be our

leading problem. The National Fraternity is aggressively pursuing these problems.

The field staff, under the direction of Scott Haggard, has done outstanding work in the area of chapter development. The current field staff consists of Mike Sophir, **Nebraska '86**, Jay DeWitt, **New Hampshire '86**, Fritz Kruger, **Puget Sound '87**, Todd Mullins, **Cal Poly - San Luis Obispo '87** and Steve Cady, **Central Florida '87**. Steve Brister and David Schott left the staff last summer.

All chapters received visits by our consulting staff within the last year. In addition to their direct work with chapters, they revised the Minimum Standards Guidelines and helped to develop position statements on issues facing chapters today such as hazing, alcohol abuse, treatment of legacies, sexual abuse and others.

The average chapter size reached 68.4 members, the highest number since the post-World War Two era when returning veterans boosted our numbers dramatically. This is also the highest number for any fraternity.

New publications of the Chapter Development group include "The Gold Book," a comprehensive chapter management resource manual, a "House Manager's Manual," and a "Fund Raising Manual."

We appreciate the work of the province officers in the area of chapter development. Several provinces held outstanding leadership schools during the biennium and reached hundreds of SAE undergraduates with a leadership training experience.

Extension

Under the able direction of Extension Director Brad Cohen, eight chapters were installed in the last year including:

We have seven colonies, giving us a total of 205 campus groups. To be a dynamic organization, we must continue to grow. Several new institutions have been targeted for colonization. Targets include: Marshall University and the University of Massachusetts, University of California - Riverside, Sonoma State, University of Tennessee - Chattanooga, and East Carolina University.

Alumni Affairs

The Director of Alumni Services/Housing position was filled by John Edwards until June 1987 and he was replaced by Tom McCarthy, **Northern Arizona '82**.

24 Chapter Advisors participated in the 52nd Leadership School Advisors Program. Since its inception in 1978 over 150 advisors have participated in this training program.

A healthy number of Alumni Associations sent delegates to the 131st Anniversary National Convention in Portland, Oregon last June.

Alumni activity was very high this year as over 100 Alumni Associations reported successful activities in 1987.

We have provided a consulting service for alumni association and house corporation officers through the Permanent Committees on Alumni Services and the Permanent Committee on Chapter Housing respectively. A liability insurance program is provided to all chapters and house corporations.

Several issues of SAE HOUSE and SAE ALUMNUS have been published. In addition, the *Fraternal Law* publication is now being distributed to all House Corporation Presidents, Chapter Advisors and Eminent Archons. New Alumni Association and House Corporation Manuals were recently published.

An Alumni Newsletter Service was organized through the University Publishing Company in Bloomington,

Indiana. Approximately 50 chapters are involved in this service. The National SAE Alumni Directory was distributed last winter.

Other programs include the T.H.E. Awards program, all alumni awards, promotion of Founder's Day activities, the 50-year certificate program, and help with Year of The Alumnus information for *The Record*.

SAE started a new national training program for House Corporation Officers at the 51st Leadership School with 23 alumni brothers participating in this first workshop, and 13 more at the 1987 Leadership School. We believe that this program along with existing training programs for Chapter Advisors and province officers, will have a far-reaching effect on the quality of chapters in the future.

We have also worked with a number of individual House Corporations this year on fundraising plans for house renovations. This continues a stance that recognizes that many chapters need major renovations or house replacement, and that we should aid them in their fundraising efforts.

SPECIAL PROGRAMS

The Leadership School

The 52nd Leadership School was held last August 2-5 for 662 delegates from 163 chapters and 12 colonies. Darrell Gibson, Director of Leadership Training, conducted a meeting of the Leadership School Planning Committee in October 1987. Although few changes were made to the program, many new faculty were selected. Many alumni made special gifts to their chapters to help their delegates with Leadership School tuition and travel expenses.

Risk Management Program

The event of significance for 1986 had to be the near loss of our liability insurance coverage and the implementation of the new risk management system and policies.

A crisis was deftly averted when we adopted the new risk management policies in September. I am convinced that this action helped us to retain our liability insurance coverage.

Hopefully it will have that effect in the future. The action was a bold move and seems to have been accepted fairly well.

Establishment of a Risk

Management System for reducing risk and handling claims and lawsuits as they are reported to the fraternity includes arranging for liability insurance coverage for all chapters and colonies. This program also provides resource materials on chapter risk management in the form of written materials, speakers, and videotapes.

In addition to instituting the risk management program, we continue to provide a *liability insurance program* to chapters and house corporations across the country. We do this because very few chapters have had any luck at procuring liability insurance on their own. A recent survey revealed that \$1 million coverage is more than most chapters had before the program went into effect. We are convinced, therefore, that the program is still essential. We may, however, have difficulty placing the coverage in the future. If this happens, chapters must be prepared to seek their own liability coverage.

Alcohol Abuse Prevention Program

This committee has made a significant contribution to the entire fraternity and college world in the area of alcohol abuse prevention programming. The scope of the committee was broadened to include other health problems and we are excited by the goals set by the new ad hoc committee on Men's Health Issues to be chaired by Rev. Robert Hedges, **Drake '51**.

Awards Program

Several new awards were recently created. The rush programming award was created and named for Robert L. Cousins. A new award was created to honor selected Eminent Archons who have provided outstanding leadership for their respective chapters. A cash prize of \$500.00 was added to the National Scholarship Award and is supported through a bequest of Francis ImMache. A Most Improved Chapter Award was also instituted. A

full listing of awards is provided elsewhere in this issue of *The Record*.

The National Office

The day-to-day functioning of the National Office is under the able direction of Assistant Executive Director Jeff Arnold. Jeff also directs the maintenance of the buildings, the financial administration of the fraternity and foundation, oversees the Risk Management Program, and he serves as staff liaison for the Board of Trustees of the National Endowment Fund, the Advisory Council of the Foundation, the Temple Building Committee, and the National Laws Committee.

During the 1986-87 academic year the majority of our merchandise program was placed "out of house" to the Ihling Brothers Everard Company and Balfour Company. This has allowed us to expand the amount of merchandise and paraphernalia available to our membership and to avoid costly overhead internally. It should be noted that the increased royalties from these companies have provided further support to the Charitable and Educational Fund, thereby increasing funding of Leadership School and the Educational & Leadership Consultant Program.

During the past year Jeff reorganized the office administrative staff for increased efficiency and timely response to member requests. The first full year of the computerization of our accounting records went very smoothly.

Many publications such as *The Record*, were produced by the National Staff under the direction of Tracey Stoll, who departed tearfully last July to seek her fortune in California.

The national office is staffed by a very dedicated and loyal group of 17 full-time employees and several students who work part-time.

General Comments

The fraternity gets larger every day, and the risk management situation has created an enormous workload for everyone this year. We have been fortunate to have a staff that has unselfishly put in an inordinate number of extra hours in order to get everything accomplished.

The realignment of the administrative staff has helped a good deal, especially farming out the merchandise program. We are constantly exploring new ways to cut costs and streamline operations.

Our gratitude goes to Legal Counsel John Snyder, Bob Hamrdla, Joe Walt and all of the Permanent and Ad Hoc Committee chairmen and members, whose support and guidance are of tremendous importance to the progress of Sigma Alpha Epsilon.

We are especially grateful for the hard work of the entire National Staff, their genuine concern for those they serve and their dedication to the cause of quality. On behalf of the National Staff, I express our sincere appreciation for the opportunity to serve you, the brotherhood of SAE.

Message From The ESA

The 1986-1987 school year was good to SAE. During the year, we installed three new chapters and revitalized three others. As a result, at the end of fiscal 1987, SAE had a total of 195 active chapters, and the 1987 national convention authorized the installation of three more new chapters in the fall of 1987.

Also during fiscal 1987, SAE initiated 4,244 new brothers. This number is second only to the record number of 4,267 new brothers initiated during fiscal 1968. This near record number of initiates in fiscal 1987 brought our total number of initiates since our founding in 1856 to well over the 206,000 mark, keeping SAE well ahead of its nearest competitor in total number of initiates.

One of our objectives as SAE's has always been to provide our unique SAE experience to as many young men as is realistically possible. The Supreme Council firmly supports this philosophy and encourages aggressive extension and rush programs, but with continued emphasis on quality rather than on quantity.

Another objective of every SAE is to provide the best undergraduate experience possible.

Toward this end, as attested to by the data contained in this, the annual report for 1987, the Fraternity has continued to place emphasis on the ways by which the quality of undergraduate life can be improved; e.g., improved chapter housing, risk management education, leadership training and the men's health issues. And, as is true to form, SAE has emerged as the leader among Greek letter organizations in these important issues.

The Campaign for SAE entered its second year in fiscal 1987 with, thanks to a significant number of loyal SAEs, a successful end to the campaign now in sight.

If it's possible, our already exemplary national

office staff improved in professionalism and quality over this past year. Under Ken Tracey's leadership, the staff has matured and become even more productive.

Fiscal 1987 was indeed a good year for SAE ... and we expect another banner year in 1988. On behalf of the Supreme Council and the national office staff, we thank you for your support of SAE and the efforts of all SAEs everywhere for helping to keep SAE atop the fraternity world.

Ohio Sigma 1924, Mount Union College

Sixty-three years of dedicated service to Sigma Alpha Epsilon began when Edwin Leroy Knowles was initiated by the Ohio Sigma chapter at Mount Union College on March 23, 1924. Since that day, he made the fraternity an important part of his life.

As an alumnus, he served his chapter for many decades in various capacities, beginning as chapter advisor and house corporation officer in the late 1940s, and later as president of the Ohio Sigma Alumni Association.

In the 1950s and 1960s, he served Province Pi (and its predecessor, Province Delta) in every office. Thru his leadership, the provinces grew in financial resources, in extension and in the personal growth of those who had the privilege of working with him.

In 1965, Sigma Alpha Epsilon presented him with the Merit Key Award for his faithfulness and continuing fraternity involvement. Two decades later, the brothers of Ohio Sigma presented him the chapter's first Order of the Lion award at a special ceremony.

In 1985, single-handedly he organized the chapter's centennial celebration. He continues to be a much-loved advisor and source of inspiration to the brothers of Ohio Sigma.

He has proven himself true to the ideals of the fraternity to all those who have had the pleasure of knowing him as a brother. Because he is such a thoughtful man and a devoted brother, he has been chosen to receive the highest honor the fraternity can bestow — The Distinguished Service Award.

Minnesota Alpha 1957, University of Minnesota

In his lifetime, he was one of Sigma Alpha Epsilon's most enthusiastic brothers and leaders.

His association with the fraternity began with his initiation at Minnesota Alpha on January 20, 1955. As an alumnus, he demonstrated a zealous love for the brotherhood in his work as his chapter's advisor and house corporation president, and later as president of the Twin Cities Alumni Association in Minneapolis.

His dedicated leadership continued through the turbulent years from 1965 to 1975, when he held every office in Province Rho. He also served on the SAE Leadership School Planning Committee, and as a faculty member.

In 1975, the entire fraternity showed confidence in his leadership and guidance by electing him to the fraternity's Supreme Council. His diligence was evident in the many ways he led the fraternity from 1975 until his tenure as Eminent Supreme Archon ended in 1983. As ESA, he had the vision to appoint several special committees, including one charged with investigating SAE in the year 2000.

His commitment to the fraternity continued as he entered the Chapter Eternal. He left a loving legacy to many brothers who had touched his life by making them society level Founder Members of The Levere Memorial Foundation. In addition, he bequeathed more than \$200,000 to various funds to provide for SAE brothers in future generations.

He was a rare brother, personifying what SAE wants each brother to become — a gentleman. For his many years of devotion and achievement, given in the name of love for SAE, we posthumously salute him with our highest honor, the Citation and Medal for Distinguished Service.

He also served as Treasurer of Province Kappa for two years.

Because of his commitment to his brothers, and to their outstanding academic performance, he has left an indelible mark on Sigma Alpha Epsilon. His many friends and brothers now pay tribute to him with their highest honor, the Distinguished Service Award.

THE FOUNDATION IN 1987

The Sigma Alpha Epsilon Foundation is a public not-for-profit corporation, chartered by the State of Illinois to provide for educational programming for the benefit of members of the Sigma Alpha Epsilon Fraternity.

Purposes & Functions

Maintain the Levere Memorial Temple

Hold funds in trust for individual chapters

Provide student loans, various scholarships, fellowships, internships

Funding of Leadership School
Provide Men's Health Programs

In order to continue to qualify as a public foundation it is necessary to increase the dollar amount of public gifts we receive each year. At least one-third of the Foundation's income must come from public gifts.

Therefore, all alumni contributions go to the foundation so that we can meet this obligation and remain a public foundation. An added benefit is that we can earn more from our investments without upsetting the ratio.

If we were to lose our public status and become a private foundation, the results would be catastrophic. A tax is imposed on a private foundation and it must dispose of its assets on a very strict schedule of percentages that would place the foundation in an impossible situation. Our continued ownership of the Levere Memorial Temple would be placed in severe jeopardy.

Gifts to the Foundation are fully tax deductible for income tax purposes (gifts to the fraternity are not tax deductible). The Foundation may receive gifts of stock and property which are then sold at their appreciated value. Such a gift may represent an advantage to the donor.

The Sigma Alpha Epsilon Foundation is under the direction of a board of trustees comprised of the members of the Supreme Council, the

Eminent Supreme Recorder, who serves as the chief executive officer of the Foundation, and five members-at-large who are selected by the Supreme Council. All of the Foundation's activities are administered by the National Office.

Many events have taken place since the 1985 National Convention which are of great significance to the Sigma Alpha Epsilon Foundation. Perhaps the most significant is the change in its name and expansion of the board of directors from six to eleven members.

Several other changes were made through the National Laws that effect the various funds and operational procedures of the Foundation. In addition, the SAE Leadership Foundation was merged with the Sigma Alpha Epsilon Foundation and the assets (approximately \$75,000) were isolated in the SAE Leadership Fund. Furthermore, The trustees publicly announced the *Campaign for SAE: The Path To Leadership*, the goal of which is to raise \$7.5 million.

Foundation Finances & Operations

The financial position of the Foundation is stable. However, even though revenues continue to increase expenses seem to be increasing even faster. Demands on the Foundation's funds have been intense, especially for building maintenance and the funding of the capital campaign. We have been fortunate that our endowment fund has produced terrific gains, some of which we have taken in order to pay our operating costs and conduct the necessary renovations. Recent stock market gyrations will put an end to that practice.

The recent stock market crash has certainly created some paper losses for the Foundation but we are confident that our income level from dividends and interest will hold up.

Although we have now retained an

architect for the Levere Memorial Temple, we do not have the funds that are required for him to embark on the many projects that need to be undertaken. Much of this expense will have to be deferred until a sufficient number of capital campaign pledges are honored.

Our data processing staff acquired a new central processing unit (CPU) in the fall of 1985 and it has had a dramatic effect on the processing speed of information. Information is handled much faster and with increased efficiency. This improvement has enabled us to effectively tackle the increased number of appeals that we generate from our office, and has enabled us to add the financial software and pledge processing packages. The word processing function is considerably faster and is now used by almost all employees.

The data processing staff has embarked on an aggressive campaign to find lost brothers. We now communicate with every college where we have a chapter, as well as with chapters, alumni associations and house corporations. All members are urged to send us address changes as they are received.

The Levere Memorial Temple

We have been plagued by leaks in the gutters for several years. As a result, the Temple suffered interior damage in the chapel and museum. Because of this we filed suit against the roofing company. We are optimistic about reaching a favorable out-of-court settlement. In the meantime we contracted with another roofing company to replace the gutters. The roof work and the interior paint work in the museum has now been completed. The tower room was restored in the summer of 1985. The chapel will be restored as funds become available.

We have now retained an architect to advise the Building Committee on conditions and concerns. The position of Artist of the Temple has been filled by John March.

We have installed an ADT fire and security alarm system in the Levere Memorial Temple, as well as emergency lighting. Other minor work involved upgrading of some of the electrical and plumbing fixtures and repairs in the business areas of the building.

The Foundation purchased the boarding house adjacent to the Temple in March 1985. The purchase was made in order to acquire the property to serve as a buffer against further encroachment by Northwestern University and to provide land for a future ΣAE office building. At the time of the purchase it was decided to continue the lease with the current occupants, the Chi Omega Rho Fraternity, until the building became a financial burden.

Last spring we had our architects survey the building and they determined that we would need to spend a substantial sum of money to keep the building operable and recommended demolition of the structure. The building committee recommended and the trustees then voted to have the building demolished this summer, rather than to spend any more money on it. The

garden and parking lot areas will be expanded.

Foundation Programs

Since June 1985, Tom Hume has served as Director of Foundation Programs. Tom has done a tremendous job but has now moved on to graduate studies at the Annenberg School of Communications (USC) in Los Angeles.

Programs include: scholarships, resident educational advisors, career planning, men's health issues, and video productions. Tom served as liaison with Tom Goodale, Educational Advisor; Darrell Gibson, Director of Leadership Training; and Father Bob Hedges, Chairman of the Men's Health Issues Committee.

Over \$19,500 in fiscal '87 was allocated toward *Chapter House Library Grants* to assist in the building or renovation of chapter library and/or study facilities. A temporary freeze was put on this program until the IRS clarified its stand on such building fund allocations. The program, with some modifications, is now back in operation.

The first *Scholarship Newsletter* was published in the fall of 1986 by Tom Goodale and Tom Hume. "Quick Study" will be a regular publication of the Foundation to be distributed to all scholarship chairmen, Resident Educational

Advisors, chapter advisors, and official family members.

We are especially excited about the plans of the *Men's Health Issues Committee* chaired by Father Robert Hedges, **Drake '51 (Iowa Delta)**. The committee met for the first time last January to begin work on a plan to provide assistance to chapters of Sigma Alpha Epsilon on a broad range of health problems affecting college men. The committee will provide resources such as speakers, written materials and videotape productions. Videotape programs are already available, including such topics as Young Men's Sexual Responsibility, Reproductive Health, Cancer, A.I.D.S., and Legal Liability. More tapes are being planned.

An \$80,000 grant was provided to support the *ΣAE National Leadership School*.

\$2,000 grants were provided to thirteen *Resident Educational Advisors* who were sponsored by thirteen chapters of Sigma Alpha Epsilon Fraternity.

Seventy-four *student loans* of approximately \$109,000 were provided to undergraduate and graduate student members of the Sigma Alpha Epsilon Fraternity.

We provided \$4,500 in *scholarship grants* to the outstanding scholars of the Sigma Alpha Epsilon Fraternity. An additional \$7,000 was awarded by various chapter scholarship funds held in trust by the Foundation. The *Walter B. Jones Award for the Outstanding Scholar* in ΣAE was given to Russ Cohen, **Arizona '87**, who received a \$3,500 scholarship. Runners-up included William Sullivan, **Southern Mississippi '86**, and Robert Newkirk, **Illinois '86**. Each received a \$500 scholarship.

The Foundation produced a very fine videotape program, "Passing the Torch," on the Levere Memorial Temple in 1985. The one-hour tape is on sale for \$39.00.

Other programs in the works are a program to help chapters acquire their own computers and software programs, and new components for the Men's Health Issues Program. We are also developing videotape productions on various topics for use by chapters of Sigma Alpha Epsilon.

Annual Fund

We have now completed our third campaign in which all annual giving is directed toward the Foundation. The program has worked extremely well. The Foundation is receiving more gifts which are needed in order for it to maintain its Public Foundation status, and the fraternity has been relieved of the burden of financing the annual giving campaign and from having to support the general expenses of the Foundation such as staffing, data processing, printing, and several program areas.

Jeff Kinzler will be departing the staff this winter and is to be commended for doing a terrific job as Director of Annual Giving for the past three years. While on staff Jeff brought the annual giving process in-house, which resulted in a more cost-effective, controllable and higher quality program. Jeff did an outstanding job in organizing the increased work load.

\$512,804 in contributions were received in the 1987 campaign year from 11,009 donors including 400 first-time donors, to set an all time record for the Annual Giving program. Contributions for this year are already running ahead of last year.

We added 155 new Founder Members of the ΣAE Foundation in fiscal 1987. Founder Membership number 1500 was assigned in May 1987, to Charles Zuber, **Southern Methodist '40 (Texas Delta)**.

WE MUST NOT PERMIT THE CAPITAL CAMPAIGN TO DIMINISH THE IMPORTANCE OF THE ANNUAL FUND AS THE FOUNDATION IS VERY DEPENDENT ON ITS ANNUAL FUND INCOME.

It is important that, as we conduct the capital campaign and realize the actual gifts, we continue to do well on Gifts to the Annual Fund.

Development

In addition to the capital campaign, Dave Arendt has been working on promotion of planned giving to the Foundation, promotion of the society levels and creation of recognition devices for the new levels. Dave has been doing a great job in expanding the development concept for the Foundation.

Through an anonymous gift received in May 1987, so far \$50,000 has been received of a \$100,000 anonymous gift pledged toward the construction of a video studio which is now under construction in the Levere Memorial Temple.

One of the principal services of the Foundation is to act as trustee for chapter funds which are created through the generosity of a chapter's alumni. New *Chapter Scholarship Endowment funds* were created for chapters at Denver University and Bucknell University. A *Student Loan Fund* was created for the Kansas University Chapter.

The concept of *Chapter Leadership School Tuition Endowment Funds* was invented by Richard Koella, **Tennessee '44**. Such funds have a minimum funding requirement of \$5,000 before they can begin granting scholarships for attendance at the national or regional Leadership Schools.

Several chapters and alumni associations are now planning to establish such funds. Incidentally, house corporations will be able to borrow from the principal of such funds for the purpose of chapter house improvements. The interest they pay on the loans will provide scholarships to Leadership School for their chapter delegates. Such Funds have now been set up for chapters at Tennessee, Troy State, Southern Mississippi, Simpson College, Ohio State, Oklahoma, and Eastern New Mexico University.

\$16,756, was received from donors for tuition scholarships to individual delegates to attend the ΣAE Leadership School.

The Foundation continues to be the beneficiary of a number of bequests each year. See chart for list of specific gifts.

Capital Campaign

As we prepare the copy for this issue of *The Record* (November 30, 1987), \$6.3 million has been pledged to the *Campaign for ΣAE: The Path to Leadership*.

A Phone/Mail campaign to all donors commenced in May 1987, and is going extremely well. By the

time this issue reaches you we clearly expect to go over our \$7.5 million goal. Look for the announcement in the Spring issue of *The Record*.

THE CAPITAL CAMPAIGN HAS PRODUCED PLEDGES OF FUTURE GIFTS AND BEQUESTS AND VERY LITTLE CASH TO DATE.

The response has been overwhelming. A very large portion of the \$6.3 million has been pledged by a handful of generous and supportive alumni brothers. We are deeply touched by the faith our key alumni have in the ability of ΣAE to contribute to the leadership development of our undergraduate members.

Most alumni are only hearing about the effort for the first time and several have made a pledge without even being asked to do so. We are grateful.

It is our hope that a successful capital campaign will sufficiently increase our endowment funds so that we can meet future challenges through effective leadership development programs, by having the ability to make loans to house corporations for building acquisition and improvements, and by being able to properly care for the Levere Memorial Temple.

General Remarks

There is a feeling of frustration within the Foundation, caused in part by an inability to fund all of the projects we wish to accomplish. We need to wait for the proper funding to materialize. In the meantime, we have suspended the implementation of new programs. However, we are very excited about the future and the promise of many exciting new programs and services as a result of the generous gifts and bequests that will be generated by the capital campaign.

AFTER THE CAPITAL CAMPAIGN, THE FOUNDATION WILL TURN ITS EFFORTS TOWARD HELPING CHAPTERS WITH THEIR FUND RAISING.

Once the capital campaign is over, the Trustees have determined that our thrust will be to assist chapters in the development of fund raising campaigns for scholarships and housing purposes.



He is survived by his wife, three children and three grandchildren.

William W. Knox (*West Florida '70*), passed away on September 7, 1987 in Clearwater, Florida, after a bout with cancer. Born on October 20, 1948 in Cherry Point, North Carolina, he received his bachelor's degree in system science from the University of West Florida and later entered the U.S. Air Force. Dr. Charles Stark Draper

Dr. Charles Stark Draper (*University of Missouri '18*), died at age 85 on July 25, 1987. He stood among the pioneer members of the first group of aircraft engineers. Dr. Draper's contributions to inertial technology earned him the title of "Father of Inertial Navigation," having evolved the theory, invented and developed the technology and led the effort which brought inertial navigation to operational usage in aircraft, submarines, missiles and space vehicles. His later research resulted in the development of a complete navigation system for manned and unmanned vehicles, regardless of the weather, and without reliance on information from external sources. Such monumental efforts as the Apollo landing on the moon and the guidance systems for all strategic missiles in the U.S. inventory, both land and sea-based, bear the stamp of his genius. His work created an industry which has produced multbillions of dollars in sales.

Among the prestigious awards he re-

ceived are the National Medal of Science from President Lyndon Johnson, the Langley Medal of the Smithsonian Institute, the NASA Public Service Award, and the Goddard Trophy of the National Space Club.

In 1978, MIT established the Charles Stark Draper Professorship of Aeronautics and Astronautics in his honor. (Dr. Draper was chairman of the MIT Department of Aeronautics and Astronautics from 1951-1966.) In 1984, the National Society of Professional Engineers awarded him its Engineering Gold Award, citing his work in inertial guidance systems as one of the 10 outstanding engineering achievements of the past 50 years.

Dr. Draper is survived by his wife, Ivy Hurd Willard, four children, and six grandchildren.

A private funeral was held for the family and a memorial service at MIT for employees and friends.



THE O'KANES

Brother James P. O'Hara (Indiana '72) is half of the hot country duo, known as The O'Kanes. James O'Hara, and Kieran Kane (their name evolved from the O in O'Hara and Kane's last name) a native of Toledo, staged a homecoming last August as the warmup for Willie Nelson's concert at the University of Toledo's Centennial Hall. The people in Toledo remembered O'Hara, however, not as one of Nashville's most successful songwriters but as a talented Ottawa Hills High School football player who went on to play college football at Indiana University. A severe knee injury in his junior year ended his hopes of playing professional football, and he turned to music. "My family was always encouraging me one way or another," O'Hara reported. "When my father realized that I could no longer follow my first love, he gave me a guitar and told me to make it in music then." The gift was on his 21st birthday. Three months later, James O'Hara, Sr., an attorney and founder of the Louisville Title Insurance Co., died suddenly. His mother, Lindy, now lives in Palm Harbor, Florida.

Young Jamie returned to Indiana and graduated with a teaching degree. He came back to Toledo and tried several odd jobs — substitute teacher, railroad plant worker, factory worker, after which he was convinced he was "not cut out for the civilized world" and began honing his song writing skills and playing his guitar in nightclubs, like the Coach House where he played with a group headed by Bruce Lang. His break came when he and former wife, Meredith, were invited to an international folk festival in Ireland. He wrote songs and she sang them, and the contacts they made further cemented his desire to write full time. The couple moved to Nashville where O'Hara started making the rounds of music publishing houses with his guitar, tapes and material. The marriage ended a few years later, but O'Hara continued to play his guitar around Nashville, fine-tuning his skills.

After a couple of winners, **Older Women** and **Wandering Eyes**, he was hired by Tree Music Co. and teamed with Kane, 37, the son of a Queens,



New York merchant. Kane began playing drums in his brother's rock band at age 9, and by the time he landed in Nashville he had accumulated many years of road experience playing a guitar and mandolin with West Coast bands.

The teaming up of O'Hara and Kane was money in the bank for Tree Music. The duo seemed to grind out hits, working mostly by themselves in the attic of Kane's home. The two men, presuming that an album of their music wouldn't go anywhere without financial help, were preparing to go to Norway to seek money when CBS/Nashville Senior V.P. Rich Blackburn listened to **Oh Darlin'**, the first song on an album they planned for release. His reaction after listening to the first minute of the song, according to Kane, was "Sign 'em. And don't let anybody mess with 'em." That song and another cut, **Can't Stop My Heart From Lovin' You** made it into the top 10 on the country charts, and the pair suddenly found themselves the

hottest new performers in Nashville.

According to O'Hara, their music puts the vocals out front and the muted instrumentation is unobtrusive and doesn't detract from the lyrics. Some of the duets bring back memories of the Louvin Brothers, a gospel/country duo who came out of West Tennessee in the early 50's to become regulars on the Grand Ole Opry. Their razor sharp harmonies are yet to be duplicated, but the O'Kanes come close.

O'Hara gives much of the credit for their album's success to the selection of the instruments and musicians. The current road band features, beside O'Hara on acoustic guitar and Kane on mandolin, Richard Kane (Kieran's brother) on fiddle, Jay Spell on accordion, Roy Yeager on drums and Henry Strzelicki on acoustic bass.


