All right, who hid the common sense?

"The best way to meet trouble is to face it"

A simple and true quote, especially when applied to the subject of risk management. In practice, risk management is an effort to identify and avoid trouble before it happens and plan for when it does.

Risk management is a concept, not a task. It is part of our daily lives from the day we are born until the day we die. Most people call it "common sense." The ΣAE Permanent Committee on Risk Management could also be called the "Common Sense Committee," since it is our goal to educate and remind the brothers of ΣAE of the importance of being aware and using common sense in their lives.

In this, and future issues, this column will address real issues and solutions faced daily around the realm of Sigma Alpha Epsilon. By sharing these real life events, we hope you can learn from your brother's mistakes and lack of common sense. We want you to think about the common sense approach you would take if presented with a similar situation. Together, we can all contribute to not only the financial well-being of our order, but, more importantly, the health and safety of those around us.

The following is an actual situation at one of our chapters. What would you have done differently?

A brother (claimant) of Sigma Alpha Epsilon filed a lawsuit due to the following events which occurred at a two-day beach party that he attended at his chapter house. In order to make the party more realistic, the brothers made their own 18 inch deep decorative pool out of two-by-fours and plastic. The claimant became intoxicated on the first day of the party. Sometime in the early hours he decided to dive into the decorative pool and severely injured himself. He is now paralyzed with only minimal movement in his fingers. The claimant estimated medical maintenance figures of approximately twelve million dollars and lost earnings of nearly two million dollars during his life expectancy. The case was settled for payment in excess of one million dollars. But more seriously is that a brother will never walk again.

ΣAE Foundation Improves Student Loan Program

True to the ΣAE Foundation mission: "Alumni supporting scholastic achievement, leadership training and personal development," the amount a brother can get for a loan has been increased. Juniors, seniors, and graduate students are now eligible for \$5,000 a year in student loans from the Sigma Alpha Epsilon Foundation. A 2.75 cumulative GPA is the standard. However, if your GPA is lower than 2.75, or you are a freshmen or sophomore, you will need to make an appeal to be eligible under special circumstances.

The money is loaned at a six percent interest rate. The interest is deferred until six months after you have graduated from school. At this time, you will begin making monthly payments of principal and interest. These payments can be made over a period of either five or ten years; the choice is yours. However, at no point can the payments amount to less than \$40 per month.

There is a limit of \$20,000 on the total amount that you can borrow. We also require that you spend the money on educational purposes such as tuition, books, housing and other school related expenses. If we discover that the loan has been exchanged for a new jet ski or a weekend in Vegas, then we will accelerate the note so it's due immediately.

The application form is simple: other than the time that it takes to have your registrar sign to attest to your grades and status in school, the application will take you no more than a few minutes to fill out. He's incredibly adept in student loan theory and philosophy and has traveled the world giving seminars on the art of "the loan." It's quite breathtaking.

hile brother M. Dale Augenstein held numerous positions during his days in the undergraduate chapter at Western Kentucky, the most significant occurred when the house cook was taken ill and unable to cook for several weeks. Someone had to step in and feed a house full of

hungry brothers. So Dale went to the kitchen and cooked his first evening meal. He didn't leave the kitchen for two years as he went on to cook every evening meal for the house. After college Dale began his career as vice president of the

Lexington, Kentucky Chamber of Commerce and was later recruited to head up the

Hilton Head Chamber of Commerce.

After establishing himself on Hilton Head, Augenstein established the Steamer Oyster and Steakhouse in 1991. When he first opened, seven of the original ten staff members were $\Sigma A Es$ and one little sister. The restaurant has grown to become one of the major players in the Island's competitive eatery market. This fall the Steamer will be relocating to slightly larger digs to accommodate the increasing popu-

larity of this casual dinning spot. Currently, the Steamer has seatin for 100 in a cozy and casual setting. The new site will seat 150 in the same casual and cozy atmosphere. The Steamer features primarily fresh seafood. A

favorite appetizer is The Perfect 18, that features one-half dozen of Rockefeller, Eleanor and New Orleans oysters.

In May 1995, Augenstein opened the Carolina Crabhouse on Lake Murray just outside Columbia, SC. The restaurant has the same menu and concept that has been so successful at the Steamer. The Crabhouse is located at the Lake Murray Marina where each seat has a spectacular water view. It is larger than its sister restaurant with seating for 200 and an outside area with an additional 100 seats. This fall Augenstein will be opening his third restaurant in a historic area in downtown Columbia.

the restaurant business. He decided to uproot himself from Denver and move there full-time because of Winter Park's growth and future potential. The restaurant is the first phase of a development that Young is putting together, that, when complete, will total 28,000 square feet. The bulk of the remaining project will include a micro-brewery/restaurant. Young realized that Winter Park is the only ski area without a micro-brewery and wants to fill that need. On a final note, Young bought much of his kitchen equipment from Walter Vollrath III, a fellow Colorado Delta brother.

Finding nothing in law enforcement, Livingstone began a mortgage company with two close friends. With interest rates at an all-time low, their business thrived and, within eight months, their business had grown to fourteen full-time employees.

In 1994, with the rise in interest rates, Livingstone sold the business and became manager of another mortgage company. It was in this position that he met his future partner in the restaurant, Al Hamilton. Through careful planning, they found a location and came up with the concept of a Cajun/Creole style restaurant with an American flair, offering inexpensive food with excellent flavor and casual atmosphere.

Fatt Daddy's opened in July of 1995; however, Livingstone still works as branch manager of another mortgage company in Rockville, Maryland, and spends most nights and weekends at the restaurant. Fatt Daddy's has become a regular hangout for many notable people including congressmen, Supreme Court justices, and the $\Sigma A E$ chapter of George Washington University.

As Fatt Daddy's slogan states, "Let the Party Begin." I would begin with a Hoya Hoopla, one of their famous daiquiris, that can be best described as the blue Hawaiian of daiquiris. Follow that up with a Pizza New Orleans appetizer an extra thin crust painted with a red bean tomato sauce and piled high with Andoville sausage, red onions, jalapeno peppers, and jack cheese. For your main course sit back and enjoy a Bourbon Street Steak--12 ounces of New York strip marinated in Cajun spices, grilled and smoothered

with onions and mushrooms. Finally, finish the meal with Cinnamon Apple
Bread Pudding with Bourbon Angles – need



In addition to the three restaurants, Lutz operates two inns that follow the same "western reserve tradition." The Bass Lake Inn, located in the woods of Chardon, is surrounded by a lake and an 18 hole golf course. While The Inn of Chagrin Falls, once the home of poet Hart Crane, has been transformed into a distinctive Village Inn with Victorian charm. The Inn features fifteen unique rooms with private baths. The Gathering Room's impressive fireplace is the perfect setting for quiet conversation and a glass of good Sherry.

So whether you seek a pleasant meal or rustic woodland accommodations, brother Lutz has a place for you.

e Dome of the Four Seasons was established in 1963 by Tennessee oil millionaire Calvin

Houghland to serve the residents of the Four Seasons Condominium. Le Dome was primarily a private club. Dinner at Le Dome was French "Haute Cuisine" prepared and served by an all-French staff. Le

Dome occupies the majority of the penthouse (12th floor) of the condominium, encompassing approximately 5,400 square feet. Fort Lauderdale restaurateur John Carlone purchased Le Dome in 1975 and maintained a similar menu, offering classic French continental cuisine. In December, 1987, brother Doug Mackle became the owner of Le Dome. The elegance and

ambiance have been preserved, and Le Dome is one of the very few South Florida restaurants to have been operated successfully and continuously for more than three decades. In 1995, Mackle changed the



name to *Chef Johnny's* Le Dome to recognize the contributions of and awards won by his son-in-law, Chef Johnny Kromann.

Awards are no stranger to Le Dome. 



Sigma Alpha Epsilon All-American Football Team

As has been the case the past few years, the 1995 ΣAE All-American team is abundant with strong-armed quarterbacks, hard-hitting linebackers and stellar blockers on the offensive line.

Texas Christian University's **Max Knake** was a semi-finalist for the Davey O'Brien Award and received All-Southwest Conference honorable mention. He completed 199 of 369 passes for 2,237 yards, 10 touchdowns and had a career best game against Kansas in 1995, hitting 32 of 57 for 391 yards. Knake's career passing figures of 1,115 attempts, 622 completions, 7,370 yards and 49 TDs are all TCU records and rank him in the top five in Southwest Conference history.

Murray State quarterback **Mike Cherry**, initiated at Arkansas, was named to the All-Ohio Valley Conference first team and ranked sixth in NCAA Division I-AA passing efficiency with 152.4 rating points. He completed 135 of 225 for 2,084 yards, 16 TDs in leading the Racers to an 11-0 mark, the OVC Championship and a Division I-AA playoff berth. Cherry's top two games were 17 0f 24 for 328 yards and 2 TDs against Eastern Kentucky and 13 of 21 for 312 yards and 3 TDs versus Tennessee Tech.

Also in the All-American backfield is M.I.T.'s **Jose DeLeon**, who ranked 21st in Division III rushing with 116.1 yards per game (167 carries for 929 yards). He led the team with 66 points, was All-ECFC first team and earned *Football Gazette* Division III and ECFC Player of the Week honors during the season.

The receiving corps is led by Pacific's **Damon Bowers**, who had 22 receptions for 239 yards. He won the team's Iron Man Award and excelled on special teams (6 tackles and 4 kickoff returns for 53 yards). **Geoff Huetten** was on the All-


Mt. Hood League second team and led Willamette with 30 receptions for 413 yards and 5 TDs. Tight end **Todd Cwynar** helped lead Duquesne to a 10-1 season and the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference title, grabbing 9 passes for 136 yards and excelling as a blocker.

Offensive tackle **Bill Sowders** helped Northern Arizona set a team scoring record (403 points) and led the Big Sky Conference in rushing. He earned All-Big Sky second team selection as the Lumberjacks posted a 7-4 record. The other offensive tackle is Yale's **Mike Bender**, who was named to the All-Ivy League second team.

Offensive guard **Brad Ainsworth** started every game for Mississippi State and is the All-American team's biggest player at 316 pounds. Also starting every contest was All-Ohio Valley Conference second team guard **Chris Reid** of Tennessee Tech. At center is **Justin Werth**, who was Pacific's regular starter. Handling the kicking duties is **Jason Crowson** of Eastern New Mexico. He was second in scoring with 38 points, booting 20 extra points and 6 field goals (including a career best 49-yarder).

The ΣAE All-American defensive unit features four line-backers who played key roles for their schools. **Justin Dragoo** of Arizona State rebounded from three years of injuries and ranked fourth with 64 tackles. He was named to the GTE University Division Academic All-American second team, received All-Pac-10 honorable mention and was co-winner of the team's Oil Can Award. Pacific linebacker **Vince Bruno** was named to the All-Big West second team and ranked second with 67 tackles.

Colorado State linebacker **Nate Kvamme** was named Western Athletic Conference Defensive Player of the Week against Wyoming and helped lead the Rams to an 8-3 record, the WAC championship and a Holiday Bowl berth. He was the fifth-leading tackler with 61, intercepted 2 passes and recovered 2 fumbles. Yale's **Kris Kristynik** ranked third in tackles with 67 (including 7 for losses), broke up 6 passes and had an interception.

The $\Sigma A E$ defensive backfield is led by cornerback **Brady Schneider**, who saw a lot

M.I.T.'s **Duane Stevens** gained All-ECFC honorable mention, with 58 tackles, deflected a team high 12 passes and recovered 2 fumbles.

A number of other ΣAE football players are deserving of mention for their fine performances during the 1995 season. Quarterback **Greg Triplett** had 4 starts for Tennessee Tech and completed 61 of 91 for 559 yards and 2 TDs. Washington & Lee fullback **Aaron Wilkinson** started every game, rushed for 237 yards on 57 carries and caught 22 passes for 200 yards. Halfback **Andy Roberts** of DePauw ran for 197 yards on 54 attempts.

Among receivers, M.I.T.'s **Trent Redman** caught 29 passes for 376 yards, 2 TDs, was on the ALL-ECFC second team and is tri-captain elect for next fall. **Greg Lockett** of Puget Sound caught 21 passes for 178 yards and 2 TDs in 5 games. **Josh Shapiro** of Arizona saw special teams action and **Barney Lynch** played every game at tight end for Furman. Tight end **Troy Gayeski** of M.I.T. caught 18 passes for 255 yards, 3 TDs and was on the All-ECFC second team. **Brook Loper** started 5 contests at tight end for Rhodes.

There were other good offensive linemen of note. **Brian Nutter** was an offensive tackle starter for Furman and teammate **Greg Sander** started at guard. **Troy Lucas** was a valuable guard for the 13-2 Montana's Division I-AA champs and guard **Brian Peoples** was on the All-Centennial second team for Dickinson. **Mitch Palmer** was Colorado State's long snapper and played in the Holiday Bowl. **Jason Urban** saw starting duty at guard for DePauw and M.I.T. guard **Joel Donnelly** is tri-captain elect.

Good linebackers were plentiful this past season. Colorado State's **Jim Detterick** had 13 tackles for the WAC champions. Kansas State's **Jim Bob Clements** was a good special teams

He led his Findlay squad to a 10-1-2 record and the NAIA Division II co-championship (21-21 tie with Central Washington in the title game). Chris Ault (Nevada-Reno '68) led his alma mater to the Big West crown, a 9-2 season and a Las Vegas Bowl berth. North Carolina's Mack Brown (Florida State '74) took the Tarheels to a 6-5 season and Carquest Bowl berth. Bob Biggs (Cal-Davis '73) led his alma mater to a 6-3-1 season and **Don Nehlen** (Bowling Green '58) concluded his 16th season at West Virginia.

Terry Shea (Oregon '68) was named head coach at Rutgers in mid-December. The former San Jose head coach (1990-91) served as quarterbacks coach for the CFL British Columbia Lions in 1995 after several seasons as assistant head coach/offensive coordinator at Stanford.


The Gold and Purple Banner Flies High over Memphis!

MEN'S HEALTH ISSUES

Hazing and Suicide - Part II

Pledge Education and Alumni Relations

Dr. J. Michael Finley (Michigan State '82)

have had the special privilege and honor of serving Sigma Alpha Epsilon as a member of the Men's Health Committee since 1987 and as chairman since the 1991 San Diego Convention. This capacity has allowed me the opportunity to visit chapters and provinces nationwide and be appointed to National and Province Leadership School faculties. Throughout, these experiences have been both immensely challenging and personally rewarding. As I have met brothers throughout the Realm, I have become more convinced than ever of the need to treat our beloved fraternity and its members as an extended family. Nothing, however quite prepared me for the responses regarding the article in this column in the Winter 1996 Annual Report.

I received calls from parents of undergraduate brothers stating that their sons no longer had anything to do with $\Sigma A E$. The theme linking all of the calls was hazing. Many related that the fraternity that is $\Sigma A E$ today is not the fraternity many of them remember – whether as members, parents or guests in our chapter houses. Stories of pledges being beaten - describing the experience of lifetime as "Boot-camp" - needless to say saddened and sickened me. One mother suggested that adult supervision was necessary - bring back the housemothers was advised! I thought we had chapters full of young men who wished to be treated with respect and deference. Men desiring guidance, but autonomy. Men who wanted to be listened to. Yet, if asked to set higher standards of scholarship, participate in member education programs, increase rush numbers or other initiatives from the Fraternity Office, many of our chapters routinely ignore or fragrantly violate the fraternity, university or municipal laws. Not only are activities of hazing, abuse of women and property illegal, they insidiously cheapen the family that is our fraternity, Sigma Alpha Epsilon.

A mother phoned to tell of her 24 year-old son, an ΣAE who had graduated one year ago after finding school a challenge. He had served his mid-eastern chapter, holding several offices and seemingly enjoyed his days in the chapter. Six months after leaving school, he filled a backpack full of stones and jumped into a river cutting short his life. This particular mother, who herself had suffered with depression, was keenly aware that

her only son had made an impact on his chapter as over seventy $\Sigma A \, E$ brothers attended the funeral. She couldn't help, however, but relate her concern that the fraternity and its brotherhood, which her son so valued, (he was wearing an $\Sigma A \, E$ shirt when his body was recovered), had nevertheless failed to provide the serenity, safety and love that family and fraternities are ideally supposed to offer. It is a question that may forever remain unanswered.

Professionally, as a physician, I have seen the seedier side of life by choice, but I have always wished for more from my fraternity. At times, the fraternity is a source of strength, support, friendship and love. At other times, its a source of embarrassment, heartache and dysfunction. Yet, like a family, our daily activities speak loudest about the type of organization we are. Sigma Alpha Epsilon proudly fills pages in this publication and others of its achievements, philanthropic support and scholarship. We promote our core values in our ritual and The True Gentleman. However, of the thousands of principles for success developed over the ages, there is one principle that will, more than anything else, do more to assure the accomplishment of wonderful things in life. This principle is so important, that, if not highly developed, it is impossible to truly achieve your maximum potential.

I am talking about the principle of selfdiscipline, the self-control equal to all emergencies that John Walter Wayland speaks of in The True Gentleman. Self-discipline is a habit, a practice, a philosophy, and a way of living. All successful people and organizations are highly disciplined in the important work they do; all the unsuccessful people are undisciplined and unable to control their behaviors and appetites. Only when the family that is Sigma Alpha Epsilon develops the same levels of high, personal and organizational discipline possessed by the most successful people in our society, will we achieve the results for which we hope and strive. From successful rush, to the cultivation of life-long friendship in our chapter houses and alumni associations, without self-control $\Sigma A E$ is just another fraternity. At a time when attracting students for prospective membership is becoming more competitive, creating an environment in which "...harmony and good feelings reign in our midst..." is not just an option, but an imperative.

A father, a 1964 ΣAE alumnus, wrote to say how much the fraternity had meant to him as an undergraduate and therefore, he was very interested in having his son pledge $\Sigma A E$. He went so far as to have "everyone I knew write letters on my son's behalf." He described his son as bashful and insecure and described a hospitalization at age ten for emotional problems. Despite this, because of the enjoyable and memorable experience that $\Sigma A E$ had been for this father, similar I trust, to that of many readers of this column, he prodded his son to pledge the $\Sigma A E$ chapter. Beginning with this high, the profound hazing that his son experienced including such "brotherhood activities" as abuse of alcohol, stealing a car, and assaulting of pledges ultimately resulted in his son quitting the fraternity before being initiated. This former $\Sigma A E$ pledge, a legacy, has now transferred schools and is "very happy without $\Sigma A E$." The hardest part of the letter to read was how this father, a once proud $\Sigma A E$ alumnus, now felt about his fraternity:

" ΣAE meant a lot to me; but since my son's experience, I have had nothing to do with ΣAE . While I had some great experiences when in college, based on my son's ΣAE experience, ΣAE has changed, and if this is what ΣAE has become, my son and I will do just fine without the fraternity."

Quite a commentary on alumni, community and campus relations.

For those readers who feel I have strayed from the mission of Men's Health typically discussed here, I apologize. There is little doubt that these passionate responses from parents speak loudly about problems occurring in our Fraternity and its chapters. Life in the fraternity is an ongoing battle between the forces of doing what is right and necessary on the one hand and doing what is fun and easy on the other. Developing the character of self-control and self-discipline allows the development of an inner sense of strength and confidence that replaces positive thinking with positive knowing. Self-discipline is its own reward. Every time we practice self-discipline, we serve to make Sigma Alpha Epsilon an exceptional fraternity. To truly become "men who appear well in any company."
